


NUMBER ONE PICKS



Peter & Gordon Kick Off US Tour With 2nd Single

NEW YORK — Peter & Gordon, British recording artists whose first Capitol single, "A World Without Love." is now approaching the top of the Record World best-seller chart, will arrive in New York from London on Monday, June 15, at Kennedy Airport, to begin an extended concert tour.

Simultaneously, Capitol is rush-releasing the duo's second single record, "Nobody I Know" (b/w "You Don't Have To Tell Me"), already a big hit in England. "Nobody I Know," like "A World Without Love," was written by John Lennon and Paul McCartney of the Beatles.

Peter & Gordon's first American concerts will be staged at the New York World's Fair June 19, 20, 21, with subsequent bookings planned for Boston, Philadelphia, Balti-

more, Washington, Cleveland, Detroit, Chicago, Atlanta, New Orleans, Houston, Dallas, Los Angeles, Las Vegas and San Francisco. According to present schedules, the tour will conclude with concerts in Honolulu on July 3, 4 and 5. National TV appearances are being negotiated.

On Tuesday, June 16, Capitol will host a luncheon for music-trade press in Peter & Gordon's honor at the Tower Suite of the Time-Life Building.

Peter & Gordon are managed by the Noel Gay Organization, Ltd., 24 Denmark St., London, with American representation by Harold Cohen Agency, Inc., 580 Fifth Ave., New York City.

Peter Asher, 19, and Gordon Waller, 18, became friends five years ago at school. They began playing guitar and singing together, performing at school concerts and eventually at local coffee bars and folk-music clubs. In order to work their club dates, Peter and Gordon nightly scaled the 12-foot wall which imprisoned the young scholars every night at 9.

Eventually, escaping and sneaking back every night became too much of a conflict with their studies. With the offer of an engagement at London's Pickwick Club, an in-spot for show-business types, school was out for good.

During their run, the boys were spotted by Norman Newell, recording manager for EMI (the British recording home of The Beatles). At an audition, Peter and Gordon ran through their material for Newell. He felt they had good potential, but realized they needed a new and different song for their first recording. They had one, but it wasn't completed.

However, Beatles Lennon and McCartney were called immediately, they came directly to the studio, finished writing the song, and Newell made the record. All this took just under four hours.

Billy J. Kramer Exits US But The 'Beat' Lingers On

NEW YORK — Just before returning home to England, Billy J. Kramer (without The Dakotas) tarried long enough to chat with Record World about his first American visit. Which included concerts and a successful stint on "The Ed Sullivan Show."

"Actually," said the agreeable, good-looking, fleshily Presley-like 20-year-old, "I only saw Texas and New York. I guess the World's Fair impressed me the most of all the sights I did manage to see. It's a gas."

Billy, whose Imperial single of "Little Children" (and album) is a hit finds himself in the unusual position of having a two-sided click. The flip, "Bad To Me," is now moving up fast. "I thought 'Little Children,' being a quiet, slowmoving song, would take a long time to make the Hit Parade. but it surprised me. It's a funny business. When I recorded 'I'll Keep You Satisfied' it was my favorite song, one I really liked. But it was a slow starter. Meanwhile, the other songs that I didn't really care too much about became solid hits fast."

Billy's next single (with The Dakotas) will probably be "From a Window" and will be out in a week or so.

No Solo

Did he ever think he might go it solo, sans the four Dakotas? "No," he said flatly. "We've got an overall sound. We started off together and we'll go the rest of the way together. I need them." (At the time of the interview, The Dakotas didn't need Billy—they were in their hotel rooms following a day's outing which had left them sunburned and suffering.)

Surely the most clean-cut and photogenic of the current batch from Blighty, Billy would love to make a movie, but he has apprehensions. "I'd be afraid to act with The Dakotas about. They'd make me laugh and ruin the scene. They're awfully funny fellows, you know."

He has had no musical training, only sang in the choir back home in (where else?) Liverpool. "I always wanted to be in show business, but I just couldn't see any opportunity in Liverpool. But Brian Epstein saw me performing—before The Beatles—and that was the beginning of everything wonderful that's happened to me."

Billy said that his favorite American recording stars are Gene Pitney, Brook Benton and Rick Nelson, whom he slightly resembles.

As for any predictions as to how long he and The Dakotas would last on the music scene, Billy said, "We don't have any gimmicks. We just sing good songs the way we feel them. If we don't last, I think it'll be because we stopped choosing good songs. In time I want to do faster songs, vary it.

"The important thing for any newcomers in this business to remember, I think, is to perform in your own way and be sincere. If you've got it, you've got it."

Well, Billy's got it, and he's now taking it to England. Sweden and Australia for extensive tours. And, he hopes, back to the U.S. in the fall.



I BELIEVE (Cromwell, ASCAP) SWEET LULLABIES (Picadilly, BMI)

THE BACHELORS-London 9672.

The Bachelors bring back this inspirational tune and give it their all. The thinking on this slice was big; therefore the big ork sound and the big vocal impact. This one has all the earmarks of a tremendous followup hit for the trio from England.

ELVIS' "VIVA LAS VEGAS" EP

ELVIS PRESLEY-RCA Victor EPA 4382.

RCA has a potent one here in this EP that features four of the tunes from the hipswinger's latest film. Ops will like this one as well as the myriads of Presley fans. There will be no album from this flick which should mean that much more for sales on the EP slice.

HAPPY HAPPY BIRTHDAY BABY (Arc, BMI) THAT BOY'S GONNA BE MINE (Morris, ASCAP)

DIANE RAY-Mercury 72276.

Diane revives an oldie that teens proved to have liked before and will probably go for in this new version. Her singing is straightforward and strong. The lyrics, for those who may have forgotten, tell of a birthday greeting from a gal to her ex-boyfriend.

THE 7TH DAWN (United Artists, ASCAP) YOU'RE TOO MUCH (Alou, ASCAP)

FERRANTE AND TEICHER— United Artists 735.

The piano team produces some potent instrumental music here. The tune is the theme from a new William Holden-Capucine film that takes place in jungle territory. The music sketches the lush, sensuous aura of that kind of atmosphere and should score heavily on the market.

THE SEVENTH DAWN (United Artists, ASCAP) LOVE THEME FROM THE CARPETBAGGERS (Famous, ASCAP)

HENRY JEROME-Decca 31635.

Henry has taken the theme from William Holden's new adventure pic and outfitted it with a beat that any stripper would be delighted to work to. The sound is brassy and brazen and should make many a summer day sizzle.

TIME IS ON MY SIDE (Rittenhouse, BMI) ANYONE WHO KNOWS WHAT LOVE IS (WILL UNDERSTAND) (Metric, BMI)

IRMA THOMAS—Imperial 66041.

Irma has a new slice out that could go either way as far as sides are concerned. She belts on the "Time" side along with a gospel like chorus. On the flip she describes in bluesy fashion her hardhearted man. Outstanding work here.

DO I LOVE YOU (Mother Bertha, BMI) BEBE AND SUSU (Mother Bertha, BMI)

THE RONETTES—Philles 121.

The Ronettes look as if they have another big one here. Right from an extended instrumental lead-in this one is geared to spellbind the teens. It will do just that and should be turning up on charts in short order.

I LIKE IT LIKE THAT (Johete, BMI) YOU'RE SO FINE AND SWEET (Johete, BMI)

THE MIRACLES-Tamla 54098.

The Miracles turn out a fine group effort here that will land them high on charts. The beat is sure and on the slow side and should allow for some good dancing. Teens will like the whole set-up and dealers should like it like that.

LIKE COLUMBUS DID (Myto, BMI) LONELY GIRL (Myto, BMI)

THE REFLECTIONS—Golden World 12.

The Reflections have made an important inroad on pop charts and are likely to repeat the action with this midtempo rocker that has them going for some interesting rhythms and vocal effects. A fine sequel to "Romeo and Juliet."

SAILOR BOY (T. M., BMI) HE'S JUST ANOTHER GUY (Blackwood, BMI)

THE SHERRY SISTERS—Epic 5-9693.

The Sherry Sisters have a summery sound here that should attract the teen boy and gal buyers. It's the old story about an adolescent naval romance, and the duo's spritely singing plus cute arrangement put it across.

LET IT BE ME (Leeds, ASCAP) MARIE, MARIE (Calvacade, ASCAP)

GILBERT BECAUD-Kapp 599.

Gilbert revives an old US hit, which just happens to have been written by him before it ever got to these shores. He gives it a soulful, meaningful reading that should get it to listeners this time just as it did previously.

DANCING IN THE STREETS (Dov, ASCAP) DON'T LET THE SUN CATCH YOU CRYIN' (Northern, ASCAP)

JERRY CRUTCHFIELD—Coral 62416.

Jerry has a spirited little instrumental that is just what it's title suggests—jubilant and bright. The piano work and the rest of the orchestra, for that matter, do some happy duty. This could break into a big summer hit.

THAT'S RIGHT (Roosevelt, BMI) FANNIE TUCKER (Picturetone, BMI)

BOBBY LEWIS-ABC Paramount 10565.

Ray leads his singers through a merry little ditty that everybody should remember. It's got a summer brightness to it that could catch the public fancy again. Whistling is one of the big assets of this singalong item.

SHOUT (Wemar, BMI) FORGET ME BABY (Burlington, ASCAP)

LULU AND THE LUVERS-Parrot 9678.

Gritty-voiced Lulu and The Luvers go through the old Isley hit with a tremendous amount of energy. They burn up the grooves with the reverberating tones of this fast-moving rocker that should certainly score well on charts.

WHERE IS LOVE (Hollis, BMI) THE ANGELS SENT YOU (Unart, BMI) THE DANLEERS—Smash 1895.



Prestige PT 7323.







Lux Lewis Dies

Prestige Beefs Up The Jazz Scene

Summertime & Sales Are Easy: Verve's 'Ipanema' A&Rer Taylor

(Editor's note: This is the third in "Record World's" current series on the jazz scene.)

NEW YORK — At Verve Records these days there's little concern over whether jazz is dying or not. They're too busy watching sales climb steadily for their latest jazz single success, the Stan Getz-Astrud Gilberto "Girl From Ipanema," and their latest jazz album success, "Getz/Gilberto," featuring the unabridged "Ipanema" slice.

According to Creed Taylor, Verve A&R producer, responsible for the latest Getz album, sales on the album will surpass those for last year's click "Jazz Samba"—also from Getz. And the single sales are phenomenal,

too (the disk jumps on this week's Record World top pop chart from 95 to 51) thanks to the quality of the song itself and the plugs it's been getting via heavy air play

and unsolicited praise from the likes of TV's Johnny Carson and Life Magazine.

But this summer boom is nothing new to Taylor or Verve. Since Taylor's arrival at his present position with the jazz subsid of MGM Records over three years ago, he recalls four consecutive summer hits of large proportions — Jimmy Smith's "Walk on The Wild Side," Getz' "Desafinado," Kai Winding's "More" and the current "Ipanema."

No Accident

This is no accident, Taylor states. "The summer seems to have something special for jazz instrumentals. Perhaps it's the exposure on beach transistors and the jazz heard at resorts. Of course, "The Girl from Ipanema' has a summery flavor to it."

The diskery timed the album release carefully, hoping that the March outing would set up the summer sales. Their thinking, needless to say, has proved wise in the extreme.

There was another reason for the album's release in March. And that was to hold it off because of the growing skepticism toward bossa nova sales. Although the album was recorded in March, 1963, Taylor reports that any release around that time would have meant misfortune. It would have been regarded as just another bossa album on an already bossa-saturated market, he felt.

And even with release a year after the recording, the packaging of the disk was done with a careful eye to avoiding any mention of the term "bossa nova." In fact, he said, the label was prepared to "hide the fact," since the distribs might have felt it was "old hat." "We've learned not to categorize, because if you say a record is jazz or bossa nova, people might say they don't like jazz or bossa nova. And they'll never even listen," Taylor explained. The idea, it seems, is just to send out each disk as music and let it stand on its own.

Verve has found that they can usually get a jazz single or album off the ground on an r&b station. To precipitate action, label has prepared special deejay albums on many of its recent releases. On these albums each band fits the airplay time demands. "There's a definite sales impact," Taylor said, "since there's so much additional airplay."

Single Releases

Taylor tends to take a conservative attitude about the release of singles. He reports that he usually waits to hear what slices are getting heaviest air play. Then he puts out a single—editing the band where necessary. (There are four splices on "Ipanema," he informed.)

If the single takes off, the label immediately and invariably sends out album stickers proclaiming that "This Album contains the hit single. . . ." "This gets the distributors excited," he said. "I don't know how it motivates the consumer." He agreed that it certainly couldn't hurt sales.

It's this excitement over a hit (Continued on page 16)

Parrot Records Flying Via Four New Singles

London's Walt Maguire Forecasts Fair Weather En Route

BY DOUG McCLELLAND

NEW YORK—In a record industry in which monkey-see, monkey-do has become the catchphrase of success (especially with the constant parade of gimmicky foreign artists), it seems appropriate that one of the most promising new labels, Parrot, is named for a feathered friend known for his imitations of mortality.

The label—now working up steam with four new recordings—was not named for this reason, however, according to Walt Maguire, head of the London-London American Group, Pop A&R and Sales. The new record label, Maguire told Record World last week, was named Parrot "simply because it was about the only one left. We went through birds, trees, stones . . ."

Parrot was formed soon after Maguire returned to London in March, 1964, after a brief hiatus with Colpix Records, "around the end of April, I believe. The London label was doing so well, I didn't want to overload it with releases. And I didn't want to turn down good product, either. So . . . I arranged with British Decca for the birth of Parrot."

Maguire added that another advantageous reason for a new label with British product is that they don't have to give it all to London distributors, but in some cases are able to service the independent distributor handling the American Group.

The singles currently show-

ing considerable promise on Parrot are "Everything's Al'-Right," by The Mojos; "A Million Drums," by Tony Sheveton; "Apple Blossom Time," by The Pickwicks; and "Shout," by Lulu and The Luvers." "They're all good artists,"

"They're all good artists," said Maguire. "With The Bachelors and The Rolling Stones on London, we'd have flooded that line and made things impossible. We're going to be careful choosing Parrot artists, too. If we hit really big with any of the Parrot folk, we'll have an artist we can build on the label, along with the label."

Distributor reaction has been unusually good thus far, Maguire went on. "They've been calling and saying some mighty nice things, which they normally don't bother to do, and that makes me feel even more confident that I really did the right thing."

All the Parrot performances released to date have been vocals, but Maguire said that he had just signed an instrumental artist, too. "It's Andrew Oldham, producer of all The Rolling Stones records and also

an indie producer with British Decca. He's 20 years old and heads an orchestra with a crazy, party pop sound that could be very commercial. His first Parrot single, 'The Theme From The Dick Van Dyke Show,' will be out soon. It has a wonderful young sound."

Working on Parrot

Working with Maguire on his Parrot baby are New York Londonders Sy Warner, Sales; Moe Schulman, National Promotion; Al Steckler, Engineer; and Sandy Ginsberg, Maguire's Girl Friday—the same G.F. who's been with Maguire for about eight years, was with

him when he started the London American Group about six years ago.

Maguire said that Parrot would probably remain a teensound label, "If one of our artists really takes off, there will be LPs, too; but at present we're playing it by ear."

Maguire keeps busy in his other departments, too. He is just issuing a Rolling Stones single called from their debut (Continued on page 15)

Our Hi Records label is also something very special to me, and London. Each year Hi shows stronger volume than the previous year. and with only a few artists on the label-Bill Black's Combo. Ace Cannon and Gene Simmons."

But this trip Record World had come for word on the bird. and Maguire beamed when he reiterated, "the reaction has been terrific on all four of our Parrot singles. The bird is on the wing, all right."

Chris Blackwell in US Spreading The Word on R&B. The Jamaica Ska

NEW YORK-Chris Blackwell, head of England's Island Records and one of the biggest pushers of rhythm and blues there (as well as The Jamaica Ska), is visiting the United States on (at least) a three-fold mission.

First, he told Record World, he is visting with Sue Records' topper Juggy Murray, whose product he distributes in England on its own Sue label and is negotiating with other labels to release their r&b material on Sue over there. "I want to give Sue the image of the r&b specialist back home," he said.

Second, Blackwell will visit Smash Records' home base in Chicago to drop off the tapes of Millie Small's new single and first LP for the company. Millie, whom Blackwell discovered, manages and produces, was largely responsible for the initial interest in The Jamaica Ska in England—and over here, where her "My Boy Lollipop" is still a hit.

A Lot of Ska

"Millie's new album will contain a lot of Ska," Blackwell said. "but it'll be a commercial kind of Ska, like 'Lollipop.' I think The Ska can be big over here, but it has to be commercialized. It needs the right song and artist, not just the sound itself.

"I'm amazed that 'Lollipop' wasn't on any of the r&b charts in America. It was originally a rhythm and blues market breakout in England, you know."

Third, Blackwell is making deals for Millie Small to come to The States to do some shows.

Blackwell also has an unusual distribution setup back home: in London he distributes his wax from vans on the road, instead of through distributors. EMI is employed for the rest of England. All his material for Island Records, incidentally, is culled directly from Jamaica, and he'll be on his way there after Chicago.

(Continued from page 11) single that usually interests the distribs, Taylor said, Otherwise, he indicated, they take a calm attitude toward jazz disks that can approach disinterest. "Too often," he said, "when a jazz single hits, it immediately becomes 'pop' in everybody's mind."

Taylor stated that his main interest is in building artists, not at all in building trends, although it was the Getz/Verve combo that initially set off the bossa craze. And despite a possible renewed interest in bossa inspired by the latest Getz hit, Taylor has no plans to exploit it. "I wouldn't try to revive anything," he laughed.

Instead he keeps alert to possible musical fields his roster of artists can explore. "I'm kind of a commercial watchdog," he said. Right now, for instance, he is readying a Gary MacFarland disk that will incorporate some Beatle tunes-mainly because they are musically akin to the kind of work Taylor would like to see MacFarland do. Because of the possible reaction to the album as "just another album of Beatle tunes." Taylor said that the cover will not play up the Beatle angle. If anything, he'll underplay the fact.

Jazz Dying?

Does Taylor believe that jazz is dying? He says no. (And, of course, in the light of the yearly increase in Verve sales, and in



To Believe Or Not To Believe

HOLLYWOOD-During the past several years many disk jockeys have repeatedly asked me, "What is the one most important thing to remember to be a good disk jockey?" My answer has always been, "You must remember to be Believable."

If as a dj or program director you forget everything else but believability, then you still will have remembered the one most important word in radio.

Without believability you are doomed to failure as a broadcaster.

What is believability? It is the act of sounding sincere about everything you do while you are on the air. In other words, it is the act of sounding believable. If your listeners believe you mean it when you say a record or product is great, then they will buy it. If they believe you are really as happy as you sound, if they believe you really enjoy your program, they too will return again and again for more happiness and enjoyment.

Too often we get into the habit of saying words just to fill time. Well-worn clichés come rolling out of our mouths almost as if we had invented them. When this happens believability goes out the window. Your ratings do, too. Remember, to acquire and keep good ratings a station and its sound must be permeated with believability.

Believe what you say, and say only what you believe!

Norman Weiser:

Tag Means Just That

NEW YORK - Four Corner Records, whose reactivation was announced a couple of weeks ago by parent company Kapp Records, will release its first single record under the new management this week, according to Norman Weiser, newly instated Managing Director.

Talking with Record World, Weiser announced that the single, "Girls Cry Faster Than Boys" by The Ramblettes, a new New York group, is being issued first "for one thing, to apprise the industry that we are just what our name implies -a record company specializing in wax from all over the globe, not just European imports, which it originally was."

Weiser informed that FCR also has contracted Francoise Hardy, one of France's celebrated teen thrushes included in the overall category of The Yé-Yé Girls (Record World, June 6). The 19-year-old Miss Hardy not only sings but composes much of her own music. although her Four Corners debut single (coming the week after The Ramblettes') will be the oldie, "Catch a Falling Star"—in English.

MMMMilva

The label will also release a new album by Italy's Milva, entitled "MMMMilva." The diskery is also re-releasing "Bravo!", by Claudio Villa, and "Lolita Sings in German.

"The important thing to remember," Weiser continued, "is that while we plan to retain our foreign situation, we are expanding into a regular record company with all kind of product. We want to be as competitive as we can, but also very select. Moe Preskel!who's moved over from Kapp to be Four Corners' Marketing Director-and I went over about 250 things before we decided to make our first release 'Girls Cry Faster Than Boys."

"Moe is deeply involved in the entire operation," said Weiser, who himself had come from 20th Century Fox Records and, earlier, United Artists. "Moe knows all areas of the operation, and is a great asset.'

Was the reactivation of Four Corners prompted by the tremendous increase in popularity of foreign artists and recordings?

"No, I don't believe so," he

replied. "Dave Kapp started the label, you know, and it's always been in his mind. I think. He's a pioneer in the record business and is one of the most aware men in the area of foreign recordings, and I'm sure that's why he conceived the labe! initially."

Separate Company

Four Corners operates autonomously, as a separate company, although both Neil Galligan of Congress Records and Weiser are responsible to the top Kapp management - Dave Kapp and son Mickey. Weiser said it was a joy working with the pros and gentlemen he has come in contact with during his still brief tenure at Four Corners, ("I took a week off after leaving Fox—whew!").

Four Corners will also not necessarily be using the same distributors as Kapp, "We'll be using our own to a great extent.

Weiser opines that the new Four Corners is also a new concept for a record company: a diskery that melds foreign product with its home-grown pop material, rather than keeping them separate operating entities, as the majority of the majors do. "Everything-and everyone-will work together" is the way Weiser sees it.

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

Atlantic Promotes Ska The Limit

Atlantic Records is blanketing the country with dance instruction charts for The Jamaica Ska. The record label has already released three ska singles and is following up the interest generated by these disks with extensive mailings of instructions on how to do Ska dance steps.

Atlantic has sent the Ska dance charts, which are fully illustrated, to distributors, djs, dealers and other interested parties. Bulk quantities of the dance steps are available to djs and others as give-aways.

Another development involving Atlantic and the Ska is the signing this week of Byron Lee to an exclusive recording contract by the company. Lee is credited with playing a key role in setting off the Ska rage in Jamaica and the West Indies. Ahmet Ertegun, President of Atlantic Records, has recorded a number of sides by Byron Lee and His Ska Kings, including the recently released, "Watermelon Man Ska." Atlantic has an album of Jamaica Ska music in the works including several selections by Lee.

Jamaica Ska music continues to open up new areas of activity in this country. The Arthur Murray Dance Studios are now teaching the Ska dance steps. To facilitate this, the Arthur Murray management has sent Atlantic Ska records, with dance instructions, to their network of 400 dance studios from coast to coast.

A group of Jamaica Ska dancers have been in this country for the past four or five weeks, and they have made a number of appearances in the New York area on TV shows, the World's Fair, the Palladium, Trudy Heller's, theaters and amusement parks. On all of these appearances, the Jamaican dancers, who are here under the auspices of the Jamaican government, have taught their enthusiastic audiences the dance steps to the Jamaica Ska.

By the way, Ringo Star had to go into London's University College Hospital with a throat infection, and had to miss the European Tour. But he'll be all right for Australia and America.



Light Classics: Who Sells? (Part III)

RCA's 'Victory', Lanza, Franchi Moving; Ditto Columbia's Kostelanetz, Mercury's Fennell, Epic's Clevelanders, London #4

"Victory At Sea"

Robert Russell Bennett's RCA Victor Records albums of Richard Rodgers' score for the television series "Victory at Sea" are good sellers. They are a phenomenon in an industry of phenomena. The first album was a tremendous seller and was re-recorded for stereo. The second and third albums, while not as big as the first, have done extremely well. They had several things going for them. First the heroic and romantic melodies of Rodgers' score; secondly the TV series itself which ran for over two years and which detailed the enormous contribution of the U.S. Navy World War II shown in documentary films; thirdly, Bennett's sterling orchestrations; and finally, the men who lived through these exciting events themselves and who found the album a memento of this crucial time of their lives.

Lanza-Franchi

RCA has the romantic Italian tenor business sewed up with Lanza and Franchi. Lanza continues to sell strong. His "Student Prince" is a big one. Lanza's big sales burst happened in the early 1950s when he re-created the life of Caruso in the motion picture "The Great Caruso." That album, which had the film going for it, took off like a house afire, and established Lanza's fame throughout the U.S.

In the mid 1950s RCA merchandised a Lanza album, "Lanza Sings Caruso Favorites," by piggy-backing to it a 12" LP of Caruso singing the same favorites. This album also took off and made the pop best seller charts. Today, both continue to sell well as do his albums of "The Vagabond King," "The Desert Song" and "Love Songs and a Neapolitan Serenade.' Recently, RCA issued "I'll See You In My Dreams," an album that contains 11 songs which do not appear in any other Lanza albums. Album was taken from air-checks made of the Coca Cola programs of the early 1950s and. according to dealers, is moving

RCA gave Sergio Franchi a big build-up before his Ameri-

can debut concert at New York's Carnegie Hall, and it has payed off. Subsequent appearances on top-rated TV evening variety shows have boosted demand for Franchi albums. Although his catalog is relatively small, his albums are selling. Most recent albums are "Dream Duet" (with soprano Anna Moffo) and "The Women In My Life" (an album that includes the inevitable "Laura," etc.) Franchi has the sex appeal, the voice and the looks to be a latter-day Lanza, but it's up to RCA to build him.

Kostelanetz

Kostelanetz' new "Wonderland of Sound" series on Columbia has been getting a good share of the light-classical business. Anything is fair game for the "Wonderland" treatment (clever arrangements which highlight stereo's depth and directionality). But the albums sound good on mono, too. One of the reasons is arranger Eddie Sauter who has succeeded in giving Kosty's massedstrings hallmark a new lease on life.

Among his most successful albums in his new series are "Gypsy Fire," "Strauss Waltz-"Wonderland of Sound." "Wonderland of Marches" and "Wonderland of Opera" (a collection of favorite arias arranged for full symphony orchestra). His "Gershwin Wonderland" (a collection of Gershwin favorites heard not nearly as often as they should be) features brilliant arrangements and performances of favorites like "I Got Rhythm," "Embraceable You," "The Man I Love," "Fascinatin' Rhythm" plus excerpts from "Catfish Row." The most recent Kosty hit is "New York Wonderland" (a collection of hits inspired by New York). It is packaged with an extra bonus, LP "World-Wide

Wonderland" with songs that were inspired by the world's great pleasure spots: "Under Paris Skies," "O Solo Mio," "Song of India." Both albums Timed to tie-in with the New York World's Fair, the special package is doing very well. All albums mentioned so far, are on Columbia's \$3.98/\$4.98 pop label. Kosty has one winner on the Masterworks label: World Favorite Romantic Piano Concertos, featuring "The Warsaw Concerto" and well-known themes from best-selling concertos, Young pianist Ivan Davis turns in good performances. Kostelanetz' current press, as conductor of the Philharmonic Promenade concerts at New York's Lincoln Center. is keeping his name in the spotlight and helping the sale of his catalog.

Mercury's Fennell

Like Capitol's Hollywood Bowl Promenade Series, Mercury's "Curtain Up!" albums are all strongly packed with favorites. Biggest sellers in the series are the Frederick Fennell Eastman Rochester "Pops" album of "Fennell Favorites" and with the Eastman Wind Ensemble, "Sousa Favorites." It is drawn from Fennell's many successful albums in the regular Mercury Olympian series and features cuts from Fennell best sellers like "Music of Leroy Anderson" and "Hi Fi a La Espanola." However, Fennell really comes into a market he has almost to himself in his band records made with the Eastman Symphonic Wind Ensemble. Albums like "March Time," "Marching Along,"
"Sousa Marches," "Music for Time," Fifes and Drums" (from the Revolutionary War); "Roufles and Flourishes," "Sound Off" (Sousa favorites). Recently Mercury has released a stereo

version of his album featuring Vaughan Williams' "English Folk Song Suite," and this is currently doing well at retail.

Fennell has strong appeal to the high school and college band market. The different sound of the Wind Ensemble which features brass, winds and percussion has captured the fancy of hi-fi addicts across the country. As good as Fennell's pop albums are, something happens to him when he gets in front of a wind band. He undoubtedly has the best band records on the market today. They are performed with a snap, precision and excitement that can make sales if his albums get the air exposure

The Cleveland Pops

Like the Boston Pops and the Hollywood Bowl, the Cleveland Pops (on Epic) is drawn from musicians who play the classics during the winter months. The Clevelanders, under George Szell, are one of the country's top orchestras and they bring the same care and precision to their light music albums under the direction of Louis Lane.

The albums are a wonderful mixture of familiar favorites and the offbeat. Their latest album, "Rhapsody," combines the ever-popular "Espana," "Hungarian Rhapsody No. 2," "Rumanian Rhapsody No. 1" and "Swedish Rhapsody" with Victor Herbert's seldom performed "Irish Rhapsody" (a wonderfully high-spirited medley of Irish tunes featuring the rollicing "We May Roam Through This World" and the tender "Believe Me If All Those Endearing Young Charms"). All are played to the hilt in the best pops fashion. It's no wonder that reviewers are writing that the Cleveland Pops offers competition for their best-selling counterparts in Boston. Another Cleveland Pops album. "Music from the Films" combines themes from "Gigi," "Exodus," "Fanny" and "State Fair" with two string pieces from "Henry the Fifth" and a beautiful recording of the "Acadian Songs and Stories" from "Louisiana Story." The

score, by Virgil Thomson, captures the good-humored, folksy quality of a young boy's adventures in the Louisiana bayous with a wistful tunefulness that's fun to hear again and

The Cleveland Pops also have a pair of steady catalog movers in "Tchaikovsky Waltzes" and "Symphonic Marches." Under George Szell, the Cleveland Orchestra has made a pair of pops albums. One includes "Capriccio Italien," "Polovestian Dances," and "Capriccio Espagnol." The other, "Magic Vienna," includes light-hearted confections by the Brothers Strauss including favorites like the "Perpetual Motion." Its gay effervescence seems as though it would go on forever as the strings fiddle the same tune over and over again. But Szell stops them and, in his Middle European accent says, "And so

London's Phase Four

London's Phase Four Stereo series is aimed at the ears of America-and judging from past sales history, it has gotten to them in a big way. In the first release, "Pass in Review,"

a stunning recording of a gargantuan parade, album producer Bob Sharples made use of stereo's famous "ping-pong" effect. It was exciting to hear a band approach from the distance on the left speaker (ping) march over to the right speaker (pong). Then, while it is fading into the distance on the right, another band could be heard approaching from the left. It was all great fun, and its success was repeated by another album, "Trooping the Color," which turns out to be a wonderful collection of march music including everything "Greensleeves" to Meyerbeer's "Coronation March" from his opera "Le Prophete."

In the semi-classical area, Phase Four has just released three albums of well-worn favorites: "Grand Canyon Suite," "1812 Overture" and "Bolero." All are magnificently recorded -aimed to take advantage of the full sonic possibilities inherent in the music. In the "Grand Canyon" the wind in the "Cloudburst" sequence is a real gale, and the clip-clop of the donkey is sharply etched in "On the Trail." In "1812" the cannon shoots from one speaker across to the other. The sound travels in a giant detonation plus the following swoosh. And the chimes ring out in thrilling fashion. So sensational are the sound effects that they almost bury the music. On the other hand. Mercury's runaway smash recording of the "1812" using the 1761 French cannon and the Yale chimes, heightens the music and, for that reason, is probably going to be selling for many years to come. London's "Bolero" mikes the snares and the remainder of the percussion instruments very closely. It is fascinating to hear the various instruments enter, one from the right, the next from the left, as they each take a lick at the haunting tune. This kind of directionality has real meaning in a score like this and enhances listening pleasure. Performances are all good, but the kinetic energy of a Bernstein is missing from "Bolero" and the sock windup Dorati and the Minneapolis built up to in the Mercury "1812" is absent from the Sharples-directed London version. But if sound is your first consideration, these are your albums.

NEW YORK—Columbia Records has signed Orchestra U.S.A., according to an announcement by Kenneth Glancy, Vice President of Artists and Repertoire for Columbia, and George Avakian, Manager of Orchestra U.S.A.

The acclaimed ensemble made its debut in December, 1962, at Philharmonic Hall in New York's Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts, under the musical direction of John Lewis, famed pianist, composer and director of the Modern Jazz Quartet.
