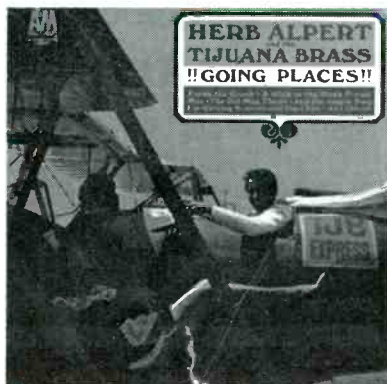

Top Operator Siskind, 62, Dies At Meet

UPSTATE, N.Y.—Harry Siskind, 62, President of Master Automatic and considered one of the best merchandisers of records via juke boxes, died during the recent (Sept. 17, 18, 19) Anniversary Convention and Outing of the New York State Operators Guild, Inc., Music Operators of New York, Inc., and Westchester Operators Guild, Inc.

Siskind was stricken during a tax meeting at the Nevele Country Club, scene of the week-end meeting.

Siskind, who listened to all records himself and made his own decisions, is credited with starting the revival of great standards in juke. At his request many record companies reissued these standards.

Among the artists with whom he was personally involved were Tony Bennett, Jerry Vale, Steve Lawrence, Toni Arden plus many others.

Siskind's philanthropies included membership on the Board of Yeshiva College. Two years ago he was UJA guest of honor

NEW YORK—Preparing a pop drive for the fall and winter, Walt Maguire, Head of A&R and Pop Sales for London and the London Group, announces a release schedule featuring many new artists.

The new English group, Small Faces, with a deck called "Whatcha Gonna Do About It" already on British charts, will be heard here on the Press label. James Bryant, artist-composer from Manitowoc, Wisc., debuts on Parrot with his own piece, "True Love is Hard to Find." The Miami R&B group, Freddy Scott and the Four Steps, will offer "Same Ole Beat" on Marlin. Jimmy Westerfield from the Minneapolis area has been signed by Tutti Camarata and will be heard on Palomar's "Another Time (Another Place)." Another recent Camarata acquisition is Jack Bedient and the Chessman, on Palomar's "Dream Boy." They're West Coast lads.

London's lone star state producer Huey Meaux has signed Sammy Jay and the Tiffineers. Their first release: "You're Driving Me Crazy."

Sonny & Cher Get Gold Record

Sonny & Cher's recording of "I Got You Babe" on the Atco label, was certified last week by RIAA. Total sales of the disk throughout the world are expected to be over 3,000,000.

ABC Distribbs Jerden

Larry Newton, President of ABC-Paramount Records, Inc., has concluded negotiations for national distribution of Jerden Records, founded by Jerry Dennon, who has been associated with the Independent Record Sales Division of Craig Corporation, Seattle, Wash., since 1962.

During Dennon's association with Craig Corporation, he formed Jerden Productions, responsible for hits such as "Louie, Louie," "Jolly Green Giant," "Little Latin Lupe Lu" and many others by the Kingsmen; and "You Turn Me On" by Ian Whitcomb. Dennon also turned out a quarter-million selling LP by the Kingsmen which was an 88-week trade chart item.

ABC-Par's distribution of Jerden Records will begin immediately, with records from Dennon's artist roster which includes Scotty and the Nomads, the Bag, Gary Bryant, Rosemary and Howard, King George and the Checkmates, Bobby Wayne, the Scepters and the Juveniles.

Col's Big Xmas Drive

Columbia Records will release 14 Christmas albums this month as the first phase of its mammoth 1965 Christmas merchandising program, according to an announcement by Stanley J. Kavan, VP and General Manager of Columbia Records Sales Corporation.

Nasatir Broadens MGM Picture

NEW YORK—Coming off a July and August all-time high of more than three million dollars, MGM Records is indebted not only to the hot groups in their grooves but the skillful guiding hand who has proved a group in one: label President Mort L. Nasatir.

Nasatir, former VP and Director of the Merchandising Services Division of West, Weir & Bartel, was named to his MGM top echelon position last June.

(In 1960 he had served as VP and Account Supervisor of MGM/Verve Records for W, W & B, and prior to that was Merchandising Director for Decca Records, Inc. Nasatir was responsible for many long-range programs in the pop, jazz and classical record areas during these periods. And he has been a key figure in developing packaging, merchandising, promotion and marketing strategy for MGM/Verve.)

"Actually, MGM was in very healthy condition when I got here," Nasatir told *Record World*. "MGM had a succession of very important images: 1) as a soundtrack outlet; 2) as a major artist outlet — Connie Francis and Hank Williams, for instance, were, and still are, among those who dominated; and 3) as a tremendous label for teen audiences.

"But we were not a record company in the broadest sense."

President Joins Label For Top Sales Period in MGM History

To keep a company alive you must frequently do new things, Nasatir feels. The acquisition of consistent hitmaker Roy Orbison was accomplished this summer, although Nasatir is quick to say he only closed the deal—he shares honors for that coup with former MGM prexy Arnold Maxin (now heading Big 3 Music) and Wesley Rose. Nasatir set the deal to release Kama-Sutra wax, plus product from Teddy Randazzo, Don Kirshner's Screen Gems and Koppelman and Rubin productions.

"We've had a phenomenal success with indie producers," Nasatir reminded. "This is now a permanent part of the record business. I don't say it's a trend every company should follow, but it's been successful for us. And we still have our own very capable A&R men in New York, Nashville and on the West Coast, plus our regular artists whom we record directly."

Nasatir tosses bouquets, too, to Album Sales Manager Sol Greenberg, Singles Sales Director Lenny Scheer, National Promo Manager Frank Mancini, Director of Publicity Sol Handwerker, Irv Stimler and Ed Barsky, who package and sell the Metro budget line; and Jerry Schoenbaum, head of DGG and Verve/Folkways.

MGM added the latter line early in '65; and is continuing "the broadening of its aspects" by recording new material for Metro. The diskery recently also added a kiddie line; and DGG sales have increased, with plans to innovate there, too.

Nasatir announced intentions to open up MGM Records even further, with details to be revealed later. Company is also expecting to move to Sixth Avenue late in '66.

"One thing," he went on, "we won't sign artists without a total commitment on our part. We must believe in them. The acquisition must also be *reasonable*, must fill a void in our company. When I saw the Lovin' Spoonful, I thought, 'The American Beatles!', and I wanted them, thought they had great potential.

"When we sign an artist we also lay out a promotion campaign. There has to be a direction to go with him. We must have a completely integrated plan. Our way of handling the English groups has become classic—interest goes beyond the product. We have become *friends* of these groups, and since most of them are comprised of very young people, they really need our guidance."

"We really have a climate within this company — people who are aggressive and young and create activity," Nasatir added.

"We're a strong singles firm — No. 4, I think, not only in

singles but LP sales," he continued. "And I'm broadening this whole line, covering the gamut of the business. We know there is package business in many areas, not just singles selling albums."

He explained, "Our aim is to go into each market and capture our share."

And with all the beefing up and broadening, MGM hasn't lost anything, Nasatir noted. "Connie and Hank and Hank Jr. are still mighty big (Connie's still our biggest artist, world-wide), and we've remained a soundtrack label—we understand it, our people grew up with it."

Heavy Soundtrack List

Within the next year MGM Records will have close to a dozen very important soundtrack packages, including the Connie Francis-Harve Presnell-Herman's Hermits "When the Girls Meet the Boys"; Herman's Hermits' "There's No Place Like Space"; the Steve McQueen starrer, "The Cincinnati Kid"; the blockbusting "Doctor Zhivago"; and Debbie Reynolds' "The Singing Nun."

Nasatir and MGM Records work very closely with MGM Pictures, which, he admitted, is a great help getting the label's artists onto film. So . . . in addition to Herman's Hermits (and the Animals, earlier MGM film stars), look for Sam the Sham and the Pharaohs, the Lovin' Spoonful, the Royalettes, the Gentrys, Joy and the Sorrows, the Jades, etc., to roar at you from the big screen—as well as from red-hot MGM records.

MGM Intro's Rack Service

As a direct result of the "tremendous" reception given Metro Records (MGM's low priced budget line) at the recent NARM Convention, Mort L. Nasatir, President of MGM Records, is instituting a new specialized sales service for rack jobbers who are located in factory-owned distribution territories in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles.

Metro Records will greatly enhance its rack jobber image through this new service, Nasatir stated. The plan, to be supervised by Sol Greenberg, Director of Album Sales and executed by Ed Barsky, Sales Manager for Metro Records, calls for top level management at all three branches to personally contact key rack jobber buying personnel in their respective territories.

Nasatir opines that this type of specialized service will establish a better relationship and understanding between branch manager and rack jobber. Each rack jobber buying principal will receive individual attention from the top level executive at each MGM factory-owned branch.

The service plan will be instituted immediately with both Sol Greenberg and Ed Barsky holding meetings this week with branch managers Morris Price, Chicago; Mel Price, Los Angeles; and Dave Seidman, New York.

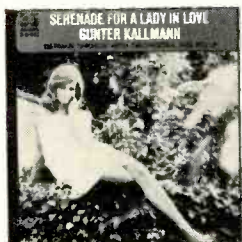

I'LL TAKE YOU WHERE THE MUSIC'S PLAYING

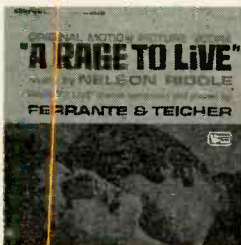

There seems to be one more Shangri-La than there was before. And now there are four of them to grind through their funky repertoire. Their summer hit "Give Us Your Blessings" is included as is their new single release "The Train From Kansas City" and "Right Now and Not Later." "Sophisticated Boom Boom" is a funny added attraction.



THAT'S THE WAY IT'S GONNA BE

THE MITCHELL TRIO—Mercury MG 21-049; SR 61049.

This cheery trio isn't afraid to mock folks in high places or glorify folks in low places. That's why they include satirical songs like "Lucy Baines" from Julius Monk's "Bits and Pieces" and Bob Dylan's haunting "Mr. Tambourine Man." Other acidic numbers are "I Was Not a Nazi Polka" and "Ecumenical March." Good Fun.



TIN PANORAMA

VARIOUS ARTISTS—Vista 3330 (m-s).

Oscar winning Robert and Richard Sherman spoof the songs of the last six decades with expert touch. Funny and yet appreciative of the times. Quite an achievement. Camarata supplied orchestrations that couldn't be bettered. Titles such as "Rutabaga Rag," "Shrub Herbs in the Suburbs," "Boogie Woogie Bakery Man," and "You Bug Me Ann-Arlene." Terrific.

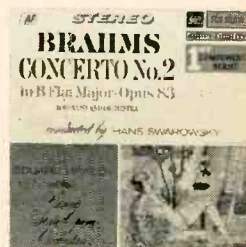

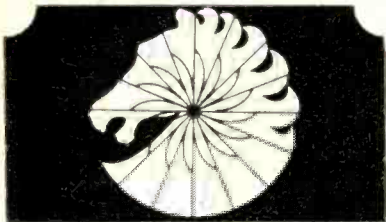

Tony Bennett in Bow As Actor in 'Oscar'

HOLLYWOOD — Tony Bennett, who makes his motion picture debut as a dramatic actor in Joseph E. Levine's "The Oscar," together with the cast of the Paramount-Embassy co-production, will be saluted by the Riviera Hotel in Las Vegas on Oct. 7, when the Columbia Records singer opens at the hotel's Versailles Room.

More than 100 representatives of the nation's leading newspapers, television and radio stations have been invited to attend the gala affair, during which specially selected scenes of Bennett's film debut performance will be shown for the first time. In the motion picture, an Embassy Pictures domestic release, Bennett portrays Hymie Kelly, the friend of a Hollywood star (Stephen Boyd) involved in the behind-the-scenes rivalry of this most

coveted award.

A further touch of glamour will be given the party via the attendance of a large contingent of past Academy Award-winners in best acting and best supporting acting categories who have been invited to the affair by the Riviera Hotel.

In addition, "Oscar" stars Boyd, Eleanor Parker, Elke Sommer, Milton Berle, Joseph Cotten, Jill St. John, Edie Adams and Ernest Borgnine will be part of the Riviera's honored guests. Also on hand will be executive producer Joseph E. Levine, Paramount Vice-President and studio production head Howard K. Koch, producer Clarence Greene and director Russell Rouse.

"The Oscar" also contains cameo roles by Frank Sinatra, Bob Hope, Merle Oberon, Walter Brennan, Edith Head, Broderick Crawford and Nancy Sinatra.

How Tony Got It

How did Tony land such a choice part, one that already has him being touted as an Oscar possibility come next spring?

It all began when he won his Grammy for "I Left My Heart in San Francisco." The following year Count Basie told him: "Tony, the time has come for you to make your move." He'd studied acting at the Theatre Wing after his Army service was over, and had done a straight acting role in a "77 Sunset Strip" TV segment. Clarence Greene and Russell Rouse saw the TV show and hired him for "The Oscar."

And Tony is emoting in pretty fast company in the Levine production. There are several Oscar winners in the cast. Brennan, for instance, is a three-time winner as Best Supporting Actor (he holds the record number in this category); and Miss Parker has had three Best Actress nominations from the Academy.

'Birthday' LP No Dealer Present

NEW YORK—A number of dealers were upset last week—and some like Sam Goody were very upset—by the "Birthday House" album packaged by Musicor and sold exclusively at Korvette's.

Sam Goody told Record World that he was "in the process of wrapping up my entire Musicor line and sending it back" because he was unable to carry the "Birthday House" album on the Musicor label.

("Birthday House" is a local TV morning kiddie show.)

Musicor prexy Art Talmadge explained the source of the confusion. He said that although the Musicor label had appeared on the first releases, the album is not a Musicor catalog item, and would not become one until six months hence when Korvette's lifts the exclusivity and allows the album to be sold elsewhere.

At that time, Talmadge said, his arrangement with Korvette allows him to take over the album, now owned by Korvette, and distribute it as a label item.

Talmadge told Record World that he had put the Musicor label on the albums (which he had agreed to package for Korvette when they needed pressing facilities for their home-produced lp) in order to establish the Musicor name with the kid market that would be picking up the package.

He said that when he realized

a misunderstanding was occurring he pulled the label from the packages. No manufacturer is now specified on the label.

In the meantime, dealers polled in the New York area—

all of whom had been receiving requests for the album—said that they were angry and as one dealer put it "going out of our way not to order the Musicor line from now on."

The list includes three Masterworks LPs, seven popular albums, three Harmony recordings and an International album.

Lester Rose tells me that they have recorded Tom Jones' protege, Gerry Dorsey. He is managed by Gordon Mills who manages Tom and who is the writer of "It's Not Unusual." Gordon wrote this tune, "Baby Turn Around" and play is starting in a lot of places.

Spoke to Gene Armond at Kapp and he's got "Two Different Worlds," Lenny Welch, being played everywhere plus some California stations. The sales and play on the Jack Jones are great: WLS; WCFL, Cleveland (Gary McFarlane); WIND; WDKY; WRIT; and Picks at WTTR, Albany; Pat O'Day at KJR, Seattle; and WDCY, Minn. All N.Y.C. except WABC and all Baltimore-Washington is on it. Roger Williams has come out with a new version of "Autumn Leaves." All the big play on "What You're Putting Me Through," Diana Newby, is R&B, though I consider it more of a pop record.

Liberty is releasing the English monster, "Tears" by Ken Dodd, Stateside. They have a tasty jazz side called "Lemon Pie" by Jerry Berry Hill (grabs you, huh?) which has a fast pick on WEW, St. Louis. Congrats to the original Johnny Rabbit, who returns to his old hutch at WIL under the name Johnny B. Good. Pat Pippolo wishes him much luck, too.

Barry Abrams reports that WIP, Philadelphia is going on the LP, "Judy Collins #5" on Elektra and her single, "It Isn't Nice." Jac Holzman is very excited. As a female folk singer she is second only to Joan Baez in fame, and many buffs consider her second to no one in musicianship and folk feel. "Drums A Go Go," Hollywood Persuaders, Original Sound, refuses to die after initial West Coast and Phoenix action, and is now going in Oklahoma City. It's very big in Sacramento. I think it's an exciting record. Sacramento has also made a nice home for the funk instrumental "Rufus Jr., Bluenotes, Galaxy, which is solid R&B off WNJR, Newark.

"My Town, etc.," Lesley Gore, Mercury, is doing well . . . Bertha Porter at WDRG, Hartford, and WEAM, Washington, really went to town on play on "Since I Fell For You," Halos, Congress, and the sales action there is very viable. There is a lot of play elsewhere also. Could be?

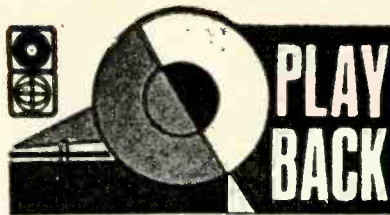

To me it is very reminiscent of Dionne Warwick as written and produced by Bacharach & David . . . KILT in Texas has picked up on our weeks ago "Kong" tip on "Do It 'Zula' Style," Hank Ballard, King, which is getting R&B play and R&B sales in Philadelphia of WDAS. Sid Nathan is pushing hard with his distributors . . . "Teardrops Till Dawn," Timi Yuro, Mercury, getting some scattered play and sales. To me she is the greatest. In person she kills the people. Like a Dinah Washington and Ray Charles put together. Does fantastic soul ballads and then murders you on the rhythm things!

Durable 'Hold Me'

Mel Carter's "Hold Me, Thrill Me, Kiss Me" turned out to be just as durable and long-lasting a record as the original by Karen Chandler, which as I recall, sold right through the Christmas-New Year's hiatus back in 1952, or was it 1753? . . . If you check sales charts in most cities, you see that they are loaded near the top with R&B records, like the Joe Tex; O. V. Wright; Otis Redding; Fred Hughes; Ikettes; and Wilson Pickett, with "Rescue Me," Fontella Bass, Chess, breaking out all over the place.

Over in Cleveland, a couple of big records are: "Tossin' & Turnin'" Ivy League, Cameo, and "Dawn of Correction," Spokesman, Decca. A local hit is "Be Faithful," Twilighters, Bell. We are cutting down on the number of records mentioned here each week, and are listing most of them in column order with the title, artist and label. This is to keep you from going blind, and encourage you to check and compare markets and record companies against each other.

Several pop companies are going heavily into R&B because they want hits, and this is where the action is; and where the record business as it used to be (with tumult, excitement and glamour) is still just that way. All a pop station needs to program records is a trade chart and an 18-year-old "music director." (?)

Cameo-Parkway is going heavy R&B, and they cut **Dee Dee Sharpe** deep in the R&B bag with "I Really Love You." Meanwhile, Swan and Roulette Records are deep in the soul bag with their going product. Well, after all, the pop singles sale business today is virtually all R&B, other than the folk rock and British stuff.

Clarence (Sweet Daddy) Scaife, Assistant P.D. of WNOO, Chattanooga, is in Memorial Hospital, Room 451 recovering from major surgery. He'll be there for six more weeks and maybe more surgery. Please write him there and clue his friends **Otis Redding**, **Joe Tex**, **James Brown** and **Jackie Wilson** about where he got to . . . If you're looking for an air gig, let me run it down to you who to contact. **Ed Wright**, P.D. of WABQ, Cleveland, is NOT looking for a man, but as President of NARA he is getting requests from top stations and chains to supply names of candidates. Ed is there to help you, so get in touch. And thus, our congratulations to **Chuck Gregory** who integrates WMCA, **Chuck Leonard** at WABC and **Buddy Lowe** at WNOR.

SMASHES: **Ikettes**, "Cleo's Back," **Jr. Walker**; and "Don't Have to Shop Around," **Mad Lads**, **Volt**, in Baltimore, Washington and San Francisco, etc.

Feeling Like Pop Station

Jimmy Bishop comments, "I'm getting to feel like a pop station in programming new records. Usually when something new I like comes in, I put it right on. But now I have a waiting list of new records. I got over 12 good new R&B records this past week alone. You HAVE to play the older, familiar hits to keep your audience. I find I'm telling record people, 'Yes, I like your record, but I can't put it on for at least a week.' In fact, I caught myself playing four new records in one hour this week, and that's too much. It takes time for people to get accustomed to even a budding hit. You must keep coming back with that established hit sound to keep your rating."

Reprise used to cut **Barbara English** like a **Lena Horne**. Now Amy has her, and they cut her in the rockin' funk bag with, "Sittin' in the Corner" . . . I like "Help Wanted," **Volcanos** . . . "World is Round," **Rufus Thomas**, is the first R&B protest type song, yeh, world is crooked too! . . . Many R&B picks on "Stay Together," **Ben Aiken**, **Roulette** . . . **Burke Johnson** getting big hop reaction to the "B" side of the current **Supremes** . . . "B" sides of current **Vandellas** and **Miracles** are request BEASTS with **Georgie Woods**, **Fat Daddy**, etc. . . . "Misty," **Vibrations**, **Okeh**, a FAST HIT in Baltimore.

"Lovers Concerto," **Toys**, is an R&B Giant in many markets in addition to being a Pop Monster . . . "Satisfaction" a Chicago giant, smash, monster, beast! . . . "Can't Help Myself," **Earl Van Dyke**, **Soul**, breaking fast with **Ed Wright** in Cleveland and **Fat Daddy** in Baltimore . . . **Paul** and **Burke Johnson** pick the new **Lou Johnson**, "A Time to Love" which uses the melody of **Sidney Bechet's** "Petit Fleur" . . . "Do It Zula Style," **Hank Ballard**, **King**, has busted in Philadelphia off **WDAS**. It is all but busted in Cleveland. Marks Music's Theme: Movies Italian Style

BY DAVE FINKLE

NEW YORK — Movies—Italian style have caught the public eye and ear for a number of movie-going seasons and are likely to go on doing so for many seasons to come, which means that Marks Music will be kept happy (or *felice*).

E. B. Marks, by arrangement with Italo-film's Rizzoli Productions, has first refusal on rights to music from Rizzoli films and also is keeping tabs on other product Italiano.

The next major Rizzoli release is Federico Fellini's latest work, "Juliet of the Spirits," a fantasy in color (premiering at a swanky benefit in New York Nov. 3), and Marks did not refuse the rights. They'll publish the Nina Rota music and be glad of it. (The pubbery did well with the Fellini-Rota "8½.") Marks will also turn at least one of the themes from the movie into a song with English lyrics. In fact, the staff, under Herbert E. Marks, whom Record World visited last week, is already preparing exploitation of all the movie music.

And a lot of work, which can pay off enormously, goes into such exploitation. Herbert Marks knows, because one of the Italian films in the Marks hopper is "Mondo Cane," from which came the Riz Ortolani-Nino Olivieri "More," a song that BMI acknowledges as one of their all-time greatest money earners, and a song which is probably the most important Marks copyright.

It Takes Work

"These songs don't become hits automatically," Marks said. "It takes work to get them going. You have to have arrangements of all sorts, for instance." With that he held up a stack of arrangements for "More." Arrangements for marching bands, stage bands, orchestras (Marks noted that school orchestras were less important than bands now), choral groups, four hand piano, simplified piano, easy piano (which is slightly more difficult than simplified piano) and on and on—some of the arrangements costing as much as \$18.

"You have to do these things to keep the song alive," Marks said.

"The sheet music sales on the song are astonishing," Marks

stated. "I can't recall such sheet music sales on anything we've ever had. And that's really something considering the state of sheet music sales nowadays. And there are 180 recordings of the song."

As for other Italian scores in the house catalog, Marks mentioned recent acquisitions: "The Moment of Truth" (a Mainstream elpee as will be "Juliet of the Spirits"), "Venere Imperiale," "Ecco" and "Three Nights of Love."

He also called attention to "Mondo Cane"-like films "Mondo Pazzo," "Malamondo," "Women of the World" and "Go Go Go World"—most of which, if released in the States, have received poor critical receptions. "These movies, regardless of the critics, are doing well commercially," he said. The theme songs from "Malamondo" and "Mondo Pazzo" — "Funny World" and "I'll Set My Love to Music," respectively—are getting multiple recordings. "I find that whatever the overall quality of the movie, the scores from these films are always beautiful," Marks opined.

Tie-ins Not New

Movie music tie-ins are nothing new to the pubbery, Marks reminisced, although in the days before so many of the American film companies owned their own pubberies, Marks did more with domestic product than currently. However, Marks pointed out, whenever there's a party scene, Marksman may hear "There'll Be a Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight" and films about the Second World War oftentimes include "Lili Marlene."

One Marks standard about to be chanted on celluloid is "Under the Bamboo Tree" ("one of

my favorites," Marks said), which will be groupsung in "The Group."

The company also has rights to the current "Diary of a Bachelor" pic. Marks also called attention to some other topical pubbery copyrights. One is the TV Emmy-laureled Norman Dello Joio score for "The Louvre." The company is preparing a band arrangement of a segment of the score and will release it soon.

Another house pride is Columbia's new Trio Los Panchos tribute to Ernesto Lecuona's songs.

'Strange' Praise

He also digressed to praise the new Nina Simone version of Lewis Allen's "Strange Fruit" in light of the present trend toward the protest song. He didn't know of any upcoming single release on the song, but allowed that the tune is certainly a direct predecessor of the current hits in that genre.

Another matter he discussed was the importance of an English lyric for the Italian themes released in English speaking countries. The lyric for "More," he reported, was written by Britisher Norman Newell and came with the score when Marks signed contracts. No lyrics have been written for "Juliet" music yet, but they're on the way. A lyric has been provided for one of the lighter "Moment of Truth" themes and Marks will be looking for recordings shortly.

Good Tip: "So Long Babe," Nancy Sinatra, Reprise. She wails like Cher, and there are many picks . . . Heavy WIBG play has broken "I Want To Do Everything For You," Joe Tex, Dial, wide open pop. This is a strong Adult lyric, and it can't be hidden in an R&B bag . . . Dean Tyler went with "Tune Up," Jr. Walker, Soul, which is a smash in Philadelphia. Seymour, who does part of Jerry Blavat's WHAT radio show, kicked it off by making it his theme. This record I can guarantee will be a hit for you. Dean also went with the "Can You Hear Me" side of the Lee Dorsey for Amy. Speaking of other R&B smashes that are also pop hits, though not being programmed on many Vanilla stations out there in "Radioland," we must include the Wilson Pickett . . . We heard part of the Hy Lit show on WIBG, Philadelphia last night, and Hy was going berserk with Jr. Walker's "Tune Up." He played it 3½ times in one hour segment. It's done 10,000 without WIBG, so we'll watch it closely. Actually, "Boomerang" never sold that much. Chips promo man Weldon McDougal did a good job getting "Tune Up" exposed in Philadelphia and proving it a bona fide pop hit. Tamla is watching, I'm sure! Irv Biegel reports that he has three sides by Jr. Walker selling. Marvin Gaye has a smash!

There are very few radio stations in Philadelphia for the size of the city and only three VHF TV stations. Owning a facility in this town is a license to PRINT money. But three UHF TV channels just opened and Georgie Woods has a daily show and Hy Lit and Joe Niagara both have their own weekly shows, in addition to the Jerry Blavat and Ed Hurst TV shows on VHF weekly.

"I Feel Strange," Wonderettes, Ruby, is on all the pop stations in Detroit . . . New play on WIBG, Philadelphia: "Where Have All the Flowers Gone," Johnny Rivers, Imperial; Bachelors; Walker Bros.; Bob Dylan; 4 Seasons; Kim Weston; Marvin Gaye; Paul Revere; Dobie Gray; Jan & Dean. Likes: Esther Phillips; Barry Young. BUSTED POP: Fontella Bass; Joe Tex; "Tune-Up"-Jr. Walker.

"Close Your Eyes," 3 Degrees, Swan, is a smash in Philadelphia and now has re-orders in Hartford, Albany, Buffalo, Boston, N.Y.C., Atlanta, Miami, Pittsburgh. Bernie Binnick and Tony Mammerella are both on the road trying to bring it in.

Every six months or so a record comes along that makes you want to scream and holler. Maybe "Make It Easy on Yourself," Walker Bros. (which we tipped you on first) isn't THAT record, but until a BETTER one comes down the pike—it will do!

"You're the One," Vogues, Co & Ce hits #1 at WKNR, Detroit, and is nothing but a SMASH. Nick Cenci and Jack Hakim are too, too much . . . Hot Tip: "Please Mr. Sullivan," the Warner Bros., Destination. These artists have been on several labels. This is an unusual mixture of comedy with a strong beat. The jocks at WLS, Chicago, have flipped. It's a jock's record. Jim Golden and Paul Glass believe this is the one. "Sandy," Ronny & Daytonas, Amy, now Top 10 at WSGN, Birmingham. WQXI and WPLO, Atlanta, are both on "Sandy." This may be a hot sleeper. A repeat of "G.T.O." which took two months. Perhaps you ought to check out. Larry Uttal is holding his breath.

Chuck Chellman and Joe Cash of Monument are out there pushing on "Happy, Happy Birthday, Baby," Dolly Parton, with many important listings coming in . . . "Il Silenzio," Nini Rosso, Columbia, is cooking in Detroit, Atlanta and other places. The first ratings on the new fall TV shows are in and we're happy to announce that the much-touted N. W. Ayer TV Forecast (average audience ratings and rankings of 97 fall programs) was wrong, wrong, wrong!

Dean Martin's new NBC-TV show—at the very bottom of the Ayer list—was No. 11 on Arbitron's "Top 20 shows of the new season" report, and the third highest rated new program on the list, topped only by "Green Acres" (CBS), No. 2, and "Hogan's Heroes" (CBS), No. 7. Martin scored even higher—No. 6—on the 26-city Trendex Report.

Another surprise of the Ayer crew was the new Smothers Brothers CBS show which ranked No. 19 on the Arbitron list. It's interesting to note that Martin (with guest stars Frank Sinatra, Diahann Carroll, Jan and Dean, Bob Newhart, Joey Heatherton and others) out-rated NBC's "Thursday Night Movie" on both the Arbitron and the 26-city Trendex reports. The movie that night was "Manchurian Candidate," starring Sinatra. The Smothers Brothers—to the delight of Mercury Records which has a big album campaign going on the boys—even topped the popular "Peyton Place III" in its time period.

If a show draws less than a 25% share of audience sponsors get edgy. So we're sorry to report that among the shows of special interest to the music field (music-variety format or featuring disk artists) the following received less than 25%: "The King Family," "Ozzie And Harriet," "Hank" (starring Victor's new Dick Kallman), "Patty Duke" (low on Arbitron but better on Trendex), Jimmy Dean, "Flintstones," and "Shindig I."

"Hullabaloo," which kicked off its first show with Sammy Davis Jr. as host, fared better than "Shindig," running second to "To Tell the Truth" but topping "12 O'Clock High" in its time period with a 28% share of audience on Arbitron and 29.2% on Trendex. Steve Lawrence also held his own. His new CBS show ran a good second most of the time and (on the Trendex survey) was No. 1 in the last half hour against "Ben Casey" and "Run For Your Life." Andy Williams lost out to Andy Griffith and "Shenandoah" in its first half hour but moved up to No. 1 on Arbitron in his second half hour, topping "Hazel" and "The Farmer's Daughter."

How did Lawrence Welk and Ed Sullivan do? Superb as usual. Sullivan was No. 13 on Arbitron's list and Welk was top-rated in the first half of his time period on both rating studies and No. 1 in the last half as well on the Arbitron list.

Scopitone Gets Mercury Artists

CHICAGO — Mercury Record Productions, Inc., representing the entire family of Mercury and affiliate record labels, this week concluded a contractual agreement with Harman-ee Film Productions, Beverly Hills, Calif., giving Scopitone, Inc., working agreements with all artists contracted to the eight labels in the Mercury family. These labels include: Mercury, Philips, Smash, Fontana, Blue Rock, Limelight, Emarcy, Cumberland and Wing.

Scopitone, Inc., is the jukebox type coin-operated mechanism which through the use of a film strip plays back a sound film on a screen mounted in the mechanism.

The agreement was reached between Irwin H. Steinberg, Mercury Executive Vice-President, and Fred Benzon and Irv Briskin of Harman-ee. It is a one-year pact with options. Benson said that the addition of the eight Mercury and affiliate labels brings to a total of 50 the number of labels now in the Scopitone catalog.

First agreement made with individual artists in the Mercury family was with the Rondells, who will film their Mercury record performances Oct. 18 in

Hollywood. Benson has blueprinted at least a dozen artists from within the eight labels during the first-year for filming. He has already contacted the Walker Brothers, Lesley Gore, Johnny Mathis, Roger Miller, the Mitchell Trio and Freddie and the Dreamers for possible filming in the near future.

Epic Classic Price Change

In line with Epic Records' increased emphasis on its classical catalog, the company has introduced a major change in the price structure of its classical product, according to Leonard S. Levy, UP-GM.

Effective Sept. 20, the new suggested cost of classical LPs to retailers is 50% of the retail list price. The new prices are on the wholesale level only and do not affect the suggested list-price schedule of \$4.79 on LC and \$5.79 on BC LPs.

Levey stated: "This move is intended to exploit fully the enormous potential of our prestigious classical catalog by strengthening our position at the retail level. By allowing the dealer to increase his profit, new

Military Market 'Sleeping Giant'

NEW YORK—At a meeting of distributors, sub-distributors and salesmen held to unveil the fall advertising, promotion and public relations programs for Pickwick/33, Cy Leslie, President of Pickwick International, singled out the military market as the least-recognized, potential major sales source open to the record business.

"The military market is actually two separate markets," Leslie stated. "It is a surprisingly large consumer market with a disposable income measured in millions. It is also an institutional market that has its own grocery, drug and dry goods outlets. In addition, every military base has snack bars, clubs and canteens.

"The current strength of the Armed Forces is close to three million. The approximate payroll is over \$12 billion. Sales by post exchanges on a world-wide basis are over \$1 billion. This total is almost equally divided between domestic and overseas.

"It's a young market. The median age of male military personnel on active duty is 24.3 and 55% of all Servicemen are in the 17 to 24 age group. An additional 28% are in the 25 to 34 category.

"It is also a young-marrieds market—nearly 25% of all new marriages in the United States each year involve servicemen on active duty. The bride does her first bit of shopping for the new family in a military store. For the past several years, military families have produced an average of 250,000 babies each year."

"A more perfect record customer profile would be hard to imagine," Leslie stated. "If the right kind of effort and attention is given to the merchandising campaigns aimed at the military market, they can produce results far in excess of anything that we have enjoyed up to this point."

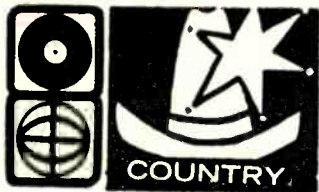

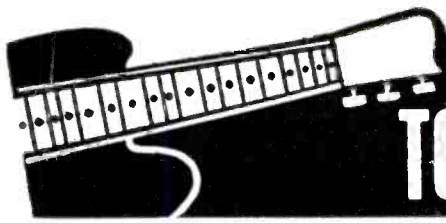

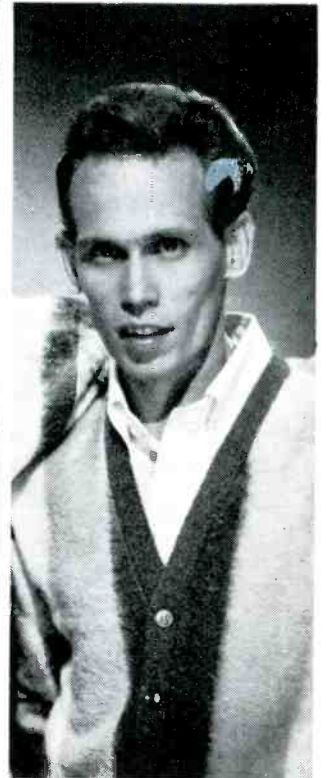
