MGM/Verve LPs Thru Capitol Record Club

NEW YORK—MGM Records and Capitol Records, Inc., have reached an agreement whereby MGM and Verve albums will be made available through the Capitol Record Club. The announcement of the pact was made jointly by Mort L. Nasatir, President of MGM Records and Alan W. Livingston, President of Capitol Records, Inc., and its subsidiary Capitol Record Club, Inc.

The addition of the MGM and Verve rosters to the Capitol Record Club represents the largest and most important addition to club product other than that supplied by the Capitol label itself. The first mailing of MGM product (about 20 LPs) is planned for late November.


The agreement allows CRCI a choice of product from the vast MGM/Verve catalogs. The label has completed one of its most successful years to date with gross sales in the last nine months that broke all existing company records.

Through the Capitol Club, MGM and Verve artists will see an opportunity for substantial increases in sales through broader consumer exposure. Thus MGM, like other majors will now round out its distribution efforts by utilizing all three basic selling methods: through distributor-dealer, via rack jobbers and through a record club. The Capitol Club, on the other hand, grows in stature and significance with the inclusion of MGM and Verve product. These new album offerings will provide a broader range of material for Capitol Club members—greater depth and selectivity as well.

MGM/Verve and Capitol Record Club officials will cooperate closely in marketing product through the club. A special division to handle club activities has been formed at MGM/Verve, including liaison offices on both East and West coasts.

The addition of MGM marks the eighth label to sign since last August when Capitol launched a major expansion program for its Record Club.

"It provides the missing link in distributon that you need to be a major record company," said Nasatir.



Dealers - Direct London's New Import Policy

London Records has adopted a new policy for selling product from its London "import" line the Das Alte Werk, Societe Francaise du Soir, Argo and Editions de L'Oiseau-Lyre labels —to dealers.

Instead of selling through distribs, label is putting on a staff of about 10 men who will sell directly to dealers.

This policy will be used for the "import" line only.

In announcing the new policy, London has also announced new terms for dealers. On a manufacturer price of \$5.79 per mono/stereo elpee, dealer cost will be \$2.95 (or 87% less 10 less 10%).

Payment will be 2% 10 days E. O. M. and net 30 days E. O. M.

Ten percent of purchases are exchangeable quarterly (January, April, July and October). Also all purchases accrue 5% in a cumulative advertising authorization. Credit will be issued upon presentation of proof of use. All freight will be prepaid by London Imports on a minimum order of 10 albums.

On two special albums, "An Introduction to 'Das Alte Werk' Series" and "An Introduction to the 'Telefunken' Historic Series," dealer costs will be \$1.27 for a \$2.49 package.

With the introduction of the new policy London "Imports" has added 85 new catalog items.



Early reports indicate that Command's latest Tony Mottola album, "Love Songs Mexico/ S.A.," may be the label's best selling disk of the year, according to Loren Becker, General Manager. The album has broken big in Los Angeles.

Now Anti - Protest Songs A Protest is a Protest is a Protest . .

Since every action has a reaction, it is not surprising that the "protest" song trend that started a few months back and grew to large proportions is resulting in an "anti-protest" song movement.

These tunes deplore in their lyrics (usually using the "protest" folknroll sound) the songs, songsters and factions that have questioned the American foreign policies—most notably in Viet Nam.

The latest of these entries is Colpix' "What's Come Over the World" by Billy Carr. The song throws doubts on the motivations of the draft card burnings and other pacifist activities that had been transpiring within recent weeks.

Another current entry is Dave Dudley's "What We're Fighting For" on Mercury, which is sung in the first person by a soldier writing home about his faith in his commitment. Capitol has Duane Hyatt's "The Troubador."

Probably the first of these reaction tunes was the Spokesmen's "Dawn of Correction" for Decca.

It's possible that this patriotic streak of disks parallels the growing support the American public, according to polls, is giving the Viet Nam war.

Verve Blue

Lenny Scheer, Director of Single Sales and Coordinator of Independent Single Record Production, will coordinate his efforts with recording chief Creed Taylor to jointly augment the Verve label with pop product. The same successful policy that Lenny Scheer has in force with outside producers for MGM will be set in motion for the Verve Blue label utilizing key pop artists and hot master purchases, all with Top 40 potential.

Nasatir revealed that plans call for separated promotion and sales departments for the Verve Blue label in order to make this project another profitable addition to the company's overall success. His aim is to duplicate the same successful formula in the Top 40 field for new artists on the Verve Blue label that such top-selling personalities as Stan Getz, Jimmy Smith, Cal Tjader and Ella Fitzgerald are enjoying in the pop/jazz market.

Uttal also announced the signing of a deal for the distribution of Goldwax Records based in Memphis, which was previously distributed by Vee Jay Records. The first release on this new label will be by the Ovations, who had a Top 40 record, "It's Wonderful To Be in Love." Also to be released on the Goldwax label will be records by O. V. Wright and James Carr.

While on a trip through the southwest last week, Uttal also announced the acquisition of a master which is currently the No. 3 R & B record in Dallas. This record is "No Man Is an Island" by the Van Dykes.

Mainstream held distributor meets on the East Coast, St. Louis and Kansas City last week to detail plans for selling label's five current soundtracks—"Juliet of the Spirits," "King Rat," "The Collector," "Moment of Truth" and "Great Original Sound Track Recordings and Movie Themes."

Bob Shad and Chet Woods presided over the New York meeting Nov. 1, then went on to St. Louis and Kansas Nov. 2 before splitting up to visit distribs and racks on the West coast and in the South.

They also pushed the single releases from the "Juliet" tracker.

Crane Now Col Producer


Lor Crane has been promoted to the position of Producer, Pop A and R, Columbia Label, according to an announcement by William P. Gallagher, Vice President, Columbia Label.

Crane is responsible to Gallagher for recording artists as assigned and developing album ideas and new artists.

Crane joined Columbia in 1964 as Associate Producer after eight years in the music industry as composer, arranger and producer.

Since his association with Columbia, Crane has produced all of the material recorded by the English singing duo Chad and Jeremy. This includes the hit single "Before and After" and their newest, "I Have Dreamed," as well as their two albums, "Before and After" and "I Don't Want to Lose You Baby."

In addition, he produced Anita Bryant's single and LP "The World of Lonely People"; Jimmy Dean's single and album "First Thing Ev'ry Mornin'" and his latest album, "Jimmy Dean's Christmas Card"; and Jean Paul Vignon's album "Because I Love You ..."

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Happy Goday Appointed TRO Vice President

NEW YORK-Happy Goday, veteran music man, has been named Vice President of the Richmond Organization by Howard S. Richmond, TRO president. Since joining TRO six years ago, Goday has been serving as General Professional Manager of the various firms within the TRO operation.

Godays career in the music business spans more than a quarter century. In 1940 he joined with Lou Levy in setting up Leeds Music. He was active there in a professional capacity and also worked closely with Levy in the preparation and staging of the Andrews Sisters act.

In 1942, Goday moved to the West Coast where he set up offices for Leeds. He operated the Leeds Hollywood office until 1950, at which time he left to establish his own company, Goday Music, affiliated with BMI

A conversation with TRO head, Howie Richmond, regarding overseas rights to certain of the Goday copyrights, led, in 1959, to Goday's joining Richmond as a professional manager. The Goday catalog was brought into the TRO fold and became Suffolk Music, a firm jointly owned by Richmond and Goday.

Since joining TRO, Goday has been extremely active in the professional operation, working particularly closely with such writers as Anthony Newley and Leslie Bricusse in their scores for "Stop the World, I Want to Get Off," and "The Roar of the Greasepaint, the Smell of the Crowd," with Lionel Bart in connection with his "Oliver" score, and with Charles Aznavour in his current show, "The World of Charles Aznavour."

In his new capacity, Goday will continue working with show writers and will be active in many upcoming song promotion projects now being blueprinted by TRO in the fields of

Roy Gyrates Ahead on Charts

NEW YORK-Backbeat's Roy Head is a boy who doesn't like to sit still. And so, with his "Treat Her Right," "Apple of My Eye" and "Just a Little Bit" riding the charts, Roy is jumping for more than his usual joy.

He sat down, however, last week for a Record World interview and talked about his career, his surprise and delight at his present popularity and his plans for the future.

The affable performer said, "I've been performing professionally for eight years-mostly through central Texas until recently-and I would have been content to go on that way because it's entertaining and I love entertaining. When my record went to 82 in the national charts, I was just glad to have a record get into the Top 100. And then it kept going and going."

It looks as if "going and going" is going to become the Roy Head trademark, for not only is his career going, but his act literally keeps him going. The fellow has worked out a style in which he gyrates constantly, getting himself into pretzel positions, taking pratfalls and even, to scare fans in the first row, falling off the stage every once in a while.

He explained that these shenanigans began when he played football and felt he ought to cut up on the field. After that and with his nickname as "rubberlegs," his friends persuaded him to work his jumping bean tactics into his act.

As far as doing an act is concerned, the idea has paid off. Roy said, "I'm curious. So I ask teens I meet what they like to see in an act. They tell me an exciting act is what they're after."

When he goes into a recording studio, Roy pretends that he's in front of a crowd so that he can get the feeling on record that he gets on the stage. "It's hard to record me," he admitted, "because I move around and the mike doesn't pick it all up.'

To overcome these problems. the singer has taken to recording and producing himself. "'Treat Her Right' was the first side I produced myself. I felt it was time I had a whack at it. And Don Robey, who is one of the best men I've ever worked with, felt I knew what I wanted more than anybody else."

One thing he usually includes in his act is some country/Western material. "I began singing Country/Western songs when I was nine," he said. "'Bummin' Around' is one of my favorites. My brother, Donald Head, has written a country song 'Blue Moon Over the New Aces,' that you can expect to hear on an album."

The eight years of one-niters that Roy has been doing ("The longest time I've ever stayed in one place was two nights," he said), can be explained by his attitude toward performing. "I'm in another world when I'm in front of an audience. I could perform morning, noon and night. I gotta move."

It's a fairly safe bet he will.

MGM Inks Merv & Steve Perrv



FRANTIC FREDDIE FREDDIE AND THE DREAMERS— Mercury MG 21053; SR 61053.



Some Roses Due Tepper, Bennett

BY DOUG McCLELLAND

NEW YORK—Composers Sid Tepper and Roy Bennett have jumped from the big-band hit "Woodchuck Song" of the mid-'40s to writing songs for Elvis

ease. And success. The fellows, who started their collaboration about 36 years ago when they were 11year-old Broooklyn lads ("You know, poems and thing"), have composed about 40 songs for the phenomenally lucrative Elvis Presley films and RCA Victor sound track albums. They wrote the fast-climbing new Presley single, "Puppet on a String," from "Girl Happy," and have ditties in three completed but unreleased Presley vehicles, "Harum Scarum, "Frankie and Johnny" and "Paradise, Hawaiian Style."

Presley movies with the utmost

"We have about six songs in these three pictures," the pair told **Record World** last week. "And we don't write down for them," it was emphasized.

And what was Elvis really like?

"We don't know, we never met him," was the reply. "We just write the songs, make the demos and ship them to the Coast." They both work on the words and music.

The boys have also clicked composing for "England's Elvis Presley," Cliff Richard. For him they wrote "The Young Ones" (the title song from his film), "Traveling Light" and "When the Girl in Your Arms is the Girl in Your Heart." (They were extremely hot in England a few years back.)

Hero at Home-Finally

Bennett added that although he had enormous success recently with the revival of the pair's "Red Roses for a Blue Lady," it all meant little to his teen-age daughter—until Herman's Hermits recorded their "Traveling Light."

"Then I was a hero at home," he said.

"Red Roses" was even a bigger hit the second time around, it was learned, and turned up in about 40 albums. This inspired the composers to dredge up the original "Roses" followup, "Thanks, Mr. Florist" which flopped again.

The hits, though, are in the majority for Bennett and Tepper — "The Naughty Lady of Shady Lane," "Say Something Sweet To Your Sweetheart," "Kewpie Doll," "The Wonderful World of the Young," "Angel," "Bagiagaloop (Makes Love on the Stoop)," etc. Said Tepper: "Our children's

Said Tepper: "Our children's numbers are performed more than any others of our songs in ASCAP, things like 'Susie Snowflake.' And we also have other important novelties, many of them seasonal, like 'Eggbert the Easter Egg,' 'Gabby the Gobbler' and 'Nuttin' for Christmas' and 'Christmas Child.'"

The latter holiday tune is in the current Decca Burl Ives Christmas package, "Have a Holly Jolly Christmas," and is one the composers are especially proud of.

Johnny Marks Busy with TV

NEW YORK — Composer Johnny Marks has become very active in the television field. Last summer he wrote all the music for the General Electric Christmas commercials (words by Tom Hagen) which will be shown nationally during Noyember and December.

He is now writing the music and lyrics for a new television spectacular being produced by Videocraft for the General Electric Co. to be shown in color on film in the fall of 1966. Last year the TV spec "Rudolph The Red-Nosed Reindeer," for which he wrote the score, featuring the voice of Burl Ives, was in the Nielsen Top 10 and received critical acclaim. It was produced by Videocraft in color and will be rerun on the NBC network Dec. 5 of this year by GE. It has also been sold abroad for TV.

Decca has made an album of the show. One side is the original sound track songs, and on the other side Decca has recorded instrumentally all the songs and important background music.

"We owe a lot to Sid Mills," they both agreed. "He took us off the streets and gave us staff writing jobs at Mills Music and helped put us where we are. He paid us while we were learning."







A few manufacturers have ecstatically informed me that their records have gone over the 300,000 mark in sales. I listen in amazement when I hear these small figures, because the total population of the United States exceeds 190 million; and the teen population is astronomical.

Charlie Fach, head of Smash Records, estimates that Top 40 radio reaches no more than 40 million people. So there must be an even more effective way for record companies to reach the consumer directly and inspire them in turn to listen more to radio. Fach finds that the new radio station "fan newspapers" (which are full of all kinds of stories about recording artists) are the most exciting phenomenon in the business. I wonder how many manufacturers "bother" to service college radio stations with their product, knowing that the most completely "turned on" hip kids in the country are to be found on the campuses? Even Joan Baez loves to sing rock and R&B songs at her concerts.

Pete Garris informs me that he has a new pop record called "One and One" by Diane & Anita on Scepter that has the picks on all three Washington stations. . . The next Roy Head on Scepter will be from the LP and is called, "Get Back." And "Just a Little Bit" by Roy is way up on the national charts, on WLS, WHK, KHJ and every big station in the country. . . The new Dionne Warwick sounds out of sight.

I am happy to say that "I Really Love," DeeDee Sharp, Cameo, which we tipped you on as breaking first R&B in Detroit, busted large pop in Detroit, and is now going on these pop stations: WIL, St. Louis; WPLO, Atlanta; WKBW, Buffalo; WKYC, Cleveland; WCFL, Chicago; WKDA, Nashville; WRIT, Milwaukee; WHYN, Springfield, etc. . . . Meanwhile, "A Boy & A Girl," Sounds Orchestral, Parkway, is on WHK & WKYC, Cleveland; WAKR & WHOL, Akron, etc.

Diplomacy Records is into the pop field with a bang as "Green Eyed Woman," New Breed, broke as a smash in Sacramento and is now on KYA & KEWB, San Francisco; WCFL, Chicago; KXOK, St. Louis; all the Washington stations; WITH, Baltimore.

ABC has a big hit in Philadelphia with, "Gee," Anthony & the Sophomores. WIBG broke it wide open. It was a hit years ago ... "Stand By Me," Sandy Borden, Diplomacy, is now on WCFL, Chi-(Continued on page 21)

New 'ABC '66' Series LP Source Possibility

NEW YORK — ABC-TV will inaugurate a new series, "ABC '66," next season that may well translate into a new source of original cast albums for diskeries.

The new prime time show (at a yet undesignated time slot) was announced last week by network President Thomas W. Moore, who said that the show is the result of ABC's search for a "new program of some sort—a creative program, a program innovation—which in and of itself will represent a departure from existing patterns" as promised earlier this year by Leonard H. Goldenson, President of American Broadcasting Companies, Inc.

Moore said that the kick-off season would present 26 new shows and repeat six of them for a 32-week schedule. "The hours to be presented will include original musical comedies and dramatic shows written especially for television, comedies, variety presentations and new

SESAC Holiday Package Sells

"Within a week after its initial promotional mailing, SES-AC's 1965 holiday package was sold in more than 125 radio markets throughout the United States," according to Sid Guber, the firm's National Sales Manager.

The special "bonus" production disk of harp moods and interludes is apparently the big drawing card as more than 95% of the orders received to date were for the full six LP package and the bonus LP.

"While a few stations are taking advantage of the three LP offer, minus the bonus disk, at \$6.95," said Guber, "the big six LP package, plus bonus, at \$12.95 is unquestionably the preferred choice of the broadcasters."

The 1965 holiday package, gift wrapped and accompanied by a miniature Christmas tree, contains six LPs featuring the Anita Kerr Singers, Elliot Lawrence and his Orchestra, the William Dawson Chorale, the Trinity Choir of St. Paul's Chapel, the Don Janse Chorale and an album of sacred melodies performed on carillon and organ by Louis Delmotte and George Crook.

The holiday package includes more than 81 individual cuts including new renditions of popular traditional carols. and exciting forms of entertainment documentaries produced from a theatrical point of view rather than hard news values."

New Talent

Moore indicated that the hour programs would be used as a vehicle for new young individuals with presently undiscovered acting or writing talents and to encourage a new form of sical comedy composition.

Among the musical hours already slated for presentation are "The Flip Side," a show about "fun and games in today's music industry," to have music and lyrics by Burt Bacharach and Hal David and a book by Robert Emmett; "How Like a God," a Richard Adler adaptation of a George Bernard Shaw short story about football, "The Anthony Newley Show," with the famed performer writer mixing mime and song; "Sour grapes," a Franco-American musicale.

The series will be supervised by Edgar J. Scherick, David Sontag and Jerry Bredouw.

Enzo Stuarti called to tell me that his smooth music entry, "He," Epic, is following the path of Al Martino's record (they're buddies) on the Top 40 stations, and he's on KXOK, St. Louis (where the policy is to give this type record a break); WKYC, Cleveland (ditto); WXYZ and CKLW, Detroit; Bertha Porter at WDRC, Hartford (she just programs the good records regardless); the Cincinnati stations and top smooth stations like WIND, Chicago and WIP, Philadelphia.

Walt McGuire at London tells me that "A Young Girl" by Noel Harrison on London Rex' son) is picking up a lot of big stations, thanx to the Big Bill Gavin Tip and Vote of Confidence (KEWB, San Francisco, San Diego, WCFL), and there do not seem to be any listener complaints about that one line in it. In fact, the song gives good advice to young girls to watch out for smooth talkers (like you jocks). . . . Tht Jonathan King "Gone to the Moon" is finally a Top 10 smash since it's only been out since July, and was a giant in England.

"I Hear a Symphony," Supremes, is a complete smash for Motown pop. I wish I could say the same for the Miracles and Kim Weston. The Marvin Gaye is on just about every pop station. Also, "Cleo's Back," Jr. Walker, Soul, is a big winner for the company. The sales on the Marvin Gaye and Miracles are astronomical regardless of the pop charts around the country.

The Walker Brothers, Jan and Dean and Mel Carter are top smash records. "My Baby," The Temptations, looks extremely big. The Elvis Presley, Dean Martin, Roger Miller, James Brown, (Continued on page 26)

Billy Joe Royal is matching his "Down in the Boondocks" with another single bestseller, "I Knew You When." "Louie, Louie" was the tune that propelled Paul Revere and the Raiders to a position of national popularity. A new single, "Steppin' Out," is helping to reinforce that popularity.

A number of newly signed artists have recorded debut singles which are sellers. Simon Garfunkel's "The Sounds of Silence," already a hit in New England, the Atlanta area and Florida, is

a certain winner. Scoring in Texas with their first Columbia single, "Time," the Pozo-Seco Singers are on their way to national success with the tune. Italian vocalist Nini Rosso is climbing charts with "Il Silenzio."

The James Brown, Wilson Pickett, Joe Tex, Fontella Bass hits seem to stay around forever, and sell and sell and sell. They may not go fantastically high on the trade pop charts, but when they are finaly all over, the sales totals are gigantic. And remember that R&B hits come from the "Land of No Returns."



Ken Reeth PD of WAMO, Pittsburgh, tells me that his boss has been promoting FM for 5 years and selling receivers at wholesale cost at the station and around town. As a result the ratings of 72,000 watt WAMO-FM are not that far behind some of the big AM stations in town. Another good move was going 24 hours, and just lately Ken put all of his gospel and a two

hour jazz show on FM. That really made things jump. Now they're selling FM sets in through the church organizations.

His big FM jockey is a lad just out of high school named Brother Matt. Porky Chadwick of WAMO packed the Civic Auditorium with the Motown show, and Ken tells me that Brother Matt got a bigger hand than the Temptations.

R&B LPs Selling

Jerry Wexler reports a phenomenon in the record business of recent vintage, the tremendous upsurge in sales of the R&B album. He is at a loss to explain its cause. But I have a double train of thought at the moment and for me, that's a triumph! You see, a thought in the singular is something of a miracle anyway, but then was then reminds me that the column I wrote last week is absolutely obsolete, because now is now, and even though I don't feel one little bit like sitting at this typewriter, instinct tells me that my editor Sid Parnes wouldn't approve of this line of thought at all. He said he's a devout Tony Bennett convert, and must try to get as many albums as possible.

Silly sort of story to relate, isn't it? But I thought you might like to know about it. And, memo to Tony Bennett: Congratulations on being chosen for the Royal Variety Command performance. We're all waiting for your arrival.

Gene Pitney's over here again, and two nights ago I put on a thick winter overcoat and raced off to London's Scotch Club. Was I thirsting for scotch, you ask? Never touch the stuff, but like Eric Burdon of the Animals, Keith Richard of the Rolling Stones and sensational new British singer Chris Farlowe, I was thirsting for some "in person" singing from Ben E. King. The club jumped, and Ben went on for something like 90 minutes. As I crept in out of the fog and climbed into my little wooden bed at 4 a.m., I could still hear that Eric Burdon voice towering over all as he wailed, "I Who Have Nothing," Ben . . . and you know what? Ben obliged.

The Bachelors seem to be on the way back with a revival of "In the Chapel in the Moonlight" . . . Georgie Fame who had a No. 1 with "Yeah Yeah" sometime ago has hit the mark again with "Something" . . . Bob Dylan's on the move again with "Positively Fourth Street" . . . The Animals, too, with "It's My Life" . . . The Everly Brothers with "Love is Strange" . . . and the Rolling Stones have gone straight to the British Top 10 with "Get Off of My Cloud."

I wish it were one of those 10-minute productions because I can't stop playing it, and if it did go for 10 minutes, then it would cut my labor by half. 

Leading television personality as well as top recording artist Jimmy Dean has numerous top-sellers to his credit.

John Gary Seeks Label Injunctions

John Gary, one of the record industry's strong LP sellers, is seeking a temporary injunction, pending litigation, against two record companies, which the singer alleges released albums of songs by him without authorization.

The companies against whom Gary filed suits (through his attorneys, Butler, Jablow and Geller) are Metro Goldwyn Mayer, who released an LP entitled "John Gary" on its Metro label, the company's budget line; and Cameo-Parkway, who released an LP entitled "An Evening With John Gary" on its Wyncote label, also a budget line. The sides in the Metro album are said to be the same as those released in the Wyncote album. Both suits were filed in New York Supreme Court.

Masters Sold

The masters were sold to MGM by Ted Black and to Cameo-Parkway by Ted Black and Ronnie Eden. Gary alleges he made most of the sides as demos for Ted Black when the latter was professional manager for Miller Music. Some were made with live musicians, and on others Gary overdubbed vocals on band tracks recorded by Ted Black in England. Gary maintains that neither Black nor anyone else had any authority to release the sides, nor lease or sell them for commercial release.

Gary is currently under contract to RCA Victor.




CHART BOUND there's a warld of excitement on CADET RECORDS



While the long active life of a jazz LP does not reflect much change on the top selling LP list, there is a continuous flow of albums of outstanding musical quality that merits more than cursory attention.

During the past weeks, in keeping with our theme, "Jazz is better than ever," the producers of albums have given great support to this thesis. Many of the newly released albums will make their way to the best selling charts thus receiving the approval of the in-

creasing jazzloving public. There's "Duke Ellington's Concert of Sacred Music," RCA Victor. This album was chosen by us as an Album of the Week on

our WLIB/FM show. There are no words to describe Duke, his myriad talents, his orchestra, or his creativity. All of these facets make up the man. In this new album, the Duke has recorded the service that was seen by millions of television viewers last Dec. 26. Incidentally, it was a beautiful post Christmas present.

The record captures the flavor of the show. And one of the really startling cuts of the album is the magnificent "David Danced Before the Lord With All His Might," featuring Bun-ny Briggs. Briggs, for the uninitiated, is about the last of the active artists practicing tap dancing. He sounds like a deft percussionist playing the snare drum and gives evidence that the tap dancer is greatly responsible for the concept of modern drumming. And lastly, only Mr. Ellington could produce a show on the pulpit of a church; have it nationally televised; bring in a tap dancer; record the LP; and still be beautiful and artistically valid.

Ellington has taken excerpts from such well known classics as "Black, Beige, Brown," "New World A Comin'," "My People" and the first four words of the bible and has produced an album that is inspiring. The Quartet Tres Bien's new album is "In Motion," Decca. Jazz has a colorful language all its own. So much can be said with a few words. In trying to define the QTB, there is no description more apropos than "together." Yet, this does not give a full, adequate portrait.

There is an original and stylish quality to their music. It is pulsating, rhythmic and sometimes provocative. There is a high degree of musicality and melodic touches are always dominent in their themes.

In this album that for once carries a suitable title that depicts the content of the music, the QTB are really in motion. And in motion they are inventive. Check out "It Ain't Necessarily So." The four musicians, Jeter Thompson, piano; Richard Simmons, bass; Albert St. James, drums; and Percy James, bongos, display a rare kind of unity. For the jazz jock who looks for music that deserves to be heard and promoted, the QTB stands ready. There is no reason for them not to be regular chart makers.

"Bustin' Out Gentlemen Junie Gardner," Emarcy, is a new artist to this writer. There is one cut in the album that shows Junie has done some homework. "99 Plus One" has reminiscences of "Soul Serenade."

From what I can gather, Junie is based in New Orleans and his roots are reflected in his interpretations. The entire album is highly programmable. Junie is indeed ready to really bust out.

"A Change Is Gonna Come/ Brother Jack McDuff," is Jack's debut on Atlantic. With the large number of releases including many best sellers, he was wise to change his setting. He has enlarged his organ sounds and augmented his trio with trumpets, trombone and guitar. Thus he comes up with a good little band sound. The organ remains the principal solo voice.

Jack has always had a reputation for being one of the most adventurous among the organ players with an ear for a good sound.
