



Concert Review

Brown at Garden A Classic

NEW YORK — James Brown came downtown last week and packed Madison Square Garden —the first time a single record name has performed this feat.

Brown performed many another feat during his hour on stage—weeping, getting helped to the wings by the Fabulous Flames, coming back, collapsing to his knees, being helped to the wings again, et al.

During this stint—certainly a show business classic—he went through his list of standards ending with "Please, Please, Please" which raised the already frenzied audience to near riot level.

He proved himself unique.

Also appearing on the stage prior to Brown's flamboyant entrance were MGM's Lou Christie, who reprised his hits, Omen's James Crawford, who did "But I Do," Excello's Slim Harpo, Vickie Anderson, Atlantic's Young Rascals, and, of course, the components of the Brown show.

W W R L deejays appeared periodically and received cheers from the throng.

But it was Brown who galvanized the evening and crowned himself a box office power.

Yorke to New Special Projects Post at Cap

HOLLYWOOD — Voyle Gilmore, VP, Artists and Repertoire, Capitol Records, Inc., has announced the appointment of Robert Yorke to the newly created position of Special Projects Director, A&R. Yorke will be responsible for current

and future A&R development programs.

Yorke brings to Capitol more than 20 years of experience in the recording industry. Prior to his CRI appointment, he served in a number of executive capacities in the industry, most recently as vice president and general manager of Colpix in Hollywood.

Yorke entered the record industry as a salesman for RCA Victor in 1945. He was then promoted to manager, sales and merchandising, manager of West Coast operations, and from 1960 to 1963 he was RCA's division vice president, commercial records creation department.

While with RCA, Yorke was responsible for signing a number of that label's key artists —Henry Mancini, Peter Nero, John Gray, Sergio Franchi, Al Hirt, Ann-Margret and the Limeliters—and was instrumental in developing their recording careers.

Ragovay Warner Labels' East Coast A & R Manager

BURBANK, CALIF. — In the first of several moves designed to further augment Warner Bros.' talent roster, J. K. Maitland, President of Warner Bros. Records, Inc., announces the appointment of producerarranger Jerry Ragovoy to its A & R staff. Ragovoy becomes A & R Manager, East Coast, handling producer's duties for the company's three labels, Warner Bros., Reprise, and Loma.

Ragovoy will report to George Lee, Vice President and Director of East Coast operations for the company, and will headquarter in the Warner offices in New York.

Maitland stated that Ragovoy will have full authority to sign talent, to record and to determine a release schedule from his East Coast offices.

Ragovoy will be working closely and directly with music publishers in New York, searching for material not only for artists who record directly with him, but also for all artists on Warners, Reprise and Loma.

Searching for Talent

Maitland emphasized that Ragovoy's operation will be

rather autonomous in nature. He will immediately initiate a search for new talent, songs and material out of the East Coast area.

Ragovoy in recent years has been one of the most successful free-lance arrangers and producers on the East Coast, having been responsible for three Top 10 records: The Rolling Stones' "Time Is On My Side," Garnet Mimms' "Cry Baby," and the Majors' "Wonderful Dream." He has also produced other successful records with Gene Pitney, Solomon Burke, the Majors, Garnet Mimms, Jay and the Americans and others.

Ragovoy is also a song-writer. Prior to going on his own as a free-lance arranger, Ragovoy worked from 1960 to 1961 as an arranger for Chancellor Records.

Colpix NY Move Official

NEW YORK—Effective April 4, Colpix Records' operation will be back in New York after spending a little over a year on the West Coast.

Bud Katzel, Vice-President and General Manager, announced that the label's main operation will be fully under way as of April 4, and that the company will be headquartered at 711 Fifth Ave.

Katzel explained that the company's move back to New York was based on a belief that the Colpix operation, a division of Columbia Pictures and Screen Gems TV, could work more effectively if it were closer to the parent company. He also added that the move in no way was initiated to curtail the record division's operation, but rather it is in line with plans for further expansion.

The move, also, in no way affects any of the label's commitments to Coast recording activities. He emphasized the fact that there is no question but that there has been tremendous growth in the record business on the West Coast over the past number of years and that Colpix has every intention of participating in that growth. However, after careful analysis of the company's present position and based on future plans, it is important that the company situate itself close to the parent company and operate its national offices in New York.

The label has just released five albums which include "Nina Simone With Strings," "The Jane Morgan Album," "Broadway Soul" by saxophonist Sonny Stitt, "Tommy Dorsey ... A Man and His Trombone" by the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra and a Lou Christie album entitled "Lou Christie Strikes Again." On the singles front, Colpix is riding the charts with "I Can't Grow Peaches on a Cherry Tree" by Just Us.

Katzel indicated that the move to New York signaled a stepped-up recording activity under the aegis of Stanley Kahan, who was recently brought in to handle A&R activities for the company. Returning to New York with Katzel is Leonard Adelman, Controller for Colpix.

Product Diversification

Hanna - Barbera into R & B, C/W

HOLLYWOOD—Don Bohanan, Vice President and General Manager of Hanna-Barbera Records, has set his corporate sights on expanding the label's successful pop music and children's line into the fields of country & Western and Rhythm & Blues.

Bohanan's industry experience through his positions with King Records, an early R & B leader, smooths the way for HBR's entry into these markets.

"Once you've experienced the excitement of R & B sales and promotion," Bohanan said in an exclusive **Record World** interview, "it never leaves you and you never want to leave it." The HBR topper points with pride to the label's first R & B release, "Be Ever Mine," by Art Grayson, a Hermitage master acquired for Hanna-Barbera Records by Bohanan.

Continuously Searching

Bohanan emphasized that HBR is continuously searching for additional material from outside producers in the R & B and C & W fields.

"There is no limit to the amount of material we'll consider for release," he continued.





Kapp's All - Out Singles Drive

NEW YORK—Kapp Records, owner of a pair of hot albums the original caster for "Man of La Mancha" and the comedy set, "When You're in Love, the Whole World Is Jewish" — is embarking on a major drive in the singles market.

The program is already underway with a number of new releases and a series of other important items ready for immediate release, according to a joint announcement by Sid Schaffer, recently appointed Kapp vice president in charge of sales, and Hy Grill, executive A&R producer for the company.

The firm's revamped singles release schedule now calls for new product every two weeks, involving such all-market product as pop-rock, "good music" and country material.

Already heavily programmed is "The Ballad of Irving," from the "Jewish" album, the first comedy single to hit the air with such impact in many months.

Lenny Welch's new disk, "Rags to Riches" has hit the charts, while Roger Williams' "Lara's Theme" from the picture "Dr. Zhivago" is getting action.

Four Others Strong, Too

Four other singles are also achieving strong early play: "If You Love Me" and "I Give In" by the Lazy Susans, a new girl group; "A Basket of Flowers," by the Nightcrawlers, a rockoriented vocal group; "When Johnny Comes Marching Home Again," initial outing on Kapp for British thrush Shani Wal-



lis; and "Please Don't Sell My Daddy No More Wine," by the Greenwoods. The latter side has strong pop, folk and country potential.

Kapp's recently signed indie production arrangement with Kama-Sutra Productions has resulted in a first single by the Critters, who'll have a follow-up in the next few weeks. Also from Kama-Sutra is Chi Chi, a new girl singer from Philadelphia, whose initial Kapp release will be out March 30. (See separate story.)

The British group the Searchers is cutting a new single in London this week for early release here, coinciding with their projected 10-day tour of the United States in mid-April.

On the country front, where vet country A&R exec Paul Cohen holds sway in Nashville, the label is rushing a new "Why Freddy Hart single, "Why Should I Cry Over You," as follow-up to his "Hank Williams' Guitar." Stuart Hamblen, who has just joined Kapp, is also perking with his initial release, "This Ole House Has Got To Go." Upcoming, too, are new releases for Bob Wills and Cal Smith, a member of Ernest Tubb's Texas Troubadours group, as well as Hugh X. Lewis, who had a recent hit with "I'd Better Call The Law On Me."

Congress' Big Singles Plan

A strong singles program is also being blueprinted for Kapp's subsidiary Congress line. The Halos, formerly known as the Angels, have "Come Softly to Me," and the recently signed



Quality Records executives will be attending the Atlantic-Atco distributor meetings which tee off at the Deauville Hotel in Miami on Sunday (27) for three days.





'One - Sided Deejays': Blessing, Curse?

Marty Wekser. Music Director of WWRL, N.Y., discussed practice of some of the R&B labels of issuing one-sided deejays copies. Marty doesn't object to the practice per se (though some pop people do), since he feels a company has a right to push what they consider the strongest side.

However, Marty wishes the labels would inform him what the title of the "B" side is. He is embarrassed when he calls stores and hears an unfamiliar title as the selling side, and has to admit that he never heard of it.



I hear that WOKB, Orlando, has become very important in Central Florida with its 5,000 watts, and owner Jack Everback is busting his buttons. 

The Long Arm of Jazz

Jazz is no longer confined to the sweeping and swirling rhythms projected in night clubs. It is rapidly reaching out and finding new outlets. And most of this expansion is due to the adventurous and imaginative young composers like Lalo Schifrin, Quincy Jones, Johnny Mandel and others.

Most composers and arrangers whose roots are deep in jazz will say that their interpretations are not pure jazz . . . that their desire is to create an imaginative score using all of the best elements based on their individual experience and the desires of the producers. However, upon listening to their scores, we find that the moving, soulful power of jazz is very much in evidence.

Just recently we were reviewing three of Lalo Schifrin's recent albums on MGM/Verve: "New Fantasy," "Once A Thief" and "Music From the Soundtrack of the Cincinnati Kid."

This talented composer, who spent time with **Dizzy Gillespie**, forged a jazz sound in all of the albums. There is no denying that he thinks in terms of today's contemporary sound, but the jazz is there.

The question of "Can jazz be used in a movie soundtrack?," other than as background music, I think has been answered by Lalo in his score of "Once A Thief" as well as Quincy Jones' "The Pawnbroker." In these pictures jazz was skillfully woven throughout the musical interludes.

Where It's Going

The question of where jazz is going seems to become a problem to those who are not cognizant of the rapidly changing times. It becomes more and more apparent that the word jazz is not only almost indefinable, but its characteristics, personality and classification only adds to the imponderable mess when a definition is sought.

When a jazz album becomes a "hit," the record people say it has gone "pop." Did the music go pop? "No," they answer, "it has nothing to do with the music. It is only in terms of record sales that we say when

a record goes pop it has received a certain number of sales that indicates its sales value."

Fine. But is the record jazz? No, it is pop. Therefore, Ramsey Lewis becomes a pop artist. And Jimmy Smith becomes pop. What happened to the jazz?

Well, this calls for further amplification. When a jazz artist goes pop, it means he has certain acceptability in the general market and will be bought by all peoples. Fine. Does it mean he is no longer jazz? Not really.

If there is confusion in the field, it is due to the failure of the producers, writers, publicity people, etc., to get together one clear definition of what jazz is or what it is not.

Because of this, much fine music produced by creative jazz people goes by the boards. The efforts of arrangers such as Quincy, Lalo and others are sometimes misunderstood, when they offer a palatable diet of jazz that someone decries it is not pure or in the case of Lalo, it is sometimes said, he is too experimental or much too adventurous.

Commercial Jazz Increasing

To expand a bit further, we notice an increasing amount of jazz is being used in commercial jingles, television and radio.

When you ask the producers of these media is it jazz, they say no, we were just trying to find a music we thought suitable for the commercial.

Add confusion to the awareness that much of the rock and roll and R & B music is performed on record and produced in studios by some of the most creative members of the jazz world and by some of the leading members of the classical music academy.

Many of the reasons for the success of the sound of these records stems from having the kind of musicians who can play the music, and upon listening closely one hears the jazz in the arrangements.

Confusion always seems to be rampant in jazz, yet the whole matter could be solved if we would only remember that jazz is really a four letter word J-A-Z-Z.


Pacific Jazz In New Look

RECORD WORLD-April 2, 1966

E. Rodney Low Market

WVON-Chicago's E. Rodney (Mad Lad) Jones started his career as a band musician in Texarkana, Ark.-Texas, Band leader Jay Franks gave Rodney his first stint on a microphone at dances-Rodney was the M.C.

In the late 40's, Rodney went on the air with what he calls "the shortest show in radio." As staff announcer at Station KTFS. Rodney was to do a 15minute show a day---that is, if the baseball game he followed was over at 3 p.m. If the game went into overtime, Rodney didn't have a show. Besides praving for rain. Rodney prepared for his show as if it were an NBC spectacular.

His listening audience soon wanted to hear more of the exmusician and ex-baseball player (semi-pro) and his entertaining comments about the day's game, played or unplayed, baseball in general, music or any number of assorted subjects; so his time was extended to one hour. And in 1952 when the station's owners opened a station in Kansas City, Miss., Rodney opened, too.

From there he moved to KXLW in St. Louis, Miss. There, on a competitive station just opposite Rodney's air slot, a disk jockey named Roy Wood was spinning disks. Roy and Rodney would call one another during their shows and simultaneously spin the exact same records at the exact same time, announcing over the air to their listeners that it wouldn't do them any good to tune to "that other station," because they'd hear the same thing. (Roy Wood is now News Director for WVON.)

Was Program Director

Next, Rodney went to WBBR, East St. Louis, Ill., as Program Director. The station had been suffering from stiff competition from other radio stations, the popularity of live entertainment and the ever-growing response to television. They asked Jones to come and take a stab at making the station a going proposition.

"They came to me (the WBBR owners) and told me honestly how it was with them," Jones recalls. "And fool that I am, Laccepted the challenge. I guess that every jock wants a chance to see if he could put together radio programming that listeners will like and listen to repeatedly."

The listeners must have liked

his programming for it took them less than a year to make WBBR the third-ranked radio station in the St. Louis area.

In 1962 Rodney moved to Chicago to take a staff job with Station WYNR, leaving to help start a new station, WVON, which made its debut April 1, 1963. Rodney gladly accepted this opportunity, he says: "Leonard and Phil Chess (Chicago record manufacturers and owners of WVON) offered me the chance I had been waiting for and working so hard for since starting in radio back in Texarkana. WVON is all, or at least most all, of what a radio station should be. We've all worked very hard at making it entertaining, listenable, interesting, informative, and most of all, a real service to the community."

Five Little Joneses

Rodney and Amanda Jones have five children: Earl, Jr., Earline, Andre, Otis and baby girl, Nichelle.

He is a leader in the community professionally (local President of the National Association of Radio Announcers, Inc.). In 1964 Jones gave the NARA an enormously successful national convention in Chicago.

Footnote: In July, '64, Rodney and another WVON disk jockey, Pervis Spann, purchased the shuttered Club DeLisa and reopened that landmark on Chicago's South Side as "The Club." featuring name stars in entertainment.

Would you believe: A teen-ager tripped on camera at Hy Lit's TV Dance Party, and this created another new dance fad in Philly, So, Hy and I phoned Gary Stevens of WMCA, N.Y. (Gary is so clever at inventing names for things.) Gary advised us to name this dance "The Schwartz." He said that it reminded him of a dance they did in the Polish section of Detroit (when he was on WKNR) which they called "The Shloomp." Funny thing. After that kid tripped, he got up and said, "Sorry about that, Hy Lit!"

We are constantly intrigued by the staying power of oldies, such as "Louie, Louie" waltzing around three times. Bernie Binnick of Swan Records is now getting big bites on "Wild Weekend." But I have some news for Bernie. He's got a record that has gone to #1 everywhere it managed to get play. It hit #1 in Syracuse and many other cities in New York, and is the top record on countless college campuses. It owns the record hops in Philly and up-state Pennsylvania. It's the flip side of "Let's Stomp" by Bobby Comstock, and the title is "I Wanna Do It." The beat is unbelievable. Call Bernie or Tony Mammerella for a copy, and just try it at your hops. I guarantee that you'll generate mucho EXCITEMENT.

I spoke to Scott Regen of WKNR, Detroit, and he is excited about what he considers to be a much underrated record, "Baby Blue," Noel Harrison, London. Scott is playing it very heavy, and is explaining the Dylan lyric to his 25,000 teen listeners. It is a well-produced and arranged record.

Have you listened to the "B" side of the Tokens' "I Hear Trumpets Blow"? It's called "Don't Cry, Sing Along With The Music" and I think **Trade Martin** cut a Top 5 Smash (though the "A" side is jumping). It has a Detroit bottom, and 4 Seasons-Beach Boys sound and is GREAT!

The Righteous Brothers: Outsiders; Cher; Lovin' Spoonful; Young Rascals; Johnny Rivers; Gary Lewis; Paul Revere; Peter & Gordon; and Beatles rule the nation . . . Petula Clark only has to have great material like "Sign of the Times" and she'll make it on every type station . . . The Tijuana Brass are setting new records in LP sales and Jerry Moss and Herb Alpert are two nice guys now set for life! . . . The Slim Harpo is another R&B smash that I discovered that has gone all the way pop. I picked it up from Will Rudd in Cleveland two weeks before Christmas . . . Lyme & Cybelle demonstrate the dominating influence of California on the total national scene . . . "Shapes of Yardbirds, is a hit and the new D.C. 5, "Try Too Hard," Things," prove that the British sound is far from dead when they make a great record . . . "Gloria," Shadows of Knight, is a Stone Smash, and proves that Chicago can start them large . . . "Young Love," Lesley Gore, is a winner. She only needs material. She has things in her LPs that are sure hits . . . Brass Ring (see previous remarks about Chicago) ... "Leaning on a Lamp Post," Herman's Hermits, goes all the way . . . "Sloop John B" a sure pop for Capitol. The West remains folk-oriented . . . "Together Again," Ray Charles, can't miss . . . Fantastic play on "Memories Are Made of This," Drifters. It broke big pop in Philadelphia off WIBG . . . "Message to Michael," Dionne Warwick, will be on every pop station. It broke first in L.A. . . . "Somebody To Love Me," Ronny & Daytonas, didn't have to start in Birmingham and spread to Paul Drew in Atlanta and Miami this trip. Stone hit . . . **T-Bones** getting all the picks it needs . . . "I Can't Let Go," Hollies, is a great production and most stations do agree "Till the End of Time," Kinks, has the important stations cooking . . . Sure but the British sound is dead . . . Harold Berkman, National Promo Director of MGM, has even revived interest in the British smash, "Have Pity," Paul & Barry Ryan . . . The Bachelors went on every good music station and many good contemporaries . . . "I'm the Sky," Eddie Rambeau, will be on every pop station. Great background ... "When I hear Sarah Vaughan's version of "Lovers Concerto" on the air, it just makes me feel good. What pipes! ... The most picked new record in the nation is "Night Time Girl," Modern Folk Quartet ... Moe Preskell called about "Too Young," Tommy Vann, which is a hit in Baltimore and Pittsburgh and went on WIBG, WMCA and many more ... "Groovy Kind of Love," Mindbenders, Fontana, keeps grow-

Columbia. It flipped me . . . "Chain Reaction," Spellbinders, selling well in Cleveland, Detroit, Baltimore, Washington, etc. . . Play "Let's Go Get Stoned" out of the Ray Charles LP (and "Get Down With It") and forget it! Thank Burke Johnson.

WDAS, Philadelphia has two great LPs selling. The WDAS "Charities" oldie LP and the Georgie Woods oldie LP top cut in the Woods LP is "Sad Girl," Jay Wiggins, and this cut made Georgie's LP large. It's out on Amy as a single. Amy is reservicing Elmore James' "The Sky Is Crying" because of the big Baltimore sales. Larry Uttal reports that "Anytime," Lou Johnson (a great talent), broke big in Miami. His Clyde McPhatter "Little Bit of Sunshine" is a Pick on WVON . . . Lucky Cordell and Rodney Jones report that the Magnificent Montague production of "Honey Bunch," Drippers, went on WVON plus: "I've Got A Secret," Sharpees; "Gonna Be Strong," Intruders; "Suffering Pain," Jeff Dale; "My Mama Told Me," Barbara Carr, Chess; Dionne Warwick (Picks on Percy Sledge, Ruby Johnson, Jeff Dale).

"Make Me Glad," Kelly Brothers, Simms, looks good . . . Bobby Powell broke well in Cleveland for Stan Lewis . . . "Good Times," Johnny Daye, getting big play and is big in Pittsburgh . . . Righteous Brothers selling well R&B . . . Jimmy Smith has a giant . . . Much play on the new Lorraine Ellison . . . "Boogaloo Party," Flamingos, big on WMCA and great play everywhere . . . Great reaction to "You Better Come Home," Exciters, Bang . . . Much play on "I'm Into Something and Can't Shake It Loose," Pat Lewis, Golden World (which is Martha Jean's saying on the air) . . . "Real Humdinger," J. J. Barnes, and "G'Wan," Mark III, are hits for Irv Biegel. The guys really like you, Irv . . . And your biggest hit will be: "I'll Love You Forever," Holidays.

Here I go again. To get more instant hits from Tamla, get a stock copy and flip it over, viz.: "Never Leave Your Baby's Side," Martha & Vandellas (Baltimore smash) and a great record. Hey pop guys, listen to it. What an opening! . . Also: "Fadin' Away," **Temptations** (just 'jump back') . . "Darling Baby," Elgins, is large . . . Joe Evans found the key to the mint with his Manhattans. Ken Reeth agrees that the LP is great . . . Pete Garris is thrilled with the reaction on Dionne Warwick and the Shirelles. Dig: "Ivory Tower," Jesse & Shirley . . . Marty Wekser and Enoch Gregory are all out to break records on WWRL and they are doing it . . . "I'm Walking Out On You," Ruben Wright, Capitol, is Top 10 in Baltimore . . . "Bad Eye," Willie Mitchell, Hi, is another "20-75." Just great Memphis funk . . . Jim Stewart expects to have the new Carla Thomas shipped soon. (Baltimore and WWRL are on the "B" side out of the LP, "Another Night Without My Man") . . . Larry Dean sent me rating figures showing WWIN far ahead in Baltimore homes. All I know is, that if WWIN isn't on your record, you have problems The new Darrow Fletcher is "Young Misery." It's hard It's hard to believe he's only 14, 'cause he is great.

I must report that every R&B record from EVERY label in the business that starts selling or that sounds strong gets good R&B play in most markets—I mean things like "Good Good Lovin'," Blossoms, on Reprise; "Chain Reaction," Spellbinders, Columbia; Billy Preston, Ruben Wright and Lou Lawton on Capitol; "Please Don't Teach Me To Love You," Lorraine Ellison, Mercury; Garnet Mimms on U.A.; MGM-Verve; Dore and you name it. My point is: This is not true of the pop stations. In many cases some pop stations seem to give the edge on the few places available on their tightlists only to inside friends, all other things being equal. Thus, most pop records that sell are doomed to enjoy only regional hit status.

It does not seem to be widely known that the great blues singer, **Ted Taylor**, is now on Atco. Jerry Wexler personally cut him in a great new thing called "Long Distance Love" that's coming soon . . . Jim Stewart tells me that they pulled a "switch" on the new Carla Thomas single. Only the copies for the deejays will be in a special four-color sleeve. They are using a revealing picture (similar to the one on her latest LP that put Fat Daddy into a trance) . . . Atlantic is releasing immediately Ollie McLaughlin's latest smash (behind Deon Jackson) from Detroit: "Cool Jerk," Capitol. KCIJ has gone R&B in Shreveport and George Tanner will be in charge of the programming. He is on: Etta James; Bobby Powell; Mitty Collier; Joe Tex; O. V. Wright; Curtis Griffen.

There is now no question in my mind that "Barefootin'." Robert Parker, Nola, is a solid smash. It's a giant in New Orleans, and breaking R&B in many markets. The record just sounds great. Bob Robbins is going around the country personally to do the promoting. He runs New Orleans distributing and Dover and White Cliffs Music . . . "Please Don't Teach Me To Love You," Lorraine Ellison, is getting much play (as is the flip, "Call Me Anytime You Want Me") on Mercury . . . Many picks on "Afraid of Love," Appreciations, Jubilee ... The Percy Sledge is a smash first in San Francisco . . Those Capitol promo men should really get busy on "I'm Walking Out On You," Ruben Wright, because it's a Top 10 smash on WWIN & WEBB, Baltimore, and also in Norfolk, thanx to the efforts of great guy, Bill Jamieson (of Capitol). So, Ronnie Grainger in Atlanta and George Williams, go git 'em, Jim. It's also selling in Philadelphia without WDAS. I think WDAS may go on it, and it'll break large. It's a winner.

James Brown and an all-star show packed 13,000 people in Madison Square Garden in N.Y. Sid Bernstein made a bundle. James is the Titan of the R&B world. He passes out \$100 bills and color TV sets to people in his audiences. There is just nobody like our James Brown. To me he is the most dynamic, exciting performer in all of show biz. He has to be revived with oxygen more often than Fat Daddy (and that is often).

Larry Uttal checked in to tell me that "Anytime," Lou Johnson, just broke well in Baltimore, Washington, Detroit and Atlanta, all on time of big action in Miami. The Clyde McPhatter is a Pick at WVON, is on WCHB and is cooking in New Orleans . . . Abner Spector called to inform me that "Love A Go Go," Bobby Copney, Tuff, came in for two big re-orders in Chicago. He's on WWIN, and it looks like he has one—at last . . . The new Bob Kuban is "The Teaser" . . . "You've Got My Mind Messed Up," James Carr, is a big one.

Eddie Thomas checked in with glowing reports about "Hotdog," 4 Shells, Volt. Play is on every station.

Just received a call from Ernie Durham, WJLB (the first person to break Ramsey Lewis' "Hang on Sloopy") and they have broken a giant: "Barefootin'," Robert Parker, on Nola. Record already is Top 10 R&B and pop in New Orleans and was busted in Cleveland. I predict the record will be a Top 5 smash nationally. Also breaking wide open in Detroit is "Wang Dang Doodle," Koko Taylor, Checker. Looking very good is the Shirelles; James Carr; "Love a Go Go," Bobby Copney; and "Mend My Broken Heart," Wonderettes, United Artists (also breaking pop on CKLW). Surprisingly enough, the Spencer Davis is selling R&B in Detroit. The Don Covay also is selling well. "I Don't Want To Love You," Steve Mancha, Groovesville, is picking up a lot of strength.



Hickory High on Donovan 45

NASHVILLE — Hickory Records pulled all the stops out last week in the promotion of the recently-issued single by British folk-pop star, Donovan. The disk couples "Little Tin Soldier" from his album, "Fairy Tales," and "You're Gonna Need Somebody on Your Bond," from the album "Catch the Wind."

Radio WMCA's Good Guys in New York climbed on the Donovan bandwagon for the first time since last year with a fortnight of continuing play of the "Bond" side, with some jocks taking time to explain the nature of the term "bond" in the context of the song, which was also composed by Donovan.

The disk, at the moment, appears to be a two-sider, with virtually all key pop stations in the Baltimore-Washington market plugging the "Tin Soldier" side, following initial exposure by WCAO, Baltimore. The label now feels this will develop as the strongest Donovan entry in many months.

Acuff-Rose Exposure

Meanwhile, songs from Hick-

ory's parent firm, Acuff-Rose publications, are getting exposure through major artists on various labels, Chet Atkins, on RCA Victor, has the John Loudermilk song, "From Nash-ville with Love," while Decca will release the late Patsy Cline's "Half as Much." Sue Thompson, on Hickory itself, has a new one in "What Should I Do."

MGM will release Roy Orbison's newest, "Twinkle Toes," this week. The disk was issued last week in Great Britain coinciding with Orbison's arrival there for a six week tour. The song was performed on his smash appearance on Sunday at the Palladium TV, and the record promptly took off.

On the country front, Columbia Records' popular duo, George Morgan and Marion Worth, who scored recently with "Slipping Around," have sliced the Acuff-Rose song, "Saving All My Love (for you)." Songwriter-singer Jimmy Jay, one of Hickory's newer pactees, and also an Acuff-Rose writer, has done "They Didn't Like Me That Way," also just released.






