A & M Pays Over \$1 Million For CBS - LaBrea Lot, H'wodd

HOLLYWOOD — Herb Alpert and Jerry Moss, owners of A&M Record Co. and Tijuana Brass Enterprises, Inc. have announced their purchase of CBS-LaBrea studios from the Columbia Broadcasting System for a sum in excess of \$1,000,-000. Lot is on La Brea near Sunset.

Moss said the purchase was made to provide needed space for the rapidly-growing A&M organization which, within recent months, has become one of the largest independent recording companies in the world. The newly purchased facility also will house Tijuana Brass Enterprises, Inc. and A&M's corporate subdivision, Almo Music Co. and Irving Music Co.

The studio, long a Hollywood landmark, was at one time owned by Charlie Chaplin's companies and subsequently by Red Skelton's Van Bernard Productions. After its purchase by CBS its chief usage was as the production facility for Paisano

Productions' TV series "The Perry Mason Show."

Construction of a complete and comprehensive recording studio and a fully equipped photographic gallery and studio will begin shortly. All existing facilities will be utilized for the Alpert and Moss companies' varied operations. Moss stated that all A&M Records and Tijuana Brass personnel would be moved into the new studio facility by early November.

Wes Quits P'tone

In a joint statement issued by Phil Kahl, President of Picturetone Music Publishing Corp., and Wes Farrell, Vice President, it was announced that Wes Farrell would leave Picturetone (as well as its affiliated companies, Wes Farrell Music Publishing Corp., Weslu Productions, Inc. and K F K Enterprises, Inc.), effective Sept. 1, 1966.

Medlin Exits, Allen To Atlantic Post

Joe Medlin has exited his three-year national promo man post at Atlantic Records to join Decca/Coral/Brunswick as General Manager of R&B product. He is being replaced at Atlantic by Henry Allen, 14year member of the staff there. Allen will cover the entire United States for Atlantic/Atco and the labels distributed by the firm. He joined the diskery as Manager of the Stock Room, and was most recently Atlantic Eastern promo head. He will continue to handle Eastern promotion along with his other new duties.

NARM Standardization Suggestions to RIAA

CHICAGO — A major revelation at the NARM Convention Executive Board press conference last week was the list of suggestions proffered the RIAA by NARM's Products Standardization Committee to find out the best way to standardize.

A questionnaire had previously been sent out by NARM, with reportedly "tremendous response." Suggestions 1, 2 and 3 were unanimously favored; while 4, 5 and 6 were write-ins. NARM then met with Irwin H. Steinberg, Mercury Exec VP, to discuss the matter from the label viewpoint. Steinberg felt that manufacturers, as a whole, would cooperate and recommended that the NARM committee submit the suggestions to Henry Brief, Executive Secretary of RIAA.

The Committee will continue to function and send out questionnaires whenever the need arises. Members are: Jack Geldbart, Chairman; and Ben Bartel, David Press, Jay Jacobs and Cecil Steen.

There also will be moves to work out problems relating to the needle and player manufacturers.

STANDARDIZATION SUGGESTIONS:

1. That a standard method for indicating a manufacturer's suggested list price on albums be accomplished by use of an alphabetcial code placed as a prefix to the manufacturer's catalog number on the liner of the album. (Examples: A-LPM 2083; B-LSP 2083; C-LCOD 2005, etc.)

2. That a uniform space in

Lipton UA Label VP

NEW YORK-Mike Lipton has been named Vice President of United Artists Records, according to an announcement made by Michael Stewart, President of the label.

In his new position, Lipton will be Director of Marketing, and will assume charge of the Sales, National Promotion, Merchandising, Advertising and Art Departments of the record organization, and coordinate with the Artists and Repertoire staff headed by Director of Artists & Repertoire Jack Gold.

Lipton is a youthful veteran of two decades in all phases of the recording industry, having served with both manufacturers and distributors in New York, Los Angeles and Cleveland. His offices will continue to be at United Artists Records' headquarters in New York City.

Lipton will shortly embark on an extensive cross-country tour for UA in which he will meet with the company's distributors to formulate plans for closer coordination in forthcoming merchandising campaigns, and to facilitate a steady flow of new masters to UA from independent producers throughout the nation.

New NARMites

CHICAGO — NARM announced at its convention last week that there are eight new regular members of the association, which brings total to around 75. There also are six new associate members, carrying this total to over 100.

NARM Sets Up Scholarships

CHICAGO — In a perhaps precedent-setting move, NARM announced during last week's convention here that it is setting up a Scholarship Program, with a committee at present headed by Cecil Steen, Don Ayers, Amos Heilicher, Lou Klayman and Charles Schlang.

While the committee members will vary, the program's aim will remain steadfast: to develop industry leaders, through higher education as well as through the welfare of employees of the NARM members and their families.

Each year a certain number of scholarships will be co-sponsored by NARM members. The organization will award a thousand dollars each year for the four years toward a Bachelor's Degree. While the scholarship winner may select his four-year course, preference will be given to students selecting to study in music education and/or marketing.

To Qualify . . .

To qualify, an applicant must be the son or daughter of a person who has completed at least one year in the employ of a NARM member. The first scholarships should be awarded at next year's NARM Convention on March 5 at the Century Plaza Hotel in Los Angeles. Applications for the NARM Scholarship Program will be available from the office of NARM Executive Director Jules Malamud in Philadelphia. Completed forms must be returned to Malamud's office there by Oct. 31.

Scholarships are available to regular and associate members' employees. The first year four scholarships will be presented which means that NARM has

He also won two Grammy awards from the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences as "Producer of the Record of the Year." The winning records were Percy Faith's "Theme from a Summer Place" and Tony Bennett's "I Left My Heart in San Francisco."

Altschuler joined Columbia Records as a producer in 1958. Earlier, he was an engineer for CBS Radio, and before that had been associated with New York Radio Station WNYC, working with the late Mayor La Guardia on radio broadcasts involving Civil Defense. He also had been a disk jockey in San Angelo, Texas.

In his boyhood, Altschuler played violin and trumpet. While he was a student at the High School of Music and Art in New York, composer Aaron Copland created a trumpet solo especially for him in "Outdoor Overture," a composition commissioned by the school.

Altschuler is a graduate of RCA Institutes and a licensed teacher in electronics.

the upper right corner of the album be without important copy or art work so that price stickers can be affixed without obliterating or disturbing the artistic and informative intentions of the layout. It is recommended that this area be approximately 2x2. Manufacturers should understand that this is not to be considered dictation of their art work, but merely a suggestion designed to make their products more attractive.

3. That there be a standard method of packaging automobile cartridges; since space is always at a premium, it is hoped that the uniform package will be of a compact design, shrink-wrapped for protection.

4. That there be a uniform position placement of manufacturer's catalog numbers on alhums.

5. That there be a clearer and more distinct indication of "Monaural" or "Stereo" on albums.

6. That a complete list of selections be printed on the outside of double pocket albums to eliminate unnecessary unsealing of such albums.

NEEDLE, PHONO MFTRS. SUGGESTION:

1. That there be a simpler and more uniform method of numbering replacement needles for phonographs and a method of indication within the phonograph itself re the necessary cartridge numbers.



FRESH FLAVOR

JANE MORGAN—Epic BN 26211; LN 24211.

There should be more Jane Morgans. Perfect enunciation, perfect pitch, elegant styling bring out previously unknown qualities in the likes of "Monday, Monday," "These Boots Are Made For Walkin'," eight others.

A HEART FILLED WITH SONG JOHN GARY-RCA Victor LSP 3666; LPM 3666.

The repertoire herein has been personally selected by the artist, which speaks well for his taste ("What Now My Love," "Because of You," "Yesterday"). His performances speak well for his artistry, but that has already been spoken for.

THE NEW OLD SWEET SONGS

FRANK DE VOL-ABC Paramount ABC 563; ABCS 563.

There are 26 great old timers here, ranging from "He'd Have to Get Under . . ." (1913) to "Be My Love" (1950). A nice, lush bit of nostalgia for youngsters and oldtimers alike.

DANCE MEDLEY TIME

GUY LOMBARDO—Decca DL 74735/4735.

The latest offering of the institution that is Lombardo features 35 old standards, weighing heavily on the works of Rodgers, Hart, Hammerstein and Kern, welcome weights indeed. In case you think the fox trot is passe, you are invited to try it to "Bewitched," "My Funny Valentine" and others.

BABY SCRATCH MY BACK


SLIM HARPO-Excello LP 8005.

If there can be such a thing as happy r/b, this is it. Even such allegedly blues numbers as "Harpo's Blues" and "Midnight Blues" have a jaunty air about them. Album could garner a sizeable audience.

HAPPINESS IS THE SHADES OF BLUE Impact IM 101.

"Oh How Happy" and "Lonely Summer" are the mainstays of the foursome's new album, but "Happiness," the title tune, and the standard "The Whole World In His Hands" are among the others nicely done. A fine album from a promising group.

The Phase 4 stereo disk attempts to capture the heart of 50 years of vaudeville and succeeds, although the performances here are better than what one could expect to find in the old time variety shows. "Frankie and Johnny," "Light Cavalry Overture," "Hello Ma Baby" are a few of the gems.

As motley a collection of instrumentalists as you'd ever hope to find present dixieland cum revival meeting renditions of songs, some recent ("These Boots Are Made For Walking," "I Call Your Name") some old ("Charleston"). An arresting sound, to say the least.



HERSCHEL BERNARDI SINGS FIDDLER ON THE ROOF

Columbia OS 3010; OL 6610. It's not often that the new star re-

cords the show's music but this is a welcome exception, though it's not really a "cast album." Two of the songs included. "When Messiah Comes" and "Fiddler on the Roof," are not heard in the current stage production.

GARY MCFARLAND, GABOR SZABO— Impulse A 9122.

The album proves that the Lennon McCartney tunes "The Word" and "Norwegian Wood" stand up well under jazz treatment. That the same can be said for guitarist Szabo's "Spring Song" and vibes man McFarland's "Simpatico" shouldn't be a surprise.

WHAT Bans Nina's '4 Women' Band

Nine Simone's recording of "Four Women," contained in her Philips LP, "Wild is the Wind," continues to blow up protest from some radio stations, this time WHAT in Philadelphia.

Song, also written by Miss Simone, contains her impressions of four Negro women, and earlier this year it was banned for a time on WLIB-New York. WHAT more recently stopped playing it—after about three months of airing the band when a local newsletter type sheet reportedly was interpreted by station manager Dolly Banks as saying the tune was insulting to Negroes.

Miss Simone feels that as an artist she is being "denied the privilege of communicating with the public." A spokesman for Miss Simone said the lyrics have been read and accepted by a cross-section of the community and were not found objectionable.



Bill Bishop, Ampex A.&R. executive, will continue to act as liaison between Mercury's talent corps and his firm, which bases in Elk Grove Village, Ill. Steinberg admitted Mercury's





J-J, Li'l Wally To Premier Fold

NEW YORK — Premier Albums, Inc., announces the conclusion of a transaction giving it exclusive world-wide manufacturing and marketing rights of the leading polka record catalog. In a joint announcement, Philip Landwehr, president of Premier, and Walter E. Jagiello, popularly known as "Li'l Wally. disclosed that Premier is taking over all of the operations of Jay Jay and Drum Boy record companies of Chicago which have previously produced the extensive polka line.

Jagiello, who created and popularized the "Li'l Wally" albums, will continue to produce new albums for release under the Jay Jay-Premier arrangement. Currently, there are approximately 200 albums in the polka catalog which retail in the \$3.79-\$4.79 price range. Landwehr said that the "Li' Wally" and other polka albums will be marketed exclusively through leading record distributors.

Landwehr reported that a "heavy new release schedule is planned for fall, 1966." The new schedule will include, in addition to several new singles, 10 to 12 new albums.

The Premier acquisition of the Jay Jay and Drum Boy record lines covers all uses of the existing catalog. They said the arrangement has been made to provide an increased manufacturing, marketing, promotional base for the polka albums for which they feel the "market surface has just been scratched."

Landwehr emphasized that Premier is planning to expand polka activities in many directions. He said that at present "no commitments have been concluded" covering either club deals for "Li'l Wally," cartridge, tape or foreign licensing deals. Each of these areas has a "tremendous potential," he said, and "we're considering a number of alternatives in each area."

London's Fusileers

London Records, now in the midst of its biggest year of album merchandising tie-ins with key artist visitors from overseas, is launching a special drive shortly on a new "big sound" LP by the United States-bound Royal Highland Fusileers from Great Britain.

The entourage of 150 colorful performers opens a 46-city tour of the U. S. and Canada in Montreal on Sept. 20. GARDEN CITY, N.Y.—Jack Grossman, President and Chairman of the Board, announced that effective Sept. 6, 1966, Merco Enterprises, Inc. will be located at new and larger quarters at 536 Broad Hollow Road, Route 110, in Melville, Long Island.

Merco, which has been in Garden City, Long Island since September, 1962, will occupy a modern, fully air conditioned building of 61,000 square feet, three times the size of its former facility.

Hailing the move as a "further measure of our growth and progress," Grossman indicated that Merco, "will take full advantage of its new physical capacity by adding to its administrative and advisory staff with seasoned and experienced personnel. Management believes that this increase in space (with its attendant efficiencies) will enable Merco to continue to accelerate its growth pattern."

Atco's End Drive

Atco Records is setting up a giant campaign to promote the first single by the Bitter End Singers on the label, "Everybody Knows My Name," written by Bob Gaudio of the Four Seasons.

The campaign launched by Atco involves extensive advertising and promotional activity plus a contest for the distributor promotion men.

The Bitter End Singers are booked through December for an extensive series of college concerts and club dates.





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

Irish Uprising Package on CBS

The CBS Legacy Collection has been augmented with an important book-and-two-record set titled "The Irish Uprising/1916-1922," marking the 50th anniversary of the Easter-Week Uprising.

Package was produced under the direction of Goddard Lieberson, President, CBS/Columbia Group. In his introduction to the book, Lieberson writes: "... We now know that the Easter Rising served ultimately to define the national purpose and create a national will that could not have been defined or created in any other way."

The two LPs feature the most important folk tunes and ballads of the era performed by Co-lumbia Records artists the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem, as well as by Breandan O'Duill, Kay Hart, Anne Byrne and The Abbey Tavern Singers. Most of the songs were recorded in Dublin especially for this album. Also included are readings by Daniel Callahan, Tommy Makem, Donal Donnelly, Tom Clancy, Ed Golden, Liam Clancy, Deirdre O'Maera and Eamonn Kelly; interviews with Sean T. O'Kelly, former President of Ireland, Mrs. Eileen O'Hanrahan Reilly, Rory Brugha, Sean Harling, Joseph Clarke, Frank Sherwin and Sean Mooney; and speeches by the President of Ireland, Eamon de Valera.

The 192-page book contains over 100 photographs, many of which were drawn from personal archives and the collection of the National Museum of Ireland and have never before been reproduced.

These photographs accompany a text written by distinguished contributors who include Eamon de Valera, Sean T. O'Kelly, noted Irish historian Thomas P. O'Neill and Benedict Kiely, Irish critic.

They succeed Quincy Jones, who has moved to the West Coast, and Carolyn Leigh, who was forced to resign in order to devote full time to her upcoming Broadway musical.

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Atlantic Signs Mireille Mathieu

Mireille Mathieu, 19-year-old French songstress, will have her first album released in the United States on Atlantic this fall.

Miss Mathieu became the most talked about singer in France after one appearance on French TV last spring. She has been called the new "Sparrow" because of the resemblance of her sad, sweet, plaintive style to that of the late Edith Piaf. In just a few weeks she has become the top record seller in France and a smash hit throughout Europe. Her two EPs issued to date on Barclay, have sold a million copies in France. Her big hit, "Mon Credo," is on the charts all over Europe.

In the United States she has already appeared on the Ed Sullivan Show and is scheduled for the Andy Williams, Danny Kaye and Ed Sullivan TV shows in the fall.

When you have had a best selling album, received a remarkably good press, been given an award from disk jockeys across the nation for the best R & B album, what do you do for an encore?

If you're Lou Rawls, rapidly becoming one of America's most exciting young blues singers, you dip into your bag and come up with another smash album. And this he has done. The new album, "Soulin'"



(Capitol), is already giving i n d i c a tion that it will equal in s a les what "Live" accomplished. Unlike many

the blues vein and permitted themselves to be turned away from what they did best, Rawls is serving notice that the blues, one of America's oldest art forms, is still palatable during the vio-

lent '60's. His monologues are becoming a stylistic part of his offerings and they are inviting as well as interesting. There was a time when few singers dared to repeat a tune identified with Frank Sinatra. But "It Was a Very Good Year" has such universal appeal for everybody that even Lou has been able to give the tune a new interpretation.

One could think that Nancy Wilson, the pert Capitol thrush, is being over-recorded. Each time this writer is about to think so, there comes another album and Miss Wilson defies us by showing her extreme musicality and talent by coming up with another beautiful package. "Tender Loving Care" has 11 songs with that special Nancy touch. With Billy May supplying the arrangements and conducting, Nancy literally dances her way through the tunes and gives special treatment to "Gee, Baby, Ain't I Good to You" and the title tune.

They often say that an actor or singer who has experienced life is sometimes the better singer. However, I think we might suggest that wholesome thoughts and beauty have a lot to do with it, too. There is

never any anger in Nancy. She sings like one who is enjoying life.

Vocalists are not the only ones finding "It Was A Very Good Year" a delightful excursion. In Eddie Harris' new Atlantic album, "Mean Greens," he brings a sensitive arrangement of the tune. Although Eddie has recorded some beautiful tunes since his "Exodus" days, there have been many fans hoping for a repeat of the magic touch that saw "Exodus" skyrocket him to fame. In this album, lightening may strike once again. Yet, the entire album is a beautiful portrait of a talented musician at work. The title tune shows mastery of the horn and his excellent writing. And on "Blues in the Basement," Eddie plays piano.

A few months ago, the jazz world welcomed a blind 17year-old alto saxophonist from Pittsburgh, Pa.: Eric Kloss. His first album on Prestige, "Introducing Eric Kloss," displayed a dazzling technique. In his newest, "Love and All That Jazz," he is working with two groups. Side A has him with Donald Patterson, organ; Vinnie Corrao, guitar; and Billy James, drums. Side B. has Richard "Groove" Holmes, organ; Gene Edwards, guitar; and Grady Tate on drums.

On his uptempo tunes ("Love For Sale," "Gemini"), he exhibits a youthful urgency that borders on power. His speed does not cloud his technique for he is clean and inventive.

While listening to his album, you try not to think of his blindness or his youth. If either is a handicap, Eric has transferred them into advantages.

And if youth is not aware of beauty or warmth, Eric somewhere has learned the art somewhere. His "I'm Glad There is You" is nothing short of a masterpiece.

Chett Carmichael of Philadelphia's Jazz at Home Club, is presenting Nina Simone the Jazz Culture Award on Sunday, Oct. 16, at the Hotel Sheraton. Miss Simone will join such select company as Duke Ellington, Father John Gensel, Jimmy Smith and Clark Terry who were earlier recipients. The award is given annually.





charge, the public might become confused, whereas the rack jobbers are "music men" and know about programming and such.

Heilicher said that the manufacturer feels there must be multiple distribution and that the rack jobber must be considered a distributor and sold "direct."

Among the predictions were a tape rental library, plus, by the time the industry is as big as everybody expected, a discounting of equipment.

Statistically, it was noted that there are 900,000 automobiles in the United States with tape machines, with a possible \$250,000,000 retail business in tape being done within a few years. Finley said he felt there will be a million and a half to a million and three quarters more cartridge sets in cars by the end of 1967.

It was further divulged that Muntz is coming into Chicago within the next 60 days with a 4-track machine that will sell for \$25-29, and will then bring it further East under the same low price, which could give 4track (popular mainly on the West Coast) inroads in the East.

Meanwhile, Lear Jet is coming out next year with a machine that will be able to play 8track, mono or stereo, plus provide visual selection of programming.

Blue Note is offering six new releases for fall sales, including dates by Andrew Hill ("Smoke Stack"), Lee Morgan ("Search For The New Land"), Dexter Gordon ("Gettin Around"), Hank Mobley ("Dippin'"), Larry Young ("Unity") and Big John Patton ("Got A Good Thing Goin'"). A thorough merchandising campaign will spotlight the newcomers as well as catalog product. There will be special displays for the new dates, a new illustrated catalog, plastic LP browser for major artists, national trade ads, stepped-up consumer ads and co-op funds and ad components for simple makeup of ads.

Block notes that the label will benefit from its recent acquisition by Liberty Records with greater penetration of the jazz market, and the addition of new and well-established jazz names to the label. The label's new theme reads: "The Jazz Sound for Everyone."




