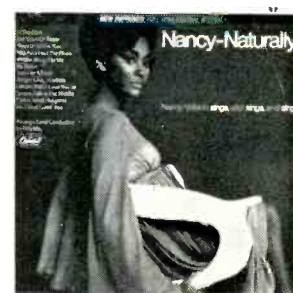
ALBUMS OF THE WEEK

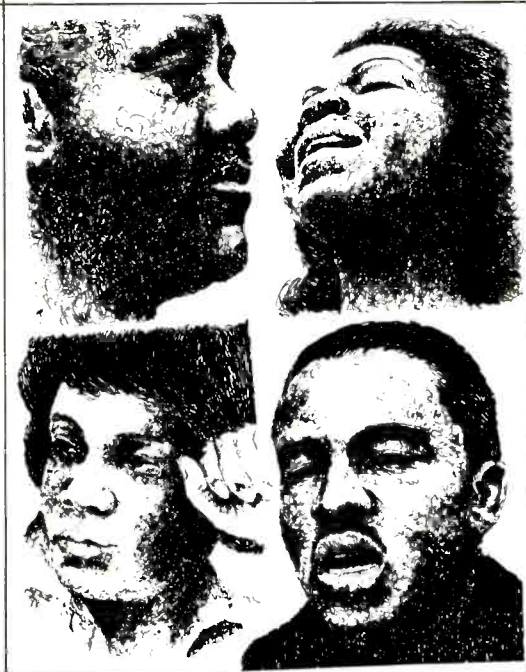

Bob Morgan Exec Producer, A&R, at MGM Records

NEW YORK—MGM Records' President, Mort L. Nasatir, announced that Bob Morgan has been appointed Exec Producer, A&R Operations, for the label. Morgan, who recently left Columbia Records as Director of A&R with that label's Epic and Okeh subsidiaries, joins the MGM executive staff immediately.

As Director of A&R Operations, Morgan will be responsible for all album and singles product produced by MGM and independent producers. He will supervise concept and planning for all MGM/Verve artists and be active in the acquisitions of new talent and masters. In addition, he will also produce specific albums and artists for the label.

Morgan comes to MGM from eight years of service with the Columbia organization. For the past three years he has been responsible for all popular product and A&R producers with Epic. In his four years

with the Epic and Okeh wing, Morgan played a vital role in building it into a significant contributor to the overall Columbia Records group profit.

Discovered, Recorded Many

In his tenure with Columbia and Epic, Morgan was responsible for discovering many name acts which he recorded. They include the Dave Clark Five, the Yardbirds, the Brothers Four, the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem, Damita Jo and Enzo Stuarti.

He produced all of the Bobby Vinton Epic hits, including "Roses are Red" and "Mr. Lonely," and was responsible for the Brothers Four hit of "Greenfields." He also made singles and albums by George Maharis, Jerry Vale, Bobby Hackett, Jimmy Dean, Cliff Richard, Godfrey Cambridge and Buddy Greco, among others.

Epic Meets Jan. 8, Fla.

Epic Records will hold a National Sales Meeting from Jan. 8 to 12 in Miami Beach, Fla., according to an announcement by Mort Hoffman, the label's Director of Marketing. All distrib principals and/or distributor sales managers and promotion managers will attend.

Mayhew JFK Book, Oswald Album Out

Alleged Assassin's Interview On Wax

NEW YORK—The hectic pace of the holiday season is not likely to abate for John F. Kennedy buff Aubrey Mayhew, also manager of Little Darlin' Records' country songster Johnny Paycheck.

Mayhew's impressive book, "The World's Tribute to John F. Kennedy in Medallie Art" (William Morrow & Co., New York, \$12.95), is just out; and "Lee Harvey Oswald Speaks!," the LP he produced for the new Truth Records (distributed by Audio Fidelity Records), is being released Tuesday, Dec. 27.

The album, Mayhew told Record World last week, is expected to garner both heavy sales and controversy. With the Kennedy clan finding itself new headlines of late, the package's appearance is most timely, as is the book's.

The material was discovered by Mayhew and consists of a 40-minute taped interview with Oswald on a New Orleans radio station. The interview was conducted by local disk jockey William K. Stuckey and broadcast on Aug. 17, 1963, three months before President Kennedy's assassination. Stuckey had been doing a series on Latin American affairs, and Oswald reportedly discoursed on the Cuban crisis of the day.

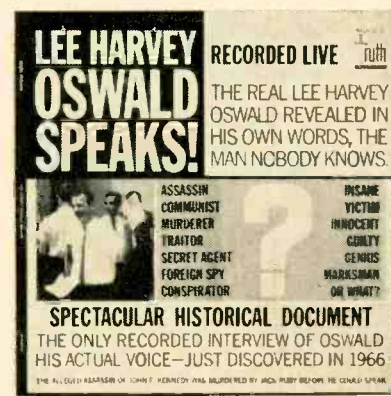
Oswald Speaks

According to the Truth Records (formed by Mayhew and Audio Fidelity just for this release) album cover, the package is "The only recorded interview of Oswald — his ac-

tual voice — just discovered in 1966."

Mayhew went on: "The interview shows Oswald to be an astute and calculating individual—not the idiot many made him sound after the President's assassination."

To hawk as well as herald the album's coming (and, no doubt, also to mention the arrival of his Kennedy book), Mayhew is taking on plenty of interviews. On Dec. 27, he is scheduled to do the "Today" TVer in the morning, newspaper, wire service and magazine interviews in the afternoon and to visit with CBS news in the evening.

And that's only the first day.

Walt Disney Music Co. Releasing Commemorative LP from Disney Pix

Proceeds To Cal Institute

The Walt Disney Music Co. has announced that early in January it will release a commemorative album of music from the late producer's films of the past three decades called "The Music of Walt Disney."

The decision to issue the package, a non-commercial entry with all profits to the Cali-

fornia Institute of the Arts, was made after much soul-searching, it was learned last week; and plans were only consummated after word came that several other labels were going to come out with budget album commemorations.

'Snow White' to 'Mary Poppins' The official Disney package will offer music from features from "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" to "Mary Poppins," in great part from

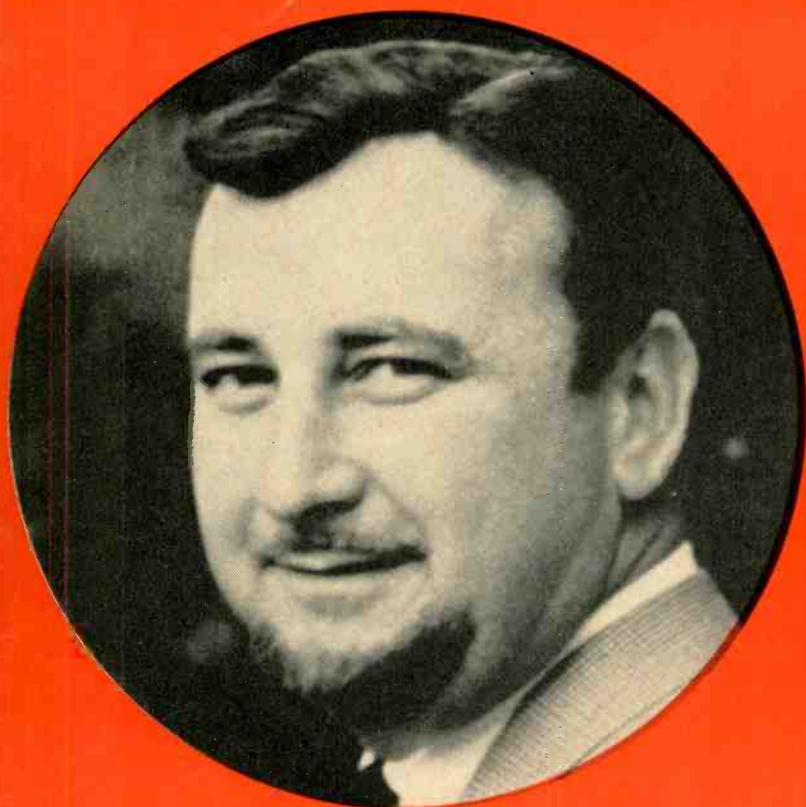

Racusin Takes Over at RCA As Label's 'Biggest Year' Closes

NEW YORK—The succession of Norman Racusin to the post of Division Vice-President and General Manager, RCA Victor Records effective Jan. 1, following George R. Marek, is taking place at the end of the diskery's "biggest year," according to Racusin, and during one of the company's most active periods (for instance, the Colgems-RCA distributed Monkees have been topping both the singles and album charts recently.)

For that reason, when *Record World* talked with the new executive last week, it was not surprising to learn that Racusin planned no major policy changes at present. Why should he?

But . . .

After More, Better Ways

Racusin did have this to say to indicate the challenge he was setting himself in his new post: "The record business hasn't begun to scratch the surface where sales are concerned. There are between 25 and 40 million players out there. Why should we get excited when a record sells a million? With something like 'The Sound of Music' soundtrack, you're getting somewhere. Why can't we do that more often? There must be more and better ways to get to the people."

In discussing more specifically current and pending company activity, Racusin said that the company has a couple of new acts to uncork shortly who could be receiving the RCA push—that high-powered of all measures that recently accompanied the Monkees' entrance into the record world.

He noted that, as trade stories have had it, the company is looking into the publishing field, although with no definite plans so far.

'Sherry' Next Caster

The next Broadway caster from RCA is "Sherry," the adaptation of "The Man Who Came to Dinner," starring George Sanders. Racusin seemed anxious to place that score alongside company's first caster release of the year "I Do! I Do!," with Mary Martin and Robert Preston, just out and promising to be a big seller.

Racusin reiterated that RCA would continue and even step up its teen market projects, which have grown significantly in the last year.

Sales Pass Ethnic Barriers

One area Racusin cited as only just starting to show its

potential is the international product on the domestic scene. He said that whereas international releases always sell reassuringly as expected in ethnic markets, he has noticed recently that sales seem to be extending beyond ethnic barriers.

To close, *Record World* asked Racusin what he thought was wrong with the record business. And Racusin answered paradoxically, "What's wrong with the record business is what's right with it. It's uncertain. It has bulges and valleys. It's a new business every day of the week. You cut a record on Tuesday, release it Thursday and all of a sudden the business has changed. You could have a big hit or a lot of compound to eat. But that's the excitement."

Caedmon's Carl

Carl Sandburg reading from his autobiography, "Always The Young Strangers," has just been released by Caedmon Records as an album.

Stones' Pic Closer: Klein

The Rolling Stones' motion picture, "Only Lovers Left Alive," is expected to go before the cameras within the "next very few months," according to Allen Klein, business manager of the group. Vigorously denying the recently reported "mystery" about the Stones' movie plans, Klein declared, "We have had some problems with the screenplay, but these are the only problems we've ever had and they are now being sorted out."

"We have signed contracts and have already been advanced 90,000 pounds," Klein continued. "Does that sound as though there was any doubt about the picture?" Last week, Klein received 80 pages of script material from writers Keith Waterhouse and Willis Hall, who are currently at work on the screen adaptation of the Dave Wallace novel on which the picture will be based.

"We hope to have the second completed draft of the screenplay by Christmas," Klein said. "The pages are coming to us by airmail as they are completed. As soon as we have a finished script, we'll set out the production schedule. We firmly expect filming to start within the next few months."

Heliodor Changes

NEW YORK—MGM Heliodor producer Richard de Costa has announced his resignation from the classical label. De Costa, who has been supervisor of the budget line since its inception, is leaving to become manager of the American Wind Symphony Orchestra in Pittsburgh immediately after the first of the year.

Jerry Schoenbaum, MGM's classical division chief, has named Philip Fradkin as successor to the post. Fradkin previously had been Assistant Musical Director with Westminster Records.

The pact is another step in MGM's continuing expansion and development into all fields of album and singles product, with special emphasis on West Coast creativity.

MGM will release Werber's production efforts for one year, and will market such product under Verve, as well as other subsidiary labels.

Working Adjunct

More than just a standard independent production deal, the merger will, in effect, establish Trident as a working adjunct to MGM's West Coast A & R Department. Thus, MGM becomes one of the first major labels to recognize vast contributions to today's pop music market emanating from San Francisco. Some of the artists already signed include Blackburn and Snow, the Mystery Trend, the Sons of Champlin, Malachi, the Ensemble and the Don Scaleta Trio.

In commenting on the pact with Trident Productions, Nasatir said, "The vast background and knowledge contributed by Frank Werber and his associates at Trident, will broaden Verve product representation in the overall market. His productions will further deepen the inroads made into the pop market by such great Verve artists as the Righteous Brothers, Arthur Prysock, Jimmy Smith, Willie Bobo, Wes Montgomery, Astrud Gilberto, Stan Getz and the Mothers of Invention."

Frisco Music Center

"San Francisco is a music center for creative people who want to live and work in the greatest city in the world," said Werber. "It is my aim to take the music that is coming out of the West Coast, specifically San Francisco, and choose from it the artists who have the most to say."

Werber, who discovered the Kingston Trio and promoted them from an off-campus trio into one of the most successful singing groups in the world, stated that a survey in depth of the Bay Area disclosed that San Francisco, which has always been a center for creative people, is fast becoming established as the capital of the

new wave of music being recorded today.

"The Trident set-up," said Werber, "with its organization, high quality recording studio facilities, talent management and development division, publishing companies, promotion and art departments all located under one roof in historic Columbus Tower, made this an ideal merger of interests for us."

Not Solely Group Sound

Werber, emphasizing the fact that the new setup would not be interested in any "quick-lived fad," declared that his involvement will not be solely concerned with the singles market group sound.

"We intend to delve into all aspects of music available in this area," Werber said, "and this includes new forms of jazz, psychedelic sounds and the new emergence of holy music."

Epic Gets Fame Releases for US

CBS Records, Ltd., in England has announced the signing of top British rhythm singer Georgie Fame to an exclusive long-term contract. This week, Leonard S. Levy, VP of Epic Records, announced that arrangements have been completed for Fame's recordings to be released in the United States on the Epic label.

Fame was born Clive Powell in 1943 in the coal-mining, cotton-mill world of Leigh, Lancashire. His father was a cotton spinner who played piano and accordion at the local church hall. At thirteen, Georgie was caught up in the rock-and-skiffle boom that was infecting Britain, and he played piano with a local group. It was no surprise to his family when he announced soon after that he was leaving home to join a rock 'n' roll group.

Fame left for London, and there his career consisted of playing in ballrooms with various back-up groups. It wasn't long afterwards that he was chosen to join a group called the Blue Flames, which played at the Flamingo Club in Lon-

don's Soho district. Soon, the group's leader left, and Georgie found himself leading his own group. The acquisition of a Hammond organ really began to change Fame's music.

A live recording session at the club produced an LP and Georgie's first single, "Do the Dog." Several records followed, and in December, 1964, the pop-buying public discovered Fame and snapped up a quarter of a million copies of "Yeh, Yeh."

Gimbel, President of Audio Fidelity Records, Inc., reported to his Board of Directors at the year-end meeting that Audio Fidelity Records Inc., showed a tremendous increase in sales of its labels, Audio Fidelity, Karate, Little Darlin', Audio Rarities and Kinor.

Since Gimbel assumed control of Audio Fidelity Records, Inc., the company has been undergoing a vigorous expansion program, the result of which can be seen in the sales and earnings growth of the company. Under Gimbel's direction, Audio Fidelity entered the pop market with its Karate label which, within a short period of time, enjoyed its first hit sin-

"Juanita Banana" album.

Since its inception in the middle of 1966, the Little Darlin' label singles and LP releases have appeared on the country and western charts consistently.

The Audio Fidelity label itself added about 60 new LPs during the past year. It released 15 new LPs in its classical line, including a luxurious seven-record boxed set of the nine Beethoven Symphonies, and a two-record set of Beethoven's 8th and 9th Symphonies.

Gimbel also introduced new packaging concepts for many of Audio Fidelity's new albums which were enthusiastically received by Audio Fidelity's distributors.

Carl Shaw, Vice President of the company, just returned from the West Coast after negotiating for a new jazz line, details of which will be announced at a later date.

Gimbel's plans for 1967 are to continue the company's ex-

1. The actual voices and statements of eye-witnesses to the assassination who support the "second assassin" theory;
2. Critics and advocates of the Warren Report heard face-to-face for the first time;
3. Many present at the shooting of Lee Harvey Oswald are heard publicly for the first time;
4. Personal descriptions of the assassination and its aftermath by members of the late President's Dallas motorcade.

'Beyond Expectations'

Livingston stated: "A number of months ago, we at Capitol determined to ap-

ply the techniques of audio journalism to the most controversial news event of our day, the assassination of President Kennedy. Journalist Lawrence Schiller was assigned as producer. He traveled over 11,000 miles to tape interviews with many different participants in the tragic events of November, 1963. The results of Mr. Schiller's work have gone far beyond our original expectations. In my opinion, the album constitutes perhaps the most startling and dramatic audio documentary ever produced."

"The Controversy" will be released nationally on Jan. 6. The album is the third in Capitol's "Probe" series. Previously released were "LSD," a study of the current psychedelic drug controversy; and "Why Did Lenny Bruce Die?," an inquiry into the troubled life and tragic death of the late comedian.

Mandala Raises Hullabaloo

Originating in Toronto, Canada, "The Soul Crusade of the Mandala" made its American debut at the Hullabaloo Club in Hollywood, and for three week-ends more than 1,500 teenagers jammed the night spot.



The Mandala

Los Angeles, the city that perhaps houses more music groups than any other, received this one with disbelief. Young George Olliver, lead singer, and his Mandala caused authorities to protest their appearance and they threatened to close the Hullabaloo if the group did not conform to city laws. No one under 18 is permitted on the dance floor of a Los Angeles club, nor is a performer in costume permitted to leave the stage. Center-staged Olliver asked his audience of 1500 to leave their seats and join him in his "circle of soul." The throng charged the stage, and at one point Olliver, frequently called the High Priest of Soul, was pulled off the stage.

The Mandala's basic material is rhythm and blues. Their highlight is a number titled "The Five Steps to Soul" which features a series of monologues by Olliver which demand audience responses.

The group travels with \$1400 in lighting equipment and their own PA system valued at somewhere more than \$22,000. Their appearance and staging are striking. Their clothes are well-suited to their act, and their use of lights provides an added musical dimension. Don Troiano's guitar sound also is effective.

The Mandala is currently playing a tour of one-nighters in Canada, and manager Randy Martin plans to bring the group back to the United States in January at which time their first single, produced by Kopleman & Ruben Associates, "Opportunity," will be released.

concerted drive in the rhythm and blues and country music fields. The emergence of the Royalettes, Howard Tate and Spyder Turner, to name just a few, in the R&B field and the addition of key personnel in that field have made a marked difference in sales.

MGM also has opened its own C&W office in Nashville headed by Jim Vienneau. This closeness to the market has resulted in the acquisition of the Stonemans, Tompall and the Glaser Brothers and Sandy Posey to an already strong artists' roster led by Hank Williams, Jr. and Sheb Wooley. In addition, Jack Clement will be working closely with Vienneau as an independent producer.

MGM has also opened its own records division offices in Los Angeles under the guidance of Clive Fox. This operation will account for stepped up control of West Coast sales and distribution. Jesse Kaye continues to head up the West Coast talent and A&R operations with a special emphasis on soundtracks.

Distribution

Nasatir also mentioned the continued sales expansion of various exclusive distribution deals as an important part of the MGM sales boom. Deutsche Grammophon classical product for example, which the label distributes in the United States, was up 20 percent over 1965 at a time when the classical business is slow generally.

The MGM Records' distributed independent Kama-Sutra label with the hit Lovin' Spoonful, was well over '65 sales figures, and the label is showing more impact with chart product from the Innocence, the Trade Winds and the Sopwith "Camel."

Soundtrack Leader

In the all-important soundtrack area, Nasatir underlined MGM's outstanding job as industry-leader with three top-selling LPs "Doctor Zhivago," "Born Free" and "The Singing Nun." The recording of the Academy Award-winning Maurice Jarre score for the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer film "Zhivago" ranks among the all-time best selling soundtracks. To date the album is well over the one million mark, label asserts.

Other artists on the MGM label have also scored heavily with album product: Connie Francis, Herman's Hermits, Eric Burdon and the Animals, Sam the Sham and the Pha-

raohs, Roy Orbison and Lou Christie.

Verve Expansion

Nasatir also singled out the diversification of the Verve label as an imposing ingredient in the record-breaking sales results. The addition of the Rigotheus Brothers, the initial entry from the Mothers of Invention and from Arthur Prysock have augmented strong sales from Jimmy Smith, Stan Getz, Willie Bobo, Wes Montgomery, Cal Tjader and Astrud Gilberto. Walter Wanderly's first album has also given a significant sales boost to Verve.

Talking about future becoming present, Nasatir referred to the Verve/Folkways scene which continues to build nicely under label manager Jerry Schoenbaum's direction. He revealed that orders for the second Blues Project album, "Projections," have already topped sales of their first LP. Two more artists have entered as substantial sellers: Janis Ian and Laura Nyro.

The King Leo label also was formed in 1966 as a regular price deluxe, double-fold line to tie in with TV spectaculars and out-of-the-ordinary childrens' product. The first numbers in this line, "How the Grinch Stole Christmas" and "You're a Good Man Charlie Brown," have been most successful.

Budget Growth

In February, MGM Records added new labels to its budget representation that made a most significant contribution to the total sales picture. In addition to better-than-ever sales from its pop Metro banner, VSP was created to appeal to the budget-minded jazz buyer, Heliodor was tailored specifically for the classical buyer and Leo the Lion Records was brought up to date and scored mightily with its "live action" and education-slanted play albums. "Batman," "Superman" and many other new titles sold well.

The MGM family of labels racked up consistent chart and sales action with its major artists. The label had its biggest sales week for singles in December when more than 655,000 45s were sold.

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RECORD WORLD**

Date Ends '66 In High Gear

The conclusion of 1966 finds Date Records in high gear, both in sales and airplay, announces Ed Matthews, the label's Manager. Matthews, who recently assumed the responsibility for the management operation of Date forsee an even greater and more successful year in 1967.

Currently, Date is riding high with a single entitled "Let's Fall In Love," by the sweethearts of soul Peaches and Herb. Listed high on the nation's R&B charts, the record is now going pop. A debut LP by Peaches and Herb is slated for release in the near future. Another group, the Arbors, have made a strong name for them-

selves with their single "Symphony for Susan," a follow-up LP, also titled "A Symphony For Susan," and most recently a single, "Just Let It Happen," which was taken from the album. "Just Let It Happen" is presently climbing to the top of the best-selling charts.

Matthews also indicated that Date had just acquired two more exciting master singles, which will be released later this month.

Since its organization late in 1965, Date Records has been well represented on the charts. Matthews expressed his enthusiasm over the success Date has attained in this time, and indicated that exciting plans to further strengthen the label would be announced in a few weeks.

Stage Review

'I Do! I Do!' Does It!

NEW YORK — Criticizing "I Do! I Do!" for its weaknesses, which really only become apparent after the final curtain falls, is looking a gift horse in the mouth.

For "I Do! I Do!" a musical adaptation of Jan de Hartog's "The Fourposter," is gifted with Mary Martin and Robert Preston as its entire cast and Gower Champion as its director.

This threesome is endlessly resourceful in bringing off the show, which quite literally revolves (and vice versa) around a bed and the married life of a couple who sleep in it during a 50-year plus marriage.

As Martin and Preston sing, dance, play instruments, change costumes, apply make-up, ride bicycles, observe the wedding night (rather too coyly), push the bed around the stage, hang diapers, clean up toys, their triumph is that this first two-character musical seems so easy, so relaxed and just sheer fun. And indeed, for the audience it is—highly-skilled and polished Broadway entertainment.

Tom Jones and Harvey Schmidt supplied the basic material for the musical and certainly they have done no less a professional job than Martin, Preston and Champion, because you can't make a silk purse out of a sow's ear. But there are different grades of silk and Jones and Schmidt only got C+ for effort. Their work is sturdy, but not inspired, and it would have been nice to leave the theater remembering Mary Martin and/or Robert Preston singing that really great love song, — — — — —, or that really great comedy number, — — — — —. NEW YORK — Liner notes and their importance have long been a moot topic in the trade and so a recent liner note story, turned up here last week, should be of interest.

Judith Crist, movie critic of the World Journal Tribune, and formerly of the Herald Tribune told Record World last week that she had received letters "from the four corners of the world" for the notes she wrote for RCA Victor's best-selling "The Sound of Music" soundtrack.

Mrs. Crist noted that her liner credit was "Judith Crist, The New York Herald Tribune," and therefore she was the only name on the album followed by some sort of address buyers could grab onto when they wanted to write to someone—just anyone—about how much they loved the album.

Evidently many letters arrived at Mrs. Crist's office addressed to Rodgers and Hammerstein, etc., and they were duly forwarded. But Mrs. Crist said she had received just as many "rhapsodizing" about the album and movie.

(An amusing footnote is that Mrs. Crist did not like the movie, an opinion she made quite clear in her review. Her liner notes, written long before she saw the movie, concerned the Rodgers and Hammerstein team—a slant suggested by RCA's George R. Marek who commissioned the piece.)

Mrs. Crist said the most interesting letter she had received was from a Welsh boy, who reported that the album enabled him to walk and play football again.

Mrs. Crist's latest disk stint was providing the liner notes for the new Upstairs at the Downstairs package of satirical songs and sketches.

Taking Care of Business

The mailbag this holiday season has been filled with soulful greetings from members of the jazz academy across the nation. And to all, our thanks for the kind remembrances.

Among the letters received this week is one from **Judson Snyder**, Program Director of KJAZ, in San Francisco:



Del Shields

"Just a note to let you know that all of us here are avid readers of your column. In regards to cooperation from the distributors, we, too, have our troubles from a minority of them. Although we've put across the message to most of them that the surest way to boost record sales is to place the music in front of the potential customer's ears, a few still think that the newspaper columnists should get them first. This despite the fact that newspaper coverage of jazz albums in the Bay Area is sporadic at best.

"But the smart record companies have gotten the message. Verve buys three hours a week, Blue Note two hours, Prestige two hours and Riverside one hour. During these hours, naturally, only that particular label is aired with the emphasis on the new releases.

"Guess which record albums are best sellers in this area?"

"Verve has been with us for over three years, Prestige for one year, Blue Note and Riverside are recent additions to our hour and half-hour program schedules.

"The enclosed brochure tells more about us, we signed on the air Aug. 1, 1959, and have been straight ahead 99% modern jazz ever since. The one percent? We dig back into the archives for the oldies once in a while to get down to the roots."

A Very Good Year

Speaking of the year of 1966 . . . it has been a very good year. There were so many interesting developments on the jazz scene that neither space nor time will allow us the luxury of full indulgence.

But among the highlights was the selling of Blue Note Records—one of the oldest jazz labels as well as one of the greatest incubators of jazz talent—to Liberty Records. Most of us waited in suspense hoping that the fine record of Blue Note would be enhanced. Fortunately, the headmasters at Liberty were aware of the keen interest that **Al Lion** and **Frank Wolff** had maintained through the years in creating the label and continued their participation. As a result Blue Note continued to produce and release some swinging LPs. There was the addition of **Bernie Block** as the Liberty head of the label, whose talent for merchandising and promotion was reflected in stepping up the distribution and servicing of the product.

Lee Morgan, **Stanly Turrentine**, **Wayne Shorter**, **Jimmy Smith** and **Bobby Hutcherson** all came out with top albums and many found their way on the best-selling charts across the nation.

Greatest Tragedy

Possibly the greatest tragedy of all was the demise of the **Limelight** label. **Mercury's** jazz wing brought in a concept of packaging that was unanimously hailed as the greatest innovation to ever take place in jazz. Unfortunately, there was a lot missing in the grooves. There were, however, some sterling albums that should have done much better. And the fact that the company added some powerhouse names in terms of top selling artists **Les McCann**, **Oscar Peterson**, **Three Sounds** and **Dizzy Gillespie** did little to offset the need for better promotion and more extensive distribution.

Oscar Peterson's long-time trio disbanded with **Ray Brown** retiring from the hazards of road travel and **Ed Thigpen** electing to turn his attention to teaching and publishing a book on drumming.

The surprise news that followed was his adding **Louis Hayes** and **Sam Jones**, long-time **Cannonball Adderley** sidemen, to the group. These two swingers proved to be worthy replacements.

While on the subject of trios, **Ramsey Lewis** and company parted. This abrupt change

came during the height of Ramsey's popularity with the group booked solidly. This forced Ramsey to return to Chicago and he signed **Cleveland Eaton** and **Maurice White**. And the sound of Ramsey continued. In the meantime, **Eldee** and **Red** formed their own group with **Don Walker** and came up with a year end smash in "Wack, Wack."

Jimmy Smith, the world's number one jazz organist, turned vocalist and came up with "Got My Mojo Working" and "I'm Your Hootchie Cootchie Man." As if this weren't enough, he next turned his hand to "Peter and the Wolf" and with **Oliver Nelson** and a big band. Another best-seller was produced.

1966 was also the year that saw the organ move from the fringe area, as **John Wilson** of the **New York Times** put it, to the center of stage. **Richard "Groove" Holmes**, who had recorded a number of fine albums with **Pacific Jazz**, came East and recorded "Misty" on **Prestige**. Overnight (as we often say in show biz), he became a hot top "40" artist.

New Prestige Era Dawned

Prestige, which had gone somewhat in limbo, added the **Fields' boys**, **Joe** and **Jerry** and with **Cal Lamplay** in charge of A & R, a new era of activity emerged and **Prestige** was once again taking care of business.

Atlantic Records came out with the strongest set of jazz releases they had ever released. With **Charlie Lloyd**, **Eddie Harris**, **Herbie Manne**, **Shelly Manne**, **Max Roach**, their year-end contribution was most welcome.

And there were attempts by jazz musicians to cash in on the new jazz rock trend. Happily, we can report that only where there was musical validity was there any success.

All in all, it was a very good year. And jazz emerged from the sleeping bee to that of an art that can successfully weather all of the storms. With the addition of FM radio as the newest frontier for jazz on a seven-day week basis across the country, the once neglected child of music emerged as a full-fledged member of the exciting world of music.

Fontana Gets Disk

Ahmet Ertegun, President of **Atlantic-Atco Records**, negotiated the agreement with **Bob Bateman**, owner of **Hib Records** of Detroit. Disk will be distributed by **Atco** under the **Hib** logo.

Spellbinders Tour

With the release of their first record, "Danny Boy," and "Help Me" being released by **CBS Records** in England, the **Spellbinders** left last week to appear on television and a two weeks tour of England. The group is arriving in London on Dec. 30 with their manager, **Bill Downs**, and director, **Syd Shaw**.

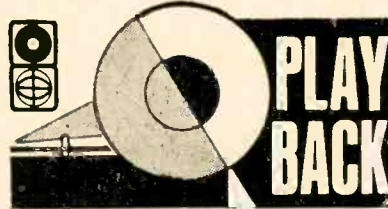

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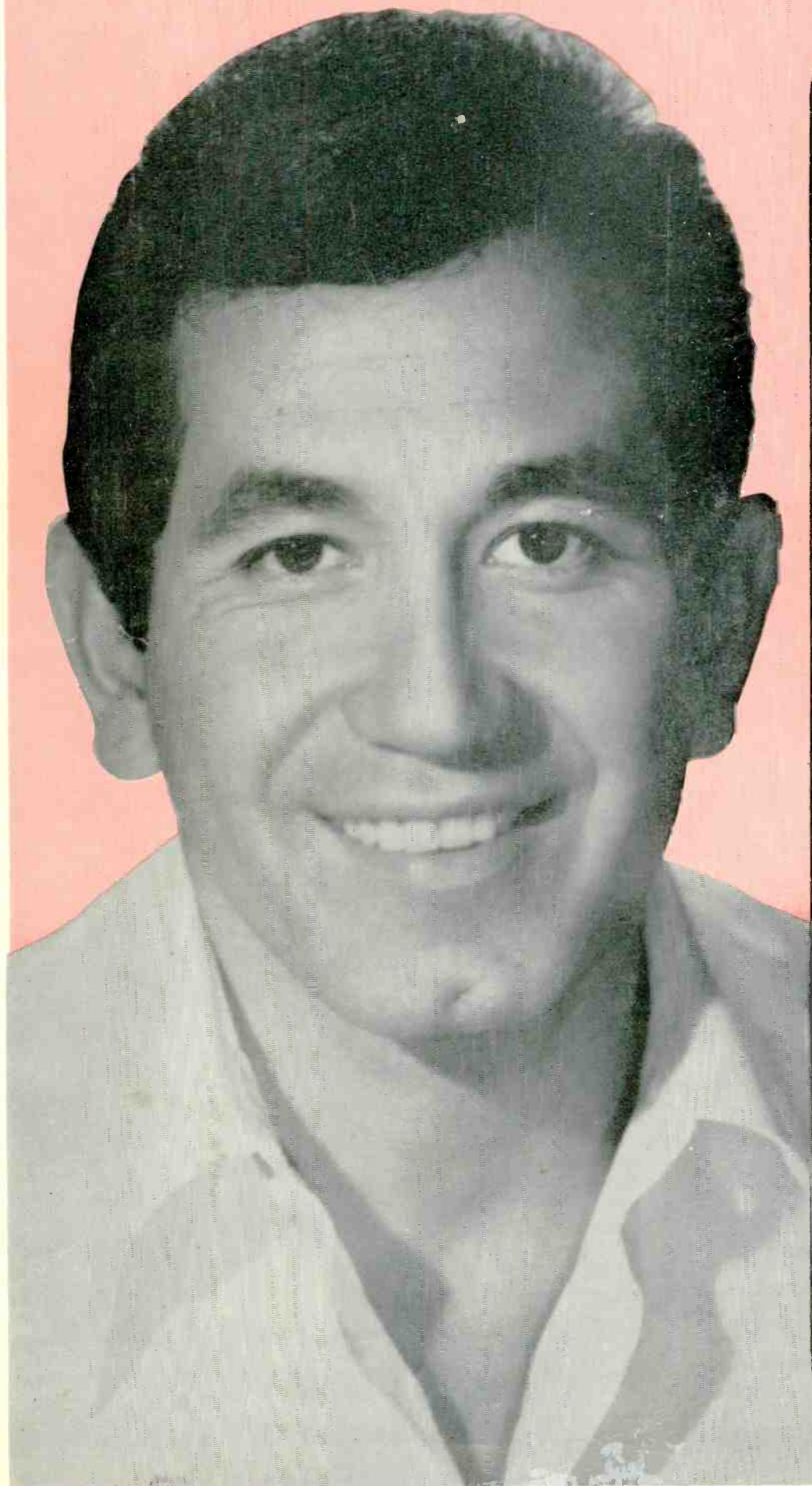
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
