



NEW YORK — Jerry Wexler, Atlantic Records Vice President, was given a surprise testimonial luncheon at the St. Regis Hotel Jan. 10 on the occasion of his winning the title Record Man of the Year, as voted by the nation's disk jockeys in the Bill Gavin Poll.

It was also Wexler's 50th birthday.

The turnout—stag, except for Mrs. (Shirley) Wexler, who sat with her "genuinely surprised" husband on the dais—was exceptionally large, around 200, with tradesters coming in from all over the United States to honor Wexler. To this end, he was treated to some bright, generally brisk and witty "toastings" that occasionally approached Friars-type "roastings" in tenor.

Received Silver Tray

Wexler was given a silver tray to commemorate the occasion on which will be inscribed the names of all those attending the luncheon.

On the program were "Opening Remarks," by BMI's Russ Sanjek, who emceed in expert, erudite fashion; plus talks of

varying length by trade representatives Bob Austin (Record World), Paul Ackerman (Billboard) and Marty Ostrow (Cashbox).

Label toppers Nesuhi and Ahmet Ertegun both toasted the guest of honor; and Nesuhi ended his humorous approach by stating, "At Atlantic, Jerry Wexler is Record Man of Every Year."

Mercury Joins with Magoos To Sponsor Big Air Tour

CHICAGO—Mercury Record Corp. will initiate a new phase of a major national promotional program for their chart-climbing "Psychedelic Lollipop" rock group, the Blues Magoos, on Jan. 20 by chartering a special executive airliner for a two to three week tour of 20 major markets not yet visited by the group.

Jointly sponsored by Mercury Records and the Blues Magoos' management, Longhair Productions, the unique private airliner tour continues an extended schedule of promotional personal appearances that already has included New York, Philadelphia, Detroit, Cleveland, Hartford, Chicago, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Phoenix, Tuscon, Dallas, New Orleans and Atlanta.

The Blues Magoos — widely known as an "underground group" — after initial appearances in Greenwich Village about a year ago became established as the best selling record act, both on their Mercury single, "We Ain't Got Nothing Yet," and on their current LP, "Psychedelic Lollipop," after live exposure in selected major markets.



WB Into Tape Market

BURBANK, CALIF. — J. K. Maitland, president of Warner Bros. Records, Inc., announces the entry of the company into the 8-track cartridge market and, similarly, disclosed the long awaited distribution of 4-track and 8-track cartridges by the company's own independent force of distributors throughout the nation.

Effective immediately, Warners' roster of 29 independent distributors in the United States will be handling both 4-track and 8-track cartridges. 4-track cartridges will be duplicated by Muntz Stereo Pak, while the 8-track line will similarly be duplicated by Ampex Corp.

Warner Bros. distributors will have 4-track product available to them effective immediately, while 8-track cartridges are expected to be available approximately Feb. 1. In both cases, the 4- and 8-track cartridges will be packaged in separate Warner Bros. and Reprise boxes, and will be polywrapped.

Phil Rose, Warner International Director, who is similarly directing the company's activities in the cartridge market, acknowledged that both Muntz and Ampex, in certain cases, will continue to sell to those retail accounts with whom they may have previously done business. In all cases, however, Warners' own distributors will be competive with these retail accounts.

Advertising, promotion and marketing programs will be developed in concert with both Ampex and Muntz, and will be directed towards Warner Bros. distributors and dealers.

with the slogan "Solid Gold" and including cover reproductions of key gold record albums, will reach a combined circulation of more than 15 million in the 23 markets.

In addition, ad mats will be available to dealers, through the label's regional sales branches, in sizes of 300, 600, 1,000 and 2,400 lines. The 300line mats, headed "Solid Gold Country," will highlight Columbia's Gold Record-winning Country-and-Western albums. "Solid Gold Broadway and Hollywood" will be the theme for the 600-line mats advertising Original Broadway Cast Albums and Original Sound Track Recordings. The remaining mats of 1,000- and 2,400line sizes will feature Columbia's entire Solid Gold Catalog. Some mats will carry coupons through which the consumer may order albums from local dealers placing the ads.

The advertising campaign will be backed up with a "hardhitting and versatile" set of in-store merchandising aids.

To supplement the programs, each marketing area will receive sets of gold record libraries, containing all of the label's gold record albums, which may be offered as prizes in local contests.

'Bell' Breaks Big

Mercury Records' Product Manager Alan Mink said recently, "The full impact of the Blues Magoos is realized only when the visual quality of the group is demonstrated. It was for that reason that Mercury and the group management undertook the widespread tour exposure."

"We think," he continued, "that the Blues Magoos represent an entirely new concept in pop music. So, they must be seen as well as heard in as many areas as possible."

Subsequently Mink's view was the performance of the Blues Magoos in the New Orleans' market. The new group was virtually unknown there prior to their recent visit; only a few hundred copies of their single record had been sold in that area. After exposure in that market, sales of both the single and the LP soared into the thousands within a few days.

Mink emphasized that the tours thus far—and the upcoming special airliner visit—are strictly promotional appearances and that the Blues Magoos have given up a series of lucrative professional dates to make the tour.

Aircraft Interview

Activity for the whirlwind tour of 20 cities will combine extensive - radio - television exposure with major in-store promotional appearances in many localities. Deejays and press representatives in a 200 mile radius of each city will be

brought in for special interview sessions with the group. The airliner is being equipped with tape recording facilities to allow the Blues Magoos to give radio interviews on the aricraft as well as at local radio stations they plan visiting in various cities.

Additionally an extensive schedule for local TV appearances, together with special parties for deejays, local and regional promotional personnel, key dealers and rack jobbers are planned. In some areas, the Blues Magoos tour is being planned to coincide with special local events, as in Minneapolis, where the group will headline a special matinee show for the annual Winter Carnival in conjunction with radio station WDGY.

The airliner also will carry the group's two tons of equipment enabling them to perform in as many localities as their schedule allows.

Cities to be visited include: Jan. 20 - Boston, Mass.; Jan. 21-Baltimore, Md.; Jan. Washington, D.C.; Jan. 23 — Pittsburgh, Pa.; Jan. 24 - Columbus and Dayton, Ohio; Jan, 25-Cincinnati, Ohio; Jan. 26-Louisville, Ky. and St. Louis, Mo.; Jan. 27—St. Louis, Mo.; Jan. 28 — Des Moines, Iowa; Jan. 29-St. Paul, Minneapolis, Minn.; Jan. 30 - Milwaukee, Wisc.; Jan. 31-Toledo, Ohio; Feb. 1-Erie, Pa. and Buffalo, N.Y.; Feb. 2-Rochester and Syracuse, N.Y.; Feb. 3-Hartford, Conn.



New Laugh LP Just for Teens

Epic Records, at its national sales meeting held in Miami Beach, Fla., from Jan. 8 to 12, announced the release of a comedy album specifically written and produced for teen-agers: "I Were a High School Graduate."

Written and performed by exclusive Epic recording artists Gail Parent and Kenny Solms, the album also carries the subtitle "Not Recommended for Adults." Kenny, 24, and Gail, 26, gathered material for the sketches partly from what they can remember, partly from what they can never forget and partly from being around teenagers as staff members of television's "The Clay Cole Show."

The Solms and Parent talent duo was discovered by Epic executives a few months ago when the young comedians' LP "Our Wedding Album or the Great Society Affair" was released on the Jamie label. The spoof of the Luci Johnson—Pat Nugent wedding was not only written by Kenny and Gail but performed by them as well.

Both were drama students when they first met at New York University: Gail had hopes of becoming a director and Kenny, an actor. But in the end, their ability to make one another laugh won out.

Besides writing skits for comedians, they have had major sketches in the last four shows at the "Upstairs at the Downstairs." The musical, "New Faces of 1966," includes a scene they wrote titled "The Miss America Pageant," which has received tremendous out-oftown response. They have also written a television spectacular which starred comedian Orson Bean and they eventually hope to write a Broadway show.

Russell-Cason Team on the Go

NASHVILLE—The independent production team of Bobby Russell and Buzz Cason announced this week their schedule of recently recorded single releases.

"We feel we have a very impressive group of records with which to start '67," related publicist Bill O'Brien. The first release on their newly formed Elf label (distributed by Bell) is "Show Girl in Town" by Wizard and the Ahs. This hard-rock release will be followed by the Elf recording of "Adora" by the Bright Hour. "Adora" was written by the lead singer of the group, John Mason Houghland II.

Russell and Cason also are excited over their initial release on Rising Sons Records, "Tears Tell," written by Russell. In addition to these releases there will be a '67 version of "Look for a Star" by Gary Miles and the New Classics on Rising Sons and a new discovery from the Louisville, Ky. area, Gary Edwards and the Embers, who will have their initial release on one of the company's labels. Cason recently produced a master on another Louisville group called the Oxfords. This disk, called "There's Always Something There to Remind Me," was recently picked up by Mala and is now in the top five in Louisville and is currently breaking in the Nashville and Memphis area.

O'Brien stated that the Rising Sons team will continue its search for new artists and writers from all the states, but will concentrate on developing talent in and around the Nashville area.

Russell-Cason Productions is located at 812 17th Ave. So. in Music City. Negotiations are currently under way with several major labels for the production of established artists.

RIAA Gold Record Awards Reach High of 81 in '66

An all-time high of 81 phonograph records, 23 singles and 58 long-playing albums were certified for gold record awards during 1966, the Record Industry Association of America has announced. In 1965, when the previous high was established, certifications were granted to 11 singles and 36 albums for a total of 47.

RIAA said the surge in gold record award certifications was a good indication of the rise in retail sales of phonograph records during 1966, which is expected to establish a new peak of better than \$700 million in retail sales at list price value. A new sales high had been established in 1965 with a retail volume of \$630 million.

The RIAA certification program, established in 1958, involves an audit of a record company's sales figures by an independent firm of certified public accountants. To qualify for an RIAA-certified gold record award, a single must have amassed a sale of at least one million copies, an album must have accumulated a minimum of \$1 million in sales at the manufacturer level.

In Miami Beach:

UA Takes Care of Business; Pick & B'way Wax Star

MIAMI BEACH—United Artists International and Solid State rounded up their new record product line, wrapped it up in appropriate superlatives and introduced it to a full complement of their distributors at the Doral Hotel Jan. 6-8 in a distrib convene that stressed informality in the belief that all work and no play makes Jack, the already pro distributor, an uninterested boy.

The only orders of business were the product presentation itself, executed by a line-up of UA execs, and private distributor meetings held by Vice President and Director of Marketing Mike Lipton.

The presentation program, stripped of slides and other accoutrements, was divided into two halves—the first of which starred David Picker, First Vice President of the parent company, who talked in longrange terms about the end-of-March UA merger with Trans-American and about up-coming UA money-making movies like the latest Bond "You Only Live Twice," new Italian-made west-ern "A Fistful of Dollars," "The Way West," "Chitty Chitty Bang Bang," to star Dick Van Dyke with songs by Richard and Robert Sherman, "Fiddler on the Roof" (which Picker said should be the big earner of 1971) and the imminent "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying."

Picker stressed the importance of music and record possibilities in UA decisions to film this or that property and cited impending Clive Donner-directed "All Around the Mulberry Bush" as one film that got the go-ahead because new UA click artists, the Spencer Davis Group, agreed to to provide the score.

Picker also voiced UA's determination to make it big on Broadway and detailed some of the production stories behind "Illya Darling," the musical adaptation of "Never on Sunday" that opens in March with Greek seductress Melina Mercouri recreating her role as the prostitute with the heart of gold and hopefully a record to match. "Never on Sunday" composer Manos Hadjidakis wrote the score and Picker had a colorful story or two to tell about him as well.

Also in the first half UA waxery President Mike Stewart introduced a short movie made during the shooting of the spaghetti-strewn Pat Cooper album cover, "Spaghetti Sauce and Other Delights." The short will accompany Pat on his trips to "The Johnny Carson Show" et al in the next few months. It's also available to distribs.

The second half of the meeting featured Leroy Holmes, Norman Weiser, Ron Eyre, Jim Brown, Lloyd Leipzig, Bernie Lawrence, Sonny Lester and Noel Rogers unveiling the 26 new albums on the January release.







Jerry Dennon on The Seattle Sound

By DAVE FINKLE

NEW YORK — Since every part of the country seems to be developing its sound these past few years, Jerry Dennon, who heads all sorts of Jerry Dennon enterprises in Seattle like the Jerden label and an indie firm, obliged Record World last week by dropping into the office to talk about the Seattle Sound (which the lad was too modest to say might be called the Jerry Dennon sound, since most of the Seattle activity centers around him).

The Seattle Sound, Dennon explained, is not so much a different sound as a distinctive, high quality sound. The reason for this, the young exec said, is that there is a lucrative entertainment circuit in the Northwest that is traveled by only the best groups in the area. And therefore competition runs high to break into that circle, and logically, quality is the outcome.

The group Dennon is proudest of is the Kingsmen, whom he recorded a number of years ago on a popular Seattle song "Louie, Louie," now a countrywide rock and roll classic.

Work Records Pay Off

The history of "Louie, Louie" (outside of the notoriety of its possible off-color lyrics, which Dennon says is no more than the strange cutgrowth of some buyers' over-active imaginations), is a long one, falling into the "work record" category. And Dennon says he believes strongly in the work record theory and its pay-off.

Right now Dennon as head of the Jerden label is behind and will stay behind, for a year if necessary, "The Witch" by the Sonics. Another label group is Don and the Goodtimes, just signed onto Dick Clark's "Where the Action Is" daily TVer as replacements for Paul Revere and the Raiders (also graduates of the Northwest school of music). 





Jerry Dennon on The Seattle Sound

By DAVE FINKLE

NEW YORK — Since every part of the country seems to be developing its sound these past few years, Jerry Dennon, who heads all sorts of Jerry Dennon enterprises in Seattle like the Jerden label and an indie firm, obliged Record World last week by dropping into the office to talk about the Seattle Sound (which the lad was too modest to say might be called the Jerry Dennon sound, since most of the Seattle activity centers around him).

The Seattle Sound, Dennon explained, is not so much a different sound as a distinctive, high quality sound. The reason for this, the young exec said, is that there is a lucrative entertainment circuit in the Northwest that is traveled by only the best groups in the area. And therefore competition runs high to break into that circle, and logically, quality is the outcome.

The group Dennon is proudest of is the Kingsmen, whom he recorded a number of years ago on a popular Seattle song "Louie, Louie," now a countrywide rock and roll classic.

Work Records Pay Off

The history of "Louie, Louie" (outside of the notoriety of its possible off-color lyrics, which Dennon says is no more than the strange outgrowth of some buyers' over-active imaginations), is a long one, falling into the "work record" category. And Dennon says he believes strongly in the work record theory and its pay-off.

Right now Dennon as head of the Jerden label is behind and will stay behind, for a year if necessary, "The Witch" by the Sonics. Another label group is Don and the Goodtimes, just signed onto Dick Clark's "Where the Action Is" daily TVer as replacements for Paul Revere and the Raiders (also graduates of the Northwest school of music). Danny O'Keefe is the other Jerden pactee.

Dennon and his office of two others handle a number of independent productions for other labels as well as what is home-distributed. The Kingsmen, needless to report, are Wand artists. Outfit also has Ian Whitcomb (the successful Irishman discovered playing rag piano while visiting Seattle) on Tower, Linda Ball (just out with a "Last Train to Clarks-

ville" answer disk) on Tower, the Buffalo Springfield on ABC and the Brave New World due to be released on Epic.

Was With Col Branch

Jerry Dennon, who early in his trade career worked for Columbia's independent distrib branch in Seattle, reversed his initials and opened D. J. Distributors in Seattle a few years back and represents Scepter, Tower and A&M.

And he's got song pubberies, a management office, Navigo, and, in the near future, a book publishing outfit and an L.A. office.

So the guy's doing all right. But what really helps, Dennon says, is that there he is up in Seattle and when good local talent is around, he, she or they inevitably come to Dennon offices. And if Dennon likes them, he can take them right into Dennon recording studios, and from there, who knows?

For as he said last week, "If you've got the product, I think you can be anywhere."

When Eddie Fisher returned kind of therapy for me. When I was a kid in Philadelphia. and those disaster-type problems that kids somehow live through got me down, I'd start singing. It didn't matter where I was or if anyone was listening or not, I just sang and felt better. It still works for me," Fisher says.

Although Eddie Cantor was impressed by Fisher's singing talent when he discovered him, he knew that the talent had to be seasoned in front of audiences, and different types of audiences. So he arranged a tour for Fisher that, in effect, lasted almost two years and provided him with a lifetime of experience by the time he became nationally known in the early 1950s.

His recordings, plus television, skyrocketed Fisher to the top. He earned a series of gold records.

Fisher was born in a lowermiddle class section of Philadelphia in August, 1928, and grew up through the worst years of the depression. The Fisher family's financial situation during his formative years was, to say the least, dire. He had a series of jobs, from washing windows to delivering newspapers, in order to help out at home.

When he was discovered by Cantor, Fisher had two jobs in the Catskills: a singer by night and a bus-boy during the day.

Drafted at Height

At the height of his initial popularity, Fisher was drafted into the Army during the Korean War and served from 1951 to 1953. A careful releasing schedule of his Victor recordings during this two year period maintained his popularity. After being mustered out of the service, Fisher made a series of concert and nightclub engagements in this country and abroad, and then embarked on a television series for NBC.

Although Fisher has appeared in motion pictures, he likes working in front of an audience best. Fisher has shown an interest in motion picture production and has formed the Fisher Production Company in order to film a slate of projects. Fisher will serve in a production capacity only. The projects include "Paint Your Wagon," based on the Broadway musical by Lerner and Loewe; "The Gouffe Affair," a sophisticated drama; and "The Big

Roselli Concert Delights Copa

NEW YORK—Jimmy Roselli told his ecstatic Copa opening crowd recently that he was suffering from a cold; but—going on to do a couple of dozen songs with unvarying pow finishes—the United Artists songster forgot to tell my eardrums.

With one of the most powerful pop voices around, Jimmy, backed by a large, concert-type orchestra (indeed, the Roselli performance took on the quality-to say nothing of the duration-of a concert after a while), Roselli could not give enough of himself to suit the clamoring, jammed room. His repertoire contained a hefty pot-pourri of Italian poppery, untranslated; as well as numerous humorous Italian asides -also a mystery to the K of C-Hadassah contingents (admittedly small).

However, Roselli did try to provide a little something for everyone. Aside from the many standards effectively rendered

"A Foggy Day," "You Do -"A Foggy Day," "You Do Something to Me," "I'm Sitting on Top of the World," etc.-he tossed in a heartfelt "Yiddishe Mama," even "Winchester Cathedral" ("to please my agent"), not to mention "Mammy." Happily, miraculously, he managed to eschew "What Now My Love?," the currently overdone club-disk TV favorite, as well as other contemporary chestnuts.

Keeping the patter at a minimum, Roselli mainly sings, and very well, with the kind of power and control and frequent spurts of lyricism that indicate he could have scored in more serious areas of music. One dark, healthy looking lady in the balcony with an even healthier whistle seemed to be having a "soul breakdown," Italian style. The room understood.—Doug McClelland.

Cap Wins Gold

HOLLYWOOD — A total of 23 singles were RIAA certified for gold records during 1966 and five of these belonged to Capitol. Four were by the Beatles ("We Can Work It Out," "Nowhere Man," "Paperback Writer," "Yellow Submarine"), and the fifth was earned by the Beach Boys for "Good Vibrations."

The Beatles were also individual winners with twice as much "gold" as their nearest competitors.

Command's Lee Hits the Road

NEW YORK — Lanny Lee, recently appointed National Promotion and Publicity Director for Command Records, is off to Cleveland, Detroit and Pittsburgh to meet with distributors and promotion men.

Jazz

Taking Care of Business

By DEL SHIELDS

Last year, our theme "Jazz is Getting Better" was proven by the increased volume of sales of jazz LPs.

Over the next few weeks, we will devote space to field reports from leading execs of jazz labels offering their view and reports on the 1966 jazz nicture.

Bernie Block, who took over the Blue Note helm following the acquisition of the company



by Liberty Records, offers the following: Dear Del:

1966 was a big year and 1967 promises to be even more exciting. Success was very evident in

Horace Silver's

release of "The Cape Verdean Blues." This great January, 1966, release further established Silver and his quintet as forerunners in the field. "The African Queen" was taken as a single from the album, and, as usual, stimulated interest in Silver's catalog product, "Cape Verdean" found its way onto many national charts all across the country.

Lee Morgan's follow-up to "The Sidewinder," "The Rumproller," was an exciting release and proved again the many faceted talents of Lee Morgan. The highlight single from the LP was "The Rumproller."

Certainly one of the most important releases of 1966 was the Ornette Coleman Trio at the Golden Circle, Stockholm, which really established Ornette as one of the leading jazz men in his field. He copped all honors with the Record of the Year and Artist of the Year by the Readers Poll in Downbeat Magazine. This is only a taste of Ornette's many great talents, which Blue Note under the recording direction of Alfred Lion and Francis Wolff will continue to develop.

Fresh Idea

February saw a new and fresh idea by Herbie Hancock in his "Maiden Voyage" release. The sounds Herbie projects on this record are of great attraction to all jazzniks, and we are still enjoying good sales.

In April, Volume II of Ornette Coleman at the Golden Circle served to emphasize and underscore Ornette as a leading sax man. Then, in May, Grant Green's LP, "I Want to Hold Your Hand," featuring that tune and "Corcovado," showed a reaction proving that Grant does have a definite following not only in jazz circles today, but also has good consumer appeal.

"The Night of the Cookers," Freddie Hubbard Live at Club La Marchall, which came out in May, was an important release for Blue Note, and further established Hubbard as an artist to watch. The album was complimented with Lee Morgan, James Spaulding, Harold Mabern, Jr., Larry Ridley and Big Black on Conga. Sales were very good, and this has become an important catalog album.

Big Summer Release

At the time of its release "Search" was a breakout LP, appearing on all national charts. Also appearing in August was "Got a Good Thing Goin'" by John Patton, and the reaction to the LP prompted the release of a single on "Ain't That Peculiar" and "Amanda." Sales on the LP are an indication of what this artist can contribute to the industry.

"Bucket," by Jimmy Smith. was released in September, featuring as a single "Bucket" and "Sassy Mae." This album found its way onto all national charts and still appears on most orders coming into this office. September also saw the release of "Indestructible" by Art Blakey, another solid entry which is appearing on many jazz charts across the country. Sales continue to climb on this LP

"Rough 'N Tumble" by Stanley Turrentine, released in October, 1966, has justifiably shown up on national and jazz charts, and the sales are building to an all time great on this artist. Stanley has had many good entries, but the LP further establishes him as one of (Continued on page 42)
