Pipolo will take charge of the recording arm of Greene and Stone Enterprises effective immediately in the development of new talent and material and national promotion activities for York-Pala and all outside record lease committments under the Greene-Stone banner.

Pipolo joins Greene and Stone after a two-year hitch as National Promotion Manager with Liberty Records. Prior to that he was with VJ Records of Chicago and Hollywood. Earlier experience saw Pipolo with Kapp Records in New York. His first position in the recording industry was as a retail salesman in several Broadway record shops upon his graduation from high school in New York.







Brunswick Boom Jackie Wilson Re-Signs, Chi Office Opens, Etc.: Tarnopol

NEW YORK — Brunswick Records is currently enjoying its most successful period, due, according to label's Executive Vice President Nat Tarnopol, to "having the top R&B artists in the business and the most knowledgeable, expert executive staff there is."

Overseeing all is Leonard W. Schneider, President of Brunswick, who, Tarnopol asserted. "has worked to turn the Brunswick Corp. into a big R&B label." Although at first told by many that a major label could not score in the R&B field, Schneider's dreams have been realized, with the considerable assistance of Dick Jacobs, Vice President; Syd Goldberg, Sales Vice President who is responsible for Brunswick product distributed through Decca Distributing Corp.; Tarnopol himself, at Brunswick six very fruitful years; Joe Medlin, National Promotion Manager, R&B Division, Decca, Coral and Brunswick; and Carl Davis, A&R Director, all on this week's cover.

New Wilson Long-Termer

Jackie Wilson, a consistent Brunswick artist who has grown hotter than ever in recent months, has just signed a new, long-term contract with Brunswick on the occasion of his 10th anniversary with the diskery. Wilson was discovered by Tarnopol in Detroit, also Tarnopol's home town, and furthermore is managed by the Brunswick executive.

Prior to his appointment at Brunswick, Tarnopol was a music publisher in Detroit "out of a \$12-a-month office." Since then, there have been many Brunswick hits, most recently such chart-busters as Wilson's "Whispers" and "I Don't Want to Lose You," plus his new smash, "I've Lost You"; the Gene Chandler "The Girl Don't Care"; the Artistics' "I'm Gonna Miss You" and the current "Girl I Need You"; "Wack Wack" by the Young Holt Trio, and their latest, "Mellow Yellow"; the Four Pennies' "You Have No Time to Lose"; and Marvin Smith's "Time Stopped." Along with other notable waxings by Jackie Ross, Otis Leavill, Laverne Baker and Billy Butler, among others.

Albums by these artists have been proving strong items, too.

Opening in Chicago

Everything has been going so well of late, in fact, that Brunswick is opening its own office in Chicago on April 26, presided over by Carl Davis.

"Most of our recording is done there," Tarnopol related. "Davis supervises all the writing and recording done there. I think Carl is the greatest producer in the business. We owe much of our success to him. And to Joe Medlin, the No. 1 promotion man in the business. He was voted the top R&B promotion man of the year last year by Bill Gavin and NARA. He is also on the NARA executive board. Joe is based in New York, but he travels everywhere, by phone, plane, whathave-you."

The recent addition of Jack Gibson as a regional promotion man under Medlin on all three labels has given the corporation additional strength in the field. Gibson is a past president of NARA, in addition to being one of its founders.

The Brunswick boom is on in a big way; and Tarnopol revealed that the label is now negotiating for several other big name artists "and we're going to get them!"

NEW YORK—The first quarter of 1967 was the most successful ever in the history of Atlantic-Atco Records, label reports. For the first three months of 1967, gross volume was up almost 100% over the first quarter of 1966. Until now the first quarter of 1966 had been Atlantic's biggest.

Hard on the heels of this record-breaking first quarter, Atlantic continued to set new sales records, with more singles sold in the first two weeks of April than any other two week period ever for the company. From April 10 through 15, Atlantic-Atco fulfilled orders for over 755,000 singles, a new sales mark for the firm.

April has been sparked by big sales of Aretha Franklin's "Respect," Arthur Conley's "Sweet Soul Music," the Young Rascals' "Groovin'" and Booker T. & the MG'S "Hip Hug-Her" on Stax.

The hot singles on Atlantic-Atco during January, February and March include Aretha Franklin's "I Never Loved a Man the Way I Love You," Wilson Pickett's "Mustang Sally," "Everybody Needs Somebody to Love" and "I Found a Love," Sonny & Cher's "The Beat Goes On," Bobby Darin's "Lovin' You" and "The Lady Came from Baltimore," the Buffalo Springfield's "For What It's Worth," the Young Rascals' "I've Been Lonely Too Long," Percy Sledge's "Baby, Help Me" and "Out of Left Field" and Arthur Conley's "Sweet Soul Music."

On Stax-Volt, the big winners were Otis Redding's "Try a Little Tenderness," Sam & Dave's "You Got Me Hummin'" and "When Something is Wrong with My Baby," William Bell's "Everybody Loves a Winner," "Raise Your Hand" by Eddie Floyd, Carla Thomas' "Something Good" and "Hip Hug-Her" by Booker T. & the MG's. Joe Tex had two big ones on Dial, "Show Me" and "Papa Was Too"; and Jimmy Hughes had a chart-buster with "Why Not Tonight."

On the album front Atlantic-Atco had a flock of best-sellers: Aretha Franklin's "I Never Loved a Man the Way I Love You," "The Exciting Wilson Pickett," "The Wicked Pickett," The Young Rascals' "Collections," Sonny & Cher's "In Case You're in Love," Bobby Darin's "If I Were a Carpenter," "Buffalo Springfield," Sam & Dave's "Double Dynamite" on Stax, "Otis Redding's Dictionary of Soul" on Volt and "King & Queen" with Otis Redding and Carla Thomas on Stax.

Other big albums were Herbie Mann's "New Mann at Newport" and "Impressions of the Middle East," Sergio Mendes' "The Great Arrival," Charles Lloyd's "Forest Flower," Jack McDuff's "Tobacco Road," Jimmy Hughes' "Why Not Tonight" and Johnny Taylor's "Wanted One Soul Singer" on Stax. Three new albums were getting tremendous sales action in April, including Sonny & Cher's movie sound track LP "Good Times," "King Curtis Plays the Great Memphis Hits" and Arthur Conley's "Sweet Soul Music."





Jubilee Sales Up

NEW YORK — Jerry Blaine, President and Chairman of the Board of Jubilee Industries, revealed this week that in the fiscal year ended Sept. 30, 1966, Jubilee Industries had a net income of \$41,231 and total revenues of \$4,959,684 as compared with the loss sustained in 1965 of \$300,729 on total revenues of \$3,919,483.

Blaine called fiscal 1966 one of "the most satisfying in the company's history in light of its reversal of three years of losses and the increase in total revenues of approximately 26% over the prior 12 months."

The rise in profits was attributed in part to Jubilee's divestment of its distribution facilities with the exception of its interest in All-One-Stop and Distributing Corp. of New York.

Major Factor

In a statement to shareholders, Blaine said: "We are now creative record producers in New York through our own lines and in joint ventures with other labels, and manufacturers of recordings via our pressing plant and auxiliary facilities in the greater Los Angeles area. The development of this manufacturing division through expansion and modernization was a major factor in reversing the losses shown in previous years.

"Our New York headquarters' offices now include a fullyequipped recording studio that can produce both stereo and monaural records of the highest quality, our own 'cutting room' and special facilities for such technical procedures in 'mastering' a finished record as 'mixing,' 'over-dubbing,' 'tracking,' etc. We augment our own creative efforts by signing young, independent record producers.

"Our record manufacturing facility in California is now the

Under the terms of this arrangement, ITCC is releasing selections from our catalog of recorded material on Stereo Tape Cartridges for which we will be reimbursed on a royalty basis. As Stereo Tape Cartridge sales grow in both auto and home use, this contract will assume increasing importance."

Blaine stated that Jubilee will continue "to develop our tremendous catalog of comedy and spoken word recordings, to actively seek acquisitions in related areas of the entertainment industry and to enhance our music publishing activities. It is our conviction that the current year will witness a continuation and acceleration of our 'turnaround' to profitability."



NEW YORK - The establishment of the Lucy Wakefield Business Career Clinic to function under the guidance of the Interracial Council for Business Opportunity was announced here by Berry Gordy, Jr., President, Motown Record Corp., Detroit.

Gordy revealed the formation of the clinic in his acceptance speech before a capacity audience of nearly 1,000 per-sons who jammed the Grand Ballroom of the Hotel Biltmore at the ICBO's annual dinner where he received the organization's third annual award for business leadership. The award was presented by Edgar M. Bronfman, president of Joseph E. Seagram and Sons, Inc.; Harvey C. Russell, co-chairman, was toastmaster.

It is belived to be the first such clinic to be established to encourage Negroes in business and to be sponsored by a successful Negro businessman.

Aids the Ambitious

In elaborating on the Lucy Career Wakefield Business Clinic, named in memory of his sister, Gordy said, "It will make it possible for bright young Negroes to further their ambitions. It will help them make their mark in the business world. It will allow them to study modern management practices as it creates apprentice jobs with established companies and will permit them to gain the kind of practical experience necessary for success in today's world of tough competition.

"This is a program for young America. Without young America and its support of the Motown Sound in music, I would not be standing before you tonight. In a very real sense, the ICBO's business leadership award belongs to them as well as to me. They have given me whatever success I can claim. Now, through the Lucy Wakefield Business Career Clinic, I can help them."

The Motown president received a standing ovation.

A highlight of the evening was a complete surprise to Gordy. The Supremes had secretly recorded special lyrics to the tune of one of their hits, "My World Is Empty Without You." At the conclusion of Gordy's speech, the special song was piped into the PA system.




Sonny, Cher's 'Good Times'







SAC Has a Record 1966: Revenues Reach \$4.6 Mil

NEW YORK — Evidence of the fantastic strides made in every area of show business by R&B artists was dramatically highlighted by the recent announcement of Don Soviero, President of S.A.C. (Shaw Artists Corp.) that in 1966 his agency had attained billings of \$4,650,000, the biggest year in its history.

S.A.C. is the home agency for such R&B stalwarts as Ray Charles, Otis Redding, Bobby Hebb, the Drifters, Rufus Harley, Chuck Jackson, Fats Domino and B. B. King. Since the popularity of these artists is in many cases a direct reflection of their success on records, S.A.C.'s bookings are viewed by the disk trades as an important index of current and future R&B penetration.

In addition to the breakthrough that R&B artists have scored in the wake of the general crossover of blues into the entertainment mainstream, Soviero, who took over the agency in February of 1966, attributed the record billings to a reorganization he instituted in the agency as well as to a judicious pruning of the roster.

Booking About 68

SAC today is the exclusive booking office for approximately 68 performers, down from 120 when Soviero first took over the reins less than a year ago. (The agency topper had been a Berkshire boniface and still owns the Music Inn and the Bosquet Mt. Ski area.)

"I felt that we had a company that was antiquated in its attitude and limited in the type of bookings it could secure as well as the type of artists it could represent," Soviero states. "My first goal was to broaden the areas in which we could provide full agency representation—appearances on radio and TV. commercials on radio and TV, motion pictures, the theater, personal concerts and records. By retaining only those acts that were already moneymakers or had growth potential and were exclusively signed to us, we kept on all the artists that produce good commissions now or who have potential to justify our investment of time and effort. The acts that are presently carried at a loss are the newcomers to the business whom we feel, in the coming years, will more than make up for their present cost to us.

"One of the means that we

have used to judge the 'potential' of a young performer is his ability to please any audience in person and to make the kind of records that eradicate all racial and ethnic barriers. This is the key to the future of R&B. Without it, performers like Chuck Jackson, Ray Charles, Fats Domino and Flip Wilson would be unable to move with the times and take advantage of what the future will bring them. There is literally no place in the entertainment industry that is not open today."

College Popularity Growing

"R&B has found the college campuses, in addition to nightclubs and concerts, a new and growing area of popularity," he continued. "We attribute this in part to the fact that magazines and newspapers are more interested in Negro performers than ever before; this is a reflection of the times we live in. It's also a byproduct of the tremendous radio exposure that today's R&B recording artists receive when they have a record that breaks wide open in all directions. Two years ago you would have never heard Otis Redding or Bobby Hebb on a pop station. Of course, Ray Charles had bridged the gap between R&B and pop music before this current crossover. In fact, you can really say that if it wasn't for Ray Charles, there might not have been the crossover at all. He broke open the pop music field to other R&B artists. Also, the popularity of the Beatles helped immensely.

"Because of new areas opening up to R&B artists, we at S.A.C. have found it necessary to broaden our own booking techniques. Encouraging this 'crossover' is to the benefit of

not only our clients, but to the public also."

As examples of the broadened booking possibilities available through today's receptive climate and the "creative direction" which is the slogan of the agency under his aegis, Soviero pointed to the major network television appearances secured by S.A.C. for Ray Charles and Flip Wilson; Rufus Harley's feature part in the motion picture "You're a Big Boy Now"; Bobby Hebb's tour with the Beatles; Fats Domino and Flip Wilson's Las Vegas bookings and a host of others.

Progressive Approach

The young president has brought with him to the agency field progressive, highly public relations-oriented approach, Shaw Artists Corporation is currently the only major booking agency which is publishing a monthly house organ. The four-page SAC Topics is mailed out to thousands of buyers, promoters, managers, artists, advertising agencies, producers and directors, many of whom have never had personal contact with the R & B field previously.

According to Soviero, "This educational service is one of the most important jobs the agency performs. We believe that it is the average talent buyer's lack of knowledgeability about R & B even more than bias which keeps the doors closed in those segments of show business where there is still a problem. We know that the problem cannot be completely erased by the publication of SAC Topics. But it is a source of great satisfaction to us to become increasingly aware that we are helping to break down the barriers."

In 1967, Soviero predicts that S.A.C.'s billings will be at least 25% over those of 1966.

Strike Records has had a very good sale on their New Sound in Country (featuring British artists doing two tracks each). Sales figures are nearing the five thousand mark, which is excellent for any kind of an album, let alone country. Strike is now readying another LP with 12 British artists, entitled: "Murray Kash Presents Call It Country Style," an album based on the title of my weekly BBC record program, with introductory links between the tracks by yours truly.

Another active label on the British country music scene and a newcomer is Major-Minor. At the moment, their latest is by the O'Briens, two brothers with their own bright composition, "I Wanna See Nashville." It has had a good reception, as has the umpteenth version of "Almost Persuaded," this time by Crispian St. Peters (Decca). The Don Gibson song, "I'd Be a Legend in My Time." has just been recorded by a new group, Jamie, Jon and Jerry. It's a very nice beginning for these three young British lads. This is also a Decca release.

Folk-Wise

Folk-wise, it's all happening, as the saying goes over 'ere. Julie Felix, California-born folk singer who opens at the posh Savoy Hotel for a cabaret stint, is also being featured on the weekly David Frost TV show. Twenty-six-year-old Julie arrived in England in 1964 after drifting around the Continent for a couple of years. She's come a long way in three years, from being a complete unknown to this country's number one folk singer.

Julie Felix has a recording contract with Fontana; her releases include "Songs from the Frost Report," an LP; and a single, "I Can't Touch the Sun/ Rainy Day."

I'm off to get some rest, because my next assignment is to attend the Festival of American Country Music, an eight-hour marathon of modern and oldtime country music with over 50 performers. Wish me luck.

Signs Sil Austin


Coupled with the new label announcement, Singleton dis-closed that he has signed Sil

Not all of our observations about jazz are centered on the complaints and failure to take care of business. Since there is a time and a season, we might as well take the time to applaud the efforts of many of the jazz producers who are giving the jazz jock and the record buyer a delightful problem. And this problem is related to the abundance of good product coming out of the studios. There is quality as never



before, almost to the point of being too finely honed.

Let's take a look at some of the current releases!

Del Shields Mexican hiatus and returned to New York. His homecoming could not have been better if the good Mayor Lindsay had given him the keys to the city. "Nine Flags" (Impulse!) is a swinging big band outing that has the fire and the brilliancy of a sapphire. Chico certainly has been missed from the jazz scene, and he proves that his sojourn in Mexico was one well spent.

Many Capable Writers

There are many writers capable of writing fine charts and front a big band for a studio date. However, there are only a few who understand fully the personality of the orchestra and knows how to mesh and bring together the varied talents to produce a true orchestral sound. Fortunately for us, Chico is one. In this opus he has written 10 charts distilling the rhythms and colors of nine different countries, according to Nat Hentoff.

I would suppose that much of Chico's success is due to his ability as a conductor. With his talented baton he is able to translate the personalities and flavor of the countries into an impressive collection of tunes.

Another big band album has the big sound of Eddie "Lockjaw" Davis as the solo horn in "The Fox and the Hounds" (RCA). Eddie left the Basie Band some months ago and shows us that his time in the Basie Band and as one of the swinging tenor men is still as rich as ever.

Of course, Eddie has been one of the strong bastions of cooking tenor men since the days when "wail" was the affirmation of approval from an appreciative audience.

"Jaws" soars on "I Wished on the Moon," "When Your Lover Has Gone," while "Born to be Blue" must be heard to be believed. There has never been any doubt about his playing. But any jazz fan sometimes questions how well a veteran performer is playing after a number of years. If you are

asking about Eddie Davis, the answer is he is still taking care of business. And he does not lean on experience. He is swinging, inventive and beautiful.

"Spicy" (Prestige) is Richard Groove Holmes' newest album. "Groove" has inched up to become the second best selling jazz organist behind James Oscar Smith, and this latest offering should continue to enchant his fans.

Poetical Beauty

Always keeping an eye on the jazz public that likes its jazz with a carpet for some hip boog-a-looing or shing-alinging, Groove has "If I Had a Hammer." However, for the jazz fans whose tastes remain strictly within the true jazz taste, check out "Old Folks." It is a piece of poetical beauty. "Work Song" and "When Lights Are Low" are additional expressions of Groove's fine work.

Freddie Hubbard, considered in most circles among the Top 10 trumpeters in jazz and moving rapidly to the Top Five positions, has a new album, (Continued on page 43)

"Backlash" (Atlantic). I, for one, question the propriety in using the term as a title of an album. However, we will not be playing the title as opposed to the album itself. Here, Freddie, whose Blue Note album "Blue Spirits" is a big seller, will create a problem for the jocks. "Backlash" is a swinger and an example of where the "Be-in Sound" of jazz is today.

"Backlash" and "The Return of the Prodigal Son" should make this a strong seller. Harold Ousley, a young tenor man out of Chicago now in New York, is serving notice that he has a talent for writing. And this tune should focus attention on his efforts.





Joe Wissert:

'Commerciality Is A By-Product'

NEW YORK-"The first duty of a producer," according to Joe Wissert, who produced "Happy Together" by the Turtles, "is to realize that the fact a record is a hit is merely incidental to the entire creative process. Therefore, commerciality is just a by-product of making the most pleasing record possible."

Exclusively with Koppelman-Rubin Associates, Inc., Wissert is one of the busiest figures in the music business. He has just completed the next Turtles single, "She'd Rather Be with Me." and their "Happy Together" LP. He will be working on "Spoonful of Jazz" by Bud Shank, an album of songs by the Lovin' Spoonful.

"The important thing is," he said, "not to make a record just for the sake of commerciality. When you do that, you invariably produce something that is actually under the level of the audience. Producers who look down on their product, who are not turning out the best record they possibly can, are underestimating and misjudging today's record buyer."


Carnegie Wins Suit

Alan L. Shulman, director of business affairs at TRO, announces that the Exchequer Court of Canada has granted a preliminary injunction restraining Arc Sound of Toronto from manufacturing and distributing recordings of the patriotic standard renowned with unauthorized satirical lyrics.

By Woody Guthrie

The song, written by Woody Guthrie, is an expression of his love for the American land. It has enjoyed considerable popularity in Canada through an authorized version in which Canadian place names have been substituted for references to places in the U.S.

The publisher has refused numerous requests to parody the song for commercial and political purposes, and has authorized only changes in the words that make it appropriate to different locales.

Since it was first published in 1956, "This Land Is Your Land" has been recorded by nearly 100 artists.
