SLEEPERS OF THE WEEK









Col, MGM, Amy Record Pope

NEW YORK-Larry Uttal General Manager of Amy-Mala-Bell Records, announces that he has concluded a deal with United Press International for the exclusive rights to UPI's complete coverage of Pope Paul the VI's visit to New York. This will include all coverage of the Pope's visit to the U.N., Yankee Stadium and Saint Patrick's Cathedral, and will encompass not only the recorded coverage. but also pictorial and news coverage of the visit.

Columbia's VP Bill Gallagher worked very closely on their recording, which also will be released immediately. Ditto MGM's.

Minucci Scores Spec

Ulpio Minucci has been set to write the music for the Thanksgiving TV special narrated by Mrs. Lyndon Baines Johnson, tentatively titled "Washington the Beautiful." Produced by John H. Secondari. program will offer 52 minutes of music and will be telecast via ABC-TV "Special Projects."



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Her Month Feature

Columbia Records has designated October as Barbra Streisand Month. In conjunction with the CBS Television Network's rerun of "My Name is Barbra," scheduled for Oct. 20 at 10 p.m. New York time, Columbia will release the album "My Name Is Barbra, Two . . . "

Columbia has planned a massive advertising and promotion campaign. Full-page advertisements for Miss Streisand's bestselling albums wil be placed in TV Guide and Esquire. The company will also sponsor saturation radio spots in thirty major markets in cooperation with Chemstrand Co. (a division of Monsanto Co.), sponsor of the October television special.

Retailers will be supplied with 38" die cuts, window streamers and pre-pack counter browsers which will hold 15 monaural and 15 stereo albums. In addition, Columbia will provide 800 transportation display locations with four-sheets posters that draw attention to Miss Streisand's new album and to the October TVer.

As a special feature, Columbia will offer radio stations an opportunity to replenish their libraries of Streisand albums. Promotion copies of the singer's best-selling LP's will be sold to radio stations for one dollar.

Capitol - **Sparton** Press - Distrib Deal

HOLLYWOOD-Capitol Records, Inc., has concluded terms of an agreement with Sparton of Canada in London, Canada, whereby certain product of the Capitol, Tower and Uptown labels will be pressed and distributed in Canada by Sparton.

Marketing Phase

The agreement in no way affects the status or operation of Capitol Records of Canada Limited based in Toronto, Ontario and can be regarded generally as a marketing phase to develop additional exploitation and sales for product of Capitol, Tower and Uptown labels and certain of their artists.

Capitol, Hollywood, has similar distribution arrangements set up throughout the world.

Sparton will make initial release of singles immediately with album product to follow shortly.

'Streisand, Two' LP Argo Label Becomes Cadet; **Continues Widening Vistas**

- Argo Records, currently eminent in the jazz and pop fields with the Ramsey Lewis Trio's chart front-runner "The In Crowd," undergoes a major title change to Cadet Records on Oct. 4, 1965

The Cadet identification, alliterative to its Chess and Checker teammates under the Chess Producing Corporation banner, is the result of months of amiable negotiations by corporate vice-president Marshall Chess, head of the firm's foreign division, with a conflicting British Decca subsidiary also known as Argo.

Chess' version of Argo has risen rapidly to a position of international prominence and voluntarily is relinquishing its hold on the trademark. The heavily - budgeted, promotionconscious Chess organization emphasized that its individuality is at stake and will not even exercise its option to utilize an Argo-Cadet identification during a three-year "selling off" period granted under terms of the agreement with the overseas corporation. Instead, it will begin immediately to issue all new releases under the Cadet banner.

Unprecedented Switch

unprecedented switch after a decade of prominence in the recording industry, the change-over was explained by Argo sales manager Dick La-Palm.

"In an age of mass conformity." he said, "individuality is an elusive virtue. Mass production has made possible high standards of quality but creative individuality and excellence still depend on personal aspects. One's name and reputation should be personal. Cadet is wholly our own and we take pride in what we intend to achieve in its name as we did with Argo."

The Argo label emerged 10 years ago as a jazz subsidiary to Chess and Checker, founded by Leonard and Phil Chess a decade earlier. It has evolved steadily into a progressive recording affiliate encompassing a wide range of projects beyond strictly jazz limitations.

A tremendous legal search was instituted to guarantee a permanent, exclusive trademark after the Argo foreign conflict became apparent, As noted earlier, the Cadet title was chosen primarily because of its easy, euphonious assimilation into the Chess-Checker-Cadet billing.

Only Name Changed

LaPalm stressed the fact that his firm eagerly embraced the title change to insure future individuality and eliminate all possible confusion.

"We are changing only the name of Argo and nothing more. Our products will always be geared to the highest standards of creative individuality and innovation. Under the Cadet name, in fact, we will broaden and supplement the image of the company.'

The parent Chess corporation is embarking on an extensive promotional and advertising campaign in trade areas and in the general public press to insure immediate identification with the Cadet trademark.

FGG Productions Plans Own Label

Feldman-Goldstein-Gottehrer Score As Producers - Writers - Publishers




Bob Feldman, Gerry Goldstein and Richie Gottehrer FGG Productions' Big Three

NEW YORK — It looks like there will be a record label in FGG Productions' future.

The hot independent record producing firm run by Bob (F)eldman, Gerry (G)oldstein and Richard (G)ottehrer expects to form its own label early in 1966, Feldman told Record World last week. (FGG has been releasing its recent hit productions on Bang Records.)

"I think it's time now for us to set up our own record company," Feldman went on. "We'd like to get a major label to dis-

tribute for us, something like that. We haven't decided on a name for the company yet."

The Feldman-Goldstein-Gottehrer threesome, responsible for such recent hits as the Mc-Coys' "Hang On, Sloopy" and the Strangeloves' "I Want Candy" and "Cara-Lin," decided once before that the time was right for them to branch out. That was in the latter part of 1962 when FGG came into being.

"As publishers, writers or producers, we haven't been off the charts since," it was learned.

"We'd been hustling our own songs, producing our own demos and we just sat down one day and decided that if were going to do all this, we might as well be doing it for ourselves," Feldman explained. They had been songwriters for the Roosevelt and Blackwood music pubberies, had about 10 chart records including Bobby Comstock's "Let's Stomp"; three Bobby Vee records; and four Freddy Cannon disks-all written and/or produced by F, G and G. (They all work together on the music and lyrics, if anyone's asking.)

Third Was Smash

The third record they produced for FGG Productions was the smash "My Boyfriend's Back," by the Angels, which they also wrote. The Columbia

album was one of that label's biggest selling rock-type packages that year.

"We try to go the way of Nevins and Kirshner," Feldman stated.

"Last year we hired staff writers, but we forgot that most of the hits we'd had we'd written. This year we went back to developing our own talents."

They have also been developing new performing talent like the McCoys ("the Strangeloves discovered them on a date in Dayton, Ohio"), "old" names like Little Eva and, of course, those "Candy"-sweet Strangeloves, in a class by themselves (more later). Plus the Beachnuts. FGG has deals with just about all of the major record companies, and is enjoying its biggest year since inception.

Executive Duties

The breakdown of the operation is as follows: FGG Productions, Feldman President; Grand Canyon Music, Goldstein President; and Celestial Artists Management, Gottehrer Vice President. Roy Rifkind is President of the latter firm, handling all the acts including the FGG performing roster and some other name acts the company is in the process of signing.

Feldman had wanted to be an English teacher but decided after three weeks of college that it wasn't for him. Goldstein attended Pratt and the University of Arizona and was hoping to be an architect. And Gottehrer was graduated from Adelphi College — he wanted to be a lawyer.

"But we were all drawn together, and here we are today," Feldman continued. "Gerry and I were friends for many years in Brooklyn — Richie, who's from the Bronx, we met about four years ago."

Well-rounded Audience

He mentioned, too, that FGG would be working toward obtaining a well-rounded audience for the promising McCoy boys, who range in ages from 15 to 19. (A member of the onetime singing group, the Tokens, is forsaking a teaching post locally to travel with the Mc-Coys and tutor them.) The Mc-Coys are set for "The Steve Lawrence Show" on TV, among other important adult slottings, and will be off to Europe early in December to play the Olympia Theatre in Paris, as well as one-nighters.

At the same time, the FGG chiefs will be visiting England to set up publishing and productions deals. (Their Grand

Which is saying plenty.



Audio Fi Sets Oct. as Johnny Puleo Month

NEW YORK — In keeping with the Audio Fidelity expansion program, the company is enlarging its promotional activity under the direction of Harold Drayson, VP in charge of sales and mainly responsible for the company's new sales incentive program.

Drayson announced that for October, Audio Fi will have a special sales offer featuring the eight Johnny Puleo albums, including a promotion with Hohner Harmonicas. Drayson said that he thought this would be an opportune time to make October the "Johnny Puleo Month" for several reasons: 1) there are indications that the harmonica is becoming an instrument that teenagers are once again manifesting a musical interest in; 2) Puleo is doing a special public service television spot for the U.S. Post Office that will first be seen coast-tocoast during the month of October, where he will portray Zip Code U.S.A. Johnny will also be seen on the "Hollywood Palace" TV show during this 30-day period.

The eight albums that are available on the Audio Fidelity label are: "Johnny Puleo and His Harmonica Gang"; "Great Movie Themes"; "Molto Italiano"; "Western Songs"; "Encore Italiano"; "Jewish and Israeli Favorites"; "Johnny Puleo and His Harmonica Gang Vol. 2"; and "Johnny Puleo and His Harmonica Gang Vol. 7"

Point of sales material being provided for dealers includes window streamers, easels and special Johnny Puleo posters. Drayson has also received the cooperation of M. Hohner Company, manufacturers of the Hohner Marine Band Harmonica, which we will offer to distributors for the dealers throughout the country during this special program.

The regular \$3.79 and \$4.79 albums will be retailing for \$2.98 for either monaural or stereo for the entire month of October only.

Little Johnny plays the Hoh-

ner Harmonica exclusively on all of his recordings.

Pubbery Success Story

South Mountain's Match Game: Right Song With Right Artist

NEW YORK—From a modest beginning in 1960 with few of its songs attaining chart status, South Mountain Music has grown into a pubbery that is consistently on the charts.

Under the direction of Stan Catron, General Professional Manager, the firm has developed a strong and versatile staff of writers that includes Teddy Randazzo, Bobby Wilding, Billy Barbaris, Lou Stallman and Tony May. Individually or as co-writers the above have written such clicks as "I Want to Meet Him," "Big Wide World," "A Miracle," "I'm On the Outside (Lookin' In)," "Goin' out of My Head," "Don't Forget I Still Love You," "I Can't Stop Thinking of You," "Hurt So Bad," "Poor Boy," "Around the Corner" and "Have You Looked into Your Heart?"

"Goin' Out of My Head" brought South Mountain its second BMI citation as a Top 10 tune—the first was for "Pretty Blue Eyes." South Mountain's current chart disks are "Take Me Back," "It's Gonna Take a Miracle" and "You Better Go."

During the past year the BMI affiliate has secured recordings of its songs by many artists including Trini Lopez, Robert Goulet, Jack Jones, Lennie Welch, Steve Lawrence, Tony Bennett, Eydie Gorme, Frank Sinatra, Little Anthony & the Imperials, Kathy Keegan, Donna Fuller, Nana Mouskouri, Michel Legrand, Connie Francis, the Dukes of Dixieland, Jerry Vale, Bobbi Martin, Bobby Vinton and the Royalettes.

An arrangement was recently completed with Hill & Range which gives that company world sub-publishing rights to South Mountain product.

An Aggressive Pubbery

South Mountain has become known as an aggressive publisher. The firm hires its own promotion men in all of the major disk centers to work on records. Regular, creative mailings are sent out to radio stations.

In some instances a recording of a South Mountain song is worked on for months. An example is Bobbi Martin's Coral recording of "Don't Forget

I Still Love You." The record was released in the spring of 1964 and did not reach the charts until that fall. During the interim maximum effort on the parts of South Mountain's promo personnel was extended to help make the platter the hit that it became.

In a sense, Catron is from the old school of publishers in that he likes to actively promote South Mountain material, because he believes in it. He directs his staff to work on secondary markets, as well as prime marts. This philosophy has paid off numerous times, and Catron feels that many South Mountain songs that became best-sellers might have been lost, were it not for South Mountain's willingness to make "that extra effort."

Not long ago Catron started a campaign to bring new writers into the South Mountain fold. A group of a half a dozen have been added, and Catron is on the look out for more new writing talent. Independent writers are also encouraged to submit their material to South Mountain. Catron and his associate, Eddie Lambert, make it a point to listen personally to as many demos of songs that are sent in as possible.

Obtained 'Umbrellas'

South Mountain moved into the big leagues among publishers when it obtained the American publishing rights for "The Umbrellas of Cherbourg" in 1964. Several older and more established firms were also in contention for the rights. After negotiations for the score were completed South Mountain commissioned Norman Gimbel to write an English lyric for the film's main theme. It was entitled "I Will Wait for You."

Gimbel also fashioned words to another of Michel Legrand's motifs from the internationally acclaimed film, which was an Academy Award nominee for best foreign film of 1964. The second song, "Watch What Happens," has been recorded by Tony Bennett, and other versions are also due. So far more than 30 recordings of selections from the score of "The Umbrellas of Cherbourg" have been done.

South Mountain has the rights to "Un Pugno di Dollari," an award-winning motion picture, described as Italy's first Western. South Mountain cleffers are at work penning words to the flick's various themes. Completed songs are due shortly.

In the near future the pubbery will enter the theatrical field. Plans have almost been finalized to publish the scores of three off-Broadway and one Broadway production.

Catron attributes South Mountain's success principally to matching the right song with the right artist. Rather than always going for a top name Catron will often offer strong material to an unknown or lesser artist.

Portrait Of A Father-Manager

Ex-Manager Of Beach Boys (3 Are His Sons) Now Handling Sunrays

The Sunrays Now He Manages Them

Father Was Their Manager

NEW YORK-LOS ANGELES In the record business there are managers and there are fathers and occasionally there are manager-fathers. Murry Wilson fit into the latter category until two years ago and now he fits into the strictly manager category.

Until two years ago Wilson managed the Beach Boys and is father of three of them-Brian, Dennis and Carl-and uncle to Mike Love and good friend to Al Jardine.

Currently Wilson is managing Tower's Sunrays and is just about to spring the Wonder Brothers on the record public when negotiations with a label have been completed.

Last week Record World talked at length to Wilson, who was in a reminiscing mood, about his experiences first with the BBs and now with the SRs and found that Wilson remembers the last four years with pride and an occasional ache.

Started 4 Years Ago

"It all started," he said, "four years ago when my wife and I went to Mexico City and left the boys with \$80 emergency cash for food. We returned and found that our sons, along with Mike Love and Al Jardine, had spent all the money on instruments and amplifying equip-

ment because they had decided to become a musical group. They'd all lost weight, but they had become the Beach Boys.'

(They hadn't quite become the Beach Boys. At first they called themselves the Pendletones, Wilson said, but dropped that name after they found out there was another group called the Pendletones. Russ Regan, Coast promo man, picked the Beach Boys moniker, a tag the lads themselves despised at first, because they thought it made them sound like "a bunch of bums.")

"Early in December," Wilson continued, "we auditioned for Hite Morgan of Guild Music and he recorded our first song, 'Surfin'.' The song turned out to be the start of surfing music with singers and it was the inspiration for Mike and Brian to write surfing songs that became nationwide hits.

"Immediately after 'Surfin'," however, nobody seemed interested in the boys and after turndowns from four companies, Morgan released them and I called Ken Nelson at Capitol and set up an audition. We played a couple of tapes and although there was nothing they wanted, they were interested to hear more. So we went back to Western Recording where the boys do all their re-

cording and recorded 'Surfin' Safari,' 'Lonely Sea' and '409' in three hours and 20 minutes.

Quick to Know Hit

"Capitol was quick to realize

they had a hit. They sent out '409' coupled with 'Surfin' Safari' and the deejays started playing the 'Safari' side and that was the first hit for Capi-

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

tol. The second record, which we recorded at the Capitol studios, didn't do so well, so we went back to Western Recording for the hard rock sound we needed for the boys."

It was at Western Recording that Wilson recorded and mixed, along with cohort Chuck Britz, "Surfin' U.S.A.," "Shutdown," "In My Room," "Little Deuce Coupe" and "Fun, Fun, Fun" and three Beach Boys al-

What Wilson remembers most vividly about the years with the Beach Boys recording and on the road was the gratification of watching the five take shape as performers under his tutelage. This despite the inevitable family emotions that entered into such a process. Wilson's code throughout the period and currently is "Do the best job you can, sing from your heart and hold your head up proud."

Two years ago, after the boys were well established as William Morris artists, Wilson had to give up his managerial post. Ill health provoked his reluctant withdrawal from the scene.

Heads Sea of Tunes

He left the road to take over the head position at the Sea of Tunes pubbery, which handles all Beach Boy songs. Wilson is still holding that full time job, but recently he was persuaded by his son to return to managerial ranks by shaping up a new group the Beach Boys admired, the Sunrays.

Wilson was hesitant at first,

but when he heard the Rays and felt their enthusiasm, he remembers, he immediately felt he could do something with them. "The first day the boys spent at our house, they worked 11 hours learning three and four part harmony. We recorded the boys and got them a contract with Tower. Their first record didn't do too well, but their second, 'I Live for the Sun' is getting on so many playlists, for which we're grateful, and I'm watching them blossom into terrific artists." (The disk is No. 32 on the Top 100.)

Now Wilson, who has vowed to manage the boys for only one year and then turn them over to someone else, is "glad to be back in the middle of things" and finds that the Sunrays-Marty Di Giavanni, Eddie Medora, Vincent Hozier, Ricky Henn, Steve O'Reilly-are becoming "like sons" to me "even though I have to be stern sometimes." Wilson is thrilled to "see it all happen again—the success, the working out of bad habits, the growth of talent."

For his happy years in the business Wilson is grateful to the trade and the fans ("I always told my boys: you're not doing your fans a favor by playing; they're doing you a favor by paying to see you and you have to act accordingly.")

In closing, Wilson, who once thought he was going to be a songwriter, summed up his attitude: "I just love watching young talent."

George Goldner is sweating bullets on "Take Me for a Little While," Evie Sands, Blue Cat. After hit action on WMCA, it is now a hit in California, but making believers around the country is not so easy . . . "For Your Love," Righteous Brothers, Moonglow, is cooking at WING, Dayton, and in Houston. You ought to try "Justine" at your hop. The kids flip! Ditto for "Alley Cat Dance," Bent Fabric and Acker Bilk, Atco. It's big in N.Y.C.

FLASH FLASH: "Cleo's Back," Jr. Walker, Soul. This "B" side of "Shake & Finger-Pop" is an R&B sales sensation because of its terrific groove, and broke open for pop sales in the South so large, that Irv Biegel realized he had better moove. So, Tamla has released it as a one-sided single. Meanwhile, WIBG, Philadelphia has gone all-out on "Tune Up," Jr. Walker, the "B" side of "Boomerang." Three big R&B stations are getting smash action on the "B" side of the current Supremes, "My Heart Belongs to You" (WVON, Chicago: Fat Daddy, Baltimore: WAOK, Atlanta).

"Night the Angeles Cried," Len Wade, U.A., Top 15, Pittsburgh. As I said, "Take Me For a Little While," Evie Sands, Blue Cat, is Top 15 in L.A. and going in San Antonio, after big N.Y.C. sales. This record is far from dead, and will hit where played . . . The Kathy Kirby has now spread to L.A. for Parrot . . .

Film Review

'Marriage On Rocks' Is Fun

Any film utilizing the beauty, femininity, elegance, sensitivity, charm and skill of Miss Deborah Kerr has already justified itself.

But Warners' "Marriage on the Rocks" also has Frank Sinatra, Dean Martin (though neither sings), Cesar Romero, Hermione Baddeley, Nancy Sinatra and Trini Lopez (in his movie debut) and enjoys its own telling so much the audience can't help joining in. It's a marital farce, the kind of thing Hollywood used to specialize in back in the '30s and '40s. Only the bathing suits and necklines have been brought up to date, by being cut down to there.

Miss Kerr, doffing the dignity of recent dramatic triumphs, plays the rather kookie mother of Miss Sinatra and Michael Petit and wife of ad agency exec Sinatra, whom she married 19 years before in Vegas. She misses the "swinger" he was in his youth, feels he now takes her for granted, and sets into motion zany comic incidents involving Martin, Sinatra's business partner and her former beau.

Trini Sings 'Sinner'

Looking better than he ever has, Sinatra is a testament to the sporting life; and Martin is funny, a performer whose glowing good nature is always apparent and, like his latest film vehicle, can't miss winning friends. In a brief nightclub appearance, Lopez agreeably

renders his latest Reprise recording, "Sinner Man." Miss Sinatra, type-cast as Sinatra's daughter, knows what she is about. I think Nancy only has one crowded scene with her "mother," Miss Kerr. She is clearly her daddy's girl.

Miss Kerr is amusing in her Carole Lombardish assignment, one of the screen's great ladies and actresses who is even more valuable in this day when those qualities seem at an all-time low. She makes an elaborate "Hollywood" wardrobe wear well in Technicolor and gets to do a refined Watusi plus a dance in the streets of a Mexican village.

And that village, Bogart buffs, looks suspiciously like the streets of Humphrey's Casablanca as imagined by the same studio more than 20 years ago. "Marriage on the Rocks" is no classic, though: it never rises above the level of TV situation comedy, but is lively and gay and should be popular entertainment.

"Are You a Boy," Barbarians, Laurie, is Top 20 in Chicago, Top 10 in Washington, Top 5 in Syracuse and hot in Miami . . . Action in Detroit on "I'm Gonna Love You," Lazy Eggs, and "I Feel Strange," Wonderettes, Ruby . . . New England and Boston are breaking "Sea Cruise," Hondells, Mercury, plus some California action . . . "Sins of the Family," P. F. Sloane, Dunhill, is Top 15 in Boston, and good in Houston, Seattle, Denver, etc. "Girl from Peyton Place," Dicky Lee, Hall-TCF, is now Top 10 in Boston; Top 5 in Louisville and good in Albany and the South . . . "Make Me Your Baby," Barbara Lewis, Atlantic, is a smash. I think the melody will be around for years and years. This song would have been a hit in 1945. It will be a standard. I predict you'll be hearing many instrumental versions.

Columbia has never been hotter in singles, with the Billy Joe Royal leading the way; and "Il Silenzio," Nini Rosso, emerging as a giant in Detroit and spreading . . . Decca has never been hotter. They made a wise move in signing up as independent producers Philadelphians Johnny Madara and Dave White who have given them two giants: "1-2-3," Len Barry, and "Dawn of Correction," Spokesmen (in which Madara sings lead). I'm sure Mercury now regrets dropping Madara and White. WIBG broke both records in Philadelphia although L.A. really proved the Spokesmen had a giant (and Cleveland). Lenny Salidor predicts the Spokesmen LP will sell large, Len has a hit in "Rusty Bells," Brenda Lee (I hope WMCA plays this Brenda); and, the Jackie Wilson is a gas! . . . Kapp needs a hit. Gene Armond has the Lenny Welch going in Buffalo, Norfolk, Oklahoma City, but nothing like N.Y.C. . . . Houston is trying to break some new records like "Zula Style," Hank Ballard, King, and "Viet Nam Blues," Jack Sanders. Dean Tyler objects to songs on this topic. Do you?

Top 15 in the upstate New York area is "Lazy Mary Memphis," Tino & Revlons. Wanna buy a hot master? The session only cost \$25 and it was done in Bob Mitchell's basement. Seriously, it is now charted downstate at WMCA, N.Y.C. . . . I think Freddy DeMann is being very good in maintaining his cool, knowing he has a Top 5 giant monster at WYDE & WSGN in Birmingham called "Sandy," Ronnie & Daytonas (remember "GTO"?). Have you heard the record? It's a gas! Congratulations to the fellows in Birmingham. Since the distributor who services that town is in Atlanta, those stations often don't get proper credit for the many records they start.

Memphis starts a lot of records also. Top 10 now at WHBQ & WMPS is "Oh Love," The Devilles. Hot master anyone?

I hope you all believe "I Still Love You," Vejtables, Autumn, by now as it went Top 10 in the California cities that prove 30% of the records on the trade charts... Bill Gavin has been alerting us about the Vejtables from the beginning, and has been virtually alone in insisting that the HIT side of the Herb Alpert is "Taste of Honey." (Now, Top 10 in Dallas at KLIF & KBOX and Top 15 in Fort Worth.) Bill keeps alerting us about the Neil Sedaka on RCA which is a smash in Chicago, Top 10 in the California barometer cities and finally busted in Miami after weeks of play and a hurricane in the middle.

I think at this point it is important that someone like myself say a few words about Bill Gavin and the fantastic service he is performing in the art of radio station programming.

By reading the Gavin Report each Monday, programmers are alerted to tomorrow's hits with a fantastic percentage of accuracy. Occasionally one hears a big or little PD say that he never reads this Report and can get along very well without it. The most successful radio men in the business will agree with me that such people are either liars, second in a two pop station market, the only station in the market or running an operation like WABC that plays only the top 30 records on the charts. Since the key stations in the country (large and small markets) report to Bill, he gets the initial sales and request breakouts as soon as they occur.

Many of Bill's correspondents have moved up and up in the field, taking the Gavin programming concepts with them from station to station. You'd be surprised how many PD's have "unlimited phone call privilege to San Francisco" written into their (Continued on page 24)

'Fu Manchu' Scares Up Claridge Biz

New Ganim - Slay Duo Hot Via 1st Disk By Rockin' Ramrods

Not that many years ago Fu Manchu was the feared archvillain of many a nightmare. Today, courtesy of the fastrising Claridge Records single, "Don't Fool with Fu Manchu," the only thing Fu might do is steal a teen-ager's heart.

What's more, this record by the Rockin' Ramrods is the first released by the newly joined team of Dennis Ganim and Frank Slay who have expanded their activities to include the new Claridge label; an artist management firm, R.B.E. Management; and a film production company, Canterbury Enterprises, Inc.

Claridge will join forces with Seven Arts Pictures, producers of the new film "The Face of Fu Manchu," to promote the picture and disk—"Don't Fool with Fu Manchu, 'cause if you do he'll make a fool of you...", the latter warns.

Slay produced the deck, adding "I'll be producing 25% of our product. We're setting up deals with some of the top indie producers around, too. We already have Hutch Davie and Neil Galligan, Barry Levine plus Jay Darrow, who produced 'That Kind of Love,' by Diana King, which was released with 'Fu Manchu.' I've virtually quit writing songs—that was my big stick for years. There are only so many hours in a day, and I'm kind of lazy."

Ganim interjected that he was trying to get his partner to record a piano album, a skill

Slay has not been practicing commercially for a couple of years. Former Kapp employee Ganim stated, "I've sold too many Roger Williams albums not to know there's a market for Frank's talent."

But the Claridge activities are Slay's main concerns right now. Ganim will be busy functioning mainly with the record company and artist management firm. "We'll be primarily a pop single label," he said. "If it makes sense to have some LPs based on singles sales, we'll have them. But we won't be competing with the catalog lines. One company I especially admire is A&M Records—they've done a fantastic job!"

Canterbury Enterprises in association with British Lion has just finished filming a fulllength color motion picture entitled "East Is East." The picture stars newcomer Casey Paxton who sings the title song and whose record will be released on Claridge shortly before the film. Other Claridge stars featured include the Rockin' Ramrods and the Vagrants. Major music personalities in the film include Freddie & the Dreamers, Peter & Gordon, the Bachelors, Freddy Cannon. Millie Small, the Merseybeats and the Chiffons. Three major disk jockeys have cameo roles: Baltimore's Bob Foster, Hy Lit of WIBG Philadelphia and Arnie Ginsberg of WMEX Boston.

Canterbury's next projects are a film called "Casket For Candy" to be shot entirely in

Jones, Fat Daddy and Burke Johnson all clue me that "My Heart Belongs to You," Supremes, is a smash! The record has a strong Dionne, Warwick, Bert Bacharach-Hal David flavor . . . "Love Makes Me Do Foolish Things," Martha & Vandellas, is a giant with Fat Daddy and Georgie Woods . . . "Cleo's Back," Jr. Walker, is a giant and has broken pop, and had to be re-issued by Tamla: while Jr. Walker's "Tune Up" is out of sight

pop at WIBG, Philadelphia . . . "Fork in the Road," Smokey Robinson and Miracles is big request, and so on. By the way, the new Miracles is out, and I wonder if I'm alone in feeling that the top side is "Since You Won My Heart"?

I noted that George Lorenz wrote in "Behind the Scenes" that R&B stations would fade into the background since a few pop stations lately have hired a token few Soul Brothers to play Top 30, Dylan and Beatles et al. I disagree. (And George is making much noise in Buffalo playing R&B on his FM station. Jocko bought WIKI, Richmond, and is making much noise in a short period of time.) Me, I see the R&B stations getting even stronger general market ratings! And they are doing this with one hand tied behind their backs, because the R&B stations all started from scratch as marginal operations with weak signals at the far right hand side of the dial . . . Most have, or had, small budgets for "promotion and sound," and low rate cards.

Today's R&B stations have top level modern format and production; sensational personality djs with unique individuality; and the aforementioned flexibility in finding the most potent hot wax around (even "B" sides and LP cuts). As long as pop stations are so relatively rigid in programming, use dis who are carbon copy "good guys"; eschew "soul sounds" that get into the guts of the public and involve people emotionally at an adult, sophisticated, level; and are so relatively rigid and slow in going on records, the R&B guys will have no problems!

Jimmy Bishop and LeBaron Taylor both feel the hot side of the new Coasters is "Crazy Baby." Jimmy agrees with me on the "B" side of the Miracles . . . Almost everyone agrees that two new hit sides are: "Help Wanted," Volcanos, Arctic (which went on WIBG) and "Give Her to Me," Jimmy Burns, Tip Top (which looks good at WVON) and is Wil Rudd's pick in Cleveland . . . Ernie Durham likes "That's It," Z. Z. Hill, Kent (I like it, too); whereas, LeBaron Taylor in Detroit likes the new J. J. Barnes, "Please Let Me In." The new Edwin Starr is a smash according to Jimmy Bishop-title is "Back Street" . . . "Peace of Mind," Vontastics, St. Lawrence, is new blast on WVON and already busted in Chicago. They're on the Jerry Butler, "Just for You," VJ. WVON new pick: "Slingshot," Jackie Beaver, Chess . . . Everyone is glad Ike & Tina Turner are back with Sue and agree "Two is a Couple" is a smash for Juggy . . . The new Volcanos selling in Detroit, Philadelphia, Baltimore . . . E. Rodney Jones reports in the Winners' Circle: Kim Weston (which is a giant all over); Walter Jackson; Ray Pollard; Marvin Gaye; Arthur Prysock; the flip of the Supremes; and "I Found a Love," Bobby

England utilizing artists from the Claridge roster, plus a syndicated TV series, "Tops 'N Tunes."

"We're close to a deal with Warner Brothers on the TV show," Slay confided. "We did a pilot with dj Jerry Blavat, and Warners has an option on it. It's a show we feel will appeal to all age groups, something on the order of the old 'Hit Parade' only with different artists each week."

Claridge Music, Inc., will be an integral part of the organization at 250 W. 57th St., too.

On Contract List

Although both Ganim and Slay were quick to say they didn't want to overburden the new label with artists, they have so far contracted—besides the Rockin' Ramrods, Diana King, Casey Paxton and the Vagrants-Tony McKay, Joey and the Continentals and Chip Tyler, the latter just recording his very first record, for Claridge release (produced by Davie and Galligan), "Sweet, Sweet Lovin'."

"We want to be selective with our product," Slay added. "Some say throw it against the wall and hope, but that's not our philosophy."

"Right," said Ganim. "If we only bring out 15 or 20 records a year, that'll be okay . . . as long as they're hits."

XYZ Sells Cannon Masters to WB

Frank Slay, President of XYZ Records, has announced that XYZ has repurchased all of the Freddy Cannon masters from Swan Records in Philadelphia and resold them to Warner Bros. Records. Cannon masters include such hits as "Tallahassee Lassie," "Way Down Yonder In New Orleans" and "Palisades Park."

The earliest Cannon records were produced by Slay and Crewe for XYZ. All of the latter Cannon records were produced by Slay including 'Abigail Beecher" for Warner Bros. Cannon's current hit record, "Action," the only hit not produced by Slay, was recorded on the West Coast by Dick Glasser.

Hall Visits London, Seeks Closer Ties

NEW YORK - Tony Hall, British Decca's promo chief, is in the states, headquartered at London Records. During his two week stay, Hall will see Decca's New York licensors and will fly to the West Coast, Nashville and Detroit to visit several indies, most of which are represented by British Decca in countries outside of the United States.

"While I'm here," says Hall, "I want to meet as many record men and artists' managers as possible. I want to tie in promo activities between British Decca and our associated American companies much more closely. 

contracts when they take over a new station. That is why I often wonder why some of the smaller market stations don't tie in with Gavin. Either they don't have the keen competition found in the big cities, or a few PD's have an insecure idea that the Gavin Report is a crutch that reflects on a man's ability to "ear pick" ALL the new hits.

The Report is not Gavin's opinion on records, but IS a synthesis of what his correspondents have "proven out" ON THE AIR. A number of people including myself report to Bill several times a week, and we either give Bill legit reports or we are dropped.

I am often asked for advice on how to make it in this business. It's easy, brother-get with Bill Gavin. Look at who is on his team. Not a loser in the bunch.

Learn a lesson from the R&B guys who are flexible and try "B" sides. The hit request side of the Martha & Vandellas is "Love Makes You Do Foolish Things."

"Never Had It So Good," Ronnie Milsap, Wand, is big in Atlanta. Ronnie is from there, and is quite a talent . . . Much good music play on "Remember When," Wayne Newton . . . There are some important picks on "Times They Are A Changing," Pete Antell, Bounty; "My Place," Crystals, and "Sand & Sea," Lena Horne, both on U.A.

Atlantic Records has re-serviced their Dial release of "I Love Country Music," Jack Barlow, as it has hit Top 20 in the C&W charts, and has shown good pop potential.

"Close Your Eyes," 3 Degrees, Swan, is a smash in Philadelphia, busted in Hartford and ready to bust with Arnie Ginsburg, WMEX, Boston, and KDKA, Pittsburgh. As a ballad it takes a little time, but this Richie Barret song and production is a guaranteed winner. Dig the flip: "Gotta Draw the Line."

There are a tremendous number of picks on "Don't Talk To Strangers," Beau Brummels, Autumn, like in Hartford; Denver; L.A.; San Francisco and the world. It's a smash. Meanwhile, The Mojo Men are "Dancing" for sales in Nashville; New York City at WMCA; California up and down the Coast and hi, Tom, Bob and Abe the Beard.

As Bill Gavin keeps telling you, the Hit side of the Patty Duke is "Say Something Funny" . . . Many picks on the new Turtles, "Let Me Be," and what else is new . . . Good play on "Hoopie," John Golden, W.B. . . . With a big pick at WQXI, Atlanta and Top 5 Sales in Birmingham, "Sandy," Ronnie & Daytonas, will be the sleeper of the year . . . "Trouble With a Woman," Kip & Ken, Crusader, is another big sleeper. A smash in Chicago, it has spread to Milwaukee (WRIT); Detroit (WXYZ); and Charlotte (WAYS) . . . Sacramento sez the English hit, "Zorba," Jorgen Ingman, Atco, is also an American hit.

"Where Have All the Flowers Gone," Johnny Rivers, Imperial, broke in Seattle, is a Pick at WHK, Cleveland and WIBG, Philadelphia and many others. It looks good . . . Gavin's "First In the Country Tip" two weeks ago on "May the Bird of Paradise Fly Up Your Nose," Little Jimmy Dickens, Columbia, broke in Atlanta and elsewhere and is a Pick at WIBG (and the big inside joke among the djs there) and it looks like a winner; as does "Hide Your Love," The Silkie, on Fontana . . . "Roses and Rainbows," Danny Hutton, HBR, is large in Detroit . . . "Secretly," Lettermen, Capitol, has done 8,000 in the Pennsylvania territory without WIBG . . . "Take Me In Your Arms," Kim Weston, Tamla, is a smash, believe me. #1 R&B already in many markets, it is GONE pop in Philadelphia, Baltimore-Washington, Detroit, Chicago, etc. Look Out!

"Road Runner," Gants, Liberty, now Top 10 in Miami and large in Philadelphia. Speaking of WIBG, Dean Tyler has gone on the following records: "Heartbeat," Gloria Jones, Tower; Little Jimmy Dickens; "Sinner Man," Trini Lopez, Reprise; "Help Wanted," Volcanos, Arctic; "I Miss You So," "Little Anthony, DCP; "We Must Be Doing Something Right," Joan Moody, Sylvia; "World is Round," Rufus Thomas, Stax; "Can You Hear Me," Lee Dorsey, Amy; "This Can't Be True," Eddie Holman, Parkway; and, naturally, Marvin Gaye; Sam the Sham; Rolling Stones; Jan & Dean. Well, I can only come to the conclusion that Great Britain is so terribly British after all! You see the phone hasn't stopped ringing the whole week, so much so that I wish I HADN'T paid last month's bill (or do you say account?). Each time I expect to hear the delicate English tones of some individual coming out with "Hello, old chap, spiffing day and all that sort of thing, isn't it?", but a voice of pure Americanism, sounding as though he might have a deal by which I can purchase the Empire State purrs, "Hi, Alan, I'm in town, baby, and I gotta see ya 'bout somethin'."

Well, the visitors have picked the right week, anyway—it's been sunshine all the way (what's all this South of France bit about sunshine, etc.?) but of course, there's always the problem of how do I entertain these visitors? Shall I take them to Trafalger Square where, no doubt, some gentlemen will take their photo as they feed the pidgeons, or does my visitor hate anything nautical or animal? Shall I take him to the Tower of London, or does he hate the sight of blood? Shall I take him to Windsor to see the famous castle, or has he just been prosecuted in New York a week earlier for not paying the rate demands on his country cottage?

A Great Problem

You see, it's a great problem . . . but I have it: jabb, that's what the man must have, jazz, and if he doesn't like it, then he can jolly well sit through it and make out like he does! So, I take him to London's famous Covent Garden Market, past the Covent Garden opera house and we come upon a bright light that looms out of the darkness indicating "Annie's Room." That lovely Annie Ross was there in person, too, and who was the star guest? I'll tell you who the star guest was, it was Joe Williams, and, daddy, was he rather comparable to dynamite, so much so, that we sat through for the second show. Patience had its reward, because it just happened that in the audience was a certain Count Basie boy, Bill Henderson, who joined Joe and they went to town, much to the pleasure and sheer delight of one Paul Jones of the Manfred Manns. (You must hear the new Manfred Mann single, "If You've Gotta Go, Go Now"-I think it's a certain No. 1). There was only one thing I didn't understand: I thought that you went to a jazz club to hear the jazz and its great personality, but all the time that Joe Williams was in action, there was a little bald man who kept talking in a loud voice to his colleagues. He kept pouring whisky into his glass, and everytime Joe finished a number, this little man jumped off his seat, stood full length and applauded with the vigor of an elephant having a mud bath. But, of course, I don't know very much about jazz really, and I guess that when you're the complete jazz convert, you just talk all the time, keep filling your glass and then jump up on your feet and behave like a lunatic-only because you've heard the record anyway!

Records . . . that's right; I knew there was something else I had to say. Into that British Top 50: James Brown and "Papa's Got a Brand New Bag" . . . Wilson Pickett's "In the Midnight Hour" . . . Sandie Shaw's "Message Understood" (Sandie's in Germany at the moment and goes from there to the Olympia in Paris.)

And if Joe Williams makes the Top 20 I know some who'll get TERRIBLY excited!

Nancy Sinatra's Career Into Busiest Period

NEW YORK—Early Friday morning a week or so ago, Nancy Sinatra dropped by fresh from a late night TV taping of "Hullabaloo" but couldn't have looked fresher or been sweeter.

The gal is extremely excited about her Reprise single of "So Long Babe," which is appearing on the Record World "Coming Up" chart, and was anxious to talk about it.

She wants everyone to know that Lee Hazlewood wrote the song and produced the session. Reprise considers it a very important cut. The success of the deck, Nancy avowed, however, may not mean an album directly following. She feels that an album should be more than a hit song plus 11 others. She wants an album to have an overall sound just like a single and will be trying to get it with any album release she has. She hinted that it may be one or two singles from now before a Nancy Sinatra album appears.

Busy Months Ahead

The demand for one, however, might step up that release date, since Nancy is going to be seen and heard increasingly over the next few months. The other week "Marriage on the Rocks," in which Nancy appears on the screen with her father (Frank, if anybody is that far behind the times) for the first time, opened and Nancy got good reviews for her acting. She has already filmed a cameo bit in "The Oscar," which'll also have dad and Tony Bennett in it. Other feature films are being set, too.

(Nancy also appears briefly as a character in Sammy Davis' just released and widely acclaimed book, "Yes, I Can," in another scene with her father that takes place at Disneyland.)

Also, Nancy has the above mentioned "Hullabaloo" coming and, she said, as the single becomes more popular, she'll accept more TV offers. Up to now, she has turned down a number

of appearances because she felt she was wanted for her Sinatra name, rather than for her abilities.

"And I resent that," she said, "but now I know people want me for a particular record. They know what I can do, they like it."

Big Record Star Overseas

Nancy mentioned that a number of foreign countries also know what she can do, and she finds herself quite a record star in Germany, Italy and Japan, to name three far-off shores.

Although she is well known in these lands, Nancy has done very little touring because she dislikes tours and the road as a steady routine. For this reason a night club act seems to be out for her. "It's very hard for a woman to get along in the night club world. It changes you and I don't like it."

But this doesn't mean that Nancy isn't interested in her career. "I'm on my own now and I have to earn a living." (Nancy's support from her father is evidently to be meted out only for medical expenses and education and only then through a stringently guarded trust fund.) "And I'm doing what I know how to do," she says.

"What I'd really like to do," Nancy smiled, "is raise babies."

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
