
Dionne Pioneers in South, Wows N.Y.C. in Copa Debut

The experience Dionne has gained on these tours ("Where do I get the energy? I don't know. They just wind me up and on I go!") has obviously benefitted her act. Although soft-spoken in person (and even during the mild patter of her act), Dionne can belt with the best, really shows an audience what soul is all about. What she has never had the chance to reveal before, however, in her too-brief TV guestings or on record, is her warmth and, especially, her humor. She does a delightfully droll rendition of a number called "L-O-V-E" ("During rehearsals I fooled around with the song, and the boys in the band said if I didn't do it that way when I opened, they were walking out. Moreover, by stipulation between the attorneys for Capitol and KHJ, KHJ has agreed that its officers, agents, servants and employees shall not offer, permit, or make available for broadcast, directly or directly, nor broadcast by radio or any other means, all or any portion of the new Beatles' album, "Sergeant Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band," or any selections derived therefrom, until authorized by Capitol to do so, or until the hearing set for May 10, 1967, on an "order to show cause."

Col Opens New Chicago Service Center May 8

Columbia Records' Chicago Service Center will move into its new headquarters on Monday, May 8.

The new service center is located at 5410 W. Touhy Avenue in the Edens Industrial Park in Skokie, Ill., a suburb of Chicago. The one-story custom designed structure is the most modern of Columbia Records' service centers.

The new facility is more than twice as large as the old Chicago service center. It will house sales and shipping installations, as well as facilities for phonograph repairs — the first such operation within a Columbia service center.

Among the staff members who will occupy the new premises are Columbia's North Central Regional Manager; the Operations Manager for the Chicago Service Center; the Sales Manager, Columbia Records, Chicago; Field Promotion Managers; Manager, Special Markets; Chicago Field Credit Manager, and Date Records' Mid-West Regional Promotion Manager.

Among Markets Serviced

The new Chicago service center will render greatly improved working facilities and substantially increased space. Situated within commercial trucking zones, the new facility offers easy access to all major roads. Among the markets serviced by the new center are Illinois, Minnesota, Iowa, Nebraska, North and South Dakota, and parts of Indiana and Montana.

Columbia Records inaugurated the unique and highly efficient service center operations some years ago. Presently, the label has in-plant service centers at the Pitman, N. J., Terre Haute, Ind., and Santa Maria, Calif. manufacturing plants, as well as regular service centers in Chicopee Falls, Mass., Cleveland and Dallas.

The negotiations and planning for the Chicago service center were handled by Warner N. Pagliara, Director, Administration, Columbia Records Sales in conjunction with Milton Maier, Director, CBS Real Estate and the CBS Real Estate department.

Composer Dead

Geoffrey O'Hara, composer, author, lecturer and writer of "K-K-K-Katy," died recently in Mount Park Hospital, St. Petersburg, Fla. after a brief illness. He was 85.

In 1913 Geoff O'Hara wrote the song, "Your Eyes Have Told Me So," for Enrico Caruso. This was followed by "Tennessee," for Al Jolson, and established O'Hara as a songwriter. He became a Charter Member of the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) in 1914, and served the performing rights society as a director from 1942 to 1945.

O'Hara leaves his widow, Constance; a son, Hamilton, a CBS sound engineer who lives in Mamaroneck, New York; and a daughter, Nancy.





Mrs. Dolin will continue as head of Newsmakers, maintaining her office and staff in Chicago, as well as an office in the Barrington Records Building.



Mr. Wonderful Bows

The greater Metropolitan area of New York this past week welcomed a new club, in Newark, N.J. The club's shingle is Mr. Wonderful.

It is a plush, modern, warm and well-appointed bistro that should become within a short period of time one of the important music rooms in the East.

But this is what Lonnie Stanley, the 33-year-old owner, is insisting.

He has booked a number of jazz acts along with his contemporary acts and feels very strongly that a jazz act can be part of a bill that will feature Miriam Makeba, Jerry Butler, Marvin Gave and others.

And the young Mr. Stanley just might possibly be right.

It has always been a known fact that all jazz fans do not restrict themselves to the muted stylings of Miles or the emotionalism of Coltrane. There are many who can put down the meanest Boo-Galoo in the world and others can improvise around the Boston Monkey or any of the other new dance steps. And furthermore, there are many R&B and rock and roll artists whose albums occupy a coveted position in the jazz libraries of some of the greatest collectors.

Personal Preference

Over the past, the urge to classify has had clubs being represented as jazz clubs, rock clubs, etc. However, I'd rather hear some good rock 'n' roll and swinging grits as opposed to some of the lukewarm and disjointed performances I've seen put down by members of the jazz academy.

The versatile format in booking also covers the couple where one member might pos-

sibly be "in" and the other "out."

Br. Mr. Wonderful has also attempted to solve the problem of booking jazz acts in the kind of atmosphere that is conducive for them to perform at their peak.

Too long have jazz acts been forced to play rooms that can be classified as "arm pits." And the general arrogance of the owners are certainly of no help.

It is refreshing to see an owner of a club who finally does not have to be told and forced by a contract to have a first-rate piano properly tuned.

It is welcome to find an owner who is aware of sound and the need for musicians to be heard not only in front of the stage but in the furthest room.

Heard in All Parts

In addition, Stanley has built a club where the show can be heard in all parts of the club including the rest rooms. Now that's really taking care of business

And if one would like to eat, he has put in a first-rate kitchen with a menu that sparkles with tasty food.

And lastly, if one wants to eat, one can see the food.

Since the club opened, he has booked a 10-piece band composed of leading jazz musicians in the New York-Newark area. The band is led by little Johnny Coles, long one of the finest trumpeters in the business. With this kind of group, the singers need have no fear that the band will not be able to play the book.

Singers often tell the story of being booked into clubs and after hearing the group employed to back them, discarded their charts and routine and then asked the band, what tunes they knew. This is the only way they could complete the engagement.

Mr. Wonderful may just possibly start a trend. Too long has it been easy for the jazz club owners to say that it can't be done. Perhaps others across the country will direct their attention to Mr. Wonderful and watch what will happen. If it doesn't happen, it will not be because young Stanley did not take care of business. He has at least made the step.

This past week, he brought

in Roy Meriwether, the Columbia recording artist, whose three albums have quietly been racking up substantial sales.

Roy, a steller member of the gospel-soul-funk school of jazz, made an impressive debut in the East. Fresh from an exciting engagement at the Bohemian Caverns in Washington, Roy is making the jazz listeners of New York sit up and take notice.

And in the few months we have watched him, his growth and development is nothing short of remarkable. He swings, he burns and he cooks! The group makes a most impressive and class appearance, and they are not afraid to entertain.

With Roy, Miriam Makeba brought her African excitement to the room and, as always, taught us that music is a universal language. One does not need to know the language in order to hear the message. There is no doubt that Miriam Makeba in the next year will emerge one of the really great artists in the business.

In weeks to come, Jimmy Smith is booked plus a number of other jazz artists.

Open Session By Brute Force

Columbia recently opened to the press a special recording session featuring the label's new singing personality, Brute Force. The session took place in Columbia's Studio B at 49 East 52 Street on April 18 from 7 to 9:30 p.m.

Brute Force recorded his newest composition, "Hello Moscow," which is expected to appeal to a global market and is directed, especially, toward the youth behind the Iron Curtain. Brute Force speaks Russian and feels that the young people in Eastern Europe cannot fail to be moved upon hearing the Russian language set to the American pop sound.

"Hello Moscow" was produced by John Simon, Columbia Records Popular A and R, who has indicated that advance copies of it, were given to the Voice of America for overseas distribution. In addition, the record will be released by various CBS affiliates and subsids throughout the world.

Bernie Block Reveals Plans For More R&B, a Jazz Series

By DOUG McCLELLAND

NEW YORK — "There have been samplers before, but never one to encompass 10 such renowned jazz artists until now," said Bernie Block, Blue Note Records' National Sales Manager, in announcing the excellent initial reception for the "Gems of Jazz" limited edition LP.

The album, containing early performances by Horace Silver,

Art Blakey, is geared as a promotional package and sells for \$2.49, mono and stereo.

"Many new retail outlets are beginning to expose themselves to jazz product," Block went on. "And with an LP like 'Gems of Jazz,' I feel the whole Blue Note catalog becomes more important in stores. We've arranged mailings, window displays, browser divider cards, ad mats, merchandising kits, instore promotion pieces, as well as national advertising.

"We want to get the maximum exposure possible for artists involved in the promotion. We recently had a very big promotion for Horace Silver on the West Coast while he was appearing at Shelly's Mannehole. The club was decorated with albums."

Business and Art

Continued Block: "The jazz artist is beginning to realize that his field is as much a business as an art. They're becoming more promotion-minded, and also are more interested in getting back into the studio. Plus, we're currently going into about a dozen radio station promotions in key markets—they play a minute and a half of the 'Gems' LP, explain that this is the first time a package of this type has been available at this price, tell where it can be bought locally and then give plugs to the catalog."

Block adds that when a "good music" station begins to program non-esoteric jazz, calls

come in from listeners they've never had before. "The stations aren't losing; they add on to their listening audience.

"What many manufacturers don't realize is that they must follow-up the initial investment on a jazz recording, must be in contact with the local FM or jazz stations and jockeys."

Profiles' Series Coming

Block reported that Blue Note is trying "with every record we're releasing to plan a concept for future." In September, Blue Note is starting a "Profiles in Jazz" series, about which more later. All Block will reveal now is that the series will be comprised of a dozen or more three-LP editions.

Furthermore, he stated, "Due to the expanding market of jazz today, we're going to be expanding our sound. Without detracting from our jazz sound, Blue Note will add a new, expansive sound that will be a plus factor for the label. We will also become more involved in the R&B field. The line between rhythm and blues and jazz isn't that wide, as we've seen with Stanley Turrentine's 'Rough and Tumble' LP. We're experiencing much greater R&B sales and play than ever before, and I think this is a direction to follow.

"Singles will be released strictly on the merit of the al-

Right Marketing Needed

"The jazz academy has some of the most brilliant A&R producers in this business, but for all their brilliance (and I've always believed it must be in the grooves), the wax must have the right marketing or it will all go down the drain. Through careful analysis, we're going to make sure our releases will not flood the market. Careful coordination is very important in this business," Block asserted.

Block added that the increasing success of jazz in general—and Blue Note Records in particular — has been especially gratifying to the label's dedicated founders (in 1939), Alfred Lion and Francis Wolff, "who would never release a record unless it was letter-perfect, and get a bigger kick now seeing jazz product sell to all kinds of music lovers."

Larry Weiss has been named Professional Manager of Saturday Music, it was announced by Tom Catalano, Vice President of the Crewe Group of Companies. Under the exclusive long-term contract, Weiss, in addition to his duties as Professional Manager, will contribute his talents as a songwriter.

Are Hit R&B Lyrics Hits To a Pop Audience?

Both "Nothing Takes the Place of You." Toussaint McCall, and "8 Men, 4 Women," O. V. Wright, Backbeat, are giant R&B smashes. They are obviously done in a musical form that is very much on the blues side. However, they are hits with adults because of their lyric content. The melody of either song is not a particularly strong factor in their impact. Both have been proven as strong pop hits in a number of key markets. If they were done in a pop musical form by a well known adult pop artist, the lyrics would have the same hit sound. Shouldn't top 40 stations consider putting these two records on their adult 9 to 3 p.m. playlist along with Roger Williams, Ed Ames, Vic Damone? Perhaps a few top 40 stations will try them on "Housewives Request" and be pleasantly surprised to find these hits please ALL listeners.

By the same token, the lyrics of the R&B smash, "Together," Intruders, Gamble, is a proven giant with all teens in the city of philadelphia, where sales are nearly 25,000. WIBG has played it heavily and WFIL has not touched it. Dean Tyler and WIBG have lived with this market for many years, and they are EXPERTS in the science of programming. This kind of record should be played pop in any city after 3 p.m. Any time non-raunchy records sell from 100,000 to 350,000 copies, they have to have programming significance either before or after 3 p.m. Hit song lyrics are not that common or easy to come by, that a programmer locked in a rating battle can afford to keep them off his airways on the basis merely of an R&B musical "form."

"California Sunshine Girl," Shackelfords, LHI (sales in Baltimore, Dallas, Chicago), is getting tremendous promotion, as it went on WMEX & WRKO, Boston; WIXY, Cleveland; WOHO & WTOD, Toledo; WTAC; WIBG; KOL; KOMA; Tulsa; WNOE & WTIX, New Orleans. Corection: It is WEAM, Washington, that broke "Still In Love With You Baby," Kitchen Cinq, LHI. It is close to 10,000. It sold in S.F., Miami, Detroit.

Tip: Watch for "Gonna Get Away," the Fantasia, Amy, produced by Kama Sutra. This could be a top 5 record!

It looks like "Shake a Tail Feather," James and Bobby Purify, can make it as a Top 10 HUGE record. It is well on its way to 300,000 sold . . . Mitch Ryder is well over ¼ million. Comment: So what is R&B and what is pop in today's market. Thus, with your hits, the line of demarcation is almost invisible . . . Joe Vann has left CKLW, Detroit, after being mid-morning man for many years.

News from Scepter

Scepter has picked up the #7 Houston smash, "99th Floor," Movin' Sidewalks, and the Louisiana hit, "These Were Songs," Rod Bernard . . . Now that they switched to the "B" side of the B. J. Thomas, "I Can't Help It," many pop stations have gone with the record.






