Jerome S. Hyams, Executive Vice President and General Manager of Screen Gems, Inc., announces an executive realignment and major expansion program for the music publishing and record divisions jointly owned by Columbia Pictures Corp. and Screen Gems.

Emil La Viola and Lester Sill have been named Vice Presidents in Charge of the Screen Gems-Columbia Music Division and Colgems Record Division, respectfully, Hyams said. Each has been a vice-president of his division since early in 1966.

At the same time, Hyams announced that Irwin Robinson, formerly attorney for both divisions, has been named Director of Business Affairs and General Attorney for all Screen Gems-Columbia music publishing and record operations.

Hyams said: "Our recent success in the music area results from the efforts of many creative people working in conjunction with talented and experienced music executives and to those unique creative opportunities which Screen Gems and Columbia Pictures are able to make available to our outstanding roster of top composers and lyricists." He cited the recently acclaimed successes of the music and records of "The Monkees" and "Born Free," which were developed in conjunction with the popular television series and film

Don Kirshner Exits Screen Gems - Col Post

Charges 'Harassment'

NEW YORK-Don Kirshner walked out of his top Screen Gems-Columbia pubbery post last week charging "harassment" and breach of contract.

He said the situation arose following his expulsion as head of Colgems Records (for whom he had supervised The Monkees) and his subsequent \$35 million law suit, also for breach of contract, against all parties concerned.

The announcement confirmed trade suspicion that Kirshner's working for a company he was suing might prove touchy.

Why Coast Flower Music **Grows Slowly in East**

By DAVE FINKLE

On the West Coast flower music is the thing; but on the East Coast everything is not coming up roses, at least as far as West Coast flower musicians are concerned.

Companies and artists who are selling flower decks in large quantity in the West are grumbling about their reception in the East, where sales and play have been moderate to date.

Ruth Meyers of WMCA-New

York, just back from a short trip to the Coast, explained why the difference in attitude. "Basically, it's the difference between markets," she said. "The flower movement is very big on the Coast, but on the East Coast we're not in the movement business. What carries most of the records on the Coast is what they're about. We'll play a record with a sound that really has it."







Excitement exploded last week with the release of the Bee Gees' first record, "New York Mining Disaster, 1941" on Atco.

Advance air play of the record in Boston, New York, Connecticut and other areas broke the record wide open. In Boston the disk jumped to the

Gees' record was so great that Atco moved up its release schedule by a week. Don Dumont, Atco's Boston distributor, was so excited about the record that he wired the firm as follows:

"Thank you for the greatest record of the year. You have a two-sided smash on the Bee Gees. Instantaneous air play on both sides on WMEX, WBZ, WRKO. You have the next number one record and the next number one group in the country. Congratulations and thank you again."

Both Sides Some Places

In some cities both sides of the record, "New York Mining Disaster, 1941" and "I Can't See Nobody," were getting air play. Youngsters who couldn't remember the title of the song were running into stores and asking for a new record called, "Have You Seen My Wife, Mr. Jones," the first line of the lyric. (Atco will add this subtitle to "New York Mining Disaster, 1941" to make certain no dealer misses the record.)

Meanwhile, in England the Bee Gees' record is enjoying the same success pattern. Disk has jumped way up on the charts there.

The Bee Gees are composed of four young men, Robin, Barry and Maurice Gibbs and Colin Petersen, all under 20, who write their own material. They are managed by Robert Stigwood and Brian Epstein. the joint managing directors of Nems Enterprises. Atco's deal with Nems, which was announced last week, is one of the biggest contracts ever entered into for a new British group by any label. Deal was for \$250,000 for rights to the group's records for the United States.

A huge promotion and ad campaign has already been started by Atco for the Bee Gees. Atco plans for the boys to come to the States sometime in June

Rita's Campaign Just Launched

BARRINGTON, ILL. — Barrington Records' promotion campaign on the label's initial release by Just Rita, "Lullaby"/ "This Must Be Love," began this week with a direct mail teaser campaign to djs nationally.

A die-cut mailing piece with cameo portrait of Just Rita, carrying out the firm's distinctive blue/green label and logo designs, with an imprinted personal hand-written message to jockeys from Just Rita, has been received by djs from coast to coast.

With jockeys interested in making comments about new artists in mind, the firm printed 5,000 special 7-inch inserts for promotion copies showing a photograph of Just Rita, titles of the initial release on one side and a brief profile of the artist on the reverse side. The insert, imprinted on heavy white stock for continuous use, makes information on the artist's background readily available to djs.

The mailing pieces were designed by Eva Dolin, firm's Director of Operations.

Cap Prez Denounces Radio Censorship

LOS ANGELES — Capitol President Alan W. Livingston denounced radio station censorship on KNXT-TV recently.

The statement was in answer to remarks made on the TV station by Bill Stewart, Executive Veep of the McLendon radio stations. That chain recently announced new policies in censoring lyrics.

Livingston said, "Our policy has consistently been not to release anything which we felt was not in the public interest, or could be considered in any way offensive. I think that censorship on the part of the receiving end of the radio station could be extremely dangerous and ill-advised."

He continued, "I think that records, particularly teenage records, are an art form and to censor an art form would be like covering up a nude painting, or censoring literature, or censoring the Broadway theater, or whatever.

"These kids who are writing today's teenage records have somethin.g to say. They represent the viewpoint of the young America and I think that we should listen to them. Whether we agree with them or whether we don't agree with them is not the point."

Livingston went on to decry the problem of reading into lyrics meanings that aren't "Somebody's always there. looking for another meaning that may or may not have been there in the author's mind. But whether it was or wasn't I don't think in any way should influence whether the lyric should be broadcast. Because, if on the surface it is a meaningful artistic lyrical piece of work, that in itself should be sufficient to allow it to be aired."

Stewart, the evening before, in explaining the new McLendon policy of demanding a complete lyric sheet with each disk submitted for airplay, announced the first four records the station had banned. They included "Penny Lane," the Beatles (Capitol); "Let's Spend the Night Together," the Rolling Stones (London); "Sock It to Me, Baby," Mitch Ryder and the Detroit Wheels (Dynovoice); and "Try It," the Standells (Tower).

The first three have fallen off the charts. The Standells release is current.

Livingston's remarks echoed a recent Record World edi-







ceptional talent, capped most recently by the Academy Awards given "Born Free" for its song and score.

In recent months both the music and record divisions of Columbia-Screen Gems have participated in the phenomenal success of "The Monkees" to the point where their three single releases and two albums have hit the top of the charts.

In view of this record of accomplishment and my constant and unremitting efforts in the interests of Columbia-Screen Gems, it was difficult to understand why certain executives of Columbia-Screen Gems saw fit to terminate abruptly my Colgems record contract with those companies. As a consequence of that termination, I instituted a suit in the New York Federal Court.

Since my discharge under the Colgems record contract, these same executives have instituted a program of harassment designed to force me out of the music division by denying my rights to creative management in the music publishing field, rights which were accorded to me in quite explicit terms under my publishing contract. They have now succeeded.

Accordingly, in fairness to my associates, the many writers and artists whom I have attempted to serve, and myself, I have concluded that I can no longer be identified with Columbia-Screen Gems.


I have instructed my attorneys, Edward Bennett Williams and Paul R. Connolly of Washington, D. C., and Jerome Stein of Newark, N. J., to take appropriate steps in the courts to obtain redress for the unwarranted breach by Columbia-Screen Gems of their contractual obligations toward me.



London's Big International Issue Ties in with Tourism

London Records has released 11 new LPs in its International Series. The International grouping constitutes the initial phase of the firm's 35-LP release, which is being issued over the course of the entire month of May in order to obtain peak promotional impact for the widely-diversified new and catalog product.

The International product has been timed to tie in with the traditional late-spring and early-summer crescendo in international travel. In addition to 10 albums which take their places in London's major catalog of international product, the company is releasing the latest edition in its deluxe Global Heritage Series. The package is slated as one of the key items of the current merchandising drive.

Titled "The Exciting Sounds of Le Mans," the recording contains the live sounds of auto racing at Le Mans, France. Narrated by James Tilling, racing authority, the album features interviews with such racing royalty as Graham Hill, among others, and is packed with the roaring motor sounds of the race track as well as background sounds of all sorts. The set is packaged in a colorful, book-fold cover.

Comprehensive Promo Emphasis

The album will receive comprehensive promotional emphasis, including strong trade and cosumer advertising. A special distribution of the album will be made among auto industry executives and leading autoracing personalities, and dealer promotional materials are also being made available.

The 10 other scheduled releases include music from such varied and popular points of tourist interest as Austria, England, Germany, Israel, Italy, Spain, and Latin America.

Among these LPs is a new release by Hildegard Knef, German theater, night club, motion picture and TV star; and a second item titled "German Sing-Along, Vol. II" with maestro Will Glahe.

"The Entertainers" is a musical package of live performances of popular British "pub" songs, recorded in a London pub. Tying in with the current high level of interest in this year's Canadian Centennial celebration and Expo '67 is a new LP by the Black Watch of Canada.

Latin Favorites

From Austria comes a program titled "Romantic Zither Music," while the music of Venezuela is represented by an album by Los Machucambos. A varied program of Latin America favorites comprises "Exitos De Hispano-America," and Italy has contributed a set featuring singer Orietta Berti. NEW YORK—At Town Hall, Friday, May 5, five groovy guys with long hair, "freaked-out" clothes and a "gas" of a sound system blended electric guitars, drums, electric flute and an ingenious rock organ combination with harmonica, beer cans, tambourine, maracas and sundry screams to make music that was far-out and unrestrained.

Their sound has power, guts and thought, making this group and its music "what's happening"! Part of the Now Generation, their following is not made up of the screaming teens who make it impossible to hear what they are idolizing, but rather a discerning group of young "hippies" who prefer merely to listen and "groove" on the way-out sounds.

The Verve/Folkways artists were set up for a live recording session, and among the program's stand-outs were Donovan's "Catch the Wind" and two original ballads, "Alberta" and "Fly Away."

Pop music today is changing so swiftly and exploring so many possibilities of instrumentation, song form and lyric content that those who listen only with the idea of labeling are missing a great deal. As for the open-minded listener, the one for whom each new artist or group is to be taken on its own terms, rather than being instantly categorized, the Blues Project abounds with surprises. —Karen Austin.





The critics were baffled by this film—I predict it will be a hit. Universal Pictures reports the Warner Theatre to be doing the best box office business since 'My Fair Lady' and 'The Family Way.'"

"Privilege" is due to open at the Sutton Theatre, New York, in June with Paul Jones attending the premiere. Meantime, his EP disk of "Privilege" is hitting the U.K. single charts.





London Records has kicked off a new release on Hi Records spotlighting the first LP issue for Jerry Jaye, new artist who is now clicking with his initial single for Hi, "My Girl Josephine."

The bypassing and overlooking of competent black news commentators and disk jockeys who have worked for a period of time at WAOK, we feel, is a flagrant insult to them and to the entire black community of Atlanta. It is but one of the thousands of examples wherein the white establishment attempts to control the lives and environment of black people. In your case, it is a clear example of white controlling the orientation of news and radio programs supposedly geared to the black community. Such action on your part further perpetuates white bossism and the brain washing of our communities.

In behalf of the Student Non Violent Coordinating Committee, I am hereby serving notice on you and your other white bosses at WAOK that we will no longer communicate with your station, respond to press calls nor send press statements to WAOK. Furthermore, we will urge all black people to boycott your station and refuse to listen to your programs or buy products from your sponsors. We intend to take any steps necessary to insure the success of such a boycott until racism and white bossism is completely eliminated at WAOK.



NARA Prexy Wright Calls Collins Letter Unfounded

Convention Still Set for Atlanta

NARA President Ed Wright has brandished as unfounded the letter circulated by NARA Treasurer Scipio Collins stating that the 12th annual NARA Convention would be held in Louisville, Kv.. instead of the announced Atlanta. Ga.

The official NARA Convention, asserted Wright. is still set for the Regency Hyatt Hotel in Atlanta from Aug. 9-13.

In discussing other points made in the letter. Wright said that Collins "has become a dupe for those forces who cannot and refuse to understand that NARA is no longer an organization for the chosen few but an organization that reflects the total interests of more than 500 R & B jocks across the country.

"At a time when R & B jocks are being faced with severe programming problems, and with many stations implementing semi-automated procedures thus reducing the number of available jobs, it is pathetic that we should be forced to give valuable time and news space to counteract the vicious letter filled with deliberate distortations, vilifications and half truths and out and out lies. His letter is an insult and in his insolence, he has attempted to cast doubt on the integrity of the officers and the members of the Board of NARA . . . We will not go into the illegality of his using self-made letterheads bearing the name of NARA.

"He has stated that the New York office was ordered closed. First, since the office opened at Seventh Avenue and 850 \$1,000.00 was placed in escrow to the Herbert Tuttle Management Agency at 157 West 57th Street, the office has never been closed. In addition, had the treasurer paid attention to his duties, he would have discovered that the rent for the suite of offices occupied by NARA has been paid up through March, 1968.

"At no time was the telephone 582-5814/5 ever disconnected. On any given day, an average of 45-60 calls are received relative to NARA business.

"As to the ordering of the office closed, WHO ORDERED IT CLOSED AND WHEN?

"[Collins] said he sent money to Louisville to pay bills. Who authorized him to pay bills,


when he knew a Board meeting was being held to discuss the various convention sites?

"As to the inspection of facilities in Louisville, he was well aware that the hotel in question was unable to accommodate our convention and that the plan was to house our delegates in three separate hotels on the same street.

"Now in regard to the 'small segment of our membership.' [Collins] failed to outline that he as well as three other members sent letters to the New York office explaining that previous commitments would not allow them to attend and indicated their preferences. He also failed to mention that the meeting was authorized by the Chairman of the Board as per his letter dated March 31, 1967."

Continued Wright: "I do not know how a supposedly responsible officer of a disk jockey organization could possibly suggest that promo men use company money and credit cards to influence the playing of records. Certainly this is a







Something Missing

I am aware that each of the gentlemen mentioned above has received his share of honorary degrees, plaques, testimonial dinners and other offerings, but it seems to us that something is missing.

First, I think that President Johnson should take a little time out and invite the three of them to tea at the White House. I am aware that on occasions these magnificent gentlemen have played gigs at the House, but I think it would be a splendid afternoon to see LBJ sitting down with Duke and Count and Pops, just discussing their wonderful years over a brew or two.

Time for Talking

The dispatch would also report that the President intended to speak to the three gentlemen who control the television networks and ask them to set aside some time to do a special just talking to these men and have them to review some of the highlights of their years.

Just as we have seen the various heads of states brought together via the satilite, we could beam their stories all over the world.

Everybody enjoys the music of these men. But I would like to hear Louis talk about his early years. I would enjoy Duke telling us how he walks out on stage and with the drop of a hand takes 16 musicians and molds them into one sound. I would enjoy hearing Basie talk about his relationship with Greddie Green and what took place in Kansas City when he first formed the band.

It would be interesting to find out their reactions to America after a combined 75 or more years of criss-crossing the country and playing in every conceivable room and hall night after night, offering their special brand of music, and what they really think of the musical taste of the country.

It would be an education not only for me but for America, because these men have devoted their lives, their soul and their spirit to keeping alive an art that has never fully developed in its own place of birth.

It would also be interesting to hear them compare the European and Asian audiences with America's.






