Atlantic Awarded 7 **Gold Records**

NEW YORK - Atlantic Records probably set a new high in the record industry last week when the company received certification for seven gold records, five singles and two albums. (The RIAA single record certification is for sales of one million copies; the RIAA LP certification is for sales of \$1 million.)

The Atlantic and Atco single records that earned the RIAA seal include Aretha Franklin's "Respect" (which is now well over a million) and Aretha Franklin's "I Never Loved a Man (The Way I Love You"), both on Atlantic; the Young Rascals "Groovin'" on Atlantic; Mr. Acker Bilk's "Stranger on the Shore" on Atco; and Booker T. & The MG'S "Green Onions" on Stax. The latter two records were orginally released about five years ago and have continued to sell steadily since they were first issued.

Aretha Franklin's Atlantic album, "I Never Loved a Man the Way I Love You," one of the fastest selling LPs of 1967, was certified by the RIAA for sales of over \$1,000.000. The other award winner was Mr. Acker Bilk's "Stranger on the Shore," on Atco, which hit the \$1,000,000 sales mark five years after its original release date.

The gold records for Miss Franklin, two singles and one LP, are a remarkable tribute to the popularity of the singer. It is rare indeed for an artist to follow up a million seller record with another million

seller and to simultaneously come through with a \$1,000,000 selling LP. Aretha's two smash singles, "I Never Loved A Man (The Way I Love You") and "Respect," are her first singles released on Atlantic. Her hit album, "I Never Loved a Man The Way I Love You," is the first LP she has ever made on Atlantic.

Jerry Wexler, Exec VP of Atlantic Records, personally supervised all of Miss Franklin's recordings.

"Groovin'" marks the first RIAA certified million seller for the Young Rascals, as does "Green Onions" for Booker T. & The MG'S, and "Stranger On The Shore" for Mr. Acker Bilk.

Atlantic also has asked the RIAA for certification on the Arthur Conley single, "Sweet Soul Music," on Atco,

MGM Buys Radio Show

NEW YORK-In a unique if not unprecedented move, MGM Records has purchased the one-hour time slot on WABC-FM Saturdays from 6 to 7 p.m. for a primarily rock music show. It is to be called the "MGM Music Factory."

Program, utilizing the records of MGM and subsidiaries (plus, occasionally, a small amount from other labels), kicks off on June 24. MGM A&R staffer (and one-time deejay) Tom Wilson, currently taping material at the Monterey Pop Festival, will be presiding disk jockey on the show. Harvey Cowen, Assistant

Advertising Manager, MGM Records (reporting to Advertising Manager Jack Maher), produces the "MGM Musical Factory." Cowen has been in various phases of the entertainment business for 15 years.

MIDEM 2 **Drive On**

A campaign to achieve vastly expanded American participation in MIDEM 2, the second annual International Record and Music Publishing Market, will begin June 19 with the arrival in the United States of Jean-Claude de Villeroy, International Manager of MIDEM.

MIDEM 2 is to be staged in Cannes, France, next Jan. 29 through Feb. 3, with an anticipated attendance of more than 3,000 publishing and disk people from as many as 40 countries.

Conferring

M. de Villeroy expects to remain in New York through Wednesday (28), after which he will spend two days (29-30) in Nashville and a week (commencing July 3) in Hollywood. He will confer with a host of executives whose companies participated in the first MIDEM earlier this year, and will have appointments with numerous other firms regarding full participation in the forthcoming MIDEM event.

All of de Villeroy's Stateside activities and appointments will be coordinated through the office of Ren Grevatt Associates. official U.S. representatives for MIDEM.

In addition to the whole range of pop music publishing and recording interests identified as key participants last year, MIDEM 2 will also focus on the classical music field. M. de Villeroy and his American colleague, Ren Grevatt, are expected to be in touch with a number of entities at this level of the business.

Ed Sullivan To Columbia

Columbia Records announced the signing of Ed Sullivan to a long term recording contract. Sullivan, one of show business' great impresarios, will

Ron Delsener: Sol Hurok Of **Central Park**

NEW YORK-Who sells records?

Artists? Companies? Radio? Dealers? Ads? Yes. But it doesn't stop there.

Many people help sell records and one is the entrepreneur who gives record acts the concert exposure that sends record buyers into stores the next day.

One of the new breed, a lad becoming increasingly important is Ron Delsener, the Sol Hurok of Central Park, who inaugurated the Rheingold Central Park Festival in Wollman Rink last summer and kicked off this year's new series with a free Barbra Streisand concert in Sheep's Meadow for 100,000 people-of all things.

Delsener, an imaginative fellow, first approached Rheingold (which he calls a "hip" company) with the idea of underwriting a series in the Park last year. They liked the notion, gave him the advance which enabled him to round up a terrific list of performers (The Four Tops crowd reached nearriot proportions) and charge the public one dollar-one buck -\$1-for admission.

Jammed Every Night

The park was jammed five nights a week last year (Monday, Wednesday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday) and the same looks to be true this year with a line-up of 42 nights (60 shows) and artists representing pop, Folk, jazz, country, gospel, youname-it. "The idea is to mix the elements, mix the music, mix the races," Delsener told Record World last week.

Shows are already selling out. The Young Rascals have sold out their shows, for instance. Delsener also has a season

closer up his sleeve for announcement later. The series, right now the big-

gest summer festival in the world in terms of artists participating and duration, doesn't necessarily stop with the series. For instance, the Streisand evening was taped by the girl's production firm, Ellbar, for future TV airing—probably in the spring—as her fourth special under her CBS contract.

And it's likely Columbia will release much of the evening's repertoire as an album to ac-

company the TV show air date. Right now there are no definite plans for live recording at other concerts, but Delsener was of the opinion that future recordings and/or tapings could follow the Streisand "big first."

One of the Delsener aims is to turn the concerts into a movie feature and he's working out the problems right now.

The guy has had offers from other cities to come in and organize local concert series thereabouts. This may be due to the fact that New York's Mayor John Lindsay has let it be known that last year's series seemed to be highly instrumental in cutting down the local crime rate. Right now, Delsener is anxious to do other series but he has found no sponsors ready to pledge the monies needed.

Anxious to Manage

Delsener is also anxious to start managing if he can find the right artist or artists.

In the meantime it's the summer series and then a series of Philharmonic Hall concerts and concerts in Detroit and Boston in the fall and winter. The only one definite right now is a Janis Ian concert Dec. 8.

"It's a matter of chemistry," Delsener said. Chemistry and savvv.

Atlantic Inks Fudge, Ensemble

NEW YORK - Ahmet Ertegun, President of Atlantic-Atco. has signed two new "underground" groups to the Atco label. Groups are the Vanilla Fudge and the New York Rock & Roll Ensemble.

The Vanilla Fudge has been stirring up a lot of excitement on the New York scene with its music. Group, manager by Shelley Finkel and Joe Basile, has built a considerable following in the New York area. First release by the group, "You Keep Me Hangin' On," which was issued last week, looks like it is on the way to the charts. The group's first album is expected to be released in July.

Strong N.Y. Following

The New York Rock & Roll Ensemble has also built a New York following among the young adults. Group has played a number of well-publicized private parties in New York, including the Paris Review soirée held a few weeks ago. Their first Atco release will be out shortly.

The signing of the groups comes hard on the heels of recent signings of a brace of other avant-garde groups for Atco like the Iron Butterfly and the Rose Garden, both from the West Coast.

Wekser comes to Epic after $2\frac{1}{2}$ years at radio station WWRL, where he served as Music Director. His responsibilities included selecting all of the recordings played over this, one of the most influential radio stations in the nation.

Prior to this, Wekser worked for two years in production and engineering at the commercial shortwave radio station, WRVL (Radio New York Worldwide).

Wekser majored in Radio and Television Broadcasting at New York University.



whose jazz arm is the successful Impulse label has activated another label with emphasis on the blues. The new label is "Bluesway," and this week we received two albums of recent recording efforts of two of the masters of the blues song, Jimmy Rushing and Eddie "Cleanhead" Vinson.

Jimmy's album is "Everyday I Have the Blues" (Bluesway).

What is so interesting that in the madness of America with its emphasis on youth, many of the veteran performers, whose **Del Shields**

imagination is as fertile and virile as youth are being bypassed. But Bob Thiele, the head A & R jazz producer for Impulse, is not allowing this to happen.

Jimmy Rushing, whose jazz history goes back to the days of Walter Page, Bennie Moten and Count Basie, was affectionately described by his fans as "Mr. Five by Five." But there was nothing short about his singing

He was possibly the first of the city blue singers. He sang and still does with the warmth of the deep south blues shouters, but also developed a style that encompassed the first sophisticated and city type of blues approach.

Very Musical

Jimmy was very musical in his interpretations. He found no reason to sing loud in order to make up for a lack of musicality, as have some of his peers. He was always at home among the leading jazz instrumentalists in the country.

It is sad that, in our desire to grab onto everything new, we have ignored and bypassed Jimmy Rushing, despite than sporadic efforts over the past few years to recognize him. Even today, he could give lessons to some of the "blues labeled" singers.

Jimmy never had to apologize for the blues. He knew what

ABC-Paramount Records | life was all about and was able to translate the bittersweet experiences into chants of blueslike spirituals.

In this album, the versatile Oliver Nelson has a chance to apply some of his St. Louis roots to a set of swinging charts.

And the guys on the date with Dickie Wells, the veteran trombonist, have a pure ball. This is not a cliché-ridden and plastic - manufactured album. This is good happy swinging blues. And in the presence of a Jimmy Rushing, the guys in the band recognize their roots and pay tribute to the spirit of Jimmy's contributions to jazz.

Clark Terry is the happy punctuator while Grady Tate, emerging as one of the really important drummers on the scene today, applies his tasteful drumming.

The album leads off with a most contemporary tune in "The Berkeley Blues," a treatise on the inhabitants of the university. And the illustrious Congressman whose habitat is Bimini is brought to the fore with "Keep the Faith, Baby.'

Jimmy revives "Everyday I Have the Blues," "Blues in the Dark" and "Baby Don't Tell on Me."

Eddie "Cleanhead Vinson" is represented on "Cherry Red" (Bluesway).

"Cleanhead," who burst on the scene back in the '40s as the alto saxophonist turned blues singer with the classic "Cherry Red," was just about another forgotten blues singer. The Adderleys, Cannonball and Nat Brought him out of his Texas retirement a few years ago when they were active with the Riverside label. Unfortunately, their active participation as producers and talent scouts ended with their association with the label and Eddie slipped back into his Houston retirement.

Now Bob Thiele has again gone to the big state and brought Eddie back for what we hope will be another chance for us to redeem ourselves since the blues seems on the revival.

A Blues Shouter

As opposed to Jimmy, Eddie

is a blues shouter. The years have not diminished his chops and his devil-may-care approach to his singing is still joyous.

As an instrumentalist Eddie was able to use his musicality in his style. He knows how to slur and to slash a note while injecting the sensualness of the blues that seems to be able to communicate as no other music.

Eddie brings back his big hit tune, "Cherry Red," "Juice Head," "Somebody's Got to Go." The other selections in the album should help a number of people to remember Eddie fondly and hope he will stay with us a long time.

The emphasis on the blues may possibly be a healthy sign that Negro people are no longer ashamed of their roots. The return of Eddie Vinson and Jimmy Rushing and the activation of the Bluesway label gives us in the industry some food for thought. We have gone through periods of the fabricated protest songs, and we may decide to look at history and place in its proper perspective, that part of American musical history that is so much Americana

For certainly, the soul of jazz is the blues, and in our willingness to return to the roots, we may begin to acknowledge that Made in America is not so bad after all.






Virtually all manufacturers have offered stereo equipment for a good number of years, and realistically it was only a guestion of time as to when monaural equipment would no longer be necessary," he said.

In adjusting the price of monaural records to that of the stereo level, Maitland believed that "an enormous increase in the purchase of stereo records would be felt by the industry in the near future."

NEW YORK-MGM Records' Johnny Tillotson is obviously a very nice young man with, even more obviously, a very nice young act.

His Copa opening last week proved, furthermore, that Johnny is an eager and now experienced entertainer with the polish of one beyond his 20-odd years. He works hard to keep his audience, taking few breathers and keeping viewers on their toes, too, in a fast, versatile act.

But Johnny's roots, he proudly admits, are in the country, and his current exposure contains plenty of-as he put it-'hayseed" influences. 
