Motown Proof All Peoples Can Work Together: Gordy

The following speech was given by Berry Gordy Jr., President of Motown Record Corp., at the Sunday (27) show in the Roostertail room of the Ponchartrain Hotel in Detroit during the label's recent convention. * * *

I am very happy to have with me the greatest producers that I have ever known in my life, my mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. Berry Gordy, Sr. The music business holds many fine memories for me. The finest of all is probably when I came out with my first record. It was a thing well done up by the Miracles. I came out with this nationally. Smokey Robinson, one of my vice presidents and close friends, encouraged me to go nationally. After three days I got a call from Washington, D.C., and Jim Forrest, who said, "Hey, man, you got a hit!" We sold out 60,000 records after about three months.

After that we did many more records and many more sales and got many more distributors. Today, with any release on a major artist, the sizeable amount of 60,000 is reached within the first three minutes of the sale or release.

Yes, Motown has really come a long way, but this is because of a great group effort by many people to whom we are tremendously grateful. It is unfortunate, however, that one of our driving forces in the early stage of Motown could not

I mean educating the black about the white, the white about the black.

It is more than a pleasure having you here tonight. The Motown distributors, in my opinion, are the finest group of distributors anywhere in the world. Possibly because individually they are fine human beings. Ladies and gentlemen, I am very proud to have all of you in our family.

Motown Meet **First Class** Label Writes Over \$4,000,000 At Lavish First Convention

DETROIT - Motor City became Fun City recently when Motown Record Corp. held its first national convention Aug. 25-28 at the Ponchartrain Hotel for one of the most lavish, funfilled trade get-togethers within memory.

"Motown Showcase '68' ("The Sound of Young America") was the title of the meet which clearly was designed to show the firm's appreciation to the distributors for their efforts on behalf of Motown through the years.

The event, which saw Motown issuing its largest album release to date (15), also saw Motown doing just over \$4,000,-000 in business, close to a record for the number of LPs. Turn-out - including distributors, trade press and wives (latter were made specifically welcome) - numbered around 150. Klein Mulls Merging Cameo With His Companies

NEW YORK — Allen Klein, controlling stockholder of Cameo-Parkway Records, Inc., has announced that he is exploring the possibility of merging Cameo-Parkway with all companies which he directly, or indirectly, owns.

Klein is President of Allen Klein, Inc., which he describes as an entertainment and inevstment company with annual volume of about \$10-million. Klein & Co. is wholly owned by Klein. His companies do business in many phases of the entertainment world. These include investments, talent management, record manufacturer and distribution, motion picture production and music publishing, among others.

Cameo-Parkway, whose shares are traded on the American Stock Exchange, is a Philadelphia-based producer of records and a distributor. Its common shares rose \$2.75 last Friday and \$4.87 Monday to reach a record high of \$29.87.

Monday morning's (10 to 12) meeting did Motown get down to business.

Rolled Out Red Carpet

In the meantime, the red carpet was rolled out for conventioneers. Upon arrival at Detroit's Metropolitan Airport, visitors were greeted by their Motown travel director, "The Man in the Red Coat," who ushered them into limousines and took care of all luggage and accommodation problems. Friday evening saw a reception and dinner in the Versailles Ballroom ("A Night in Paris"), featuring gendarmes, mademoiselles and French cuisine. Then, on to the Plaza Room and action à la Las Vegas, including gambling with special Motown currency plus prizes.

Barney Ales, Motown Vice President, made the opening address on Friday, keeping it very brief (as did all other speechmakers throughout the weekend). He introduced the executive Motown staff. Ales also stated: "We feel here at Motown we have created new dimensions in the world of R&B, because we have worked for world-wide acceptance."

Saturday brought breakfast at the Hunt Club Room, with a typical English hunt breakfast served. Off to the races next at the MRA Track, featuring "mad money" enabling convention-goers to pick a winner in seven races. That night at the hotel Mexico was the motif, including a dinner and Motown's Tijuana Brass-type entertainment.

Sunday Brings Highlight

Perhaps the highlight of the festivities was Sunday. Following an afternoon cruise on the Detroit River, with lunch and Dixieland music, conventioneers returned to the hotel's Roostertail for the big "Showcase '68" show, featuring Motown performers. Earl Van Dyke and Band (which also provides the backing at Motown sessions) did the back-ups; and the stars were the Spinners, who scored with their impressions of Motown artists; Chris Clark, Gladys Knight and the Pips, Willie Tyler and Lester, Stevie Wonder and Diana Ross and the Supremes.

Ales introduced the show, "featuring not only our established acts but new acts that Motown will establish," and Berry Gordy Jr., Motown President, as well, "a man who is a great writer, a great producer, a great executive and

more importantly my friend." (See separate story on Gordy's speech.)

LPs Speak for Themselves

At Monday's meeting, there were short speeches by Ales, National Singles Manager Al Klein, National LP Manager Ron Newman and the sales team of Phil Jones and Mel Dakroob. Klein discussed the new singles by the Four Tops, Chris Clark, the Messengers and Stevie Wonder; while Newman said the albums would speak for themselves. The audio program was kept very simple.

The new albums: "Soul Sounds," Chris Clark; "The Mo-"Soul town Sound," a collection of original hits; "The Four Tops' Greatest Hits"; "Diana Ross and the Supremes' Greatest Hits"; "The Original Spin-ners"; "Soul on the Rocks," the Isley Brothers; "Make It Happen," Smokey Robinson and the Miracles; "Marvin Gaye's Greatest Hits"; "United," Marvin Gave and Tammi Terrell; "I Was Made to Love Her," Stevie Wonder; "Hungry for Love," the San Remo Golden Strings; "The Temptations in a Mellow Mood"; "Martha and the Vandellas Live!"; "Jr. Walker and the All Stars Live!"; and "Everybody Needs Love," Gladys Knight and the Pips.

Appropriately, a champagne brunch concluded Motown's first national convention, a first-class event in every way.



Talmy Signs Production Deal with Decca Records

By DAVE FINKLE

NEW YORK—"I don't like to follow trends. I like to set them," Shel Talmy, American disk producer based in London, said laconically at lunch last week.

It's obviously this desire to set trends and take advantage of a trendsetter that has brought Talmy and Decca Records together in an inclusive production deal, which will mean that all new acts acquired by the quiet, confident Talmy will go directly on the Decca label.

The price for the deal was undisclosed by either Talmy or Decca, but Talmy did say, "I feel I'm worth it."

Right now Talmy is already producing the Who for Decca and has been for some time. And he's lined up two new acts. The first is solo artist Oliver Norman, an American living in London. The second is new group, the Creation.

Talmy told Record World that much of his time spent stateside in the next two weeks will be to coordinate promotion and interest in the Creations' first disk, due for release in about a month. "I want everybody to be prepared for it, to be ready to move at the same time," he said. "I don't want the record to break regionally. I want it to break nationally."

When asked whether a large budget had been accorded the Creations for promo, Talmy said it had. He plans to film a color video film immediately upon returning to London.

The Creations, Talmy went on, are already popular abroad and have had hits in a number of countries. The act has a highly polished visual act replete with a light and sound man who accompanies the quartet wherever they appear.

Hitting Like House Afire

"The act has a dramatic flare," Talmy said with humor. "Once in Germany—Hamburg, I think—they set fire to a theater. The manager was upset at first, but got over it when he saw how much the kids were enjoying themselves."

Talmy, in the record business a number of years, got his start in Chicago, his home town, went to Los Angeles for a while and then emigrated to England in 1962 because "The American sound was the big thing in England then and I figured an American producer would be best at it. I was just about the first American producer to go to England, And when I got there, they said 'Where have you been all this time?'

"I've never regretted the move," Talmy stated.

One of his first productions was "Charmaine" by the Bachelor. And from then on, he was in.

And when everything started there, Talmy was on the ground floor. "I had the Kinks using an Indian sound a year before the Beatles were," Talmy said, setting the record straight. "I've always been interested in different sounds. That's why I'm enjoying the increasing sound complexity of todays pop disks."

Other Interests

Talmy isn't confining his interests to records alone. About a year and a half ago, he commissioned young Oxford student Thom Keyes to write a book about a rock and roll group for eventual filming. The humorous, authentic book, "All Night Stand," was released last summer and the 20th Century-(Continued on page 16)

Cowsills At MGM Meet

ST. LOUIS, MISSOURI-MGM Records held its Third Annual Promotion Men's Convention Aug. 31-Sept. 4 at the Tan-Tar-A Country Club Resort at Osage Lake in the Ozark Mouintains. At the convention plans for new artists and product were outlined to promo men from all the labels' independent distributors as well as company promotion personnel.

A highlight of the meet was the surprise appearance and performance of MGM's new push group for the fall and winter of 1967, the Cowsills. They sang and played for the promotion men and their wives Saturday night. The Cowsills, managed by Leonard Stogel Associates and produced by Art Kornfeld, drew raves and were asked to do more than a dozen encores.

The Cowsills are embarking on a nation-wide tour September 11th, following their Tan-Tar-A performance. The show they gave was a sneak preview of their live, in-person act.


In addition to showcasing the Cowsills for thir promotion men, MGM execs held regular, morning workshop sessions with the distributor promotion men. They were addressed by MGM President, Mort L. Nasatir; Director Of Promotion, Frank Mancini; Director Of Marketing, Lenny Scheer; National Singles Promotion Manager, Harold Berkman; and LP Promotion Manager Mike Becce.

The annual promotion get togethers are the brainchild of Frank Mancini and have been most successful in tieing together overall promotion programs.

Get to Compare Notes

"At these meetings," said Mancini, "we get an opportunity to compare notes, and to outline our future plans for tours, etc. with new and established artists. At these sessions the distributor promotion men have a chance to make us aware of what their local problems are. This gives us a better overall estimation of what our future plans should be like." Mancini also said that the distrib promo men get a chance at these meetings to exchange ideas with one another.

President Nasatir is an enthusiastic supporter of the promo-meet idea, and said that he felt the unity of effort that emerges from these meetings is important to artists' success.

NEW YORK-Merv Griffin, man of many talents (and enterprises), is embarking on yet another career: independent record production.

According to the amiable Westinghouse - Channel 5 TV host, Griffin Productions will produce records for issue on the MGM label, with the first release set for around the second week in September.

"I've done a single with my son, Tony, who's seven, and my niece, Candy, who's nine, that's due out then," Griffin told Record World last week. "The first side is the Cy Coleman title song from the new David Merrick play, 'Keep It in the Family.' We do it with 12 kids, altogether, and a big orchestra. The flip side is the one Tony's really prominent on, 'Dear Papa.' It's the first time he's ever done anything like this, but he sings out like Ethel Merman! He did it in two takes, too. Half-way through the first one, I suddenly heard a honk! from his general direction. I said, Tony, what was that? He said, I had to blow my nose. I said, oh, well. We'll have to do the song again and, Tony, this time please try not to blow your nose until it's finished."

Others in New Deal

Also coming in the new independent production deal will be records by Gloria Loring, the beautiful blonde with the ditto voice who has been getting much exposure on Merv's TVer of late. She'll have an album first, produced by Bob Morgan. Griffin Productions also has signed Brazilian singer-composer Marcus Valle, who will be produced by Ray Gilbert. David Soul will have a single in mid-September, too.

Griffin, whose 90-minute color show recently moved to an 8:30 p.m. slot in the New York area from a late evening berth, is now getting "twice the rating we had at night before in the area," says Merv.

Griffin admits that in recent months he was becoming "too comfortable" in his TV host's chair, and apparently is now going all out to remedy this.

He will be taping for his show in Russia in late September-October. Furthermore, early he's going to produce and star in a "a sort of road tour" in the near future, a package already set to play the Riviera in Las Vegas in late July-early August next year and the Westbury Music Fair in Long Island for a week right after Easter.

"In the meantime, we'll play some one-nighters in cities around the country to break in. We'll bring along some acts from the show, including our announcer, Arthur Treacher, of course. Roulette Bows Own Label And Pubbery in Mexico

NEW YORK — Morris Levy, President of Roulette Records, announces the formation of a new Mexican label for Roulette, and the establishment of a Mexican music publishing company.

Discos Tico, the new label, and Planetary - Nom Mexico Musica, the publishing company, will be headquartered in Mexico City. A group of top Roulette executives, including Levy, legal counsel and director international operations of Normand Kurtz, Latin American music director Pancho Cristal and Big 7 Music head Al Peckover, will be at the Hotel Maria Isabella in Mexico City for a month commencing Sept. 11 to officially open the Discos Tico offices and to coordinate initial operations.

"We regard Mexico as we do Canada—and our label there a natural extension of the United States record market



and of Roulette as an energetic and progressive record company," said Levy.

Will Visit Periodically

Levy emphasized that "Discos Tico has been formed and will be run according to American business techniques in administration, collections and promotion. An adequate staff will be on hand at all times to give effective service, and Roulette executives will visit the Discos Tico offices periodically to ensure that efficiency is maintained."

The new label is the result of an agreement concluded between Roulette and the Guindi Industrial Group of Mexico, a giant diversified corporation which through its international agreements with Swan Industries, Panasonic Radio and Television and Sealy Mattresses, manufactures textiles, Stereo Jet tape cartridges, mattresses and a variety of electronic equipment for home and industry.

Principal officers of Discos Tico and Planetary-Nom Mexico Musica: Morris Levy, Roulette treasurer Morris Gurlek, Alberto Guindi, Jose Ades, and Guindi U.S. representative Joseph Cayre. Ades is expected to be named chief exec of the new label.

Kurtz said that negotiations are being conducted for Discos Tico and Planetary-Nom Mexico Musica to represent important U.S. record and music publishing interests in Mexico and that periodic information on Roulette's Mexican activities would be released.

Fisher & Hackett, Talented Twosome

NEW YORK-Eddie Fisher, | the world's greatest minstrel according to Buddy Hackett, and Buddy Hackett, the world's greatest clown according to Eddie Fisher, opened a six-week run last week at the Palace Theater.

During the long opening night program, their talent was never in question-just their taste.

Fisher nostalgically sang a few of his old RCA Victor hits ("I had 22 in a row") and a few of his new ones, along with the now inevitable references to the girls in his life, past and present, and the Jolson medley. The thin, amiable young man also belted out a few show tunes admirably (including at least three too many renditions of "The Impossible Dream"), for-

got some words (including the name of his conductor, Colin Romoff) and these days is singing "That Face" to Buddy Hackett-no relation to Joan.

Buddy, in his marathon stand-up turn, proved a sharp cookie with an overemphasis on water closet jokes he didn't learn at Jack Paar's knee. "Here we are," he says to Eddie at one point, "where all the greats have played. Us [raspberry], a couple of saloon guys You know, we could've stayed at Grossinger's and played to this same crowd." Unfortunately, Hackett does not know, or has forgotten, that the code of the old Palace greats was always to leave the audience wanting more.

NASHVILLE—Chart Records | products will be manufactured, promoted and distributed world-wide by the RCA Victor Record Division as a result of negotiations just completed between Steve Sholes, Division VP, Pop A&R, and Slim Williamson and Ott Stephens, Chart co-owners based here.

Formed in March, 1964, by Williamson and Stephens, the label's second release, "Lookin' For More In '64," was a hit and got the neophyte corporation off to a stable start by selling over 40,000 records and staying in trade listings for 27 weeks. Sales have continued to increase to the point where today Chart has three Top-50 songs registering strong sales action and a significant backlog of past hits.

Current toppers include "Too Much of You" by Lynn Anderson, "Keeping Up Appearances" by Lynn Anderson and Jerry Lane and "World's Biggest Whopper" by Junior Samples. "Go On Home, Girl" by Crash Craddock will be the first Chart disk released under the new RCA pact.




