Warner/Reprise Catalog To Play Tape 2 - Track System

BURBANK, CALIF. — The entire Warner Bros. and Reprise record libraries are being converted to the Play Tape two-track cartridge system, according to a joint announcement made today by Frank Stanton, President of Play Tape, and J. K. Maitland, President of Warner Bros. records.

The addition of these two major labels brings the number of record company catalogs in the Play Tape family of music to 20.

Commenting on the association, Maitland declared, "Warner Bros, expects to be part of the rapidly expanding home entertainment market. We recognize that it is a burgeoning one, taking on many facets. Play Tape is one of the modern, forward-looking companies who are part of the new entertainment industry. We are proud of our association with Play Tape."

Emerging from its intensive test marketing campaign, Play Tape will have its national distribution pattern set by July. "By just in these test markets alone," said Stanton, "Play Tape has sold over 500,000 play tape machines within the past six months. Play Tape will introduce its automotive and plug-in home units this June." offices at 8560 Sunset Blvd., completed national distributor appointments and, simultaneously, is shipping their first single release.



London's Jumbo Circus LP Push

London Records announced this week the imminent release of a package which the firm's execs believe will be one of the most colorful issues to date in London's Phase 4 stereo spectacular series. Nearly a year in preparation, the set is titled "Circus Spectacular" and is the only album of authentic, live circus sounds and music ever to receive official endorsement and sanction by "the Greatest Show on Earth," the Ringling Brothers-Barnum and Bailey Circus.

Release on Tuesday (4) has been set to coincide with the 1967 New York opening of impresario John Ringling North's famed three-ring spectacular. The book-fold package, representing nearly an hour from a complete circus performance. contains a six-page, bound-in booklet with full-color photos of all the star performers and a running text, carefully geared to children, as well.

Recorded in various locations, the album itself features musical director Merle Evans, the circus maestro for 50 years, leading the band in all the familiar marching and background music for the acts. The introductions to the acts, the roar of the animals, and the acclaim of the crowds were taped during an actual tent performance. Additional sounds of sideshows, complete with barkers, were recorded with wireless mikes in the lower sideshow areas of Madison Square Garden in New York. Evans himself flew to England to baton the recording there of the actual band music.

Working with Circus

London is planning an allout promotion drive on the new "Circus Spectacular" LP which will incorporate a close working liaison with the promo, exploitation and advertising forces of the circus itself.

London has prepared a 36inch-high mobile in the likeness of a clown with a flashing red bulb for a nose. In New York, a number of leading stores have already set window displays, featuring the clown mobile and album covers. Giant wall hangers and streamers have also been prepared, and London has scheduled a record-breaking distribution of albums for stereo radio and in-store demonstration use.

The album was produced by Tony D'Amato, Phase 4 producer, in association with Al Steckler.

Liberty Adds Space in L. A.

LOS ANGELES — Liberty Records management has set wheels in motion for additional expansion in the Los Angeles area.

According to VP Harold Linick, the firm's accounting building, located directly next to Liberty's home office on Sunset Boulevard, has grown to such proportions that a trailer was temporarily added to handle the overflow. The rear of the building is now being "squared off" to provide 4.000 additional square feet which will be utilized for credit, internal audit and extra occounting space. A combination conference-lunch-recreation room is also planned.

A few blocks south of the home office on Orange Drive, Liberty has purchased a building with 50,000 square feet, and is now involved with construction to streamline every cubic inch. Director of Manufacturing Irv Kessler reports that within six to eight weeks, it will be the new home of Liberty Records Distributing Company of California and will contain inventory to service all of Liberty's independent distributors in the western states as well as LRDC's California dealers.

The Orange Drive facility will also house the production department as well as shipping.

Atlantic Inks Talent, Sets Promotion Campaigns

Atlantic Records President Ahmet Ertegun returned to New York last week after a busy 10 days on the West Coast recording and signing new talent for the label. On the recording scene Ertegun cut sides with the label's new pactee Keely Smith, in preparation for her first album for Atlantic. Her initial album will be cut under Ertegun's supervision sometime in April.

During his Coast visit Erte gun also held a series of conferences with Bobby Darin concerning promotion for the singer's recently completed album, "Inside Out." The LP, produced by Koppelman and Rubin, contains Darin's new smash single, "The Lady Came from Baltimore," which is an overnight breakout in Chicago and the Midwest.

Ertegun also met with Sonny & Cher and their managers, Joe DeCarlo and Harvey Kresky, to work out a national campaign on Sonny & Cher's forthcoming soundtrack LP from the film, "Good Times." "Good Times" opens in San Antonio, Texas, April 12, and will open in theaters in every major city shortly after. The Atco soundtrack LP will be released about a week before the film premieres.

Signed Groups

One of the hottest new underground groups in the country was signed to a long-term, exclusive contract by the Atlantic chief. The group, the Iron Butterfly, has been creating a sensation at the Galaxy Club on the Sunset Strip in Hollywood, and has built a tremendous following among young adults in Southern and Northern California. A dozen labels were interested in signing the group before Ertegun, Charles Green and Brian Stone signed them to the label.

Ertegun also signed another hip group, the Nirvana Banana who have also become popular on the Coast. First singles by the Iron Butterfly and the Nirvana Banana are expected to be released sometime in April.

Atlantic Vice President and Album chief Neshui Ertegun was also on the West Coast last week and active on the recording scene. Neshui Ertegun recorded the Modern Jazz Quartet live at the Lighthouse in Hermosa Beach, California, where the group is playing.

Concert Review

Peter, Paul, Mary **Tops** at **Carnegie**

NEW YORK-The repertoire of Peter, Paul and Mary, which is always a delight to their fans, is a rare mixture of old and new songs chosen and arranged with taste and imagination. Sometimes humorous, sometimes carrying a message, sometimes simply telling a tale, their songs reflect the backgrounds, moods and cultures of their audiences.

Groups singing folk songs and quasi-folk songs keep coming. Few folk groups are immediately-then durably-singular. Heading this list are Peter, Paul and Mary.

On a recent Saturday night at Carnegie Hall, the Warner Brothers artists presented a thoroughly enjoyable, professional and polished performance. They drew their program from the vast international reservoir of folk music as well as the new and the familiar. The bulk of the program consisted of cuts from their various albums performed in their individual style. The audience joined in on favorites, such as "Puff," "If I Had a Hammer" "Blowin' In the Wind." and

The six LPs are also affixed to Capitol's "Something to Sprout About" display. The wire rack being used in the 60-day promotion is newly designed with replaceable display fixtures. At the end of April, a new centerpiece and theme for the display will be provided.

LPs Will Be Displayed

At that time, the six new albums in the promotion will also be displayed on the rack, and an additional 250,000 seed packets will be shipped. The May albums in the promotion are: "Extra Special" (Peggy Lee), "Hearts Were Full of Spring" (The Lettermen), "Too Much" (Lou Rawls), "Just For Now" (Nancy Wilson). "Buck Owens and His Buckaroos in Japan" and "Song of the Year-Wayne Newton Style."

RE BLOOMING WITH HITS, BUT .



The inevitable question of what is jazz is one that is posed as one of the all-time brain teasers among jazz fans. The answer to the question has never been answered satisfactorily.

Another almost as elusive brain-teaser might be: What is jazz taste?

A review of Record World's Top 20 best selling jazz LPs shows that the jazz public probably lays claim to the most



diverse taste in music. What is jazz to one person may not necessarily be jazz to another. Beginning

with Cannonball Adderley's giant of an album.

"Mercy, Mercy, Mercy," Capitol, the title tune began as a single that was broken by R & B jocks across the country. When the album was released, the jazz jocks immediately picked up the cue and began exposing the album. In a matter of weeks, the combined push of the single and the album made this one of the biggest selling albums in the country.

Now the question arises: Is it a jazz album? In listening to the tracks, one hears immeditely some of the best jazz that the Cannonball group has produced in some years. The music is fiery, soulful, swinging and very much of today. However, the single is a big R & B record. Is it R & B because of sales or is it a jazz record that has been exposed by R & B jocks? And what is the album? Is it a jazz album because Cannonball is a jazz artist?

Ramsey Lewis' newest album on Cadet is "Goin' Latin." Here, again, is a case where the single preceeded the album, was pushed by the R & B jocks and then followed by jazz and good

music (a phrase I find detestable since I feel the jazz played on my program is good music and only jazz because someone finds a need to apply a label) jocks. The hit single is "One Two Three," a hit of two seasons ago by Len Barry. Is it jazz, or is it R & B because it was first exposed on R & B stations? And what of the album? Since it is being played on jazz stations and is resting in the Number 2 spot on the charts, does this prove that the jazz public only is purchasing the album? And does the jazz public accept this album as jazz. or is the acceptance based on Ramsey being an important jazz artist?

New Guitar in Town

Gabor Szabo, the Hungarian guitarist who won his musical letters with the Chico Hamilton group, has emerged as the newest guitar talent in jazz. There is seemingly no limit to his ability and in his new album, "Spellbinder," Impulse, Gabor has come up with a delightful, refeshing sound. His style is composed of the mystery of the gypsy music and a blending of classical and jazz guitar. His album is being very well received in the jazz circles and as yet has not been fully exposed, if at all, on the R & B stations. I do not know for certain if there is a single. However, I feel that we are right in asserting that the success of this album is due mainly to the efforts of the jazz jocks across the nation.

His style differs from that of the free-wheeling and heavily blues-accented rhythms of Wes Montgomery, who has a big new seller in "California Dreaming," Verve.

In many quarters, Wes is considered the Number One jazz guitarist. And his technique has never been shown more dramatically then in the cut, "Sundown." But again there are some people who do not like Wes. As guitar players go, they prefer the sensitive style of Kenny Burrel or Barney Kessel or Charlie Byrd. The choice of the listener depends on taste.

The Young-Holt Trio's Decca album, "Wack Wack," contains a tasty selection of tunes that has launched this new group into prominence. The title tune was one exposed by the R & B jocks then backed up by the further exploitation of the jazz jocks when the album was re-

Also included will be singer-songwriter-producer Dorsey Burnette, who recently inked a recording and producing contract with Hickory. The Burnette operation covers Burnette's own disks, as well as those he produces by Gary Crosby and George Richey, who has a budding hit on Hickory in the Uni-"Jimmy ted States with Brown." Cincinnati deejay Tom Dooley, whose Hickory disk of "Have a Happy Happy Time" is showing signs of strong chart activity, is included in the arrangement as well.

Also covered by the Hickory/ London agreement are a number of prominent country artists presently associated with Hickory in the States, a development which is particularly significant in view of the steady growth of country interest in England and Eire. The country roster includes Roy Acuff and the Smokey Mountain Boys, Ernie Ashworth, Bob Luman, Bob Gallion and Sandy Mason.

Midnight," all brilliant offerings.

This same analysis can be applied to each of the albums listed on the best selling chart. There is no clear cut, simple

answer to the question of taste. But there are a number of

similarities. First, if it swings and moves, there is a general acceptance on the part of the public. However, the tastes of the jazz public almost border on the fanatical and well guarded choices of his or her artist.

Give Up on Sellers

There are many who have given up jazz artists who have received commercial acceptance by the public and have become big record sellers. There are those jazz lovers who prefer to have their jazz as they say, "pure and without compromise." The cry of "sell out" is still heard in the jazz circles.

In no other music is the disk jockey or the company producing records faced with the almost insurmountable task of finding the right record to appeal to the largest number of people.

There is also the demand on the part of the public that the jazz performer be original, an innovator and a continuous wellspring of creativity. In short, he wants no imitators. And he feels there will never be another Bird, Monk, Ellington or Gillespie. All organists copy Jimmy Smith and there are only three or four truly pure jazz singers.

With all of this confusion, it is even more amazing that a jazz LP can break through and command enough sales to land on best-selling charts.

And it is even more of a miracle that the successful jazzmen can continue to produce a sound that will activate and hold onto a sizable following allowing him to reap the benefits of sales, royalties and greater acceptance from the jazz public.

And what is even more amazing is the fact that most jazz men are so completely involved in their music, thus making us their followers as opposed to their considering us first.

There is only one answer for us. Jazz is extremely personal from the producing end to the receiving end. And it will really depend on whether or not the musician is saying something musically valid that will allow our tastes to develop and become satisfied.

- 5. The distributor also earns five records at no charge for every 15 records ordered by the dealer. This is over and above the free records given to the dealer. These free Cesana records are cumulative and can be ordered at any time during the period of this program.

This is the newest 20th motion picture soundtrack from the hit starring James Coburn, with music by Jerry Goldsmith. The musicians include Shelly Manne on drums; Red Mitchell, bass; Ronnie Lang, alto sax; Plas Johnson, tenor sax; and Dick Nash, trombone.

San Francisco, fast becoming to pop-music fans in the US what Liverpool was to the pop fans in the UK three years ago, is acknowledged today in entertainment circles as "where the action is." And Columbia Records is there, too.

Col artists Jerry Vale, Paul Revere and the Raiders. Miles Davis, the Byrds, the Chambers Brothers, the Cyrkle, Tim Rose. the Sparrow, John Handy. Mongo Santamaria, Taj Mahall, the Peanut Butter Conspiracy, Denny Zeitlin, Ernie Heckscher and Keith Allison—all have recently appeared, are currently appearing, or are soon to appear in various showcases of entertainment in the City by the Golden Gate.

The Chambers Brothers are currently playing on weekends at the Fillmore Auditorium, San Francisco's hippy gathering place and home of "total environment" entertainment. This past weekend, the group was joined by another Columbia act, the Byrds. for three evenings. During the week, the Chambers appear nightly at one of the city's discothèques. The Matrix. Two weeks ago, the group also made a concert appearance at the San Francisco State College Folk Festival.

Tim Rose, whose singles "Hey Joe" and "Morning Dew" have been breakouts in San Francisco, returns to that city April 4 for a two-week engagement at Basin Street West.

Meanwhile, the Sparrow continues a lengthly run at the Ark, across the Golden Gate Bridge in Sausalito, working weekends at another of San Francisco's hippy dance halls, the Avalon Ballroom.

And the Peanut Butter Conspiracy, Columbia folk-rock group, was allowed to finish a successful two-week engagement at the Whisky A-Go-Go during the month of February only after they promised to return as soon as their schedule permits.

Vale Draws Crowds

Jerry Vale is presently drawing capacity crowds at the Fairmont Hotel's main show room, high atop Nob Hill. Also in the Venetian Room is bandleader Ernie Heckscher, Columbia album artist. Ernie has been pianist and leader of the house band at the Fairmount for years.

And one of the first graduates of that city's jazz element is Columbia's John Handy, who has just finished a two-week booking at Both/And in North Beach. Miles Davis takes his trumpet into Both/And for a two-week engagement beginning April 11.

Another Columbia jazz figure, pianist and full-time psychologist Dr. Denny Zeitlin, continues to appear occasionally at the city's top jazz spots —primarily, the Trident in Sausalito.

Afro-Cuban jazzman Mongo Santamaria, presently working his way west from New York to the Coast, will begin a twoweek appearance at the Jazz Workshop in the city's North Beach section in June. A new Col artist. Taj Mahall, is now appearing at a San Francisco folk club, the Jabberwock. His first single on Colombia, "I Wish I Could Shimmy Like My Sister Kate." has just been released.

Other recent appearances by Columbia artists in the Bay area included concerts by Lou Christie, at the San Francisco Teen-Age Fair, and Simon and Garfunkel, who played two weeks ago to a packed house at the Berkeley Community Center across the Bay.

Paul Revere and the Raiders, Keith Allison and the Cyrkle were also recently in San Francisco for filming of the Dick Clark television show, "Where the Action Is."
