

Mercury Begins Construction On Multi-Million \$ Mftr. Plant

CHICAGO — Mercury President Irving B. Green announces that the corporation will begin construction immediately of a new multi-million dollar manufacturing plant near Richmond, Ind.

The self-contained facility, which will more than double the space available in the corporation's present plant in Richmond, is the result of two years of planning by Green, Executive Vice President Irwin Steinberg, Director of Manufacturing Lloyd Shaw and other Mercury officials.

According to Green, an indie marketing study conducted by a team from the University of Chicago shows that the record industry will grow by a minimum of 50% over the next 10 years. "With our new plant, which will be in full operation by the fall of 1969, we will be able to more than cope with

the expected growth paterns," Green emphasized.

Entire Process In Company's Own Plant

With Mercury's present modern facilities, once the original artwork and mastered tapes are sent to Richmond, the entire process resulting in finished singles and LPs is conducted in the company's own plant. With the new facility, these already quality procedures will be improved to an even greater extent.

Pressing operations for other labels, which has been done at Mercury's Richmond plant, will also be continued on a larger scale on the new site. The new plant, which will be built on a 30 acre site northwest of Richmond, will contain approximately 300,000 square feet and will be built on one level.

Schwartz Joins Musicor A&R

NEW YORK—Art Talmadge, President of Musicor, announces the appointment of Bob Schwartz to the A&R Department at Musicor Records. Bob will be responsible for developing and producing new talent for the label.

Schwartz comes to Musicor from a series of successes dating back to the beginning of Kama Sutra Productions where he was involved in the A&R department with such artists as Tony Bruno and Tiny Tim. Bob later became associated with Windmill Productions and Roulette Records. Schwartz was largely responsible for bringing "96 Tears" by Question Mark and the Mysterians to Cameo Parkway.

He has also had his own songs recorded by such people as Jack Jones, John Gary and the Sunshine Company. Most recently, Bob has just completed the score for two major films, "Wicked Die Slow" and "Seven Days Too Long." In addition, Bob has written the original score for the forthcoming TV series, "The Outsiders," debuting this fall on NBC-TV.

The first project that Schwartz is involved with for Musicor is the production of a new group called the Tingling Mother's Circus.

Campaign for Leslie

Atlantic has instituted a strong publicity campaign for the new Leslie Uggams single, "River Deep, Mountain High," written by Phil Spector, Ellie Greenwich and Jeff Barry. Promo men from the label are on the road on its behalf.



New RCA Label In Japan

The RCA Record Division and Victor Records of Japan, an independent Japanese Corporation, have signed a new agreement under which RCA's own label will be introduced in Japan with a catalog of new recordings by Japanese artists as well as Japanese pressings from masters taken from RCA's world-wide catalog.

Announcement was made simultaneously by Norman Racusin, Division Vice President and General Manager, RCA Records, in New York, and Hitoshi Momose, President, the Victor Company of Japan, Ltd., in Tokyo.

Under the terms of the new agreement, all the Japanese artists on the new RCA label and their recordings will be available on the RCA label for release in the United States and all foreign countries by RCA record licensees and RCA subsidiaries, Racusin said, adding that hence-

forth all records pressed in Japan from RCA-owned masters will be released on the RCA label.

Momose said the agreement will provide important international exposure for Japanese artists and their recordings.

Important Market For Music: Japan

"We recognize that Japan is one of the most important music markets in the world, and that this new relationship between the two companies will give us an opportunity to take full advantage of the market potentialities," Racusin said.

The agreement is a result of negotiations recently concluded in Tokyo by Dario Soria, Division Vice President, RCA Record International Department. The initial recordings on the RCA label are expected to be released later this year.

Baez 'Baptism' LP, Book on the Way

Vanguard Records has just announced the release of a new Joan Baez album, "Baptism, A Journey Through Our Time."

Music has been composed by Peter Schickele (of P.D.Q. Bach fame), and the LP features Miss Baez speaking and singing the poetry of Henry Treece, Walt Whitman, Jacques Prévert, Federico García Lorca, James Jovce, William Blake, Norman Rosten, John Donne, Arthur Rimbaud, Yevgeny Yevtushenko, E. E. Cummings, Wilfred Owen and Countee Cullen. Also included are poems from the Japanese and Chinese translated by Kenneth Rexroth and Arthur Waley.

Miss Baez, who has enjoyed a number of best-selling Vanguard albums, has also written an autobiography, entitled "Daybreak," which is being published by Dial Press.



Dot Comedian Wilde Pens Interview Book on Comics

rv Wilde, heard on the Dot album, "The Joker is Wilde," is very excited about an exciting new project-along, of course, with his opening at the Copa July 11 on the bill with Gladys Knight and the Pips.

Wilde has written a book called "The Great Comedians Talk About Comedy," which Citadel is publishing in October. It's a compilation of taped interviews Wilde has obtained from 16 comedians (several of them recording artists) including Bob Hope, Jack Benny, Joey Bishop, Johnny Carson and Ed Wynn. The book, which should prove historically important, will include a biography of each star, a sample of his comedy and the interview.

Was there a best interview of the batch? "It would be difficult to choose. Each interview was different—I created different questions for each star. Milton Berle was probably the most gracious, the most willing to help. He spent the first 10 minutes asking me about my career." The tough-The toughest-to get hold of, anywaywas Johnny Carson, whose schedule kept him on the hoof but who, from his elevated desk, ultimately pontificated satisfactorily.

Wilde, when interviewed himself on the resurgence in popularity of comedy on wax, especially "shock" humor, commented: "I don't do anything in my act I would be ashamed to have my mother or a priest hear. Some will laugh at the 'shock' joke, but that doesn't mean they really like it, or that they feel good when they leave. When a woman hears a suggestive or sick line, she may laugh, but I don't think she really likes the guy delivering it. Look at the ones who have stayed at the top over the years-Benny, Hope, etc. They're clean and they are still stars because the public has helped them. I think the cheap laugh is a passing

phase. You just can't keep titillating people by shocking them."

NOTES FROM THE UNDERGROUND

By CARL LaFONG

Well, this year the music industry is celebrating the 20th anniversary of the long-playing record, introduced to the world by Columbia Records back in 1948. The significance of the LP, however, and especially the stereo album, is just beginning to be

appreciated as a creative medium. And simultaneously technicians are working on projects that will make the disk as outdated as the Tin Lizzie before we know it.

It was rock, and artists like the Beatles, Van Dyke Parks, Laura Nyro and Nilsson, that made the album a complete thing. While the single still has its valuable place in rock as another element entirely, it is really the LP that has galvanized the rock scene.

But our limited heads find it hard to conceive of what further can happen to give musicians broader scope. 3M is working on a system, for instance, that will record sound as light impulses or signals, hoping that eventually they wil be able to reduce an entire album to a plate the size of a 35mm slide; no distortion, no surface noise, no hiss. And Dr. Peter Goldmark, the man who more than anyone was responsible for the development of the 33 1/3 rpm, one mil groove, long playing record, is reportedly working on a 360-degree sound system that will put stereo into the museum.

The question is: can rock keep up with the heads in the laboratories?







'R&B Bubble Won't Burst'

NEW YORK — Larry Uttal, President of Bell Records, predicted last week that fore-seeable population jumps over the next decade will assure the continuing prosperity of labels dealing in "young pop and R&B" music.

"The success of what is called 'young pop and R&B' music — strong beat, steady rhythm and straight forward lyrics—is not a passing fad," Uttal said. "There will be a bigger audience for it over the next ten years and young people will increase their already significant purchasing power for entertainment items—such as records."

Uttal pointed out that 34% of the 32,000,000 radios that will be sold this year will be bought by young people. There are already about 20,000,000 youngsters between the ages of

5 and 9. This age bracket is expected to increase to 27,000,000 by 1980. The 10-14 age group, now numbering nearly 18,000,000, will expand by 1980 to a new level of \$24,000,000.

"The appeal of pop and R&B music is constant and contagious," Uttal continued. "It is pure entertainment, easy to listen to, easy to sing. It has always been one of the most popular forms of music and it definitely has a future—a very prosperous one where the record industry is concerned."

Bell Records is on the charts with "Angel of the Morning" by Merrilee Rush, plus "Choo Choo Train" by the Box Tops and "Look Over Your Shoulder" by the O'Jays. On the album charts Bell is scoring with the Delfonics' "La La Means I Love You" and the Box Tops' "Cry Like a Baby" LPs.

The End of an Era

Bill Graham announces that he is moving his Fillmore operation from the Fillmore Auditorium to the Carousel Ballroom in downtown San Francisco. Beginning Friday, July 5, it is known as Fillmore West. The gala event was ushered in by the Butterfield Blues Band (Elektra), Ten Years After (Deram) and Fleetwood Mac (Epic).

Why move? A number of varied reasons constituted this move.

The Carousel Ballroom was available and rather than allowing the competition to attain it, Graham seized the opportunity for his organization.

Second, the Fillmore West has a better location from the standpoint of easy accessibility for the commuting public.

One of the most influencial reasons, but certainly not the only reason, is the occurrence of minor incidents that are becoming more frequent in the Fillmore district. Although there have never been any major incidents surrounding the Auditorium, several cars have been broken into, and some Fillmore patrons have been interferred with. No group can or should be held responsible, it is simply a few elements in the community.

The lease for Fillmore West is by handshake only and will remain so until both parties decide otherwise.

Capacities

The old Fillmore's capacity was 1,500; Fillmore West is about 2,000, and Winterland, which Bill used for big weekends, holds 4,200.

Graham still maintains a lease on the old Fillmore structure until March, 1973. Specifically, political platforms voiced, theatrical seminars held and amateur jazz and Rhythm and Blues programs sponsored will be possibilities.

During this summer the Graham organization will advise and urge members of the black community in using the Fillmore Auditorium for events that will be beneficial to the community. They will not suggest, organize or make a profit from this, only advise.

"Furthermore, we have been meeting with members of the Fillmore community to discuss ways in which the Fillmore Auditorium can be used throughout the summer to become more closely aligned with the aspira tions of the community and hope to be able to announce a program soon," said Graham.

"It has always been our aim to present diversified entertainment in a new and unusual manner, presenting to our audiences performances that they would not normally have turned out to see."

Bill Graham is anxiously awaiting the day when his hall will present some good Latin American music. Booking such an act is difficult when only one city can be offered.

Following the summer, when Bill Graham holds two clubs, he hopes to use one for the introduction of new, local talent. Another intention for one of the halls will be to use it for the inspiration for young political platforms such as are held in New York's Washington Square.

Light show seminars as well as jam sessions were mentioned.

With a mere 25 administrators, Graham has built a successful business which conservatively speaking grosses over \$1,000,000 annually.

The Fillmore East has grossed \$40,000 in a two-night stint when such groups as the Jimi Hendrix Experience (Reprise), Doors (Elektra) and the Jefferson Airplane (RCA) have headlined.

Our Fillmore will gross \$25,-000 during the summer six-dayweek schedule.

Although the Fillmore Auditorium is not closed, it is as though an era has ended.

What has to be one of the most versatile and fabulous groups ever to reside in San Francisco, Rejoice, played a hip, local club last week. The group has been playing a number of engagements lately and their folk-rock music has been warmly received.

Hopefully, within the immediate future we will hear Rejoice cut a disk of their "Golden Gate Park" ditty. It will appear either on ABC or one of its subsidiaries.

RECORD WORLD'S PRIZE WINNING JAZZ SECTION



The July 4 weekend has become symbolic in America in many ways. The National Safety Council projects its grim statistics on the highway fatalities. Those of us who are old enough to remember recall the days when cherry bombs and three-inch firecrackers were the big happening of the day as were sparklers for the weak of heart. It's the last big holiday before the official vacation season sets in and in jazz, it be-

gins the formal festival season.

The Newport Festival will no doubt play before a record crowd of more than 60,000 and George Wein will take his

festival show on the road playing before capacity houses across the nation.

And the big holiday offers us a chance to review many of the album releases currently available. It's getting so that being an A&R man in jazz must be a lot of fun.

Eddie Harris' "Plug Me In" (Atlantic) follows up his number one best-selling album "The Electrifying Eddie Harris." The same ingredients that made "Electrifying" a gas are very much in evidence here. Once again he is knee-deep in his electronic amplified bag. He seems to have mastered the control of this new sound. Speaking of Harris, he has one of the prettiest tones in jazz.

Would you believe Lew Leslie's "Blackbirds of 1928"? This show that opened 40 years ago with music by Jimmy Mc-Hugh and lyrics by Dorothy Fields and starred Bill Robinson and Adelaide Hall has been reproduced by Columbia in its Hall of Fame series. The historical significance of this show is that it was an all-black show that produced some memorable tunes such as "When I Can't Give You Anything But Love Lindy" which was changed to "I Can't Give You Anything

But Love Baby." This cast includes Duke Ellington, Cab Calloway, Mills Brothers, Cecil Mack Choir and Don Redman and His Orchestra and here in 1968 Cab Calloway is still cavorting on the Broadway stage in "Hello, Dolly."

The death of Dave Lambert was viewed by most of us to be the end of an exciting era in jazz . . . that of the slick, imaginative interpretations of jazz tunes with a horn-like unison approach. A new album. "Leonard Feather presents the Sound of Feeling and the Sound of Oliver Nelson," introduces the Andrece twins, Alyce and Rhae, two very together chicks who should be around for a while. They have five tunes on this album including "My Favorite Things," "Waltz Without Words" and "Circe Revisited." Gary David plays piano and doubles as the third vocalist. Ray Neapolitan is on bass, Chuck Domanico on bass and Dick Fisher on drums. It is the freshest sound we have heard in some time and is a welcome sound, too. The album is a gas with the flip side being the continuation of a session which in part was included on a previous album called "Jazz Encyclopedia Volume One."

Another album where two masters are paired—this time Earl "Fatha" Hines and Johnny Hodges—is called "Swing's Our Thing" (Verve). When jazz artists of the caliber of these men get together, they are really holding school. The question one raises is how is it possible for these men to produce such a high degree of music as they have during their careers? They have so much to give and we have so much to learn from

James Brown, Jazz Artist?

James Brown, Soul Brother No. 1, has released a new album called "Nothing But Soul." There are six instrumentals featuring the famous James Brown band. Through the years, Brown has been giving evidence of his improving or-

gan technique. "Buddy E" and "Gettin' a Little Hipper" are two excellent examples of the James Brown well disciplined band at work. Is James Brown going to become a jazz artist? The answer is simply, it's all in the soul bag.

A listen to **O. C. Smith's** new album, "Hickory Holler Revisited" (Columbia), gives clear evidence that this young man is on his way up. O. C. has a particular vocal appeal that is well displayed in this album. Two of the best tracks are "The Son of Hickory Holler's Tramp" and "Honey (I Miss You)."

All aspiring young pianists and even the seasoned veterans will learn a lot of new tricks from the immortal Art Tatum. Some of Tatum's greatest masterpieces have been reproduced in "Art Tatum Piano Starts Here," another great album in the Columbia Hall of Fame Series. Jazz buffs will especially enjoy Tatum's incomparable rendition of "Humoresque," as well as the ageless standards "Tea For Two" and "Willow Weep For Me."

Evolution of Jazz Concert in Philly

PHILADELPHIA - An "evolution of jazz" concert, Wednesday, July 10, in John F. Kennedy Stadium sports a lineup of "names" at the Philadelphia Music Festival — Louis Armstrong, Sarah Vaughan, the Charles Lloyd Quartet, African drummer Olatunji and the Don Ellis Orchestra.

The 9 p.m. concert will demonstrate the ever-expanding range of jazz, from the traditionalist, New Orleans-influenced "Satchmo" Armstrong, to the modern varieties of Ellis and the Lloyd group, to the African - influenced rhythmics and sensations of Olatunji with his drummers, dancers and singers.

Miss Vaughan ranges from blues and bop to show tunes. A localite will also appear-Philadelphia singer Maggie Harris, backed by this city's Dave Shrier Quartet.

The Festival presented by C. Schmidt & Sons, Inc., thus continues at Kennedy Stadium amid a fantasy-like stage and lighting setup, including a giant TV screen giving a simultaneous blowup of the performance. Co-sponsored by the City's Recreation Department, Festival admission is \$1.





Dis Find Ashley A Side Despite Label Reversal

NASHVILLE—The deejay on the other end of the long distance call to Ashley Records artist-president Leon Ashley declared rather apologetically: "I'm sorry, Leon, but we're going to have to go with the B side of your new record. The side with the dobro out front."

The Music City independent label chief was doubly surprised. Number one, that the deejay was flipping "Flower of Love" which has eevn his toughest competitors talking on Record Row . . . and Number two, that the deejay mentioned the dobro—that instrument is featured on what was supposed to be the A side "Flower of Love" song.

Investigation disclosed the hangup.

In one of those rare mixups, the labels had been reversed and the A side label was on the backside.

The snafu proved the strength of "Flowers," however. Several top deejays telephoned long distance and scores of others wrote to tell Leon they were flipping to the B side

which everyone now knows is actually the A side.

Leon's summary of the incident: "Don't tell me the deejays don't listen to records . . . and don't tell me they don't call the shots the way they see 'em. The deejays deserve almost all the credit for everything I have been fortunate enough to come up with."

Fortunate Year

The Ashley label, barely one year old, has, in Leon's own words, "been fortunate to come up with" a number one smash, "Laura," which Leon co-wrote, and a solid string of hit singles and albums including the recent "Mental Journey" click single and current LP release for Ashley. All this plus the Leon and Margie (man & wife) duet single and LP. Plus a BMI writing award for "Laura" and an ASCAP artist award for Margie's Ashley disking of "Ode to Billie Joe."

It appears that even a flipped label cannot stop the unconventional Leon Ashley & company.

The country music scene is becoming more and more popular as the days go by in this part of the world. Dee jays on the BBC are devoting more air play to C/W disks like Johnny Cash's "Folsom Prison Blues" (CBS), for example. Country programs such as "Country Meets Folk" and "Country Style" are getting bigger listening figures. Producer Ian Grant has just completed editing an hour-long radio special that

was recorded especially for the BBC of "The Johnny Cash Show," when Johnny was in London last month. Besides Johnny, also featured were

Murray Kash June Carter, Carl Perkins, the Tennessee Three and Britain's James Royal. This will be transmitted this week. This ties in with the release of Johnny's latest CBS album, "Old Golden Throat."

Mervyn Coleman of Emerald Records, which is based in Belfast, has just issued the Frankie McBride single of the Goldsboro composition, "With Pen in Hand." Since Frankie is very popular on both sides of the border in Ireland, and developing a following in Great Britain, this could be a winner! Mervyn's going all-out to make it so! . . . Glen Campbell doing a quick return to London to appear on Bobbie Gentry's BBC-Television show. At the same time, Ember is releasing a new single by Glen, "Dreams of the Everyday Housewife." His album "I Wanna Live" is picking up sales, says Ember-man Jimmy Henney.

From the E.M.I. stable some new albums: on the Stateside label, "George Jones Sings the Songs of Dallas Frazier"; and on Capitol, "Kinda Country," featuring such Nashville names as Sonny Jackson, Jean Shepard, Wanda Jackson, etc.; and Buck Owens, "It Takes People Like You to Make People Like Me" . . . I was very happy to receive a new single from CBS by an English country singer whom we haven't heard from for some time, namely Houston Wells. About five years ago, he recorded a number of songs, including "Only the Heartaches," which proved quite popular for a time. But then Houston faded out of the picture. He emi-

grated to Ireland, formed his own band and found a new and more successful career there. Now Houston has just recorded "Teach Me Little Children," which could revive his reputation here. Sure hope so . . . Great news from Ole Tresherg in Copenhagen. His publication, the Western Bulletin, has just come out with issue number 30, on its third birthday! This is just one of the many projects sponsored by SCAWC (Scandinavian Country and Western Club). Ole is also very active in putting out a country music tape featuring native talent, and promoting the latest U.S. releases. Since there is little country music played on the Scandinavian radio stations, this has become very important listening to country music lovers. Keep up the good work,


