MGM Records VP

Realignment of the MGM Records staff is beginning to take shape with the announcement by Mike Curb, President of MGM Records and Vice President of MGM, Inc., of the appointment of Ken Mansfield as Vice President of the Record Division. He will be working directly with Richard W. Whitehouse, newly appointed Senior Vice-President of business affairs. He will report directly to Curb.

Mansfield's duties will enencompass many areas, most important will be to maintain a line of communications between MGM and Transcontinental Record Distributors. He will be involved in artists relations, product development, internal affairs and special merchandising promotions.

Curb is rapidly reorganizing his new management team and will soon announce additional appointments to the MGM Records staff which will reestab-

lish MGM Records as an important label in the industry.

Mansfield is a graduate of San Diego State College and holds a Bachelor of Science Degree in Marketing. He has had wide experience in many phases of the record industry.

arisen whereby CBS-TV has proposed using ASCAP and BMI music on a per-use basis as opposed to the licensing arrangement used heretofore. Current licenses expire Dec. 31,

If no BMI deal is signed in a few days, CBS-TV will not have access to the BMI repertoire, although local stations could use BMI material under their own licenses, whereas ASCAP's license can be extended on an interim basis via application to N.Y. Federal Judge Sylvester J. Ryan.

BMI, furthermore, has been demanding substantially higher licensing fees from CBS-TV, complaining that CBS has agreed to pay ASCAP \$5,565,-000 for 1969 while BMI is getting about \$1,250,000 from the web. BMI suggests that these dollar figures do not coincide with the percentage bases upon which ASCAP and BMI are paid off. Furthermore, BMI feels, since it is accounting for 50% of the music performances on CBS-TV, it should be earning as much as ASCAP, BMI notes that in every other licensing sphere except network TV the gap between ASCAP and BMI is disappearing.

The CBS-TV notice that it intends to pay royalties after the Dec. 31 license expiration only on music it uses was sent by network President Robert D. Wood, who said: "We recognize that your music is essential to the CBS Television Network and do not, of course, propose to stop using it. We merely believe that we should pay for the music - and pay fairly for it-when we do use it." Wood asked ASCAP and BMI to submit terms for license based on use. He suggested es-

Asher Heads Capitol's **Eastern Operations**

HOLLYWOOD-Dick Asher, formerly a Columbia Records VP, has joined Capitol Records and will head the Hollywoodbased recording company's expanded operations in New York and the eastern United States, effective Jan. 1.

The announcement was made in Hollywood by Capitol Records President Sal Iannucci.

As Vice-President, Eastern Operations, 37-year-old Asher will administer Capitol's business, A&R and recording activities on the East Coast, with special emphasis on increasing the firm's New York artist roster and boosting the production of New York-recorded product.

Since assuming the presidency last July, Iannucci has quadrupled Capitol's New York staff of producers and created additional New York executive

positions in business affairs, merchandising, promotion and publicity, emphasizing the autonomy of the East Coast operations.

Capitol's New York facilities include executive offices in the Sperry Rand Building at 1290 Avenue of the Americas, recording studios at 151 W. 46th St. and music publishing offices at 1650 Broadway. Asher will be headquartered at the execu-

British Decca Guarantees Jones, **Engelbert \$6 Mil Over 6 Years**

LONDON - The Boards of Decca, Ltd., and MAM (Management Agency and Music Ltd.) announce that the relationship that has existed between the two companies in connection with the recording of MAM's two major artists, Tom Jones and Engelbert Humperdinck, is to continue under a new contract signed Dec. 17,

The new contract covers a period of six years and will come into force on Jan. 1, 1970, in respect of all recordings made from that date. Under its

terms Decca will have exclusive recording rights on a world-wide basis in respect of the recordings of Tom Jones and Engelbert Humperdinck.

Royalties under the old contracts will continue to be paid on sales of any recordings which were made prior to Dec. 31, 1969, but substantially higher rates of royalties on world-wide sales will be payable under the new contract on recordings made after Jan. 1, 1970. Decca has guaranteed that royalties payable to MAM under the new contract, exclusive of those payable under the former contracts, will not be less than \$6,000,000.

The contract also provides that upon the issue by MAM of its own record label, Decca shall have similar rights over all artists recorded by MAM under that label, and the same royalties as are payable to MAM under the new contract, shall apply in respect of any such recordings.

Arrangements have also been concluded under which Decca has purchased from the three largest MAM shareholders, Gordon Mills, Tom Jones and Engelbert Humperdinck, 500,-000 shares of MAM. The three vendors still own collectively over 2,000,000 shares of MAM.

on a series of albums guaranteed to set a new trend in both format and sound. Plans for a nationwide promotion and advertising campaign is already underway and will be outined at these meetings.

The sales meetings will be hosted by Bob Shad, President, Chet Woods, Sales Manager, Maury Apatow, National Promotion Director, and Mike Sterner, Regional Sales, who has just joined Mainstream Records. Mike was formerly associated with Record Club of America.

Pudwell to RCA Product Assurance Post

John Pudwell has been appointed Manager, Product Assurance and Manufacturing Coordination, RCA Records.

Announcement was made by Bill Dearborn, Manager, Production and Engineering, who said the promotion is effective immediately.

"In his previous position as Manager of Product Assurance and Production Coordination of Recorded Tape, Pudwell established and maintained Stereo 8 quality standards which are unmatched in the industry, and we are convinced he will approach his added responsibilities with the same vigor and effectiveness he has shown in the past," Dearborn said, Pudwell will be responsible

for product assurance and quality for all RCA's domestic plants and studios as well as

During his tenure the Big 3 reorganized its professional department with an emphasis on the contemporary market. Lesser was also a key figure in directing the expansion of the music pubbery's print division. His future plans were not announced at this time.

Levine Exits ABC

Al Levine and ABC have reached an agreement to sever their relationship as of Jan. 3, 1970, thus ending a four-year association.

After an extended vacation, Levine plans to return to the record industry.

Liberace to WB

Liberace has been signed to Warner Brothers Records by label General Manager Joe Smith, who announced that the pianist will aim himself at the contemporary market in his new affiliation.

Smith also indicated that Liberace is planning his first "concept" album for Warners, a record to be released early in the spring.

Galligan Heads Crewe A&R

Neil Galligan has joined the Crewe Group of Companies as Vice President in charge of A and R. The exec will be in complete charge of A&R functions with Crewe Records and its new affiliated label. Generation Records. In addition, he will engage actively in consultation in connection with the CGCdistributed Maxwell label, operated by Larry Maxwell.

Galligan will operate as overall A&R administrator and will devote much of his time to acquisition of masters and setting up production deals with outside indie producers. Several deals are now in the final stages of negotiation and are to be announced within

Accent on Outside

The accent of the operation will be much on the outside indie production side, according to Galligan, although he will also be closely involved in the production projects of CGC President Bob Crewe, which currently include the diskings of Julius LaRosa, Oliver and the newly-signed Lesley Gore.

Following a long-term stint with the Tommy Valando pubinterests, Galligan lishing established the Canadian-American label, which enjoyed such hits as "Sleep Walk" with Santo and Johnny and Linda Scott's "I've Told Ev'ry Little Star," among others.

Later, he founded Congress Records, which promptly kicked off with a solid hit, "Nitty Gritty" with Shirley Ellis. Galligan also headed up Big Seven Music, which, under his direction, became one of the nation's 10 top publishers. He left Big Seven to accept his new post with CGC.

Granahan Exits **Dot-Paramount**

NEW YORK-Gerry Granahan has announced that he will leave Dot-Paramount Records on Dec. 31. Granahan has been East Coast A & R Director of the record operation for the past two-and-one half years.

Prior to his present affiliation Granahan was an A & R Director at United Artists Records for three years. In the past he has also been an entertainer and recording artist with several hit records. Granahan reported that his future plans call for affiliating with a recording complex.

Kasenetz-Katz: Beyond Bubblegum

NEW YORK - Jerry Kasenetz, one half of the extraordinary Kasenetz-Katz production team, is always quick to coin a phrase. Usually his maxims in some way pertain to what Kasenetz-Katz are doing, and his latest, "It's not what you've done in the past. It's what you're going to do in the future," will surprise many. Kasenetz-Katz' latest expansion is the opening of an English office and the assembling of a star-studded staff of writers and producers there.

The English office is located at 55 Park Lane in London, and within a few months is expected to be doing about two thirds of all Super K business. "We feel that this operation will far outdo all of our previous efforts," says Kasenetz. "We are not content to live off our past successes."

A look at the new Super K roster indicates that he is not joking. John Carter and Kenny Lewis have been signed with Super K as artists and producers Carter and Lewis are signed as writers to Southern Music, but Super K now has a working agreement with Southern. Among the records that Carter and Lewis have written or produced are "Little Bit of Soul," the Music Explosion's million seller; "Tossin' and Turnin'," "That's Why I'm Crying," "Is it True?," "Sloppy Joe," "Sunshine Girl," "Sentimental Friend," most of which were recorded by Herman's Hermits; "Semi Detached." "Sunday for Tea" and "Peek A Boo," which were done by Manfred Mann, as well as "Let's Go To San Francisco," a big English success, and their latest effort, "Cowboy Convention," by the Ohio Express. The duo appeared as artists under the name of the Ivey League.

Also pacted is Graham Gouldman, as a writer with Kaskat Music and an artist and producer. Gouldman is the writer of "For Your Love" and "Heart Full of Soul" recorded by the Yardbirds, "Listen People" and "No Milk Today" by Herman's Hermits, "Bustop" and "Look Through Any Window" by the Hollies" and most recently "Sausalito" by the Ohio Express.

Kasenetz considers both Carter and Lewis and Gouldman to be talents of the first order. Evidently their association with Super K is paying off: in the last three years they had

written only three songs — in their first month with Super K they have written seven. Also signed are Eric Wolfson, composer of "Sunshine Games," and Freddy Garrity who wrote Freddy and the Dreamers' "I'm Telling You Now."

Perhaps the most exciting development from England for Kasenetz-Katz is the signing as artists of Freddy and the Dreamers. The group had two big hits in 1965, "I'm Telling You Know" and "You Were Made For Me," and was voted the best new group of 1965 by Record World. Since then they have had an English TV show called "Little Big Time." Kasenetz described their sound "as a kind of English bubblegum." Kasenetz-Katz also has acquired the rights to the group's TV show. No label deal for Freddy and the Dreamers has been made yet.

In addition to all of this, Kasenetz-Katz has stationed Ritchie Cordell and Hy Gold as their men in England. Cordell will work personally with all British talent. Cordell is now living in Manchester.

"This is just the beginning," said Kasenetz. "We went to England because we felt too many labels in this country were taking us for granted. Kasenetz-Katz has never stood still and we never will. A lot of people are going to be surprised by our British product. We will be working by the time we're finished with most important English artists. We have things planned," he went on with an enigmatic smile, "that you wouldn't believe."

Kasenetz and Katz have most recently been represented with their productions for the 1910 Fruitgum Co., the Ohio Express and the Crazy Elephant and their work in writing the current Tommy James smash, "She," which they co-authored along with Tommy James, Mike Vale and Ritchie Cordell. "It's not what you've done in the past," says Kasenetz, though. "It's what you're going to do in the future." They are certainly not above bubblegum; but their new English operation is planned to take them beyond it.

'Jet Plane' Gold

"Leaving on a Jet Plane" by Peter, Paul and Mary has been certified as a gold record by the RIAA.

A Golden Year For Atlantic

Scores of hit singles and albums, the successful launching of many new artists and groups, the expansion of the firm's English artist roster and the growth of tape cartridge product helped to make 1969 a great year for Atlantic Records.

The company earned a total of nine RIAA certified gold record awards for albums with sales of over \$1,000,000; and four of the firm's albums received platinum record awards for sales of over \$2,000,000. A new company record in total sales was set by the Iron Butterfly, whose album "In-A-Gadda-Da-Vida" on Atco passed the 2,000,000 unit mark in December for domestic sales.

Ahmet Ertegun, President of Atlantic, said this week in his year-end report: "Atlantic Records in 1969 consolidated its position as one of the world's leading companies. In the pop, rock, blues and jazz fields our Atlantic, Atco and Cotillion labels continued to dominate the best-selling charts. We introduced many exciting new artists this year, most of whom have already become firmly entrenched on the music scene not only in this country but throughout the world. We also made great strides in tape, setting up production facilities of our own of 8-track stereo tapes and cassettes. We look forward with confidence to even greater success for the Atlantic, Atco and Cotillion labels during the

"We could not have achieved such a successful year," Ahmet "without Ertegun continued. the tremendous talents of independent producers associated with Atlantic Records like Buddy Killen (of Dial Records), Quin Ivy and Marlin Greene, Ollie McLaughlin, Kenny Gamble & Leon Huff, Isaac Hayes & David Prater. Brad Shapiro and Steve Alaimo, George Avakian, Charles Greene, Jim Hilton, Rick Hall, King Curtis, Les Carter, Huey Meaux, Felix Pappalardi, Willie Henderson, Herbie Mann, Eddie Hinton, Tommy Cogbill, Norman Petty, Ted Cooper, David Rubinson and Crewe."

"The independent English producers who contributed so much to this great year for Atlantic are Robert Stigwood, Maurice and Barry Gibb, Georgio Gomelsky, Kit Lambert & Chris Stamp, Jimmy Miller,

and Pete Townshend," concluded Ertegun.

Many From Own Staff

Many of Atlantic's hit singles and albums were produced by the firm's own A&R staffers, who include President Ahmet Ertegun, Executive Vice-Presidents Jerry Wexler and Nesuhi Ertegun, and Vice-President Tom Dowd, jazz producer Joel Dorn, arranger-composer-producer Arif Mardin, engineer-producer Adrian Barber and Miami-based producer Dave Crawford.

Ahmet Ertegun this year cleared the way for the formation of two of the great supergroups: Blind Faith and Crosby, Stills & Nash. Both of these groups played a major role on the rock music scene in 1969, and their Atlantic/Atco LPs were big sellers. He also acquired the husband-and-wife duo Delaney & Bonnie, who are presently working and recording with Eric Clapton.

Atlantic in 1969 continued its fast pace in single records sales. Four of its singles earned RIAA certified gold records sales of over 1,000.000 units. Five LPs released by the company in 1969 became No. 1 selling albums: "Crosby, Stills & Nash," "Led Zeppelin I,"
"Blind Faith," Iron Butterfly's "Ball" and "Led Zeppelin II." More than half of the over 100 LPs issued by the firm during 1969 became best-selling items, and the firm had 20 to 30 albums on the charts every week throughout the year.

An all-time high for orders at a sales meeting was set by Atlantic in January, 1969, at the firm's annual sales meeting in the Bahamas. More than \$8 million in orders were written at that meeting. Atlantic held two other sales meetings during the year, one in the summer in New York, Chicago and Los Angeles, and one in October with the firm's sales staff visiting distributors in their own cities.

Atlantic contributed to many causes during the year and the firm's artists played many charitable benefits. One of Atlantic's major contributions was \$20,000 to NATRA for their training programs; and \$5,000 to FORE (The Fraternal Order of Record Announcers) to help start their new association.

Corporate Acquisitions Play Major Role in ABC's Big Year

ABC Records has just completed one of its most significant years, particularly in terms of building a major new marketing structure for the *70s, according to Larry Newton, President of the company.

While the firm chalked up one of its top years in terms of unit sales and overall grosses, the accent has been on new corporate acquisitions which have been brought into the companion firm, ABC Record and Tape Sales Corp. These are expected to provide the company with a blanket spread of the nation's distribution centers through record merchandising operations.

"It has been a year of putting together the new pieces to give us the most effective marketing organizations in keeping with the truly mass merchandising needs of the '70s," Newton said. "Rack type distribution is the name of the game in today's record business," Newton continued, "and

I can definitely see new phases of growth in these areas which can give us a \$4 billion dollar annual record industry by 1975. With our marketing structure as we're laying it out now, we'll be in a position to take our full share of this tremendous potential increase."

In line with the company's specific distribution plans, Newton said, a first annual meeting of the entire exec staff of the firm's rack merchandising operations across the country has been scheduled for Chicago for early February. More than 50 persons are expected

to attend these meetings, headed by Newton and Lou Lavanthal, President of ABC Record and Tape Sales Corp.

Meanwhile, Newton said, the company will issue a total of 32 new albums in mid-January on the ABC group of labels, which includes Dunhill, Command-Probe, 20th-Fox, Impulse, Riverside, Bluesway and Westminster, in addition to ABC itself. Among the special features of the release will be a deluxe new Westminster set featuring Beverly Sills in a performance of Donizetti's "Zoberto Devereaux." The re-

cording was produced in the EMI Studios in London. In February, the company is also expected to release the original cast recording of "Applause," the upcoming Broadway musical to feature Lauren Bacall, with a score by Lee Adams and Charle Strouse.

Meanwhile, the ABC-distributed 20th Century-Fox label is enjoying a major sales upsurge, expected to continue indefinitely with its year-end release of the "Hello, Dolly!" soundtrack LP, which stars Barbra Streisand and Louis Armstrong.



Having been together for 10 years, the Seasons' longevity is unique among pop groups on the scene today. Gaudio feels that this is due to the fact that other members are encouraged to "do their thing" outside of the group so long as the group is not neglected. Hence Frankie Valli, their lead singer, has recorded a couple of hits on his own and Gaudio has been involved in several outside production and writing ventures. Gaudio's latest coup is the production and co-writing of Frank Sinatra's new album, "Watertown," which he wrote with Jake Holmes. He also has produced forthcoming Trini Lopez and Nancy Sinatra records.

The group generally prefers to give concerts as opposed to club appearances, although they have settled down and begun to enjoy their current gig at the Empire Room which began traumatically with sound system hang-ups and a fall by guitarist Joe Long which kept his hand bleeding all during the opening night show.

The Seasons have a new personal manager in Ken Roberts who has been with them for the last few months during which the new Philips contract was negotiated. Although they will not be exclusively produced by Bob Crewe who produced their last single, "And That Reminds Me," they will remain involved with him. They are looking forward to releasing a new album early in 1970.

Cotillion Signs Ronnie Hawkins

Atlantic Records has signed a long-term, exclusive contract with Ronnie Hawkins, whose first album will be released in January on Cotillion Records, the Atlantic subsidiary label. Deal for Hawkins was made by Jerry Wexler, Atlantic Executive VP.

Hawkins has been well known from the early days of rock when he had a few hits of his own on the Roulette label. The band he put behind him in the 1950s, which played small towns with Hawkins from Coast-to-Coast in the U.S. and Canada under the name of the Hawks, developed into one of the key recording acts of the late 1960s as the Band.

It was under Hawkins that Levon Helm, Robbie Robertson, Richard Manuel and Rick Danko paid their musical dues on long, difficult one-nighter tours. They worked for Hawkins for four or five years, then left to go with Bob Dylan, but not before Hawkins had helped them become a cohesive, driving combo. A pioneer in the rock field, Hawkins' loyal following dig his singing, musicianship and comedy.

Rhinoceros At Bitter End

NEW YORK — Elektra's Rhinoceros is a group which has been kicking around unrecognized for quite some time. They have always had the potential to be a top group, but somehow the public never quite caught up to them. This is changing.

The group has undergone some personnel changes and proved to be a major contender in their Christmas night opening at the Bitter End. Their act was animated, funky and polished.

The lead singer knows how to shake it up (he pouts well, too) and the band is always on top of the situation. The group knows they're good but this doesn't keep them from always trying their hardest to please. "Top of the Ladder" was a

"Top of the Ladder" was a smoothie—a testament to their tightness. Their formula is simple: outstanding musicianship plus the ability to improvise equals professionalism. Rhino's new drummer, the Grand Duke, is one of the most powerful percussionists ever seen in these or any parts.

Though their emphasis is definitely on a heavy sound, they are quite capable of putting down a blues-flavored ballad and a country-tinged phrase as well as some freaky riffs now and then.

The audience was as enthusiastic as the group; Rhino deserved their adulation—they work hard for their living. "Get out the Back Door" was a favorite; sly lyrics and irresistible rhythm work.

The band is loud but not irritatingly so. This phenomenon is due primarily to the fact that this group makes music

Getting It Together

NEW YORK-My award for the best publicity job of the year, given to the Wartoke Concern for their job on the Woodstock Festival, stepped on a few toes of those who found me guilty of the sin of omission. Sonny Schnier, Vanguard's publicist, requests that her name be included, as does Dick Gersh who was retained as public relations counsel to Woodstock Ventures and was involved in some of the crucial pre-festival decisions. Both of them, however, were in agreement with my praise of Wartoke (Pat Costello, Jane Friedman and Rod Jacobson). Gersh said that Wartoke had "done a marvelous job" and Schnier characterized their efforts as "fantastic." The award meant in no way to downgrade any of the hundreds of people who made Woodstock work, but, on the contrary, to single out one small group who made the most extraordinary contribution that I, as a member of the press, was aware of. The award, with all due respect to the others, still stands.



Madison Square Garden has been the site of more than one important musical event lately. Sell-outs were accomplished by Donovan, Johnny Cash and, of course, the Rolling Stones. That Janis Joplin had 20,000 or thereabouts screaming fans to greet her doesn't really adequately indicate what went down in her Dec. 19 concert there. She was great, of course. But she was better than great. She was magical.

Remember that Janis has been out of the spotlight for a while, that she has not played New York for well over a year and that her standing has been a bit uncertain. Was she living off of yesterday's headlines? Was her band good enough to support her? Did she have any voice left at all? Who was she? The image was a little faded. Memories of a screaming voice were all that was left and, in light of the recent smash success of Ike and Tina Turner, it was relevant to ask whether she any longer had anything to say. She did.

Paul Butterfield began the show with a fine but extremely long set. His new band is made up of as many good musicians as ever. Butterfield, like John Mayall in England, has been a starting place for countless American young blues talents. He still throbs and lives the real Chicago blues and he has in no way been damaged by the popularity of black blues artists. Butterfield gets it on from the inside.

Janis' beginning was shaky. It took three or four songs for the public address system to get adjusted. But then she got together. Her voice was clear and well pitched; the band was tasteful and together. For about a half an hour she soared, socking it to the crowd with her voice, her songs and her body. From the start Janis looked fantastic; well rested, healthy and sexy. She was at a point which could be described as a peak when she stopped to talk about Port Arthur, Texas, where she came from and how terrible a place it was for a girl to grow up in. "I've finally found someone who got the same stuff laid on him, though," she said, "and I'd like to invite him up to do a song with me. His name is-Johnny Winter." Ecstatic pandemonium as Winter, the white-haired gallant guitar genius, pranced on stage. He was plugged in in a second and playing his clear blues a moment later. Janis sang of Texas and how heartless it can be and Winter played on, singing with Janis and Butterfield who had joined them. His guitar expressed the feeling while re-creating note for note anything that Janis' throat could sing. Butterfield put his hand to his head in amazement. Janis jumped up and down in glee. Winter played and played.

It was authentic rock ecstasy. The song took about 25 minutes and would have been a magnificent climax to a roaring comeback. But this music wasn't called acid rock for nothing. Janis had another surprise which took us even higher. She pulled out an acoustic guitar, and after a short sound system hassle she began "Me and Bobby McGee," a lovely song which was a country hit for Roger Miller and was effectively done by Ramblin' Jack Elliot in his recent stay in New York. Janis began it as a folk song, and the band gradually joined in to make it rock by the end. The song, as Janis softly sang it, expressed so well one side of her: "Freedom's just another word for nothing left to lose

College News

The college students' involvement is obviously beginning to affect the top acts in a way that might start a revolution in college entertainment. Most of the top acts appear on campus for a short concert, usually from one hour to two hours, and leave. This practice used to be accepted, but today's college students are beginning to take a second look at such practices. They want more than a short concert which allows no time for interaction between students and artists.

Those artists who charge the highest prices usually don't want to identify themselves with the students or don't have time because of heavy schedules. Student committees sponsoring artists such as this are critical of the performance and try to avoid such artists in the future. The National Entertainment Conference Artist and Agency Evaluation form carries many complaints about artists who fail to establish themselves with the audience. The Cornell Sun summed up the students' opinion pretty clearly when they reported on one act: "Who's fouling whom?—Group clearly interested in making money rather than music." In other words, it is important for an artist to be an ambassador as well as an entertainer.

One top act which establishes their identity with the college student is the Fifth Dimension. They are aware that it is important to identify with the students through their informal discussion and receptions. Their attitude on and off stage is one of involvement with the audience which is reflected in the great deal of respect students have for the Fifth Dimension. Another such act is the Lettermen, who have been identified with students for years.

Maybe the students' change is due to a greater sophistication or a greater awareness or a greater appreciation for the educational process. Whatever the cause may be, the change is opening up avenues for the new artist which have not been available before. If the current trend continues, aspiring artists will find a ready market in which to show their talent and develop into one of the big acts of tomorrow. Colleges are developing low-budget programs for campus night clubs and coffee houses which are providing new avenues for the new acts and a place to develop their program with a low overhead.

These acts become involved with the students and are appreciated more because they take the time to talk and listen.

—nothing ain't worth nothing but it's free. Feeling good was easy, boys, when Bobby sang the blues—feeling good was good enough for me." Good enough.

From there she managed to maintain excitement with her hits ("Piece of My Heart," "Kozmic Blues," "Maybe" and "Try a Little Bit Harder"), while reaching those who listened with her inimitable philosophy. Janis does exist as a woman and she shows it. When the noisier fans started yelling for "Ball and Chain" (which she eventually did as an encore), she said, "Oh come on, man, let me pick 'em out." When she urged the crowd to its feet, people surged forward with a magic that Mick Jagger was never able to generate. And she refused to settle for mere applause. "Now look. I don't know what you came here for man but I want to know, when that person sitting next to you asks you—what are you going to say?"

There's no way to describe it but she was there. Right there. When people broke through the crowd onto the stage to touch her and almost knocked her over, she shakenly said, "That's not exactly what I had in mind," and the stage climbers stopped. Chaos and violence are not synonymous. She had dedicated the concert to Joe Namath and the New York Jets who nonetheless lost the next day but the magic was there. The art of rock and roll, rather than lost in the past, was alive again, and people were walking out changed at least a little.

Janis is alive. Love is possible for all.

"One third of the people of the United States promote while -Will Rogers (1879-1935) the other two thirds provide."

Taking Rogers' above proportion and applying it to today's pop music industry, you'll find a much higher precentage of 'promoters" in evidence.

By promoters, of course, I'm referring to the myriad titular positions which encompass press agentry, publicity and public relations. It's been through the work and resources of the aforementioned that many a pop name and trend have met success. In retrospect, put yourself back 10 years and think about how you would have reacted to someone prophesying the success of a group like the Monkees or a dance like the Twist.

Indeed, until recently, it's been virtually impossible for an unknown entity to make it without some kind of predetermined campaign. With the formulation of pop's own private mass media in recent years (encompassing everything from Rolling Stone, Fusion and Hit Parader to Teen, Tiger Beat and Fave), the burden has been made somewhat lighter for pop publicists. But they'll still insist that an artist must go through a schedule of interviews, photo sessions, television guest spots and the like if he is to really

Not necessarily so!

succeed.

The recent successful emergence of two entities, an artist named Lee Michaels and a record titled "Je T'Aime . . . Moi Non Plus," have somewhat negated the factor of publicity and put more credence into two simpler channels: actual exposure and

Michaels, for instance, has been a fixture on the West Coast for some time, always eliciting the utmost in audience response and critical praise for his unabashed organ pyrotechnics. A lot of it came through on his records, but it was nowhere near as explicit as his live sets. It's only been in the closing months of 1969 that Michaels has extended his gigging across the country, capturing the fans that were there, but just didn't know about him. It was like starting all over again, but it adhered to his general philosophy of doing his own thing. He's never taken an active part in the publicity-public relations phase of the industry. He hasn't done interviews, TV spots or photo sessions. He's relied strictly on his musicianship . . . word-of-mouth took it from there

And look at "Je T'Aime . . . Moi Non Plus" . . . the celebrated four-and-a-quarter minutes of gentle orchestration, French lyrics and heavy breathing. Supposedly the first top-40 version of the sex act (though actually a carefully produced effort), it held the number one spot on the British charts for three weeks and kept in the upper reaches for more than a month. All that in the face of the fact that it got virtually no airplay. The BBC, which dominates the British pop airwaves, banned it and what little exposure it got was through the small offshore and foreign transmitters . . . remains of the old pirate stations. But underground word-of-mouth made it a smash, already initiating numerous (and more daring) cover versions and even plans for live presentations. The record cracked through the Top 100 charts here recently, getting steady airplay on the FM and college stations. A complete album by the artists involved (Jane Birkin of "Blowup" fame and Serge Gainsbourg) is currently pending release.

Michaels and "Je T'Aime" are but two examples of the success of the non-hype. More are coming into their own all the time. Rightfully so.

BITS: Plans are currently in the works to reunite the old Jimi Hendrix Experience for a "final tour," much like Cream's immense money-making venture of a short while ago. It would be the "offi-(Continued on page 27)

WCBS' Change to Top 40 FM **May Herald Programming Trend**

NEW YORK - Gus Gossert, Program Director of WCBS-FM, and Herb McCord, Station Manager, talked to Record World last week about their recent, possibly innovative change in format.

The station until a few months ago was programmed for "young adults" under a format called "the young sound" which was a primarily middleof-the-road.

Within the last few months, under the leadership of Gossert and McCord, the station has changed to an FM Top 40 format which is unique in its conception and practice. Although the station plays most chart items, it eliminates all bubblegum from consideration and adds two album cuts and two oldies to its liberal 50 record playlist.

Gossert emphasized that the station listens to "literally all product released in an effort to find music that will appeal to our audience." He described the WCBS-FM audience as "young, hip college graduates; people who already know where they are and what they're going to do." Thus he eliminates those sounds that are usually associated with younger age groups like "acid rock" ("I hate that term," confided Gossert as he vainly searched for a more appropriate label) as well as the middle-of-the-road material that used to frequent the station.

The music, although being

the most significant landmark of the station, is only one of the innovations which Gossert WCBS-FM hag instituted. places few restrictions on their air personalities. The disk jockeys are encouraged and expected to express their personalities to the listener. Other distinctive points of the station are a series of about 40 jingles to be used for various circumstances. This differs from the handful of jingles that the average such station relys on. Also, the station broadcasts its community affairs programs at prime time.

McCord said that the first indication of the experiment's success will be in the winter ratings but that he expects no conclusive show of strength until the spring. Indeed, the station's advertising scheduled to begin until mid-January. Should the format prove a success, it could mark a nationwide effort for such open programming, a step which is of both listening and commercial interest.

Pookah Popular In Philly

NEW YORK-An impressive debut in Philadelphia for United Artists' new progressive rock group, Pookah, at the Second Fret recently has led to a return engagement in that city at the Electric Factory. The engagement begun Dec. 26 has them featured with the Grand Funk Railroad.



Jacques Wilson Signs In

By BOB MERLIS

NEW YORK - Jacques Wilson is the creator of the A&M 12-record series, "Signs of the Zodiac." He was in New York recently and visited Record World to talk about the albums and his plans.

Wilson calls the concept used in the records a "theater of the mind approach"; the music of Mort Garson on the Moog and the voices of two actors and an actress (two Aquarians and one Leo) serve to bring out seven points of illumination.

Among the points touched on by each album is a general statement realized in loosely poetic terms of the salient characteristics of the individual born under the sign the record covers. Other points are a key word identified with the sign, planetary motivations or why a given planet influences a person the way it does and a moon chart which the individual uses to plot out the exact cosmic conditions prevalent at the time of birth.

Love Aspects Discussed

The "occult symbologies" of the sign are explored; numbers, colors and gems associated with the sign. Wilson points out that "If you contemplate these things you might be able to get closer to yourself." Also discussed are the love aspects of the sign; what one should anticipate from a lover born under the sign.

The four seasons of a person: the promise, and the effort to gain that promise; the accomplishment of that promise and making the promised contribution, with the final season the expectation of what is to come or the reaping of that which has been sown in the first three seasons.

The last cut is the same on all 12 records. It consists of quotations of literary and scientific figures on the subject of astrology and things cosmic. Einstein's is quite contemporary: "I believe that cosmic religous sense is the strongest motive for scientific research."

Jacques Wilson feels that the series speaks to the individual on a very personal level. "The records serve to reaffirm self-identity in a society plagued by a loss of a sense of self," he says.

Wilson's interest in astrology goes back three years, but he says that "the vibrations" have been present longer than that. He is working on a book of his poetry, "The Love Hunter," and serves as staff poet at KFMB in San Diego. He expects his

radio work to be syndicated to over 50 cities by the end of the year and is working hard promoting the "Signs of the Zodiac" albums by touring the country.

Kenny Rankin: Recognition at Last

NEW YORK-Kenny Rankin, Mercury recording artist talked recently to Record World over a steak and baked potato about his life and music.

Rankin had just finished an exhausting but evidently rewarding day of giving out Christmas presents to kids along with the 9th Precinct police in the Lower East Side. The Sunday before he had entertained at a Christmas Party at the Electric Circus where the gifts had been collected. Rankin, who has three kids of his own, was very pleased with the event and said. "I hope I can do it every Christmas-it was really a groove, man, we just went up to kids on the street and gave them presents.'

Rankin is more than a mere gift-giver, however—he is also a highly respected writer and musician, one who has been making music for 12 years but is just now beginning to get the recognition that he has always deserved. This is partially the result of his contempt for hype, "I've never been much interested in promoting my stuff and taking pictures and

all that. I think that a record is made in the studio not with promotion. I work hard to make music—that ought to be enough."

Rankin's latest album for Mercury is called "Family" and has a picture of him and his family on it. Evidently there was some objection to the cover in certain parts of the country because they are all naked. As a result an alternate cover has been photographed and dealers will have a choice.

Rankin is one artist who takes his music seriously and generally finds nothing to say about it after the product is finished, "What can I say?," he asked. "Tell everyone to buy my records. Now that baked potato," he added with a motion toward his plate, preferring to discuss the present rather than the past, "that baked potato is out of sight."

Bell Gets 'Georgy' B'way Caster

NEW YORK - Larry Uttal, President of Bell Records, announced that the label will issue its first original cast album, "Georgy," from the upcoming Broadway musical scheduled to open in February.

Starring Mellissa Hart, John Castle and Stephen Elliot, with Dilys Watling in the title role, the stage adaption of the hit film "Georgy Girl" is being directed by Peter Hunt, winner of the Tony Award for "1776," and produced by Fred Coe.



She's paid her dues, as the saying goes, and she's about to come into her own. She recently completed the vocal score for "Performance," the film debut vehicle of the aforementioned Mr. Jagger. And she'll have her own solo album, on Ode, coming out in January, featuring herself and Billy Preston.

A Golden Year for Atlantic

A unique innovation in album packaging was launched by Atlantic Records during the summer when the firm introduced the "Blind Faith" LP with two different jackets. It marked the first time in the history of the industry that a new album was presented offering dealers a choice of cover

Four artists earned RIAA certified gold record awards for million selling singles during 1969. They included Aretha Franklin for "See Saw," which marked her eighth RIAA certified gold record for singles; Tyrone Davis' "Can I Change My Mind" on Dakar; Clarence Carter's "Too Weak To Fight," his second gold record in a row; and R. B. Greaves' "Take a Letter Maria."

Aretha's single was produced by Atlantic Executive VP Jerry Wexler, and Tom Dowd and Arif Mardin, Willie Henderson produced Tyrone Davis' hit; Rick Hall handled the Clarence Carter single. Atlantic President Ahmet Ertegun produced R. B. Greaves' smash.

Atlantic's Platinum Record Award for \$2,000,000 in sales was awarded four times in 1969. The Rascals earned it for "Time Peace: The Rascals' Greatest Hits." Led Zeppelin earned it twice, for "Led Zeppelin I" and "Led Zeppelin II," making it the first group to be so honored by Atlantic. Iron Butterfly won it early in 1969 for "In-A-Gadda-Da Vida."

In jazz, Herbie Mann had his biggest hit with "Memphis Underground," and the label had a series of hits by Eddie Harris, Les McCann, Yusef Lateef, Roland Kirk and new singer Roberta Flack.

Atlantic started releasing its own 8-track stereo cartridges last January, selling them to its distributors throughout the country. Sales of cartridges on the Atlantic-Atco-Cotillion labels have boomed all year, and now account for 25 per cent of the firm's album business. (This does not include tape sales made by Ampex, who are licensed to make tapes of Atlantic product.)

In December, Atlantic started issuing its album product on cassettes. The cassettes are being issued simultaneously with the release of LP's, just as the firm has been doing with its 8-track stereo cartridges.

New artists on Atlantic, Atco and Cotillion included Lulu, Crosby, Stills & Nash, Gary Burton, Lotti Golden, R. B. Greaves, MC 5, Black Pearl, Blackwell, Blues Image, The Allman Brothers Band, Fusion, Rosco Robinson, Baby Washington, Z. Z. Hill, Donnie Hathaway, Otis Leavill, Walter Jackson, Banchee, Yes and Taste. Cher was signed to Atco as a solo artist, with Sonny and Cher together continuing their work as a duo. At the end of the year Atlantic announced the signing of two major artists, Mongo Santamaria and Ronnie Hawkins.

Two acts from England had a solid impact in the U.S. on Atco, Blind Faith and Jack Bruce. Two of England's hottest new groups, Fat Mattress and King Crimson, were signed to long-term exclusive contracts with Atlantic in midsummer. Atlantic also released an album by an important rock group from Holland, Golden Earring.

Major Distrib Deals

During the year Atlantic made a number of major distribution deals for new labels. One of the key distribution arrangements was with San Francisco, the new label started by Fillmore owner Bill Graham and producer David Rubinson. First release on the label featured a second generation San Francisco rock act, Cold Blood. Another label distribution arrangement was with Track Records of England. First artist to be released in the U.S. under the contract was Thunderclap Newman.

Sly Stone and David Kapralik entered into a distribution arrangement with Atlantic for their new label Stone Flower. Under the agreement Sly Stone will produce new artists that he signs to the label. Initial product is expected early in 1970. Initial product is also expected early next year from Charles Greene's new Etcetera label, which Atlantic will distribute.

Atlantic made arrangements in the fall to distribute Phil Walden's new label, Capricorn. First release featured the Allman Brothers Band.

Foreign Sales

Foreign sales for Atlantic Records were excellent in 1969, with many of the firm's top acts becoming best-sellers abroad. Strong sales were scored in England and European countries, especially in those countries visited by the company's top names during

the year. The company has had several big hits in Europe this year. Percy Sledge's "My Special Prayer" was number one in Holland for several weeks. Vanilla Fudge's "Some Velvet Morning" was number three in Italy for many weeks.

One major change in Atlantic's foreign distribution during the year was made when Warner Bros. Records of Canada, Ltd. was named Atlantic's Canadian licensee.

The continuing growth of Atlantic was noted in the promotions and the additions to the company's executive staff during the year. Three new VPs were designated in 1969: Bob Kornheiser was named Vice-President in charge of liaison between sales and prpomotion; later he assumed the position of head of Tape Sales; Shelly Vogel named Vice-President, Finance; and Bob Rolontz was named Vice-President in charge of Advertising and Publicity.

Rick Willard assumed the post of National Sales Manager of Single Records for the Atlantic-Atco labels. Johnny Bienstock was named National Sales Manager for Cotillion Records, while Dick Kline became Cotillion National Promotion Manager. Dave Glew joined the firm to handle album sales for the three labels, succeeding Len Sachs. Three additional field salesmen were appointed including Charles Goldberg, Dick Krizman, and Tom Davies.

Jerry Greenberg was promoted to head of pop promotion, under the aegis of Henry Allen, Atlantic' VP, Promotion. New field promotion men were added to the firm's staff, including Dick Wooley, John Minkove, Bob Gaitors, Bob Breedlove and Vince Faraci. Margo Knexz joined Atlantic to take over distributor-promotion department liaison. Bettye Marx was named manager of the firm's music publishing companies, Cotillion and Walden Music. Mark Meyerson was named executive assistant to Vice-President Jerry Wexler, succeeding Jerry Greenberg. Jack Howe was named assistant to President Ahmet Ertegun. Mark Schulman was appointed to the position of executive assistant to Vice-President Nesuhi Ertegun.

Jim Delehant and Shel Kagan joined the company in the A & R department. Danny

'Judy. London. 1969.': The LP That Was Never Meant to Be

By DOUG McCLELLAND

NEW YORK-What ever the artistic merits of the current Juno Records LP, "Judy, London. 1969.," it is a significant show business document presenting the last recorded vocals of the great Judy Garland.

Record World chatted with the producers of the package last week, Croma Music heads Robert Colby, President, and Ettore Stratta, Vice President, who also have the Blue Records label, distributed by Atco. Both Blue, whose Frank Pourcell album, "Aquarius," is doing well, and Juno are new labels, the latter being the more recent and also clicking with the Ken DeCell single, "Through a Dark Glass Brightly."

"Judy. London. 1969" is Juno's first album—an album that was never meant to be.

According to Colby, "Judy was signed to Juno about a year and a half ago. We were looking for material when she went to London for an engagement at the Talk of the Town cabaret, and we planned to record her in a studio in England, where she had decided to live, at the end of the Town engagement.

"Our idea was to cut all new material with Judy. She did four of the new songs in her act there. The album was taped by her husband, Mickey Deans, over five nights in January and February of 1969, all from a table in the club. Ninety per cent of it was done on the closing night of the engagement. The act was recorded more to boost her morale, really, to show her what she was still capable of."

Judy Loved Tapes

"She loved the tapes, and said, 'Can't we put these out?' But we told her we wanted to go into a studio and do even better," he went on.

Stratta noted that "The most we hope for with this album is to show that Judy was doing a terriffic job and was ready to do great work again. The 'up' sound, the conversations - we hope that all this will erase the rather 'down' image she left behind her in the states just before going to London."

Continued Colby: "We had planned to record Judy after the Talk of the Town, last May or June. John Spence, Tom Jones' arranger and conductor, was going to do it. But our schedules were always prohibi-

"The Beatles also were interested in recording Judy. We were agreeable, since we felt it very likely would benefit all, but it never got beyond the talking stage," Colby revealed.

Stratta mentioned that there would probably be a single from the album, a new song, "I'd Like to Hate Myself in the Morning," written especially for Judy by John Meyer, who introduced Colby and Stratta to her in the first place.

How did they find Judy? "Even near the end, she had periods of rare brilliance and wit. But she could wear you out —she wanted to go, go all the time," revealed Colby. "She hated the business aspects of her profession, couldn't be bothered with them. When we brought her the contracts to sign her, she said, 'Just give me the pen.'"

tablishing per-minute rates, varying with time of day and use (feature, background, commercial) of music.

The following letter has been sent by BMI President Edward M. Cramer to Wood:

Dear Mr. Wood:

I have your letter of December 19, 1969 which I received on December 22, 1969. I will not comment on your characterization of our existing licensing arrangement except to point out that:

1. The agreements between BMI and CBS have always been consistent with the Consent Decree entered into between BMI and the United States government.

2. At no time has CBS ever objected to the existing form of license nor did it initiate any

discussions relating to a revision of the license.

3. At all times, CBS had the right, as did BMI, to terminate the agreement. By not terminating, it obviously indicated its satisfaction with the license.

4. It was BMI, not CBS, that terminated the license because BMI objected to the unfair and inequitable manner in which CBS was paying for performing rights.

Nevertheless, we continue to be prepared to enter into negotiations with you, looking forward to a new license. As you know, the BMI Consent Decree provides for several alternate licenses and we are ready to explore any of these with you. In fact, since April, we have attempted to enter into meaningful negotiations looking forward to a new license.

You must recognize the fact that after January 1, 1970, the BMI repertory will not be available to you if CBS is unlicensed. Any performances occurring thereafter are deliberate and willful copyright infringements under Sections 101 and 104 of 17 U.S.C. In view of the limited time left, I suggest you call me immediately so that we can arrange a meeting with a view to resolving this matter.



James Brown Still Fantastic

NEW YORK — Outside at the entrance of the Appollo Theater, Harlem's Carnegie Hall, was a poster which read "Many have gone from the ghetto to glory and forgotten—JAMES BROWN is back with his fantastic show."

James Brown, in what was rumored to be his last New York appearance for some time, was still loyal. As usual he began his show by saying "Regardless of my success and popularity I'm still a soul brother. And don't think that I ever forget who put me where I am today—it's you."

James remembers and evidently always will. An intrinsic part of his show, as always, was giving, and though the act is highly ritualized by now, the gift is real and the fans love it. Brown's energy and sweat is genuine. The epithet, "the hardest working man in show business," is among the most accurate in the music business and the James Brown empire is kept on top by dint of the tireless work of its king.

The Brown show itself has evolved to a reliable soul nostalgia which has as much entertainment as ever (he is the slickest and most professional performer in music today), but is without the blazing fire that used to attract screams and panting. Indeed, the only disturbance was one holiday-"spirited" middle-aged lady who kept screaming "Sock it to me!" while Brown charmingly calmed her. This is his heaviest asset: he ignores no one, and so the show's familiarity bothers no one. Like a movie so good that you want to see it several times, the Brown show is a breathing entertainment with an ever-mellowing soul.

For what it's worth, "Mr. Please Please's" thing included the new "Let a Man Come in and Do The Popcorn," the classic "Say It Loud-I'm Black and I'm Proud" and the slower "If I Ruled the World" and "It's a Man's World." The show featured Marva Whitney who sounded great with her "It's My Thing" and "Foolish Fool" as well as comedian Clay Tyson. In the middle, there was a dance contest for little kids which was won by an eightyear-old named Mary who took home a color TV.

The show seemed a little wooden at times, of course, but Brown does perform something like 300 nights a year. And in

his late '30s he is in better voice and dance than any of his white contemporaries. In this "rock and roll revival" time, Brown's show was ideal—an audio visual catalogue of the greatest and most successful soul artist who ever lived. Like Johnny Cash, his closest country counterpart, Brown has his ambivilances and a slight excess of polish but that he is one of the greatest artists to ever mount a stage is nothing short of obvious.

The Rise of Uncle Dirty

NEW YORK - Uncle Dirty, New York's hottest comedian, stopped up at Record World recently to talk about his sudden success, his past, his future, life and death.

Uncle Dirty, whose real name is Robert Altman, started doing comedy about four years ago but only has started to work regularly within the last year. He started at the Cafe A Go Go when Howard Solomon, his roommate at College, realized that he had no one to go on one night. Altman went on and "just rapped." Following his initial success, he played varioue houses in New York, did "four sets in a row" and then, when everyone had come down to see him, he "bombed."

He went to Florida where he eventually opened a coffee house called "The Flick" which quickly became known as Florida's only folk club. Eventually he sold his share of the club, went to California, spent the money and returned to Florida. It was there that he re-entered the comic field with considerable success. After a few months of playing in Florida, he was asked to come to New York.

In the last year, things have happened very fast for Uncle Dirty and his reputation has grown almost overnight. He has played numerous rock concerts, appearing between heavy rock acts such as Steppenwolf and Santana, and his college and club work, particularly at the Cellar Door, has mushroomed.

Had Many Careers

Before entering the field, Uncle Dirty, now 38, had many careers including a long stint as a stockbroker and a short one as a musician. He has studied comedy the way a musician studies music and is able to repeat riffs of Lord Buckley or Lenny Bruce, both of whom have influenced him greatly, virtually word for word. His own style is personal, Jewish (he is Phillip Roth's cousin), Freudian and always warm and hilarious. He calls himself a "verbal nymphomaniac." His stage manner and personal rap are barely distinguishable from each other, and he speaks about everything with incredible Brucian detail.

He chose the name Uncle Dirty originally because of its curiosity value on a marquee and gradually worked a routine, which he has since dropped, around the name. He told his mother recently that "From now on you'll be known

as 'Uncle Dirty's Mother,' " and said that he considers that a "triumph of sorts." Having done nine TV shows in the last four months, Uncle Dirty has more than one triumph to point to. He does Merv Griffin Jan. 6.

Now living in Brooklyn (but formerly of Newark, N. J.), Uncle Dirty is married (his second wife) and a dedicated vegitarian. The comic field, void of a culture hero since Lenny Bruce's death, has a new exponent of its artistic virtues. In addition to his comic material, Uncle Dirty has composed countless short talk stories which he would love to record. Should he continue at his present rate of progress, he may give entirely new meaning to the word "dirty" before he's through. He is currently appearing at Ungano's. See him. —Dan Goldherg.

Seven Proves Lucky Group

NEW YORK - The Seven. Thunderbird Records contemporary jazz-rock group from Syracuse, were recently in town to cut their first single. Material to be recorded includes two original songs, "Song" and "Rachel," and two new versions of older songs, the Zombies' "Tell Her No" and Martha & the Vandellas' "Heatwave."

The group has mastery of 19 different instruments and uses six voices in their act. An observer, who has seen them and heard a dub of theirs, has said "Their tightness has only been surpassed by the Cream." The Seven consists of Al Ruscito, Jr., group spokesman, trombone and trumpet; Frank Sgroi, sax; Chuck Mellone, organ and group leader; Tony Licamele, drums, Nick Russo, singer and percussion; Chuck Wheeler, guitar; and Chuck Sgroi, bass.

The group, one of the top acts in upstate New York, has a real club act; audience participation is encouraged and plenty of excitement is generated. They have performed at the Bitter End in New York; Gilligan's in Buffalo; the Aerodrome in Schenectady; and The Club in Rochester.

The Seven describe their material as "Revamping with more hip arrangements with lots of brass and voices."

Dot Records has followed Clifford's "See Your Way Clear" with release of a single version of cuts from the album -"Baby I Could be So Good At Loving You" and "Children Are Crying Aloud.'

Clifford's growing catalog of contemporary songs, which includes the recent chart hit "Echo Park," is published by Hastings Music Corporation, the BMI wing of the Big 3. Buzz has plans to tie in with the total campus promotion via college concert appearances. Clifford is currently organizing a group to back his personal appearances and is developing new creative and staging concepts for his first bookings early in 1970.

London Lowdown

LONDON—A January album worth waiting for—Noel Coward and John Betjeman reading their more recent works. Last week was Noel Coward's 70th birthday, and all entertainment media have been concerning themselves with revivals of Coward's plays and songs. The presentation of the Master's works to a new generation has certainly been an eye-opener on the economic use of the English language to maximum effect in lyrics. Climax of the 70th birthday celebration was a dinner given for Coward at the Savoy Hotel, London, to which the cliche "everybody who was anybody was there" could truly be the tag line.

Walter Woyda has been appointed General Manager of the joint Pye-G.R.T. Tape Company. Current duties of Woyda are Special Projects Manager with the Philips company; his new appointment takes effect early 1970 . . . Music for Pleasure budget company plans expansions for the New Year. Richard Baldwyn, Managing Director of M.F.P., confirmed that in November the company moved 1,000,000 albums. The new plans for one and possibly two more labels have names and prices yet to be confirmed. Baldwyn said, "Increasing competition in the budget line makes it necessary to constantly review the market here and abroad." 20,000,000 record sales are the confident prediction by the end of the year's trading for the four years the company has been in business . . . Giorgio Gomelsky has resigned from the Paragon organization, the company part owned by Polydor Records. Giorgio has been associated with many recording stars and was instrumental in guiding the careers of the now disbanded but much influential Yardbirds and more recently was associated with Julie Driscoll and Brian Auger Trinity. Paragon started three years ago mainly to handle independent clients and many of Polydor's artists. Giorgio's future plans are unsettled, but such a personality does not remain out of the picture for long . . . Lou Reisner, Executive Producer of the Mercury label for the past seven years, has bowed out of the company to set up an organization with composer Quincy Jones and author Harold Robbins. The new complex will incorporate films, management and record production divisions. Name chosen for the company is Symbolic; the label will initially be launched in the U.K. and America. Dunwich Productions, Ltd., of Chicago and Terrace Music Corporation of Nashville have worked out co-op plans to benefit both companies.

Although Terrace Music and Dunwich Productions will continue to operate independently, negotiations between Al Jason of Terrace and Bill Traut and Jim Golden of Dunwich have created several mutually-owned ventures. One is the formation of jointly owned publishing wings. Many of Dunwich's artists, writers and producers are planning and making trips to Nashville to find more ways to utilize the Terrace facilities.

Al Jason, President of Terrace Music Enterprises, stated that, although there will be an increase in the production activity and expansion of their studio facilities, the primary goal of Terrace Music will continue to be directed in supplying artists and A&R men with hit material.

With all the trimmings of a Broadway or Hollywood premiere complete with searchlights and police escorts, Wheeling, W. Va., Mayor James L. Rogers cut the ribbon Saturday evening, Dec. 13, officially opening the New Capitol Music Hall, formerly the Capitol Theatre. The dedication placed the modern WWVA Radio-Jamboree under one roof in downtown Wheeling.

Among the dignitaries present for the ribbon-cutting were Ohio 18th District Representative Wayne L. Hays and West Virginia Secretary of State John D. "Jay" Rockefeller, IV. Four hundred were guests of WWVA prior to the first show of Jamboree U.S.A. They toured the new complex and were feted at a cocktail reception. As the invited guests were viewing the new facility, thou-

LONDON - The British Country Music Association has elected Goff Greenwood, Mike Storey and Jim Marshall to head their Administrative Board for 1970. The BCMA has now been incorporated as part of the Country Music Association of Great Britain. They

have a very am bitious schedule lined up for 1970 which i ncludes organizing another visit to Nashville for the convention in October and

Murray Kash putting out six issues of their BCMA Bulletin. The BCMA has been invited by Mervyn Conn to present the awards to artists in various categories at the 1970 Second International Festival at Wembley.

Hank Locklin, accompanied by the popular British group Country Fever, has just concluded a successful tour of Ireland and Great Britain. They went as far afield as Galway and Castlereigh in Eire and as far North as Aberdeen in Scotland, playing to capacity business. The audiences numbered as high as 3-4,000 a Show. Promoter Lou Rodgers, who has been bringing Hank over to this part of the world for the past seven years, reports that it was a great compliment to Locklin's popularity to play to such marvelous business considering that this was his third visit this year and was here as recently as last September. Rodgers' plans for 1970 include bringing over more Nashville stars such as Tex Williams, Jeannie Seeley and Cal Smith.

Two more country venues are now in operation in the Midlands of England, a ballroom in Birmingham with a capacity of 4,500 and one in Manchester that can hold up to 6,000. They will be presenting a country music show every Sunday night featuring American and British performers. This is indicative of the growing popularity of country music in these areas.

The BBC radio show, "Country Meets Folk," featured a great Bluegrass foursome on

their Dec. 13 show with Brian Golbey, Pete Stanley, Nick Strutt and Roger Knowles . . . Tower Climber Turns Chart Climber

Guy Drake is a 46-year-old steeplejack who contracts with radio station owners to maintain their transmitting towers. Drake's operation covers some 500 stations in the Southeast.

Guy had wanted to record one of his self penned songs for years, so seven months ago he moved to Nashville from Weir, Ky. and began calling on A&R men with his proposition: he wanted to have the first release on his tune, "Welfare Cadillac," and he had to have his release within 30 days. Two or three of the dozen producers he approached wanted the tune but showed no interest in Guy as an artist.

Drake finally ran into Bullfighter Music's Don Hosea who met Guy's conditions, and within 30 days "Welfare Cadillac" was released on Tripp Universal Records. Drake and Hosea took copies to all the station managers to whom Guy was contracted for tower maintenance. The approach worked, and "Welfare Cadillac" got air play and listener reaction.

Dick Heard of Royal American Records investigated the initial action and offered to purchase the master. Heard's deal was accepted and the orders began to flow in. Heard told Record World that he has sold 40,000 records since Oct. 12th.


