NEW YORK—At the annual meeting of AGAC last week, Ervin Drake, Vice President, announced plans for the formation of an International Guild of Authors and Composers for the purpose of achieving solidarity and cooperation between all songwriter guilds in the world.

All members of this projected informal federation would reserve complete autonomy.

To this end, an International Guild Committee has been formed, co-chaired by Leonard Whitcup and Ervin Drake, backed by Sheldon Harnick and Robert Colby with AGAC members from the West Coast to be appointed at an early date.

Invitations to participate have been sent to various guilds of authors and composers throughout the world. Enthusiastic acceptances in principle already have been received from Great Britain - David Heneker, Chairman of The Songwriters Guild of Great Britain; France - Roger Fernay, Vice President of Syndicat National des Auteurs et des Compositeurs de Musique; Germany-Raimund Rosenberger, Stellvertretender President of Deutscher Komponisten-Verband; Australia - Eric Gross, President of the Fellowship of Australian Composers; Holland—Jack der Kinderen, Executive Secretary of Vereniging van Woord- en Toondichters der Lichte Muziek; and Malta—F. X. Pisani, Executive Secretary of the Guild of Maltese Composers and Authors.

AGAC feels that the world community of authors and composers should receive the same benefits and protection in the U.S. that American writers receive abroad. To that end, the International Guild Committee is calling on all authors and composers throughout the world for a combined effort to correct existing inequities.

A Letter to Dave Rubinson

■ Dear Dave Rubinson:

You can't imagine how surprised I was to pick up my copy of Record World and find your article (Nov. 21, 1970). It made me real sore, but not at you, my uneducated friend, because I'm a libertarian and I believe in you being able to do and say anything you want that doesn't infringe on the rights of others. What upset me was Record World printing your old wornout cliches under the heading of "Dialogue." Underneath it said, "We welcome letters on all subjects pertinent to our industry." Will someone please show me how this nonsense is pertinent to our industry?

As for you, Dave, let me point out a few facts. I'm probably younger than you and I'm just as interested in a revolution that will improve this world from its present hypocritical state, but you're not advancing our cause. You were not trying to reason with people, to convince people in your article. Instead, you were bitter and filled with hate. For instance, you don't seem sorry that the world is in its present state, you seem glad so that you will have an excuse to fight "the old people" or the "establishment," or whatever it is you refer to as "them." The revolution that you visualize will never happen because you need me and hundreds of thousands like me across America and the world to bring it about. Oh, you may say the revolution is already here because last Thursday you had some friends over and you smoked a few joints and laughed and made love, and sat on the floor and talked about how different things are now. But 20 years from now you're going to wake up and see that nothing's changed and the reason nothing's changed is because when you did have a real chance to help the revolution, like writing an article in Record World for thousands to read, you screwed up.

Must Have Benefit of Doubt

You see, Dave, when a man wants to criticize constructively. he must make sure that every point is closely reasoned and he gives the criticized party the benefit of the doubt. In other words, he understates his case to keep from building more resentment than necessary. I am giving you the benefit of the doubt by suggesting that you were trying for constructive criticism. If you weren't, then you are simply a hate-monger. If so, you should quit. Hitler had you beat before you started. In that article, you did what you accuse "them" of doing. You point out several inconsistencies in the traditional stance and ask if they really expect us to believe them. As you said, "You know very well we are not unintelligent." Well, don't you know that "They" are not unintelligent either. And the more intelligent a man is the more careful you must be in talking to him for the simple reason that the first time you make a mistake, tell a lie, shade the truth a little, he will catch it and you have lost the chance to convince him of your point of view, and we do need to convince people whatever you think.

Well, Dave, no one could have lost more intelligent people than you did. A few examples? You state, "You told us love was filthy and ugly." "You told us to hide our love in dark rooms." "You told us our bodies were vile." But Dave, the truth is that I heard a little of that stuff, too, from the nuts and fanatics that no society has ever been without, but all in all, it didn't inhibit me. My life is full and wonderful. You said, "Once you have lied to me, I will never believe you again." A statement like that may really turn on the idealistic person but it turns off an intelligent and realistic man, for he could never believe anyone. All of us have lied.

You also say, "There has never been a drug-induced hippie

riot." I'm not disputing the truth of that statement, but I am disputing your giving it as a pure fact when neither you nor I know if it is true or not. You have not been present at every riot. Besides, what is a drug-induced hippie riot? Does it mean that the main leader who stirs up the group is under the influence of drugs or does it mean that the majority of the mob is high? Just what does it mean and who are you to decide if it's never happened? It would take a huge team of sociologists several years to find out the truth of your statement but you go right on as if all readers accepted everything you say as facts. You state, "You are the lies, and we seek only the truth." Everything's black and white isn't it, Dave? You can do no wrong and "they" can do no right. How juvenile. That page of trash you wrote is the most absurd, egotistical, unscientific conglomeration of assertions I've ever read. You have done our generation a great disservice by holding us up to the ridicule of intelligent men.

Early in this piece I referred to you, Dave, as uneducated. I don't throw words around like that just for effect. I used that word after careful thought. Any man with a normal education who was applying that education to the problems you speak of could not have written what you wrote. For instance, history teaches us about the Europeans who settled America. They came from civilized societies, but when they landed in America, they had no schools or churches or streets or stores. They starved froze, the weak died, they were killed by animals and Indians, etc. Finally, the ones who survived lost their civilized ways and became as savage as the land. These people pushed westward across the greatest wilderness on earth and every day, seven days a week, 12 months a year, a man struggled from daylight to dark just to feed his family. The problem was just one of survival. When a boy was six or seven, he started helping his dad and he worked from then until his death. In societies of this type there is no revolution, no generation gap.

Had Time for Philosophic Questions

But as soon as our society reached the place where we could offer young people security, education, freedom from hunger and cold, give them time to think, then you have your radicals and militants. Our generation is the first such. My father was born in Smithville, Tenn. in 1910. He was milking at six and plowing by mule at nine. He attended a one-room school, learning only basics, and left home at 17 to work in the steel mills of Detroit. He worked like a dog to give me and four brothers and sisters all the "advantages" that are common now. We had time to sit and think about the philosophic questions of life: Who am I? Where am I going? Is the traditional way that I've been taught really the best way to live? I decided no, that I could formulate a better life, a new life style.

Now, Dave, here is where you and I separate. I looked at Mr. Agnew, Mom and Dad and I said thank you for what you have done. I believe you did the best you could under the circumstances, but I believe I can do better because you have given me better circumstances in which to work. I also decided to try and reason with them quietly, but failing that to let them die gracefully, with my love, and believing their own way. Compare that, Dave, with what you have written and if you still believe you're right, then answer me this: Since a man's ability and intelligence is controlled by heredity, if we are basically what our parents were, then how in hell did we get so much smarter, so superior? Why are they all lies and us all truth, why are they, as you said, the forces of death and we the forces of life? Why are they so evil and we so good? If in truth, we are slightly better in some ways, by what miracle did we get that way? Is it that we had a better chance and you just don't have the guts to admit it?

Shelby Singleton Speaks Out

(Editor's Note: This concludes a two-part "Dialogue" started last week between Record World and Shelby Singleton, President of SSS International in Nashville.)

Record World: Are you going to try to exploit Nashville talent or are you going to go to the Coast for a hard rock group? What are your ideas about your own company trying to prove what you say, that "Nashville has the ability to become an all-around recording center." The talent's here, the material's here, everything is here. How is your company going to grasp this and use it to make money?

Singleton: We're going to take talent from every part of the United States—every part of the world—but it's going to be a unique type of talent. The perfect combination to have is a self-contained group that writes, plays, sings and performs. Now there are such groups in Nashville. There are groups for which we've taken pieces from various groups and put together a whole new group. In other words, there may be a great guitar player with one group, a good bass man with another one, a good drummer with another one. If you can get them together to make a new combination, sometimes this is the way to do it. Otherwise, you may find a traveling group that continuously books but has no recording contract or anything else but they're a great stage act. Still, the secret to it is being seen in front of the people and have the proper material that communicates with them.

Record World: You keep talking about groups — what about individual artists, what about the Kris Kristoffersons?

Singleton: These type of artists, especially if they write like Kris does or Mickey Newbury, will come into their own light. Particularly because when you go into the studio with this type of person (I don't record either act), I imagine when they write a song they have a definite concept of everything that goes around it and the majority of the musicians in Nashville are so flexible that they could play any type of music.

Record World: You're not only interested in group music, you're interested in Elton John and this type of artist as a company?

Singleton: Well, as an overall company, we're interested in any kind of an act that we think we can establish.

Record World: What about spending money on these acts? How much money do you have to spend? Is it true, as some people in Nashville see it, that Nashville artists are made in the recording studio. They go in because they have a song and come out with a hit and all of a sudden they're thrust upon the public and they have no background in the entertainment field. Is Nashville hurting in this area and, if so, what can we do to change that? Is the money going to come from an SSS International to do this for its artists?

Record Companies Victims as Financial Backers

Singleton: Record companies always are the victims of being financial backers of any act. Unless Nashville can convince the major booking agencies and management agencies to open branch offices in Nashville. This is something that has been discussed quite a bit through many years with William Morris, GAC or CMA or any of the big agencies that draw on Nashville talent, yet they draw on them only when they've got a pop hit, which I think is wrong. Alan Bernard and Don Williams have done one of the best jobs with two of Nashville's talents that can be done with Ray Stevens and Roger Miller, with television exposure. Dub Albritten's office has done a fantastic job with Brenda Lee and they now have Jeannie C. Riley, but most of the other booking agencies in Nashville are geared to the country market. It's not only a problem in Nashville but practicaly any of the booking, promotion and management agencies throughout the South are all in the same type of category.

Record World: It's all done in the studio?

Singleton: Some are being done in the studio. No, I don't think so, I think an act that has an accidental hit that is the victim of a song is not really a recording act. They're a one-shot singer; they have one hit and they're never heard from again.

Record World: What we're talking about is a new dimension, not trying to get rid of the things that made Nashville a suc-

cessful recording center but trying to add a new dimension to that recording center. And to do this, don't we have to get people in who would exploit talent outside the studio?

Singleton: Yes, that's done with management and booking and from this comes the teaching of how to dress, the choreography and everything that goes with it. A complete type of program is always necessary on any act that you plan to build. The stage presence is just as important as what you put in the studio.

Record World: Do you feel that Nashville talent agencies are falling short in this area?

Singleton: Very short.

Record World: Except for maybe the ones you mentioned?

Singleton: Except for a couple, there's none really — what happens is whoever has a hot record is who gets bookings. That's what it amounts to and the New York agencies don't want to hear anything about an act unless they've got a record that's a pop hit. I think this is very wrong. Nashville is getting more and more national television exposure, and I think the main pioneers of this is a guy named Bobby Brenner in New York—he's a friend of mine who helps us get a lot of television exposure for our acts and Alan Bernard, Don Williams, Dub Albritten and this type of people.

Record World: Isn't there a lot of preparation that goes into a good spot on TV? I mean you don't take an artist out of the recording studio and run him right into the TV studio and make him an instantaneous popular figure with the watchers at home.

If Artist Can't Perform, Keep Him Off TV

Singleton: You have to have a tangible reason to get behind something like this. For instance, you have a record you're selling in 10 markets and you're missing 20 and you know that a national TV shot can help you, but it can only help you if the artist can perform. If the artist can't perform, keep them off the television until they can, because sometimes it can hurt as well as help.

Record World: Well, who puts them in a position to become TV performers if they can't?

Singleton: Well, management is responsible for this to the extent that they would put the right artist with the right type of choreographer or the right type make-up experts or whatever it takes to dress them and school them and show them how to move and what to do and what to say. There are very few people who have what I call a natural instinct. It takes a lot of guts to get up before millions of people and sing.

Record World: But Nashville agencies claim they don't have the money to invest in a performer. What's the answer here?

Singleton: I would say that possibly because the performers didn't want to invest in themselves that they're happy to make what they can this year and not worry about the future.

Record World: Now you're talking about a performer who's making a quarter-million dollars a year. What about the new guys coming in; what about the David Alan Coes?

Singleton: I think the new performer that is coming in is willing to do anything.

Record World: But he doesn't have the money.

Singleton: What happens with David Alan Coe—we have financed him from the beginning, including giving him living expenses. It's a slow process of growing with a talent; or if you believe in the performer and you're going to stick with them, then the record companies end up having to invest in them until they get to the point that they're established enough so that a big agency will take over.

To discuss more in a general nature the problems that the record business faces, not just today but in the future, the main problem that we all have is distribution and the availability of the product into a particular market at the time the records are getting exposed on the radio. It's an especially bad thing with country records. Country volume would probably be doubled or even tripled if there was a way the product could be merchandised properly, but because of the nature of this business and the lack of dealers and the lack of financing, tape, although it added to the gross sales of the record industry, has caused an independent

distributor to have to finance a triple inventory now. It's a chain reaction to the rack jobber, to the one stops, to the dealer, right on down the line to the record company where it all ends. One time a distributor had only to finance a single record and an LP, now in most cases it is a single record, LP, an 8-track and a cassette; and the LP, the 8-track and the cassette is all the same basically, yet because of the different configuration involved and with the equipment being sold, it's a necessity that they stock one of each. Therefore, the spread of product available has been narrowed down. Where a guy used to stock 500 titles of LPs, he probably in most cases has cut his inventory back to 200 different titles that are available because he is now in reality carrying 600 since he is carrying three types of the same product. So in the LP market this is a problem.

In the singles market, especially in country product, in most metropolitan markets you will find maybe only one store that handles any type of country product other than country product that has crossed the borderline into the pop market. So availability of product through distribution is a gigantic problem. Independent distribtors carrying 400 or 500 lines are not like they were many years ago when sometimes you'd have five independents and the labels were spread. Now what happens in most markets is you only have one or two distributors that handle all the independent lines. Therefore, it looks like to me that the record business as such or music business is growing into a tape business too now. It may be an audio-video scene in the coming years. It's going to narrow down like the film busines did many years ago where you're going to have major distributors who finance independent record companies and distribute their product. It's already starting in that direction with several labels, but it's going to come to the point where a company my size will have to either get together with three or four labels of a similar size and open their own distribution points or within the next five years go to a major that owns its own branches across the country for distribution. I don't feel that what you have is like the theory that Mercury showed me many years ago. You have all this product coming down, 100 pieces of product, that is available to a place like in a cone—at the bottom of it is a very narrow point to get through to get back out into this spread. This is the reason a lot of record companies have gone into multiple distribution as they call it, where they sell some one stops direct, they sell major rack jobbers direct. The real thing to be is to have only 30 or 40 distributors across the country to control it, but like now we're selling to over 300 different accounts to try to get closer to the ultimate consumer, the buyer, of the record without the stopgap. I think this is the biggest problem faced.

You can create the greatest record in the world, but if you can't figure out a way to merchandise it, it wouldn't mean anything. Of course, everybody can sell a hit but the idea is to be able to sell an act.

New Doors Album





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
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'Total Packaging' Concept Leads Dean's Kitty Mawk Graphics to Grammy Nomination

ing fame is alive and well and living in Hollywood designing album graphics and winning Grammy nominations.

Well, that should be singular as Torrence is presently up for his first Grammy accolade for his design on the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band's "Uncle Charlie" LP cover. In case you haven't seen it (one of the minority), it's the one which contains "Mr. Bojangles."

Torrence, a graduate of USC, was obliged to turn to his avocation and major advertising design when his singing partner suffered an accident terminating their career as a duo. So Dean evolved from recording artist to graphic artist, he told Record World last week. The missing adjective before both of the forementioned professions is top. Dean was a top recording artist and he has since proven to be a top LP designer.

His newly found success is a

result of what Dean terms "Total Packaging." This consists of carefully building a creative, memorable image for the artist. This image is the culmination of A) LP graphics; B) logo; C) billboard; D) posters; and E) other media.

Dean Torrence and his Kitty Hawk Graphics are of the opinion that the art director should serve the recording artist, not put him at the art director's mercy. Torrence recalls the days when he was a recording act frustrated by art directors usually of another generation who told him the 'image" of his music. This unhappy experience has made Torrence aware of what recording artists generally must contend with and, therefore he has made it his astute policy to act as an interpreter to the ideas of the record act.

On his Grammy nomination he worked very closely with the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band's manager. Bill McKuen, who has also been nominated for his photography for this same LP design,

Torrence has done some 200 LP covers, most which adhere to his belief of working with the recording artist not for him, assisting him determine the image they want.

The interview ended when the Grammy nominee had to rush out to meet Nilsson to play a handball game and, during breathers, discuss new graphic concepts for the RCA performer.

HOLLYWOOD — The creative young performer of to-day needs specialized and personalized agency attention, according to Burt Zell of Zell Enterprises.

Celebrating his second year in business, Zell has purposely limited his roster of clients so that he can provide them with this individual attention. Concentrating in the contemporary field, Zell has such acts as Johnny Rivers, Neil Diamond, Linda Ronstadt, Arlo Guthrie and Frank Zappa, among others under contract.

He contends that these talented young people should not be confined to recordings but should be exposed in all media of entertainment. Two areas of exposure that most contemporary acts are failing to take advantage of are television and Las Vegas, he opines.

"As recent demographic studies have proven, television is losing its younger audience—the intelligent young people

of 18 to 25," Zell believes. "Contemporary music is the key to recapturing this audience, but the performers must be presented with proper and intelligent programming."

On the Las Vegas scene, where the majority of acts booked are established entertainers, the resort could attract a large audience of younger people if contemporary music were offered. "This was proven when young people in their 20s and 30s showed up to see Blood, Sweat and Tears play to capacity audiences. These are people with money to spend that Vegas had never seen before."

In other areas as well, Zell believes in "building" an artist, not just "booking" him. He is optimistic about the future of the entertainment business and believes the expansion and development of today's sounds will play a large part in its continued growth.

Problems with rock concerts including gate-crashing, security, counterfeit tickets, smoking, drinking, drug abuse, property damage, late arrivals, no-shows and generally uncooperative acts were heatedly discussed in one of the workshops. Most agreed that the \$7,500 plus acts are those who cause the most trouble while a trend towards smaller, more informal "miniconcerts" at lower cost with less risk of violence seems to be the wave of the future for many colleges.

Files Injunction

The NEC's legal bureau has filed a preliminary injunction against the American Federation of Musicians in the matter of the AFM's contract "form B" which the NEC finds unacceptable for its member institutions. The NEC contends that the AFM provisions contain many objectionable points contrary to both NEC policies and federal and state restraint of trade provisions.

Schaffer will be working closely with Columbia's Director of Public Information, Bob Altshuler, whose department will be handling the publicity servicing function, while Schaffer will operate out of facilities Columbia has provided for Douglas' use, developing concepts and intimate liaison between Douglas and Columbia. Schaffer will be travelling extensively to the homes of music and lifestyle publications throughout the

In addition, Neil Illiano, who has been supervising Douglas' product flow to rollege and university lampuses, will be working closely with his Columbia counterparts while remaining on the road much of the time coordinating Douglas' insurgent activities on college campuses.

According to Davis, Douglas' success in marketing what previously had been considered by the industry to be "esoteric" and limited market product (such as the Last Poets LP which rode the album charts for over six months in 1970 without the benefit of airplay) should be tremendously expanded and reinforced by its teaming with Columbia's marketing force.

Alan Douglas cited Columbia as the company that could best market Douglas record product due to its extensive merchandising ability, and happily noted that under the arrangement Douglas will function, as it does in the book and film media, with absolute independence in product development and supervision of how its product is presented.

During 1970 Douglas released four albums, working them on a concentrated "project" basis, one at a time. It scored successfully with each, Lenny Bruce's "To Is a Preposition; Come Is A Verb"; John McLaughlin's "Devotion"; Timothy Leary's "You Can Be Anyone This Time Around"; and the Last Poets' debut album.

In the coming year, now freed of sales and merchandising duties, the company will function undistracted as an independent label guided by the principles of good music, special attention and relevence. A total of 12 to 15 albums are expected.

Founded in 1962 as Chicory Music (BMI), the production company is headed by Frank Slay and Dennis Ganim.

He oversees the production and publishing activities. Chicory's present activities

Chicory's present activities include the production of singles and albums by three groups: Sugarloaf, Sweet Pain and the Black and Brown Community. The first two are on the UA label; there is no commitment for the last, so far.

"Where we differ from most, if not all, other production companies, is in our involvement with our artists' advertising, merchandising, promotion and publicity. We work with the record company, and have final control over what is done in those areas," explains Ganim. "Also, our contract includes a certain amount of money in addition to the company's regular advertising and promotion budget, a sum we can use in any way we see fit."

Slay and Ganim have purposely kept their artist roster down to the three mentioned, so that their attention can be concentrated as highly as possible. And, as a glance at the sales will show, the method seems to be working very well.

I subsequently heard a dub of his forthcoming album and his second single, "The Tracker," which has to be one of the finest and funkiest gritty singles of the past year or so.

Imagine my disappointment when Anderson came out backed by a psychedelic "heavy heavy" band and sang the "underground top 40." The only saving grace of the set was his incredible voice—a mixture of the Duke-Peacock Texas blue's sound, Cajun calling and the best of hard rock. In spite of the unfortunate choice of material (can you believe "Easy To Be Hard" and "Eleanor Rigby"?), Anderson was impressive in his purple soul suit and another thing-this boy can dance!

Perhaps he was reticent to perform material unfamiliar to the audience and kept away from the excellent songs on his album for this reason. My hope for his future is that he'll see fit to sing his own dynamite stuff whether or not audiences are familiar with it; if he performs it enough they soon will be. It's time for James Anderson to start happening in his own groove and it's time Cotillion put his album on the market for the people to start digging the real James Anderson.

Poco, as their new Epic smash album, "DeLIVErin" shows, is one of the best live bands around. They came through with their usual fantastic set and got the usual wildly enthusiastic response they truly deserve. Poco is a delightful good time band with a dynamic country sound performed with an exceptionally high degree of professionalism. Go see them and have a good time; that's what they're all **Bob Moore Merlis** about.



If there is a more "together" thrush hitting the boites these days, this reviewer cannot think of her. There is an easy, warm quality about Miss McRae's performing that comes from a secure and polished art, and this is something to be cherished in these rather frantic times.

Her dramatic numbers have all the expected impact, while her lighter forays are rendered with characteristic tempered humor.

Among her outstanding vocals were "The Folks Who Live on the Hill," always a joy and especially so when Miss McRae is shining it up with her wistful magic; a haunting "Sounds of Silence"; "For Once in My Life"; an amusing special material piece about Thelonious Monk; and a Beatles medley which, while hardly an innovation, did contain an unusual and effective selection for the songstress, "She Came in Through the Bathroom Window."

With the current rage for nostalgia especially, the combination of McRae and the elegant, almost Art Deco Rainbow Grill should prove a delightful and popular evening.

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Fillmore Show Enjoyable

■ NEW YORK—Spencer Davis and Peter Jameson opened the enjoyable show at Fillmore East (12).

The group consisted of Mediarts' Spencer Davis and Peter Jameson on acoustic guitars, Richard Landes on piano and Steve Somong on bass. This combination of instruments produces the effect of acoustic blues and folk songs with a definite British flavor, Songs like "100 Years Ago" have that soft-sounding, not-too-fast, nottoo-slow pace that gives them that British sound. These numbers were very pleasant but they didn't go over too well with a rough and rude audience at the Fillmore that evening.

One of the most interesting songs they did was "Wash My Hands in Muddy Water," which featured Peter Jameson on bottleneck guitar. This song was similar to a James Taylor style and the audience caught on immediately.

Before bringing out the ninepiece band which accompanies him, Columbia's Taj Majal came on stage with a worn National guitar to do two songs himself. Taj Majal should have been headlining the bill, for he and his group were the real excitement of the evening. The group had a fast, heavy blues sound. In some songs they used four tubas at once, which makes for a very deep bottom! The band also combines the effects of electric piano, guitar, brass and, of course, all the dynamic energy of Taj Majal himself (which includes flute and harp, and he even whistles extraordinarily). The total effect was fantastic.

Next on the bill were the Chambers Brothers, also Columbia's. This was their fourth appearance at Fillmore East, and the audience was, as always, ready and waiting for them.

Doing songs like "The New Generation," "Can't Turn You Loose" and "Love, Peace & Happiness," the Chambers Brothers received tremendous response from their fans. One especially noteworthy tune was a slow song, "When Evening Comes," featuring the lead guitarist on vocals. With a strong, yet mellow voice, this was perhaps the one that many will remember most from this particular performance.

Byrds Fly High at Carnegie Hall

NEW YORK — The Byrds, who have kept up an extraordinarily high level of musical output since their founding in 1964, delighted a fanatic Carnegie Hall audience last Wednesday (17) with an outstanding set and three encores.

With Roger McGuinn at the helm, the Byrds (Clarence White, Skip Battin and Gene Parsons) performed in a wide variety of styles from the acidish sound of their obligatory extended version of "Eight Miles High" (which has unfortunately become an "Inna Gadda Da Vida"-like signature number for them) to the Jimmy Reed blues standard "Baby What You Want Me To Do."


In between were some fine acoustic numbers with drummer Parsons doubling on banjo; the finest of this variety was Woody Guthrie's "Pretty Boy Floyd" which was included on their "Sweetheart of the Rodeo" album. Their latest Columbia LP is entitled "(Untitled)."

The Byrds are a group with a fantastic repertoire, a devoted

following, an easy-going approach and, the cliché aside, good vibes. In the personnel department, they are close to nonpareil considering the imaginative guitar work of both White and McGuinn and Bettin's very musical bass. It wasn't surprising, therefore, that after the third encore was over the crowd hooted and stomped for more. In the Byrds' case the adage "too much of a good thing" doesn't hold much water.

Opening the bill was Redeye, whose "Games" on Pentagram is a happening single. The first impression one gets is that this is a pleasant enough group of competent musicians. As the set wore on, their music didn't hold up well because there is nothing especially distinctive about it. Redeye was not objectionable, but much of their work has been heard before in one form or another. Additionally, what the world needs now is definitely not another group with the old 20-minute drum solo-rave up routine; something fresh would have been more appropriate.



Frankel also said that Kinney had attained record revenues and income for the fiscal year ended Sept. 30, 1970, at a time when many companies were suffering from the decline in the economy. Revenues for fiscal 1970 were \$514 million, net income \$33.8 million, and income per Common and Common equivalent share was \$1.90.

Part of Program

Shareholders voted to change the name of the Company from Kinney National Service, Inc., to Kinney Services, Inc. Frankel pointed out that the name change is part of a program to build "a better recognition of Kinney, the corporation." He stated that "In line with this quest for better recognition, we have also designed a new Kinney trademark. It will appear on the covers of millions of comic books and magazines, on millions of record albums and tapes, and on thousands of uniforms. In animated form, it will identify our television programs and motion pictures where millions of people will see it. 



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NOTES FROM THE BUNDERGROUND

By CARL LaFONG

Musical product is shaped by influence, there's no getting around that.

Whether those influences are musical or not isn't the point. Take a couple of recent album releases for example:

Play any cut at all from the debut album by Emerson, Lake & Palmer and dig the ocean of musical energy that Keith Emerson, Greg Lake and Carl Palmer provide. ELP takes up where the Nice left off in terms of instrumental improvisation (particularly Emerson and Palmer), with the added bonus of highly listenable vocals by Greg Lake, ex of King Crimson. The chief influences are clearly musical, not just classical. ELP assimilates an eerie array of styles, but the energy in their recapitulation of such cuts as the Bartok-inspired "The Barbarians' is what makes it for them.



On the other hand John Lennon's recent opus. It is clearly and ultimately the product of psyche influences. There's plenty of music there and it is, in its own simple and uncomplicated way, just as intense as ELP, but the charts say that record buyers would rather have the deluxe instrumentation of George Harrison's album. which more clearly parallels the music factors of Emerson, Lake & Palmer.

Okay, now listen to the newly-released second album by former Steve Miller Band guitarist Boz Scaggs. It represents one of the most in-

teresting amalgamations of influences on the market—cultural, geographical and musical—as well as psychological. It is an album produced by an Englishman (Glyn Johns) for a former Texan (Scaggs), who now lives in San Francisco, and it incorporates extremely strong Latin and country flavors as well as blues and gospel.

"Moments" it's called and it is a good contrast to his debut solo effort which he recorded for Atlantic nearly two years ago. The earlier work was recorded in Muscle Shoals and featured some of that area's best musicians. It turned out to be one of those inside albums that just didn't sell other than to musicians and producers.

The Columbia album was recorded in San Francisco and featured the musicians of his own touring band and background vocals by such notables as Dorothy Morrison and Rita Coolidge. It is generally a more vibrant and varied blend of influences. Good music.

According to Scaggs, the difference in the two albums can be attributed to the dual factors of producer and locale, "The approach to both albums was exactly the same," he said, "but Glyn made the difference. He was in complete control throughout the album."

He further pointed out the differences in San Francisco and Muscle Shoals recording.

"Basically, San Francisco is more creative . . . the studios are more advanced and the musicians are more aware of the newest trends in music and techniques. The South, on the other hand, is more formula-ized. Each studio's personality is unique to the musicians who play there."

Scaggs formulated his present band about eight months after he completed the Atlantic album. It includes Jymm Young, kevboards; Doug Simril, guitar and keyboards; David Brown, bass; George Rains, drums; Pat O'Hara, trombone; Mel Martin, saxophone, flute; and Tom Poole, trumpet,

In the year since the band's formation they have worked steadily in and around San Francisco and have been adopted by the locals (à la other transplants like Sir Douglas, the Youngbloods) and they are now indigenous to the Bay Area, both culturally and musically. As Boz describes it, "We're to San Francisco what the J. Giels Band is to Boston.

In short, Boz Scaggs and company reflects the new spirit of San Francisco music-a refined potpourri of musical influences.

Jake Holmes-Discovered at Last

MOLLYWOOD-It's not that | the talents of Jake Holmes have laid dormant; but rather that until now the public, curiously seems to have overlooked this Polydor recording artist.

Holmes, who says, "I prefer to be discovered rather than be hyped," has suddenly found himself to be the music industry's latest serendipity. After four LPs, he has finally been discovered and considered a major talent.

Ask Holmes how his career has grown and he'll tell you that it's been anything but elementary. Jake Holmes, who goes back to the days of Tower Records, has had his struggles, peddling everything from comedy routines to his songs. But then, it's not everyone who can peddle their songs to Frank Sinatra. Jake has a way of capturing life via his lyrics, and therefore it's not surprising to

learn that many people like Sinatra are beginning to record and cover his tunes.

His own Polydor single, "So Close," came that close to making it big. It's a little discouraging to lose a great record, but still it can be compensating just to know people recognize the fact that it should have been a hit.

Other things people are starting to recognize about Jake in addition to his face (since he is frequently guesting on TV) is that he is an intense, articulate person. Perhaps it is his confidence in his own abilities that makes him so good-that, and the fact that entertainer Jake Holmes has been 10 years in the making.

Jake makes his Carnegie Hall debut in April. He is currently working on another LP for Ron Baron Polydor.

Chief engineer Ronny Capone of Stax Volt is clucking like a mother hen over his new Spectrasonic 16 track board. He'll give a quick course in electronic sound reproduction to anyone who'll listen-but keep your hands off the buttons, baby. Carla Thomas had the initial use honors, putting down her new LP. From what we hear, the album will do more to showcase Carla's great versatility than any previous effort. Other Stax news: by the time you read this the Staple Singers album will be released and the group will be winding up its sevencity, cross-continent tour. Bar-Kays have a newly released LP. "Black Rock," which features their new lead singer Larry Dotson. In the "They Come and Go" department, Caboose lead Gary Johns left after finishing the group's first album to become a dobber with Danny and the Dirt Dobbers. He was quickly replaced by rock/blues singer David Mayo.

The meeting of Memphis Music, Inc., originally scheduled for mid-February, was cancelled in favor of a mid-March date. The change was dictated by an influx of late-arriving information requests. And, since membership is the name of the game, time has been allotted to allow more of these late-comers to join. The search goes on, meanwhile, for suitable property for the construction of a Memphis Music Hall of Fame.

Still no word from Dan Penn and Beautiful Sounds Studio, but rumor had it that the studio is for sale. Whatever the reason, it's a funky place with a great sound and an atmosphere that's hard to come by in the newer super-decorated studios.

ATI Does It Their Way

NEW YORK - American I Talent International (ATI) was formed six months ago out of a desire to "do it our own way," according to Ira Blacker of the firm. He and agency principles Sol Saffien and Jeff Franklin are all refugees from big organizations where they became fed-up with the red tape and politics involved in the operation of same.

Blacker sees the rock world as badly in need of stimulus which ATI hopes to provide with its upcoming tour of Savoy Brown, Small Faces and the Grease Band. The tour is unique in that none of the three acts are headliners at this point, although each possesses an established and respected name. It is hoped that with the combination of the three groups into one package will come a tour as successful as one by a single supergroup, and that in the end each act will emerge strong enough to support a tour of its own. Recordings are due from each group at the start of the tour, which will last two months. Record sales will be booming by the end of the tour.

Meanwhile, the agency is actively acquiring new artists, among them Iron Butterfly, Juicy Lucy, the Bonzo Dog Band and Long John Bawldry. And, oh yes, ATI also handles the Broadway smash, "The Me Nobody Knows."

BOSTON — "People haven't stopped buying classical records; record companies have stopped selling them."

This was the opening quote by Tom Mourey, representative from Deutsche Grammaphon Gesellschaft in Germany at the opening of a new 6 output recording studio here last week. Located in Symphony Hall, the home of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, the studio's purpose is to make recordings right from the hall itself. Symphony Hall, sometimes referred to as the best concert hall in the United States, is also used by the Boston Pops, who will also be recording on Polydor Records in conjunction with DGG.

DGG will keep up their standards with the Boston Symphony by using "the newest and best recording equipment" put together by DGG's Group Recording workshops. The mixer has 33 input and 6 output channels. It has quadraphonic output, which provides four different channels of sound. WCRB-Boston and WGBH-Boston will be broadcasting the recordings made by

DGG using quadraphonic output, each station providing for two channels of sound.

After the presentations by Peter K. Burkowitz, Director of Recording for DGG, and Tom Mourey, the first recording made by the Boston Symphony in association with Polydor and DGG was previewed.

Personal Opinion: Tim Rice

■ LONDON—Tim Rice, former EMI recording engineer and production assistant to Norrie Paramor, some two years ago set about writing and producing with Andrew Lloyd Webber a "rock opera," in double album form. Many people in the London music world thought them over-ambitious, but that same album recently reached the top spot in the Record World LP charts, "Jesus Christ Superstar."

Space in Record World to say my bit about the music business. A chance to blast off with any one of the thousands of dynamic original and, of course, entertaining ideas that leap into my mind every time I pick up a music paper and get annoyed by someone else's view. But suddenly my army of comments, frank, perceptive analyses and abrasive, revolutionary solutions to everybody's music problems dissapear fast when I actually face up to the challenge of writing a piece of coherent English about the industry I have worked in for five fascinating years. However, holding back my desire to list my all-time top 10 (which would have Del Shannon's "Runaway" at number one), and quickly slipping in the fact that I am delighted that Tony Ashton has at last got his long overdue huge British hit ("Resurrection Shuffle"), I do find that I have one major beef which I do not believe my predecessors in this column have touched upon. (David Symonds and Jonathan King, how I endorse your every word about English radio.)

Roughly speaking (very roughly), one can divide the people in the glittering music industry into two major categories—the artistic (i.e. singers, musicians, songwriters, most producers) and the professional (i.e. record companies, managers, agents, publishers, etc.). Of course, this is a crude division and there are many notable examples of men with their feet firmly in both camps. (There are even more un-notable examples.) But this generalization enables me to put forward my argument.

I am fed up to the back teeth with those representatives of the creative side of the business who arrogantly assume all members of the professional side are money-grabbing, power-crazed maniacs whose tastes are Philistine and whose gods are green-backed. Many artists or composers may have genuine gripes about the mishandling of their work by men who do not understand their artistic aims. But the belief that all music professionals are by definition three forms of life below all creatives is manifestly (Continued on page 50)

Among the foreign artists: Aguaviva, Carosello; Wallace Collection and Samantha Jones, EMI Italiana; Rare Bird and Jimmy Cliffe, Phonogram; José Feliciano, RCA; Antoine and Mungo Jerry, Ricordi; and Nino Ferrer, Sif. The participation of these artists will be confirmed only after the final selection of the songs.

If you don't want your work to be recorded, don't make a record. Stay at home and play your music to three friends and your mother: Don't try to communicate, because then there is no danger of evil commercialism creeping in.

Of course, there are a quota of slobs and incompetents with the sensitivity of retarded water-buffaloes in the professional side of the music world, but this slob-rating is more than matched in the ranks of the creative side. The two halves of the music industry must have mutual respect for each other, and on the creative side this respect for the other half is lacking.

And after all at the end of the day who ranks higher in the eyes of God—a marketing chief or a bass guitarist? We can't all be Beatles and it's a good job we aren't. So come together creatives and professionals, and when you finally go to that great top 100 in the sky these words will be relevant to all:

I think of the things we've done together while our hearts were young

Which amazingly has brought me back, in a rather contrived way, I'll admit, to Del Shannon.

BOOK REVIEW

Country Book Full of Laughs, New Wrinkles

Country Music: White Man's Blues," a new book by John Grissim (Paperback Library, New York, \$1.25), is probably the most objective contemporary view of "now" Nashville to date.

Names are misspelled and a few facts reportedly are distorted, but it's the type of work that keeps Music City moguls from taking themselves too seriously. A good reflection for inside readers. Grissim is a sometime Rolling Stone writer who is the most perceptive outof-towner yet to report on the hard-to-crack Nashville music

The author overlooked the absolute fact that WSM, Inc., fathered the recorded music business in Nashville. Had it not been for WSM's staff engineers and musicians, the technical personnel would not have been around to build the old "Castle Studios"; and what of the Opry and salaried people like Jim Denny, Jack Stapp, Francis Craig, Owen Bradley and Fred Rose?

Grissim's approach is a little too heavy for the casual observer, but for a reader educated to the doings and people in Nashville, it's full of laughs and new wrinkles.
