

Stein Produces Rock In New York City

■ NEW YORK — Contrary to rumors that Howard Stein is negotiating to take over the Fillmore East, Stein has announced that he will be producing concerts on a weekly basis at the Ballroom at Manhattan Center, 34th St. and 8th Ave.

This spring Manhattan Center was the scene of a three-day pilot program featuring the Grateful Dead. The series was so financially successful that at that time Stein negoti-

ated a long-term agreement with Manhattan Center.

"It is purely a coincidence," emphasized Stein, "that we have entered New York City as the Fillmore is leaving. Our plans were made long before word of the Fillmore's closing was announced."

The Ballroom at Manhattan Center will be the first free-form ballroom situation in New York City. The hall will have a \$5 general admission with a

Scepter 'Cream' LPs to \$5.98

■ NEW YORK — Scepter Records has announced a new retail and distributor price schedule for its "cream" LPs.

In explaining the new policy, Sam Goff, Scepter Executive Vice President, pointed out that the move was necessitated by rising costs and pressures from within the industry, essentially retailers and racks. He said, "The new pricing policy has been carefully reviewed and is highly selective so that only our best selling

product reflect the price increase."

Ed Kushins, Scepter National Sales Director, is orienting all distributors this week at Scepter's regional meetings. The gist of the price change is that the Scepter 500 series which is predominantly Dionne Warwick, B. J. Thomas and includes "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" will be at a new suggested retail of \$5.98. This will increase

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It's Not Too Late to Save NARAS:

Streamline Awards, Alter Voting, Enroll Young

■ Probably the first things that NARAS has to do to make itself more responsive to the present status of music in this country is: 1. Streamline the Grammy Awards; 2. Alter the voting procedure; 3. Enroll more young members in the organization and induce them to run for office.

None of the adjustments are easy, but the most dramatic could be the streamlining of the Grammy Awards. There might still be as many awards as there are now, but they would be more easily understood. There should always be a Record of the Year and Album of the Year Award, with any type of music qualifying — jazz, pop, country, blue or even classical. Other awards should be in the pop (including rock), blue, country, jazz and classical categories, with awards for traditional blues, gospel, sacred, traditional folk, religious, and Best New Song of the year (jazz, country, blues and pop). And there should be an engineering award, plus special awards made by the national offices of NARAS. At the end of this week's article is a list of suggested NARAS Grammy awards categories.

It is most important to alter NARAS' current voting procedure, because, as mentioned earlier, many NARAS members who work for record companies vote almost exclusively for their own firm's product. One way to alleviate this problem would be to limit the amount of categories any one person could vote in. NARAS members would only be able to vote in, say, five out of 15 major categories. This would mean that each member voting would vote almost entirely for a category he was familiar with.

The hardest job of all for NARAS is to enroll younger members. A recent ballot for officers of the New York Chapter indicated that out of about 30 nominees less than five or six were under 30, and more than half were over 40). You can be over 60 and still know a hit group or a hit record, but older hippies are fewer.

Young producers and many young artists look on NARAS as stodgy and very establishment. True or false, that's not the image to have. What can be done about it? Well, first the organization could direct some mail appeals to all owners of new record labels, and to all producers listed in various year books and source books to join NARAS. Perhaps in that mail appeal it could be explained that a NARAS member can nominate someone for a NARAS award, whether the music the artist plays is *today* or *yesterday*.

These young craftsmen, artists and producers, sidemen and songwriters, liner note writers and illustrators and photographers, are not going to join NARAS on their own. They have to be cajoled into joining the organization. Younger members will have to be sought after. But it's worth the work and the energy because most young artists would like to belong to a NARAS—if it's a NARAS they can believe in.

NARAS can be made believable as long as today's music—pop music—is not ignored. As long as Captain Beefheart and Alice Cooper and the Stones and Iggy and the Stooges and Jim Morrison and the Doors and many "outlaw" or "underground" groups get as much of a shake as establishment figures. They can and they will get a shake as long as there are young people in the organization to nominate them and vote for them.

Let's work on getting that kind of a NARAS with an enthusiastic, youthful, vigorous outlook. More on NARAS next time.

Records and affirms the company's commitment to its Artists & Repertoire staff."

Waronker, who has been a staff producer with Warners for the last five years, will coordinate the activity of the label's house producers as well as the work of independent producers to insure that maximum creative energy will be expended on behalf of the recording artist. He will also be responsible for the lifeblood of the recording company, the acquisition of new talent. In addition, Waronker will continue to produce several artists for Warner Bros.

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4,000 Applaud Atlanta Tops of Pops Benefit



At Atlanta Tops of the Pops Benefit: Bill Lowery, Billy Joe Royal, Tommy Roe, Ray Stevens; David Leanse, Simon Trane, Roe; Dennis Yost and Classics IV; and the Tams.

■ ATLANTA — Hometown recording stars Ray Stevens, Billy Joe Royal, Tommy Roe, Dennis Yost and the Classics IV and the Tams more than pleased the 4,000 persons assembled in the Civic Center Auditorium here for the Atlanta Tops of the Pops benefit concert (14). Proceeds from the first annual Atlanta affair will go to the educational projects of the Atlanta Chapter of the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences and the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra.

Failing to perform as scheduled was Capitol Records artist Joe South who missed his flight in Panama City, Fla. He was unsuccessful in obtaining a charter flight due to inclement weather. Audience reaction to South's non-appearance was surprisingly agreeable as the hometown crowd applauded each performer with gusto.

Tommy Roe, often called the "High Priest of Bubblegum," proved that his talents are not confined to his hits but include a versatile repertoire of popular songs. Highlights of the Roe set were "Jean," "The Greatest Love" and his ABC Records hits.

Ray Stevens, suffering from laryngitis, had to stop in the middle of "Mr. Businessman" explaining that the complexity

of the vocal arrangement would not permit him to finish the song. However, the audience was totally with him from that point as he entertained with a "Ray Charles Medley," "Ahab the Arab," "Love the One You're With" and a medley featuring the big hits of 1970 including "Everything Is Beautiful."

Billy Joe Royal turned in an outstanding set polished with the poise and professionalism of an artist preparing to open in Las Vegas for his fourth time. Entertaining with his Columbia Records hits, Royal answered an encore with a rousing version of "You Gave Me a Mountain."

Spotlighted Hits

Two Atlanta groups Dennis Yost and the Classics IV and the Tams provided excitement with performances spotlighting the hits they popularized. Highlights of the Classics IV set were "Spooky," "Stormy," "Traces" and "It Ain't Necessarily So." "The Tams Medley," a collage of their big hits, was the crowd-pleaser from the Atlanta Tams.

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Mathews Exits Paramount

■ NEW YORK — Edwin F. Mathews, Director of West Coast A&R for Paramount Records, announces that after a series of recent meetings in New York with Bill Gallagher, label President, he has decided to terminate his association with Paramount.

"The termination is an amicable one," stated Mathews. "Gallagher and I have been associated successfully for many years, but his newly-developed philosophy for Paramount which will have the label concentrating on broadly based production deals as Artie Ripp and/or acquisitions such as Blue Thumb, limits the expansion potential of our West Coast activities. During my career, I have enjoyed my role as a developer of talent, rather than as an administrator—when I joined Paramount, this was our major emphasis in California.

"Now that Paramount has elected to pursue a new philosophy, I feel restricted inasmuch as my primary function would now be more directly administrative rather than creative. We have made some fine additions to the Paramount roster in the past year that I'm sure will be successful in the months ahead. I sincerely hope the Paramount family of labels continues to prosper and grow."

Gallagher stated, "I regret having to accept Ed Mathews' resignation. I asked Ed to join us shortly after I came to Paramount because I knew his past accomplishments more than qualified him for the challenge. During the past year, he has made a fine contribution to the revitalization of Paramount.

"As Ed has stated, during the past few months we have formulated certain new directions for the label based on studies of current industry trends and well-developed goals for the future. In order to accomplish these, we have placed our major emphasis on attracting producers with proven talent and label acquisitions with already established rosters. This new philosophy would, of necessity, require Ed to spend a great deal of his time in administration, and unfortunately for Paramount, he has elected to continue to concentrate his career in creative areas."

Gallagher also stated, "Paramount's West Coast reorganization is not fully completed as yet. However, both the Blue

Thumb and Artie Ripp's Family Productions groups will remain autonomous units in the Paramount family of labels. Paramount's world headquarters will remain in New York in the Gulf+Western Building and the New York staff will function as the merchandising and marketing force for the Paramount family of labels, which includes Jeff Barry's Steed label, Dot Records, Michael Lang's Just Sunshine Production Group and the Famous label which is currently being marketed the United Kingdom."

Don Burkheimer will continue to head up Paramount's A&R Department and he will concentrate primarily on the future development of Paramount's roster of artists. Jim Foglesong will now head up Famous Music Corporation's Nashville interests which will include music publishing where he will work with Marvin Cane. On the recording side, he will be responsible for Dot's C&W roster, under Burkheimer's supervision.

Lewis Exits MGM Label

■ NEW YORK — Albert A. Lewis, Director of East Coast Operations for MGM Records, has left the firm.

Lewis is a financial and contract specialist in the entertainment field with extensive experience in the areas of royalty payment and artist negotiation. He is a graduate of Pace College and a 14-year veteran of the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer organization, with 10 of those years spent in the record division. Prior to assuming his most recent post, Lewis was Director of Business Affairs, East Coast, and assistant to former MGM Records' Presidents Mort Nasatir and Arnold Maxin.

Prima Signs James

■ LAS VEGAS—Louis Prima, President of Prima Magnagroove Records, has signed guitarist Ronnie James to a long-term recording contract.

James has been appearing with Prima at the Desert Inn. His first release for the Vegas-based label is "Two Face" b/w "Oh Happy Day."

Liberated Myrna March Speaks Out on Problems Facing Women in the (Disc) Business World

■ (Editor's Note: With Women's Liberation so much in the news and a growing factor in the business world, Record World this week holds a dialogue with one of the music industry's outstanding women for an insight to just what gender engenders. Myrna March is a prolific writer, successful singer and President of her own independent production company.)



Myrna March

Record World: Myrna, you're a multi-talented woman in business. Your company has had a degree of success in a short time. First, we'd like to find out what made you go into the production and publishing business since you had a lot going as an artist.

Myrna March: Well, gratifying as it is, working as an artist only gives expression to that talent. In order to express the other talents I felt I had to have and an organization and direction began building a company.

Record World: How?

Myrna March: By looking for the people with knowledge and abilities in music—publishing, promotion, management . . . all the facets. I recognized that I would need people with abilities that complemented mine. As a writer, I needed someone with a thorough knowledge of publishing. As a producer, someone with abilities in arranging, engineering, etc. With that kind of a backup, it leaves me free to concentrate on the creative aspects.

Record World: Does it work?

Myrna March: I feel most enlightened label executives appreciate the total concept. You're not just going to them as a songwriter or as an artist's representative or just any one thing. You're bringing a package, ready for them to distribute and sell, which much like the film business today, is the direction the record industry seems to be taking.

Record World: Was it difficult to set up?

Too Aggressive to Sit and Wait

Myrna March: It really was an accident waiting to happen. I was a contract writer with one of the publishing companies and got discouraged after turning out 21 songs in 10 weeks and seeing absolutely no action. Having been a performer, I wanted to hear them. I was too aggressive to sit and wait for the company to get around to showing them and thought maybe I ought to run with them myself.

Record World: Why didn't you?

Myrna March: My biggest problem was being afraid to call people on the executive level. I attended a Gavin convention and surprisingly learned that many people knew me as a performer and were receptive to hearing material.

Record World: As a woman do you feel they were just being polite?

Myrna March: Not really. Most top men in the business are too busy for that. They know that talent and product is what makes a deal; however as a woman it probably helped get appointments in certain cases.

Record World: Do you find the sex factor presenting any problems?

Myrna March: I don't, but perhaps some of the men in the industry do. In my mind a meeting is a business appointment and

I would hope that others look at it the same way. If they can get past an appraisal of legs, etc., then talent, material and the terms of a deal can be objectively measured.

Record World: Do you dress as a woman or dress for business?

Myrna March: I dress as I feel. I never really think of business as something to prepare for. I can be in jeans with no make-up, or in hot pants and a new hair-do. I really lose awareness of womanhood and try to let the talent out.

Record World: Do you find that male execs can deal with you on a man to man basis?

Myrna March: Quite often—yes. But there are the times when they throw up womanhood and I sometimes get the feeling that it's really a defense mechanism employed during the negotiating process.

Record World: Do you find the business details difficult to handle.

Myrna March: I try to limit my direct involvement to the creative level. The nitty-gritty money aspects are finalized by my attorney. It's better that way. I wouldn't want to be haunted by the feeling that I had a feminine advantage . . . or was taken advantage of as a woman in a deal.

Record World: Have you encountered any problems or do you anticipate any—like being chased around the desk?

Tries to Overlook Casting Couch Approach

Myrna March: I try to overlook—and overcome—the casting couch approach. Maybe it's naiveté, but I've never been able to tell the difference between a proposal and a proposition. Dating back to my active performing days I found, as in all businesses, there are a few unethical "animals," but I just won't deal with them—there are too many nice people in our business. I'm flattered by this kind of attention, but never let it try to sell for me.

Record World: Have you encountered any difficulty in dealing with the acts you produce or for whom you write because of the female angle?

Myrna March: On the contrary, I think it's worked to establish a better rapport. A kind of "den mother" role is assumed and soon the ability to give guidance and the benefit of my experience to them is translated into winning their confidence. Having "been there" they know I tell it like it is. Once the rapport is established we can deal on a talent level and Bert and I can decide if we want them on our roster.

Record World: You mean Bert Keyes, your partner?

Myrna March: Yes.

Record World: How did you and Bert get together? And, by the way, what's his feeling about working with a woman for a partner?

Myrna March: Well, we knew of each other by reputation and I guess there was a mutual respect for each other's talents. When we first talked about a production company partnership, Bert was somewhat reluctant. He was afraid he wouldn't be able to disassociate everyday business functions and needs from the usual emotional patterns of a woman.

Record World: How did it work out?

Myrna March: Again, we dealt from the creative level and put all emotional hangups aside. We decided right from the beginning that there could be no place for male ego or female wiles. We disagree, sometimes fight—but have built a respect for each other on a level of talent and that overrides everything else. I found that he can put male pride aside and he found that I can be aggressive, so we now complement each other's abilities rather than compete on a male/female level.

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'Rare Earth Day' Kicks Off Third LP

■ DETROIT — To prove good things come in three's, Rare Earth Records, Motown's rock subsidiary, has proclaimed June 30 as "Rare Earth Day," marking the start of a massive sales campaign to promote "One World," the third album by Rare Earth.

The Detroit group made a heavy impact with its first album on Rare Earth, "Get Ready," which was followed with a hit single under the same title. With "Ecology," the group's second LP, Rare Earth established itself as a potent force in the rapidly expanding

pop/rock field, selling almost four million records last year.

Since November of 1969, when the group first broke onto the nation's best selling record charts with "Get Ready," Rare Earth has maintained a solid chart position for 20 consecutive months.

"One World," shipping this week, was co-produced by Rare Earth and rock arranger Tom Baird, the Motowner who contributed so successfully to the two previous albums. The album includes a variety of material, from Rare Earth's interpretation of Ray Charles'

"What I Say" to their new single, "I Just Want To Celebrate," released concurrently with the LP.

Rare Earth label has mapped out one of the most extensive promotional campaigns in the company's short but successful history for "One World" and "Rare Earth Day." Campaign buttons proclaiming Rare Earth Day are being distributed in huge quantities for public distribution by dealers.

A special over-sized poster of the new album's cover, a dramatic group portrait of the Rare Earth sextet reflecting the

album's title and theme, is being shipped to over 3,000 retail locations as part of the million dollar promotion.

This together with advertising in magazines, newspapers, radio and free-form stations is expected to expose "One World" to over 30 million potential buyers, according to Rare Earth Sales Director Joe Summers.

"It's a summer powerhouse album," Summers said, "destined to continue Rare Earth's domination of the charts." Besides, the third time is a charm, right?

Warner Packages 'Hot Platters' Sampler

■ Under the supervision of Merchandising Director Hal Halverstadt, Warner Bros. Records is readying another one of its creatively packaged sampler albums. Like the preceding six, the newest sampler, "Hot Platters," will be available only through the mail for \$2.

The samplers are prepared and packaged at such a low cost in order to acquaint the consumer with a wide selection of tunes by Warner/Reprise recording artists from recent album releases. As was the case with the previous samplers, neither the label nor the artists will derive any profits from "Hot Platters."

"Hot Platters" comprises

four subtitled sides of hot wax from the Warner/Reprise family. "Rock Salad" includes "Master" by the Doobie Brothers; "Higher Ground" by Jackie Lomax; "Macon, Georgia" by Savage Grace; "Colonel Chicken Fry" by Stoneground; "Crow Jane Lady" by Crazy Horse and T-Rex' "One Inch Rock."

Side two of "Hot Platters," labeled "Strange Bedfellow Jello," features Randy Newman's "Last Night I Had a Dream"; Gordon Lightfoot's "Ten Degrees and Getting Colder"; Norman Greenbaum's "Circulate"; Jethro Tull's "Up to Me"; "Memo from Turner" from the "Performance" soundtrack LP; Beaver & Krause's

"Walkin'" and the Trinidad Tripoli Steel Band's "Apeman."

"Kin Casserole" (side three) is made up of groups with members that are related. Featured here are John and Beverly Martyn's "Tree Green"; Rosebud's "Lullabye"; Beach Boys' "Add Some Music to Your Day"; Brave Belt's "Crazy Arms, Crazy Eyes"; Fanny's "Take a Message to the Captain" and the Stovall Sisters' "Spirit in the Sky."

"Hot Platters" winds up with a side devoted to blues-flavored performers. Dubbed "Blues Played Special," the side includes "Tobacco Road" by John D. Loudermilk; "Otis Spann and Earl Hooker" by Memphis Slim; Mother Earth's "Bring Me Home"; Ry Cooder's "On a Monday"; Little Feat's "How Many More Years" and John Baldry's "It Ain't Easy."

"Hot Platters" will be available in July.

Custom Fidelity Pop LP Promotion Wins New Stations

■ LOS ANGELES — KELP, El Paso, WTAC, Flint, and WOHO, Toledo, have been added to the growing list of Top 40 music stations using the new Custom Fidelity Pop album promotion.

This radio promotion is a custom album package containing 24 "Golden Greats" in a two-record set with such songs as "Venus," the Shocking Blue; "In the Summertime," Mungo Jerry; "Traces," Classics IV; and "Going Up the Country," Canned Heat. The album cover and the complete inside surface area are custom designed

for each station, working around the station's call letters, title and pictures of the djs.

Rick Donovan, Manager of the Special Products Group at Custom Fidelity, reports "the album has racked up great sales" with such stations as KCPX, Salt Lake City; KEZY, Anaheim; KRUX, Phoenix; KUDL, Kansas City; and KIRL, St. Louis, among several others.

The Custom Fidelity Company, Inc., manufactures this album entirely within their own plant in Hollywood.







HOYT AXTON—Capitol SMAS 788.

Hoyt Axton has gotten quite a bit of publicity for his anti-drug "The Pusher." That gritty number is here along with a number of other songs that have the insistence of a leaky faucet. The album may not be easy to listen to, but it makes a lot of sense.

JEREMIAH

ALIOTTA HAYNES—Ampex A 10010.

Aliotta Haynes had a rather impressive first album and this second package is even more so, especially "Poppa Song." Fellows are getting country and country in their modes of expression. Just about everything here is tastefully done, although all on the quiet side.



IT WAS A GOOD TIME


EYDIE GORME—MGM SE 4780.



BEGGAR'S OPERA ACT ONE Verve V5-5070.

Perhaps the music herein is inspired by John Gay's immortal "Beggar's Opera," but it doesn't seem to be based on it. What is included is frenzied rock of the sort that some people like and other people can just let pass by. The cuts are few and long, long.



TRIPSICHORD Janus JLS 3016.

Tripsichord (whatever that means) makes a kind of ethereal rock that could get across to some listeners. Certainly their sounds will be given a chance on progressive stations, but whether they are potent enough to capture a large audience and sales is something else.



MUSIC FROM GREAT FILM CLASSICS BERNARD HERRMANN—London SP 44144.

Album will find its admirers among movie fans. Bernard Herrmann began his career in Hollywood writing the lush scores of '40s movies before becoming strident and cacophonous for Hitchcock. This album covers the lush period. "Citizen Kane," "Jane Eyre."



SUNSHINE FLAMING EMBER—Hot Wax HA 705 (Buddah).

Lots of funk and spark from this crowd of fellows. Although none of the songs overwhelms the first time around, it's possible that repeated listens could ingrain the package. "I'm Not My Brother's Keeper" could be the one to step out the farthest. Keep an eye on.



IT'S REAL DALE EVANS—Word WST 8546.

Dale Evans, orchestra and chorus conducted by Anita Kerr, production by Ken Nelson. Sounding just a little bit like Kate Smith, Dale gives her considerable all to some of the hardest of the black spirituals. This is one of the best albums to date from Word. Go, Dale, go, girl.





Nader Rock Revival Proves Best In His Series to Date

■ NEW YORK — One is hesitant to recommend a return to the recording studio for artists who impress at rock & roll revival shows. No matter how great they are in live performance, their sound is generally dated and not really commercially feasible in today's market. There were, however, two groups at the latest (11) Richard Nader-produced Madison Square Garden show who belie this general rule.

They are the Drifters and the Crystals. Theirs is the early 1960s uptown Rhythm & Blues group sound currently undergoing quite a renaissance on hit records by Dawn and Dusk. Concurrent with Carole King's emergence as a major artist has come a revival of the entire catalogue of her early classics, written with Gerry Goffin. And Spector-sound, too, has returned, in Phil Spector-produced albums by Beatles George Harrison and John Lennon and a single by his wife Ronnie, former lead of the Ronettes.

The time would seem right for a return to records by the Drifters and the Crystals. The former have never stopped performing, even releasing an occasional single on their original label, Atlantic. The Crystals, however, hadn't worked together for seven years until their appearance here last week. They remain the same four beautiful girls, precise in their vocals and fun to watch and hear. The only one of their Philles hits that they didn't sing was "Uptown." Maybe next time.

As Good as Ever

Only lead singer Johnny Moore remains of the original Drifters, but the group's sound is as good, if not better, than ever. Their "Up on the Roof," "On Broadway" and "Under the Boardwalk" could be hits today, and just may be for somebody. A highlight of their set was an outstanding medley of classic songs by such rock pioneers as Jackie Wilson, Sam Cooke, the Platters, the Coasters and many, many more.

As for the remainder of the show, it was simply the best of Nader's excellent series to date. Headliners Franki Valli and the Four Seasons and Jay and the Americans are just barely in need of revival. Their seemingly endless string of hits may

be just that. Endless. Either group could return to the charts at any moment. It has not been that long since their last hit record. At any rate, their brilliance on stage guarantees a full house wherever they choose to perform.

The number of the current generation of guitarists who were first inspired by such early rock & roll virtuosos as Bo Diddley and Duane Eddy must be astronomical. Bo's a super-energetic, extra-exciting set simply brought down the house, and Duane's guitar is as twangy as ever.

Perhaps the evening's only disappointment was an ordinary performance by Jerry Lee Lewis, while all about him was enthusiasm and exhilaration. He's a star attraction on the Country & Western circuit these days, and maybe just a little bit tired of playing his old hits like "Great Balls of Fire" and "Whole Lot of Shakin' Goin' On." Still, an ordinary performance by Jerry Lee and his pumpin' piano is a very good one indeed.

The show was marked by an impromptu, a cappella "I'll Be Seeing You" by the Five Satins, Bobby Lewis' "Tossin' and Turnin'" and the return of the Del Vikings with their great hits "Whispering Bells" and "Come Go with Me." Little Eva opened with her hit versions of the Goffin-King classics, "Keep Your Hands Off My Baby" and "The Locomotion." Her vocal approach is very similar to that of Carole King. Food for thought there!

Madison Square Garden was, once again, sold out for the performance. It would seem that Richard Nader will be able to produce his revival shows here forever with equal success. I, for one, hope so.

The Next Supergroup: Redbone on Epic. A year ago Redbone came out with a two-pocket LP. Our 10-year-old son, Mitchell, the drummer, flipped over it. He especially dug the cuts "Rebecca" and "Crazy Cajun Cake-walk." Then the single "Maggie" became a big hit on WIBG, Phila. Epic promo men Don Wright and Don Colberg

kept the group working around Philadelphia. WIBG got a scientific firm to put together a physics presentation in sound built around a phase down-recording of "Maggie" that was presented in about 85 area schools as a promo for WIBG. It helped explode the record. Now the record "Maggie" is also on WFIL and is an even bigger smash. In the meantime, it went on WQXI, Atlanta, when George Burns found it had exploded R&B at WAOK and it went top 10 there. Now Chuck Brinkman of KQV informs us it is a giant request record at the Pittsburgh area hops, and the new PD of WIXZ, Bob Hamilton, reports it to be a giant on their phones. So here we are much later with the single coming to life after 15,000 sales in Philadelphia and their new LP "Potlatch" about 15,000 in Phila.

Who and what is Redbone? It is an Indian term meaning half-breed, which they are. Lolly Vegas on lead guitar is perhaps one of the finest guitarists in the nation. He is unique. You would swear there is an organ in the group: that's the sound Lolly obtains. Lolly is intelligent, animated, fluent and just fantastic. His brother Pat plays bass. His writing is incredible ("Nikki Hoki"). The drummer is a full-blooded Cherokee just off the reservation named Last Walking Bear, or Peter DePoe. His poly-rhythmical patterns which he plays underneath the group are unique. Wah wah guitar is played by Tony Bellamy and he is extremely soulful. They are the most visual, dynamic group since 3 Dog Night. They can also break R&B. They sold out Philly's Spectrum to the tune of 16,000 people and have had 15,000 sold out gigs in three months around Philly. This is the next supergroup. We told you first about Elton John and about Carol King. Now watch.



Message Debuts With a 'Push'


■ NEW YORK — A new recording company, Message Records, is off to a fast start with its first release, "Don't Let the Pusher Push You."

Ike & Tina Turner Superstars at Last

■ HOLLYWOOD—After nearly 20 years of a slow, laborious kind of exposure, Ike & Tina Turner have emerged in the early part of 1971 as two undeniable superstars of the decade. Nothing happened overnight for them. Whether performing on the Chitterling Circuit and doing small clubs or finding a continual futility with sundry recording companies, the Turners have worked hard with their gutsy, primitive soul music for a long time.

The press has newly discovered Ike and Tina as well. Life, Look and Playboy have given the duo extensive coverage while Ebony and Tan have given their covers. Al Aronowitz of the New York Post is doing a three-piece article on them, his first such article since the Beatles. As opposed to a few years ago, Ike and Tina are now only playing the best places no matter what the city. The endless stream of one-nighters is coming to an end by their own choice. They want to do more confined theater-concert type bookings such as Carnegie Hall while turning out a steady stream of quality product.

Acceptance in England

Though being Americans, for a long time Ike & Tina Turner gained a much readier acceptance in England. This was partly due to the fantastic success of their 1966 single, "River Deep, Mountain High," produced by Phil Spector. Some critics have labeled it the most passionate performance ever put on record until Aretha.

At the age of six, in Clarksdale, Miss., Ike Turner began getting into music. He played piano in the house of a lady from the church. In exchange he would cut wood for her. His mother bought him a piano in return for a good report card and the interest in music hasn't waned since.

After high school he formed a group called the Kings of Rhythm. They went to Nashville following local success and cut "Rocket 88," which became Ike's first R&B hit. Dates followed around St. Louis with Howlin' Wolf and B. B. King. In 1956 in a nightclub he met Annie Bullock who became Tina Turner.

Though born in Brownsville, Tenn., it was in Knoxville that Tina grew up singing in gospel choirs and talent

shows. Going to night clubs with her sister at the time, she used to ask Ike if she could sing. "He'd say 'O.K.' but never called me to the stage," she recalls. "One night he was playing organ and the drummer put a microphone in front of my sister for her to sing. She said 'no' so I took the microphone and started singing. I ended up singing several numbers with the group and later I joined them."

In 1959, Ike wrote "Fool in Love" and the singer never showed up for the session. Tina filled in and the single sold over a million copies. After Spector's "River Deep, Mountain High" they were signed to an exclusive contract with United Artists Records, a move which offered an end to the intermittent taste of success with a label here and a label there.

With full support and exploitation of the highest qualitative level, the Turners' arrival marks a late but solid appreciation. Fabergé chose Ike and Tina for the "Album of the Month" TVer July 17 and 18 in 85 key markets nationally.

Their new LP is "What You Hear is What You Get."

Martha Joins Purcell

■ Singer-writer Martha Radclyffe, whose current album for Athena Records is "Martha Radclyffe," has signed a personal management contract with Jerry Purcell.

Young Re-elected L.A. NARAS Prexy

In addition to an across-the-board push on the entire LP release, special emphasis will be placed on the "Howlin' Wolf London Session" album, which was recorded with Eric Clapton, several members of the Rolling Stones, Steve Winwood and other prominent British artists; the new Dells LP "Free and Easy"; Funkadelic's "Maggott Brain" LP which includes their recent pop and soul hit "You & Your Folks, Me & My Folks"; and new artist Diane Davidson, 17-year-old Nashville discovery.

Record World: Can you attribute your success thus far to the encouragement of any particular people?

Myrna March: Oh, yes. There have been many. Singularly, Hal Neely was a big factor. When we began working together—me as an artist, he as my producer—he freely expressed recognition for my writing in the selection of material and for the sense and feel I had for the practical business side of making records. He, in fact, predicted my involvement in my own firm and was a motivating force. Several other label executives and people throughout the industry have been very helpful.

Record World: Do you foresee a growth in the number of women who will become as involved in the business as you have in light of new attitudes and the whole Women's Lib movement?


Myrna March: Obviously there will be, but I don't think it should be strictly as a consequence of any movement—political or otherwise. It boils down to what kind of person one is regardless of sex.

Record World: Please explain.

Myrna March: Perhaps Freudians would relate it to childhood or something like that. For example, I lost my parents when I was quite young and was brought up by an aunt. I had no early image of man/woman relationships. No imagery pattern to follow. So I became like a child without fear . . . not seeing things in terms of male or female and today I like to think of things on a level of ideas and deeds rather than the people representing them. I don't see man, woman, age, color . . . only a person and what he or she represents. People are people—period.

Record World: Then essentially you say it's a mental more than a physical thing.

Myrna March: Right! In business I'm a cerebral person. My address is my mind.

Chuck Mangione. KJR got Top 5 phone requests since they went on the record last week, which confirms Top 3 sales at KLIF. Apparently, this is another record that breaks right away.

Chicago. It is still #1 in Philadelphia. We must point out that the side "Color My World" is even bigger than the "Beginnings" side in the Philadelphia market and, therefore, we recommend that you play both equally.

RECORD WORLD

■ Grin, Spindizzy recording artists, are on the verge of becoming big stars in the rock and roll world. Most of the excitement surrounding Grin comes in the form of multi-talented Nils Lofgren. He wrote all the material on the group's first album. On stage he moves around like the rock star he will surely become, playing extra-fine, high energy guitar. Much of his current prominence is due, however, to his work as a session-man. He has played on albums by Neil Young, Steve Stills and Crazy Horse (who, incidentally, returned the favor by playing on Grin's LP). Bob Gordon (bass, vocals) and Bob Berberich (drums, vocals) supply the bottom and the beat that make up an important part of Grin's sound.



Recently Grin played Bill Graham's Fillmore West. Nils was kind enough to take time off from a busy schedule and answer a few questions.

LaFong: Grin's album is dedicated to Roy Buchanan. Could you tell us something about him?

Lofgren: He's a 30-year-old guitar player from Maryland. I met him a few years ago and see him off and on when I can. He's like the best guitar player in the world. Plus he plays a lot like I like to play. And a lot of my styles

come from him. I appreciate him a lot and always promised myself that our first album would be dedicated to him.

LaFong: Has he ever made a record on his own?

Lofgren: He just finished an album for Polydor. He signed a contract. What they're going to do with him I don't know. I don't think they're handling him properly at all. Like if they knew what they were doing they'd let him do what he wanted, when he wanted and where he wanted. They're not doing that. They flew him down to Nashville and made him play with their musicians and the whole trip. I'm sure it's a good album anyway. As long as he's playing anything.

LaFong: Does he have his own band?

Lofgren: He's a guitar player that plays in a band in Maryland. He gets paid by the singer.

LaFong: Does he ever travel outside the Maryland-Washington, D.C., area?

Lofgren: No. He's got five kids and need a lot of money to support them. He's not like a 16-year-old kid who can tour on the road for two and three months at a time.

LaFong: Did he ever tour when he was a 16-year-old kid?

Lofgren: Yes. In fact he played on the original "Suzie Q" record with Dale Hawkins. He developed that riff, that guitar riff. After that he quit the band. Robbie Robertson was also in that band.

LaFong: It would seem Maryland has a lot of musical talent. Who else besides Buchanan and Grin come from there?

Lofgren: Lots. Link Wray. Bob (Berberich) played him a few times. The Sunflower. Canned Heat's guitar player Henry Vestine. John Fahey, Mama Cass, Peter Tork, Marvin Gaye.

LaFong: What was responsible for your association with Neil Young?

Lofgren: Neil Young saw us at the Cellar Door in Washington, D.C. He was very nice and interested in us and went out of his way to get people to hear us. He asked us to L.A. and introduced us to David Briggs, his producer.

LaFong: Your first album was recorded a long time ago?

Lofgren: About 18 months ago. We couldn't get the proper record deal. (Note: Spindizzy is David Briggs' label and is distributed by CBS.)

LaFong: Are you working on a new record?

Lofgren: Yes. We started a couple of weeks ago in L.A.

Just to prove it could and did, she let loose with the title song from her Broadway hit, "Purlie." That voice could cut diamonds! Then on to "Son of a Preacher Man" with the energy of a summer storm.

A Highlight of Evening

A highlight of an evening with many was her beautifully soft "For All We Know," set in a melancholy mod and accented by a haunting cello accompaniment.

And, of course, saving the best for last was the song that brought her stardom in "Purlie"—"I Got Love." Leaving us all too soon, Melba encored with what is also her current Mercury single, "He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother."

After this remarkable debut and its thunderous ovation, one realizes that talking about Melba now is not the same as it was even hours before. She seems hesitant to accept it—to believe it's all happening to her. But it is, it does. And last week Melba Moore stepped through a door in a career that carried her from a promising artist to a full-fledged star.

Melba is victorious!

After 10 years as a New York actor, Dustin Hoffman, a genius at his craft, was called an overnight star. Buzzy, New York musician, darling of the hip underground, is a true genius at his craft.

Gertie's Folk City is the scene of Buzzy's latest club engagement. It's far from the best place to play. The sound system rivals other West Village bistros. Bad. However, when your name is Buzzy Linhart, you play anywhere, anytime, and sometimes for no pay at all.

It wasn't an easy performance (15). Drummer Luther Riex, caught in one of New York City's major traffic snarls, was 45 minutes late. Luther then filled in as house

comedian when Buzzy broke a "D" string. Topping this, when the set was completed, the first one to shout "more" was Buzzy's manager, Billy Fields. Cheap theatrics, but then, I'm an idealist at heart. The set was worthy of encores, to be sure, but I knew down deep that this was not one of Buzzy's better nights. For the overflowing audience, though, it was sheer delight.

It's going to take the soon-to-be-released Buddah album to put Buzzy over the top. I heard some of the cuts on tape in the confines of the Linhart apartment a few weeks ago. I flipped then, as I did at Folk City for "You Gotta Have Friends," "The Love's Still Growing" and Elton John's "Take Me to the Pilot."

He's got it all. A completely original style, a tenacious capacity for work and, above all, a warm and human personality that makes me honored to be his friend. Hang in there, Buz. The cream always rises to the top.

Big 3 Print Dept. Enjoys School Market Boom

■ NEW YORK — The print division of the Big 3 Music Corp. (Robbins-Feist-Miller) is enjoying an unprecedented upsurge in sales to the school market.

According to Allen Stanton, Exec VP-General Manager, the boom in their educational music traffic is principally the result of the firm's sustained pioneering push to make contemporary music an important part of every school program.

Stanton reports that Big 3 sold in excess of 2,000,000 assorted choral publications to schools during 1970 and more than 200,000 marching band editions which also resulted in substantial performances for their various publishers as a good many of the marching bands were performed on football fields for television programming. The success of Big 3's school music marketing drive appears to parallel their educational department's policy of employing major arrangers, an emphasis on graphic excellence in publication covers and their extensive promotion to schools. Some 30,000 schools are contracted twice yearly by a staff of especially trained educational personnel backed by a major advertising campaign in educational magazines and timed with attendance at conventions and music clinics where educators meet to review new music for their school programs.

All-Out Campaign

Some six years ago, Herman Steiger, Director of the organization's print operation, launched an all-out campaign to bring the more relevant pop material into the school sphere. The big breakthrough in schools sales really occurred when educators were catapulted into the age of Aquarius through the introduction of "Hair." When that happened, the Big 3, which leases "Hair" print rights through an exclusive agreement with United Artists Music publishing, was ready with everything from choral settings to symphony orchestra arrangements of music from the tribal rock epic.

Recently Stanton directed Steiger to further expand the drive to bring more pops into the classrooms. In the past few months the Big 3 has released chorals, marching bands, concert band and concert orchestra editions, stage bands and

string orchestra publications featuring such contemporary copyrights as "Knock Three Times," "Oye Como Va," "I Walk the Line," "Burning Bridges," "Wade in the Water," "Song of Joy," "Everybody's Talkin'," "Sunny" and "The Windmills of Your Mind."

Complementing Policy

The Big 3's educational music drive has been particularly complemented by the firm's astute policy of representing "outside" copyrights for print in all areas including school music use. Through such print right agreements, the Big 3 now distributes a major mix of music editions from the catalogs of the Aberbach Group, Shelby Singleton Music, 4 Star Publications, Gene Autry's publishing companies, the Wes Farrell Organization as well as The United Artists Music Group and some 20 other prominent music publishers.

LPs of Own Material Plus Instrumental Hits Coming for José

NEW YORK—José Feliciano is very proud of his current RCA album, "Encore — José Feliciano's Finest Performances," a compilation of the best of his work to date. But, as with most creative artists, was more anxious to discuss future projects during a recent chat.

José has opened his own 16-track studio in Orange County, Calif., now his home base of operations. There, he hopes to one day produce his own recordings and also cut the many artists and groups that he discovers during the course of his travels, perhaps for a label of his own.

Born in Puerto Rico and raised in New York City, José spent a boyhood with his ears fixed to his radio. He loved the old New York group sound then, and still considers rock and rollers like Chuck Berry and Buddy Holly as major influences on his music today. He's

The Sweet Pain of Success

By TONY LAWRENCE

HOLLYWOOD — What happens to a group with a sincere deference for rock, especially if the group is on the doubtless outskirts of strong success? Sweet Pain, on the United Artists label, is going through the pains of growing while trying to find the right way towards proper exploitation.

"According to Walrus [a regional underground paper], we have the most widely programmed album on FM right now," said their manager Dennis Ganim. But sales are, so far, not responding to that exposure. The album, "Sweet Pain," has been out for 2½ months with approximately 30,000 sales.

"We've gotten good live reviews," said group member J. C. Phillips, "all except for Michael Sherman in the Times. But that's O.K. It can only help us." Another group member, David Riordan, feels that because of the tremendous amount of product with which the FM PD is saturated, a "numbing" process takes place so that many FM stations will only go on a group or act that

is connected with a previously known underground figure. The public, therefore, has a hard time centering in on any totally new product.

In talking of the live performing part of Sweet Pain's image, I was interested to know what an ascending group felt about the proclamation of "the death of rock" with many facilities discontinuing themselves and bookings.

"We would like to feel that we are a good live attraction," said Riordan. "But no concert promoter will take a group that is not connected with either a major artist or a successful single." An example was given of a top booking agency that had a group with a hit but were then told that perhaps they were just "a one hit" group.

At Life Celebration

Sweet Pain has been able to play clubs, however (Ice House, Golden Bear, the Whisky and Troubadour), without exclusive representation and plans now call for them to perform at the upcoming "Celebration of Life" festival down South. They will be performing on the main stage (the fest will run eight days with only six hours of music per day).

"We feel that in addition to doing super numbers, though," said manager Ganim, "we'll have to maybe do something outrageous like take our clothes off. Not that the music doesn't stand up, but just to get people to notice us," he said.

In about three weeks Sweet Pain will release "Timber Gibbs," done when they jammed with Teddy Buckner and some of his vintage Dixieland musicians. Riordan said, "We jammed with them one night and the vibes were great. These guys were supergood old New Orleans jazz." They feel this will be commercial enough for AM without going into a bubblegum bag. This might give them the one "punch-through to mass AM appeal" so that listeners will then go back and listen to previous product.

It would seem that even if the audiences don't take the hint with a future hit and go back, Sweet Pain will continue to go up.

New Kirstein Post

The label reports it has doubled its sales in the domestic market because of the increase in the number of full line record stores with an ever-growing demand for this type of catalogue material. Says H. J. Lengsfelder, head of Request, "With our extensive catalogue, we can now serve the needs of dealers in any area."

Request's expansion does not confine itself to the domestic market. Contracts have recently been signed with Austrian, German, Caribbean, Australian, Dutch, English, Belgian importers, and thousands of al-

bums of over 66 nationalities have already been shipped to the overseas markets. Canada, always a top user of Request's material, has multiplied imports over the last year. Pressing contracts are already in effect in Argentina and South Africa. A few of the leading companies in France are negotiating for such rights to different parts of the catalogue.

Request Records has released 72 8-track stereo cartridges with music of different nationalities. Another group of its recordings were licensed to GRT. This contract has now expired. Request will soon release a substantial number of these and other cartridges under its own label and packaging.

■ One of the most consistent quality jazz labels over the past two decades has been Contemporary Records, operated out of Los Angeles by Lester Koenig.

I spoke to Lester recently, and he seemed optimistic about the current state of affairs for jazz and about his label in particular.

After a couple of years of inactivity, Contemporary reared its head again three years ago. Currently, Koenig is concentrating on three artists. He has just released a double album by Huey (Sonny) Simmons and will soon release a double album by trumpeter Woody Shaw and a single album by Shelly Manne live in London. The double albums will sell for \$6.98 list price. If they sell well, Koenig will release more product in that form.

Huey Simmons, a masterful and creative saxophonist and English horn player, already has one solo album and two collaborations with Prince Lasha on Contemporary, as well as albums on Arhoolie and ESP. He is a significant musician whose music spans many styles and whose recognition is long overdue.

Woody Shaw came to prominence in the groups of Horace Silver, Joe Henderson and Andrew Hill. He has appeared as a sideman on many Blue Note recordings. This date for Contemporary is his first as a leader.

Drummer Shelly Manne needs no introduction. He has had many albums on Contemporary and other labels.

Koenig is excited about the label's activity. He told me, "We will issue about 12 albums a year and keep our entire catalogue of over 180 jazz albums and a number of classical albums in print. We don't delete or repackage albums."

Contemporary remains independent in ownership and distribution. "We've had lots of offers. But it would be too difficult to work in that situation. They are geared to sales, and a merchandising department cannot run a jazz label. We don't cheapen production costs and sacrifice quality. We don't follow passing trends or dictate to our artists. We tell them to play beautiful. We treat our jazz records the way RCA would treat its Red Seal series. The best pressing, the best recording conditions, poly-lined sleeve and other quality considerations."

"Majors delete albums just because they are mono, despite their artistic worth or catalogue value. But the stereo panic is over. Our older discs that are available only in mono continue to sell. Hopefully, those horrible rechannelling techniques are a thing of the past. Also, unlike the majors, we rarely have any returns. And we don't just consider the United States for our albums. A jazz album can sell far more in Japan and France than in the United States."

An important part of the future of black music rests with the dedicated independent. We will deal with more of them in future columns.

* * *

A new label of contemporary music has made an impressive beginning in Germany, Manfred Eicher's ECM Records. The catalogue already includes the Mal Waldrom Trio (1001), the Paul Bley Trio (1003, 1010), the Robin Kenyatta Quartet (1008), the Marion Brown Sextet (1004), the Chick Corea Trio (1009) and Barre Phillips-Dave Holland bass duets (1001). Soon to be released are two Chick Corea solo piano albums and a second Dave Holland album. Eicher wants to release about 10 albums per year of quality, free, improvisational music. He is also interested in obtaining a distribution deal in the United States. The following letter came from one of the leading gospel recording companies in reference to the May 15 issue of *Record World's* "Gospel Time":

"Distributors around the country at present are under-financed and because of this, they need the fast-selling, quick turnover hit to exist. Therefore, gospel, which is a slow-moving item to them, has never been promoted or

stocked properly by them. They use their money to pay the companies that have the current hits first, and as a result gospel has to suffer. Gospel companies get paid last or not at all, and collecting money has become the most important part of the business."

I am thankful for this bit of information. If this is all true then companies may have to cut out the distributors for gospel and deal directly with shops. There are some companies presently who are doing this already because of the lack of interest shown by distributors.



Allied Record Co. Forms LP Package Department

■ HOLLYWOOD—Allied Record Company has formed an LP Package Department that will specialize in the complete handling and packaging of small orders for custom pressing.

The department, headed by Mildred Hemphill, will offer a full-line of services to customers ranging from mastering to the finished shrink-wrapped product and shipping.

According to Jack Wegner, Allied Vice President, the plan was designed to accommodate the hundreds of small LP order customers who are "lost once they've gotten their product out of the studio."

Allied will take that product and make it into a finished product through one of four

different plans and give the customer a total and final cost figure before starting. A price list with the four is available from the Los Angeles-based company.

The four plans are:

A) Mastering, processing, testing, labeling, pressing and jacket (stock picture jacket with maximum of four lines of copy on front, printed liner, shrink-wrapped).

B) Same as A except jacket liner plain white, unprinted.

C) Same as A except jacket plain front and back.

D) Same as A except no jackets, or jackets furnished by customer.

"The advantage of the plan," says Wegner, "is that it enables customers to see what kind of costs they have to meet and they can press according to their exact budget."

Wegner believes that the plan is the first of its type in the industry and is one that will provide a valuable service to businesses, clubs, universities and other organizations that don't put albums out on a regular basis.

According to Hyman who conceived the evening and has signed such star players as guitarist Toots Thielemans, bassist Richard Davis and drummer Bill Lavorgna for his house rhythm section, "the idea is for our members to get together socially and musically. Nowadays, there just don't seem to be enough opportunities for musicians to sit down and play for fun, so we're creating this opportunity, and, if things turn out well, we'll create more. We hope that both top jazz and rock musicians will drop by so that we can go in all possible directions."

Admission to the session will be free to all NARAS members; non-members will be asked to make a two dollar donation, returnable upon joining the Academy.

LaFong: One last question about Maryland. What's it like playing there?

Lofgren: Well, we've been playing there for almost two years. All of us have been playing in local bands for about four or five years but Grin has been playing there for about two years. Playing there is a lot of fun. Everybody knows us and knows the music. Sometimes we play beer-bars and sometimes we play concerts. People come to listen. It's a local scene instead of a big important city like Los Angeles. In L.A. people come to listen but they expect you to have a name and have records out, while back there there are a lot of local bands that are good. People come to listen to you because you are good, not because you've got the big name.

After the Fillmore date, a concert in L.A. with the Incredible String Band and more recording work, Grin will be returning to Maryland. Back on their home turf they will continue to write and play good music.

From their first LP we recommend listening to "Like Rain," "See What Love Can Do," "If I Were a Song" and "Left to Right Below."





■ LONDON—We welcomed our Record World Canadian colleague Larry Leblanc in town last week for two weeks, on business, as well as taking a short vacation. Also good to see Fly's John Kongos record (U.K. Pick April 24) breaking big on both sides of the Atlantic after a slow start here. It is disappointing, however, that Pye Records intends to re-release an old Kongos album which, although good, is not up to his present-day standard.

As expected after his recent trip to London, A&M's boss Jerry Moss has completed a deal to issue Hookfoot recordings in the states. First release under the new deal will be their first album released by DJM here last month and Hookfoot will visit the states for an eight-week promotional tour commencing on Aug. 27. The next important date for the Band, who are proving immensely popular here, is the Reading Festival on June 27, and their American tour is set for September.

Britain's Magna Carta will have the whole of their forthcoming Royal Albert Hall concert recorded this month. The show will also feature jazzman Johnny Dankworth, along with The Royal Philharmonic Orchestra and follows the completion of their superb new album entitled "Songs from Waste's Orchard," produced by Gus Dudgeon. Magna Carta, who are signed to Philips' contemporary label, Vertigo, are currently working on their previously announced BBC TV series, "Castles."

New Roy Orbison Deal

A new recording deal for Roy Orbison was completed last week with Decca Records Chairman, Sir Edward Lewis. Orbison, who has sold thirty million records in his time, has signed a five-year contract for Decca to issue his recordings for the world excepting the United States and Canada where he will be released by MGM. New deal also for AIR London with EMI who will release all AIR productions for the world again leaving out North America. Significant that one of the company's partners, George Martin, is currently visiting the United States recording Sea Train and new act Winter Consort.

As expected, former Music Business Weekly editor Rodney Burbeck has been appointed by RCA's Olav Wyper to set up a press office for the company. Burbeck's move follows the close of Music Business Weekly a few months ago, and he takes with him his assistant Alan Sizer. RCA's press relations was previously handled by Chris Williams' New Dimension company which will continue to undertake specific responsibilities until the end of the year. A new pressman also for Decca with David English replacing John Wilkes.

Quinaimes the Quintessence

■ NEW YORK — Every once in a while a group comes along with that indefinable capacity to make you forget about the vast amount of mediocre talent around today. It happened with such groups as the Youngbloods, the Lovin' Spoonful and the Band. And it has happened again with the Quinaimes Band.

Elektra's Quinaimes, who performed last week at Folk City, have a clean, good time sound which perfectly combines down-home simplicity and musical sophistication. In performing a diversified set which included the bluesy "Try Me One More Time," the '50s rock 'n' roll "Walk On In" and the country-sounding "Don't Take No for

an Answer," they displayed a rare ability to sense just when to be soft or loud, happy or sad. And while the vocals and harmonies were excellent, especially in an a cappella gospel number, the group was most impressive in the coordination of their instruments, with the result that it almost seemed at times that there was only one sound coming across, instead of six different instruments.

Quinaimes closed with their about-to-be released Elektra single, "Look to Yourself," the most commercial tune of the night. Hopefully, this song and this group will catch on, for a combination of talent like this does not present itself often.

Consisting of Glenn Leopold, on guitar and songwriter for the group; Steve Goldrich on piano; and Gil Roman on bass, Gun Hill Road displayed good, tight harmonies and a pleasant stage presence. Highlights were "Dog Catcher," "Cargoes" and "42nd Street."

Mark/Almond on Move

■ NEW YORK—Mark/Almond makes the sort of music that I thought jazz-rock would sound like when I first heard that term some time back. At least that's what I heard at their abbreviated, equipment problem-plagued set at the Gaslight at the Au Go Go last week (9). Theirs is a sound that derives from the small jazz combo instrumentally, incorporates a folk feel vocally and maintains the freedom and energy of rock.

The group is led by Jon Mark, acoustic guitar and vocals, and Johnny Almond, who played vibes and sax during the set but is proficient on seven other instruments as well. Rounding out the ensemble are Tommy Eyre, piano, and Roger Sutton, bass, with Danny Richmond on drum.

Mark/Almond formed last June, then spent the next six months "rehearsing and learning to live with one another." Both Mark and Almond had been, of course, with John Mayall; Eyre was a member of Juicy Lucy. Sutton is an old friend. When they felt that they were ready, a press reception was held. Ronny Scott, who runs London's foremost jazz club, was so impressed that he offered the band a booking.

The engagement at Ronny Scott's was on a bill headed by Charlie Mingus. One night, in the middle of Mark/Almond's "The City," Mingus' drummer Danny Richmond sat in and "brought the house down." So successful was this collaboration that they "hesitantly" asked him to join them; they were delighted when he "enthusiastically" agreed to do so.

For Next Tour . . .

Richmond has been with Mark/Almond throughout their first tour of the United States, currently in its final days. Second-billed to Elton John, they find themselves established in three months when

it takes most artists several times longer to achieve an identity in this country. For their next tour they would like to do two hour concerts in small halls and clubs, rather than play the larger arenas that they've seen on this trip.

Meanwhile, a second Blue Thumb album is planned. It will be "more romantic" than the current one while maintaining the same "mellow mood."

Rod, Faces Tour Secondary Markets

■ CHICAGO — Beginning July 9 in Philadelphia and ending in Memphis on Aug. 8, the Faces featuring vocalist Rod Stewart will visit 22 cities in a unique tour for a "name" group.

The only "major" market, and the only time the group stays in town any longer than one day, is in Chicago where the band will perform at the New McCormick Place Theater Auditorium July 20 and 21.

Supported by These Buyers

"Rod and the Faces picked these so-called secondary markets because they felt they've been supported by record buyers in these cities and the people should be given the chance to see their favorite groups in a live setting," explained Irwin H. Steinberg, President of Mercury Records. Stewart records for Mercury as a solo artist and joins the Faces on their Warner albums.

Aliases Pubbery Formed Exclusively for Prison Inmates

■ NASHVILLE — Aliases, a music publishing company formed recently to work exclusively with prison inmates, launched its state-endorsed program here last week with a show at the Tennessee State Prison.

Headlining the show were such interested talents as David Allan Coe and Glen Sherley (both former inmates themselves), Sammi Smith, the Hagers, Paul Richey, the Kendalls and the Kate Sisters. Coe emceed.

Highlighting the show, before a packed house of nearly 2,000 prisoners and distinguished guests, was presentation of a new Grammer guitar to Sherley by Roy Wiggins, General Manager of Grammer's local operation. Guests on hand included several representatives of the governor's office, members of the State Legislature, Department of Corrections Commissioner Mark Luttrell and heads of Tennessee's other penal institutions.

Located at 806 17th Ave. S., Aliases was founded to provide an opportunity for inmate writers to get their talents exposed to the outside world. Partners in the new endeavor are Bonnie Bucy, President, Bonnie Bucy & Associates, Inc., Paul Richey, a locally-based writer/producer/publisher, Coe and Jack Wall, a local music industry businessman.

Through the interested aid of Memphis attorney Russell X. Thompson, a member of the State Legislature, Aliases was brought to the attention of Commissioner Luttrell, who saw the potential of uncovering latent talent in addition to acting as a morale booster for the inmates, and endorsed Aliases' projected program as a part of the state's rehabilitative en-

deavor.

Working in co-operation with Jimmy Lynn, Music Director for Tennessee's prisons, Aliases will pay an immediate \$50 advance to the writer of any song accepted for recording with additional royalties to be paid at the time they're received. Other facets of the new company include conducting seminars inside the walls on correct songwriting techniques, sponsoring stage shows at the prisons which feature name talents as well as inmate talent; soliciting of artistic talent and demoting of material.
