





Day of Instant Single Hit Dawning on the Charts

By FRED GOODMAN and DAVE FINKLE

■ NEW YORK — A significant pattern seems to be taking shape in singles sales, according to recent Record World chart evidence.

Singles, culled from albums, (usually those of established artists), are leaping to the top of the charts with unprecedented alacrity.

For instance, this week Isaac Hayes' "Theme from 'Shaft'" (Enterprise) from the "Shaft" soundtrack album jumps to number three in its second week on the singles chart and John Lennon's "Imagine" (Apple) from the "Imagine" album jumps to number (Continued on page 35) six in its second week.

Also the Chi-Lites' "Have You Seen Her?" (Brunswick) comes on the singles chart for the first time at 20. That record-setter, from the "Give More Power to the People" package, also jumps to the number one spot on the R&B chart in its first appearance on that chart.

Other recent quick-steppers include Paul and Linda Mc-Cartney's "Uncle Albert" from (Apple) "Ram," which reached the top 10 in four weeks, and the Carpenters' "Superstar," (A&M), which also reached the top 10 in four weeks.

Traceable to Changes

The reason for this new development is easily traceable to recent changes in top 40 programming, changes which may

be the most important in radio programming since the advent of FM underground outlets four years ago.

Top 40 stations that, a few years back, began eautiously to program album cuts as a response to the FM competition, have begun programming album cuts more and more. Favorite cuts from new albums are quickly settled upon and then played heavily creating demands for singles that, when released, become instant bestsellers, selling hundreds of thousands in a matter of days sometimes

In other words, the industry suddenly has an abundance of pre-ordained singles hits, and

Grand Funk Label Set with Capitol

■ HOLLYWOOD — For the I first time in the company's history, Capitol Records will release its product on an artist's own label, as a matter of courtesy and honor to the art-

According to Allen A. Davis, Capitol VP, Marketing, the sixth Grand Funk Railroad album, "E Pluribus Funk," will be released Nov. 15 on the Grand Funk Railroad label specially designed to coincide with the overall marketing concept of the package.

A dye-cut round jacket has been fabricated in silver foil to resemble a coin with the words "E Pluribus Funk." The three faces of the members of Grand Funk Railroad have actually been engraved on the front of each album.

The rear liner has been engraved with the titles of the songs and, in place of the traditional eagle found on U.S. coins, a miniature rendering of Shea Stadium has been embossed as a permanent remembrance of the group's recordbreaking live appearance there last July.

Inside, a round insert will carry photographs of each of the members of Grand Funk together with the lyrics of the songs and the album's technical

The entire concept was designed by the group's manager-producer, Terry Knight, who worked personally with Craig Braun, Inc., on the actual layout and fabrication of the

"Capitol has orders for more than one million albums alone for the 'E Pluribus Funk' pack-Davis commented. "Knight and Braun have been working day and night in order to meet the Nov. 15 release

"Knight has also informed us that GFR Enterprises, the Grand Funk corporation, is manufacturing and marketing cloth jacket patches, belt buckles, necklaces, bottle openers, earrings, cufflinks, schoolbook covers and stationery, each carrying the 'E Pluribus Funk' design."

Davis concluded by saying "Capitol will also release future singles from the group on the Grank Funk Railroad label. We feel this is the most total and comprehensive marketing campaign the company has ever undertaken; total company-artist cooperation."

Piracy Arrest a Texas 'First'

■ Eight people were arrested and hundreds of pre-recorded 8-track cartridges and cassettes as well as blank cartridges and duplicating equipment were seized in Brownsville, Texas, in what was believed to be the first enforcement of the new Texas state law making it a crime to pirate phonograph records and tapes.

According to Brownsville Chief of Police Gus O. Krausse, the arrests and seizure of equipment came on the afternoon of Oct. 13 when police armed with a search warrant raided the Texas Electronic Tape Company at 1003 East 14th St. in Brownsville. Chief Krausse said more than 3,300 8-track cartridges and a large number of cassettes containing pirated versions of hit albums released by a wide number of record companies were found. The cartridges and cassettes bore the "Imperial" label. Also found was a large store of blank tape cartridges as well as duplicating equipment. Chief Krausse estimated that the plant had been in operation for about a year.

Of the eight people arrested, four not otherwise identified were said to have been Mexican laborers, who were released and sent back to Mexico. Arraigned were: Luis Isuardi, identified as the owner of the plant, and his wife, Juanita, and Ignacio Martinez, said to be the plant manager, and his wife, Gloria. All four were charged with the unlawful reproduction and sale of tapes and records and were released on bail for further hearing.

Under the new Texas law, the first offense is a misdemeanor. Subsequently offenses are punishable by up to five years in jail and/or a fine of up to \$25,000.

■ NEW YORK — Transcotinental Investing Corp. reported lower losses for the first quarter ended Aug. 31, 1971, and a continuation of the trend towards turnaround results starting in the second quarter.

Loss for the quarter ended in August was \$1,363,000 after taxes, equal to \$.16 per share, on revenues of \$22,674,000. This can be compared with a loss of \$2,664,000 after taxes, equal to \$.31 per share, on revenues of \$22,900,000 for the comparable period a year earlier.

The results for the prior period were reconstructed since the company had subsequently changed ite fiscal year to May



■ Jules Malamud, Executive Director of the National Association of Record Merchandisers (NARM to the industry). the trade association of the wholesalers and manufacturers of phonograph records and tape product in the United States and Canada, has served NARM as its first and only chief executive since 1961. Under his leadership, NARM has grown to encompass more than 300 wholesalers and manufacturers of recorded product, including the most important companies in the industry.

A veteran of the phonograph record industry before his com-

ing to NARM, Malamud rose through the ranks, working at virtually every level of the record industry. He started as a radio promotion man for Jubilee Records in 1949, shortly after that moving to Essex Records, where he worked in recording and sales.

In 1956, when Miller International created Somerset Records, the first line of budget merchandise specifically created for mass merchandising (a new industry product and a new industry concept for its time), he was National Sales Manager for the label and launched the Somerset Stereo Fidelity line, the first budget line recorded in stereo.

In addition to his duties as Executive Director of NARM, Jules is Executive Director of the NARM Scholarship Foundation, created by NARM for the purpose of providing scholarships to employees and children of employees of NARM member companies.

Record World: How did you, personally, and NARM as an Association, become involved in the fight for anti-piracy legislation?

Malamud: During 1969, when we experienced the first real growth of tape as a consumer product, members of NARM began to feed into my office a fantastic quantity of information on pirated tape. In turn, I passed it along to Jules Yarnell, special investigator for RIAA, and to Robert Osterberg of Abeles and Clark, counsel to the Harry Fox Office. As each day went by, the problem increased, and in turn, the information which we were receiving from our members pyramided. During this time, NARM went along with the other segments of the industry in supporting the passage of the omnibus Copyright Revision Bill, which included anti-piracy provisions. The straw that broke the camel's back for me personally was an incident which occurred in October, 1970, when a NARM member in Philadelphia called me about a store in our area which was selling pirated tape. I went out to the store (a beautiful, free standing tape center) and saw an eye-catching display of tape product, attractively packaged. There were tapes being sold of the leading 30 or 40 best sellers, going right down the charts. I still couldn't believe what I saw, and purchased a quantity. When I listened to them, the sound fidelity was in every way comparable to legitimate product. Right then I knew that the industry could not afford to wait for the Copyright Revision Bill. We had to seek separate federal anti-piracy legislation.

Record World: What was your first step in that direction?

Malamud: I discussed the matter with Jim Schwartz, who was then President of NARM, and with Earl Kintner, our general counsel. They both gave me the green light on setting the wheels in motion. Coincidentally, I had a meeting up at Atlantic Records, relative to Atlantic's participation in the 1971 NARM Convention, with Bob Kornheiser. When I walked into Bob's office that day, I was so full of the piracy problem, that I discussed it with him. A group of Atlantic executives and attorneys were holding a corporate meeting in the offices, and at Bob's request, I joined them and a short time later left with the blessing and full support of Atlantic's executives Nesuhi Ertegun, Jerry Wexler and Dave Glew, and attorneys Mike Mayer and Ted Jaffe. Columbia Records was my next step, and with the support of Clive Davis and attorney Mallory Rintoul, I knew that the campaign was on its way.

Record World: But that was just two companies. How did you get everyone together?

Attendance Overwhelming

Malamud: With the full approval of the NARM Board of Directors for immediate action, the day after my meeting with Atlantic and Columbia, invitations went out to the chief executive officers of all the record manufacturers. The NARM Board of Directors appointed Jim Schwartz, Jack Grossman, Amos Heilicher, Jim Tiedjens and Arnold Greenhut to represent NARM and the merchandising segment of the industry. The luncheon meeting was called for Nov. 2, 1970, the day after the UJA dinner honoring Ahmet Ertegun. Because so many industry executives from the West Coast would be in New York for the dinner, our attendance was really overwhelming.


Record World: Who else was there?

Malamud: It reads like a Who's Who of our business. Jerry Moss and Harold Childs; Jay Lasker and Howard Stark; Ahmet Ertegun, Jerry Wexler, Mike Mayer, and Ted Jaffe; Neil Bogart; Sal Iiannucci and Artie Mogull; Clive Davis, Walter Dean, and Mallory Rintoul; Jac Holzman; Bill Gallagher; Len Levy; Marvin Schlachter; Herb Goldfarb; Tony Martell; Irwin Steinberg; Carol Curb; Phil Jones and Tom Schlesinger; Cy Leslie; Jerry Schoenbaum; Morris Levy; Al Bell; Mo Ostin and Joe Smith; Bill Dyczko; Sidney Shemel; Mort Drosnes. It was an unbelievable group. Of course, I was there with Earl Kintner, NARM's counsel.

Record World: What action did the meeting take?

Legislative Committee Formed

Malamud: We met for lunch. By the time lunch was over, every executive to a man had agreed on the need for separate federal anti-piracy legislation. Then and there, the Record and Tape Industry Legislative Committee was appointed. The Legal Sub-Committee met one week later on Nov. 9, in the offices of NARM's Earl Kintner in Washington, D.C. Attorneys Bill Dyczko of RCA, Morton Edelstein of Capitol, Paul Wolsk of Ampex, Mallory Rintoul of Columbia and Ted Nussbaum and Ted Jaffe of Atlantic met with NARN counsel Kintner and Chuck Ruttenberg and RIAA counsel James Fitzpatrick, Andrew Krulwich and Ernest Meyers. Henry Brief of RIAA and I also attended. From that meeting came a plan of immediate action. The next day, Nov. 10, in Washington, the plan was reviewed and approved by the full Record and Tape Industry Legislative Committee. Committee members had flown in from New York and California for this urgent one day session. It was one of the most gratifying examples of industry cooperation I had witnessed in my 22 years in the (Continued on page 36) business.







Station-to-Station

■ WMOT-FM is the campus station of Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro. They operate 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, with a power output of 780 watts. The station, though, recently received a grant from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare enabling them to go to 50,000 watts stereo. The boost will enable them to serve all of Middle Tennessee, north to Kentucky, and south to Huntsville, Ala.

In the afternoons, the station broadcasts a blend of MOR, light rock, pop and folk. The evening is a progressive blend of rock and folk/rock with emphasis on modern artists. There are also soul, jazz and folk shows plus a classical show on

The station should be on your service list. WMOT-FM, Middle Tenn. State Univ., Murfreesboro, Tenn. Zip code:

KASF-FM, Adams State College in Alamosa, Colo., is back on the air. They are the only FM station in the area and broadcast 24 hours a day. People in the student and general community listen to the station, and you should be servicing them with product. Danny Johnson is Director, station's zip code is 81101.

From KRWG Radio's Programing Guide . . .

"Most radio stations are formed on five departments. These include PR, programming, production, news and advertising. Each of these departments is strictly responsible for the sound that the station puts out. Every department must be as good in its own right as the next, meaning to say that if one department lacks in organization, quality of work and results it brings the whole station down. No matter how good one department is, it cannot make up for the incompetence or inefficience of other departments. Every department must be in full swing in order for the station to put out a decent sound.

"But even though every department is and must be performing equally well, there is a definite variance of importance. Of the five mentioned above, the programming department carries the most and final responsibility for the sound the station illicits. In fact, that is programmingmaking sure that what goes on the air is up to par and does not discredit the station's standards on program format.

"On the whole, most programming departments have more problems than they would like to handle, and KRWG is no exception to the rule. But one of the bigger headaches on the list of problems is the station's format. The format is the way in which the station sets the way the music will divide commercial sets, the type of music they will play, what type of music-when and where, the selection of programs, and how the jock will arrange his show. Just how good the programming department is depends on how good the format is. The format is usually left to the discretion of the programming department and it is responsible for it being carried out.

"As much as the program department would like to have it, their responsibility for the station's sound does not stop with the format. The format is only as good as the jocks who do it -and responsible jocks are another problem. Record output is another problem, and so is program management. If this story sounds like a circle of problems and responsibilities, the idea has come across. Radio's management is a neverending circle of problems and responsibilities that must be as tight as the show—that we are all working for. And even as biased as I might sound, programming is only 1/5 of it." TERRY BRYAN





CLUB REVIEW

Garner an Original

■ NEW YORK — Erroll Garner's opening at the St. Regis' Maisonette last wek (18) was in effect a mini-concert in which the piano master added extra dimension to familiar standards and gave new life to more recent favorites. Garner introductions and interpretations combine elements of classical influence with traditional jazz stylings.

Among the pieces included in his program on this occasion were "Autumn Leaves," "Desifinado," "Something" and finado," "Shadow of Your Smile." "This Guy's in Love with You" was especially well received. No, he did not perform "Misty." Not in his opening set at least.

Credit for a delightful evening's entertainment must go to Garner's musicians, Jimmi Smith (drums), Ernest Mc-Carty (bass) and Jose Mangual (bongos), a near-perfect sound system and the intimate nature of the room itself. And, of course, Erroll Garner, a musical original.

BORN AGAIN YOUNG-HOLT UNLIMITED-Cotillion SD18004.

This former rhythm team for Ramsey Lewis is expanding its sound. This album features various keyboard players and string and vocal arrangements by Richard Evans. The program includes pop hits and funky originals that should put this group back into the limelight.

RUSTY BRYANT—Prestige 10014.

With a strong rhythm section, R&B tenor saxophonist Rusty Bryant cooks on four extended tunes, two by himself and two by organist Leon Spencer. This is one of those funky albums that you can just sit back and immerse yourself in.

NEW DIRECTION GENE RUSSELL—Black Jazz BJ-1.

Pianist Russell offers a program of jazz tunes in a very tasteful, but commercial style that should reach a great many ears. Bassist Larry Gales appears on two cuts, and he is a monster.

LONNIE SMITH-Kudo Ku-02 (CTI)

Organist Lonnie Smith has assembled a band of today's studio jazz heavies to present a real cooker. Side one features two originals and Carole King's "I Feel The Earth Move." Side two is a 17-minute of Sly Stone's "Stand."

ORNETTE COLEMAN—Atlantic SD 1588.

This is the second collection that Atlantic has issued of Ornette Coleman material from the early '60's that was never before issued. And, of course, it is classic, beautiful music. Atlantic should keep these coming until their can on Ornette is completely dry. Grab this one and listen to it.


TIME AND SPACE



Triple Header at Bitter End

■ NEW YORK — It's unusual to see a bill consisting of three acts at the Bitter End. It's even more unusual when the three acts represent different record labels. It becomes interesting to watch three carefully polished promotional teams in action. You run the risk of seeing the Abbott & Costello "Who's on First" routine come to life. Thankfully, this did not happen. Each team cheered enthusiastically for their own act. while the remaining teams exhibited their own individual styles of coddling the artist in the backstage area.

So, who's on first? Ellen Mc-Ilwaine, a lady possessing awesome qualities, showed why Polydor believes they'll have a major superstar in 1972. When I saw Ellen's act in July, I went out of my mind. Here it is, three months later, and I'm still going nuts at the same exact performance. She has it all, a gutsy blues voice and 10 magic fingers that play guitar. Ellen shows remarkable range wielding her way from hard rock to soulful rhythm and blues to straight country. Her first album will be released in mid-January, I can's wait, She's a killer.

RCA's Swampwater was next,

and I think they have the makings to be the best country rock band since Poco. This act, like Ellen, relies heavily on the material of others. I was disappointed in the material thev chose. I was also disappointed that the band failed to introduce each member, so I can't give any names. The drummer's rhythmic beat is the tightest I've heard since Ringo himself. Add to that a great fiddle, throw in nice harmonies; the result will be a big future. Their immediate goal should be to find better material.

Oliver (UA) remains a puzzle. It's natural to assume he's concerned with his image. "Jean" and "Good Morning Sunshine" are in the past, and if he isn't careful, Oliver will be in the past, too. Like Swampwater, Oliver's material leaves much to be desired. There's something weird about seeing Oliver sing "Shop Around." The potential is definitely there. I hope he moves his act more toward the soft side.

I have to fault the practice of presenting three acts on a bill. It doesn't give the individual performer much time to involve the audience. The sets of Ellen McIlwaine and Swampwater were far too short.

Although the situation is undeniable, a few questions pop to mind? Who are the buyers? Don't they have the albums? Are there overlapping sales? Some of the answers seem to be that juke box operators are undoubtedly a large percentage of the buyers. They know a

song is a hit and must buy immediately in large quantities. Other buyers, it is suspected, are the usual singles buyers (the so-called youth market) who may have the album, but require the single for easy toting to parties.

Will it last? The answer to that is who knows?

NARM's Malamud on Anti-Piracy Legislation

Record World: From Nov. 10, 1970, when the plan for action was approved, to Oct. 15, 1971, is just over 11 months. What was the legislative timetable for S664, the anti-piracy bill?

Malamud: On April 29, the Senate passed S646. On June 9, the battle for legislation in the House of Representatives opened, when hearings were held before Sub-Committee #3 of the House of Representatives Judiciary Committee, at which every industry segment supported the bill. Jack Grossman, NARM's newly-elected President, spoke for NARM; Stan Gortikov spoke for RIAA. And the pirates also presented their side. On July 1, the bill was reported favorably by the Sub-Committee, but with a two year limitation; on Sept. 16, the limitation was extended to three years.

Record World: O.K. We've got the bill past the sub-committee of the House. What happened then?

Malamud: One week later, on Sept. 22, the full Judiciary Committee approved the bill, and on Oct. 4, it was passed by the House of Representatives. Three days later, the Senate re-passed it as amended by the House and on Oct. 15, President Nixon signed it into law.

Record World: How do you feel now that S646 is a reality?

Malamud: I can't find the right words to express how I felt when the anti-piracy bill finally became law. It ended a period of frustration not only for me, but even more important, for every member of NARM, who was seeing so much legitimate business going to the pirates.

Record World: What's next on the agenda now that S646 is on the books?

Malamud: The real job of education and enforcement remains to be done. Earl Kintner and Chuck Ruttenberg have already set the wheels in motion in discussions with the Attorney General's office, the Justice Department and the FBI. They also are in close contact with other recording industry leaders in order to formulate a meaningful educational and enforcement program. If anything, this will require an even more intensive and concentrated industry effort than even the fight for legislation. However, I am really looking to the NARM membership, at the grass roots level—with the same grass roots effort they put into the passage of the bill—to get into the problem of enforcement.

Record World: Why did you characterize the NARM membership efforts as "grass roots"?

Members in 50 States

Malamud: NARM is the only industry association which has

members in every one of the 50 states. Our members either have headquarters, branches or service retail outlets from Maine to Hawaii and Alaska. Therefore, whenever we needed help in contacting Senators and Congressmen, our membership came through. As much as other segments of the industry wanted to cooperate, most of them were headquartered in New York and California. It was only the NARM membership who were consituents of every federal legislator.

Record World: Then NARM members must have been instrumental in getting state legislation.

Malamud: They certainly were. People like Sam Marmaduke in Texas, Leonard Singer in Arizona, Sieg Siebert and Bill Fisher in Arkansas all played a vital role at their state level. In addition, in every state where anti-piracy laws were passed this year, NARM members' strength was marshalled to pass each bill. Chuck Ruttenberg, NARM counsel, was involved in many of these state situations.

Record World: Talking about state legislation, now that we have a federal law, can we call it quits at the state level?

Malamud: Not at all. State laws are extremely important. You see, sound recordings under the federal law are not copyrighted until Feb. 15 (four months after the President's signature). State laws are needed to protect all product which was and will be released up to the effective date of S646. What was released before Feb. 15, 1972, is not copyrightable. Only state laws can help fight piracy of that product. In addition, state laws provide another enforcement area.


Record World: Did you believe when NARM started the ball rolling for separate federal anti-piracy legislation that in less than one year the industry would be successful?

Malamud: Yes, I am an incurable optimist, and I was naive enough to believe. Believe it or not, I was ready to organize a march on Washington if necessary. But, now in retrospect, I can say that what really excited me most about the whole chain of events and accomplishments was the fantastic cooperation which I saw exhibited every step of the way, by every segment of this business. For once, we all pulled together. NARM, RIAA, the Harry Fox Office, AFM, NMPA. Manufacturers, publishers, whole-salers, retailers. The trade press. We were all working for the same goal: a federal anti-piracy law which would protect the creative genius that produces the MUSIC: the music we make, the music we SELL.

CONCERT REVIEW

Bennett Still in Major League

■ NEW YORK — Emcee Julius LaRosa quoted Roy Campanella in his introduction of Tony Bennett at Carnegie Hall recently (9). The quote was to the effect that a major league baseball player needed the strength of a man but the spirit of a little boy.

Then the Columbia recording artist bounded on stage, beaming boundless enthusiasm, capturing the audience at once with his energy and personality. He's an entertainer who's played for presidents and queens, yet is able to convey the impression that every performance is the pinnacle of his career. In the case of Tony Bennett, the spirit of a beginner is combined with the showmanship of a veteran.

It's not a case of especially imaginative programming. His selections are predictable, and who would have it any other way? One expects to hear Tony Bennett sing "I Left My Heart In San Francisco" and "For Once in My Life," to mention just a couple of his classic stylizations. It should be noted, however, that "It Had To Be You" was extra-exquisite on this occasion.

Midway through the third number, the performance was interrupted by a stink bomb. After a short pause in the proceedings, Tony went on with the show. It was the only defect in an otherwise perfect concert.

Providing instrumental support was the Canada-born, Britain-based arranger-conductor Robert Farnon. They opened the evening with several pieces of light classical music of which a suite from "Porgy and Bess" was best received.

Cody Affair Commanding

■ NEW YORK — Press parties generally don't rate a review but an exception must be made in the case of the long-awaited New York City debut of Commander Cody and his Lost Planet Airmen.

Long-time favorites of the Detroit and Bay Area undergrounds and mere legends elsewhere, the Commander and his boys have surfaced recently on a Paramount album, "Ozone," at Dot Records' CMA show in Nashville, and last week (19) at the Plaza 9 Music Hall here.

Categorizing this group as country-rock is much too simple. Their sound encompasses such genres as straight country, western swing, Oakland bar blues, truck driver songs, and the purest rockabilly since Elvis, Scotty and Bill got together in Sam Philips' Sun "chicken coop" in 1954. As the New Lost City Ramblers did with bluegrass in the early 1960s, the sounds are lovingly recreated and even transcended in terms of time and fun.

The new album is fully representative of the loose instrumental feel and goodtime vocal approach the band exhibited in live performance. Commander Cody and his Lost Planet Airmen are truly a group for all of the people, all of the time.

London branches, all of which will stock the complete spread and depth of the catalog, include London Records of New England in Boston; London Records Distributing Corp., in New York; London Records Southeast, in Atlanta; London Records Midwest, in Chicago; and London Records of California in Gardena Calif., near Los Angeles. All these branches offer complete wholesaling and warehousing facilities. A sixth branch office is operated in San Francisco, with servicing of product out of the Gardena

facility.

The various labels in the import lines have garnered more than 50 prizes for both excellence of production and performances during the past three years.

In addition to music performances by a host of European soloists, chamber groups and orchestras, several of which are currently on tour here, the lines also contain generous samplings of 800 years of English poetry, compiled under the auspices of Oxford University, and the complete Shakespeare under the auspices of Cambridge University. There are also a host of entertainment, drama and other spoken word discs in this direction. Deluxe new catalogs have been printed and are available to dealers through the six London branches

Ray Barretto

Ray Barretto was born in Brooklyn, N.Y., of Puerto Rican parents. His youth was spent in typical Latin New York fashion, his early school years living in Spanish Harlem and then his early teens in the Bronx. Throughout this struggle for ghetto survival there was always the music of his parents and grandparents, either on the radio or on the phonograph, to form the background for the daily chore of surviving.

At the age of 17 he joined the army.

It was while he was stationed in Munich, Germany, that he rediscovered music, this time with a new and special meaning. Through some friends he learned of jam sessions that were being held at a G. I. club. It was here that the sound of jazz was introduced to him. He met and befriended many of the musicians that performed there, musicians from Germany, France, Belgium, as well as the American G.I. musicians, both black and white.

Then one day, with the back of an old banjo head as a drum, he got the courage to "sit in." The complete realization came to him . . . on the stage, with

his drum, playing, performing, this was where he belonged.

Three years later, now a civilian, Ray was back in Harlem attending more jam sessions, studying percussion and going about the business of making music his way of life. A reawakening of his Latin roots also took place, and soon Ray found himself drifting easily between the two worlds of jazz and latin music. He jammed with Charlie Parker, Max Roach, Art Blakey and scores of other giants of the new jazz movement, and he recorded with Lou Donaldson, Red Garland, Gene Ammons, Dizzy Gillespie and many other jazz stars. His first steady job came with Eddie Bonnemere's Latin Jazz Combo. When José Curbelo formed his Latin band Ray was asked to join. After two years with Curbelo, Tito Puente called him to take Mongo Santamaria's place when he left to join Cal Tjader. The next four vears were spent in Puente's big band. He continued to record with every major Latin and jazz organization, as well as jingles and commercials for radio and TV. He then left Puente to join Herbie Mann, but the desire to start his own group had been steadily growing and after four months he left Herbie to do just that.

Riverside Records knew Ray through his jazz work and they decided to record him with his own band. Ray did two albums for them; one with the group he had at the time, a charanga styled band, and the other a jam-type album incorporating Latin and jazz idioms. This album, "Latino," has since become a collectors item. He then signed with Tico Records and his first album for them, "Cha-

Per share loss for the recently completed quarter was computed on the basis of 8,545,-000 average shares outstanding compared to 8,543,000 average shares a year earlier.

Chairman Robert K. Lifton stated that the reduction in loss reflects improvements in the company's Transcontinental Music Corp. subsidiary, a large rack jobber of musical records and tapes. "We are continuing to reduce costs, improve administrative procedures and obtain profitable new business for this operation," he said.

The TIC chairman stated that the company had obtained all necessary approvals for the previously announced sales of its American Bank of Commerce to the holding company of Central National Bank of Cleveland. It is expected that this transaction will be completed by the end of the calendar vear.

Capitol Reports Profit

■ HOLLYWOOD — Capitol Industries, Inc., at its annual meeting reported a profit before extraordinary items for the first quarter of fiscal 1972 of \$76,000 or \$.02 per share on sales of \$27,565,000.

This compares to a loss of \$809,000 or \$.17 per share on sales of \$34,101,000 reported during this period last year. There were 4,612,000 average share's outstanding this year versus \$4,630,000 last year.

Actions taken to control costs have begun to be productive as evidenced by the operating profit achieved in the face of sales that were \$6,536,000 or 19% lower than the first quarter of last year. Although this cost control will continue, future progress in increasing profitability will depend primarily upon attaining higher sales levels.

Results for this quarter include two extraordinary items totaling \$2,438,000 or \$.53 per share net income after taxes. The sale of our investment in Pickwick International, Inc., stock resulted in an after-tax gain of approximately \$7,077,-000. A change to an alternatively acceptable accounting practice for product returned for exchange resulted in an after-tax extraordinary charge against earnings of \$4,639,000. Had this alternatively acceptable accounting practice been in effect throughout fiscal 1971, the loss for that year would have been \$.01 lower than re-

Rivers. Grace at Gaslight

■ NEW YORK — Johnny Rivers' career has been marked by astute selection of material and the unusually appealing nasal tone of his voice. Both factors were in evidence as he opened last week (13) at the Gaslight at the Au Go Go here.

Unfortunately, also in evidence was the unrehearsed quality of his set, during which he seemingly picked tunes at random and cut them short when he tired of them. The lack of backing musicians was also quite noticeable as his adequate guitar work failed to compensate for the absence of accompaniment. Granted the sparse audience was no spur to an entertainer's enthusiasm, but the show should go on, shouldn't it, Johnny? Listen to his fine new United Artists album "Home Grown" for a truer indication of Johnny Rivers' talent.

On the brighter side, the bill's opening act, a New Yorkbased group named Amazing Grace, was a real ear-opener. Like several well-known English acts, but few American ones since the death of Jim Morrison, Amazing Grace features a theatrically minded lead singer, Ronnie Baker, whose instrumental contribution is limited to some welltimed tambourine shaking. He is a strong vocalist, arresting in appearance and demeanor.

The band provides him with solid support, playing adeptly in several commercially acceptable styles. They are Rob Rothstein on bass (a fine if not

so flashy vocalist in his own right), Dr. Howard on honky tonk piano. Larry Packer (late of Cat Mother and the All-Night Newsboys) on lead guitar, Ben Beckley on drums, and Hank DeVito on pedal steel.

Amazing Grace is currently unsigned to a record label, a situation that should soon be corrected. Amazing Grace has the stuff of which stars are Gregg Geller

■ NEW YORK — All Bob Dylan fans (there must be millions) know of guitarist David Bromberg. He's played so beautifully on many of Dylan's recent albums. An expert picker.

Now, David Bromberg is his own act, and he has a Columbia recording contract to prove it. Folk City was the scene of David's recent club engagement. To this reviewer, it appeared to be a grand success. He mixes his act with flavors of country, soft ballads and, of course, rock and roll. The biggest hand of the night was reserved for David's version of the Beatles' "I've Just Seen a Face." This should be a message to other performers: Include a Beatles song. It gets them every time.

As a singer, David's style is unique. There are touches of Dylan in his voice, but after years one would expect something to rub off. Again, as a guitarist, they just don't come

any finer.

David is presently working on an album, due for release in January. These days, he can be heard on the Columbia LP, "The First Great Rock Festivals of the Seventies, Isle of Wight/Atlanta Pop."

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

The group is expected to be in the USA for three weeks during which time they will play Carnegie Hall, Wesleyan College, Conn. Stonebrook, L. Wil-Helm Sues Loretta Lynn

■ NASHVILLE — It was reported last week that the Wil-Helm Agency has brought a \$5 million suit against Decca artist Loretta Lynn for alleged breach of contract. Chancellor Ned Lentz ordered Miss Lynn to show cause why the contract should not be continued, and set Oct. 29 as the date for the hearing.

Wil-Helm official Larry Hart would make no comment to Record World, and Wil-Helm's attorney Charles Warfield could not be reached at press time.

Frank Ratner, Miss Lynn's attorney, told Record World: "Loretta Lynn and Wil-Helm Agency agreed that she would be released from her contract last May. This went along until about Sept. 1, when they apparently had a change of heart and reneged on the release that they had given her. They hired a lawyer and said as far as they were concerned, she is still under contract.

"The release was obtained for the reason that Miss Lynn was of the oninion that the things Wil-Helm was doing were not in her best interests and prejudicial to her career. They were confronted with this and they said they would release her if she wouldn't sue. The agreement was made and they gave her the release in the early part of May. Other grounds for breaking the contract is that in her original contract there was a provision that if the agency ever changed ownership or management, she would have the right to void her contract. The agency did in fact change ownership and management (when Smiley Wilson left last October).

Confident No Problems

"An answer will be filed within the next 30 days by us, and we feel confident there will be no problems."

Miss Lynn and husband Mooney Lynn operate Loretta Lynn Enterprises which owns a chain of western wear stores, a traveling rodeo, music publishing companies and recently she joined forces with fellow Decca artist Conway Twitty to form United Talent, a booking agency.





M NASHVILLE—Faron Young and personal manager Billy Deaton have expanded their publishing activities with the purchase of Clyde Pitts' interest in Blackboard Music (BMI).

Deaton and Young presently own another BMI firm, Court of Kings Music, which includes in its catalog "Wind Me Up," "Seems Like I'm Always Leavin" and numerous other songs, many of which Faron has recorded for Mercury.

Young's publishing interests and recording activity which this year included several chart hits and a No. 1 c&w single, "Leaving and Saying Goodbye," represented links in a chain of career highlights all year long.




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
