Knight Suspends Grand Funk Contracts

NEW YORK — The recording contracts of Grand Funk Railroad have been placed in suspension, the group's manager-producer Terry Knight has announced. Knight said, "for failure to comply with the terms of the contract and for breaking their exclusive recording artist agreement, Mark Farner, Donald Brewer and Melvin Schacher, professionally known as Grand Funk Railroad, have been notified that their now existing recording artist agreement with Good Knight Productions has been placed in suspension until the terms of the agreement are

Knight revealed that, since the members of the group have notified him in writing that they have "terminated" their contracts with him, Knight said he has been forced to cease negotiations in the group's behalf for a new re-

cording deal and immediately suspend their contracts "until the matter is settled."

When asked how long he expected the suspension to last, Knight said, "that's up to Grand Funk. The usual terms of recording agreements provide that when an artist breaks his contract, the company has the right to suspend it for as long as the artist refuses to perform. It could take weeks or it could take years before the group can record again. It's all up to them."

Newton Named GSF President; Will Form Music Subsidiary

NEW YORK — Robert S. Sinn, Chairman of GSF Inc., entertainment complex and motion picture production organization, has announced the election of Larry Newton as President of the corporation.

Newton, a long-time executive in the music and record fields, will focus his initial efforts on the formation of an all-encompassing record production, music publishing and talent management subsidiary, to be known as GSF Music and Productions Inc.

The record wing, Newton disclosed, will be a full-line operation in every sense, with strong representation in pop, country, r&b and jazz. An announcement as to the actual label title will be made shortly.

Newton has been active in the record industry for more than 20 years, having started his career in Philadelphia during the late 1940s. He was active in sales capacities with various distribution organizations, and as founder of one of the first successful independent label operations of that period. Derby Records.

Newton joined ABC Records

in New York City in 1956 as Vice President and National Sales Manager under his long time friend from the distribution end of the business, Sam Clark, who had become head of the ABC Record Division. During that phase of his career, Newton was closely associated with the development of such artists as Paul Anka, Steve Lawrence and Eydie Gorme, Ray Charles, B. B. King, George Hamilton IV and many others.

Editorial

The Anderson Charges

■ There is a highly naive quality to the Anderson charges against the record industry.

First of all it is naive indeed to assume that disc jockeys determine public taste. In reality, it is quite the opposite. It is public taste which determines what a program director or disc jockey will play. And stations which are not attuned to the public soon find their ratings are not what they would like them to be.

There is no question but that radio exposure is essential to the making of a hit but it is the height of naivete to think that exposure can ram a record down the public's throat. You can expose a record from here to the moon and if it doesn't have that elusive element which the public responds to, there is no way of making it a hit. Every record official in this industry can truthfully testify to that—at times much to his sorrow. What Mr. Anderson is confusing is getting your product before the public to see if it's liked and "manipulating public tastes." The latter phrase, as far as our industry is concerned, is somewhat laughable since anyone who knew how to manipulate public taste would indeed have a highly saleable product to the record industry. To date no one is known to have discovered the method.

It is also naive in our society—whether it be on the highest levels of government, as we have recently been reading, down to the makers of shoe laces—to think that the seller doesn't entertain the buyer. We set vaguely acceptable norms of this behavior which vary from business to business. Yet just as in all other industries, it would be miraculous if some didn't overstep those bounds. But to tar the entire record industry in one blind accusation is to show a regrettable lack of acquaintance with the vast majority of dedicated, involved young men who make up today's record promotion echelon.

If Mr. Anderson has evidence of what he considers wrongdoing, he has a duty to bare it so that we can examine it, determine how serious it may be and then deal with it. But he has come to an unjustifiable conclusion (may we hint because the word payola in itself is good for a headline) in implying that if some have overstepped the bounds, it is indicative of our whole industry.

Jerry Greenberg, Senior Vice President, Operations and General Manager, Atlantic: "Jack Anderson's charges of payola are naive as well as absurd. Today's young disc jockey, on FM, 'Underground,' r&b, and college radio stations, is so individualistic that he wouldn't even consider playing a record for favors. He only plays the music he likes and believes in and refuses to play records by popular artists that he calls 'plastic" or "hype acts." Record company promotion men find it impossible to convince these jockeys to play any record that they don't personally believe in . . . even if it's high on the Top 40 charts. And it is through these stations that most new records and artists are exposed.

In his new capacity, Cohen will have full responsibility for all Columbia a&r activity on the East Coast, including popular, classical, original cast and motion picture soundtracks.

Cohen, in turn, has announced the merger of the label's Masterworks and Broadway show interests into the combined area of Classical Music and Original Cast A&R. Tom Frost and Tom Shepard have been named Directors of this expanded area.

Scott Joplin Honored

■ NEW YORK—Elektra's—or is it Nonesuch's, in this case? -Joshua Rifkin, looking very much like a long-hair of old, gave a charming, ultimately moving concert of piano rags of Scott Joplin at Alice Tully Hall last week before an appreciative crowd that was nowhere near the size it ought to have been considering Rifkin's mastery of the rag, or more precisely, Joplin genre.

Because of the connotation of rags, audiences past 1920, say, have tended to think of the music for what composers and jazz musicians have burgled from it - stride piano, 'Alexander's Ragtime Band"or for what silent movie piano accompanists lifted-segments of melody to underscore the wistfulness and quaintness of the Gish sisters, et cetera.

But rags were much moreor, at least, much differentfrom jazz and movie house piano, intended as they were by Joplin, who is reputed to have been a sad, discouraged man, to be much more than quaint, intended, indeed, to be in the tradition of classical music. It is this more profound goal to which Rifkin has been unswervingly true. Watching (a piano and a pianist on an otherwise empty stage) and listening to this concert, one was more aware of Joplin's predecessors - Bach and Chopin came to mind - than his antecedents.

Rifkin played each piece with a metronomic precision and clarity that allowed it to stand free, like sculpture in a

of the selections were from his best-selling (relatively, that is) Nonesuch album, and of these, "Maple Leaf Rag" was the most familiar and the most wellreceived (Rifkin reprised it as his last encore, a notion the audience loved and almost rewarded with a standing ovation, that was, however, refreshingly eschewed), but it was the lesser-known Joplin pieces (the ones Rifkin has evidently recorded for his imminent second Joplin album) that hypnotized and cheered me the most. The loveliest, I thought (and it must be remembered that no Joplin rag is unlike another; they are distinguished, as are the pieces of most great composers, more as variations are distinguished one from another) was "Bethena-A Concert Waltz.

If concerts can be rated by levels of excitement generated, then this concert rates highly. It represented a particular (and rare, for the predominantly rock concert-going ticket holder) excitement—the excitement of restraint, respect, integrity and musicianship.

Mercury Southern Strategy

■ NEW YORK-Mercury Records has launched a Southern offensive.

The label has long had a deep commitment to the South in both a musical and a business sense, according to label President, Irwin Steinberg. From the early days of rock and roll, Mercury has been involved with Southern performers and Southern recording facilities.

Remember "Chantilly Lace" by The Big Bopper and Dickie Lee's "Patches?" Both came out of Beaumont, Texas. How about Paul and Paula, and Bruce Channel's "Hey, Baby?" Dallas. Phil Phillips and his "Sea of Love" rose up from the bustling metropolis of Villa Platte, Louisiana.

The stream of great Southern Mercury product has never let up. Mercury-Nashville, run by Jerry Kennedy, and Buddy Killen's Nashville-based Dial Records both have impressive track records. Within the last few weeks, Dial's Joe Tex received a gold record for his "I Gotcha," and his new album of the same name has just been released. From Mercury-Nashville comes "We All Got Together And . . ." a new album by the critically acclaimed country artist Tom T. Hall, And the inimitable Jerry Lee Lewis celebrates his return to rock and roll with a new album titled "The Killer Rocks On." The Nashville roster also includes Bobby Bare, Roy Drusky, Dave Dudley, Jerry Foster, Linda Gail Lewis, Roger Miller, Patti Page, the Statler Brothers, and Kennedy himself.

Memphis, Jerry Lee's hometown, has lately been the scene of a different tactic by Mercurv. The label is bringing artists from other parts of the country to the South to record: Melba Moore has just cut a single with famed Memphis hitmaker Chips Moman; the single is being rush-released.

Activity is taking place in other relatively new areas for Mercury. In Birmingham, Alabama, the Mercury-distributed Moonsong Records have come up with a strong top-40 candidate in Bill Brandon's "Stop the Merry-Go-Round." And Mercury has even gone to the mountains in its quest for good Southern music — the Appala-

FM Survey From ABC

■ NEW YORK—A comprehensive study of the composition and buying habits of the stereo rock (or progressive rock) audience reveals that 85% of these listeners buy albums rather than singles, and that this audience spends nearly twice as much time listening to the radio as watching television


The report, which was executed by Pulse, Inc. through personal interviews with 1000 listeners in seven major markets was released March 27 by ABC-FM Spot Sales, which commissioned the study.

Highlights of the study were revealed at a press briefing last week by ABC-FM Spot Sales Executives Martin Percival and Karen Layland. The overall conclusion was that the stereo rock listener, who is defined as a person between the ages of 18 and 34 who listens to stations which play current progressive rock music, is an average to above average consumer whose purchases of such items as records, books, clothing, and movie theater admissions are significantly higher than the national average for that age group.

The report also stressed the continued growth of stereo rock radio. Since its inception in 1968, the audience for this format has increased steadily, and it now exceeds 12% of the total nighttime radio market. The study found that the average stereo rock radio listener considers stereo equipment and rock music a necessity rather than a luxury, that he considers clothing his most important consumer item, and that he buys one or two albums per month and listens to 22 hours of radio per week.

The study went into considerable detail as to the preferences of these listeners for 29 kinds of consumer goods. It will be used throughout the country as a promotional tool for the 22 ABC-owned FM stations.

During the next 30 to 45 days they will begin dropping names . . . The Week's Best Line: found in a

press release regarding the recent attempt by the Doors to play a concert at the Atlanta Municipal Auditorium (they were turned down by city fathers because "the Doors are a riot-causing group") is this little gem: "A spokesman for the group tried to explain that any past incidents were caused by the late Jim Morrison, not the surviving members." . . . The Doors, by the way, are heading out on a European concert tour for the end of April, as soon as they finish the album they are recording at the A&M studios for Elektra . . . The Carpenters are off to Japan to get a couple gold . Elliot Roberts, the other half of Geffen-Roberts has returned to L.A. San Francisco apparently didn't suit him . A&M says Joe Cocker HAS been in the studio, correcting the wiseass columnist who said he hadn't last week. Though there is still no word on new Cocker product . . . B. B. King In Long-Term Las Vegas Deal, Film

■ NEW YORK — Of the many veteran bluesmen who have begun receiving helated recognition over the past several years, B. B. King (ABC) has attained the highest degree of commercial success. Last week, it was announced that he has signed a long term contract with the Hilton Hotel in Las Vegas. That announcement, made by David Victorson, entertainment director of the hotel, was another in a long line of major recent developments in King's skyrocketing career.

Among B. B.'s many current projects, according to his personal manager, Sidney A. Seidenberg, are a film (which is being produced by Seidenberg's company, SAS, Inc.), the writing of his autobiography and a prison rehabilitation program in connection with F. Lee Bailey which finds him playing concerts at many prisons. And these activities must all be fit in between the almost constant round of touring and recording that the artist has always kept up.

In an interview with Record World, King had this to say about the prospect of playing regularly in Las Vegas: "It's one of the greatest things that could happen to a blues singer. We've got a good band that's kicking and a good team behind us, and when you've got

that, there's nothing that can stop you."

He continued, "I was scared to death at first, but now I think of it this way: some of the same people go to Las Vegas that you might have seen at the Fillmore or the Puerto Rican Pop Festival. After you go on stage, it's all the same. When I'm playing, I'm never conscious of what's going on around me."

Seidenberg filled in some of the details about King's other current ventures: "We're trying to bring out the many sides of B. B. King. We think that we should film him while he's on top; the movie will be biographical, tracing his career from birth in Mississippi through the years of playing southern clubs to the college tours right up through Las Vegas. We'll be filming many of his live performances, including some of the jail concerts, and hope to offer it first as a TV special and later as a theatrical feature. B. B. has been making TV and radio commercials, and we're also working on a syndicated TV show to be hosted by him.

"With the Las Vegas deal and all these other things, he's joining Elvis, Barbra Streisand, Johnny Cash and a few others as a star of the highest magnitude."

Stones Tour Set; Will Begin June 3

■ NEW YORK—The 1972 U.S. Concert tour by the Rolling Stones will begin June 3, cover 30 cities throughout this country and Canada and include 40 concert performances.

The group has chosen to spread their appearances out over a two-month period for a more relaxed tour than previously, allowing for two-night performances and lay-overs in certain cities. They have decided to play a variety of halls, from large arenas to smaller dance - oriented auditoriums, and to schedule more dates than usual, giving more fans a chance to see and hear them in comfortable surroundings.

Mervyn Conn:

Country Music in the United Kingdom, Part Two

■ (In addition to being Britain's first country music promoter, Mervyn Conn has enjoyed great success in many other fields of live entertainment over several years and more recently with his own record label. Carnaby Records. The following is the conclusion of an interview with Conn, recently conducted in London.)

RW: Can British country artists achieve a similar type of re-

spect internationally?

Conn: Yes, I feel that once again this depends largely at this stage on the record company because the majority of British artists don't have many singles released. They have practically no singles released at all and the majority of album releases are all low-priced or budget lines, which is not really a step in the right direction. I feel if there was a little more devotion with regard to, as I said before, single record releases and just a little bit of the budget spent by some record companies on promoting some of the records, I feel that we'd have a heavy increase in sales although we've had an increase in the last 18 months because there's more exposure. Nevertheless I think if we had that bit more involvement it would help exposure considerably. I wouldn't like to see country music become like the pop field. I don't think it could ever compete with it, but I wouldn't like to see it get in the same rat race, because there are artists I can name, country artists, from 10 years ago who are still stars today but you'll have to search your brain very deeply to think of pop artists from stars from 10 years ago.

RW: You have mentioned briefly what you intend to do with your own label with regard to Country music. I gather generally that you feel a lot of the future support should come from record

companies in England. Is this true?

Conn: Yes. Why not? I'm not saying that all record companies are responsible for the bad situation. There are a lot of them that do a bloody good job. There is no question at all about that, but there are also many of them that have absolutely thousands and thousands and thousands of pounds worth of product on their shelves and it's just collecting dust.

RW: Are you prepared to name which record companies fall

into which?

Conn: Well no, really I don't think that's my prerogative to slate particular record companies, is it?

RW: It's a general opinion?

Conn: Yes, it's a general opinion. You come along to Wembley and you'll see the record companies there.

RW: The ones that come and the ones that don't?

Conn: That's it, I think that's a fair enough supposition.

RW: Now let's talk about Carnaby Records; when was the label

Conn: It was formed around about two years ago, but we never released anything until about the end of 1970. We were with Pye originally, but I wasn't too happy with the Pye situation on the marketing side.

RW: What kind of product did you first consider for the label? Was there a pre-conceived image in mind for Carnaby?

Conn: Yes, the idea was conceived when the whole of the English scene was whatever you made was great as long as it was English, sort of thing. We had the Union Jack on the label. but I don't think at that time enough thought was put into the label. But since then of course we have re-designed the whole label. We have a direction with the label, which way we want to go with it. I don't want to be put into one bag, but we will try and run the label as three entities. We will keep the main label. Carnaby Records for pop and progressive music, and we'll have Carnaby Country, which will be country music, and Carnaby

Gold which will by low price records. RW: As you mentioned, you were originally with Pve, and you have recently made a new distribution deal for the label. What

particular qualities attracted you to make this deal with Philips Conn: I liked the personnel there. There was a lot of trouble when we first went there with the whole Phonodisc system and we held everything up. We didn't have our first releases until November of this year.

RW: Distribution problems?

Conn: Distribution problems. But I think they've overcome them. I think they will go from strength to strength. I feel that they have a pretty good situation eventually.

RW: What do you consider your greatest achievements to be in your different involvements? First of all in concert promotion,

secondly in records.

Conn: For concert promotion I think that Wembley must be a number one. It's not only a concert promotion, but we're also exhibition contractors, builders, printers and party makers. It is a mammoth promotion and I must say that it is one of the biggest things that we have undertaken at this stage.

RW: And what about records?

Conn: Records — unfortunately we haven't had a great deal of succes in the UK. We have had hits overseas: several hits in France, Belgium and Holland with James Royal. We've had other hits in Spain with John Walker, and hits in Japan with the Wake: I feel internationally we've done far better than here in the UK, but I think that stems from our distribution problems here.

RW: Can you see a healthy future generally for Britain's record industry considering the limited opportunities for new talent.

Conn: The British record industry is in the doldrums at the moment. I don't think anything sparkling has come on the scene in the past few months. I feel that the advent of commercial radio in the next couple of years, and it's on the cards for '73, will be a shot in the arm for talent and it's going to make the record companies have to work much harder than they're working at the present moment. I think we lack, in the whole of the record field, good executives; the executive side of it is not as it should be. I think the promotion, executive promotion side, really needs a shake-up and that with commercial radio it will get it, it will find it's level. I think this will do the record industry good.

RW: Will you be concentrating your efforts on any other par-

ticular territories during the coming months?

Conn: Well, first of all, I want to get my own house in order. to make sure we get a hit here in the UK.

RW: That's your immediate intention?

Conn: That's my immediate intention. We are promoting quite heavily now into Europe because of the advent of the Common Market, even though the record industry's been in it for years. But the working situation is going to make it much easier on the continent. We are working very close with our associate distributors in France — Sonapress. We have artists going over to France, and a tour set up for some artists in Argentina. We have a big promotion in Spain, and are working very, very closely with our licencees overseas because we have had success there, and I feel that it's very important that people should work closely together on the record field, not at arm's length.

RW: What are you considering doing in America?

Conn: Well, the American situation, as you know, for the past year has been pretty bad, economically, and I feel that to have got involved in a record situation in the past year in the United States for a label deal would have been a mistake. Personally, I don't think the label was ready for a deal in the United States. But what we're going to do in the next few months in the United States is license several artists with several of the major record companies there because I feel this will be the best way to start off. You know, don't run before you can walk; I feel that for us to go out as Carnaby in the United States at this stage would be (Continued on page 18)

A few additional comments on the Convention: The feeling among many label representatives is "we're not going to let it happen again." There will be a meeting on college promotion people to discuss the problems of the Convention, and to come up with suggestions for running upcoming conventions. Secondly, many of the problems encountered arose because of lack of planning. This same committee of record industry people will make suggestions based on their experience in working with college people. All suggestions and ideas will be incorporated into upcoming regional and local conventions. For example, IBS assumed responsibility for setting up the entertainment and arranging facilities. This responsibility belongs to the record company, as labels have much more experience in planning and setting up concerts than a college radio organization; this is just one area for improvement that must be made.

ABC Record and Tape Sales is getting into the field of racking college bookstores with album product. Mike Sandler of the Cherry Hill, New Jersey office informed Record World that ABC has been involved college bookstores for 8-9 months, and is very pleased with the response they are getting. They are presently servicing 20 college bookstores, with product that they feel will sell in that area. Their local men visit and service the accounts, and write orders. The price of the albums stocked is optional with the individual retailer, but they try to discount the albums to "try to keep the students around the school," and not make it necessary for them to travel to discount centers. One of the reasons for their success. according to Sandler, is that they are "... trying to service the individual account according to the market." They hope to expand their operations in the future. LLEGE RADIO | IBS Convention Commentary



■ NEW YORK—A letter commenting on the Intercollegiate Broadcasting System (IBS) National Convention: "This year's IBS Convention was disappointing. True, the banquet was a disaster, but, aside from that, the rest of the Convention could have been salvaged by a few people who were serious in pursuing the avowed purpose of exchanging ideas, problems and solutions with other college broadcasters. The panel members were excellent, but the restrictions on the times for the panel and the questions raised from the floor limited the discussions to platitudes and humourous ancedotes about New York radio. The delegates did not take full advantage of the expertise available, or of the college radio people on the panels, who could have bridged the gap between those professionals and college radio. The tight scheduling and rigorous adherence to the policy of only one activity (panels, entertainment, hospitality suites) at a time did a lot to stifle the conference, but these obstacles were overcome successfully in the now famous room 1909, as well as in the London and hospitality Atlantic suites. where successful "bull sessions" did take place. The real purpose of the Convention was to allow college radio people to share experiences and problems, and then to utilize the professional expertise available to help solve those problems. This purpose was not accomplished."

"On the positive side were the high attendance, and the comments I heard from many of the newer stations that the Conference did provide them with a good background in basic radio programming, which will help them immensely in planning what to do with their newfound medium. For those of us who have been through it before, there is reason for optimism. In the sparsely attended session on Sunday, the delegates got a chance to offer feedback on the Convention to the IBS Board of Directors, If some of our criticisms are taken seriously, next year's convention should be excellent."

"In the meantime, there is no reason for contact between college radio stations to be limited to the annual convention. College Radio Report published its subscription list (which was mailed out a few weeks ago) and a letter between stations is a good way to start the discussions of problems to be explored during next years Convention. If you don't have a particular station or stations you wish to contact, write to CRR. The Letters to the Editor column is an excellent place to draw comments on a wide variety of sources on the problems you are encountering at your station. With good advance intercommunication, next year's convention can't face the same problems as this year's."



Then we will have a short rest on the promotion front during July and August.

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

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On To Colorado

■ DENVER — When the great westward movement began some years ago, everyone had his eyes on the Pacific Ocean. For easterners this new body of water represented the kind of security they were used to. It was very easy to forget about Coney Island with Malibu waiting. A beach is a beach, something to do on family day. Then family day became every day, and the beaches got crowded. So they all decided to have pools, and the pools got crowded, and besides, chlorine burns the eyes. The ever present smog didn't help. But that was all bearable. After all, it was a party compared to the happenings back east, that is, unity the fear of earthquakes began to spread. Without much fanfare it was apparent that the inland movement to the Rockies was on.

According to the Colorado Chamber of Commerce, people are moving into the state at a rate of 300-400 per week. No one seems to be moving out. Since Colorado proves itself to be one of the fastest growing states in the country, if not the fastest, it's safe to assume that music people make up a portion of those statistics. Denver then, is well on its way to becoming the next music center.

Tumbleweed There

Tumbleweed Records is already there.

The Famous-distributed label is headed by Larry Ray and Bill Szymczyk, who bring to Colorado track records that include stints at A&M, Elektra and Dunhill. They're attempting to provide the market with quality music without having to depend on New York or Los Angeles. Since their inception in 1971, they've been depending on LA for recording facilities, but all that changes on or about April 1. Jim Gurcio's new 24track quad studio, the Caribu Ranch, is near completion, and Tumbleweed has contracted to lease the facilities six months per year.

Scymczyk on Studio

Szymczyk, Tumbleweed's producer-engineer told Record World that the studio, which once was a dude ranch, sits on 3000 unspoiled acres at an altitude of 9000 feet. It's an hour drive from the office on Gilpin St. and 16 miles from Boulder. The studio is being built by Tom Hidley of Record Plant fame. Among all the incredible

advantages will be projection facilities for soundtracks, "a field we're definitely moving into."

Tumbleweed's name is becoming more widely known with the chart success of bluesman Albert Collins' first single, "Get Your Business Straight," from his first album, "There's Gotta Be A Change." Danny Holien, Colorado singer-songwriter has received extensive FM airplay with his debut album. Within the next few weeks the label will release an album by keyboard artist Dewey Terry. his first album after years of absence from the recording scene.

Average Age Low

The average age at Tumbleweed is 23. Included on their list of ten stalwarts is Bob Ruttenberg, who keeps himself busy with National Promotion. Donna Rabbitt coordinates all pre-production, while Aaron Schumaker heads up all graphics within the company. Schumaker also designs for Tumbleweed Graphics, a Colorado company. Recently Tum-Graphics bleweed designed packages for "J. Geils" (Atlantic) and "60,000,000 Buffalo," Nevada Jukebox (Atco). Ray. the old man at 31, brings the average way up.

Tumbleweed finds itself in the enviable position of being the only major label in a city where club and concert attractions are on the rise. Marvelous Marv's continues as the leading club. Tulagi's in Boulder has been attracting bigger blues names. The new 1000seat Soundtrack provides rock and roll every week-end, while the Denver Coliseum maintains its position as the big room. Easily, the most majestic place to play is the outdoor Red Rocks Park. There hasn't been a concert at Red Rocks since Jethro Tull played a few years ago. Minor riots occurred, so the parks department decided to temporarily close its facilities to music. If the situation ever resolves itself, Rad Rocks will once again be more than just an awesome tourist attraction.

If, in fact, Denver becomes the next music center, then Ray, Szymczyk, Ruttenberg and the lot will forever be able to boast that they were there first. First to hear new music, and first to understand what it's like to live six miles from our country's major storehouse of nerve gas. Enough nerve gas to annihilate the world six times. No escape.

Blue Thumb; Thumbs Up

■ NEW YORK — Blue Thumb Records is riding high with its most successful chart performance in the label's three year history. With their last three album releases on The Album Chart, Blue Thumb has suddenly established itself as the most successful new label of the seventies. The three albums are Dave Mason's "Headkeeper," Mark/Almond's "Two," and the Crusaders' "1."

Mason's album is selling the best of the three; he is the former member of Traffic who wrote the classic songs, "Feelin' Alright," and "Only You Know and I Know," both of which have been hit singles within the last six months. Blue Thumb has released a single from "Headkeeper" entitled, "To Be Free."

The Crusaders, who were called the Jazz Crusaders before producer Stewart Levine signed them to Blue Thumb. are on the charts for the first time in several years. Blue Thumb has initiated a massive campaign to sell the two-record instrumental album, including a television spot on "Soultrain." the syndicated television show which is taped in Chicago and shown in 18 major cities. On the show, the Crusaders album is being advertised through Sears Roebuck.

Due to tremendous airplay from the album, Blue Thumb is pulling a single, "Put It Where You Want It," from the album. According to the Vice President and General Manager in charge of sales, Sal Licata, "Put It Where You Want It" has been getting tremendous r&b airplay. There's no question at all that this record is an r&b hit, and the single has a good chance of going high on the pop charts as well. Blue Thumb has never gotten such good response to a single as it has to this Crusaders record."

A&M To Release Live Liza Album

■ HOLLYWOOD—Due to the sensational success of Liza Minnelli in her smash film "Cabaret," A&M will release the performer's first and only solo live performance album later this month.

Recorded live at Paris' famed Olympia Theatre, album is only solo live recording by Liza since her performance with her mother Judy Garland at the Palladium, released by Capitol several years ago.

George Novak Dies

■ NEW YORK—George Novak, Marketing and Sales Executive for Columbia Records, died unexpectedly last week of a heart attack. Widely known in retail and distribution circles, the 47-year-old executive played a major role in the growth of Columbia Records in recent years. His expert knowledge in the sales and marketing field contributed importantly to Columbia's leading position in the industry.

Novak joined Columbia Records in 1965 as Account Executive in Special Products. In 1966, he was promoted to Manager of Sales Marketing and Development of tape products. Under his direction, Columbia's entry into the tape field grew quickly, becoming an important contributor to the company's volume. In 1969 Novak was promoted to the newly created position of Director of Special Products Sales and Distribution. In that position he was responsible for developing and supervising sales planning and policies for national accounts, new product development, children's books and records, as well as tape sales.

Prior to joining Columbia, George Novak held various executive posts with Capitol from 1946 to 1964.

The diskery will be mounting an extensive advertising and promotional program.

The Chess label will be represented with albums by three legendary artists, "The London Chuck Berry Sessions," "The London Muddy Waters Sessions" and Bo Diddley's "Where It All Began." The Berry and Waters albums are expected to follow the success of the recent "London Howlin' Wolf Sessions" in sales and chart action. Bo Diddley has reached a new level of popularity with his personal appearances during

the past year.

"The Dells Sing Dionne Warwicke's Greatest Hits" and "The Heating System" by Jack McDuff are the Cadet entries. The Dells have been a leading popular group for 19 years and organist Jack McDuff has a considerable following among jazz fans. "The Snake" by guitarist Harvey Mandell is on

Janus and "America Eats Its

Young" by Funkadelic is on the Janus - distributed Westbound

"The Soul of Aretha Franklin" on Checker is being repackaged and reissued, based on the renewed interest in her gospel roots. The Harmonizing Four, long running gospel group, celebrate their 44th year together with "Looking Ahead 50 Years" on Checker. The Rev. Franklin, who has had almost 60 best-selling albums, will release a new Chess sermon, "I Heard It Through The Grapevine."

Faberge Music

■ Beverly Bremers, featured in "Hair" and on the charts with her Scepter single, "Don't Say You Don't Remember," has also been making commercials.

It has just been announced by her managers, Steve Metz and David Lipton of Catalyst Management, Ltd., that an agreement has been negotiated between their office and Richard Barrie, Executive Vice President of Faberge, Inc., for Miss Bremers to not only record all the television and radio commercials for their new product "Music," but to also do personal appearances in different retail outlets.

Melvin the Man For All Seasons

■ NEW YORK—It's not often that a man writes, produces, directs, edits, scores and stars in a film that grosses over \$10 million. But Melvin Van Peebles did just that with his "Sweet Sweetback's Baadassss Song."

And it's rare that a man does both the book and music for a Broadway show but Melvin Van Peebles did just that with his "Ain't Supposed To Die A Natural Death," which has garnered raves from the critics.

Now the unconventional Mr. Van Peebles is working on a multi-media project. "When I think of multi-media, I don't mean one thing being done with the various media," he explains. "I think of using all the media to interlock. What I'm going to do next is a book, a film, a play and an album that are all one and the same thing and I'm doing them all simultaneously."

The name of this ambitious project is "Don't Play Us Cheap." The A&M recording artist anticipates his play will open on Broadway before this season is over and the movie will be out in August.

"'Don't Play Us Cheap'," he says, "is a comedy about two imps who majored in party pooping and they're taking their final exam which consists of pooping a party. Unfortunately, the party they try to poop takes place in a railroad flat in Harlem. Of course, you realize the only strength the imp has is the sense of evil in the mind of his victim, so they run afoul of the natural good humor and nitty grittyness and just downright homeyness of the folks."

Music Important

Although Van Peebles has had no formal musical training, can't read or write music, and has seen very few Broadway musicals, he emphasizes: "the music aspect of my work is very important because the black audience, my nitty gritty constituency, is very musically attuned. So I always think of the musical aspect, the musical marketing of the thing, as a very important promotional and integral part of the whole."

Even though he always thought music was important to a film, he did not immediately perceive it as an important promotional tool. He explains: "the impact of this came to me as time went on, and then I had a theory that I had a chance to try out with 'Sweetback.' It was right, just as I thought it was. So, for example, my spearhead

in what I'm doing now will be the album which will be followed by the book and the play and then the cinema."

The 38-year-old Van Peebles came from Chicago's Southside to Broadway by way of Paris. He tried Ohio Wesleyan and the Air Force and then took a motorman's job on a San Francisco cable car. He became interested in photography and filmmaking but when he tried to get a film job in Hollywood, he found out he could work either as an elevator operator or as a parking lot attendant.

To Paris

Turned off by the Hollywood scene, Van Peebles left for Paris where he eventually ended up making "Story Of A Three Day Pass," a highlight of the 1967 San Francisco Film Festival. Hollywood then started to romance him and he wrote and directed "Watermelon Man" starring Godfrey Cambridge. A&M signed him and his first album was "Brer Soul," followed by the album "Ain't Supposed To Die A Natural Death" and his latest "As Serious As A Heart Attack."

The Broadway show "Ain't Supposed To Die" is based on the album of that name and "Brer Soul." The performers in the show speak the words to musical accompaniment rather than singing. Van Peebles says: "this type of form is called 'sprechstimme' and nothing happens outside of a historical context. I wanted people to listen to the words of my original songs. The words to many pop songs have really just become phonetic accompaniments to the music. So I backed offaided by the fact that I can't sing—and half spoke the words. People said, as bad as this guy sounds, he must be singing something important, so they listened."

The original idea to turn his songs into a show came from Charles Blackwell, a friend and one of the producers. Van Peebles explains: "from the very inception of the whole 'Brer Soul' series what I wanted to do was to give voice to the silent black ghetto majority that runs the elevator or shines shoes. You never hear their voices and I wanted to do something really indigenous to the nitty gritty black culture."

So many people say that Broadway and the musical is dying but Van Peebles doesn't know about that. "I use the same syndrome I used when I went to school," he states. "In school you find the biggest boy around and slap him in the mouth. Say what you want, Broadway is still the king of kings and I don't particularly worry about Broadway one way or the other. For the spectacular aspect of the production, Broadway was the best place to fulfill the physical requirements so I went to Broadway."

He points out: "Forty per cent of the audience that comes to the play has never been to the theatre before and it's running about 90 to 95 per cent black just like 'Sweetback.' The white audience is increasing. The very theatrical people just flip out over the production because of the theatricality of it, but the little old lady from Peoria sees all those bloods waiting in line and usually freaks out. However, as we go along, it's gaining more and more prestige. We'll be doing the Tony program. I'll eventually do a road company but not for the moment. I'm already the eleventh longest running show on Broadway. Pretty soon I'll be ten, nine, eight and I've already told 'Fiddler' to watch out, here I come. And, I mean that sincerely.'

Van Peebles is proud that he has five times more third world people working in his production than there have been at one time on Broadway before. It isn't only the actors who are black, but also the director. Gilbert Moses, one of the producers, the stage manager, production stage manager and costume designer. Van Peebles made "Sweetback" with a nonunion crew and says: "I have a very good understanding with the union. As long as they don't know third world people, us third world people don't know them. There's only one God and that's the box office. And, we seem to get along pretty well, the box office and me."

■ NEW YORK—In these post-Fillmore, post-Woodstock, postprogressive FM radio times, it gets harder and harder to break deserving, if under-exposed, rock acts. American Talent International, a booking agency that makes it a point to fill in the gaps left by others, has come up with what appears to be not only an innovative valuefor-the-money format for working newer groups, but an attempt to re-define the nature and profitability of the rock concert as we have come to know it. Beginning with the Faces' tour of the South this spring, ATI will present several acts in a travelling Rock and Roll Cyrcus, complete with high wire acts, special publicity, and professional circus stage management.

"The Faces were a natural to introduce the concept," ATI agent Ira Blacker told Record World, "since they represent the real spirit of show business that we're trying to re-introduce to rock with our Cyrcus. The idea is to make rock concerts appeal to a broader audience than previously; we feel that the Cyrcus is a truly exciting and original form of family entertainment."

Although the concept will certainly gain added momentum from its association with the puckishly hedonistic Faces, the actual presentation of the Cyrcus will differ somewhat on this first trial run from what ATI eventually plans to offer, in a package with three rock

UA's Stewart On The Soundtrack

■ HOLLYWOOD — As one might expect, Mike Stewart, President of United Artists Records, feels that UA does the best job on movie music in the industry. And right off the top of his head, he can tell you several substantial reasons why.

Going back a few years there was the success of the James Bond film soundtracks, and soundtrack albums from "A Man And A Woman," "The Thomas Crown Affair," "Never On Sunday," "What's New Pussycat," "Midnight Cowboy," and several Beatles movies. That's history. Current events are "Fiddler On The Roof," Frank Zappa's "200 Motels," and "Diamonds Are Forever."

Stewart wants to emphasize the importance of a soundtrack to a film. He makes a good case for soundtracks being a definite box office factor these days, and insists that "the soundtrack must be right. It can help or hurt a film."

Stewart says that UA has always been especially conscious of this and the film division under David Picker, the publishing division under Murry Deutch, and Stewart's record company have always worked closely on film projects. Not only does the film benefit, but so does the publishing house and the record company on soundtrack sales.

"There is no greater selling point for the 'Fiddler' album than to see the movie. When people go to see the movie, we've got customers," Stewart says. Basically, according to him, the rule is first the music is used to sell the film (with record company and publishing company promotion men pushing the songs and the records), and then the film is used to resell the music.

The "Fiddler" soundtrack, though, was an unusual situation. No one had seen the film, it had not even been released, when the album was certified by the RIAA as a million seller. Stewart has said for some time that with "Fiddler" it isn't a question of selling a million units, but how much more the album will eventually sell when the film is in wide release. Stewart expects a soundtrack like "Fiddler" to have a life span of as much as five years.

While taking some pride in the way his company functions with their soundtrack albums, Stewart is also quick to say that the company is not simply and exclusively one that puts out the parent company's movie soundtracks. "We don't have to be reminded of Ike and Tina Turner, Traffic, the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, Don McLean, War, and oh so many more, do we?" he asked.

Upcoming are three big musical projects for UA. In early April David Merrick's "Sugar" will open on Broadway with Merrick producing, Gower Champion directing and Mitch Miller producing the album, which should be ready by late April. The songs are by Julie Styne and Bob Merrill.

"Man of LaMancha" will be out by the end of the year, directed by Arthur ("Love Story") Hiller, and starring Peter O'Toole and Sophia Loren. Tunes are from the long running Broadway show.

Following that, in 1973, UA will have the musical version of "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer," produced by Arthur P. Jacobs, and set to music by the Sherman Brothers, who wrote "Mary Poppins."

Free Flow Presents Wisconsin Music Fest

■ NEW YORK — Free Flow Productions, a subsidiary of Directions Unlimited, will present The Wisconsin Music Festival on Friday, April 14 and Saturday, April 15, in Madison, Wisconsin. Free Flow produced a similar festival in Williamsburg, Virginia the previous weekend (7-8).

The two days of concerts will be held in the Madison Field House (on the campus of the University of Wisconsin) and will be headlined by Richie Havens and Kris Kristofferson. Among the artists scheduled to appear are: It's A Beautiful Day, Country Joe McDonald, Ramblin' Jack Elliot, The Earl Scruggs Revue, McKendree Spring, Dave Van Ronk, The Sorry Muthas and Uncle Dirty.

Cole Porter Year A Waldorf Salad

■ NEW YORK—The Cole Porter 80th Anniversary Year, initiated by Chappell & Co., publishers of Porter's music since 1936, has spurred record activity on the extensive catalogue of the late composer/lyricist.

"We are definitely experiencing a peak Porter period at this time," Norman Weiser, Vice President and General Manager of Chappell stated last week. "Since last June, the start of the anniversary year, it's been difficult to keep track of the number of current and scheduled projects. But they all seem to have one thing in commonsuccess. The Porter catalogue is now stronger than it has been in years, with a whole new generation of Porter buffs involved."

Columbia Projects

Columbia Records currently has three Porter albums in the planning stages. Producer Tom Shepard and Cole Porter authority Robert Kimball (author of "Cole") are working jointly on a unique concept album utilizing rare and private recordings of Porter performing both published and unpublished material never before released. The LP is set for early fall. Also definitely slated is an Andre Kostelanetz album.

In addition, Columbia is participating in a tie-in promotion with Holt, Rinehart and Winston, publishers of the critically acclaimed "Cole." A premium album and the book will be offered jointly through both the Book Of The Month Club and the Columbia Record Club.

Bobby Short

Also available is Atlantic's "Bobby Short Loves Cole Porter, "which the label predicts will probably be the artist's best-selling L.P. to date. The sales of the two-record set, which has received excellent reviews, are attributed in part to the fact that it has reached an untapped youth market.

Television producers are also turning to the rich Porter catalogue. Two television specials, one a musical salute to Porter, the other an adaptation of a major Porter show, are scheduled for 1972.

Chappell & Co. is publishing a 50-song deluxe folio highlighting the top Porter standards and lesser-known songs. The book will contain photographs and specially-prepared text by Robert Kimball.

In May, the Museum of Modern Art will feature a selection of classic Cole Porter film musicals.

New Womack Single; Album to Follow

■ HOLLYWOOD—Hot on the heels of "That's The Way I Feel About Cha," which is rapidly approaching gold, United Artists has released a new Bobby Womack single entitled "Woman's Gotta Have It." The single, recorded at American Sound, Memphis, was produced by Bobby Womack and co-arranged by Womack and Mike Leech, "Woman's Gotta Have It" is from an album entitled "Understanding" which is slated for May release. Womack also produced the album which was recorded at Muscle Shoals Sound and American Sound.

■ NEW YORK — Lon Harriman's The Tasty Management Unit, Inc. has established itself as a unique management service after five months' operation.

Harriman's experience as a booking agent had made him aware of the need for American representation of groups managed in England due to the vastness of the American market. JAZZ

By MICHAEL CUSCUNA

There is always little to say when we lose another neglected genius. But the death of Lee Morgan is made even more tragic by the violent, needless circumstances under which he lost his life. Anything else that need be said can be found in the great music that he made.

Since dishonest treatment of musicians is a Michael Cuscuna time honored tradition, the new, revised publication of "This Business of Music" by attorneys Sidney Shemel and Bill Krasilovsky is a welcome bible to all musicians.

The book is written in clear, direct terms and organized in a useful manner. It reveals all the laws, regulations, techniques and standard practices in recording, publishing, managing, song writing, booking, promoting and every other aspect of this rather boggling business.

If you want to know how to protect yourself and your music and find out what you are entitled to and what you can get, read this book for your own sake. If every musician had read it, robbery and double dealing in music would be greatly reduced.

*

As interest in African music grows, the demand for recorded material becomes more and more immediate. Composer-pianist Randy Weston, who now lives in Morocco, has made a deal with Creed Taylor to produce and record authentic African music for a special series on CTI Records.

As a recording artist, Weston has also completed one album for CTI, although he is not signed to the label. The session included Grover Washington, Freddie Hubbard, Ed Blackwell, Airto, Vishau Wood and Billy Cobham.

Every so often someone asks me what happened to Betty Carter. Well, just about a year ago, she recorded a fine album live at the Village Vanguard. Since her artistry has never been appreciated by record companies or vast audiences, she has issued the album herself on Bet-Car Productions, 333 North Drive, North Plainfield, New Jersey. As you might expect, it's beautiful.

Over the past year, I have discussed various records that artists have released on their own. I am happy to say that the Jazz Composer's Orchestra, which records and sells its own albums, is offering free distribution mail-order services to other musicians who have financed their own records and to small, non-profit European jazz record companies who cannot get their records released Stateside.

The JCOA is now preparing a catalog of the records that it will carry. Anyone interested can get more information from them at 1841 Broadway, New York, New York 10023.

Atlantic Records has acquired US and Canadian rights to the Commodore catalog of jazz from the late thirties and forties. Among the artists who recorded for that label were Don Byas. Chu Berry, Edmond Hall, Billie Holiday, Albert Ammons, Wille The Lion Smith and Lester Young. A reissue program is currently being planned.

Tenor saxophonist Sonny Rollins has come out of a period of inactivity once again. He is currently playing the Village Vanguard and consummating a record deal.

Brubeck to Atlantic; Two Albums Released

■ NEW YORK — Dave Brubeck, one of the most respected talents in the world of jazz, has been signed to an exclusive recording contract with Atlantic, initiated with the release of two new albums last week, it was announced by Nesuhi Ertegun, Executive Vice President.

Brubeck's first Atlantic release is "Truth Is Fallen," a major composition based on Iaaaih 59 from the Bible, featuring Erich Kunzel conducting the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra. "The Last Set At Newport," is the second, featuring the Dave Brubeck Quartet with Gerry Mulligan, was recorded live at the 1971 Newport Jazz Festival.

Brubeck has performed in only the most select concert appearances in the years since 1967, when the original Dave Brubeck Quartet dissolved. In the interim he has devoted the bulk of his time to serious musical composition,

Although three of his serious religious works have appeared on the Decca label, all of Brubeck's forthcoming works will be released by Atlantic.

Brubeck has currently returned to a full schedule of concerts, working in conjunction with groups formed by his sons, namely the Darius Brubeck Ensemble and Chris Brubeck and New Heavenly Blues, in concert together billed as "Two Generations of Brubeck." Dave Brubeck himself is appearing as a trio, with Jack Six on bass and Allan Dawson on drums. Frequently appearing with the trio on his tour as guest artists are Gerry Mulligan on baritone saxophone and Paul Desmond on alto sax.





■ LONDON—A welcome cut in purchase tax on gramaphone records announced in last week's government budget has resulted in varying price reductions. Formerly 50p. (\$1.30), single retail prices now range between 45p. and 49p., whilst full price albums have generally dropped by approximately 20p. (\$0.52). EMI, Decca, Pye, Phonogram and Polydor have all agreed on a recommended price of 45p. for singles, Kinney and CBS 49p. and RCA 47p., with pop LP's now ranging between just under £2.00., and £2.25. (\$5.22-\$5.87).

The 1972 Eurovision Song Contest brought Luxembourg their first victory ever with "Come What May," sung by Vicky Leandros. Britain's hot favorite entry, "Beg Steal Or Borrow," by the New Seekers was runner up with Holland finishing third. In spite of no general improvement in the quality of the material, Austria's entry, "Falter Im Wind," by the Milestones was refreshing and certainly not what we have come to expect to hear in the contest.

Messrs. Kamerman and Apps have announced the signing of several new American artists for European representation with their March Artists Company. Johnny Nash, whose "Stir It Up," currently figures in the U.K. top 50, will undertake a ten week U.K. tour through March Artists during late April and May, whilst Spirit will tour the U.K. and Europe during July. Also as a result of Apps' recent visit to New York, a new band consisting of former members from Iron Butterfly, Deep Purple and Johnny Winter's band, named Captain Beyond, will be brought in to make their world debut at the Bickershaw Festival on May 6th. March's British acts, Tranquility and Matthew Ellis are both due for their initial Stateside record releases. Tranquility's single, "Thank You," will be released by Epic shortly, whilst the group extend their current West Coast tour having undertaken several dates with the New Riders Of The Purple Sage, as well as being re-booked at the Whisky A Go-Go. Matthew Ellis debuts on Warner Brothers with his second British album release, "Am I," on June 10th.

John Baldry's new Warner Brothers album, titled "Everything Stops For Tea," now complete; his second produced by Rod Stewart and Elton John. Atomic Rooster are also near completion of their first album since Chris Farlow joined a few months back, whilst Argent's third for Epic "All Together Now," is ready to go.

Expect top twenty success here for current Stateside hits—"A Cowboys Work Is Never Done" by Sonny and Cher (MCA), "Everything I Own" by Bread (Elektra), "Running Away" by Sly and the Family Stone (Epic), and Paul Simon's, "Me And Julio Down By The Schoolyard" (CBS).

"There's another thing about records and the record business that Jack Anderson doesn't seem to realize. It's music that sells records. Artists who play music sell records, even without air play and without Top 40 litings. Like Frank Zappa and the Mothers, or John Prine, or Miles Davis for example. Music comes first and records become best-sellers because of the music that is on the records.

"Unfortunately, the subject of payola always makes a good story."

Fred Ruppert, National Promotion Director Elektra: "Jack Anderson seems to have jumped into something he knows very little about this time around. His statement about "an underpaid r&b jockey may be seen riding around in a five thousand dollar car, all for pushing a few 'top 40' records" is This ludicrous. statement points out that he doesn't even know the difference between r&b Radio and top 40 Radio. He is talking about an "r&b jock" taking payola on "Top 40 records."

"Mr. Anderson also refers to "big-time disc-jockeys collecting payola" and to "small station jockeys . . . clamoring to get their share of the boodle." He must be very poorly informed about the programming of radio stations, because there are very few disc jockeys that have the freedom to program their own shows. The records the jockeys play are pre-selected for them by programming and music people, most of whom do extensive research into sales patterns, play at other stations, and requests from their listeners. Promoting records today to these highly scientific programmers is a very sophisticated business and I really hate to see a noted columnist such as Jack Anderson come out with an article condemning an industry he obviously hasn't done his homework on.

"Anderson says 'The dupes in all this are America's pop crazy teenagers, always eager to buy the latest 'hits.' These youngsters have no inkling of the gangster - like world which rigs record marketing.' Mr. Anderson is really selling America's record-buying youth very short American youth determines which records will succeed, not record companies, not radio stations, not gangsters. 'American youngsters' as Jack Anderson refers to them, are very sophisticated music

buyers. One has only to listen to the best selling records of the early sixties to see how much the quality of music has risen over this decade. We, as a record company, spend large sums of money to produce records that 'America's youngsters' will either accept or reject. We are still in business because we have been right more times than we have been wrong about what records America's youth want to hear and buy, not because we have force-fed "America's voungsters" what we want them to buy. In the end, the music is either in the grooves or it isn't, and any amount of hype, push, pull, or payola won't force people to buy it."

Tom Noonan, Dir. Merchandising & Mkting, Polydor: It seems to me that broad charges and blanket indictments of two industries serve no useful purpose. Specific facts can at least be used to point out specific wrongdoings; and at the same time protect the innocent who are, after all, in the great majority.

Pat Pipolo, National Promotion, MCA Records: "First of all I don't think the man knows what he's talking about. You know, it's always the guy with just a little bit of knowledge that's most dangerous, because usually whatever other little bits he picks up is distorted. I would have to say if he does have evidence of payola in the industry, he better bring it out in a hurry because he's doing a great dis-service to all the honest and dedicated people in radio. He must have 'Top 40' and r&b formats confused, first of all. He's talking about disc jockeys taking money at the 'Top 40' level. If he knew anything about the industry he would know that disc jockeys have nothing to do with what they play, that it's the program directors. I think that if this is typical of his reporting, the whole IT&T scandal that he supposedly broke is now very suspect. The other thing is the 'Top 40' program directors are usually influenced by the big national pd's and these are people you couldn't touch with a ten foot pole, because they're honorable people, they're highly successful, and there's nothing you can do for them. Absolutely nothing. The pity of it is something like this gets all kinds of headlines and it gets in a whole lot of publications. If it does come to trial and people are brought to trial and it is thoroughly investigated, usually nothing comes of it, or people are vindicated, or there are explanations for what he feels is

wrong and that's what doesn't get printed, or if it does, it's on small print on page 27. All people remember was the bad press it got initially."

E. Rodney Jones, WVON-Chicago: "I think its the most ridiculous and assinine statement anyone could make. Especially pertaining to r&b jocks who drive \$5,000 cars when a r&b record sells nationally 150,000 to 200,000 records. Tell me how a record manufacturer could stay in business giving gratuities of that nature?"

Ron Saul, National Promotion, WB/Reprise: "According to what he wrote, he (Anderson) distorted some of the facts presented inaccuracies, probably because he just didn't understand the industry. The thing about deejays being able to select their own music lists was not true. He made mention of WABC, but there are many others with the same standards. He made it look like payola was rampant in the industry, which it isn't. It probably exists, but I think it's in isolated situations. It doesn't represent the record industry and it doesn't represent the radio industry. He made an isolated situation represent the whole picture and it's not true. He shouldn't say it's rampant: he should be specific. There's an old chinese proverb: the beginning of wisdom is to call things by their right names. Which suits this situation. When a company has the product and the manpower, they don't have to resort to pavola."

Steve Popovich, Director of National Promotion, Columbia: "I am in basic agreement with the responses of Stan Gortikov and in particular, Bill Gavin."

Harold Childs, National Promotion Director, A&M: "The charges are just totally wrong. I have never seen anything like that go on, and I just don't have evidence of it going on. The top 40 situation around the country goes so much by charts and what's happening on an overall basis that it's totally impossible to get to one person, and nobody can add a record around the country without some reason for it. I think the charges are just full of air. No foundation for them whatsoever. I know that our promotion staff would never get involved in something like that."

Brown Meggs, Vice President. Marketing, Capitol: "I don't know what to tell you. I'm not aware here, in this company, that we've ever engaged

in any of these activities he's described. I read his column with interest, but no recognition. Jack is really getting around, isn't he? From industry to industry?"

Steve Wax, Director of National Promotion, Bell: "I think the entire thing is being blown out of proportion. There is more professionalism in records and radio than ever before. We can't say that 'payola' isn't going on, but we base our company on the dictates of proper business."

Herb Gordon, Director of National Promotion, Famous: "I feel Anderson doesn't understand the record or radio industry as far as promotion or why records become hits. Records make it because of quality and artistic value and the professionalism of promotion people, pd's and disc jockeys knowing their trade. Unfortunately, in this type of smear campaign a lot of innocent people get hurt."

Boo Frazier, Perception-Today Records: "If this statement were true, why concentrate on the disc jockey rather than the station owner. The problems lies in the front office. R&b has for many years has been shown more attention than pop. Why? It's a shame economically that the r&b discjockey hasn't been paid his worth. R&b jocks start them, pop jocks chart them."

Stan Monteiro, Director of National Promotion, Metromedia: "I've been doing promotion since 1957 and have never been involved in payola. I hear it's still going on in some areas. One always hears rumors. I've been hearing them for years. Jack Anderson's statement was far too general, and because of it many good people will get hurt. If he has anything specific to say, he should say it."

CLUB REVIEW

Davis 'Club' Date **Good Time For All**

■ BIRMINGHAM, ALA.—The Nashville Brass conquered this Alabama steel town several weeks ago and the reception was so noteworthy that RCA decided to do a live album at the beautiful private club.

Due probably to the mechanics of live recording, Danny's show lacked the quick movement that his brassy country music implies.

Producer Bob Ferguson came up with the idea of the decade: A current Nashville Brass arrangement of "Dixie." What better way to sell records to the "friends and neighbors?" The tune, which is featured on the live album, was wrapped into a medley with the "Battle Hymn of the Republic" by Brass arranger Bill McElhin-

Gaslight Bill A Gas

■ NEW YORK—Pearls Before Swine, a Reprise group from Florida, offered a packed crowd at the Village Gaslight last week (25) a fine evening of entertainment

The group consists of four very talented and congenial young men: Harry Orlove (guitar, mandolin and banjo), Art Elis (flute recorder and glockenspiel), Bill Rolins (bass and lap steel) and Tom Rapp (lead vocals and guitar).

Witty Tom Rapp knows how to talk to an audience and gained instant rapport with his excellent sense in monologs between every number. He also knows how to inject humor into a song as was the case with. "There's No Other," which was a positively silly rendition of the old Crystals' tune replete with oo la las, do wops and be bops. Another fine example was "Crawling Toward Bethlehem," a brief bluegrass number adapted from W. B. Yeat's poem, "The Second Coming."

"The Baptist," a more serious tune, has very moving religious overtones which seem to dominate the majority of their work. Other standouts included "Amber Lady" and "Everybody's Got Pain," which proved this group does not need gimmicks to succeed.

These four newcomers to the current scene are the fifth group to go by the name of Pearls Before Swine since its inception in 1967. They just might be the last. They're that good.




