THE SINGING COWBOY NEELY REYNOLDS, "SWEET LITTLE ROCK N' ROLLER (FEEL LIKE A ROCK)" (prod. by Wes Farrell/Pierre Cossette-Wes Farrell Corp.) (Pocket Full of Tunes/Common Good, BMI). The televised nation-wide talent hunt is over: these cowboy boots are made for some solid top 40 walkin'. The "Sweet Little 16" of '74. 20th Century 2101.

#### **ALBUMS**

THE EDGAR WINTER GROUP, "SHOCK TREATMENT." One of the current contenders for the 'King of Rock & Roll' crown delivers the genuine stuff in spiffy style. Distinctive variety is amply exemplified, from the heartfelt blues of "Someone Take My Heart Away" to the rollicking "Rock & Roll Woman" right on to the up-tempo optimism of "River's Risin". Epic PE 32461 (6.98).

HERB ALPERT AND THE T.J.B., "YOU SMILE — THE SONG BEGINS." The uniquely Americanized Latin sound that titillated all within earshot is back again after a long absence. Sensitively orchestral compositions constitute the set, as demonstrated via the impassioned aura of "I Might Frighten Her Away" and the penetrating "Save The Sunlight." A&M SP-3620 (6.98).

MAHAVISHNU ORCHESTRA, "APOCA-LYPSE." The talents of John McLaughlin and his re-formed entourage are masterfully mated with those of the London Symphony Orchestra. This co-effort lushly weaves dulcet tones, forming a total musical flow. The tempo variation within "Smile Of The Beyond" adds dimension to its magical musicality. Columbia KC 32957 (5.98).

THE STYLISTICS, "LET'S PUT IT ALL TO-GETHER." Premier production for the quintet from Hugo and Luigi, who maintain the sensuously symphonic sound associated with the fivesome. ■ LONDON — RCA Records, at a Quadraphonic Progress Report meeting in London Thursday (9), announced development of a new universal vinyl compound formula which RCA Records is offering to the chemical industry and discussed quadraphonic projects by other RCA Corp. divisions.

Other companies making presentations at the meeting were Warner-Elektra-Atlantic, National/ Panasonic and JVC/Nivico.

tions services, RCA Records, said the new vinyl compound provides exceptional wear characteristics, superior audio properties and a high degree of stability under varying moulding conditions and "Because we believe this formula, or something close to it can simplify the manufacture and improve the quality of all records, both stereo and quadraphonic, we are giving it away. Invitations are being mailed to the major chemical suppliers in the U.S. to meet with our director of manufacturing for a full disclosure and review. It is our hope," said Heneberry, "that the skills of the chemical industry, when applicable to our formulation, will generate further improvements to reduce the cost to a point that, balanced against the factory savings in eliminating all or most multiple compounds, it will add nothing to manufacturing cost."

### FM Progressives Move Toward Jazz

(The following is the first in a twopart series concerning the current FM radio trend towards jazz and iazz-oriented albums.)

■ NEW YORK — Progressive FM radio stations, as reflected in Record World's weekly FM Airplay Report, are playing considerably more jazz and jazz-oriented al-bums than they have in the past.

In a four week period beginning April 20 this year, there were 76 individual reports of some 27 different albums, all of which can be defined as jazz or jazz-rock. In the same period one year ago there were 34 reports of sixteen albums, representing an increase of some 70 percent in the number of albums and more than double the number of individual reports.

Not all the stations reporting to RW are approaching these albums with the same enthusiasm, but certain artists are receiving almost universal acceptance. Drummer, Billy Cobham, for example, whose name won attention during his stint with John McLaughlin's Mahavishnu Orchestra, is being played widely, his second Atlantic

solo album, "Crosswinds," having been reported by 16 stations in four weeks. Keyboard player Deodato is also gaining wide acceptance with his first MCA effort, "Whirlwinds," picking up reports from 14 stations in the same time period. One year earlier, the strongest album added to the progressive FM libraries was Atlantic's live set, the "Ann Arbor Blues and Jazz Festival," which was listed by eight stations.

While variables such as release dates and changes in station formats (the "free-form" era of the mid-1960s is over for all practical purposes) do enter into such comparisons, the breadth in the styles of artists represented and the

#### **Record Bar Chain Finds Success** With New Album Pricing Strategy

■ DURHAM, N.C. — While some discount centers and department stores continue their policy of price cutting, discounting or using recoords as a loss leader or as a draw to get people into their stores, full line record retailers continue to search for ways to sell records in quantity, maintain selling prices at reasonable levels and, ultimately, make a profit. The 45-store Record Bar chain, headquartered here, has just completed six months with a new pricing and merchandising policy that chain executives say has caused no loss in volume, but has led to higher profits. And at the same time, Record Bar has completed price increases on albums that bring their selling price to among the highest in the nation.

Simply put, their new pricing and merchandising policy is that no new release by a best selling artist is put on sale for the first two weeks after the album's release, but is sold at the store's regular selling price. "We like to wait a minimum of two weeks before we put an album on sale,"

stated Record Bar's Pete Smolen. "But don't confuse putting an album on sale with promoting or merchandising it. We will and do run promotions on albums with in-store displays, playing the album in the stores. We'll also stock the album in depth in all of our stores and advertise it in our newspaper ads. But we won't give the album away on sale." Smolen notes that Record Bar "would rather sell 500 copies of something at full price than 1,000 on sale, because in (Continued on page 32)



#### Mississippi Enacts **Anti-Piracy Law**

■ JACKSON, MISS. — Governer William L. Waller has signed into law an anti-piracy statute which makes it a misdemeanor to duplicate, sell or use for public performance pirated versions of sound recordings, or to make available for a fee, rental or any compensation any equipment or machinery to be used to make pirated recordings. The law becomes effective July 1 this year.

The new statute also makes it mandatory that all sound recordings sold within the state carry the name and street address of the manufacturer and that the name of the actual performer or group be prominently displayed on the outside cover or jacket of recordings.

Violations of this law are punishable by a fine of up to \$100 and/or a jail term of up to 30 days for the first offense, and a fine of up to \$500 and/or a jail term of up to six months for subsequent violations.

THE VIEWPOINTS OF THE INDUSTRY

#### Radio Luxembourg's Alan Keen: Great Britain's Commercial Airwaves

■ For the past four years Alan Keen has been general manager of Radio Luxembourg's British Service, which until recently was the only commercial radio network being heard in the U.K. The following interview underlines the changing face of radio in Britain and how the introduction of regional commercial radio has affected Luxembourg and indeed the entire record industry in the U.K.

RW: What first attracted you to working in radio?

**Keen:** First of all because it was exciting. A guy called Philip Birch [Editor's note: now managing director at Piccadilly Radio, Manchester] called me when I was on the Woman's Mirror and asked me to meet him at the Hilton one evening to discuss "an exciting project." It was all very cloak and dagger. I was intrigued. I didn't have the slightest idea what it was about. The outcome of that meeting and two more which followed was that I said "OK, I'll join you," because he told me his plans were to launch a "pirate" radio station. It wasn't going to be the same as Caroline, which had been going for about a year at that time, June 1964. The station was to be called Radio X.

We could not disclose the name because in those days, if you remember, we were outside British territorial waters, we weren't a British registered company at all, so we couldn't give our name away. Had we done so, somebody else could have come along and said "You're not Radio London, we're Radio London, we're going to take the name," so we had to withhold it. So with that in mind, I joined Philip in August, 1964. We had a trestle table, one secretary, Philip and myself in Curzon Street. We started preparing ourselves for a ship that was going to leave Miami and arrive in three or four months time. The ship eventually arrived and we started taking on disc jockeys. Every guy we took on, with one exception, was an experienced broadcaster. The exception was Kenny Everett, who came to us and had never been in radio before, but every other guy that we had, had at some time or other had experience—from Paul Kaye in those very early days and all those other names that you may remember.

We built up, I think, a great radio station. We started at Christmas 1964 and closed down on August 14, 1967. That was the end of the pirates because of the Marine Offences Bill. Being involved in launching a new project, however, was exciting. It was adventurous, it was fun, it was different. Music had always been my hobby anyway, and this was a great opportunity. When you get to a certain age there comes a moment when you've got to make a major decision. I could have stayed at IPC. I might have been there to this day had I not taken that chance, but the best move I ever made in my life was to join Philip Birch and get into radio, because it's communications. I'd already been on newspapers, that's communications; I was a salesman, I wanted a sales platform with a difference, something to be really exciting and different. And I wanted to pioneer something.

RW: What did you decide to do when the pirates closed?

Keen: I didn't know what to do. I could have gone back into advertising but I didn't want to. I was approached by a few people and the only one that really excited me because it was a challenge was a meeting I had with Bob Reisdorff, an American who at that time had come from the States and was heading Liberty Records because they had broken away and set up their own operation on Albermarle Street. I talked with Bob and he said "what about coming in to join us and running the music publishing company?" and I knew nothing about publishing at all. All I'd seen in the past were names on the "a" and "b" sides of singles and record album sleeves, or sheet music where you would see the name of the company at the bottom. That's as much as I knew, so I said I'd think it over, went along to PRS and asked

them to show me around, went to MCPS and made the same request, and they obliged.

I also went along to see an old mate of mine, Don Agnes of Leeds Music, who showed me their copyright department and how it functioned. I grabbed a couple of books, talked with a couple of people, looked at the opposition and thought "OK, I'll have a go" and got into music publishing running Metric Music. I did that for 12 months, then got together with a guy I'd known for many many years called Harold Pendleton who was running the Marquee, and he said "let's get together" and I suggested starting our own music publishing company, which we did for two years until August, 1970 when I came to Radio Luxembourg. That was called Marquee Music (London) Ltd. but the registered trade name was Alan Keen Music. I used that name purely because I thought if all my old pals at the BBC saw my name on a record it may possibly have some influence. I capitalized on that name. Then I came to Radio Luxembourg on August 1, 1970.

**RW:** How would you say the new commercial stations compare with the pirate stations of the mid-sixties?

Keen: Well, they don't. The new stations are local.

RW: Yes, but in terms of format?

**Keen:** Different again, really. Do you want me to highlight one particular station?

**RW:** We'll start with Capitol Radio [London], as it was the first music station.

**Keen:** Capital . . . 1 think that they've . . . apart from inheriting a couple of people who were pirates—Dave Cash and Kenny Everett—they're good broadcasters, they're professional broadcasters, and Capital had an opportunity to present the style they had on Radio London. That Kenny & Cash show started on Radio London. If you look at the format of the pirates as opposed to the format of, let's say, Capital Radio, of course there's a difference. There's even a difference down to the advertising. They're picking up an awful lot of local advertising, be it cinemas etc., or the local stores, which the pirates never really had as much of. If you look at their format I personally do not believe that Capital Radio is catering to such a wide audience as the pirates. That's the impression I certainly get.

**RW:** For a long time Radio Luxembourg has been the only so-called commercial station broadcasting to the British public since the pirates closed. With the introduction of legalized commercial radio how would you say it's affected you so far?

### "The more competition, the more radio awareness from the advertisers and their clients."

**Keen:** I'd approach that from two different directions. First of all 1 would approach it from an advertising point of view. A long time ago people started saying to me "How do you feel about competition because you've had it on your own for so long?" and my immediate answer always was "The more competition, the more radio awareness from the advertisers and their clients," and this has been the case, it's been proven to be quite true. If you look at the number of editorial single column inches given in national and local newspapers and magazines to commercial radio in the last six months, you will see an astronomical increase. This in itself proves that there is far more radio awareness. The more advertisers that think radio, the better for Radio Luxembourg. Let me repeat, we're not a local station, we're offering a complete network coverage. Not only in the UK, we're offering it to advertisers throughout Europe. We have conducted research in the Benelux, we've conducted research in the four Scandinavian territories, Sweden, Norway, Finland & Denmark, we've conducted research in Germany. I'm talking of research to the British service of Radio Luxembourg, so that we know we can show advertisers documented proof that we have a vast audience. Not only throughout this country but in Europe.



Lou Reed is doing his next, which Steve Katz is co-producing, in New York, and Ted Templeman heads there this week, to finish Lorraine Ellison's current effort . . . Back here again, at Western Recorders, Denny Doherty is wrapping up his first for Paramount-Ember, which John Madara, natch, is producing . . . Final sessions for the DeFranco Family's "Save the Last Dance for Me" are scheduled for this week . . . Jack Jones, appearing at the Flamingo till June 5, is also shuttling back to A&M, where he's readying his next (RCA) album for fall release . . . And Tavares have begun their second album here, with Dennis Lambert and Brian Potter overseeing . . . Paul and Linda McCartney, meantime, are said to be contemplating a return to these shores, in four or five weeks, to do their next album with Wings . . . Visiting have been Bengt Palmers and Blue Swede's lead singer, Bjorn Skifs, while Loudon Wainwright III went to Sweden last week, to tape a 45-minute tv special . . . Bryan Ferry was also here. What's been his dream, according to one who should know, is to use Liberace's piano-with-candelabrashaped pool as the site of an album cover-so he did that . . . And in other news: Chicago, for the first time in the seven years they've been together, have added a new member, their eighth. He's percussionist Laudin de Oliveira . . . #### **Hoople Hoopla Hits Broadway**

■ URIS THEATER, N.Y.C. — Although a purely musical act appearing on Broadway is a relatively new advent (e.g. Bette Midler and Liza Minnelli), never before has hard rock hit the Great White Way. Mott The Hoople (Columbia) and Queen (Elektra) had the privilege of being the first when they opened at the Uris Theater this week (7).

Queen was explosive on the previously thespian stage, displaying electrical expertise and dispensing pulsating metal rhythms, but alas, to a predominantly Hooplite audience. Costumed and somewhat theatrical in their stage presence, the British band's New York debut was highlighted by their most renowned hit, "Liar," which was excellently performed with its energetic crescendos.

#### **Hot For Mott**

The stage was set for Mott, and, befitting their Broadway bow, came a symphonic orchestral prelude. Coming on strong, dramatic,

and most effective. Ian Hunter's raspy vocals led the beginning of "American Pie" which segued into "The Golden Age of Rock and Roll." The costumes were glorious, the visuals most pleasing, and the music was Mott at their best. The audience, however, somehow forgot they were in a legitimate theater and assumed that they were at the Academy of Music. The stage was rushed, the plushness of the auditorium ignored, and the magic that usually fills the dramatic arena was reduced to its lowest possible level.

Mott's set was musically lavish and extremely well-done. The sixpiece ensemble thrilled their devotees throughout: from the commercially sophisticated "Roll Away the Stone" to the soothingly melo-(Continued on page 32)

Crumb, you might or might not remember, was the man responsible for the adventures of such comic book/strip characters as Mr. Natural, the Fabulous Furry Freak Brothers, Fritz the Cat and Suzy Creamcheese, all of whom adorned the underground newspapers of the 1960s and some 20-plus comic books.

Robert Crumb (pictured here in hat) is a recording artist too, though, with a 78 he put out a few years ago and with an album Blue Goose is currently in the process of releasing: "R. Crumb and the Cheap Suit Serenaders." The trio (Allan Dodge and Robert Armstrong in addition to Crumb) play a variety of old pop songs, waltzes, polkas and the like with spirit, dedication and even enthusiasm. The basic instrumentation is tenor banjo, accordian and fiddle. The execution is properly

The advertising revenue in 1973 was the best year ever in the history of this company. And that's a fact. 1974 will be a tough year. TV advertising is down by 20 percent. Some of the local stations have already slashed their rates in half. I think that's a dreadful mistake. We have not done that. We haven't had to do it. Our revenue for this year is equal, in fact it's better, than last year. If you look at the bookings we have in hand for the whole of this financial year, they're up on last year. But if you analyze them into months-January, February and March, they're the only three I can talk about so far-we are actually fractionally down. The reason is because of the material shortage. For example, Gibbs, Unilevers, said to us some several weeks ago, "We can't commence our campaign at the moment because we can't get the plastic to contain our shampoos." Coca Cola and Pepsi Cola have a bottle shortage and a can shortage, so they again have said "We can't start the campaign yet, but there's the order for the year; you keep it, don't cancel it, but it'll have to start later in the year than we originally expected." So because of that our monthly figures are in fact four percent down.

**RW:** The BBC has never really featured pop music in the evening, so you have had the field to yourselves during the time you broadcast in the UK. How has the introduction of local stations affected your

istening figur**e**s?

Keen: The last period of research was for the period ending November 1973. I'd just like to clarify a couple of things here which are very important and it's this: our research, unlike everybody else's research is very modest because we only research people between the ages of 10 and 34. Our research does not include anybody outside those age groups. Don't think that everybody stops listening to Radio Luxembourg once they hit the age of 35 because they don't! But we only count people between the ages of 10 and 34. Those people are our target market audience. If you look at the research which has been provided by Capital, LBC, and some others to be forthcoming, they don't do that, they take the whole audience across the board. They show a total cumulative audience. We don't do that, and I'll tell you this much, that our own research which was provided to the ISBA and the IPA (Incorporated Practioners of Advertising) has received their complete recommendation. They are, I understand, going to demand that radio research is conducted in the same diary form which we adopt by other radio stations in the future. (Concluded next week.)

multiple reports for an increased proportion of the albums are significant indicators that station tastes are changing. Ten of the sixteen albums reported for the weeks of April 21 and 28, and May 5 and 12, 1973, received only one listing each, compared to 13 out of the 27 this year.

Albums which might be considered hybrids (jazz-rock, soul-jazz, MOR-jazz) appear to be the strongest because of their appeal to dual audiences and crossover potential. And the stations themselves break down according to those playing the jazz albums leaning most heavily in one direction or another.

The ratio of jazz or jazz-oriented cuts to more standard fare is still

relatively low at most of the stations, and some are still very cautious about adding such albums But a listen to such FM stations as WBCN (Boston), WCMF (Rochester), WOWI (Norfolk, Va.), WXRT (Chicago), KPFT (Houston), KRMH (Austin), KZEL (Eugene, Ore.) KMET (Los Angeles) or CHUM (Toronto), among others, will provide more of a jazz taste than it would have a year or more ago.

(Next week, music directors at some of these stations comment on the cuts they're using, the time of day different styles and artists seem to suit best, approaches to programming jazz into regular shifts and listener response to their efforts.)

At any rate, Buzz Bennett reports that the April Hooper shows KDWB winning mornings and nights, coming close to KSTT in after-

noons and losing midday to WDGY.

KFI (Los Angeles) . . . The station has donated over 17 thousand 78 rpm records to a foundation which furthers the study and preservation of American music in various forms. So the John Edwards Foundation received discs from the '30s of such artists as Glenn Miller, Benny Goodman, Duke Ellington and Count Basie. Do you think in the future they will be studying the styles of such current performers as Ricky Segall and Rodney Allen Rippy?

XEROK (El Paso) . . . The station, known as X-ROK 80, has become "more aggressive" in its format and programming, according to PD John Long. As he described it, "It's today's format, not all original, but not all stolen either." At any rate the target audience is "everybody we can get," or mass appeal as they say in marketing circles. Since Long's come to the station, there have been some slight changes in the line-up, which now is: 6-10 a.m. Randy Hames . . . 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Bill Stevens . . . 2-6 p.m. Christopher Haze . . . 6-10 p.m. Eric Chase . . . 10 p.m.-2 a.m. Steve Sever . . . weekends John Long (program and music director).

Los Angeles . . . Barry Hanson, a/k/a Dr. Demento, who currently holds forth on KMET-FM with his Sunday specials from 6-10 p.m., will soon be syndicated nationally. Having a personal collection of over 35,000 records, which he uses on the air and discusses in minute detail, makes him a true doctor of musical knowledge. **KTFM-FM** (San Antonio) . . . #### Climbing to the Top

■ NEW YORK — Lori Lieberman (Capitol), is a unique entity in this world of singer-songwriters. Her songs are written specifically for her by the well-established team of Charles Fox and Norman Gimbel, and while they are often covered by other artists (e.g. Roberta Flack's hit of "Killing Me Softly With His Song"), they are still primarily associated with her.

Two problems with this type of arrangement are almost inevitable. The first being that an image emerges which is really that of two other people interpreting the singer's feelings, the singer herself then having to interpret the songs. The second is one of depth, for although Ms. Lieberman may make suggestions for at least some of the numbers, and participate in working them out, her own emotions undoubtedly run at different levels than her writers'.

At the Bitter End recently (1), Ms. Lieberman was in fine voicecolorfully low and occasionally sultry, and seemingly vulnerable in a very honest, likeable way. But the contrast between what she tried to express between songs, and what came from the lyrics themselves was too sharp. "Piece of Time," "House of Women," "Stone Canyon" and "The Feeling's Good" are all fine songs, and she performed them well, but one kept hoping she would reach out and offer something more. Tempering the Gimbel/Fox songs with those of other songwriters (or perhaps her own) would help. But for the moment, there is something very satisfying about watching such a talented new artist starting a climb to the topa place she should well reach given the proper care and atten-

Opening the evening was Murray McLauchlan (Epic), a Canadian singer/songwriter who has established a name for himself in his native country with "The Farmer's Song" and who is known here as the author of "The Child Song," which Tom Rush recorded a number of years ago. His songs are very personal, highly focused examinations of the human condition-be it love affairs, alcoholism or just plain survival. He, too, should be heard from often again Ira Mayer in coming years.

#### Mogull Gets 'Arnold'

■ NEW YORK—Ivan Mogull, on behalf of Ivan Mogull Music Corp. (ASCAP), has acquired the title song and score to the Bing Crosby Production's film, "Arnold." The title song was composed by George Duning. The deal was negotiated by Mogull and Crosby Production staffer Arthur Manson.

## Hammond To Produce 'Big Band' Album

■ NEW YORK—John Hammond, vice president, talent acquisition, Columbia Records, has entered the recording studio to supervise the production of a record by an 18-piece big band headed by trombonist Bill Watrous. With the exception of some studio work he did with Epic recording artist Don Ellis, this is Hammond's first big band recording session since the 1940s when he produced such legendary big bands as Count Basie's Orchestra and Goodman's Orchestra, Benny among others. Hammond will be the executive producer of an upcoming record by Watrous' band, to be entitled "Manhattan Wildlife Refuge."

#### New Material

The album has been in the works for over three years, in which time the band was put together and all new material was written especially for the project. In addition to playing trombone, Watrous wrote much of the material, conducts the band, and will produce the album with Hammond.

■ NEW YORK — Warner Bros.' May release includes new albums by Arlo Guthrie, Wet Willie, Ry Cooder, Doug Kershaw and a Beach Boys re-issue.

New albums on the Warner Bros. label this month include "First of the Big Bands," a joint effort by Deep Purple's Jon Lord and Tony Ashton formerly of Ashton, Gardner & Dyke. In the country field, there is Doug Kershaw's seventh album for the label, "Mama Kershaw's Boy." A new group including Richard Greene of Seatrain, Peter Rowan, John Kahn, David Grisman and John Guerin is Muleskinner, with an album of the same name. Also being released is "The Storm and The Sea," recorded by Mystic Moods' producer Brad Miller. Debuting this month on Warner Bros. are Quacky Duck and His Barnyard Friends, whose album is titled "Media Push." The Warner release is rounded out by "Hot and Sweet" by The Mighty Sparrow, and "Red Pump Special" by ex-Stealer's Wheel member Rab Noakes.

Reprise Records' contribution to Warner's May includes Arlo Guthrie's latest, simply titled "Arlo Guthrie," Ry Cooder's "Paradise and Lunch" and "Heart Strings" by Linda Lewis. "Pet Sounds," the Beach Boys' legendary turning point album, is being re-issued this month on the group's Brother label.

Capricorn Records has two new albums this month: "Keep On Smilin'" by Wet Willie and "A Spiritual Greeting," by White Witch.

to have Clyde working with us on the administrative end," Waronker stated. "He looks after costs and commitments and makes the whole operation run quite a bit more smoothly."

Among the current top selling Warner and Reprise artists produced in-house are Maria Muldaur (produced by Waronker with Joe Boyd); Gordon Lightfoot (Waronker); The Doobie Brothers (Ted Templeman); Van Morrison (Templeman with Van Morrison); Montrose (Templeman); Graham Central Station (Russ Titelman with Larry Graham). Wickham has recently been looking after Warner Bros. country interests out of Burbank and has produced sessions by Debbie Dawn and Corky Mayberry. He is also working closely with Chips Moman, who has produced such artists as Joe Allen, Tony Joe White and Marion Love (with Buddy Killen) out of Nashville for Warners.

#### **Ronnie Spector Returns**

■ NEW YORK — Ronnie Spector and the Ronnettes — the names conjure up memories of such songs as "Good Morning Heartache" and "Be My Baby," that latter an invitation many an audience member has undoubtedly fantasized to be his. Now, after a five year sabbatical, Ronnie Spector is returning to the stages she loves, and has just released a single, "I Wish I Never Saw the Sunshine," on Buddah.

"I never wanted to leave the stage," said the chamois-suited Ms. Spector. "When I got married I didn't think I was going to leave either, but evidently Phil didn't want me to go on stage. The first year I missed it so much, and after that I went bananas. I love the stage. I would sing for nothing. Phil couldn't understand why I would want to sing when I had everything I could want-money, this, that. I said, 'I like the stage. I get a charge out of being up there doing my thing.' My act is never the same. Every show I may say something different."

#### **Up-Date**

The current act, she told **Record World** recently, is similar to the one she did five and more years ago, but up-dated, with "rock, pop and something for everybody," and includes both new and old material. Audience enthusiasm for what she loves to do so much has even exceeded her own expectations.

#### **Oldies Show**

"I did an oldies show at Madison Square Garden a few weeks ago, with eight acts on the bill. We were seventh to go on. It was awkward waiting for the six acts to go on. Everybody had gotten the same reaction of 'good, good, good.' And then we went onwith the second song they started lighting matches and lighters. We were in the middle, like at a boxing match, and trying to play to all the audience. I'd go on this side and turn around and there'd be all these lights. Before I knew it the whole place was lit up. Eight or nine years ago they might have given us a standing ovation and yelled for more. But this time we got that plus the lights. At first I thought maybe they didn't like us. But when I saw they were jumping up and down . . . I still sometimes think it was a dream. New York is really where it's at. I was born and raised here and I guess everyone knew that."

Such response has reportedly been following Ronnie Spector and the new Ronnettes wherever they go, indicating that her and their talents go beyond "favorite daughter" status. One of her hits sums it up perfectly: "I Never Can Say Goodbye." She probably never will.

#### **CLUB REVIEW**

#### Beefheart Band Brings Big Sound 'Upstairs'

NEW YORK — Never a group to rest on past laurels, Captain Beefheart and His Magic Band (Mercury) have always relied to some degree on the element of surprise in their presentations. Their stint Upstairs at Max's recently (25) was no exception. One might not even have realized that it was the good Captain at all, save for an off-stage introduction, for once saxophonist/clarinetist Del Simmons made his entry, the band seemed more his than Beefheart's.

Beefheart limited his own role to that of lead vocalist and harmonica player, leaving the reeds to Simmons. He growled out lyrics to such songs as "Mirror," "Crazy Little Lady" and "Full Moon, Hot Sun," sounding like a Jimmy Durante gone rock and roll, in part bringing back memories of the Fugs. Beefheart's one-time association with Frank Zappa is apparent in attitude and stage mannerisms, but the Zappa genius is still in a class by itself.

Simmons lifted the entire band from its background riffing patterns, bringing loud cheers for a super high powered "Sweet Georgia Brown."

#### Aim

Opening was Blue Thumb recording group Aim, whose lead singer and guitarist was suffering from laryngitis. The group, however, kept on top of its music, rendering such songs as "Aim For the Highest," "Hollywood," "Topanga Lane" and "My Friend" with energy and dedication. Greater dynamics would be helpful, but otherwise Aim was pretty much on target.

#### McDonald Wails At the Whisky

LOS ANGELES—It's not possible to review Kathi McDonald (Capitol) without mentioning the vocal similarity to Janis Joplin, just as it's also impossible to regard her as merely a Joplin imitator. Coming onto the Whisky stage in a flurry of rose petals, wrapped in feathers and lamé, McDonald begins to project a visual image of flash. With her powerful, lowdown, high-pitched vocal range, she begins to project a musical image of raucous whiskey-blues rock-and-roll. But she stays at one ear-shattering level throughout without developing the gutwrenching aspect that is so important to this kind of singing. Also, as good as her back-up band is, it doesn't help that they drowned her out at times. Still, her version of "Heartbreak Hotel" was unbeatable and showed, best of all, the all-round talent that she definitely possesses.

ABC-Dunhill group Rufus opened the bill, with everyone in the r&b group more relaxed and less frenetic than in previous engagements. But they just haven't evolved their own particular musical identity or excitement enough yet, despite each individual's competence.

Herbie Hancock, Stanley Turrentine and Yusef Lateef were among the leading jazz artists to play, but I heard tapes of two magnificent sets by local musicians. One was by jazz and r&b saxophonist Earl Turbinton, who is well represented on Joe Zawinul's last Atlantic album. Leading his own quartet, Turbinton tackled one original, Professor Longhair's "Mardi

Gras In New Orleans," Coltrane's "Love Supreme" and Leon Thomas' "The Creator Has A Master Plan" with gusto and artistry. The last night of the festival featured an extremely long and exciting performance by the two blues greats Professor Longhair and Clarence Gatemouth Brown, who have also just recorded together. The crowd went wild with their unique brand of New Orleans r&b. Aside from regular evening concerts, the fairground offered free concerts and workshops by various Louisiana blues and cajun groups. Now we can only look forward to next year.

As summer approaches, the festival scene will open up on international proportions with the biggest being Montreux and Newport In New York. An interesting evening tentatively planned for both of those festivals is an African jazz night that will include the unique pairing of Manu Dibango and Dizzy Gillespie. The combination should be an exquisite one, considering Gillespie's prior delvings into Latin and African rhythms. Atlantic Records will record one or both performances. Blue Thumb's Hugh Masekela will also be on the bill.

Jean Luc Ponty, who has joined the new 11 piece Mahavishnu Orchestra, is expected to sign as a solo artist with Atlantic Records . . Arhoolie Records just recorded a third Juke Boy Bonner album using the facilities of Houston radio station KPFT . . . Steve Lacy has recorded a number of excellent albums and is looking for American labels to buy the tapes . . . Trumpeter Ted Curson is embarking on another European tour in June . . . New Orleans jazz drummer James Black, who did some spectacular work with Nat Adderley and with Yusef Lateef in the sixties, is currently on the road with Dr. John . . . David Fathead Newman is finishing up his next album with guest artists Roy Ayers and Pat Rebillot. It features more straight ahead jazz than his most recent releases . . . Muse Records, which has been recording some of the best Sonny Stitt in recent years, is readying the release of another Stitt album . . . Grant Green has left Blue Note Records and is currently shopping for another label . . . Howard Johnson, whose brilliant talents on tuba, flugelhorn and baritone sax have graced many a jazz and pop group, is planning to record and release an album of his own music . . . A new album is expected momentarily from Herbie Hancock, but it will not be the film soundtrack that was (Continued on page 51)

■ MAX'S, N.Y.C. — Comeback, shumback! If Janis Ian (Columbia) were any more contemporary, she'd be too far ahead of her time to be savored over and raved about. Her audience was almost reverent, but it was from no podium that Janis Ian delivered her unmistakable talent to the attentive throng. Backed more than glowingly by a small rhythm section and female vocalist, Janis Ian proved she more than lives up to the name of her latest album "Stars."

The highly personal title song provided a fitting close to the show, while other tunes from the album like the deftly political "Dance with Me" and the sensitive "You've Got Me on a String" were interspersed throughout her performance. She sang many songs that have yet to be recorded; the furthest back in her repertoire she got was to her previous pre-retirement album (circa 1970) for the most beautiful ballad "He's a Rainbow." Not society's nor anyone's child any longer, Janis Ian is a masterful songwriter, a precise performer and one mother of a five-foot talent.

Opening the show was songwriter Eric Kaz of "Love Has No Pride" fame. Performing a few tunes from his latest Atlantic album "Cul de Sac," he concentrated most wisely on songs from his first package which the audience was more familiar with, through various interpretations from such talents as Tracy Nelson and Tom Rush: "Temptation Took Control of Me," "Mother Earth" and "The Sky's About to Cry." With no rhythm section other than the beat of an occasional swizzel stick, he gave a uniquely personal viewpoint to his stand-out compositions. He's less of a vocalist than a tunesmith, but his set was nonetheless pleasant and sincere.

#### **Springfield Soars** At Troubador

Springfield, indeed, can be more than just a pretty face. He and his back-up musicians can produce some good hard-driving rock and roll, although Rick seemed to be pushing himself and his guitar-playing a little too hard. He was on much shakier ground with the slower numbers, where the emphasis was on the lyrics, which were by any standards but bubblegum's, slight in substance. NEW YORK — An evening with Rod McKuen (Stanyan) is not designed for those who intend to boogie through the night. In fact, if there were such a thing as a positive form of lethargy, McKuen would have cornered the market.

At Avery Fisher Hall Friday (3), McKuen appeared in his now traditional jeans and sneakers (changing during intermission from sweater to western shirt), intoning the lyrics to his poems and songs. It is a most gentle way to spend an evening, one which requires little thought or action on the part of the listener, for McKuen deals in well-phrased platitudes. It was only shortly into the second half of the program that he spiced the tone of his words, reading an unpublished poem about the men of Watergate. The poem was an unusual departure — and a welcome one—which disproved his long-standing claim of apoliticality.

Musically there is little to say, as McKuen would probably be the first to admit he is not a singer. But as a poet of the masses—and knowing that the masses don't normally read poetry—his annual concerts are a vehicle for spreading his words of loneliness, loveliness and worldliness. Besides, it's healthy not to boogie every night.

lowering prices to get that double volume, your profits disappear." And Smolen noted that in order to make the profit they normally would on 500 copies sold at regular price, they would have to do five times as many albums at sale prices.

The chain has also implemented a series of price increases in their stores. Regular selling price on \$5.98 list has been raised to \$5.29 from \$4.99, an increase of 30 cents, while the sale price is at \$3.99. Regular selling price on \$6.98 list albums has gone from \$5.89 to \$5.98, while the sale price is at \$4.79. Smolen cited increased construction costs, mall rentals (the chain is opening 16 new outlets during August, September and October), increased mail, shipping and phone costs, and an increase in the minimum wage from \$1.60 to \$2 an hour as reasons for the increased prices. And the chain's executives report no loss in volume - in fact, Smolen explained that five markets were tested at \$5.19 during the first quarter, and "all stores continued in the trends set previously with no loss in volume or profits."

Regarding the policy of not putting an album on sale the first two weeks it is out, Smolen notes that "profit is the name of the game" and that there is no guarantee that a customer attracted to a store because of a low price will necessarily buy other albums. Record Bar's theory, he noted, is to "satisfy the customer's needs and make a profit while doing it. And you don't make a profit by giving the merchandise away."





### McLean Makes Magic At the Bottom Line

■ BOTTOM LINE, NYC — Don McLean (UA) did "American Pie" for the first time in a long while, before an enraptured audience (19)—and shades of "The Exorcist" syndrome, a string broke just as he got to the chorus about the Devil. In all other respects—including Don's quick fix-it banter which followed for the 30 seconds it took him to resume full-strung mid-song—this was one heavenly event.

### **New Material**

Currently working on a new album with producer Joel Dorn, McLean has already perfected much of his new material to the point where an initial live listen seems to convince you he's written yet another eternal piece of work. He shaped most of his set out of these new gems, and there wasn't one throw-away amongst them.

The most commercial sounding was a ditty called "La La Love You"—although if it is meant to be a parody, it loses out in that sense, for its total grip on the top 40 form it's allegedly aping. There is talk that another of his newies, "Did You Know" has been cut by Roberta Flack. And just because of its strangely effective imagery, expect much word-of-mouth about "The Mummy of Andrew McCrew" long before it surfaces on disc.

### **Ballads**

"Tangled" and "Winter Has Me in Its Grip" were two more ballads with all the power of "Vincent" with which he so happened to close the show. He also managed to sneak in an outside oldie, "Nature Boy," just before his gentle finale.

### **Openness**

Don McLean is a one-of-a-kind act. Although tired of being called "Mr. American Pie," and not one for the spotlight in general, his openness and closeness with any audience truly interested in his music always comes shining through. Performing with all the polish and yet retaining all the earthiness of his mentor Pete Seeger, Don McLean on stage is magic personified.

### **Country Gazette**

Opening quite appropriately was the youthful bluegrass quartet Country Gazette. Working off material from two UA albums, the band romped through songs as seemingly disparate as "Honky Cat" and "Orange Blossom Special" with a home-cooked humor at a perky pace.

### David Amram:

### The Art, Craft and Business of Music

By IRA MAYER

■ NEW YORK — David Amram is interested in the music business. After a hiatus of some 15 years, he returned to the recording studios two years ago to begin to try to record and make accesible the kind of music he has composed and played in concerts — concerts ranging from those with the New York Philharmonic to those with his own jazz band to those for which he accompanies his pop songs on guitar. His third album for RCA has just been released.

### **Series**

"I tried to make the records all part of a series," says Amram animatedly. "The first one, 'No More Walls,' was trying to show that an American born and trained musician could work in the different areas of music and use all the material of different kinds of music that are available. And more than that, to encourage people who work in folklore and jazz, that maybe they could be welcome in the classical music world."

The second recording, "Subway Nights," was a compilation of Amram's pop songs. The latest, the "Triple Concerto," is a symphonic jazz work. Making people aware of the breadth of his musical abilities, and of his attempts to bridge the gaps among various audience's tastes, are now among Amram's top priorities.

"I think there's the art of music, the craft of music and the business of music, and at 43 I've spent my whole life working on the art and the craft. In the last year I've been trying to learn something about the business of music—in the positive sense. It's important. I've learned by traveling around the country that a lot of people in small record stores would like to know who's out there and sometimes there's no way they can know unless the artist goes there himself.

"Now RCA's beginning to really help me. They're putting out a one-sided album called 'What Is An Amram,' and I speak about all the three records and the different kinds of music I've worked in, from a music education point of view and also from the point of view of getting kids to participate and raise their tastes so that they'll enjoy all kinds of music more."

### **Multiple Talent**

A conservatory-trained musician who is equally adept on French horn and Pakistan flute, among other instruments, and who served as composer-in-residence for the New York Philharmonic for two years, Amram is more than aware of the traditional "snobbism" of the classical world —both in terms of classical musicians looking down on folk and jazz forms, and of pop fans who feel classical music is inevitably stuffy.

"There's a difference between going to schools playing free concerts and trying to bring people more of an understanding of the music—bringing the music down to earth. I never believed that taking a Beethoven symphony and adding to it to make a rock and roll record was the right approach. I believe Beethoven and Bartok are fine the way they are, and my music is, too. But if the musicians and conductors and composers can get out there in the field and in the street it will be much more fun for everybody and the music will get around to a much wider audience."

### Balance

Amram tries to balance his personal appearances in the same manner. One recent week, for example, he went to Toronto, playing opposite Dr. Hook and the Medicine Show at the Victory Theater, doing concerts at some 15 high schools in the area, and then appearing with the Toronto Symphony Orchestra. And this, coupled with his efforts to understand the business end of his music-of trying to gain insight into the ways to maximize the sales and impact of his records by exploring his record company's views and needs as well as those of the record buying public-will hopefully give him the opportunity to record still more projects, classical, jazz, folk and educational (all of which really boil down to the same for him).

"My hope," Amram says, "is that this will create a market that other composers can fall into. Then I'll feel I have really achieved something."



### Sammy on B'way

■ URIS THEATRE, NYC—There are four tests any nightclub attraction must pass in order to be considered a four-star institution. They are (in any order your own critical priorities dictate): the ability to pull off medleys of songs related only by writer or originator concept; the art of choreography personalized and absorbed into a seemingly natural, yet unique state of total being; the gift of gab, highlighted by a Jewish witticism or two; and a voice that fills a theater while riveting people to their seats. Every night of his record-breaking box-office twoweek run here (April 23-May 4, historically representing the largest Broadway gross for any 14-day stand), Sammy Davis Jr. proved he has each one of these difficult tests down pat. Sammy is slickness personified, but his humility is never to be underestimated.

Many times during his hourplus stage act, he thanked the audience--yes, even the press--for his warm reception. Whether he was singing Sinatra or Beatles medleys, dancing to a dramatic "Mr. Bojangles" routine, proving himself to be the only natural black yenta in show biz or simply singing his heart out to the tinkling ivories, Sammy Davis Jr. seemed the happiest superstar this side of heaven. If you are fond of the cabaret genre of talent, you can do no better than spend an evening with the impressively versatile performer.

Opening for Davis was Freda Payne (ABC) who displayed a sense of nervousness in the presence of such an act as Sammy. While her "Band of Gold" hit came off extremely well, her version of true supper club music was much less effective. Although Ms. Payne began as a night club talent, she now seems more at home in a funkier groove. Given the demographics of the audience, she could not get into it and keep everyone happy, so she held back and compromised. Look for more recorded success in her future, and for her stage act to appear in more favorable surroundings.

The evening began with the dance routines of vaudevillians The Nicholas Brothers. Some things never change.

### Eleventh House: No Names Up Front

By IRA MAYER

NEW YORK Larry Coryell has played with a variety of musicians ranging from Chico Hamilton to Gary Burton to John McLaughlin, with quite a few stops in between. In New York since 1965, he has participated in and led different groups in efforts to merge the openness of jazz with the contemporaneity of rock. The latest manifestations of his talent and outlook is represented by a recently released Vanguard album, "Introducing the Eleventh House With Larry Coryell."

"In the older group I had a different kind of rhythm section and a different kind of concept," says Coryell. "The Eleventh House is more organized. We try to keep the tunes shorter. We try to play up the strengths of each individual member without making it look like a talent show."

The Eleventh House, Coryell points out repeatedly, is the "pooling of resources" of a group of musicians who happened to cross each others' paths at the right time. The group formed in July, 1973, when Coryell's previous group disbanded. The line-up is currently Alphonse Mouzon on drums, Mike Lawrence on trumpet (replacing Randy Brecker, who left shortly after the album was completed), Mike Mandel on keyboards and synthesizer and Danny Trifan on bass.

Coryell supplies the back-grounds of each of the players with relish, consciously explaining how each fits the overall scheme in terms of background as well as ability. "This is not a back-up group. I've had too many back-up groups. It's more of a collective thing with me as coordinator."

### Howlin' Wolf Sues Arc Music

■ NEW YORK — A lawsuit filed in Federal court here by Chester Burnett, a/k/a Howlin' Wolf, has charged Arc Music Corp. and its chief executive officer, Gene Goodman, with not paying proper royalties on a group of 55 compositions written by Wolf between 1955 and 1970. The suit also charges Goodman with inducing Wolf to sign an agreement "that all musical compositions written and performed" by Wolf shall be "the sole and exclusive property of employer," which would be Arc Music Corp., and not Wolf. The suit asks for \$1,250,000 in damages, for the agreement between Wolf and Arc to be rescinded, and to declare Wolf the sole owner of all of the copyrights. in its efforts to decentralize its musical base. Corvell attributes the demise of the first Mahavishnu Orchestra in part, for example, to the bands "always having to do John's (McLaughlin) music. Not that John's music wasn't good, just that nobody else got to do any of their own music." (Coryell's "Spaces" album features both guitarists, as well as Chuck Corea, Miroslav Vitous and Billy Cobham.) Also, there is the musical relationship to groups such as Weather Report, Herbie Hancock's band, "a little Edgar Winter, a litle Focus, a little Brian Auger. We're all up there. We're all trying to do the same thing. That is to make our particular message reach the largest possible audience without any compromise whatsoever."

The group has been in the studio in between American and European tours, "continuing in the vein that we established with the first Eleventh House album. We just want to improve on what we started. Which is by no means a formula. Just a concept. A formula is self defeating. A concept is constantly evolving . . .

"I hope eventually that they throw no one's name up in front of the group . . . Without a fully integrated active musical environment, I can't grow and the band can't grow. And that's the whole point. To grow and grow and grow until you drop dead. Communication to make life richer." Music like that of the Eleventh House communicates on just that level.

### Pirates Plead Guilty In District Court

■ SEATTLE — A distributor of pirated tapes who pleaded guilty to 10 counts of violating the Federal Copyright Laws in the U.S. District Court here has been sentenced to 20 days in jail on each count, the terms to run concurrently, and fined \$200 on each count for a total of \$2,000.

The manufacturer of the pirated tapes was found guilty of 52 counts of copyright violation and is to be sentenced June 28.

### Defendants

The defendants were identified as Richard G. Standow of All Good Tapes, Inc., doing business as American Sound Systems and North American Tape Company, and Joseph P. Cawley, also known as Joe Nelson. Standow pleaded guilty and was sentenced to the jail term by U.S. Magistrate John Weinberg. Cawley was found guilty by Magistrate Weinberg and faces penalties of up to one year in jail and/or a fine of up to \$1,000 on each of the 52 counts.

The criminal information filed by U.S. Attorney Stan Pitkin charged Cawley with manufacturing pirated versions of copyrighted tapes at a plant in Vancouver, Wash., that produced approximately 50,000 pirated tapes per month. Last September about 3,500 pirated tapes and various materials and machinery used in the duplication process were seized by authorities.

Standow was charged with distributing the pirated tapes to some 200 retailers in Washington, Idaho and Montana.



The one by Manuel Alvarez Llana from Radio juventud, La Voz de Asturias was completely inexact. He declared: "Records and Spanish singers lack quality!" . . . He is damn wrong!

It reads: "Sorry it has taken me so long to thank you for the kind words re Mocedades and the Tara label a few weeks back in Record World. We are rush releasing "Dime Señor" from the album and after that have another new single which I personally believe can be no. 1 on the U.S. charts. Group will be in Los Angeles, May 2 to tape a Dick Clark special as well as a Midnight Special and we are really doing all possible to break them as an American act. Your help has made our job easier. God bless!" . . . Success is not an accident, Dick. You've got what is needed and your letter proved it . . . Mucho Records released in New York "Mujer Bonita" b/w "Gran Señora" by Don Juan and his Orchestra with vocals by the talented young singer Ray Hernandez, and "Canción de Wilfredo" b/w "Algo" by Ricardo Marrero and his Group. Ricky's version of "Canción de Wilfredo" is catching on. Also the flip side, "Algo," doing well and could smash even in the American market. These records were produced by Felo Brito and recorded at Broadway Sound Studio with Pat Jaques and E. Greenbaum as engineers. Both of these groups are represented by Oasis Management in N.Y.C. which is headed by Narciso S. Vizciano. Regards to Andres Aviles and good luck! . . . Warner Bros. just released a single by Secos & Molhados



General manager Des Brown is backing up his faith in American band Montrose by launching a massive promotional campaign for their "Bad Motor Scooter" single and "Montrose" album. The campaign coincides with a nationwide tour, on which they support Status Quo, and involves distribution of 25,000 'flexi' giveaway discs featuring sample cuts from the album, extensive radio and press advertising, posters, stickers etc. Ex-Warner associate label Raft will be dispensed with but will go out in style with a similar campaign for new British band Beckett, produced by former Family vocalist Roger Chapman.

Polydor has announced major changes in their promotion department beginning with the appointment of **John Howson** as general promotion manager reporting to a&r chief **Wayne Bickerton** (whom we congratulate on producing and writing this week's fastest moving single "Sugar Baby Love" by the **Rubettes**). Howson will be responsible for a minimum of 15 new field promotion men shortly to be appointed to facilitate efficient coverage of BBC local and the increased number of regional commercial radio stations around the country. **Bob White** and **Johnny Evans** become pop product and MOR promotion managers respectively.

The Hollies back up their recent "Air That I Breathe" single and "Hollies" album successes with a major concert tour-their first in six years—which coincides with the release of a new single, "Son of a Rotten Gambler" (Polydor). A full orchestra will be utilized on all dates which include two shows in London, and James Griffin may also be featured on the tour. Steeleye Span follows their recent album success "Now We Are Six" (Chrysalis) with two concerts at the Royal Albert Hall on May 20th and 21st. The last minute decision to undertake the second date was made after the first sold out within minutes of the box office opening. The band visits Holland before headlining the first show of their American tour in Philadelphia on June 12th and appearances in Australia, New Zealand and Japan complete a three month trip. Other Chrysalis acts Procol Harum ("Exotic Birds and Fruit"), Robin Trower ("Bridge of Sighs") and Ten Years After ("Positive Vibrations") all have world-wide smash albums out and a fourth by Jethro Tull is near completion. More tours announced by Gary Glitter (commencing June 16th) and Blue with Focus who include two London appearances during their schedule between May 19th and 27th. The Sweet have cancelled their remaining dates due to a throat condition being suffered by lead singer Brian Connolly.

David Essex's new "America" single should make it 14 for CBS in next week's Top 50! Instant hit also for Alvin Stardust's third Magnet single "Red Dress," and one other strong competitor this week is on ATV's Bradley's label, the theme tune to "The Zoo Gang" television series written by Paul & Linda McCartney, recorded by Jungle Juice.

In fact, we have received not one single direct consumer complaint about the 4-channel quality of this Elvis release."

"In summary," Heneberry said, "RCA Records is a solid supporter of CD-4 and expects to see this system establish itself as the industry standard, worldwide."

### Okla. Pirate Guilty

■ OKLAHOMA CITY — A jury in Federal District Court here returned a guilty verdict on six of seven counts of a criminal information charging Darrell Gene Mallicoate, doing business as D&D Enterprises, with violations of the Federal Copyright Law. Mallicoate's partner in D&D Enterprises, Donald Crabtree, had previously pleaded guilty to five counts of Copyright Law violations. Both face penalties of up to one year in jail and/or a fine of up to \$1,000 on each count.

The criminal information charged the two men and D&D Enterprises with having illegally produced some 150,000 tape recordings in the six months that D&D Enterprises had been in operation in Spencer, Oklahoma. FBI agents who raided the facility last December seized a quantity of pirated tapes and duplicating equipment

Before his trial began, Malicoate had petitioned the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Oklahoma to dismiss the complaint, charging that Sections 101(e) and 104 of Title 17 U.S. Code (U.S. Copyright Law) were unconstitutional.

U. S. District Court Judge Fred Daugherty dismissed Malicoate's arguments that his constitutional rights under the 1st and 14th Amendments have been violated.

about Dick James Music and its future.

While the company has found licensing its catalogue to foreign distributors efficient in most countries, Ellis said, and having used Bell as its American distributor at one point, they currently find it more advantageous to license specific artists to specific labels. Thus, while Elton John, as one example, is on DJM Records in Britain, he is on MCA here. Coordinating an international catalogue, Ellis added "is a matter of meeting every situation as it comes up."

"We are also very conscious of communication. We were the first record company in Britain to set up a Telex line so that we can be in virtual instantaneous contact with our American or French offices—either by telephone or Telex."

### Copyrights

The Dick James organization, Ellis went on, is primarily interested in copyrights, the firm having built its catalogue and reputation first as a music publisher. The record company became a way of exploiting the copyright by getting the songs into the public consciousness as quickly as possible.

One form of recognition of the firm's services came with the "Queen's Award to Industry" for 1973. The award is given to companies who have successfully exported British product to other nations. Ellis qualifies their pride in the citation, however, by pointing out that one of the reasons for the new New York offices is their quest for talent from this side of the Atlantic, in the hopes of providing the same services for selected American acts that are now being given to those in the DJM British catalogue.

He is his own man. Check this album out.

Ornette Coleman's next album is completed. This unique record features Ornette and **Bob Palmer** playing with the **Master Musicians of Joujouka** in Morocco.
