NOT least of the many blessings for which we may render thanks next Thursday is radio. While it has become commonplace and incidental in the lives of most of us and while some radio widows still look upon it as a curse, there are thousands to whom it is a boon. It dispells loneliness, it brings forgetfulness of sorrow, it relieves suffering.

No sacrilege need be involved in a companion piece to "Thank God for a Garden" in "Thank God for a Radio." Thousands of letters to broadcast station attest this fact.

Radio has relieved the pathos of life for many otherwise unable to receive the solace of religion, the inspiration of fine music, or even the joy of jazz.

It satisfies the wanderlust of those unable to bodily visit distant places. It brings the news of the world to those unable to read it. Even the normally deaf person can frequently hear radio. And many an otherwise weary hour during the day or late at night is pleasantly passed by its aid.

Thanks is too often selfish. Like happiness, it should be shared. So instead of consigning a set which no longer suffices for your needs to the dark confines of basement or closet, or instead of accepting its small trade-in value, why not get in touch with some charitable organization that can place it where it will do good for others?

Thus can you carry out the spirit which might well govern our observance of Thanksgiving Day. And your own feasting and cheer be all the greater because of the personal satisfaction in bringing thankfulness into the hearts of others.

There we have an American who can't speak English, trying to tell us what is the matter with Europe. Where there is one who is constructive there are ten who are destructive. At the end of an evening, we have a dark brown taste—and nothing else.

Sometimes every station around the bay has a third-rate speaker, talking, talking, talking—hurling words out on the air blythe-ly, hopefully, satisfied with himself and his subject—and if he only knew it, boring the radio fans to death. G. Bolivar Watts on "Sofa Cushion Planting in Bolivia." T. Wimpus Smith on the value of "Washing Behind the Ears of Your Ford." Or Henry Jones, explorer, on "How I Grabbed a Tusk Off a Walrus!"

Only the other night, with a hunger for some music, we trotted right around the dial. Not a scrap. Every station in the bay district was blabbing about something or other and most of it was the sort of drivvel that nobody would read in the cheapest kind of a magazine. And so, we did what hundreds of other radio fans are doing these nights—went out of town to Los Angeles, Portland, San Diego and Denver and got our entertainment. Local stations are losing out with so much talky talk. Folks are tired of it.

There are about five or six features in the San Francisco bay district worth hearing. Because we don't want to hurt any feelings, we shall not tick them off. But you can all name them.

But at that, the radio fan would stand for poor music without a murmur if these self-constituted orators would quit making speeches over the air. The same old hokum. The same old applesauce. The practice of broadcasting a banquet is another of the radio pest family. Who wants to listen to a banquet. Who wants to hear the fat, complacent little orators, tell the same old chestnuts, or the same old dishes rattle?

Once in a year there is a speech over the radio that is worth hearing. Lately the stations have developed another complex, viz., that of stopping a first class musical concert in the middle to let Mr. Bla-bla-bla finish the series of talks he is giving on "The Way to Wheedle Dandruff Out of a Clam" or something equally as heavy. That is irritating and ruinous to the concert. The fan curses, changes stations and never hears the rest of the program. Ask 'em. They all tell you the same thing.


Maybe there is money in these speeches. All right—we admit the right of the station to compensation. But if the announcer or the operator would only do us a favor and just throw the switch so these talky boys do not come out on the air. Not only do we not want to hear them, but when they have from 1,000 to 5,000 watts of power behind their voices, they keep a lot of us from hearing anything else. And this is rotten selfish.

We do not include in this category the educational talks which are for a purpose. We refer to—well, you know just what we refer to. If we dared mention names you'd agree. As it is, you can figure it out. The next time you hear one on the air, you'll say, "There's one of those radio pests the Loud Speaker was kicking about!" And you'll be dead right.

If you have a friend and he intends to make a speech over the radio, lead him aside and show him this and tell him to think it over. Maybe it will help the cause along. Maybe he thinks we want to hear him. Well—we don't! And we don't mean maybe.
