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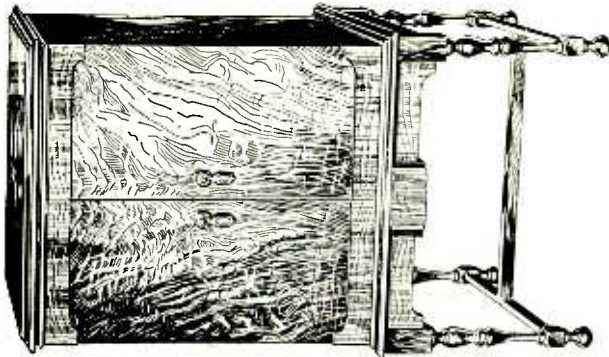

## THE EDITOR'S PAGE

LEOPOLD STOKOWSKI and the Philadelphia Storage Battery Company deserve high honor for their courageous announcement of October 6, at the conclusion of the first Philco symphony concert hour, one of the outstanding musical radio events of the year. Said Stokowski:

"Write us frankly if you like these concerts. If you do not, we will discontinue them. We shall play no popular music. The highest and best or nothing at all! We would like to hear from you."

In these days of moronic jazz, of the professional prostitution of classic themes, and wholesale theft and butchery of harmonic motifs, it is indeed good to see one conductor and one sponsor brave and determined enough to stand firmly on the side of fine music and to declare that they will present that or nothing. It leads to the inevitable conclusion that ideals may, even today, form a part in the production of products when a concern is not afraid to dare to sponsor this attitude, and a conductor to announce it.

QUESTIONS of vital importance are being threshed out at The Hague, where an international technical committee on radio communication is in session. In general, Europe is attacking the great number of wavelengths held by the United States and is engaged in an endeavor to allocate a number of these to continental powers.

At the present time some 3000 stations are seeking the use of wave bands in channels where only 800 wavelengths are available. Of this number the United States controls

about 60 per cent, the remaining 40 per cent being held by Great Britain, Germany, France, Italy and the other powers. France and Italy have comparatively few, Great Britain and Germany holding the bulk of this allotment.

The real battle is in the short wave field. Short wave work was developed in the United States by amateurs, and accepted by commercial companies and the government as far superior to the longer wave lengths. Great Britain awakened to the importance of this and is now seeking supremacy in the short wave field. Europe desires to chase the amateurs out of the short wave field by restricting them to only a few waves. The United States cannot see this because of the great amount of development work which amateurs have done in this field, and are still doing.

It is doubtful if anything will come of The Hague conference because the committee has only advisory powers but the battle which is taking place in The Hague forum shows, in reflex something of the mad scramble which is taking place in radio affairs all over the world as higher powered stations stretch beyond their own territory into other lands and become a problem to foreign nations. If some invention could be devised by which radio waves could be induced to die out or stay home or within the confines of their own country, the whole structure of foreign radio argument would collapse. Unless some such development does take place, the radio overlap will shortly prove an international problem greater in importance than perhaps any other.

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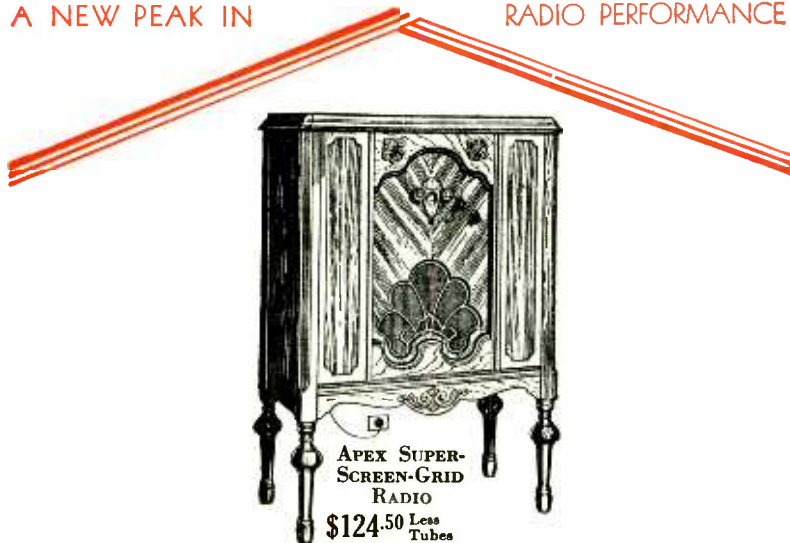

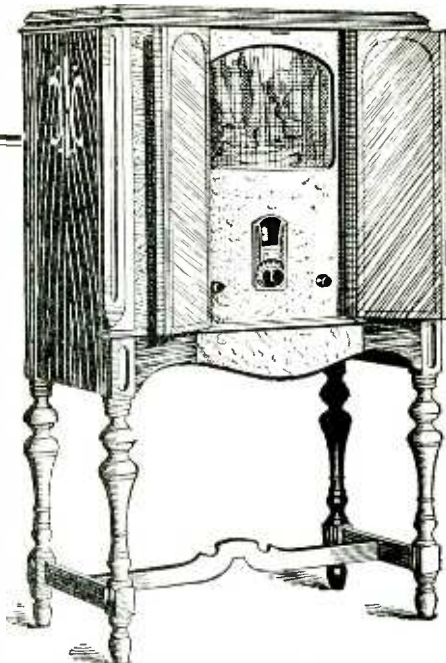

# The STATUS of TELEVISION

**A**NXIOUS to know precisely what was the exact status of television, as to its utility, availability for public consumption, and general value, a special committee of the Radio Manufacturers' Association of New York was appointed recently to make a survey of the entire field and its developments. The committee compiled much interesting data, which is contained in an official report filed by D. E. Replogle, chairman, the highlights of which are given herewith.

First and foremost, the committee found that:

1. None of the stations broadcasting television have put on the air signals or broadcasts intended to have an entertainment value.

2. The radio commission has been flooded with requests for television permits. A great number of these have been granted and many stations are on the air with regular schedules and others, principally on the Pacific Coast, with irregular schedules.

3. All transmitting, to date, is purely experimental to solve the difficulties of transmission and reception, the determination of the best working zones, the degree of interference with other forms of broadcasts, and the distances to which such signals can be successfully transmitted.

4. The transmission of pictures in natural colors by the Bell laboratories in New York City, was accomplished at enormous cost, which placed it beyond public availability.

5. There are a few systems which are able to transmit pictures with fair success, none with complete success and many of no value whatsoever.

6. Talking picture films will probably be the first subject matter medium used, because of the fact that both vision and sound can be picked up from the films, and with greater facility and practicability than by direct pickups.

7. That transmission of this nature would require sight and sound channels, completely separated on the air, which is already over-congested with demands.

8. That special and costly transmitting and receiving apparatus is necessary to broadcast television with any degree of satisfaction, the amplifiers alone being forced to work with a range from 20 to 50,000 cycles per second for sight transmission, eliminating completely present broadcast receivers which operate with a frequency range of from 50 to 5000 cycles.

The general conclusion which the committee drew from all its available data and which seems to be the one with which the public is most directly concerned is that the present broadcast receiver cannot be either used or adapted to television reception. This leads to the conclusion, and this is well known to engineers, that radio receivers which are being sold with a "television attachment" are worse than useless.

In addition, it will be almost certainly necessary that any television receiver sold to the public will not be of the battery type, but will have to be operated from the house lighting circuits, if for no other reason than to insure synchronism, or the keeping in step of receiver and transmitter, which is absolutely essential for any picture reception. And even this form of synchronism is unsatisfactory for, as every user of current knows, the lights fluctuate from time to time and this is fatal in television reception.

The committee's report concludes:

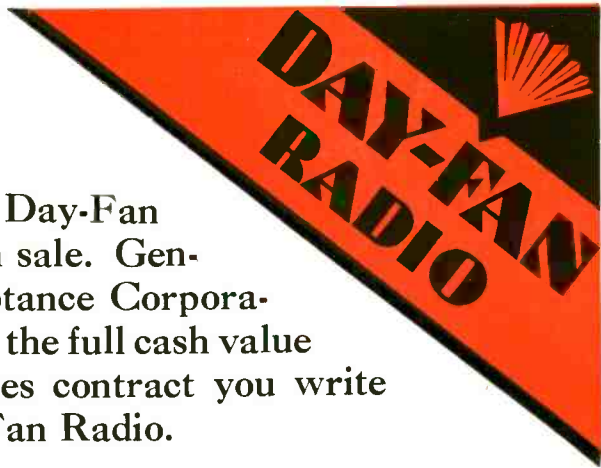
"As in all new arts, problems are constantly arising, but in few arts has there been such a wealth of experience and material with which to work as there is at the present time in the art of television. It is, therefore, not unreasonable to suppose that while the advent of interesting commercial television is not yet here, it may be close upon us and that we can look forward to the future with confidence that radio will be no longer blind."

A review of the New Zealand radio market reveals that the American electrically operated radio receiver is rapidly displacing the battery-powered instrument, according to a report made public by the Department of Commerce.

It is barely six months since the first electric radio was introduced to New Zealand, but even in so short a time it has succeeded in making heavy inroads on sales of battery types, and for the time being the local market is in a decidedly unsettled state. It is reported that battery sets, of which large stocks are still held, are being marketed at practically cost price by local wholesalers and retail establishments, and in some cases prices have been cut to below cost figures.

The number of licensed wireless receiving sets in the Dominion as of December 31, 1928, amounted to 42,801, an increase of 4616 over 1927, according to the government returns.





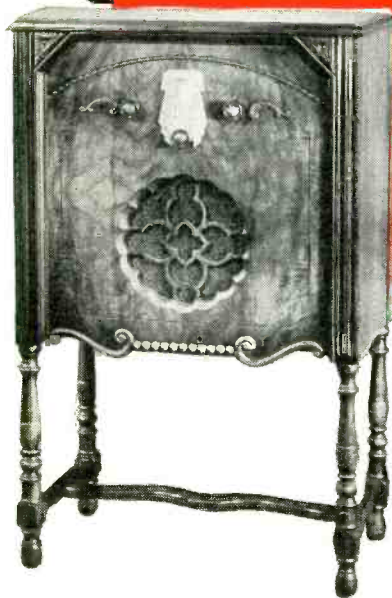
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# MYSTERIES OF RADIO

YOU can't see it, but it's there! Sixty to two hundred miles overhead, depending on where you are, the Heaviside layer, like a spherical shell, completely surrounds the earth. It is named after the British scientist who first predicted its existence.

It is a well-known fact that the conductivity of air varies with the pressure. At sea level, or, more correctly, at a pressure of fifteen pounds to the square inch, dry air is a good insulator. As the pressure is lowered, either artificially in the laboratory or by greater altitude in the atmosphere, a point is reached at which air becomes a good conductor of electricity. At this pressure air is just as good a conductor as metal, so that for electrical purposes we may look upon the earth as being completely encased in what could just as well be a metallic shell. This shell tends to keep radio signals confined within it and also to ward off any signals that might be approaching the earth from the outside—if there are any out there. The pressure that makes air into an electrical conductor is rather critical, and either an increase or decrease in pressure will again restore its insulating qualities. Thus, outside of the conducting shell, or Heaviside layer, the air is again an insulator.

An electrical condenser of gigantic proportions is formed by the Heaviside layer and the earth. For those who like figures, it is about 3000 farads. This vast condenser is coupled electrically to every radio condenser and antenna system on the earth's surface, and serves to join them all together, making it possible for one antenna to radiate energy into another located at any point on the earth's surface. If it were not for the Heaviside layer it is more than likely that we would not be able to use radio over distances of more than fifty miles.

There are many things going on in the Heaviside layer about which we have very little knowledge. Prof. Goddard's rocket, when perfected, may increase our knowledge of the upper atmosphere, and in the meantime it forms an interesting subject for speculation. There are undoubtedly electric currents of tremendous magnitude flowing up above our heads, and it is possible that these may be responsible for the earth's magnetism. The sun and earth are both electrically charged and to different potentials. Without knowing which is positive and which negative, we do know that the sun, if positive, will pull the Heaviside layer electrons to the side upon which it is shining; and if negative

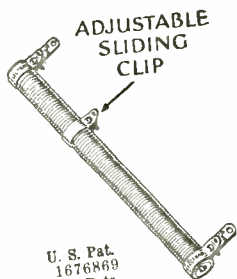
will repel them to the opposite side. In any event the effect will be the same—to hold them in a fixed position against the earth's rotation, resulting in a flow of electrons from east to west through our atmosphere. At the earth's surface the magnetic field of this Heaviside layer current is in the same direction as the field which we refer to as the earth's magnetism and which operates our compasses. Possibly all this is coincidence, but more than likely there is a connection.

Radio waves, heat waves and light waves are all undulations of the same medium, called the ether, the only difference between the three being in wavelength. Some substances are "transparent" to some waves and "opaque" to others, some allow all to pass, while still other materials obstruct them all. Glass, for example, will pass light and electro-magnetic (radio) waves, but will obstruct heat. Porcelain and wood pass radio waves, but obstruct light and heat, while metals, at ordinary temperatures, obstruct all three. The Heaviside layer, as we can see, is almost perfectly transparent to light, and it also passes heat, but obstructs the waves at the electrical end of the spectrum. Just at what wavelength the transparency ceases and the opacity starts is not definitely known. At the wavelengths used for radio broadcasting, the Heaviside layer is extremely opaque, so that it would form a very definite obstacle to waves which might be arriving from outside the planet. Thus "signals from Mars," which are from time to time reported as being heard, would be pretty well excluded at these wavelengths.

Recent investigations indicate that at the shorter waves it may be a different story. Experiments with radio echoes have shown that at certain wavelengths and under special conditions a radio echo will be received from three to twenty-five seconds after the instant of transmission. Radio waves travel at a speed of about 186,000 miles per second, so a question immediately arises as to the whereabouts of the wave during the interval. Some investigators think the waves might go right through the Heaviside layer and be reflected back by the moon or by some distant planet. However, a check-up usually fails to show any known heavenly body at the distance which the time interval would require. Barring the possibility of there being reflecting media in empty space it would appear as if these particular waves penetrate part way into the Heaviside layer only to be turned back.

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# A PAGE FROM THE NBC WOMAN'S MAGAZINE OF THE AIR

AN INNOVATION in aerial entertainment is the "Woman's Magazine of the Air," an NBC broadcast heard every week-day excepting Saturday, between 10:30 and 11:30 o'clock.

With its estimated audience of more than 3,000,000, this unusual program is well worth seeing in production.

The brain-child of an NBC commercial manager, the "Woman's Magazine of the Air" grew in less than two years from a single morning program to five—one-hour broadcast of 15 features. Bennie Walker "edits" them, announces, and comes again before the microphone to sing and to read poetry.

An hour filled with sparkling humor, the serious business of housekeeping, instrumental music and solos, the "Woman's Magazine of the Air" is interesting to watch.

"Outside looking in?"

No, settled against the heavily draped wall, near the console of the big pipe organ, feeling the warmth of the busy studio and the spirit of good-fellowship that goes out through the air from the half dozen domestic science experts and artists who are entertaining.

Everything in readiness, the green light flashes on the brown carbon mike and Spokane, Seattle, Portland, San Francisco, Oakland, Los Angeles and the miles of surrounding territory hear "Good News" played by Joseph Hornik's band.

Where everything apparently was confusion, quiet reigns and the program progresses with clock-like precision.

Came the familiar comments from Bennie . . . "keep that old smile smiling" . . . and the others by which he voices greetings and sends happiness into a lot of homes.

My visit was Monday and Marjorie Gray followed Ben to the microphone, going to talk for the Brazilian-American Coffee Committee. John Barry and an organ recital followed.

"That's the Monday routine," Bennie explained. "You've heard Peggy Chapman singing today, but October 21 you'll hear Eileen Piggott, soprano, and William Powers, the colored tenor."

All the magazine family had escaped, manuscripts in hand, while Bennie reviewed the magazine for me. Even the artists were gone.

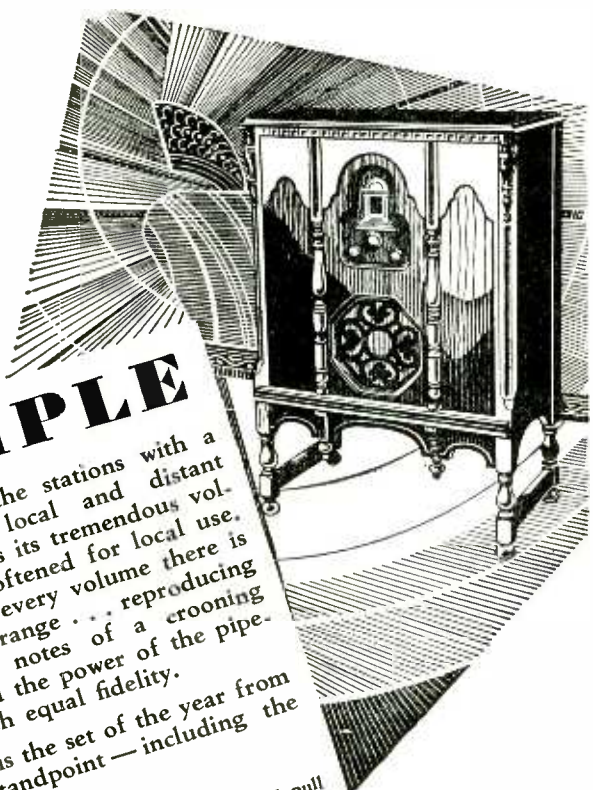

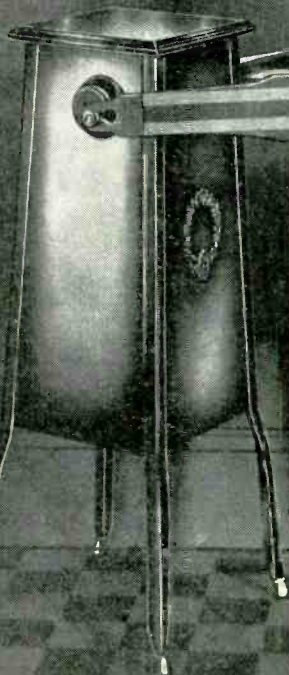

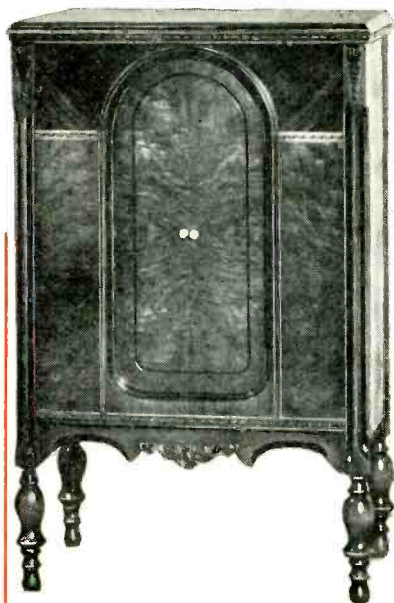
