





## The Editor's Page

**M**ADAME SCHUMANN-HEINK expressed the wish, recently, that more people on the radio and opera stage would really learn how to sing. "It takes three years," she said, "with a good teacher before a student really learns how to sing." And then she added: "One has to be a better singer for the radio than for the stage." This is undoubtedly true, and explains why a number of our famous stars come over so poorly when heard via the radio. They are not really fine singers, but only seem so behind the footlights when aided by personality and an orchestra. Radio, which magnifies defects, is calling for better material than the opera has ever demanded.

**R**ADIO is gripping the public more and more. A Washington, D. C., fan speeded forty miles an hour into the arms of a traffic cop. "I've only got five minutes to make Amos and Andy," he told the officer. "Please don't stop me. I haven't missed 'em in months." The cop grinned. "There's a fine radio set in the jail," he said, and took him in. While the fan posted bail he heard his favorite program. All of which goes to show that when a radio program makes a hit it makes a real one.

**V**ARIOUS efforts are constantly being made by states and cities to control radio, despite the fact that Uncle Sam has complete jurisdiction over it. One state attempted legislation to prevent broadcasting racing returns. Another state is trying to pass a bill prohibiting radio stations, save those of public convenience and necessity. Special taxes of various kinds are under con-

sideration everywhere. It seems to be a hard matter to get over to legislators what they can and cannot do. The minute a new device appears, a thousand fingers itch to control it. The great art of minding one's own business is still unknown even to lawmakers.

**R**OADHOUSES, cafes, small restaurants and barbecue joints put in a radio these days and have all manner of music laid at their doors. The old-time hired orchestra which used to liven the evening is gone. The place saves money, does without musicians and chooses its entertainment from a dozen stations. Along the highways, these days, any place with a room bigger than a telephone booth has a sign "Dancing." This means they have a radio set—and can make a living. Radio, indirectly, has brought an income to hundreds of these roadside entertainment resorts.

**T**HE new police bulletin service which announces to police cars, fire boxes and hold-ups, via KJBS, is a valuable and worthy service. But it is also a reflection on a municipality that is so slow in appreciating the value of radio that it has to use broadcast channels for its business. Detroit, Chicago, Berkeley and a number of other cities have been willing to erect their own stations and operate on proper police wave lengths with great success. San Francisco is using a makeshift. The police have eight bands of their own and ought to be working there. Someone ought to wake up the supervisors to the need for proper cooperation in this direction.

# The RADIO TATTLER

If any daylight is saved it won't do her any good because she never sees the sun anyhow. And the old man, instead of coming home when he gets through work, as he does now, will have an hour of daylight in the evening and he'll bum all over town and get swacked with the boys. Yep—it's the women that get stung!

If they inaugurate daylight saving out here, it is going to back a lot of the radio programs into the dinner hour. Some of our favorite entertainers will be drowned out by

the soup eaters splashing in their gruel. Program directors will grow bench-legged trying to fit sponsors into the new hand-me-down and keep out the financial wrinkles, while the little kiddies will get their bedtime stories at four in the afternoon.

Bennie Walker, Editor of the Woman's Magazine of the Air, adds another 235 to the announcing staff which, collectively, tips the scales at more than 1300 pounds. William Andrews, Jack Keough, George Nelson, Arthur Lindsay and Byron Mills are the others of the group.

Versatility is the watchword at KJBS. Besides being announcers, all staff men have radio operators' licenses and are frequently called into portray bits in plays. For instance, there's Charlie Parker, genial announcer of the KJBS Alarm Klok Klub, who, in addition to his other duties, finds time to write the "Tales of the Sea" programs which have elicited so much comment. Jack Gray, who plays in the "Buddy" skits, also manages to find time to do the "Al" part in "Tales of the Sea." Ted Berlin, in addition to portraying "Jimmy," the old salt in "Tales of the Sea," also does the "Buddy" skit in the title role, and finds time to act as publicity director for the station. Each man writes station continuity and assumes responsibility for the proper functioning of certain sections of the operating equipment.

Plant department engineers at the NBC San Francisco studios can be classed as of the old school. Everyone served his apprenticeship at sea and boasts a government operator's license. Among ten in the department, one finds an average of five and a half years' service or 55 years of sea wanderings. Collectively, the men have visited every civilized port in the world and many not so civilized.

Walter Bunker, Jr., KFRC announcer, keeps in trim for his announcing duties playing tennis and boxing. Walter realizes that it is necessary to be in good physical condition in order to be in good mental condition for cheerful, pleasant and accurate announcing.

A choir of 50 children have been specially trained, recruits being chosen from among the best of the 50-odd boys and girls who appear weekly at KNX under Brother Ken's auspices. A further novelty is the use of the choir as a background for the station's violin choir of childish players, all between 2½ and 5 years of age.

Despite the accusation so often hurled in the direction of radio comedians that they get their jokes out of joke books (and old ones at that) it is seldom so easy. The radio "funny man" has to have a new act every day, and he usually finds it easier to devise his own gags. Pedro, of KFRC, boasts that he doesn't possess a single joke book. "Simpv Fitts" would be highly insulted, and probably incapable of saying anything funny for a week, if anyone so much as hinted that he stole his gags. The best ones come out of perspiration and a type-writer ribbon, say these birds.







# Radio to Play Part in Fire Patrol

THE summer fire menace is almost here. Year after year timber valued at millions of dollars is burned, either mysteriously or carelessly. Sometimes it is a camper who forgets his fire. Sometimes it is a "wobbly" with a sinister streak. Sometimes it is a firefighter who wants to be hired for the money in it. Whatever the cause—the fire season costs millions to state and government.

Every protective agency in the country is being mobilized this year to combat the myriad fires that spring up in forest and timber land. Radio is expected to play no inconsiderable part in the protective network, both in the broadcasting of warnings and in the transmission of messages and assistance information to and from fire areas.

Not only are patrol planes to operate radio equipment from observation cruises over timber areas, reporting to ground stations at distant points, but amateur radio has offered to cooperate by linking its own efficient network to the government's forestry service on a basis that will facilitate the location and reporting of important fires.

Lightning is the only weather element that can start forest fires. In the East this is an uncommon situation, but in the West scores of fires may be started by thunderstorms which are accompanied by little or no rain. A single thunderstorm has been known to start more than a hundred fires. One storm last year in Idaho started seventy fires in twenty minutes.

Such fires usually occur in remote locations, far from ranger stations and ranches. A thin wisp of smoke by day, a pall of crimson by night—this is the first indication that a forest has become an inferno. If there is wind, the danger becomes quadrupled, and if the wind is dry and strong, a whole mountain may burst flame over night, especially if the trees on it are rich in resinous products.

Special studies have been made of the humidity of air currents and their effect on forest fires has been found to be astonishing. If a wind is dry, it will absorb moisture from the ground and leave that particularly readily susceptible to fires. Therefore the motion of dry air becomes of importance in fire patrol work. Radio notes and records the move-

ments of large bodies of dry air, thereby aiding in the patrol work.

In the tall timber of Washington, Oregon and California, there are certain dry winds known as "fire winds." When these winds are preceded by a dry period forests become highly inflammable. Such were the conditions of 1920 and 1921 when vast areas were laid waste by the fire demon. In 1913 the government started broadcasts of the "fire-winds" enabling precautionary measures to be taken.

Planes on patrol work are now equipped with sling "psychrometers," double thermometers, one of which is "wet," which are used to measure humidity conditions. A plane may find one reading at what is known as "forest level" and a thousand feet higher, run into a "fire-wind" as indicated by the spinning "psychrometers." This discovery reveals the presence of danger—unknown to ground observers, liable at any moment to drop to lower levels bringing fire menace with it. Thus do the planes work hand in hand with ground patrols to safeguard the valuable timber.

In California is a fire weather truck, equipped with fire-fighting and observation apparatus as well as radio, which is sent from point to point. There are numbers of these, able to receive weather reports by radio, or transmit fire information to distant points. Maps are plotted, fire progress traced, and general conditions tabulated. If assistance is needed, a touch of the operator's finger on the key, and the fire truck is instantly in touch with headquarters and proper arrangements made. In this work radio is without a peer.

The Government and the general public have no protection against the human rat who touches off a national forest to watch it burn, or the brainless camper who drives off, leaving behind him glowing embers of a camp fire, save stiff legal penalties for those that are caught. But against lightning, dry winds, broken power wires and other causes of forest fires, a well organized system has been developed. Radio is the invisible voice that whispers the messages of safety and warning that some day will save state and nation millions of dollars.

# Uncle Sam May Claim Radio Patents

**P**OSSIBILITY that the United States government may take over valuable radio patents, covering the operation of receiving sets by house lighting current, developed this week when preliminary steps toward litigation which would establish this claim were taken by the Department of Justice.

The claims involve a device perfected by Percival D. Lowell and Francis W. Dunmore, former employees of the Bureau of Standards, who at the time were research workers on radio for the United States government. The validity of the patents was recently sustained by the Federal court in Delaware in actions brought by the two inventors against companies using them.

The Government, in its claims for the patents, contends that the inventions were made while the inventors were employees of the Government and that by Federal regulation, all such developments are the property of the United States government. If the claims are sustained in the higher courts, the Government will fall heir to the most important development in the radio field in the past ten years.

The harnessing of house current for radio purposes, in other words, the development of the a. c. set, is recognized as the outstanding achievement of the field in recent years. The patents are regarded by the Department of Justice as of great value as at least 60 per cent of the modern receiving sets are so operated.

In their defense against the government claims, the defendant companies claim that the inventors should have dedicated their invention, for some unknown philanthropy, to the public use because they were government employees. This was answered by the Federal court with the declaration that if Federal employees make inventions but do not dedicate them to public use, such inventions become the property of the inventors.

The inventors in question did not dedicate their inventions to the public, the inventions having been, apparently, grabbed by certain corporations who saw immense profit possibilities in them. If the Government wins its suit, a financial accounting running into millions will have to be made by the corporations.

The litigation is a side light on the way in which a number of valuable patent holdings have been jockeyed into a semblance of legal stability with nothing more than squatters' rights behind them. The Government, it is understood, intends other actions based on similar charges, where other inventions have been grabbed and used without permission of Uncle Sam or his employees.

## A New Self-Contained Ohmmeter

A self-contained ohmmeter in a case of molded bakelite has been announced by the Jewell Electrical Instrument Company, 1650 Walnut Street, Chicago, Illinois.

The Pattern 89 Ohmmeter, as it is called, has a 1½-volt flashlight cell inside the case,



and is therefore independent of external voltage supply.

A convenient adjustment to correct for variation in the cell voltage is provided by a magnetic shunt. In operation the instrument can be adjusted to the cell each time a series of tests is made, and the result is a very high degree of accuracy.

The Pattern 89 Ohmmeter combines the convenience of a self-contained resistance meter with the stability of a bakelite case and a high degree of accuracy, at a popular price.

# The Parks Sisters, NBC

IF THIS little interview with the Parks Sisters fails to be adequate it's our fault. A man who can't face a battery of flashing black eyes and scintillating white teeth, such as these girls command, and come out of it with enough inspiration for a good story just isn't a fit candidate for any office. It doesn't require any talent—just some youthful romanticism, a very average amount of susceptibility, and a little knowledge of the typewriter.

Separate the Parks Sisters and you have June Parks and Frances Parks. Not that you would want to separate them. Their personalities harmonize somewhat after the fashion of their voices. Both their lives and their dreams are entwined. (We've been trying to avoid using the word inseparable ever since this paragraph began, but there seems no other way out. Yes, the girls are inseparable.) It is only when they are stymied on the arrangement of a new song that their ambitions leave them temporarily and the idea of marriage and separate homes is entertained. June, who is about two years the younger, told us this early in the interview. She added that they had an imposing list of eligibles, cross indexed according to height, weight, complexion, disposition, mentality and previous condition of servitude. This wise-crack furnished us with the theory that she was the humorous one of the pair, a theory we tried vainly to substantiate during the remainder of our talk, because Frances laughs a lot, too. However, June has more of a humorous twist to her mind and more mischief in her eyes. At bottom, though, they are just a couple of kids who are getting a big drive out of life, both from their work and their play—the show business hasn't succeeded in veneering their youthful interest and spontaneity. They nurse their ambitions with an astonishing friendliness towards work, rehearsing new songs three or four hours a day. And when it comes to play, they are keen about most

everything except card playing and strenuous exercise. (Dancing does not come under the heading of strenuous exercise.) They attribute their prejudice toward physical exertion to the fact that they were born in the South, June in Alabama and Frances in Georgia. They

still retain a trace of the Southern accent, Frances especially, although they came West to Los Angeles when June was five and Frances seven. The accent is not affected, either. They are the last sisters in the world from whom you would expect affectation. They love books and the theatre and their tastes in these things are above the average. They prefer good drama on the legitimate stage to the talkies and only recently enjoyed the Colbourne-Jones London Company's presentation of Shaws' Arms and the Man. Lardner's devastatingly humorous attack upon Tin Pan Alley, June Moon, they both enjoyed, too, June more than Frances. Frances says that this was because June is younger, but we used the fact to fortify our little theory that June has a larger list towards humor.

When it comes to books, they read biography and novels, principally. Being a pair of ambitious young ladies they recently attacked and completely routed Ludvig's biography of Napoleon. Erskine is a favorite of theirs.

Cooking is one of their hobbies. Never having had to cope with it seriously, three times dai'y, they approach it in the spirit of a frolic. Just now cake baking tops the list of their culinary enthusiasms. June bakes the cake, and Frances frosts it. Music is neglected on cake baking days because it takes almost the entire day to do the job up right. They haven't yet attempted to prepare a complete meal, because, you see, their mother lives with them in their Geary Street apartment, and assumes all responsibilities of that nature.

They have their own car and do considerable driving, just for the fun of it, and

## Damrosch Compiles Key Manual for Fans

THE "musical appreciation course" of Walter Damrosch, which is today, perhaps, the greatest feature of the National Broadcasting Company, reaching as it does, an estimated 5,000,000 children, is to be augmented by a musical manual of inestimable value, compiled by the great composer, and available to music lovers from coast to coast.

Damrosch has signed an agreement with the NBC to continue his activities for another two years. His programs, begun as an experiment, are to be systemized and placed on a definitely constructive basis, directed by the musical genius of the man who, overnight, has become beloved to the children of America. With some 20,000 letters from children in his mail, Walter Damrosch has become the outstanding musical figure of the air lanes.

The manual, which it was decided to compile, as an aid to those who like to hear and profit by the Damrosch concerts, will contain information about every selection to be played, a bibliography of references on every phase of music, lists of compositions available as record music, lists of music available for school orchestras, and lists designed to help young students seeking a musical career.

The work is being prepared by the Bureau of Radio Research of the Teachers' College of Columbia University, and under the personal supervision of Damrosch. More than 40,000 teachers' manuals were sent out last year and another 30,000 to persons other than teachers. Letters from every state in the Union, Hawaii and Canada came in requesting copies, and it was decided to issue a comprehensive work to meet all demands.

Actual count shows that 4000 teachers, 600 school superintendents, 500 music teachers and 3000 private individuals had received the first issues and acknowledged them, inspiring the makers to a greater effort for the forthcoming season. The widespread equipping of school houses with radio receivers has made the Damrosch programs available to literal millions and the manuals which explain and connote the concerts are of immense value to these listeners.

Damrosch himself is highly enthusiastic over the nationwide reception of the musical appreciation programs.

WHEN Bennie Walker steps up to the microphone in one of NBC's San Francisco studios on the morning of June 16 to greet the "Woman's Magazine of the Air" audience, he'll introduce an old friend who is to have an important part in the daily WMA programs hereafter—Edward J. Fitzpatrick, violinist and new conductor of the Magazine Melodists.

Fitzpatrick really needs no introduction to radio listeners, for he is known to thousands who follow the broadcasts of his afternoon concerts with the Hotel St. Francis Salon Orchestra in San Francisco and who have heard him on other programs. As leader of the Magazine Melodists he returns this week to the air as one of the WMA personalities after a long absence. The group of musicians playing under his baton will be new, and Bennie Walker promises that many musical delights are in store for the WMA audience. One of these will be the violin solos which Fitzpatrick will contribute frequently. The Magazine Melodists will not confine themselves to any one type of music, but will mix semi-classic compositions with tuneful salon pieces, popular numbers and other favored selections.

Well, at last the secret's out! After exciting the curiosity of her listeners for some time with tantalizing hints of a coming surprise, Helen Webster revealed it in her Easier Housekeeping talk last Wednesday. A photograph of Clayton Murdock Burns—the adorable red-headed baby on whom much attention has been centered since his birth several months ago—is available to at least 1500 persons. All that is necessary to secure his picture is to write to Miss Webster and tell her that you want it. You'll love those big, round eyes of his, that winsome smile, and everything else about him.

A most intriguing title designated one of the prize recipes Ann Holden read during a recent California Home Catsup period. "A Bite a Night" is what its creator, Mrs. E. K. Schauss of Sacramento, Calif., called it. Here are the directions:

Cream one square of pimiento cheese. Add gradually one-half cup of California Catsup and one teaspoon California Home Worcestershire Sauce. Put one tablespoon of this mixture into a canned pimiento, lay on but-

tered toast and put into a moderate oven for about five minutes, long enough to heat through.

Miss Holden declared that the recipe had a most piquant appeal. She suggested that it be used in a full meal, as the main dish, with perhaps one hot vegetable and a vegetable or fruit salad, although it is intended especially for a "snack" after a bridge party. This recipe and several other prize ones are to be available in book form soon.

If you follow the "Women's Magazine of the Air" broadcasts regularly, you no doubt have heard Miss Holden talk about that much-discussed "Slenderizing Dressing." That's the name that has been given to the Gold Medal Salad Dressing because it contains so little oil. One can serve it on salads without any fear that it will cause an increase in weight. And what a treasure chest of helpful suggestions that Best Foods Round Table that Miss Holden conducts is to the busy home-maker! Just last week she had a number of hints that can bear repeating.

In speaking of appetizing tid-bits to serve with salads, Miss Holden suggested an easily prepared cheese dainty. It is made by spreading a flavorsome cheese on thin slices of fresh bread, covering with melted Nucoa, and rolling up the slices. These are browned in a hot oven and then served very hot with an ice cold salad.

Another suggestion: Remove the pits from about a dozen cooked prunes and fill the prunes with two tablespoons parsley and two tablespoons onion chopped together. Wrap these in bacon strips—small ones—held in place with toothpicks, and bake in a hot oven until the bacon crisps.

If you are one of the many who are bottling fruit juices and root beer this summer, you'll probably be interested in what Helen Webster said in a recent Clorox period. To clean old bottles and glass fruit jars that have been kept since last year, Miss Webster suggested that you make a strong solution of soap suds and Clorox and put it in the first jar or bottle for a few minutes. Then, while that bottle is being rinsed, the strong Clorox solution can be doing its work on the second bottle and so on, until every container is pure and clear. The Clorox acts as a germicide even while it cleans.






# Television Scares Film Industry

LIFE in the motion picture industry these days is as hectic as that of a South American president, with "revolutions" coming one after another.

Barely recovered from the chaos into which it was plunged by the advent of talking pictures, the industry was faced with the perfection of color, and no sooner had absorbed that than wide film made its appearance, and now, as the theaters of the country prepare to install the larger screens required for the wide film, television looms up, not as "around the corner," where it has spent the past year or two, but almost "here."

When Dr. E. F. W. Alexanderson at Schenectady sent the pictures and music of an orchestra to a theatre a mile away, he deprived more than one film company executive of his night's sleep.

The audience in the theater saw the face and heard the voice of an orchestra leader directing his men, but motion picture officials saw more than the six-foot square screen on which the pictures appeared. They saw a new day dawning in which things theatrical will be different. It is how and where they will be different that is worrying them.

No sooner had Dr. Alexanderson's demonstration been concluded than the motion picture industry was discussing the possibility of a chain of television theaters in the near future.

Unless the "near future" covers a period of many months this is not likely, since the the mechanics involved are still very intricate, but the threat is there.

However, the electrical companies which are developing television are heavily interested in the motion picture business, and the rest of the industry is hopeful that they will not throw on the market any development which might seriously upset the equilibrium of the trade.

Nevertheless, it is a pretty safe bet that as soon as television is carried to a point where it is merchantable, Radio-Keith-Orpheum will shoot it into its own houses, for the box office value of the novelty if nothing else. Like talking pictures, the first television installations will probably develop defects, so that the theater installations also would have a laboratory value which would be very helpful to final perfection.

Pessimistic motion picture men look forward to a day of worse competition than ever has been experienced, with every theater a "first run" house and a tremendous fight between producers. There is much doleful shaking of heads and dire predictions of the "one big trust" comprehending all amusements.

with no particular objective. Speaking of traveling, the girls go in for that in a big way, especially in their dreams. Their specialty is deep sea travel. A joint account at the bank is designed to eventually grow into the magic bank-roll that will carry them around the world. They have already had a taste of foreign travel on their Hawaiian and European trips. Ocean voyages are just their dish. They feel so good when at sea, says June, that they can even play a little bridge, and like it.

The girls broke into radio while still attending private high school in Los Angeles six years ago, when they were 12 and 14 years respectively. KFI was the station. There followed a long interlude on the stage before they returned to radio. They played in Paramount-Publix theatres in Los Angeles and San Francisco, in Honolulu, in England, Germany, Austria and France, lending their act to both revues and vaudeville. After their European trip a year and a half ago they played over the Eastern vaudeville circuits and then did some broadcasting over NBC from WEAJ in New York. Following that they joined Oleson and Johnson's Orpheum act for 42 weeks and when they landed in San Francisco, three months ago, at the end of their engagement, joined the San Francisco staff of NBC.

Their vaudeville act, just like their act on the air, is based chiefly upon their unusually good harmony, with its trick arrangements of both comedy and sentimental songs. On the stage, however, they do soft shoe, novelty and tap dancing. Patter is neglected. They aren't very talkative, Frances explains. Both on stage and air they are usually armed with ukeleles.


