INTERFERENCE A PROBLEM

INTERFERENCE elimination in the broadcast band is a problem of engineering, involving more than the mere arrangement of stations so that no two on the same or adjacent frequencies shall be so geographically situated as to interfere with each other.

The detection of interference is one of the manifold and varied duties of the radio division of the Department of Commerce, upon which is imposed the task of not only keeping the broadcasting channels clear, but also those used by the many other services in the fields of aviation, shipping, commercial telephony, telegraphy, etc.

In the broadcast band, the radio division is faced with two problems requiring the exercise of considerable engineering skill on the part of its inspection personnel, outlined in a recent discussion of radio activities in connection with regulation.

First, if any station deviates from its assigned frequency or strays from its assigned channel beyond the tolerance set down by the licensing authority, interference is set up in the form of cross talk or heterodyning. To ascertain at frequent intervals that these stations and some twenty thousand other stations operating on frequencies above and below the broadcast band maintain their assigned frequencies within the limits prescribed by the licensing authority involves the making of thousands of scientific meas-

urements of the carrier frequencies of radio stations per month.

Second, if a station assigned to operate simultaneously on the same channel with one or more other stations increases its power beyond that authorized by the licensing authority, undue interference is created with these other stations within their normal service area. To avoid such conditions and to eliminate them when they are found to exist requires frequent inspection of the radio transmitting apparatus of the stations and measurement of the power of stations at distant points through the use of field intensity measuring equipment.

In the United States alone there are, in addition to 613 radio broadcasting stations, more than 25,000 other stations, including point-to-point, maritime, aviation, amateur, police, fire, power company emergency, visual broadcasting, relay broadcasting, experimental and geophysical radio stations, exclusive of the large number of radio stations operated by the various branches of the Federal Government. The operations of this large number of radio stations in the United States and thousands of other stations throughout the world, together with the engineering and natural limitations of the ether, present a problem in this field of communication without a parallel and has made necessary the development of a new technique to cope with the situation.






Above: New MAJESTIC Combination Radio and Phonograph with twin speakers. Value \$304.







MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Through the BROADCAST WEEKLY the sightless men and women of the San Francisco Association for the Blind desire to make public acknowledgement of their debt of gratitude to the radio stations of the bay district.

To the courtesy of these stations in granting time, allowing the announcers to send out daily items, and in general coöperating in every way is due a great measure of the success of the 1931 Blindcraft Week.

• • • KTM doesn't believe that "public interest, convenience and necessity" are at all served when seven stations broadcast a Saturday football game and two or three additional do the re-broadcasting. Two or three would be plenty, thinks C. B. Juneau, production manager of KTM, and that station continues its usual Saturday schedule, in the belief that maybe, after all, there must be a few people who do not want the radio football diet.

• • • Despite the fact that it is nearly two weeks since Rajput left KNX for Chicago, where he is delighting eastern audiences with his thrilling adventures in the Hindu secret service over WBBM, his mail continues to pour into this station.

On the day he left for the East, he received 811 letters from enthusiastic fans. Now, although he has gone, and will not return to KNX for thirteen weeks, he is still averaging 100 letters a day! Absence does make the heart grow fonder . . . for Rajput!

• • • Hugh Pendergraft, banjoist and guitarist of KFI-KECA, became a navigator twice over the first of this month when his 28-foot cabin cruiser the Lorraine was launched at the Wilmington Boat Works. Pendergraft also operates a little four-passenger racing runabout, the "Sca-Roo," which makes 38 miles per (not knots). It's no wonder that Hugh felt the need for a calmer sea-horse in the family; the "Sca-Roo" has thrown him twice during the last year.

• • • Milton Swartswood, formerly senior announcer of KOIN, Portland, has been added to KPO's brilliant staff of announcers.

During his affiliations with the Northwest station Swartswood was dramatic production manager, writing and dramatizing many of the station's stellar plays.

Prior to his radio work, Swartswood wrote several one-act prize-winning plays which were produced at the Civic Theatre in Portland, and appeared in a number of legitimate productions under the management of the Henry Duffy Players.

Swartswood is well known as a short story writer and is a musician of ability, his favorite instruments being the saxophone, violin, clarinet, though he plays many others equally well.

During his college days he distinguished himself in football, basket ball, and track, specializing in the 440-yard dash.

• • • Gunnar Johansen, renowned young Danish pianist whose Sunday night recitals are temporarily missing from NBC's Pacific network, is touring Europe by airplane. He and Mrs. Johansen drop down out of the clouds at each city where the NBC artist is scheduled to give a concert, and are back in the air again in a few hours. Johansen will return to San Francisco and NBC in December.

• • • Carlton E. Morse, author of many mystery serials heard through NBC's Pacific network, likes to get up early. He is in his office in the San Francisco studios every morning by 7, and many of his most terrifying mystery situations have been written at that hour, not late at night as might be supposed.

• • • The theme song of Russ Columbo, NBC's romantic baritone, was composed by himself. It is "You Call It Madness, But I Call It Love."

• • • In preparation for one of the most extensive schedules of football broadcasts in his career as a sports announcer, Ted Husing has arranged to spend a week at West Point in training with candidates for the Army eleven.

Ted, a former all-scholastic center and later member of a professional team, will

take part in the scrimmages, will go through all the pre-season training routine, and will sit at the training table with the cadets in order to get himself in perfect physical condition for the exacting schedule of broadcasts that will carry him from coast to coast until December 26.

• • • Ken Niles, master of ceremonies for the Hallelujah Hour and the KHJ Merrymakers, has added a pair of Mallard ducks to his rabbit farm. The new animal which is expected to result will be called a Dubbit. Niles is licking his chops in anticipation. He feels that the distinct qualities of a duck with long hair or a rabbit that floats insure a wide commercial appeal.

• • • Jerry Herst came to KJBS as a pianist. No one even suspected that he could sing, until one day when he was asked to help out in a vocal trio. "I've never tried it," said Jerry, "but if you're serious I'll take a chance." And, to make a long story short, he took the chance. Now he is heard on Sunday afternoons over the station in songs and patter with Frank Galvin.

• • • Betty Kelly, pretty young NBC songstress, is the possessor of acting ability, it has been discovered. Required to speak a few lines in the Entertainers' program, which mingles dialogue with music, Betty did so well at rehearsal that her part has been built up to a real rôle.

• • • Winnie Parker, low-voiced siren of popular songs, has found her musical soul mate at KFI-KECA, thus creating one of the most quickening programs of popular singing on the air. Miss Parker's program mate is Don Ricardo, baritone.

These two artists, with the piano team of Herb Myers-Polly Hall, enjoy singular favor with audiences from the teppees of Sonora to the Loggias of Santa Barbara.

• • • Something about the eleven Royal Canadians of Lombardo (CBS) . . . Their average age is 26 . . . Ten are dark-haired—Fritz Kreitzer is the blond . . . Five live in Manhattan, six in Long Island . . . Ten hail from Ontario, Canada, and Larry Owen, the sax player, from Cleveland . . . Nine play tennis—Carmen enjoys horseback riding, and Guy chooses speedboating . . . Four have moustaches . . . Ten continually "kid" Victor, the youngest . . . Four write songs.

• • • Jack Dunn's Rainbow Gardens dance orchestra has gone high hat these days. They have made some unusual concert arrangements that are liberally sprinkled in between dance groups. And, besides all that, they are now doing the 8:30 p. m. half hour for KTM each Sunday, Tuesdays, and Fridays, in addition to their regular late hour dance music.

• • • Dr. Laurance Cross, daily speaker in NBC's Cross Cuts from the Log o' the Day, is a licensed motion picture operator, as well as a clergyman, radio artist, writer, and musician. Dr. Cross once was the pastor of a church whose congregation was foreign-born. Instead of preaching sermons to them in English, which they could not understand, Dr. Cross showed them pictures, and obtained the operator's license in order to do the work himself.

• • • Roy Leffingwell's childhood ambition was to be a fisherman—a whaler, to be exact. He read the "Cruise of the Cachelot," and decided that a life on the ocean waves was the thing to do. Of course he didn't become a whaler, as he wanted to be. Neither did he become an engineer, as his brother thought best—or a minister to please his mother, or a lawyer to please his father. Instead, he is a pianist-composer. Now wotta you thing of that? So do we.

• • • Edmund Lytton, KTM announcer, has been appointed music director of the station by C. B. Juneau, production director. He used to be a stage actor before entering radio three years ago, and at one time was a prominent violin virtuoso in the East.

• • • B. A. Rolfe, known to millions of radio listeners as "Lucky Strike Rolfe," is probably the only person who has never heard his orchestra over the air. Rolfe has never been absent from the NBC studios while his musicians were broadcasting.

• • • Jack Ross, of the KFI-KECA Ranch Boys, is a really-truly cowboy. Born twenty-nine years ago near Oracle, Arizona, he can rope, tie, and brand any steer; ride any horse, and sing any desert ditty. He is tall, dark and handsome, single, and has an unswerving devotion to hand-made boots, horses and saddles. Plays the guitar and sings a sympathetic baritone, but has remained single.

Lucky Strike Harsh to Ear

As a subscriber for the past three years, would like to add a few remarks regarding the controversy in your Open Circuit Column of the Lucky Strike dance orchestra. I do not wish to quarrel with anyone who is satisfied with this program, nor do I wish to be ungrateful to the sponsors of any of the many worthy programs offered so freely, but I must admit, as some of your readers have been inclined to think, that this broadcast has never been a good one. Somehow it is noisy, loud and raucous. It certainly isn't pleasing to a musical ear. I do not condemn the musicians, for as modern dance music goes, they play well indeed. It is the reception itself that is at fault, I am sure. Either the long distance line connection, the intensity of power from the sending station, or the improper placing of the station's microphones are the real cause for such poor reception, regardless of how fine or expensive the radio set. I have a \$300 set and this particular broadcast is the most unmusical received. As perhaps you may remember, "Show Boat" was a very noisy, raucous broadcast, with improper modulation in the early days of this program, by long distance, through CBS, but now this has already been corrected and the present reception of "Show Boat" is as pleasing as a good local station with the unpleasant harshness eliminated. That's all that's wrong with the

Lucky Strike program; its reception is harsh to the ear. Many of the old phonograph records were recorded the same way in order to get volume of sound into the records. The reproduction was harsh and noisy instead of musical. I believe this letter might clear up some of this controversy for the musicians should not be condemned for something that is no fault of their own. The sending station should be appraised of the feeling of readers and they could easily correct their modulation or whatever it is that causes this program to be more unnatural than the rest, in being received. SILHOUETTES

DURING an interview which the *BROADCAST WEEKLY* reviewer had with Alexis Harrison, whose stellar work before the KPO microphone has done much to assure the success of Mrs. John Cuddy's "Children Plays," heard every Saturday evening from 8 to 8:15, an old-fashioned music box was tinkling out its delightful tunes. Tunes that thrilled the grandmothers of today, before the phonograph and then radio supplanted them. But talking to Alexis was like being transplanted in that bygone era, for here was a lad whose wholesome views, whose conduct and consideration of the best things in life could easily be those of the laddies who climbed into grandmother's lap so long ago. He has a deep appreciation for the arts and music and withal a keen appreciation for the outdoor sports—loves to hike—and his best girl is his mother.

Mrs. Cuddy discovered his dramatic talent when he attended State Normal School and cast him in the part of the "Tin Soldier" in a school production—in those days Alexis was still playing "soldier" in the sandlot near his home, when the American troops were fighting overseas. From the part of the little "tin soldeir" Alexis graduated into a leading actor of the Children's Theatre, and since then has won much success on various stages, notable among them his splendid performance at the Greek Theatre in Berkeley, when he played the young son of George, Duke of Clarence. Throughout his career he has been fortunate in having the coaching of his sister Zeta, herself a leading actress of the western stage.

It is hard to get Alexis to open up in conversation, he is one of those retiring, efficient chaps who believes in talking only when he has something really important to say—idle chatter has no place in his scheme of things—but when it came to talking about

Zeta and her help in his work, his frank and honest blue eyes, softened and he became quite enthusiastic and voluble.

The fact that he was proficient on the track during his Polytechnic High School days is readily understood when one glances at his splendid physique—he stands five feet ten inches in height, has a determined jaw and even in his street clothes can see the hidden power that carried him to victory in many a 50 and 100-yard dash.

As a diversion from the toil of the workaday grind, Alexis gathers a violin under his chin and woos the favor of Orpheus or uses his fine baritone voice to carol to the Gods.

A native of San Francisco, Harrison still lives in the house where he was born—a home that has given to the stage two splendid feminine stars—Zeta and Ula Harrison—Ula has passed beyond the horizon from whence there is no return—Zeta is starred over KPO, during the time between seasons of legitimate stage appearances. The Harrison

Carried trayful of breakfast up three flights of stairs to the suite of rooms occupied by the Three Laytons, famous vaudeville team. Tray crashed. Bobby fired. Laytons sympathetic and gave him autographed copy of "Steamboat Bill." Contact with Laytons (while sweeping up debris) fired his ambitions for a theatrical

career. Learned "Steamboat Bill" and won first prize amateur night at local theatre. Bob Fitzsimmons was the judge. He picked Bobby up by the neck and carried him into the wings to save him from the mob. Bobby became famous in Indianapolis as Izzy Gross, the "Boy With a Million Songs."

Came to Los Angeles with his family twenty years ago. Couldn't find work. Wired former employer for job and money to get back to Indianapolis. Ticket came. Bobby told mama he was going down to San Pedro for afternoon and wired her the bad news from the train at Yuma. A long winter and motion pictures exposing beauties of Mack Sennett bathing girls convinced him that a boy's best friend is his mother in Los Angeles. Bobby returned and became successful cabaret singer, operating in Vernon, Watts, and Los Angeles sectors. Turned down many chances to go to New York and watched his friends take the chances and become famous.

Abe Lyman got Bobby into the song plugging and publishing business. He became Pacific Coast representative of such potent houses as Witmark, Berlin, and Remick. This summer, Raymond Paige, KHJ's program musical director, suggested that Bobby bob up for KHJ audition. Bobby was entering the studio with a bundle of popular ballads under his arm when he headed for home and exchanged them for a sheaf of the comedy-character songs he used to wow them with in Indianapolis.



CRITIQUE OF THE WEEK

THERE'S too much sameness on the air today. Too many duplications. Stereotyped routines. Either program directors are content to sit back and pattern insipidly after other stations or they never bother to listen to rivals at all. I'm inclined to believe it's that . . . lack of interest in the enemy. If I were responsible for a show (where have you heard that before) I'd make a point of finding out what my competitors were doing. No time? All right, I'd hire a scout for the job. With his daily reports I could give my audiences something original. Steer clear of hackneyed ideas and imitations. If my Chinaman let's say, wasn't a darned sight better than my rival's I'd use a Swede or some other "personality." There'd be no bucking a best bet against another station's ace at the same hour, either. Especially if the ace had the advantage of an established following. Knowing what the enemy's up to, means winning the battle.

* * *

Potluck at KHJ is well named. Sometimes you get a full meal with dessert. Then again it's hash. You take it as it comes. With a friendly feelin'. If more radio performances were properly titled we wouldn't be such a mob o' howlin' disillusionists.

* * *

Generally, Rendezvous with the Coquettes on Wednesday nights. It's an artistic program. Plenty o' love interest, too. My long-distance devotion is kinda touchin' though. I know they'd never give a baldheaded egg who heaves like a rattlin' castenet when he dances, a tumble. But they're sweet. I don't mind.

* * *

Clarence Weaver, coming through DLBS with Plain Facts, is worth anybody's time. He talks naturally and amusingly on all sorts o' subjects. Scientific articles bore me stiff. He comes forth with the same information, dresses it up with wit an' I'm held spellbound. The other evenin' he hada clear his throat an' I cleared mine. If that's not sympathy, I'd like to know.

Always been strong for the Merrymakers on KHJ, but if they're gonna go down I'm for biddin' 'em goodbye now. Rather remember 'em as they were. Accidents will happen, but one or two burny-burns oughta be enough. If they wanna keep their old customers they'll hafta show more discrimination in invitations to guest artists. That bird for instance who forced an encore on a modernistic atrocity October 10 (I didn't get his name) nearly destroyed my power o' perceivin' sound. Coulda been free talent, but even so . . . he didn't belong.

* * *

The RKO program released through National is one o' those gambles. A wow, sometimes . . . flat, other times, but I seldom pass it up. The M. C. is spontaneous an' generally there's a special star who's entertaining, but the apple-pie to me is Tom Kennedy. His intimate, confidential touch carries a note of hospitality. It's like a compliment that warms the heart.

* * *

Ever see an old-fashioned garden with a picket fence nearly hidden by blooming passion flowers? Take it from me, it's a sight for sore eyes. Riotous colors, sorat subdued, exquisitely blended. Exotic picture. Exotic's not half strong enough. Well, ennyhow, that's what I see when the House of Color comes through NBC. The introductory remarks are simple and brief. They're my cue for a refill o' the ancient pipe. The musical pattern's conductive to reverie. I relax in the knowledge that no advertising material 'll jerk me outa my dreaming. Barry Hopkins officiates. His voice shades right in with the music. At the close 'of the broadcast a scarcely perceptible reference to the doner is made. It's unobtrusive as a card at the bottom of a birthday gift. Believe me that sponsor gets my support. He knows how to give a present.

The violinist in the J. Ward Hutton ensemble via DLBS is pretty awful. Sounds as though some friend 'd told 'im in order to succeed he'd hafta slur an' slur flagrantly an' the poor dub 'd taken it to heart.

Mildred, Seattle.—Anthony Wons (CBS) will listen to Chopin by the hour, loves to fish and swim, plays a "mean fiddle" and longs for an invisible ray whenever a determined photographer is on his trail. Nothing bores him like a visit to the barber shop unless he is offered the alternative of an appointment with the dentist, and nothing pleases him better than solitude. He goes in for furniture building and carving when time permits, or hides away in a little cabin in the hills with

Germany Studying American Broadcasting

A CLOSE study of American methods of handling short-wave broadcasting has been made by representatives of the Reichrundfunkgesellschaft, the German broadcasting company, preparatory to the inauguration of a regular weekly broadcast from this country of observations upon American activities by a prominent German newspaperman.

The establishment of this feature strongly evidences the great strides which have been made in international broadcasting in the past two or three years and is expected to be the forerunner of what eventually may be an exchange of programs between all of the leading countries of the world.

International programs regularly scheduled have been one of the dreams of radio engineers, who began experimental work along this line almost as soon as domestic broadcasting achieved a national scope. The international program, it is pointed out, is the logical development of the coast-to-coast broadcast, but has been more difficult of achievement because of the long jump across the ocean. At the present time, all obstacles have been overcome except those offered by atmospheric conditions—fading and static—but even these, scientists claim, will eventually be harnessed.

The international broadcasting program is expected to pave the way for international television within the next few years, and radio investigators hold forth the promise that in the not distant future the people of the United States may see and hear the opening of the British Parliament by the King, a fleet review in the Mediterranean, or the Olympic contests in some European city as they occur and with no more trouble than is entailed in the twisting of a dial.

The international program, of course, is not new. A number of them have been featured by American radio stations, and American broadcasts have been repeatedly sent to Europe. To the Germans, however, goes the credit for arranging the first regular overseas schedule, which will take to the people of Germany the observations on American life, manners and events of one of their own newspapermen.






