## WIRE TELEVISION COMING

TEN YEARS of constant experimentation at a cost of some \$3,000,000 have developed "wired wireless" to a point where it can be offered the public on a commercial scale.

As soon as television development reaches the proper stage, "wired television" also will be provided, it is indicated by recent developments.

The first wired radio operations on a large scale will be in Cleveland, where equipment capable of furnishing service to 270,000 homes is being installed. Every city with an electric light plant will be capable of handling the new form of broadcasting.

Wired radio can be developed to a point where it can offer a large variety of programs simultaneously. In Cleveland, three programs will be available. The broadcasting is achieved by superimposing upon the 60-cycle transmission plant of the electric company, without interference, a 13-kilocycle carrier current which is stepped up in multiples of 13 to deliver programs. The Cleveland programs will be on frequencies of 26, 39 and 52 kilocycles.

Wired television is also receiving attention. This will probably be handled over telephone wires. The telephone system of the country comprises some 80,000,000 miles of wire. The average use of this tremendous mileage is about 18 minutes a day, so that there is

considerable time available for the transmission of pictures if such a service is developed.

Through the telephone system, long-distance television transmission will be possible, so that a few studios strategically located can provide a service for the entire country. This work is proceeding quietly and real experimentation is awaiting the perfection of transmission and receiving equipment, since there are few difficult problems to be encountered in the actual carriage of the program from one point to another once the equipment is available.

With wired broadcasting and television available, it is anticipated that there will be adequate room for all types of broadcasting once these media of transmission are put into operation. Network programs will be possible over the wires with the same facility as at present and with the added advantage of less interference from static and fading.

The development of wire carriage for programs offers a new field for speculation as to whether network programs may not eventually be confined to certain frequencies so as to make available space for more independent stations. Such a development, however, cannot come in wired radio until some means is discovered of reaching the great proportion of the population which as yet is without electric service.



# MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Rex Dunn, NBC orchestral director, is an authority on old Celtic music, and composed a number of musical settings for the work of modern Irish poets. "Dusk" by A. E., and "White Birds" by Yeats are two he has set to music, and he is at work now on "Carramore," tone-poem inspired by A. E.'s poem of that name.

• • • Radio engineers, the men behind the guns, are reticent, shy creatures. But they have lots of color and interest as human beings. Consider Curtis W. Mason of KF1-KECA. Curt was born in Pomona thirty-two years ago and has played with "juice" since his first knickers. His experience includes ship-board operating on the Australia-New Zealand run, and service with the Navy. He is of athletic build, blonde, with the diffidence of true authority. His hobbies are Japanese prints, etchings and good editions. He plays tennis; has remained single, in spite of frequent raids on his good will by fascinating ladies. Schooling: U. C. L. A., Polytechnic Hi, Marconi Company.

• • • Rob Roberts, for over four years manager of KTAB, has resigned from that position and has established a radio advertising agency here.

• • • The thousands of constant listeners to the program presented by Calmon Luboviski's violin choir each Thursday night over KNX, in Hollywood, from 8:30 to 9 o'clock, were treated to an unexpected surprise recently.

A world famous collection of violins was brought to the station for the violin choir to use in its program. Their value totaled almost \$400,000!

Fred Olsen, first violinist of the KNX concert orchestra, who plays in the choir, used an instrument valued at \$55,000, formerly used by Fritz Kreisler. Freddie, who is very proud of his own instrument, reluctantly admitted that the borrowed violin was a little better than his own!

• • • The postman who delivers mail to the NBC studios in San Francisco earned a good sleep Monday night, March 14. He

brought 10,754 letters from NBC listeners on that day—the largest audience mail figure in Pacific Division records thus far. Wanda Woodward and her assistants in the audience mail department were literally "snowed under" for several hours, as sack after sack of envelopes arrived.

• • • Ronald J. Smith, production manager of KJBS, is apparently the busiest man in the studio. He writes most of the station's sustaining features, edits all advertising copy presented over the station, takes his turn at the microphone for certain broadcasts and keeps a keen eye and ear to all of the other activities that come under the heading of "production." Smith is a thorough technical man and knows the mechanical end of broadcasting from beginning to end, is one of the youngest production managers on the coast and has been with KJBS since it first went on the air.

• • • An echo from the past recently assaulted the redoubtable Jack Carter, known to the audiences of KNX as "The Boy from London." The echo, so Jack relates, was in the form of a letter from one Tony Orford, a former comrade of Jack's musical comedy days in London, now living in the caribou country, Canada. This old-time thespian, whom Jack has not seen nor heard from in twenty years, was listening over his radio one night recently to the broadcast from the Paris Inn Café, when suddenly he heard a voice that sounded strangely familiar. When the program was concluded, and Jack signed off, giving his name, Orford immediately wrote a joyful letter to his former partner in crime, renewing their old acquaintance.

• • • Anna Nettleman, soprano of KFWJ's staff, has had a varied and successful career. Her own preference seems to lie along the German classics, and yet her past engagements have found her singing in opera, choir, and light classical programs. She has done opera with Mme. Margaret Matzenaur and has appeared in recitals with Frederic Bittke. For several years she has been soloist of the "Deutscher Verein" in

San Francisco, as well as all the other local German singing societies. She is not new to radio, having appeared as soloist on programs over KLY and KFRC.

• • • Television has a curious effect on animals, William Schudt, CBS television director, reveals. "Whenever we feature talking parrots, 'singing' dogs, and the like, they become utterly dumb when the flying spot of television hits them," Schudt says. His theory is that the purple light shining out at them in a completely darkened room frightens them. Nevertheless, he has arranged for an intensive animal series to begin in April over W2XAB-W2XE, to bring a chimpanzee, a small bear, a cobra, and an ant-eater to the studio. This will be the first time that a zoological exhibition of this sort will have been televised.

• • • Fredric Bittke, KFRC baritone, learned recently what a blessing the airplane is when one is supposed to be in two places at the same time, so to speak.

Bittke was scheduled to sing on his regular spot during the "Home Sweet Home Concert" from 9 to 11 o'clock Sunday morning. Then he had a date as soloist at his church at 1 o'clock. This went off as per schedule, but an appointment to appear at 6 that evening in Los Angeles required some fast moving. He booked passage on one of the air liners to leave Mills Field, San Francisco, at 3 o'clock. Arriving at the field a few minutes before the take-off time, he learned that flying schedules had been cancelled due to storms and fog.

It was an important appearance and Bittke was determined to get there. He finally found a pilot who was willing to make the flight and chartered his plane, arriving in the southern city just in time to appear on the concert stage of the Turner Hall in Los Angeles.

The following morning Bittke was due at the KFRC studios at 10 o'clock for Jam-boree rehearsal, which he made by taking off from Grand Central airport at 6 that morning and flying to San Francisco.

• • • Fred Smith, who conceived the idea for the March of Time (CBS broadcasts, has relinquished his position as writer of the dramatized new scripts to youthful Tom Everett. Smith has rented a villa at Biarritz where he will write a novel or two.

Everett brings a cosmopolitan background to his position, having studied at Yale, Oxford, the University of Grenoble and the University of Munich.

• • • Peter Dixon, author of *Raising Junior*, writes the scripts for the daily program in what once was the coal bin in the basement of his Long Island home. Dixon says he does this to get away from his two children.

• • • The legal profession has probably lost more of its members to Columbia than any other. "Casey" Jones studied law while at Middlebury College but was lured to aviation and now tells the radio audience all about it. Art Jarrett and Bing Crosby both took legal courses at school. Bing went even further and clerked in a law office after graduation. Milton Rettenberg was admitted to the bar of the State of New York. For a time he earned his living in the courts as well as by piano playing. He thought, however, that he could be more convincing as a musician. Scruppy Lambert is another graduate lawyer who has become a radio entertainer.

• • • When Captain Dobbsie, skipper of the *Shell Ship of Joy*, broadcast each weekday morning over KFRC and the Columbia Don Lee Network invited his listeners to "cut themselves a piece of cake," he little realized that 30,000 of them would take him literally.

The occasion was the fourth anniversary of the *Shell Happytime* when Dobbs was presented with what was said to be the world's largest birthday cake, measuring more than eight feet in diameter and equally as high. During the celebration Dobbs offered all listeners who would write in a generous slice of the cake.

To date more than 30,000 fans have accepted his invitation and at this writing requests continue to pour in at the rate of several thousand a day.

• • • Sydney Dixon, KYA production manager and tenor, and Edmund Ruffner, former NBC-New York announcer, helped to defray their college expenses by peddling ice in New York.

• • • Otto Cesana, composer and special arranger for KFI-KECA, was born in Brescia, Italy, famous as a musical center—

but Cesana obtained all his musical education in the United States. Way back in 1922, when radio was a pup, Cesana was advised by Charles Wakefield Cadman to write with a view to broadcasting. Cesana immediately heeded the advice and began to experiment with the new orchestral values imposed by the radio technique. To this wise provision he attributes his success as a writer and arranger of music so ideally fitted for broadcasting. Cesana is thirty-three, married, and fond of outdoor sports. He studied in San Francisco and New York.

• • • Eight years have marked an enviable growth for KFOX, Long Beach station which had its beginning with a 100-watt transmitter and call letters of KFON, broadcasting before commercial radio was practical. In 1929, the call letters were changed to KFOX and with a power of 1000 watts, the station has attained a position in the world of commercial broadcasting that is second in importance in the Southwest.

• • • Virginia Spencer, staff pianist of KYA, displayed her musical ability at a very early age. When she was only three, her father took her with him to a performance of the "Merry Widow." He thought she was too young to appreciate the operetta and was more than surprised to find her picking out the airs on the piano—the next day. Virginia also plays the violin, but she doesn't want anyone to know it.

• • • A fan, blind since birth, was a recent caller at the Chicago Columbia studios during a "Myrt and Marge" broadcast. Touched by his sincerity, the cast gathered around to chat and answer his questions. As he was preparing to go, "Myrt" asked if she could give him any more information regarding the script. "Yes," came the answer, "who killed Ray Hunt?" It was the one question "Myrt" could not answer.

• • • Bill Hatch, KNX, who is the most easy-going man, has taken to sending wires to one of his boys. Unaccustomed as he is—to arising early in the morning, the bass player, Johnny Dulzer, forgot to appear for a new program the other morning, and so one day received a wire from Bill reading, "Orchestra call 10:45 a. m., this morning. Bring Bass." I'll bet Johnny will get up mornings after this!

• • • The philosophies and favorite poems of "The Old Vagabond of the Air" are contained in a booklet just published by KFRC's popular midnight hour announcer. It is titled "To You!" and is rich in philosophical and inspiring poetry and prose. "The Old Vagabond" is Jerry Wilford, one of the most picturesque characters in radio today. From Juneau, Alaska, where he was born forty-three years ago, Wilford came to "the States" and has at one time or another held positions as inventor, structural steel engineer, advertising designer, hotel manager, real estate salesman and radio announcer.

• • • K'TAB's Beverly Hillbillies could not stand too much of city life. So they have taken a house out of town and there live in a backwoods manner. One of the boys has a mother who plays that rôle for the whole gang.

• • • Rex Dunn, orchestral leader and composer who has joined the NBC staff in San Francisco, was the conductor of the Honolulu Symphony Orchestra for two seasons. When he left the islands his farewell concert was one of the most impressive musical events Hawaii has ever known, and at its conclusion the audience rose and sung "Aloha" to him.

• • • The postman recently staggered into the KFRC office under a load that buckled even his strong legs. "This is a sweet how-de-do!" he declared.

The office and artist staff gathered round to discover that the mail carrier had delivered an even hundred pounds of home-made candy, the gift of Mrs. B. F. Burcholtz, Brentwood, California.

The candy, stated Mrs. Burcholtz, was in appreciation of the many happy hours the Golden State Blue Monday Jamboree artists had provided her through her loudspeaker.

Needless to say, the music from KFRC was sweeter than usual after that.

• • • "Please rewrite this script in English," was the notation on a proposed radio talk that turned it from a dull academic lecture into a highly educational broadcast. The notation was made by Freeman H. Talbot, manager of KOA in Denver, who had found twenty unrecognizable words on one page dealing with a subject in which he had majored in college.

• • • As long as certain radio stations MUST play records, they can at least play the best records available. Such is the attitude of KECA, which starts a record-program series entitled *Recital Jewels*, daily at 2 p. m., and Sundays.

This series will feature the cream of recorded music by solo instrumentalists. Paderevski, Freidman, Kreisler, Casals, Paitigorski, McCormack, Chaliapine, and the other luminaries of the concert stage. Each program will be built up carefully as an all-star presentation, only the latest and freshest records being used.

• • • Billy Small, KYA violinist, claims to own one of the world's smallest "playable violins." The tiny instrument Billy picked up at the sale of an instrument collection. It measures about nine inches in length and is perfect in every respect. Its tone is perfect within its range.

• • • The Belmont Theatre, Los Angeles, is giving amateur talent a tryout on each of its evening performances. Each night's winner again appears on Saturday and this gala performance is broadcast via remote control from the stage to KTM. The winner each week will be awarded a paid engagement at KTM.

• • • Pet aversions seem to be the style these days. Here are some of the dislikes at KTAB:

Glenhall Taylor dislikes masculine women and feminine men; Alma La Marr hates to sit up late at night; Thelma Blair does not like high piano stools; Dennis Charles revolts at a rehearsal; Elbert Lachelle shuns the bright lights; Jerry Jermaine disdains people who say "just dandy"; and Ernie Smith lets nothing interfere with his daily swim.

• • • Jim Walsh, trombone player in Anson Weeks' Orchestra, heard over KFRC, has learned with what zealous regard the various coffee makers regard their produce and its publicity.

Walsh uses a coffee can to obtain a certain mute effect from his trombone. It so happened that it was an MJB brand can. One evening the manager of the Alta Coffee Company was dancing at the Mark Hopkins and noticed his competitor's can adorning Walsh's trombone. He immediately sent for

• • • When Ernst Toch, great European modernist composer, appeared in San Francisco recently, in a recital of his own works, Eva Gruninger Atkinson, NBC contralto, was selected as soloist to appear with him. She sang a group of his songs to his own accompaniment, winning enthusiastic press notices.

• • • A Myrt and Marge fan who holds the record for curiosity, traveled all the way from her home in Somerville, Massachusetts, to Chicago to see if the Myrt and Marge cast were as interesting in person as she found them over the air. Her only disappointment was to find that one of her favorite characters, Ray Hunt the stage manager, had been murdered in the drama while she was en route. She is Miss Geneva Clark, and her interest in the back-stage adventures of the Wrigley program is heightened by the fact that she is herself a veteran trouper.

• • • So many comments have been received by KFI-KECA about the English intonation in the voices of Basil and Bertie, daily comedy skit, KECA at 6 o'clock, that we must affirm that both Basil and Bertie are very real native Englishmen.

It was interesting to read the score of letters that followed their first program—exactly half of them praised their authentic English accent and the other half damned them for their English "affectation."

• • • Cliff Arquette and Harold Isbell, KNX, who entertains you nightly with the laughable antics of Aunt Emmy and Bert, are now the closest of friends, but, through a misunderstanding on Arquette's part were bitterest enemies up until a few months ago. The matter was finally discussed and talked over, and the boys decided it was all a mistake, and so wiped the slate clean and started from scratch.

# ... RADIO NEWS ...

**M**ANY complex and as yet little understood factors which affect radio waves are to be found in the upper reaches of the atmosphere, in the sun and even beyond that body, according to Professor Arthur E. Kennelly, joint discoverer of the Kennelly-Heaviside layer.

Speaking before the staff of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, of which he is a research associate, Professor Kennelly declared that much of the phenomena of radio is due to the sun but that there is reason to believe that much more remote influences are at work.

The Kennelly-Heaviside layer, he explained, is seemingly almost impenetrable to long wave radiations, and is caused by the intense violet rays of the sun falling upon the upper atmosphere, breaking the air molecules up into electrically positive and negative parts.

Observations in recent years, he said, have shown that when brief electrical impulses are sent out at a radio transmitting station the invisible broadcast wave carrying the impulse outward along the ground in all directions is closely followed by echoes which come down from the sky, due to radio impulses bent down, or seemingly reflected, by the Kennelly-Heaviside layers, which completely blankets the world.

"It is found from numerous records," Professor Kennelly asserted, "that the apparent height of the invisible cloud is related to the strength of the long-distance radio signals, such as those coming over the Atlantic. The strength of the radio signals, in turn, is found to be related closely to the earth's magnetic activity, and this in turn is related to conditions on the surface of the sun, as revealed by sun spots.

"The reasons for the interconnection of these widely different phenomena can only be guessed as yet. The spots on the surface of the sun are found to be associated with the outpouring of ultraviolet light and this may change the depth and density of the invisible cloud in the atmosphere."

"This can affect radio signals and somehow affects the earth's magnetism. Why the sun should have acquired the habit of an eruptive cycle of about eleven years still is a

mystery. There may be cosmic influences at work more remote than the sun."

Solution of "great cosmic riddles" of the world, Professor Kennelly said, may be effected through radio. Exploration of the upper regions of the atmosphere, he pointed out, now is limited to the height to which recording instruments can be lifted by balloons, but radio waves can be sent up to much greater heights and studied upon their return to earth.

**B**ITTER attacks upon the policy of the Federal Radio Commission in refusing to grant a cleared channel to station WCFL, Chicago, because, as a labor station, it represented a particular group, have been laid before the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee by representatives of the American Federation of Labor.

The committee has before it for consideration a bill requiring that an exclusive frequency be set aside for the use of labor.

If the desired cleared channel could be secured, it was made known, labor interests propose to establish a chain of their own, with all the stations operating on the same frequency, at a cost of between \$300,000 and \$400,000, with the Chicago plant as the central station.

Declaring that the commission was "prejudiced," representatives of the American Federation of Labor pointed out that while denying a cleared channel to the labor station, the radio commission "has granted to stations operating on cleared channels what is virtually a vested right to those frequencies."

A favorable report on the labor station's application was made by the chief examiner of the commission, it was asserted, but his recommendations were overruled on the ground that if labor or any other single group was granted a clear channel all other groups could demand similar privileges and all of the cleared channels would soon be secured by special interests to the detriment of the commercial broadcasters.

With the Federal Radio Commission definitely aligned against the allocation of a cleared channel to labor, the committee was

told, such facilities can be secured only through Congressional enactment.

Officials of the commission opposed the legislation setting aside a cleared frequency for labor on the ground that it would be in violation of the Davis amendment to the radio law providing for the equitable distribution of facilities. They also pointed out that if labor was given an exclusive frequency there could be no defense against a similar demand from such groups as the Masons, Odd Fellows and Knights of Columbus, each an organization with many million members.

"Since there is only a limited number of available frequencies for broadcasting," it was declared, "the commission is of the opinion that there is no place for a station catering to any group, but all stations should cater to the general public and serve public interest as against group or class interest."

**D**ETERMINED not to introduce television equipment commercially until satisfied of its perfection, Radio Corporation of America still can give no promise as to when it will enter the field of picture broadcasting.

"Marked progress," however, is declared to have been made during the past year in studio and transmission equipment, but receiving sets are offering more difficulty because of the necessity of developing inexpensive sets, simple of operation. Not until this has been accomplished will Radio Corporation attempt to invade the television field.

Allocation of a specific field of frequencies for television is declared by David Sarnoff, president of the company, to be necessary. Picture transmission, he believes, cannot be thrown into the broadcasting spectrum without disruption of both services. A special band of frequencies, adjusted to meet the peculiar needs of television, must be provided. Indications are that television will be offered as a separate service and not an adjunct to sound broadcasting.

Reviewing the work of the past year along this line in his annual report to the stockholders of the company, Mr. Sarnoff stated that "intensive television developmental work was continued."

"Although the development of television is still in the laboratory," he said, "marked

progress was made in 1931 in its transmission and studio phases. An experimental station was constructed in the tower of the Empire State Building in New York City, from which tests were conducted into the effect of television signals of large buildings and steel framework in the New York area.

"Television receiving equipment will be offered to the public when experimentation has demonstrated that a reliable and serviceable system of sight transmission of practical value can be assured.

"It is believed that television can best be brought into practical application on its own band of radio waves as a service additional to the established system of sound broadcasting.

"While the cost of research has been substantial, sound policy dictates in such a rapidly moving art that the laboratory must be given primary consideration and that no possibility of adapting radio to new utilitarian tasks should be overlooked. Accomplishments of both immediate and potential value identified 1931 as a year of technical progress."

**R**ADIO service by telephone, recently inaugurated in Switzerland, has made unnecessary the purchase of receiving sets by telephone subscribers, who need only to take the receiver off the telephone to secure radio entertainment.

The service has already been put into effect in six large cities and will be extended in the near future to others.

Swiss radio is under government control, there being six broadcasting stations serving something less than 105,000 receiving sets. Programs for the new telephone service are provided by two of the largest stations, which are equipped with special underground wires for telephone broadcasting, one of the advantages claimed for which is absolute clarity of reception.

Other advantages cited by the Swiss telegraph and telephone administration in selling the service are the elimination of antennae and other equipment, avoidance of atmospheric disturbances and man-made static, and low cost, the fee for use of the radio devices being only about 50 cents a month.



# SILHOUETTES

EACH generation witnesses the same old struggle between the carefully laid plans of fond parents and the strong convictions of aspiring children. The case of Tito Guizar, Columbia tenor, thus follows pattern. Tito's parents were horrified at his desire to go on the stage. His mother was a talented vocalist and pianist, and his father a skilled guitarist and mandolinist—but, of course, only as amateurs who played and sang for their own amusement. So Tito was sent to the Mexican National University in Mexico City, and all possibility of a professional career was scorned.

But when the young man officially was in the laboratory pouring over scholarly books and test tubes, he actually was in the green gardens surrounding the University buildings, sprawled out on the grass, singing for the sheer love of singing. His fellow students soon discovered this outdoor laboratory, recognized Tito's talents, and became an admiring throng of enthusiastic listeners. And Tito left college—

He had already attended the Conservatory of Music in Mexico City, appeared in numerous amateur theatricals, and became recognized as the most talented musician in Guadalajara, where he was born. He had studied the fundamentals of music: composition, harmony, voice, and piano; and had had his share of academic learning. The sincere admiration of his fellows at college convinced Guizar

that he could be successful in the career for which he had always longed. In 1925, at the age of twenty, he went to his father and declared that he was through with medicine and academic studies forever.

The next two years found him in Italy, studying voice at St. Mark's Academy in Milan. In 1928 he returned to Mexico City to appear in opera at the Iris theatre.

During his two months there, he sang in the principal rôles of "Manon," "Elixir d'Amore," "The Barber of Seville," and numerous other operas.

In 1929 Tito came to New York to make records of his unique renditions of Spanish and Mexican songs. At the expiration of the original contract, Guizar was offered another on similar terms, but by this time officials of the Columbia Broadcasting System had heard his mellow voice

and signed him for radio performances.

For more than a year—since November of 1930—Tito Guizar has been featured with Vincent Sorey's orchestra on the Gauchos program, one of the most popular of Columbia's sustaining features, broadcast each Sunday night over a nationwide network. He is also heard each Thursday evening in a solo presentation, featuring Mexican and Spanish songs. Since January 1 of this year Tito has been co-featured with Leon Belasco and his orchestra in the "To the Ladies" program, broadcast every Friday evening from 9:30 to 9:45 P. M., EST, over a nationwide network of the WABC-Columbia network, and sponsored by the Andrew Jergens Company, makers of Woodbury Facial Soap.

A SIX-FOOT son of Texas whose dreamy interpretation of music in three-four time has made him a national radio, recording and dance orchestra favorite and won for him the title of "Waltz King" . . . prefers to arrange and play romantic waltz numbers . . . famous old tunes or bits from the classics . . . never loses sight, however, that youth likes novelty and hot numbers as well . . .

Wayne was born in El Paso . . . attended public schools there . . . once wanted to be an automobile mechanic and did repair work in Oklahoma and Texas . . . later joined his brothers in the banking busi-

ness in Iowa . . . tired of banking . . . came to Chicago . . . became first saxophonist in Trianon Ballroom's regular orchestra . . . was a protégé of J. Boldwald Lampe, famous composer and arranger . . . attracted attention of officials of Music Corporation through his solo work, personality, and physical appearance . . . formed his own orchestra in 1926 . . . style of music won immediate favor.

Composes popular songs in spare time . . . some of his successes include: "The Waltz You Saved For Me" . . . "Until the End" . . . "Beautiful Love" . . . and now a great novelty hit, "Goofus" . . . often said Wayne makes his saxophone talk . . . friends say he endeavors to attain a certain expressionistic tone enabling him to almost speak the words of the song . . . puts a great deal of feeling into his playing . . . often closes his eyes while doing a solo . . . lives each number.

**I**NTRODUCING Herr Fizzmeyer—in person!

Not altogether coincidental was the choice of Max Waizman, noted actor and stage director who has joined the NBC staff in San Francisco, as the portrayer of the baffled German school-master

in the Schooldays skit of the Associated Spotlight.

Max has been playing dialect parts so long on the stage that he's likely to break into a Potash and Perlmutter, Herr Fizzmeyer or some other dialect almost any time.

"One reason for that is because I have real German in my own blood," he explains when you ask him to divulge the secret of why comical mispronunciations roll off his tongue with a touch of authenticity far different from the strained stage effects sometimes heard in dialect performers.

Young Max grew up in San Francisco and attended the University of California. Dr. Julius Klein was one of his classmates and Rube Goldberg was a senior at U. C. when Max was a freshman..

Max started his theatrical career by joining the German Players at College, and from that it was an easy step to the Liberty Theatre in Oakland. There, later, he first met Tom Hutchinson, NBC production manager, Earle Hodgins, producer, and other old Liberty alumni now at NBC.

Twenty years on the stage, including fourteen in New York productions, are the basis for Max's fine technique before the microphone. He played eighty-eight weeks on Broadway as the lawyer in "Potash and Perlmutter"; appeared in "Partners Again" and played with Ann Harding and Jimmy Gleason in "Like a King"; it was Ann Harding's first part.

Besides playing the rôle of the schoolmaster in the Associated Spotlight, Max produces a number of NBC programs, including the Dinglebenders, Kolb and Dill's radio serial,


