

ETHER GLEANINGS

SIGNIFICANT things have been happening along the radio rialto during the past fortnight, outstanding among them being the news that the Happy Go Lucky hour, given birth, nursed and reared by Al Pearce at KFRC, moves en masse to Los Angeles' KHJ on the first of the year.

The daddy of the popular matinee variety hour returned from a sky trip to Los Angeles to tell us that Don Lee had decided to move the program to the southern link of the Don Lee-CBS chain. New and fresh fields to play to and more chances of interesting a commercial sponsor in the program, they said.

Al Pearce is taking with him the following members of the Happy Go Lucky gang, who will be augmented in the south by artists on the KHJ staff: Cal Pearce, Norman Nielsen, Hazel Warner, Tony Romano, Andy Andrews and Morey Amsterdam.

According to the present plans the group will remain in Southern California for at least three months and possibly a great deal longer.

All stations now releasing the hour will continue to do so, the new origination point having nothing to do with any change in the present set-up.

Just as has been the custom at KFRC these several years, visitors will be admitted to the KHJ studios to witness the five performances weekly of the merry troupers.

Just try and scrap that "Memory Lane" program, Mr. NBC, yeh, just try it! That was the attitude taken by the thousands of followers of the West's oldest radio program when announcement was made that the broadcast would be no more after the General Petroleum Company had announced a change in its air presentation. The NBC said that it wouldn't continue the bill unsponsored. But all those folk who had been traveling down "Memory Lane" to "Goshen Center" week after week and year after year, had something to say about that and believe me you they SAID it!

So vociferous and determined were their utterances, so strong their demands—in letters, telegrams, telephone calls and personal ones, too—that the chain lost no time in reversing its decision and plunked the "old faithful" right smack back on the air again.

"I was actually astonished how ired the audience became when we announced the change in the program policy," Don Gilman, network chieftain told me. "Within forty-eight hours after the announcement I reached

the decision that "Memory Lane" must stay on, so great is its appeal. Numerous letters came from college students and flappers, the type of audience that we previously believed "Memory Lane" would hold no interest for. But now we have proven that it has appeal to young, middle aged and old alike."

Several prospective sponsors are seriously considering "Memory Lane" now, Gilman revealed.

If crime and mystery yarns are your pet radio dish, list to this. The Eno Crime Club returns to the air on January 31, this time over KPO via electrical transcription. Dramatizations of famous crime stories will be broadcast on Tuesday and Wednesday evenings from 8:30 to 9 o'clock.

With the Federal Radio Commission's approval, Don Lee would like to build another link in his growing chain of radio stations at Redlands, Calif. He has applied to the Federal body for a license to construct a station using 500 watts power night and 1000 daylight and operating on 780 kilocycles. He would use the facilities of stations KTM and KELW, recently ruled off the air, if he could get them.

An now "One Man's Family," which has been the crowning achievement in Carlton Morse's radio career, may go into the movies. John Swallow, RKO executive, hopped up to the NBC recently to go over the situation with the author and the network executives. If it is accepted, it is very probable that most of the radio cast will be used in the picture, so true to type are they. "One Man's Family" originally scheduled to run thirteen weeks, has been on the air about seven months to date and its end is not in sight.

We note that Leo Tyson, KHJ executive, was elected to the board of directors of the National Association of Broadcasters at its recent convention at St. Louis.

Public Foods, who have been bouncing out the shekels for those nightly "Cecil and Sally" broadcasts on KPO, are cancelling at the end of next month, running through only about six months of their original year contract. 'Smatter? Didn't C and S know their groceries?

Harold Horton, former announcer and drama producer on KFRC was recently ap-

pointed program director of station KMTR in Los Angeles. One of his outstanding achievements hereabouts was his dramatization of those "Tales of the Frozen North" yarns, which he authored, directed and acted in.

Roy Frothingham, sales promotion manager of the NBC here, has turned dramatist. His dramatization of the book, "Robert E. Lee" will be presented on that Star Book Series over KPO on December 23.

* * *

The program makers at the NBC have reincarnated an old KFRC affair — Chiffon Jazz—which is now being heard regularly featuring Caltana Christoph and Meredith Willson's orchestra.

Those Pearce Brothers of KFRC conducted a dance for thirty consecutive Saturday nights at Robinson's Corners, California, and made good money at it. The dance is closed now for the winter months.

Lloyd E. Yoder, NBC exec., reminded us to remind you that the chain he represents is winging out an account of that Pasadena Tournament of Roses grid game on New Year's Day, January 2, from coast to coast.

And Harrison Holliday asked us to give the same break to the CBS which is radioing the happenings at Kezar Stadium on that date when the Shrine East-West contest is staged.

And on January 1 Standard Brands renews that "Great Moments in History" series which is being aired weekly over the same network .

* * *

When Mona Lowe, NBC torch singer, becomes Mrs. Paul Rickenbacker (before the year is out) it is reported that she will retire from the mike. Oh, Mona!

The CBS is boasting that it soon will have one of the biggest sponsors to date—the Standard Oil Company of Indiana. It plans six shows a week of half an hour each, with a forty-five piece symphony led by Joseph Bonime. According to the present plan they will use mystery yarns, variety and every kind of presentation imaginable. The dope as we get it is that the account was to have gone to the NBC, but that network couldn't clear the time. 'Tis said that although the time on the air will equal Lucky Strike's programs, the expenditures will be even greater. Uh-umm!







The aged bird had a typical seaman's vocabulary, and was still able to use it vigorously up to the very end of his career.

• • • The Pavon Sisters, now on KROW, were known to KFRC listeners as the Dainty Sisters becoming affiliated with radio after a three year stage engagement.

Their favorite pastimes are reading and hiking and at no time are they seen with a hat.

• • • May Singhi Breen and Peter de Rose, who for ten years in radio have been known as the "Sweethearts of the Air," celebrated their third wedding anniversary on Thursday, December 8. Ten years ago at station WEAJ, New York, now a key station of the NBC network, Miss Breen, known as the "Ukulele Lady" and de Rose, a pianist, met. For seven years they appeared together on programs, which culminated in their marriage three years ago.

He prefers to set his own, and his fingers land right on the proper stops with never a falter, while he sings into a "mike" placed just over the console.

• • • Actors have their peculiarities. During a recent serial play produced from KYA, G. Donald Gray played the part of a hunchback student,—and he played the part with his back bent and his hands on his hips. He maintained that the posture was necessary to the proper interpretation of the part, and was unable to read his lines with feeling when standing upright.

• • • President Hoover's election visit to his home at Palo Alto, California, gave two brothers who have not seen each other for three years a brief, happy reunion.

They are Herluf Angsgar Provensen, supervisor of the NBC Washington, D. C. announcing staff, and Martin Provensen, NBC announcer in San Francisco.

Because of his cordial attitude in such cases, Carter is frequently drafted by charity organizations for the benefit performances. He invariably lets professional engagements go begging when his talents are sought by welfare groups.

• • • Gracie Allen's brother apparently has lost the comedienne's favor for the moment. The other night she told Geo Burns that the last time she had seen her relative was when he left to sell a donkey and the donkey came back with the money.

• • • Two blocks away from where he played piano in a nickelodeon at the age of 11, Frank Black later conducted an orchestra of 68 men in a huge theater in Philadelphia 20 years later.

• • • Dickie Le Grand, NBC juvenile star, is growing up. He became "Richard Le Grand Jr.," on NBC casting sheets, by his own request, the other day—"because I'm almost thirteen, now, and that's too old to be called 'Dickie.'"

• • • Still great favorites, they're not as young as they used to be. Meaning Will Rogers and Al Jolson, both of whom KFI was recently pleased to present to a nation-wide audience. Both Will and Al have to wear "specs" to read their lines.

• • • Helen Musselman, pretty young NBC actress, is becoming known as a singer—but not on the air. She has appeared at several recitals recently, but has never sung through a microphone.

"I'm afraid to try—I'd be

so scared I couldn't sing a note," declares the youthful microphone player who has been acting ether rôles of all types for several years.

• • • Paul Carson, who builds the "Bridge to Dreamland" for NBC listeners Sunday nights, with the aid of an organ keyboard, is the descendant of several generations of clergymen, but never felt the slightest desire to enter the ministry.

• • • For the past month, a tally has been kept of the requests made at the New Yorker hotel for certain numbers by George Olsen and his band. While most of his fan mail asks to have his wife Ethel Shutta, sing her famous German band song, 73 more persons at the New Yorker asked Olsen to play the current pop hit, "Let's Put Out the Lights and Go to Bed" than they asked for the German song.

• • • Perry Crandall, author of "Si and Elmer" and portrayer of the former character when the serial is on the air over KNX, also designs and produces all sound effects used in the act.

• • • Scrappy Lambert and Billy Hillpot, the musical edition of the Smith Brothers, returned to Columbia the other night to start their eighth season on the air. It is interesting to note that the duo has performed in behalf of the same sponsor for the past seven seasons. The combination was formed while they were undergraduates at Rutgers.

• • • Patti Pickens, of NBC Pickens Sisters, prizes a bowl of goldfish among her most treasured possessions. Patti, who joined her sisters when she finished school last spring was given the goldfish by a schoolboy admirer who brought them from Brooklyn to her Park Avenue apartment

on a subway—without losing a fish—which is an achievement, as an subway rider knows.

• • • Glen Rice (Mr. Tallfeller) and his original Beverly Hillbillies from KROW recently completed a stage engagement at the Warfield Theater.

Since their organization by Rice the Beverly Hillbillies have been presented to nearly two million people, in person. There's is the most imitated act in California.

• • • Polly Grant Hall, ever-ready pianist, receives fan letters addressed to "Polly Grandpaw" and "Polly Graf Hall"—mayhap not so much of an indictment of KFI-KECA announcers as of careless listening.





SILHOUETTES



WHETHER she's portraying a fiery Mexican damsel named Lily Laguna, with a manner and accent that fools real Mexicans, or singing old English and Appalachian ballads to her guitar, or languishing before the microphone as Gladys, the bride of Simpy Fitts in "Simpy and Gladys," you can count on Elsbeth Frellesen's ability to hold an audience.

As Lily, NBC star is re-creating a type she knows better than most persons—the Mexican peon transplanted to upper California. As Gladys, she's a comic and character actress second to none, and when she sings ballads she does so as a keen student of the folk songs of England and America.

"And then," she reminds you with a flash of Elsbethian humor, "I kind of like those funny old songs, just for themselves. The sadder they are, the more I enjoy singing them."

Elsbeth was born in San Miguel, California, and spent her childhood there and in Salinas, where her family later moved. Her father was a physician whose practice extended through the countryside, and Elsbeth used to accompany him on his visits to patients. The families of the Mexican laborers who had come to the Salinas district to work in the fields were included in many of these visits, and before Elsbeth was six she was exhibiting her inborn

talent for mimicry by lapsing into their dialect and mannerisms, sometimes to the consternation of her family. Her father was a student of the Appalachian music and folk lore, having spent much time in the eastern mountains in earlier years, and he taught

Elsbeth most of the wailing ballads she still sings to her guitar.

Elsbeth was just four years old when she made her first "professional" appearance—at a show in the family barn. She charged five cents admission—"I have a Scotch mother," she explains—and made money. But her first real stage work came at the age of eighteen, at the old Alcazar theater, in San Francisco. She had just completed her Freshman year at Mills College and she liked the stage so well she never went back

to college. From the Alcazar she went to the Morosco theater in Los Angeles, where she played under Henry Miller for a season or two, then pictures claimed her. She discovered she liked writing for the films better than acting in them, and she was one of the first "gag-men" of her sex to invade the Fox lot. Then she took a flier in the newspaper business, working for the Los Angeles *Record* and later the Los Angeles *Examiner*, before she entered radio.

She appeared before the microphone in many roles—as a singer, as shopping advisor, a household editor and character actress, before she joined the National Broadcasting staff. Now she engages in character work, playing a Danish cook, the fiery Lily Laguna, founded upon a succession of Mexican maids in her own household, and other nationalities and types, all with gusto. When she isn't making radio audiences chuckle at her dialects or ga-ga gags, she's usually to be found entertaining a group of fellow radio artists, between programs. Music is her favorite means of relaxation; her favorite writers are Corey Ford, Charles Dickens and D. H. Lawrence; her hobby is collecting foreign recipes and cooking dinners with them, and she likes Persian cats better than any other pet—has been known to have as many as thirteen of them at one time.



SYDNEY DIXON, tenor soloist and executive, names Muskegon, Michigan, as his birthplace and Chicago as the scene of his grammar school days. He studied engineering at the University of Washington and Columbia (graduated from the latter in 1922), and voice culture with prominent teachers in New York. After a concert tour in Canada, Mr. Dixon appeared in opera in the Northwest. He is six feet tall, weighs 230 pounds, has blue eyes and dark hair. Is married. Of English ancestry.

DX fans are often puzzled by the time difference throughout the world, and have difficulty in computing the time at distant points with respect to the local time. Particularly is this true in the short-wave field, where foreign DX reception is not only possible, but a regular occurrence. For instance, when the Pacific network gives us the London rebroadcasts, no doubt many listeners are puzzled to know the hour in London corresponding to Pacific time. The accompanying World Time Chart answers all questions concerning world time.


The local time, under the "Pacific" heading, corresponds to the time indicated on the same

horizontal line in any other part of the world. It is seen that 2 a. m. here is 10 a. m. in London, 9:30 p. m. in New Zealand, 8 p. m. in Sydney, 7 p. m. in Japan, etc. If you should hear Manila on short waves at 6 a. m., you will know that it is 10 p. m. there. In order to determine whether it is the same day, or the preceding or following day, follow this rule: Crossing from dark to light area at midnight, indicates the following day. Crossing from light to dark area indicates preceding day. As an example, 4 a. m. here is 9 p. m. in Tokio of the preceding day.
