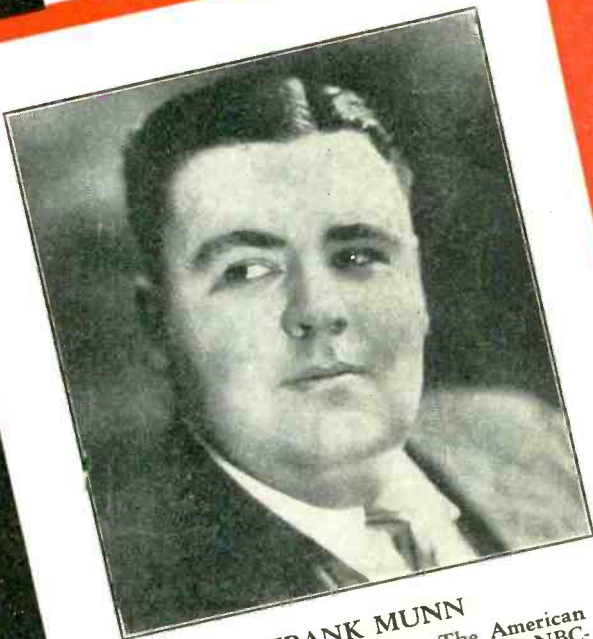

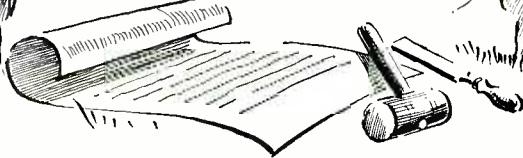

ARE YOU SATISFIED?

BROADCAST WEEKLY sounds a warning and makes a plea. Radio is still in its infancy. Its stupendous possibilities and potential power for good or evil transcend the human imagination. Already it has revolutionized communication throughout the civilized world and effected sweeping changes in the attitudes and activities of its inhabitants. As you sit at home tonight comfortably ensconced in your favorite easy chair, summoning entertainment and inspiration from the ends of the earth at will, give a thought to the *future* of radio. Whether this infant prodigy grows toward greater service and broader benefactions or metamorphoses into a mere moneymaking machine of capitalistic monopoly depends entirely on your own alert interest, outspoken expression, and active support of those agencies sincerely dedicated to radio progress.

Do present programs meet your entire approval? Are broadcasting stations guilty of sins or omissions which conflict with public interest or your own personal enjoyment? How can radio increase its humanitarian value, alleviate present economic hardships, and speed the return of prosperity? Can you conceive ways of utilizing broadcast facilities to improve representative government? Speak up, and keep on speaking. A stream can rise no higher than its source. The inspiration and direction that emanate from the audience itself will ever continue to be the exact measure of radio progress and achievement.

Silence signifies disinterestedness or approval, invites stagnation, and automatically encourages commercial interests to appropriate broadcasting to their own ends in possible disregard of public welfare and individual rights. Big business stares covetously at control of the air as the richest prize of modern times. The present exercise of this control by the listeners themselves is neither more permanent nor effective than their fulfillment of the duty and obligation

such control entails. Though the inherent right of a democratic people, at the slightest show of indifference it quickly becomes a mere political shibboleth, the actual power passing into the hands of organized capital eagerly outstretched to receive it. And once such control is lost to the public, its return is difficult if not impossible of attainment, as has been vividly and repeatedly demonstrated by other similar losses.

The *conscientious* exercise of that control can stimulate further radio development and progress exceeding even the most sanguine expectations of its most ardent supporters. Who shall say that in addition to its colossal contributions to entertainment, education, religion, and home happiness radio will not also ultimately achieve the political salvation of the nation?

Eternal vigilance is the price of safety. If the people of today are to continue to reap these benefits in ever-increasing measure and number, and prevent so great a patrimony being jeopardized for future generations, then lethargy and indifference must cease and every radio listener here and now resolve to let his voice be heard and his interest known.

Your congressmen are sworn to obey your mandates. Instruct them. The Federal Radio Commission at Washington is the people's radio tribunal to which all broadcasting stations must apply semi-annually for license and answer for their conduct. Communicate your will to your officials. The stations themselves need, seek, and welcome your comments and criticisms. They are powerless to conform unless you see to it they are informed. **BROADCAST WEEKLY** is dedicated solely to your service, its editorial page a medium for giving effective expression and widespread circulation to your opinions and suggestions. What are they? Guide us. Speak fully and frankly, that this page and your entire magazine may be edited with maximum benefit to you and to radio.

The gang has been making personal appearances lately in the Northwest. . . . Cecil Solly, the station's garden talker, brought a group of canaries with him when he appeared as guest artist on the Carnival Hour recently.

Alfred Hertz is now batoning the Standard Symphony Orchestra. . . . Donald Cope has written the play for the KPO Drama Hour on February 13 at 8:30 o'clock, entitled "Going Home." . . . Tom Mitchell is still receivin' 'em. His latest gift from "an ardent fan" is a beautiful miniature piano. . . . Harry Barris and Loyce Whiteman are back in Hollywood after a few months in New York. . . . The NBC telephone operators received more than 700 calls from fans wanting to know the whereabouts of Cecil and Sally the first night they went off the air and the first day's mail after their absence brought more than 100 letters . . . SILHOUETTES

THERE probably isn't a busier man around the Seattle stations than Alexander Schuss, the gent who is master of ceremonies on the Mardi Gras program from KJR via the NBC.

Besides all his radio work, he is showing folks that he is somewhat of a coach by turning out winning football, basketball, and baseball teams at the O'Dea High School in Seattle. And at Washington, too, he develops the freshman basketballers for varsity work in later years.

Tack on to these activities his scholastic work at the "U." Al is just completing his law course, and he wouldn't in the least be surprised if he found himself to be a lawyer some day.

This Schuss boy was born in little ol' New York twenty-seven years ago. When he was eighteen, the lad came West with his parents, his father going in business with one of Al's uncles.

After completing his high school education at the high school of Chehalis, Washington, he entered the University of Washington.

It was while he was announcing over the public address system the field events in the Husky stadium that the thought came to him that he might like radio announcing. The result was that in the early part of 1929 he dashed

up to KJR for a trial, and he obtained his start over the wires of the American Broadcasting Company, the network which later cu-plunked. But Al was among the few who stuck it out, and so here he is.

Alex has a couple of inches to go yet before he will be a six-footer, and he has just a

wee bit more weight than ordinary. He has auburn-brown wavy hair that parts almost in the middle. His complexion is that natural pinkish tint which always goes nicely with reddish flowing locks.

Needless to say, Al takes an active interest in nearly all sports. He likes action, and he just couldn't be indoors all day long. A Mrs. Schuss, his wife, helps, too, to entertain him.

Thus, we have learned something about Al Schuss. He is not positive what he will do in the far-away future—it might be law—but whatever it is and wherever it is, we can trust that he will be able to earn his bread and butter, anyway.

SINGER of comedy and ballad songs for six years with Jimmy Joy's orchestra during far wanderings over the country Andy Andrews, musical comedian has decided to stay put for a while and has joined the Don Lee staff where his humorous songs have begun to form a welcome part of the Happy-Go-Lucky hour and other programs. Andy got his fill of travel in those six years before referred to, and having been, as he puts it, "married to the same girl for quite a number of years" began to have visions of a home.

A University of Nebraska youth, Andy joined station KFAB at Lincoln in that state, when it was founded in 1923. His fame as a singer soon spread, and the engagement with Joy followed. Although primarily a comedy and ballad singer, Andy wields a wicked fist — or whatever one uses as a composer. Modest to the point of secrecy about his songs he admits, at least, to the authorship of—"There Goes a Horse."

EVERYTHING is just "ginger peaches" with Jeannie Lang. Petite, vivacious and collegiate, she first got a "big bang" out of life when she made her bow to the world in St. Louis, December 17, 1911. She was small enough then, but no one suspected she'd go through life abbreviated as "Half Pint," "Peanut," and "Spark Plug."

Although Jeannie's earliest dreams and ambitions were aimed at a theatrical career, she was preceded by three brothers who always were on hand to wallop any fancy ideas out of her, and a father and mother who, like most parents, were dead against it.

A leading rôle in the high school musical comedy production cinched her determination, however, and she took matters in her own hands. She called upon the manager of a local theatre, who was a friend of the family. He was quite unaware that Jeannie had come to apply for a job without the full sanction of her parents, so he gave her a small part. The parents eventually threw up their hands in resignation, and Jeannie hammered at all opportunities vigorously.

The first real coup d'état loomed when Brooke Johns, over six feet tall and looking for a small feminine foil, appeared at the theatre. Jeannie persuaded him that she was just the girl he needed. Waiting backstage to go on, however, she suffered such agonies of fright that she fainted. Brooke Johns nonchalantly

picked her up and carried her before the footlights with him, and when she "came to" he was singing her song for her. She did not utter a note. That was two and a half years ago.

When the Langs went visiting in California, friends at the Universal studio conducted them on a tour. Paul White-man was commencing production on the "King of Jazz" and Jeannie was introduced to

him. He offered her a screen and microphone test. Both were so successful that, without further hesitation, she was given several numbers to do in the picture.

Hammerstein later sent for her to come to New York for a part in "Ballyhoo." Upon its conclusion, Jeannie returned to the coast and resumed radio work at KFI and movie shorts with Warner Brothers. Then came a telegram from Jack Denny, offering her a job as soloist with

his orchestra, and Jeannie went East.

It was Pontiac who came through with the hoped-for "commercial." She is now heard on that program over CBS stations along with Colonel Stoopnagle and Budd, gigantic Bill O'Neal, and Andre Kostelanetz. The program originates in the Chamber Music Hall of Carnegie Hall. Naturally, Jeannie gets a "big bang" out of it.

FAY FRASER, active in radio work for the past ten years (knows it from every possible angle), writes continuity, arranges programs, sings, etc.

For the past three years her hobby has been "interior decoration." Every Tuesday afternoon, on "Feminine Fancies," she may be heard giving one of her interesting and instructive talks on "The Home Beautiful."

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • One of the most unusual programs on the air originates in the studios of KEX, Portland. It is the "Circus Court of the Air," and is presented in the interest of the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children. The studio is fitted out as a real courtroom and is presided over by Circuit Judge, W. A. Ekwall. Special Prosecutor Barney Goldstein is the beetle-browed griller, and two attorneys for the defense are on hand, Robert Mautz and Herman Kenin. Kenin is familiar to musicgoers, having had one of the finest recording bands several years ago; he retired from the musical field to pursue the study and practice of law, and it is in the rôle of attorney that he makes his appearance on the program. Jimmy Richardson, well-known sports authority is heard as the hard-boiled and wise-cracking bailiff. Each week a prominent citizen is hailed before the court, is tried for a misdemeanor, and is fined accordingly. All proceeds go to the Shrine Hospital for Crippled Children.

• • • Almost everyone with an office takes pride in some desk ornament of one kind or another—ash tray, photo or cigarette container. Henry Grossman, Columbia's Chief Division Engineer, decorates his office with an enormous burned out water-cooled power tube, at least a yard long, from Columbia's transmitting station at Wayne, N. J. Each of these intricate glass creations cost \$480—there are 26 of them in the Wayne transmitter, and each of them lasts just about 1,000 hours. Then a new one's needed.

• • • Just before leaving for Boston with his band, Don Redman, Columbia's dusky

conductor, packed up a dozen pairs of roller sales in a special valise. It seems that Mistah Redman and his brethren are "that way" about roller-skating and always spend an hour after their evening shows rolling around a stretch of smooth asphalt. In New York their favorite spot is the Harlem River Speedway from three to five in the morning. Two taxis wait at the bottom of Coogan's Bluff while Don and a dozen of the faithful coast downhill at a terrific clip. The taxis haul them up—and they're off again.

• • • Elsbeth Frellesen, the NBC entertainer, knows how the owner of the ugly duckling felt. About a year ago, a stray kitten, bedraggled and thin, attached itself to Elsbeth who didn't have the heart to turn it out. She kept it and named it Buzz. Recently Buzz, now a full grown Persian, was entered in the California Cat Show—the only feline permitted to enter without a pedigree—and although his family tree was missing, he possessed so many "points" that he won second place in his class.

• • • The greatest array of broadcast talent and equipment ever assembled for a single event will be brought into play by Columbia Broadcasting System, when it covers the inauguration of Franklin Delano Roosevelt as President of the United States in Washington, D. C., on March 4. Herbert B. Glover, CBS News Director, has drawn up plans for the reporting of the activities of President-elect Roosevelt at every point of importance, from the Capital, at one end of famous Pennsylvania Avenue, to the White House at the other, to a background of martial music. The

announcing staff will be headed by Ted Husing, he will be assisted by a staff of veteran commentators, including Frederic William Wile, Edw. C. Hill, and H. V. Kaltenborn, plus a number of men from the regular announcing staff. The broadcast will begin at 6 a. m. and last until 1 p. m., Pacific Standard Time. Description of the Inaugural Ball will be heard from 7 to 8 p.m.

• • • Rudy Vallee, at the microphone for one of his Fleischmann hours is serious in mien, intent on his job. He conducts his orchestra with movements of the hands, swaying of the body; he uses no baton. When he sings, Rudy steps from the conductor's stand and goes close to the microphone, his voice inaudible a few feet away in the studio. He closes his eyes if he is singing a tune he is familiar with. He does this as an aid to his memory and to help him concentrate on the words and music. He adopts an easy, informal garb, with collar loosened to give his vocal chords free play. When introducing guests, or engaging in dialogue with them, Rudy appears less serious, smiles and gestures freely. As a veteran of the air waves, he gives invaluable advice on microphone technique to the guests he brings from the stage and movies.

• • • Ivar Kallin, violinist member of the staff orchestra, unexplainedly dropped his case on his way down the hallway toward KNX's main studio. Down on his knees he went, flung open the case, to find that his precious fiddle was split back and front. To any true musician this is a major tragedy—so it was to Ivar. But Kallin took the fiddle to one who mends such

things, and was told that the instrument after being repaired might be improved musically and certainly would be enhanced as to material value.

• • • There is one very definite spot in KFI's studio B, where Silvio Lavatelli is not allowed to sit. Technicians soon discovered that when Silvio parked himself in a certain location and played his beloved 'cello, its tones fairly blew the transmitter off the air.

• • • Ben Alley, the bridegroom, received 104 wedding presents from radio fans. . . . A few years ago, Lennie Hayton was attending boys' camps, and now he's conducting one of the most important programs in radio. . . . The Roslyn, L. I. Baron Munchausen Jack Pearl Club members answer their phones with "Vas you dere?" . . . Anson Weeks possesses New York's most energetic band because he adds six new tunes every week to his band's repertoire. . . . Leo Reisman is collecting the love songs of all the ages for future orchestration. . . . Jesse Crawford likes to play "Barrelhouse" organ, which is rhythm of the super torrid type. . . . Mildred Bailey is to be spotted soon on an important commercial originating outside of New York. . . . Cliff Hall, straight man for Jack Pearl on the Magic Carpet Thursday nights, is camera shy and refuses to be photographed.

• • • Although he has had long experience in radio dramatics, Bob White, who portrays Dr. Petrie in "Fu Manchu Mystery Stories," cannot drop the gestures he acquired on the legitimate stage. While his left hand is occupied in holding the script, his right hand is never idle. If the script reads, "Look! I found this luck piece," the hand will dart into his pocket and a coin will be thrust convincingly under the nose of

the person to whom the remark is addressed. In intensely dramatic scenes the operators tremble for the safety of the microphone.

• • • Frank Black, NBC maestro, has just gotten what he terms his proudest possession, a collection of three complete orchestra scores of works by Felix Mendelssohn. They comprise the "St. Paul" oratorio, the "Elijah" oratorio, and a group including his "Hymn of Praise," "Ninety-first Psalm," and the "One Hundred and Fourteenth Psalm." They were published in 1836 and the binding bears these words: "Presented to Mr. John Marry by the Congregation of the Methodist New Connexion, Ashton-Under-Lyne, as a Testimonial of Respect for his Service as Leader of the Choir," December 24, 1853. Black believes there are not more than two other copies of the first edition.

• • • Charley (Capt. Henry) Winninger and Lanny Ross, were among the radio celebrities at a party for Amos 'n' Andy, staged at the Hotel St. Regis in New York, recently by Clarabelle Walsh, well-known New York theatrical patron. Mrs. Amos and Mrs. Andy were there, too, and Mrs. Walsh herself made sure Madame Queen wasn't absent by impersonating the famous beauty shop proprietress.

• • • George A. Presby, better known as "Archie," has been named assistant program manager of KGW, Portland, Oregon.

• • • The authors of the serial, "The Seal of the Don," Eugene Carman and Richard Gerson, are both native sons, Gerson having been born in San Francisco and Carman in Los Angeles. The colorful history of their native state has always held a fascination for them and while their writings

have included a number of other radio features as well as magazine stories and newspaper articles, their crowning ambition has been to present by means of radio a faithful story of early California.

Historical details of "The Seal of the Don" prove to be accurate in every respect, therefore, as both the writers have had their own families and innumerable friends who were thoroughly familiar with the events of which they write, to serve as authorities for their characters and adventures.

• • • General Ching, one of the two Mongolian larks who have been added to the bird choir in NBC's Crosscuts program, surprised Dr. Laurence L. Cross, his owner, the other morning. In the bottom of his cage, which adjoins that of General Mah, the other Mongolian lark, lay a tiny egg—necessitating a change in nomenclature. General Ching has been rechristened General Mah-Mah.

• • • Gertrude Niesen, Columbia's vivacious young torch singer, is a paradoxical linguist. Born of Scandinavian parents, Gertrude sings in English and Italian, speaks French fluently, and her favorite language is Latin, at which she excelled in school.

• • • Ben Klassen, NBC tenor, started life as Bernhard Peter Klassen, but became Ben during his school days, because nobody ever could remember how to spell his first name correctly.

• • • Those Boswell Sisters can not listen to radio programs at their home now. The reason is that their manager, Harry Leedy, gave Connie a great Dane puppy for her birthday. The pup howls every time the radio is turned on and he howls in a deep bass voice. The dog hasn't been named yet, but chances are Connie, Vet and Martha will decide to call him Critic.

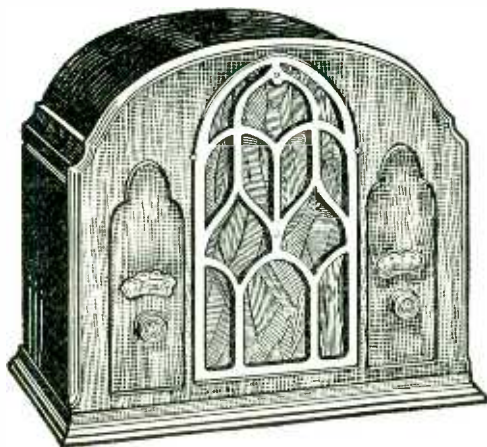

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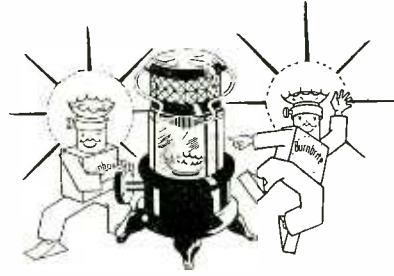

DX fans are often puzzled by the time difference throughout the world, and have difficulty in computing the time at distant points with respect to the local time. Particularly is this true in the short-wave field, where foreign DX reception is not only possible, but a regular occurrence. For instance, when the Pacific network gives us the London rebroadcasts, no doubt many listeners are puzzled to know the hour in London corresponding to Pacific time. The accompanying World Time Chart answers all questions concerning world time.

The local time, under the "Pacific" heading, corresponds to the time indicated on the same

horizontal line in any other part of the world. It is seen that 2 a. m. here is 10 a. m. in London, 9:30 p. m. in New Zealand, 8 p. m. in Sydney, 7 p. m. in Japan, etc. If you should hear Manila on short waves at 6 a. m., you will know that it is 10 p. m. there. In order to determine whether it is the same day, or the preceding or following day, follow this rule: Crossing from dark to light area at midnight, indicates the following day. Crossing from light to dark area indicates preceding day. As an example, 4 a. m. here is 9 p. m. in Tokio of the preceding day.

RCA Announces Two New Models

A new, low-priced Bi-Acoustic model featuring a Tonalite control system by which "you see what you hear—and control it," and a handy little set of the submidset type that operates on either A. C. or D. C. current, have been announced by the RCA Victor Company.

The Bi-Acoustic model, R-90, which will sell at \$110, is the practical equivalent in performance of the R-78 receiver which met with great favor during the past season, plus four new features summed up as the Tonalite control system.

The Tonalite control system comprises four separate controls mounted on the panel, each one illuminated so that the eye can assist the ear in obtaining flawless tone reproduction at all times. It includes a visual tuning indicator, consisting of an illuminated scale directly over the dial. As the station is tuned in, a needle swings back and forth, and at maximum swing indicates that the receiver is in exact resonance with the station, eliminating the inaccuracies of tuning by ear alone. A Hi-Lo tone control differs from all previous tone controls in that it controls the low frequencies as well as the high. In the colored illuminated band above this control, the listener can determine the exact amount of tone shading required. An illuminated Tonalite indicator is added to the standard RCA Victor volume control; a colored light rises in the opening as the

volume is increased, and is especially useful for controlling the volume when tuning in a new station. An improved noise suppressor for reduction of between-station noises is also equipped with a Tonalite indicator.

The new RCA Victor R-27 is a tiny type of personal receiver which has become so popular recently. It is housed in an attractive cabinet measuring slightly more than six inches in height, about eleven inches in width, and a little over four inches in depth. It operates on any 100-125 volt alternating or direct current and is priced at \$19.95.

Silver-Marshall Factory Resumes Production

After being closed down for three months the Silver-Marshall factory has been reopened and production resumed on models that were shown at the last R. M. A. Trade Show, according to a report received from Chicago. The company is continuing the former policy of selling direct to dealers.

The company was declared bankrupt on October 29, 1932, and a few days later was sold at auction as a going concern to George A. New Portable Radio Announced

A new portable radio set that operates on either alternating or direct current has been announced by the Ansley Radio Laboratory, 147 West Twenty-third Street, New York.

The set is in a black leatherette traveling case, measuring 12x16x8 inches, and the weight complete is twenty-seven pounds. The set requires no aerial or ground. An 8-tube superheterodyne circuit is employed, using 3-39s; 1-37; 1-85; 2-28s in push-pull and 1-80. It is equipped with automatic volume control, variable tone control, and Magnavox dynamic speaker. The retail price is \$59.50, complete with tubes.

Sub-Midget Radios Gaining in Popularity—Here to Stay

The sub-midget or cigar box type of radio set is rapidly increasing in popularity and there is no question but it is here to stay.

Because of their ordinary tone quality and limited range, however, sets of this type will never take the place of the larger and finer toned receiver as a quality musical instrument for the home. But their compactness makes them ideally suited for special purposes where small size and light weight are the principal considerations. Sets of this type have become very popular with business men for office use, and among commercial travelers, tourists, etc.

Many excellent makes of sub-midget receivers are now on the market. Some are designed to operate on 6, 32 or 110-volt current, either AC or DC, and may be used in the automobile as well as in the home or office. Others offer a tuning range that covers both the broadcast and short

wave bands and bring in the police calls.

Current models of sub-midget sets are priced between \$20 and \$25 and are available in a wide variety of designs and cabinet finishes.

Manufacturers report a very rapidly growing demand for receivers of this type and some are considerably behind on orders. Jobbers report sales good, especially to dealers in the larger cities and towns. Several dealers interviewed said their sales of sub-midget sets were showing a good turnover.
