

## Appreciation Must Be Shown

THE coming and going of radio programs has more than seasonal significance. Quite obviously if results were satisfactory and sustained programs could, and in most cases would continue. The nation's successful business enterprises check advertising returns accurately and impartially, and would not reasonably discontinue media producing profitable results. Therefore when a program is suspended or eliminated the one and only logical explanation is that it did not or would not continue to pay the sponsor.

If the program is good then for its passing the audience alone is to blame in not manifesting its appreciation adequately. If the program be unworthy its own faults have caused its failure and its going is good riddance. Never is the discontinuance of a program due to fortuitous causes or to any inherent weakness in radio itself. Either audience apathy or the sponsor's poor judgment is directly culpable always.

The value to business of a force that can simultaneously "sell" seventeen million homes exceeds that of any other power known to modern merchandising. The resultfulness of radio "advertising" has been proved so often and conclusively as now to be almost axiomatic, when properly conceived and directed. And a magic that can summon to the family fireside the world's leading educators, entertainers, statesmen, scientists and religious exponents thereby becomes one of the funda-

mental factors in the home life of the nation. Wherefore radio demands that, to sustain these benefits, its own progress, and the march of civilization both audience and sponsors now unreservedly accept and diligently discharge their respective responsibilities. Not radio but human intelligence is on trial, and the crucial test is at hand. Not only the future of radio but of civilization is at stake. You who have followed radio closely during recent weeks will recognize the timeliness of this warning, the urgency of this need, the necessity for immediate and concerted action.

Neither the audience nor the sponsor can take each other for granted. There must be reciprocal confidence, sympathy, understanding and the giving of value received. In a country where modern equipment, experienced labor and competent brains are readily available to every enterprise, few products possess such exclusive merit the public cannot permit its gratitude and good will to play a large part in guiding its purchases. Radio broadcasting offers unequalled facilities for creating such gratitude and converting it into profit. But programs **must** be endowed with audience appeal, render an audience service, and be sustained by audience patronage.

The one way to get favorite programs back and assure the continuance of programs you like is to write sponsors **often**, specify their merchandise, and be sure to mention their radio program as the reason when you buy. And there is no time like the present to begin.

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# SILHOUETTES

A SLIM little person whose dark eyes match her first name, and whose fair hair harmonizes with her last one—that's Rita Lane, NBC lyric soprano. Add an elfin wit, purely Irish, and you have the sum total of one of the most interesting personalities on the air.

Rita was born in San Francisco and received her early education here, later attending the University of Pennsylvania. While in the East she studied voice at the Curtis Institute, and coached with Frank La Forge. Then followed the thrilling experience of her young life time—a trip to Europe, to complete her musical education.

"What did I do first? Well—I got lost," she muses. "That was in Paris, where I spent all my allowance on perfumes and clothes, and just had enough cash left to get back to Milan, where a friend of my family was to meet me. I got off the train at the wrong station or wrong time or something—and there I was, lost again. By this time I knew enough to go to the American consul and he found my friends for me, and I settled down to music for awhile."

"Settling down" being a typically Rita method of getting into more excitement, it included eight months of coaching with the noted Italian teacher, Malatesta, and numerous adventures, such as a flight with a young Italian aviator over Milan. The plane happened to have dual controls and the young American passenger spied them. The pilot was gallant, and before long Rita was swooping all through the Italian sky, guiding the craft here and there with pride. The great cathedral, topped by a statue of St.

Christopher, attracted her attention and she dipped for a closeup of the saint.

Dipped just an inch or two too close and sheared off the great bronze hat of Christopher as neatly as with a pair of scissors. The ship wasn't harmed but was the ambitious young flier's face red!

Giving St. Christopher, a close shave didn't injure her musical standing in Milan, however, for she made her operatic debut as Gilda in

"Rigoletto" shortly afterward, and scored a triumph. Then followed a tour with the operatic organization, with appearances in Bologna, Naples and other cities. When the tour ended, Rita's natural love for keeping on the move wouldn't let her remain in Milan. She bought a small car and started on a trip of her own all over Europe, traveling through Germany, Switzerland, Spain, France and Austria.

"It was wonderful," she claims, "for I avoided all the

cities and towns advertised for tourists and jogged from one funny little village to another. Most places I couldn't speak the language, but I made signs and got along famously."

She ended up on the Russian border, where cables from her worried family in America persuaded her to come home and not venture into the unsettled territory beyond. Upon her return to California she went to Hollywood, where she had rôles in several pictures, including the Hollywood Revue; also in several singing shorts. Six months on Fanchio and Marco time, touring the United States, followed that. Then Rita returned to her native San Francisco and joined the KPO staff, becoming a member of the NBC organization when the National Broadcasting Company acquired KPO.

Rita is one of the soloists on the Melody Mixers program, on which she appears two afternoons a week: she sings in Saxotunes, Mondays and Wednesdays and in Dance Moods, Wednesdays.

Away from the NBC studios the pretty little singer enjoys most of the pursuits of other twenty-three year old girls. She plays golf regularly, breaking 100 usually, and tennis now and then. Plays a good game of contract, and loves to dance. She spends a good deal of time with books and her literary tastes are catholic, ranging from biography to Russian authors, and from them to mystery stories, read late at night, by preference. She has a cat named Baci, which means "kisses" in Italian and a police dog named Baron, who was given to her by Johnny Patrick (Cecil to "Cecil and Sally" fans).



CLARENCE HAYES ran away from home when he was twelve to work up the Mississippi on an old time show boat. But he was marched back to Richmond, Va., and to school as soon as he was located. Not until he finished college was the parental vigil lifted. The world was his then, and immediately he jumped into the entertaining business. He is over six feet tall, weighs 170 pounds, is blond and has blue eyes. Married. One child. Speaks with a fascinating drawl and says, "You-all."

# ETHER GLEANINGS

THE East is finally becoming conscious to the fact that we Westerners are producing some good radio programs. Incomprehensible as it may seem to them, it is the truth.

That our elite cousins on the far side of the continent are beginning to recognize San Francisco is borne out in the news that "One Man's Family," a favorite among the drama presentations hereabouts for the past year, is being "piped" horizontally across the map and released by thirty-seven stations affiliated with the NBC. And in the words of the gent south of the Mason-Dixie line, "that's powerful good news."

Good news to San Francisco, to the NBC quarters here, to the author, producer, actors and the firm which sponsors it locally.

Good news because it means that "One Man's Family" which has been "howlin' 'em over" in the Western radio audience since April 29, 1932, is the first dramatic serial type broadcast to be released out of San Francisco of the West for the ears of the rest of the nation's dialers.

Good news because it means that the East is recognizing the fact that we do broadcast high type material out here.

On various occasions the Atlantic side has broadcast orchestral programs originating in the San Francisco studios of NBC but never before a dramatic program of this type.

Carlton E. Morse's drama, which has set all endurance records for serial yarns originating in San Francisco, has met with tremendous success. It is sponsored here on the coast. The NBC thinks enough of it to present it coast to coast without a sponsor. It will be broadcast Wednesday nights from 9:30 to 10 o'clock Eastern Daylight Saving Time, which means that the actors have to put it on here at 5:30 p. m. Pacific Standard Time.

Our brother tuner-inners in the East will hear "One Man's Family" from the very beginning. There's one consolation, we'll be a year ahead of 'em. With the addition of the eastern network there is now a grand total of forty-six stations releasing "One Man's Family."

The appointment of Harold Bock as the KYA News Reporter was a happening of the past week. He succeeds Darrel Donnell who went over to KFRC as the news broadcaster for the San Francisco Examiner.

Bock has a nightly broadcast of world events from 9:45 to 10 p.m. over KYA except on Saturdays and Sundays.

He is widely known in radio, newspaper and theatrical circles in San Francisco. He has been San Francisco representative for Variety for the past two years and eastern radio publications. Previous to that he was a reporter on a Long Beach paper.

You've heard the new voice m.c.-ing that Don Lee affair—Feminine Fancies? It belongs to Edward Fitzgerald, who came here not so long ago from the Pacific Northwest where he achieved tremendous popularity on one of the local stations there. He's been actor, newspaperman and business man. If you've caught any of those clever Connie Moffatt programs, which boom out over KFRC on Mondays and Friday at 7:15 o'clock, you'll note that the same pleasant voice is assisting Connie in disseminating what's what and why in feminine and masculine wearing apparel.

And by the way, did you know that Connie's program is quite a fashion show itself. I mean right there in the KFRC studios. She makes her appearance at the station garbed in exactly the same outfit that she describes in her chats before the mike. We're waiting till she talks about the new bathing costumes.

Josef Hornik, baton wielding maestro at the NBC camp, has returned to the mike as "The Music Doctor." KPO transmits it from 9 to 9:30 p. m. on Saturdays.

\* \* \*

Another old timer has been polished up and stuck back on the ether waves from the NBC. It's the Medicine Show, which is now being KPO'd from 7:30 to 8 o'clock on Saturdays. The new cast includes Charles McAlister, who is "Doc" Abimederth, the medicine man and Charlie Marshall as "Buckskin Charlie."

One of the more recent groups signed for KTAB appearances by Bob Roberts, manager, is the Hawaiian Serenaders, a four-some of Kanaka instrumentalists.

\* \* \*

Two important radio dance band changes come about this month. Tom Gerun and his Bal Tabarin group leave for the Chicago World's Fair and during their absence Kay Kyser and his instrumentalists will hold forth at the Bal, where the NBC has a remote control pickup.

Ted Fio Rito and his Hotel St. Francis orchestra will be succeeded by Gus Arnheim's band. KFRC and the Don Lee network broadcast from there.

An speaking of dance bands, Anson Weeks grand musical organization are going to do the playing on the M.J.B. Demi Tasse Revue, beginning Monday night, June 5. Herb Settlemeyer, ad boss for the coffee company, tipped us off, too that he's planning a couple of surprises on the new Demi Tasse Revue set-up and judging by their past surprises, we're all ears waiting on the new gag. They've put forth some first rankers in their several years on the air.

With Washington observing the Daylight Saving Time, dialers in that state are getting their radio programs that originate out of the territory just one hour later than usual. For instance programs released in San Francisco at 8 p. m. are heard up there at 9 p. m.

Betty Boop gets an increase in radio time.

The famous cartoon character, brought to life by Mae Questel, is now being heard over the NBC-KPO setup on Wednesdays at 5:30 p. m. and Fridays at 2:30 p. m.

\* \* \*

NBC mike reporters will be on the job at Washington, D. C., on June 14, when President Roosevelt is given the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws by the Catholic University of America. The ceremonies attending the affair and the President's speech of acceptance will be carried by the network, being released by the chain in California from 8 to 9 a. m.

The Philip Morris Company, makers of those Marlboro and other ciggies, have gone coast to coast on NBC, broadcasting a program twice weekly from 8:45 to 9 o'clock on Monday and Wednesday nights. Ferde Grofe's orchestra and Conrad Thibault, vocalist are the participants.

\* \* \*

We hear that Carnation-Albers isn't going to renew its contract on "Crosscuts from the Log of the Day" when it expires on June 10. Dr. Laurance Cross conducts the hour.

\* \* \*

Mystery surrounds the particulars pertaining to the special RCA-Victor radio broadcast over the NBC net from 11 to 12 o'clock California time on May 31. KGO will release it here.

\* \* \*

Bob Olsen, one time favorite of the air audience hereabouts is staging a steady come-back over KTAB.

\* \* \*

KYA was a participant in the World International Education Association broadcasts which were presented recently. Radio stations operating under the auspices of the Association broadcast special programs in Australia,

Japan, China, Hungary, Austria, Italy and France, at consecutive hours during the day and KYA finished off the program with a half hour presentation between 3:30 and 4 o'clock which was participated in by San Francisco high school students.

And now its coming to regular stage scenery in the radio studios. Plans are being drawn now for the construction of an old time mountain cabin for the KFWI studios which will be used in connection with the Range Riders' program which is released from 12 noon to 12:30 p. m. daily.

\* \* \*

KFWI has installed a remote control pick-up at Tait's new night club in San Francisco and is broadcasting the entertainment from there nightly from midnight until 12:30 a. m. except on Sundays. Talent parading on the program includes Boris Kramarenko and his Royal Russian Balalaika orchestra, Rae Bourbon's Ensemble from the famous "B.B.B." Cellar and "Backyard" in Hollywood.



# MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • That new master of ceremonies on the Feminine Fancies Hour, heard from KFRC, over the Columbia-Don Lee network at 3 o'clock daily, is Ed Fitzgerald, whose varied career of showmanship on the Pacific Coast ranks his with the best known names of the theatre. Fitzgerald, who incidentally, is heard also with Connie Moffatt on KFRC, started on the legitimate stage in 1909, as an actor with Bert Lytell in New York. He continued on the stage until the war, when he joined the Imperial Royal Flying Corps in 1915. In 1921 he again returned to the theater, but this time in the front of the house, managing theatres for Pantages, Henry Duffy, Fox West Coast and Warner Brothers in major cities throughout the West, closing this phase of his history in San Francisco when the Warner Theatre on Market Street was sold. His first experience in radio came in Seattle when it became his duty to announce an organ concert broadcast by his theatre.

• • • Who says radio isn't conducive to romance? Modesta Mortensen, pretty auburn-haired violinist of the San Francisco Symphony Orchestra, and John C. Ribbe, National Broadcasting Company producer, met for the first time in a broadcasting studio during a rehearsal of the Standard Symphony Hour, in which Miss Mortensen played violin and Ribbe produced the program. Sunday, May 7, the two were married at a quiet ceremony in the bride's home in San Francisco, leaving the same day, for Carmel to spend their honeymoon there.

Miss Mortensen has been a member of the San Francisco Symphony for eight years. Ribbe has been with

the NBC for four years, he has produced the Standard Symphony Hour ever since the inception of this program, as well as a number of other microphone offerings.

• • • Claire Ingham has been added to the staff of KFWE in the presentation of monologue specialties to be heard over the station at various times. As yet no definite time has been set for Miss Ingham's program but in the very near future she will broadcast at a regular time weekly continuing Annie Hyde's "Tales of a London Street" monologues through which she became so well known to Bay area radio listeners some months ago.

• • • "London calling," and London calling those Boswell sisters. While Connie, Vet and Martha play vaudeville in this country in addition to broadcasting, British producers have literally been pleading with their manager Harry Leedy, to bring the girls over. A summer tour is being planned unless broadcasting commitments prevent it.

• • • Cliff Hall, straight man for Jack Pearl, the Thursday night Magic Carpet Baron Munchausen, buys four carnations a day and is never seen without one.

• • • They aren't all Pennsylvanians with Fred Waring. There's Stewart Churchill, the young tenor with a rich "choir boy" voice who sang the lead in Waring's Easter presentation of "Ave Maria." Churchill was born way out west in Kansas and was educated at the University of Michigan. Johnny Davis, the comic scat singer, hails from Brazil, Indiana, and once tooted the trumpet in Minneapolis and points

west. Babs Ryan and her brothers of the song trio come from Kansas City. But James "Poley" McClintock, the freak combination of foghorn and high C soprano, was born in Fred's home town of Tyrone, Pa. and was his classmate at Penn State.

• • • Roger Joseph, who has been portraying the romantic Pietro during the past year on KOMO's "For All the Family" program, recently returned to his old love—Shakespeare. Since he was graduated from the University of Washington two years ago, he has played in stock and enacted many diverse rôles on the air. He is now playing in "Treasure Hunt on Thunder Island," released over KOMO. He is twenty-four, tall, dark, and single.

• • • Gene Sullivan, of KYA "Sportsman's Corner" fame, was born near Guerneville, California. Gene never intended to go radio, although he had a fine baritone voice. After two years' gold prospecting in Arizona, and a short career in amateur boxing, he settled down to building contracting, singing a few programs after hours. Artists at the studio soon discovered Gene's ability as a fisherman and outdoor sportsman. Now Gene gives out to air listeners the same tips he formerly supplied only to fellow artists. He has that quick Irish wit, is well over 6 feet tall, is married and has two children.

• • • Amos 'n' Andy are utilizing their week-ends to set new records. It has only been in the last few months that Correll and Gosden's broadcast schedule over NBC would allow them time to make personal appearances. Now that they have Saturday and Sunday off, they are giv-

ing hosts of fans who have followed them over the years an opportunity to see what they look like in real life. And do the fans like it? Last week-end, in Kansas City, the boys played to more than 20,000 persons in two days. Preceding week-ends in Atlantic City, Indianapolis, and Fort Wayne, had been other record breakers for those towns. Both of the boys got a tremendous "kick" out of meeting their followers of years' standing, face to face. It offers them a change from their night-after-night broadcasts with no audience—for even after years on the air neither can get away from the old "feel" of the theater.

• • • Frank Black, N B C musical director, doing research on classical music, has discovered that in the early days of Egypt, they had musical directors. Black has discovered that the first actual indication of a musical director is shown in a painting at El Bersheh, Egypt, which shows men transporting a colossal statue from a stone quarry and while there are 172 men laboring at the ropes, one is placed on the statue beating time for the singing. The custom of singing at work still pervades in Egypt, says Black.

• • • Jimmy Melton, N B C tenor, is one radio artist who doesn't mind meeting studio visitors. Before or after a broadcast the tenor is besieged by autograph hunters. Jimmy merely grins, grasps a pen and writes his name very carefully upon any scrap of paper that is thrust before him.

• • • Fannie Brice received a letter the other day from a youngster in a boarding-house in Lakewood, N. J., begging her to change the time of her program. It seems the girl, Patty Nathan, wanted to listen to another program while the boarders insisted on hearing

Fannie. Miss Brice thought the note so amusing that she forthwith sent Patty Nathan a small radio set. Now Patty can listen to the other program. Miss Brice broadcasts over the eastern NBC network only.

• • • Walter C. Kelly, the Virginia judge who has told his stories in nearly every country of the world, as well as every state in the Union, was chosen master of ceremonies for the Chase and Sanborn Hour, Sunday, May 14. Bert Lahr and Lee Sims and Ilomay Bailey continue with Rubinoff as features of the hour, but "The Case of Jane Doe," dramatic serial, was dropped.

• • • On April 18 Uncle Rod's Smile Club had its first anniversary on KTAB. Lieut. Dannenberg of "Old Ironsides" addressed one of the biggest audiences on the air on a local station. Mayor Morcom of Oakland appeared in the studio and told how proud he was in being a member of the club and what a wonderful work it was doing. While the Union gave Jess Stafford permission to bring his fourteen-piece dance band into the studio and furnish the music for the party. Thousands of cards and letters greeted Uncle Rod on the broadcast. It was "some" party.

• • • Charles Runyan, N B C pianist and organist who accompanies many of the singers who try out for radio work, has met some unique characters at auditions, but none like the lady elocutionist who appeared for a hearing the other day. She carefully detailed to Charlie the musical numbers she wished him to play as an accompaniment to her recitations, then took off her hat and coat, reached into her purse and pulled out a long black chiffon band which she tied around her head like a Roman charioteer, "just to get into the mood of

poetry," she explained to the mystified pianist.

• • • Ella Stankevich, the young Russian concert pianist who has been entertaining KFWI listeners Monday evenings was recently moved to a San Francisco hospital. Her condition is said to be not serious and Miss Stankevich is expected to return to the air audience within the very near future.

• • • Rush Hughes, the Langendorf Pictorial reporter whose swift, crackling news sketches are heard daily over an NBC-KGO network, says his mother must have named him Rush because she had a premonition of his future activities.

• • • When Anson Weeks was in his musical infancy at the Hotel Senator in Sacramento he spent quite a few days in Folsom Prison—not doing time, but teaching the boys the latest wrinkles, tunes, rhythms, and whatnot. Installed as the musical director of Hotel Mark Hopkins, he transferred his humanitarian activities to San Quentin. When he reached New York on his recent tour, he found the Big House at Sing Sing waiting for him—and he left them something to remember him by—in a list of new numbers for their repertoire including several of his own compositions. Warden Lawes, world's leading authority on penology took a personal interest in Week's work with the inmates. There has been a movement on foot to get permission to broadcast some of the splendid programs of prison orchestras in different parts of the country. Having resumed his duties at the Mark Hopkins, Weeks plans to take up the work at San Quentin where he left off.

He was the guest of Warden Lewis E. Lawes at dinner and then spent the evening giving the prisoners an intimate first-hand picture of world events and personalities.

• • • Isham Jones and his orchestra, after a current southern tour, New York theatre engagements and collegiate proms at Johns Hopkins, Penn State, Fordham and George Washington U., will return to the Columbia net-

work at the end of June. They'll be heard from the Ambassador Hotel in Atlantic City during the entire summer.

• • • The most comical thing Mary Wood, NBC soprano, ever saw happen in a studio, she says, was when a musical conductor fell off the stand in the middle of a heavy number. "He went down beating three-four time, and bobbed up again beating two-four time," says Mary.

• • • Rudy Vallee, after a season largely devoted to one-night appearances on the road between his Thursday evening broadcasts, will settle down for the summer at his old hotel dance post in New York City.

• • • Lee Sims, who with Hlomag Bailey, is now being starred on that coffee program Sunday nights at 4 p. m. over the NBC network, is a real radio veteran and his unique piano work has been a radio feature for 10 years. But the piano-vocal duet he and Miss Bailey do is a recent discovery.

• • • Mary Wood, NBC soprano, keeps that slim figure by bicycling around Lake Merritt in Oakland, California, for two hours every morning before she comes to the studio.

• • • Armand Girard, NBC basso, has played in thirty-five motion pictures.



Another nice feature of the Remler policy is the abolishing of the middle man in handling its products, thus giving the consumer more value and a better radio at a lower price.

But to get back to this little marvel of the radio age—the Remler Scottie—abide with me while I give you a little inside on the set.

Engineers at the Remler laboratories labored over the set for more than six months before they produced what they thought was the best possible receiver of its type. Only the finest of materials were used. Preciseness was most essential in such a little "watch-charm" receiver and they eventually gained that. Absolute safeness from fire hazard was necessary in order to get the approval of the laboratories of the Fire Insurance Underwriters and the fire underwriters of San Francisco, and that was accomplished. In fact, as we stressed at the beginning of this article, the Remler Scottie is the only set of its type, which operates both on A.C. or D.C. electric current, that has passed the approval of the Fire Underwriters. Other sets of its type cannot be used in San Francisco, Portland and some other Pacific coast cities, but the Scottie can. It is absolutely safe.

The Scottie—the finished product—was brought out on May 1, the neatest, ultra-smartest, classiest looking little receiver you ever laid your orbs on. It's a five-tube super-heterodyne. Its distinguishing features include translucent dial illumination and excellent tonal quality. And what struck us was its compactness, its tinyness. Why, you can put it under your arm, when you leave home in the morning, and take it to the office if there's some listening you want to do during the daylight hours when you're away from home and the family radio. It makes an ideal second radio in the home. And even if your office does have D.C. electric current, that

makes no difference to the Scottie. Just plug in it and it'll work just as good as at home.

And it is just the thing for those week-end trips into the country. Grab the Scottie, take it to your summer shack or seaside hotel or wherever you go. Remler's slogan: "Companionable as a Puppy" fits it perfectly. The Remler Scottie can be your companion wherever you go. It's so easy to carry. Oh yes, we almost forgot. There's a suede zipper carrying case that slips right over the Scottie with attractive handles which make it even more easy to carry the Scottie from place to place.

The dimensions of the Scottie are:  $10\frac{1}{8}$ " x  $6\frac{1}{4}$ " x  $4\frac{7}{8}$ ". The compact chassis is completely enclosed by the Bakelite cabinet, even the back. It is equipped with dynamic speaker and new multiple type tubes. The advertising pamphlets on the Scottie say that it is "built with the jewel-like precision of a tiny wrist watch." And we believe it, after examining one of the models thoroughly and then putting it to a tuning test.

It's sturdy, too. Although small, it is strongly built and looks distinctive. But two dials grace the outside of the set, one the station selector and the other the volume control. There is an illumination effect on the former in order that the dial readings might be seen in a dark room.

On the center of the speaker is the popular dog for whom the new wonder set has been named—a little ivory Scottie—which, after the radio receiver it is named after, is the choice of best people.
