In a program monickered "Sweet Music," an instrumental quartet is wafting out a new daily 3:30 to 3:45 p. m. concert on KFRC now. The participants: Barbara Schwartzman, harpist; Claude Sweeten, violinist; Herman Reinberg, cellist; and Dick Aurandt, organist.

Celebrated folk in the movie capital are taking to "Hodge Podge Lodge," Don Lee chain event, like flies to sugar. On a recent visit to San Francisco Estelle Taylor told Jennison Parker, author of the ridiculous fraternity, that she had formed a Hodge Podge Lodge club in Hollywood and a group of friends met regularly each week to listen to the skit on the air. Members who show up after the broadcast has started are fined, she said.

Dolly LaSalle, blues singer from Southern California, has replaced Miss Cynthia at the NBC. The latter, whose full name is Cynthia Duane, former U. S. C. co-ed, came to the network a few months ago.

Irving Kennedy is back on the NBC air-planes, following a several weeks' absence during which time he rushed to New York to see his mother, who is seriously ill.

The Texas Oil Company has renewed its Texaco Fire Chief program for another twelve months.

A cross country college debate will be staged by radio on Saturday, November 18, when the teams of Stanford and Cambridge face the NBC microphones. The debate will be released throughout the country by the NBC-KPO locally from 2:30 to 3 p. m. Will Rogers' son is a member of the Stanford debating team. The subject of the forensic combat will be: "Resolved: That Political Salvation of the World Lies in Democracy Rather than Dictatorship."

On the former date there will be a special broadcast on the Carnival's time from Tulsa, Oklahoma, where KVOO will dedicate its new transmitter and studios. The Del Monte people have added three NBC stations to the chain already broadcasting their Thursday a. m. Cap'n Dobbsie program, as the result of fans in these territories that were not served asking for it.

What we believe was the first time that an insurance company ever held a regular business meeting by radio, was staged recently by the Occidental Life Insurance Company over the NBC wireup on the Pacific Coast. MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • KNX's famous comedy team of Frank Watanabe and the Honorable Archie have gone "talking pictures" in a big way, according to Drury Lane, program director of the 25,000-watt Hollywood broadcast unit. Recently Reginald Sharland, "The Hon. Archie," was loaned to R. K. O. studios to play the second lead to John Barrymore in "The Long Lost Father." Sharland plays the rôle of Lord Vivian. Eddie Holden, foot creator of the rôle of Frank Watanabe, breaks down to say that he wrote the Japanese dialog for Paramount's latest release, "Hell and High Water," now showing in downtown Los Angeles. Eddie Holden is writing under the non de plume of his radio character—Frank Watanabe.

Half a dozen radio writers have been loaned to motion picture studios during the past few months—and each has made good in a big way. Laird Doyle, Ted Osborne, Kay V. Ripper, Dick Creedon and George Turner, who wrote the KNX program "The Count of Monte Cristo," have been called on to turn their hands to talkie scripts.

• • • Anita Calfot, NBC juvenile actress, has a family of canaries named, respectively, Wek-Wek, Wy-Lee, Little Jo, Dolores, Felicia, Bill and Mrs. Bill.

• • • Although "Happy" Felton celebrated his twenty-fifth birthday only recently, he is the oldest member of his popular twelve-piece orchestra, which is heard over the Columbia network.

• • • Phil Spitalny's outstanding childhood memory goes back to the days when he was studying at the Con-

servatory in Odessa, Russia. He and Mischa Elman got up a student band and gave a concert in which everybody played toy instruments. Now he conducts over NBC.

• • • Alice Joy, NBC's popular "dream girl," proved herself an ardent baseball fan when she managed a flight to New York for the rehearsals in Chicago for the Real Silk program, on which she is starred, to see at least one of the games in the Series.

• • • Annette Hanshaw, the shy little blues singer of Captain Henry's Show Boat, is never happier than when away from crowds. She is an accomplished horsewoman and spends all the time she can riding in the Berkshires. Annette also hopes to become a good golfer, now that a special set of clubs of particularly light weight has been made for her.

• • • The one unforgivable crime a radio star can commit is to miss a rehearsal, yet Roy Atwell of Fred Allen's Revue (heard Friday nights over an NBC coast to coast network) did it with impunity recently. His friend Ring Lardner had died that morning, and Atwell had rushed to comfort the bereaved family.

• • • Andy Andrews studied agriculture at the University of Nebraska; Morey Amsterdam's parents were set upon making a lawyer out of him; Al Pearce ran a dairy as a boy, played in orchestras, and sold real estate before he went into radio; Bill Comstock (Tizzie Lish) was a drummer in a theatre orchestra before the war; Bernardine Miller was a stenographer. It looks like Mabel Todd is about the only member of the Al Pearce

Gang who never had her mind set on anything but the stage from the very beginning. She sang in concerts as a little girl, and played in vaudeville for several years before joining Al Pearce.

• • • Over three hundred fan letters a day is the daily average for Chandu, the magician, released thrice weekly at 6:45 from KNX. This average is based on a six-day average, inasmuch as mail is delivered six days weekly. The 1933-34 series of Chandu, the magician, has "topped" the mail records for the old series, proving that Chandu, the magician, is still, in its third year, a "top" feature. The same cast, writers, and producers who started originally with Chandu, the magician, still act, write and produce the skit. KNX releases the only "live talent" version of Chandu, the magician, in the United States, and the program is heard on Tuesdays and Saturdays from 6:45 to 7 o'clock.

• • • When his birthday rolls around, Bert Lahr invites twenty-five persons at random from fans he has met through the mail. Then when they arrive, the housekeeper tells them he was suddenly called away. Then disguised as a butler, Lahr moves among his guests, getting the low-down on what they think of him before he takes off his wig and discloses his real identity.

• • • A dream has come true—the dream of the De Marco sisters—who sing on those Saturday night Magic Carpet programs with Jack Pearl. They've been singing around Boston radio stations for the past year, and they've been given their big chance

because they gave a great audition for the Baron Munchausen programs. They are being hailed as a new note in harmony.

• • • Blanch Peanuts, the new Al. Pearce Gang skit, is played by Mabel Todd and Jackie Archer, and written by Don Johnson, new member of the Gang. Johnson is a Seattle boy, and wrote the Mardi Gras, a coast program for NBC, which originated in Seattle.

• • • B. A. Rolfe, the maestro, visited some friends in Connecticut, and after questioning a farmer about crops and cattle, asked him if they listened to the radio much. "Yep," replied the farmer, "it's the only thing around here that still works fourteen hours a day and seven days a week."

• • • Rush Hughes, the Pictorial reporter, who is heard over an NBC-KGO network every week-day afternoon, gets many requests for autographed photographs, but he sends them only to listeners who promise to send him one of themselves in exchange. His photograph gallery is growing by leaps and bounds.

• • • Al. Pearce was presented with a 200-year calendar by its inventor during the recent Long Beach engagement. Tizzie Lish dubbed it a Scotch calendar.

• • • When you hear that baby gurgling and cooing in "The Jordans at Home," skit which is heard every Thursday morning during NBC's Woman's Magazine of the Air broadcast, it's a safe bet that Gail Taylor and Myron Niesley, principals in the skit, are silently controlling hysterics. Because Bennie Walker, two-hundred-pounder who is the Magazine's editor, plays the Jordan baby, and lately he has taken to making gestures to

suit the sounds he has to interpolate into the parental dialogue between Gail and Myron.

• • • Last summer the Revelers rented a penthouse so they could rehearse in the hot weather. Now they find they are legally responsible for the place for a whole year because they forgot to tell the landlord they were moving before the first of October. So they'll keep it as a rehearsal hall for twelve more months.

• • • Johnny Toffoli, NBC accordion star, is the possessor of a brand-new custom-built accordion, designed by himself. It includes an arrangement by which overtone effects may be switched on or off at the pressure of his hand as he plays it, and its reeds are silver instead of steel, giving a violin tone to certain passages.

• • • Verna Felton, NBC's only woman announcer in the West, who introduces Harold F. Burdick's "Do You Believe in Ghosts?" broadcasts, played "Carnille" when she was fifteen years old.

• • • In a Chinese restaurant the other night, Jane Froman noticed a waiter looking at her and she asked him where she had seen him before. "If," he replied, "you are Jane Froman, I was in a history class with you at Missouri University."

• • • Lloyd E. Yoder, manager of the Press Department, and director of special broadcasts in NBC's Western Division, is now a fully accredited buff. He received a badge in the form of a tiny fireman's hat from the San Francisco fire department the other day, inscribed with a number, and the fire department's permission for him to enter fire lines.

A buff, in case you've never chased fires, is a civilian whose enthusiasm for fires makes him drop whatever he

is doing when an alarm sounds, and scurry after the fire engines. Those fire fans who are recognized by the fire department receive badges and become a sort of lay member of the fire department. All buffs are masculine—the feminine of the species is called a vamp.

• • • Bernice Berwin, who plays Hazel in "One Man's Family," is posing for a cameo portrait of herself. An artist who specializes in miniatures on cameo, asked permission to add her profile to his collection. At each sitting, he carves a bit more of her likeness into a tiny fragment of shell, which, when completed, will be part of an unusual assortment of celebrities in cameo which he intends to exhibit.

• • • Here's a laugh idea for the talkies. Cal Pearce and Tony Romano, motoring to San Francisco late at night in a heavy fog from an all-night dance up country, were tired and sleepy and stopped for occasional cat-naps along the way. It was difficult keeping on the road in the heavy fog, anyway. After one such refreshing pause they discovered they had been parked on the main line of the Southern Pacific. Calmly lighting a package of Murad's apiece, they drove on—just before a train came by.

• • • James Melton, the tenor, never forgets a face. He can walk backstage after he's played there a year ago and call stagehands by their first names. Radio executives call him "The man who never forgets." And he never forgets anything—except in music.

• • • Albert Spalding, America's foremost violinist, who started a series of programs on Columbia October 4, declares that there is no such thing as highbrow music. He says that any time a piece of music has stood the test of

me, it means the public likes or they'd have let it die. And about popular songs, he says if they last three months, that's remarkable!

• • • Elmer Blurt, the low pressure salesman, received a meeting notice from the "National Association of Salesmen" bearing this inscription: "You need our help, come and bring a salesman with you."

• • • For the first time in years, Rubinoff was unable to visit his parents for the Jewish holidays, which just ended. In the past, Rubinoff always managed to get to Pittsburgh, where they reside, to pay his respects. This year he is broadcasting from Hollywood, and was unable to leave.

• • • Bernice Berwin, pretty-dark-haired NBC star who plays Hazel in "One Man's Family" always looks as if she had just emerged from a beauty parlor, but she seldom goes to one. Her hair has a natural wave that makes it look freshly finger-waved every time she draws a comb through it.

• • • Phil Harris is one orchestra leader who has firsthand, up-to-the-minute knowledge of the varying musical tastes of the country from coast to coast. California, he says, likes its music "sweet"; New York prefers it "hot." Phil aims for a happy medium, which he terms "sophisticated."

• • • Bert Parks, new CBS announcer, who first participated in amateur theatricals at the age of four, gained a reputation in his native Atlanta as a mimic of Charlie Chaplain, whom he resembles sans mustache. He came to radio in March, 1931, as a baritone vocalist for WGST.

• • • American men should be more romantic and serenade their lady loves, suggested Ortiz Tirado, NBC's singing surgeon.

"How," asked John S. Young, NBC announcer, "can I serenade my girl who lives in a pent house twenty-five stories above the street?"

"For a moment Mexico's romantic tenor was stumped. "Take a blimp and sail over," Tirado said.

• • • Did you know that Edward Lynn, author of "Our Romantic Presidents," over KMTR Friday evenings, has just had lyrics accepted by the publisher for Charles Wakefield Cadman's newest and, the critics say, greatest choral number, "Master of the Forge." Edward Lynn is accepted as Cadman's principal collaborator.

• • • Radio listeners never miss a detail. One group of admirers of "One Man's Family" telephoned NBC the other night, following a broadcast, to know why they have not heard the sound of Paul's cane-tapping through the serial lately. When reminded that Paul has been chiefly pictured as sitting or standing, in recent episodes, they were satisfied . . . "but we just wanted to know whether his leg had been cured," they explained.

• • • Big Freddie Miller, the CBS baritone, is a bear for outdoor exercise, but he's off horses for quite some weeks—thrown off, in fact. Three times he attempted horse-back riding in Central Park, and three times he was tossed off. Freddie says he'll stick to road work—afoot!

• • • Victor Young, the composer-maestro, opened his mail the other day and found his diploma of merit from the Conservatory of Warsaw, which he had hidden in his uncle's home during the World War. He had forgotten the hiding place, and it was only when his uncle tore down a chimney while remodeling his house that the diploma showed up.

• • • Recently, Peter de Rose and May Singhi Breen, his wife, went to Rye, N. Y., to see a performance being given by Rudy Vallee. Peter was very tired and, though he needed a shave, decided to put it off until the following morning.

Rudy learned that they were in the audience and he promptly called upon them to sing for the audience. Electricians turned on their brightest lights, and Peter swears that he could feel his beard growing by the inch.

• • • Ernie Holst, NBC orchestra leader, has a new hat!

Some time ago an interviewer learned that Holst had worn the same hat for seven years. The story was carried in newspapers throughout the country. An official of one of the better known chapeau companies read it and invited Holst to his New York office to choose any hat he desired, with the manufacturer's compliments.

• • • Albert Spalding lays down his \$35,000 Guarnerius violin so casually that he gives the jitters to the plain fiddlers in Don Voorhees' orchestra which accompanies the foremost American violinist on his weekly broadcast over the Columbia network.

• • • James Melton, the radio tenor who is rehearsing for a rôle opposite Maria Jeritza for the New York stage, had to learn French dialect but he did it without having to pay for it. Melton, a native Georgian, swapped lessons in dialect with Taylor Holmes, the veteran actor and comedian.

• • • Travis Hale and E. J. Derry, two members of the Al. Pearce Gang's Three Cheers, are celebrating the seventh anniversary of their harmonizing together. They started seven years ago in Kansas City.



SILHOUETTES



THE Singing Guardsmen, popular KNX quartet, have started their second successful year with Hollywood's 25,000-watt station, KNX, which is located in the heart of the film colony.

The Singing Guardsmen are: Charles Henri, bass; William Brandt, baritone; Henry Iblings, second tenor; and Urbin Hartman, top tenor. Howard Chandler is the piano accompanist.

Henri is one of the few basso profundos in this country and can hit a "D" below "D" below low "D." He is the one member of the Singing Guardsmen who was not born in the United States. His home was Worthing, England.

All the Singing Guardsmen are married—happily. All the young men sing fluently in French, German, Italian and Spanish, and they have made a specialty of so choosing their numbers that never do two numbers of the same musical type appear on one program.

We asked each of the Singing Guardsmen about their most embarrassing moment. Here they are:

Charles Henri: When I was called on to suddenly read lines in front of the microphone.

Henry Iblings: I sang a whole-barred number and did some swell work, or so I thought. As I walked out of the studio, the program manager said the song had been cut on the air, so I'd done all the work for no purpose except practice.

William Brandt: While he was singing, a young girl broke into the studio and tried to get his autograph. He later found out the autograph was made out on an insurance policy, and he's still paying for it.

Urbin Hartman: When Howard Chandler, accompanist, played a whole chorus of Hartman's song in a different key.

Howard Chandler: When he discovered he'd been playing Hartman's song in the wrong key.

The Singing Guardsmen all live in the same apartment house, and spend the early morning hours, rain or shine, playing tennis. In clear weather they play on the outdoor courts; during "unusual" weather they retire to the indoor courts of a country club.

Charles Henri, oldest of the group, began his singing career in the rôle of Mephistopheles in Gounod's "Faust," which ran at the Opera Comique in Paris, France. He writes poetry in his spare time and believes it is an excellent form of relaxation.

Bill Brandt, baritone, likes to travel and has toured extensively through Mexico, Alaska, Hawaii, Canada, France, Germany, and Italy. During the war he entered his regiment a "buck" private and came out with a couple of shell wounds and captain's bars. He served with the 91st division. He says his special hobbies are tennis, bridge, poker, and food.

"The Singing Guardsmen" appear on many of the big shows of KNX, notably the Optimistic Review on Friday evenings, the Saturday night Varieties, which is staged and produced by Jack Carter. Incidentally, they have their own programs on KNX, among them the special Monday evening show from 7:15 to 7:30, when they are accompanied by the KNXponents of Rhythm, KNX dance band.

"The Singing Guardsmen" never sing a stock tune. It must be a special arrangement, made particularly for their unusual blend of voices, or it isn't sung. They tried it once and it didn't go well, they said. Urbin Hartman, top tenor, makes the arrangements with Howard Chandler. Chandler is not merely an accompanist. He criticizes the songs the Guardsmen sing; and his criticisms are sometimes caustic. However, his judgment is the final word.

Each of the Singing Guardsmen is an accomplished soloist, although they rarely sing without the other three members. At KNX the Singing Guardsmen are known as the Four Musqueteers.

ROBERT WALDROP, NBC announcer, in San Francisco, is a true Californian, the son of a family which dates back to the earliest records of this State. One ancestor was Captain Henry Fitch, the sea captain who guided his vessel through San Francisco's Golden Gate in 1826, and on the other side of the family he is descended from the Bailhaches, great Spanish landowners who settled down in lower Mex-

ico before 1820, and later extended their holdings to San Diego. Old Spanish tales and rare hangings are treasured by his mother and sister, as well as some exquisite silver vessels brought from England by Captain Fitch, and said to have been taken from Westminster Abbey by Henry VIII.

The young NBC announcer—he's just 24—was born in Eureka and christened Robert Leonard Bailhache Waldrop. He is a nephew of Uda Waldrop, noted San Francisco organist and composer, with whom he studied for a time.

In 1927, Waldrop had his introduction to radio through George Davis of Sherman Clay and Company, San Francisco, and spent four years as Davis' assistant writing continuity and building programs for the Sherman Clay Discovery Hour and similar offerings. It was a natural step from this work to becoming an announcer for the National Broadcasting Company.

Waldrop is heard introducing many musical programs originating in San Francisco. His own musical knowledge is sound; he plays piano beautifully and has an excellent baritone voice. Despite which he looks on music as an avocation and puts his spare time at the typewriter, on short stories, which he hopes will be his ultimate career.

IF YOU want to know anything about short story writing, play-writing, logging, railroads, poetry, tunnel-building, vermin-exterminating, old furniture or acting—ask Milton Wood. This tall, dark young man whose pleasant voice is heard announcing many of the NBC programs which originate in San Francisco came to radio, as do many of its stars, by a winding road.

Born in Spokane, Washington, he studied law at Reed College, Portland and of Idaho. After his graduation he settled down to writing plays and short stories, then decided to get some active experience, and spent the next four years mostly in logging camps. He had studied violin and when his hands were damaged in a logging camp he took up clarinet and saxophone, achieving what he calls "a union card and flair for coon shouting." The combination brought him an orchestra of his own with which he played coast towns, then became a railroad man for a time. He tells it:

"Helped the railroads straighten out the car situation by writing down two or three million figures which, if laid end to end would be a splendid idea. Became poetic, with long hair and short meals. Played roles with Duffy Players in Portland; must have been good, as Duffy Players closed the following week. Built the Cascade Tunnel along with some other people, worked in bank, ran a transit for logging company, exterminated vermin by means of various powders and liquids. Poetry and cockroaches didn't mix so gave up cockroaches. Two months later papered room with rejection slips and gave up poetry."

After which, he took up radio, and for the last five years has been one of the most versatile microphone personalities in the Northwest, where his skits and plays won immense popularity as well as sponsors. He was in charge of dramatic production and acting at a coast station when he came to San Francisco and joined the NBC staff as an announcer.

Old furniture and rare books are his twin passions; he is an ardent collector of both. Horse back riding and swimming are his favorite sports.

It is only reasonable to believe that no broadcaster will deliberately sponsor a feature that actually antagonizes a majority of listeners.

The air lanes are wealthy with programs as varied in type and purpose as the great out of doors. So let's be just as tolerant in our attitude. Let's do our part in encouraging the better programs, and those few which are really bad will eventually run themselves off the air by the very lack of what they should be.
