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
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ETHER GLEANINGS

I HAVE sad news to relate to all the radio brethren throughout the land who have been attending Seth Parker's Sunday night "githerins" these past few years.

Seth is saying good-bye to his followers—and they are legion—Sunday night, December 3. On that date the final Sunday at Seth Parker's program will be broadcast over the coast to coast NBC chain. And many a sad heart there will be, too, when the news is spread. For Seth had one of the greatest following of any feature on a nation-wide chain. A devoted and faithful following who lent eager ears to the loudspeaker while Seth and his neighbors sang all the old-time hymns on their Sabbath gatherings.

The NBC had many opportunities to sell that program to a sponsor, but flatly refused all offers, some of them very lucrative, because it was of a religious nature and thought that commercialism shouldn't enter into the picture on such a program.

Phillips Lord, who created the rôle of Seth Parker and wrote and produced the programs, was once a school teacher. He is a young man, not more than thirty-two. He once told this writer of the difficulty that he had in getting the network to listen to his idea for a radio broadcast of this nature. His plan for the Seth Parker program was scoffed at by the radio executives and program chiefs. But he was persistent and finally got an audition. The program was eventually put on over some eastern stations. The mail that came in as the result astonished the NBC and it wasn't long before Lord had his program over a coast to coast hookup.

It still stands as one of the leaders in popularity on the air.

But Phillips Lord has worked hard these last four or five years on that program. He's tired. He's made a comfortable sum, too, and so he is going to take a long rest.

He sets sail on a two-year world cruise on his private yacht December 5 from Jonesport, Maine.

But try as he did, Phil Lord couldn't keep away from the microphone. He is going to broadcast direct from his yacht over a country-wide NBC hookup during that cruise—not as Seth Parker, the hymn-singing way-down easterner, but as Phil Lord, the adventurer. Once a week there will be a broadcast from his ship—a dramatized story of sea adventures and which will bring out some of the actual experiences encountered on the trip.

The boat is a four-master sailing schooner, carrying a crew of fifteen. Three male

friends will accompany Lord, which makes up the entire passenger list.

Each Tuesday night over KGO then, from 7 to 7:30 o'clock, there is a program scheduled to be broadcast direct from the yacht.

General Motors will sponsor these unusual broadcasts in behalf of its home appliance product, "Frigidaire."

The Governor of Maine has declared December 5, the sailing date of Lord's party, a state holiday.

Torrid Mae West, it was reported at this writing, has been signed by a cosmetics company for a series of broadcasts. The network over which she is to be heard was not decided up to press time.

Murray and Harris, song team of KFRC and Don Lee chain fame, are riding the high seas (not high c's) today headed for Shanghai, China, where they have been engaged to sing in one of that city's famed night clubs.

They make the second KFRC team to shove off from San Francisco for the Far East. Midge Williams, the colored hotspot, and her four diminutive pickaninny brothers went to Shanghai some time ago and, according to advises from there, are clicking in no small manner with their song style.

Two of the big cigarette companies go on the coast to coast CBS chain this month—Chesterfield and Camel.

Chesterfield is due on November 28 with a six nights a week quarter-hour broadcast from 6 to 6:15 o'clock featuring the Philadelphia Symphony orchestra, directed by Leopold Stokowski.

Camel will bring Glen Gray's Casa Loma orchestra, the Do Re Me Trio (girls' vocal troupe), and others to the microphone. Tuesdays and Thursdays, from 7 to 7:30 o'clock, they can be dialed. They are scheduled to start the end of the month, date not definite at this writing.

Richard Crooks and Lawrence Tibbett come on the coast to coast air stage for Firestone Tire Company, beginning December 4. The NBC will carry it—KGO locally—8:30 to 9 o'clock. Crooks will sing on the first two, and thereafter they will alternate each week. William Daly's orchestra, now playing for John McCormack, will appear with them.

You've got to hand it to M. J. B. for keeping their programs constantly interesting and

different. Now they've signed up J. P. McEvoy, the renowned humorist, dramatist and author, who is relating witty anecdotes every Monday night on the M. J. B. Demi-Tasse Revue—7:30 to 8 o'clock on KGO

McEvoy is sharing honors on the broadcasts with Ted Fio-Rito and his orchestra.

In addition to his many successes with Broadway Revues, novels, plays, McEvoy writes a daily column for a national newspaper syndicate and the *Saturday Evening Post*, is now engaged in writing dialogue for the movies and has taken on the added responsibility of being a radio humorist.



J. P. McEVOY Signed by M-J-B

THE signature of another far-famed personality has been secured by the M. J. B. Coffee Company for its popular *Demi-Tasse Revue*. J. P. McEvoy, nationally known humorist, author, playwright, and newspaper columnist, has set his name to a contract which will bring him before the NBC microphone for a series of appearances on the variety broadcast show. He makes his second appearance in behalf of the coffee company sponsor over the western network of the National Broadcasting Co., from 7:30 to 8 p.m., next Monday, November 27.

McEvoy's rare wit and humorous philosophy will be heard weekly over the NBC chain.


With this latest acquisition for their broadcast, the sponsors have added another star to their already luminous log book of their radio activities on which are posted such names as John P. Medbury, Bing Crosby, Donald Novis, Phil Harris, George Olsen, Ethel Shutta and Peter B. Kyne.

But, unlike many of his predecessors, McEvoy comes to the M. J. B. *Demi-Tasse Revue* with an already nationally established name. A number of those who appeared on earlier *Demi-Tasse Revues* found the coffee company broadcasts a stepping stone to great heights in the radio and entertainment world. Crosby, Novis, Phil Harris are particular examples.

McEvoy will co-star on the programs with the international maestro, Ted Fio-Rito, whose orchestra has been featured on the *Demi-Tasse Revues* for some time.

The newly signed star of the *Revue* has a reader audience of several million through his daily syndicated column in newspapers throughout the nation.

His reputation as a possessor of unusual wit has made his literary works constantly in demand. Among the outstanding Broadway revues which he penned were: "The Americana" and "Allez Oop." He also authored the following successes: "The Poters," "God Loves Us," "Show Girl," "Hollywood Girl," "Denning and the Dumb Cluck," "Mister Noodles," and "Are You Listening?"

McEvoy is a graduate of Notre Dame, and his home is on the Hudson in New York. But he has been out West for some time doing dialogue work in the movie capital.

Appearing with him on the M. J. B. *Demi-Tasse Revue* is the regular all-star lineup of broadcast talent—Ted Fio-Rito and his nationally known orchestra, Lief Erickson, Muzzy Marcelino, and effervescent Ernie Smith, whose *Football Vignettes* and work as master of ceremonies are highlights of the thirty-minute broadcast.

The origination point for the broadcasts has been moved from San Francisco to Los Angeles, due to the fact that McEvoy is occupied there, and Ted Fio-Rito and his orchestra are playing a special engagement at the Ambassador Hotel in the Southern California city.

Ernie Smith commutes by airplane each week, from San Francisco to Los Angeles, in order to participate in the broadcasts.

In securing the services of J. P. McEvoy for a series of M. J. B. *Demi-Tasse Revues*, the sponsor feels that it is bringing to its listeners one of the most outstanding personalities in his particular field of endeavor.

The sponsor has the happy faculty of bringing to its air audience not only outstanding persons in their field, but men and women who contribute high grade entertainment that is different. And that is half the secret in putting on a successful radio broadcast.

Welcome to the air domain, Mr. McEvoy. Long may you be permitted to pepper the ether with your laugh material.

MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • Charlie Hamp, with his Thirty Minutes of Sunshine, has left KNX to make a personal appearance tour of west coast theatres. Hamp, who started his radio career on KNX, ends it on the same station temporarily to accept a very flattering offer to go on tour. Hamp is said to be getting the "top" figure of any radio act with the exception of Frank Watanabe and the Honorable Archie, who played a three week's tour two months ago

• • • Al Pearce has put on his false whiskers and Santa Claus suit and started his annual Christmas drive for toys for the crippled children in the Children's hospitals.

Already hundreds of toys have come in, both by mail and delivered in person to the Radio Playhouse, Eighth and Beacon streets, Los Angeles. The toys will be distributed to hospitals all up and down the Pacific Coast.

• • • Five young actors and actresses, of famous relatives, appear on Vic Potel's KNX skit "College Daze and Knights." Dick Bare is cousin of the Duncan sisters; Bert Kalmar, Jr., is the son of the famous song-writer-producer of talking picture fame; Betty Le Grande is the daughter of Dick Le Grande, network comic; Broderick Crawford is the son of Helen Broderick, hit of the New York show "As Thousands Cheer," and Violet Moss is a niece of Harold B. Franklin, president of the R-K-O Theatres and a sister of Dick Moss, manager of the first run R-K-O theatre in Los Angeles.

• • • The story of the rise of Irene Bordoni (recent guest artist with the Ipana Troubadours) reads like a play. As

a mere girl she was an apprentice hatmaker in Paris who was overheard humming. A year later she was the toast of Paris and was brought to this country for a musical comedy. Miss Bordoni lives very simply. When she is in New York, she lives quietly in an apartment, and every summer she goes to France. She has a villa near Cannes, France, where she spends most of her leisure time, especially during the summer. It is almost impossible for either stage or radio executives to induce her to take an active part in the entertainment world during the summer.

• • • Eight hundred members of the National Broadcasting Company staff in New York reported at their new headquarters in Radio City November 6, and the biggest moving of this year was officially completed. The big trek of vans which transported NBC's equipment and furnishings from the company's old home at 711 Fifth Avenue, started Thursday evening at six o'clock, and the last load arrived late Saturday night. Only a quarter of a mile intervenes between the old headquarters and Radio City, but all the moving was done at night in order to avoid congesting traffic. Three hundred van loads were handled in what officials declared was the largest and most complicated removal of the year. The vans moved in a continuous stream from one building to another with a special detail of police to handle the traffic. All furniture and crates were mounted on rollers. Each of the 20,000 separate items in the removal was numbered, and placed according to blueprints prepared in advance and similarly numbered. The numbers on larger pieces were chalked

on the floor in the proper spots at Radio City, to facilitate handling, and different colored tags indicated floor and general location. Broadcasting continued as usual throughout the entire moving operations.

• • • When Bert Lahr and George Olsen engage in a friendly banter on their Wednesday evening program, their sentiment is not just for radio effect. They first met and became friends all of sixteen years ago.

• • • Imagine Phil (Armour Jester) Baker's chagrin, when on returning home from his Friday evening broadcast at the Chicago NBC studios, he found twelve new books on his shelves. (His crime library numbers several thousand.) The titles included "The Haunt of the Bumblebee," "In New England Hauts" and other volumes, all bearing titles containing a five-letter word meaning spook, personally autographed — from Beetle!

• • • Wilbur Hatch, musical director, who guides the musical destinies of KNX, says his most embarrassing moment came when he was called on to accompany Kate Smith on a Columbia network originating from KNX studios. Hatch, who is an excellent pianist, had never touched a pipe organ and was given five minutes to familiarize himself with KNX's studio organ before the broadcast. Hatch is a Phi Kappa Sigma and Phi Beta Kappa man and attended college at the University of Chicago.

• • • Approximately 1,372,000 persons have seen the Al Pearce Gang perform since March 6 of this year, according to figures released today

by Al Pearce, guiding spirit of the troupe. Of these 1,137,000 paid admissions at theatre box offices to view the shows. Since March 6, the Al Pearce Gang has appeared on the stages of 60 theatres; played 20 free benefit shows and given 90 free broadcast shows from the stage of the Radio Playhouse, 8th and Beacon Streets, Los Angeles.

• • • KNX constantly receives letters from fans of Frank Watanable and the Hon. Archie, asking for copies—or at least the name—of the theme song used to open and close each episode of the famous comedy teams. The theme song has no name and no score of the number is available. It was written by Wilbur Hatch, KNX musical director, over two years ago, and was specially recorded for Frank and Archie.

• • • Charles Runyan, NBC organist, has an eight-year-old son, Charles, Junior, whom he would like to see following in his own musical footsteps, but the youngster does not altogether agree. When he was unenthusiastic about practicing his piano lesson the other day, Mrs. Runyan undertook a bit of persuasion:

"Just think how lucky you are, Charlie," she said. "Why, you know lots of little boys who would give anything to be studying music, but their parents can't afford it—and here you are, with a father who teaches you—aren't you fortunate?"

"Yes," said Charlie, gravely. "They want music and they can't have it—and I can have lessons, and I don't want them—now, isn't that just like life!"

• • • May Singhi Breen's daughter, Rita Lherie Breen, was married November 5 to Lieut. Byram Bunch, U. S. A., and May and Peter de Rose turned their Monday program over NBC into a "Good Luck" and God Bless You" send-off

for the youngsters. There was an emotional quaver in May's singing. Just as the studio went off the air May broke down and wept. Lieut. Bunch has been ordered to Hawaii for two years.

• • • Bing Crosby is apparently the favorite radio singer of most of the Al Pearce Gang. The following list Bing in number one position: Mabel Todd, Morey Amsterdam, Tony Romano, Earl Hatch, Phil Hanna, Travis Hale, and E. J. Derry.

Betty Bruce, the new Rhythmette, likes Ben Bernie; Bernadine Miller likes Mildred Bailey best, and Andy Andrews says Joe Penner. Al Pearce likes all the members of his Gang best.

• • • Ruth Cornwall, author of Death Valley Days stories told by the Old Ranger on NBC stations every Sunday evening, has a clipping from a Barstow, California, newspaper bristling with the nomenclature of that region. It reads: "Bill Jarrett worked for six weeks on the graveyard shift of the Corpse Mining Company in the Coffin Mine located in Dead Man's Canyon in the Funeral Range at the edge of Death Valley. Bill leaves next week for a prospecting trip to the Devil's Playground in Hell's Half-Acre."

• • • When an interviewer asked how he spent his earnings, Peter de Rose promptly replied, "Orchids for May." In fact, Peter added, if given her choice between an orchid and a new dress, May Singhi Breen will invariably choose the orchid. But she usually manages to get the dress, too.

• • • Amos 'n' Andy are leading such busy lives giving five vaudeville performances, two radio broadcasts and writing a fifteen-minute script daily that they are "hard put to it" getting enough sleep. They have learned to catch

"cat" naps between performances and on trains but Amos set a new record the other night when he was found "snoozing" on an NBC studio piano.

• • • Stuart Buchanan, KNX sports announcer and news reader, recently asked listeners outside the eleven western states who listened regularly to KNX programs to write in. Answers were received from Massachusetts, Florida, Illinois, Mexico (Mexico City and Chihuahua), Minnesota, Indiana, Canada, and Alaska. Most of the letters praised highly the radio programs coming from the West—and especially southern California.

• • • It looks like Phil Hanna, Three Cheers tenor, and very popular bachelor with the Al Pearce troupe, is head over heels with a Spokane girl now living in Los Angeles. It is the McCoy this time? He met her on the recent trip North. Her name is Ruth Porter.

• • • Baby Rose Marie, the nine-year-old child entertainer of radio, stage and screen, has traveled almost 50,000 miles in the six years of her professional life.

Rose Marie has been to the West Coast several times for picture work, and has performed on the vaudeville stage of practically every large city in the country.

• • • The ung-ung-ungs of Bert Lahr, the zany, may be all right for radio, but they're barred forever from several boys' academies in New Jersey. The first boy heard on the campus or in the school halls imitating Lahr will be expelled. The boys want Lahr to protest the ruling.

• • • The Al Pearce Gang spent Armistice Day in Pomona, where they played at a local theatre. Andy Andrews and Earl Hatch found fun and relaxation peddling

rented bicycles; Al and Cal with the Rhythmettes in the back seat, drove through the orange groves, harmonizing songs—mostly hymns, if the truth be known. Mabel Todd and Jackie Archer, ordering coffee in a Chinese restaurant asked for a napkin. "No service napkins with coffee," explained the Chinaman.

• • • Character actors may miss some of the notes in feminine handwriting which leading men receive—but they are always working.

There's Bert Horton, NBC actor, for instance. Bert has been a radio actor since 1925, and he has played in some four thousand plays and serials on the air in the last eight years. Because of his ability to double in two or more parts in almost every production, the number of rôles he has played is close to ten thousand.

• • • Charlie Hamp, who furnishes KNX listeners with his "Thirty Minutes of Sunshine" thrice weekly, has a "non-dentable" piano in his Outpost Estates home. Piano is painted a dull green, unpolished, and is said to resist the hardest kicks administered by Charlie when he "muffs" a note.

• • • No—Joan Winters, who plays the widow in "The Widow and Angel" skits heard over NBC networks from Chicago, wasn't killed in Palestine a few days ago.

Ever since the tragic death of an American dancer whose stage name was the same as the NBC star's, Joan has been kept busy denying the reports of her demise.

• • • Morey Amsterdam is on the injured list these days, although he is still being used in the daily Al Pearce lineup.

On November 4 he banged his shin against some backstage props at a Bakersfield Theatre, and he is still going to the doctor.

• • • If you call Bert Lahr a "low" comedian, you won't make him mad. Lahr's proudest boast is that he is the lowest comedian on radio. His belief is that low humor reaches and pleases the greatest number of people, and he says that if that is true, he's perfectly happy to be a low comic.

• • • John McCormack, the Irish tenor, who is now heard over NBC networks from New York, usually sings for some friend in his vast radio audience. One week it is for a composer, another night it is for some member of his family and another time it is for a member of his church.

• • • Leah Ray, who warbles to the accompaniment of Phil Harris' NBC orchestra knits during her idle moments in the studios. Now she is working on a sweater for Phil, after an earlier effort which produced a garment large enough for Primo Carnera.

• • • Give Pearl King Tanner a deck of cards and two or three congenial acquaintances, and she's happy. Friends of this NBC actress who is heard frequently in "Death Valley Days" say that bright, sunny weather usually evokes from Pearl: "This is such a beautiful day — let's stay in and play bridge."

• • • Meredith Willson, NBC orchestra conductor, is still perplexed about the compliment he received the other day from a listener in Illinois, who wrote a whole page of fulsome praise about his transcontinental program, and concluded: "I never fail to miss your program."

• • • Paul Martin, NBC guitarist, has found a secret key to the heart of a banjo. The new playing technique which Martin has developed makes the banjo sound at times like a harp, a steel guitar, and at times like a zither.

• • • Joe Penner, who has had the same comedy hat for seven years, wears it for luck on his radio broadcasts. Joe first began to make the better vaudeville and picture houses about the time he acquired the hat, so it has become something of a mascot for him.

• • • B. A. Rolfe's strangest experience came when he rented a seaside cottage for a week and had a painter put his initials over the door. It wasn't until twenty persons strolled up and ordered drinks did he realize that the inscription over the door read "B. A. R."

• • • Al Pearce carries a specially built public address system with him for use in the theatres he visits with his gang. It can be set up in less than ten minutes.


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SILHOUETTES



ABOUT two years ago an old trouper of minstrel days came to New York to make his network radio debut over Columbia as the feature of the Barbasol program. In that time the newcomer, Harry Frankel in real life, has become one of the headliners of the air as Singin' Sam, the Barbasol Man. In doing so he has shaken off a jinx which has pursued so many of his fellows, for there are few "old timers" of the stage who have been able to adapt themselves to the technique of radio.

Sam well qualifies as a theatrical veteran, for in 26 years of show business he has played in every state in the country, as well as widely throughout Canada. He was born in Danville, Ky., but moved at the age of eight to Richmond, Ind., where he grew up and where he first displayed his instincts for showmanship by acting in what he calls "kiddie shows." As a schoolboy he sang in a boys' quartet that entertained informally in Richmond. One day they were heard by a vaudeville actor who arranged bookings for them in Southern theatres during their summer vacation. This first professional appearance was disastrous, however, for they became stranded in a small town far from home and had to wire home for their return carfare.

During high school Sam decided to desert his texts and learn a trade. To that purpose he obtained a job in a piano factory, but he was destined for the footlights, and it was not long before he joined J. A. Coburn's Greater Minstrels, featured at 17 as the "boy basso."

In this engagement he was partnered with Frank Tinney, an outstanding figure of minstrelsy. Later he was featured as comedian with the Al G. Fields' Minstrels.

Besides his minstrel shows, Sam has performed extensively in vaudeville. For eight years he toured as a member of a quartet, aptly named "The Big Four," as each member weighed more than 200 pounds. During this long association their harmony was not only musical, for they had but one fight, and that arose over a game of "Hearts." A later vaudeville series was "The Two Black Birds," of which he and Joe Dunlevy were co-creators.

Less than two years ago Sam made his radio debut over a Cincinnati station, when a friend asked him to go on the air to advertise his lawn-mower business. Success was immediate, and when the company found

it was getting more orders than it could fill, another sponsor readily engaged him to continue on the air. His local broadcasts attracted wide attention, and he set something of a record when he received 25,000 letters for a week's broadcasting in Cleveland. The Barbasol Company brought him to New York, after he offered but one song for them at his audition, and he has been delighting radio audiences ever since then with his informal programs of song. He has an intimate, homelike voice, which embodies a fortunate combination of depth, tone, and feeling, and he ad libs all the announcements, which he makes himself.

Sam himself is a constant radio listener—and herein lies a large part of the secret of his success. He listens for his own enjoyment, but he does so also to know what others are doing and what is going over with the public. "When in Rome, you have to shoot off Roman candles," he says, in regard to his radio success. He fully realizes the differences in technique between the stage and radio, and he has studied the new medium in order to adapt his offerings to its limitations. He sings largely the old-time songs, but insists on numbers of several different types on each program, with the idea of making each one appeal to at least one member of the family. Another of his theories is that a smile, provoked by a radio performer, is ten times as valuable as a laugh, which is a distraction, rather than a sign of satisfaction. One conversation with him about radio and you will know that his success is far from haphazard.

Side glances: He is typically a man of the outdoors and prefers the country to the city. Is fond of all sports, both as spectator or participant. . . . In school he starred at football and basketball (then a new sport and popularly considered a game for girls). . . . Now he goes in for golf, hunting, and fishing. . . . With a friend, he owns a hunting lodge in Michigan. . . . His radio success has brought more vaudeville engagements, but he has discarded blackface to appear informally at a microphone, as he does in the CBS studios. . . . It has also brought him a contract to sing for phonograph records.

He spends little time in rehearsals, for he feels that over-rehearsing spoils the informality of the programs. . . . Only rehearses an unknown song, and then runs over it but once or twice with his pianist. . . . He transposes his songs at sight, for none are writ-

ten in a key low enough for his voice. . . . He has never taken a music lesson, and cannot play the piano, despite his work in the piano factory. . . . His musical library, housed in a specially built trunk, contains thousands of numbers, and he makes up his programs without a duplication, except when specially requested, over a period of several months. Most of his selections are based on requests. He occasionally broadcasts a one-man minstrel show, in which he takes all parts, singing both baritone and bass. . . . Is considered the leading exponent of the Bert Williams type of song, and he often includes such numbers on his programs, in response to the requests of many other old troupers.

ALTHOUGH James Wallington, NBC announcer and winner of the American Academy of Arts and Letters gold medal for good diction, is now only 26 years old, his life has been so crowded with incidents that nothing less than a fat volume would be required to cover it in detail.

He was born in Rochester, N. Y., on September 15, 1907. Jimmy attended the public schools in that city, and then embarked on preparations to be a minister. Two months at a theological seminary convinced him that he was not temperamentally inclined for a life in Orders, so he then enrolled as a medical student at the University of Rochester.

This idea soon palled, too, and he next went in for geology, and then again switched, this time to music and English. He left the university in his junior year and entered Union College, where he was graduated in due course. Later he won a place as a member of the Rochester American Opera Company.

For one whole season Wallington sang among the stage conceptions of ducal palaces and Montmartre garrets, developing a voice that was to be heard later at the bottom of the world. Then followed a brief excursion into musical comedy with Ned Wayburn's "Chatterbox Revue," and then, for what seemed to Jimmy a long, long time, the ghost refused to walk. The ex-singer of opera became a salesman of furniture made in his dad's factory, until one day he applied for a job as radio mechanic at the General Electric plant in Schenectady, N. Y. He got the job, but when he reported for work, to his surprise he found that he was on the payroll as an announcer.

However, nothing could surprise young Wallington by this time, so he plunged into his work and determined to become one of the best announcers in the business. Within a short time he came into national prominence when he acted as master of ceremonies on the programs which were sent by short

wave to Admiral Byrd at the South Pole, and which were heard throughout the country over NBC networks.

Early in 1930 Wallington was transferred to the National Broadcasting Company headquarters in New York, where for the past three and a half years he has been announcing many of the outstanding programs heard over NBC-WEAF and NBC-WJZ networks. In addition to broadcasts of special events which have thrilled the nation, Jimmy has been heard as straight man for many of the leading comedians of the air and stage, including Eddie Cantor, Maurice Chevalier, George Jessel, Harry Richman, Jack Benny, Milton Berle and George Price.

Wallington is the fourth NBC announcer to win the American Academy's gold medal for good radio diction in the five times the award has been made. The others who have been similarly honored are Milton J. Cross, Alwyn Bach, and John Holbrook. The presentation of the 1933 award was made to Wallington at a meeting of the Academy on November 9 by William Lyon Phelps, noted author and educator.

GEORGE NELSON, NBC announcer in San Francisco, has real pioneer blood in his veins. His father, a Danish musician, landed in New York with an accordion in his trunk which paid his way clear across the continent to Idaho, where he bought a ranch and became one of the early residents in that section.


George grew up on the ranch, and his proudest memory is of the time he was allowed to run the threshing machine all by himself. Music, however, was his chief interest, and his sympathetic parents furthered the youngster's ambitions. He began studying piano and violin when he was five years old and was teaching violin by the time he was in high school. Then the Nelsons moved to Seattle. George's rich basso won him a scholarship course at the Cornish Conservatory there, and he studied voice and drama for several years. He wrote a number of song lyrics and the book of an opera "The Old Music Master" which was produced in Seattle.

The opera brought George an offer to join the staff of a Seattle radio station as a singer and announcer. He left it to become chief announcer and station director of NBC station KOMO for two years, and eventually to NBC's San Francisco's headquarters, where he is notable for his ability to meet the requirements of almost any type of program. He still sings occasionally on the air.

Swimming and rowing and football games are his favorite sports and he reads Shaw, Shakespeare and Ibsen, much.

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
