# ETHER GLEANINGS

**D**AME RUMOR has it that Campana, already sponsoring two coast to coast etherizations over the NBC, is warming up for the third.

From the same source we get it that Carveth Wells, the noted author and traveler is to be heard on a coast to coast under the protecting wing of a sponsor, right soon now.

Tom Gerun of the Bal Tabarin in San Francisco took his band on tour January 24, and is being replaced temporarily by Kay Kyser, the lad with the Louisiana drawl, and his musical cohorts. You will remember that the latter were a great success when they appeared at the Bal last year while Gerun was making a lot of new friends at the World's Fair in Chicago.

In addition to the nightly dance "moosic" broadcast from the Bal over KGO, there is a special half-hour of entertainment from 6:15 to 6:45 o'clock, which features Tim and Irene, Will Aubrey, another comic, and Kay Kyser.

Dot Kay, blues singer, who has been heard on various stations in the bay area of late, has been signed by the NBC.

\* \* \*

In addition to KGO, KPO is also now releasing those Metropolitan Opera House productions on the NBC. Eighty-one stations are broadcasting the operas, released on Saturdays.

\* \* \*

A new frolic-type broadcast hits the air via the Don Lee network on February 2—Borden's Friday Frolic—which should prove both fast and novel. The Borden Company has signed a twenty-six weeks contract, and will broadcast direct from the stage, featuring Fanchon and Marco acts being played in San Francisco, Los Angeles, Portland, Seattle, San Diego, and other coast towns. M. J. B., you recall, tried out that idea some weeks back, but didn't keep it. The opening program will originate in Los Angeles. The time is to be from 8:45 to 9:15 o'clock.

Gary Breckner, former sports announcer for KHJ, has been named production manager for KGB, Don Lee's station at San Diego.

\* \* \*

Helene Hughes, soprano, and Bill Carey are two new staff artists at KFRC. The former has been singing at local theatres for several years, and Carey, a jazz singer, comes from Ted Fio-Rito's orchestra.

The best demonstration of genuine co-operation among the bay district radio broadcasting stations ever witnessed by this scribbler occurred on the recent twenty-sixth anniversary program of KQW of San Jose and San Francisco.

Each of the ten stations sent their own talent to KQW to participate on the special birthday salute broadcast on the evening of January 15. A total of twenty-two artists participated, exclusive of the speakers, which included Mayor Angelo Rossi of San Francisco; United States District Attorney H. H. McPike, and Dr. Charles D. Herrold, inventor, who built KQW twenty-six years ago.

The spirit of friendliness and coöperation was uppermost in the artists, too. They put everything "they had" into their song, story, monologue, or musical selection. Of course, there was friendly rivalry, and each act and artist tried to outdo the others—as the result a commendable program was forthcoming. Fred J. Hart, Eva P. Hart, and the gang at the station are still counting and reading the several thousand letters that came in on the birthday program.

The artists who participated on the KQW event included: Doric Quartet (Harry Stanton, Everett Foster, Myron Neisley, and Ben Klassen), Emil Polak, director and accompanist, from the NBC; Adhesive Pontoon (Arnold Maguire), from KFRC and CBS; Cap'n Dobbsie (Hugh Barrett Dobbs) of the Del Monte Ship of Joy; Jean Wakefield, song stylist and composer of KTAB; Lou Tobin, "the man of a thousand voices," and Maurice Gunsky, famous ballad singer, both from MacGregor and Sollie Recording Laboratories; Nat Goldstein, his accompanist; Fred Skinner, "red hot" pianist of KLX; Bob Allen, pianist of KYA; Art Fadden, pianist of KJBS; Cumberland Hillbillies from KROW, and the Olympians: Sig Arndt and Earl Wright of KGGC.

To the best of this writer's knowledge, it was the first time that every radio station in the San Francisco bay area had collaborated in a program for one of its brother stations.

As a prebirthday event, KQW held a special 1 to 2 a. m. broadcast on the morning of January 14.

DX-ers from all over the map are writing in to the station their reports of having picked up the program which was m.c.-ed by Ralph Bryan. The participants included: Antone Hoffsted's Orchestra; Geno Meski, accordionist; and the Hillbillies, "Sandy" Warren, "Curley" Rose, and "Slim" Cowin.

If you have any fish yarns to tell, don't go around KFRC spouting 'em off. You're liable to get hurt. It's a sore spot with six of the boys there, at least. Not so long ago someone organized a fishing trip to Clear Lake in Lake County, California. Harrison Holliday, Arnold Maguire, Claude Sweeten, Jennison Parker, Ellis Levy, and Earle Smith made up the party. After fishing all day, not one in the party so much as got a nibble.

KYA has a novel stunt in the offing. On February 6 it will broadcast a two-way conversation between an airplane flying over San Francisco's skyscrapers, and men in the studio. It will be a feature of the Floyd Bennett Aviation Forum on that date, from 7:30 to 8 p. m.

\* \* \*

Unique is that program called "Chinese Echoes" on KTAB. It is an authentic reproduction of broadcasts from the Oriental sta-

tions in China. The program is on Sunday from 7 to 7:15 o'clock, and is conducted by Paul Quan, of San Francisco's Chinatown.

\* \* \*

Rabbi Elliott Burstein has resumed his series of talks over KYA, and is being heard Sundays from 5:45 to 6 p. m.

\* \* \*

Charles Hamp, the renowned radior warbler, was the guest artist of George Taylor on his Radio Frolic over KTAB the other day. Hamp stopped over at San Francisco on his way to New York, where 'tis whispered he is about to close with a sponsor for a coast to coast broadcast.

The Philip Morris "ciggie" folks are on the air after having postponed their program for several weeks. They are on the NBC, featuring Leo Reisman's Orchestra, and Phil Dewey, baritone.

# SILHOUETTES

**T**OM COAKLEY, whose dance orchestra is being heard over NBC from the Palace Hotel, San Francisco, is an Oakland, California, boy who started out to be a lawyer but found music more profitable.

This dark-haired, smiling-eyed lad whose dance rhythms have become popular all over the West, is a graduate of the University of California, where he completed his studies in the law school last May. He took his bar examination recently, and is anxiously awaiting the results, because he expects to practice law some day.

It was while he was a student at St. Mary's College that he first became interested in dance music. He played drums himself, and organized a group of fellow students to help pay for their tuition. When he transferred to the University of California he continued leading orchestra for the same reason. He was graduated from U. C. in 1928, and immediately enrolled in the law school—still serious about his law business. He and his orchestra had become immensely popular by that time, but although wider horizons have opened before them many a time, Coakley has centered his engagements in California in order to continue his legal studies. He played at the Athens Club for two and a half years before being called to the Roosevelt Hotel in Hollywood, from where he and the orchestra returned recently.

Several members of the Coakley orchestra have been with him since campus days. One of these is Carl Ravazza, tenor and violinist who has sung and played with Tom, refusing all other offers except for an interval when, at Tom's urging, he was featured under Anson Weeks' banner. Others are Jerry Rice, Lyle Bardo, Bud Bardo, Leon Green, Ellsworth Coates and George Kinney. Lyle Bardo, who arranges melodies for the group, was just fifteen years old when Coakley first enlisted his services. He had to buy his first pair of long trousers in order to play trumpet in the orchestra, and when his younger brother, Bud, was fifteen, he also donned longies to join Coakley as trombone player.

The youthful leader of this group is a brother of Frank Coakley, assistant district attorney of Alameda County. He played basketball at both St. Mary's and California, and is a member of the Phi Kappa Psi, Skull and Key, and Phi Delta Phi. Between his law studies and his music he has little time for anything else—"not even girls," he says, with a flashing smile that belies his statement. He hates cards of all kinds, doesn't

expect to play golf under the age of fifty, and takes his exercise swimming and playing handball. His greatest fun is flying; he hopes some day to have time to learn to pilot a plane himself, but meantime he uses the sky in preference to other forms of travel, and enjoyed his Hollywood engagement because it gave him an excuse to commute between there and Oakland by air.

**W**HEN Mabel Todd was just a tiny tot emerging from coveralls into gingham dresses for school, her father erected a horizontal bar for her in the back yard of their Los Angeles home. Mabel called it her "actin' bar." She firmly believed that diligent practice at chinning herself and skinning the cat on her "actin' bar" would make her an actress fit to go on the stage.

At the age of six, she saw her first footlights. She sang "Oh Dry Those Tears" at the Los Angeles Philharmonic Auditorium with Charles Wakefield Cadman. The eminent composer's interests in the child prodigy wasn't very sympathetically received by her mother, who was opposed to her daughter's theatrical ambitions.

But Mabel continued to exercise her natural talent for singing all during her school days. The break with her mother came during Mabel's first year at the University of California. She quit school to be a line girl at the old Belmont Theatre. She quit that first performance and formed a sister team with another girl. They earned enough money to take them to Chicago where they obtained work in vaudeville, with Paul Ash, and in the musical show, Flying High. With another partner, Mabel was in the Fanchon and Marco units for two years. While doing a turn in vaudeville with Johnny Dann, they approached Morey Amsterdam for some material. Johnny told Mabel to be nice to Morey and maybe he wouldn't charge them so much. Mabel was so nice, Morey has been furnishing her with material free ever since. Mabel joined Al Pearce at Christmas, 1932, for her first radio experience. Now there are Mabel Todd clubs all over the coast. Yet she feels she is still just about as far from her ideal of an actress as she was when her tiny hands clung tenaciously to the "actin' bar" in her back yard. Morey Amsterdam, her fiancée and writer, has proven much more helpful to a young lady who wants to become a great actress and singer than an "actin' bar."

# MICROPHONE GOSSIP



• • • The inflexibility of an international agreement has made Phillips H. Lord, NBC star, one of the proudest men in radio. Phil, now sailing along the east coast in his four-masted schooner, the Seth Parker, will broadcast from various ports around the world over KNRA, newest National Broadcasting Company station.

Lord recently started a 'round-the-world cruise in the Seth Parker and broadcasts from coast cities under the auspices of the Frigidaire Corporation. He will be heard each Tuesday at 7 p. m., until the ship leaves Miami, Fla.

After he leaves the coastal waters of the United States, Lord will be heard from time to time over NBC networks. In order to carry out these plans, NBC applied to the Federal Radio Commission for a license for a shortwave transmitter aboard the Seth Parker.

In its report to the Commission, NBC requested call letters KNBC, KPHL (using Lord's initials), KSPE (for Seth Parker Expedition).

The Radio Commission granted the license but replied that under international radio agreements it would be impossible to grant the requested call letters since ships must use the same code letters for radio signal that they use for visual flag signals.

The schooner Georgette which was renamed Seth Parker, for years has been listed in the international marine registry under the code letters, long before NRA meant the New Deal. The Radio Commission, therefore, assigned the call letters KNRA to the new station.

KNRA operates on one kilowatt power and will send shortwave programs from the

far corners of the earth for rebroadcasting over NBC networks.

• • • One of those rumors that are always cropping up about famous old violins got around again recently. Albert Spalding's Guarnerius was the center of it this time. The rumor was the one about the violin having been built by Guarnerius while he languished in a gloomy dungeon. Our rumor spiker asked Spalding about it and found out it was not so. The violin couldn't have been made in the dark because sunlight is needed to cure the wood during the process of manufacture. That was that.

• • • The visitors who are taken through the Radio City studios (N. Y.) by a corps of uniformed guides number approximately a thousand a day. From 9 a. m. to 11 p. m. there is a steady stream of men, women and children going through on the tour, which takes about an hour to complete. Among the high-lights of the tour are NBC's own weather-making machine, the world's largest air-conditioning plant, which supplied 20,000,000 cubic feet of fresh air each hour, and the main control board, nerve-center of the nation's two chief networks, NBC-WJZ and NBC-WEAF.

During December, the first full month since the tours were inaugurated, 27,885 persons were taken through the studios.

• • • C. Ellsworth Wylie, manager of KHJ, the Don Lee Broadcasting station in Los Angeles, recently announced the appointment of David Heenan as publicity director for KHJ. Heenan comes to KHJ from Bowman-Deute-Cummings advertising agency

in San Francisco. He was assistant advertising manager of the Los Angeles Steamship Company in Los Angeles for several years until the consolidation of that line with the Matson Navigation Company interests two years ago. Prior to coming to the West Coast, he spent seven years in Honolulu, Hawaii, where he was engaged in newspaper and theatrical work.

• • • Helene Hughes, widely known and popular songstress has joined the staff at KFRC. Since she started her singing career in San Francisco in 1922, her melodious mezzo-soprano has been heard in many cities up and down the coast. She has appeared in many stage productions, and is well known to San Franciscans for her appearance at Police and Firemen's Balls and Shriners' affairs. Miss Hughes' latest professional engagement was singing for Norma Shearer in "Smiling Through."

• • • Sheriff Underwood and his famous Arizona Wranglers, who popularized "Strawberry Roan" in the West, are to go on tour with the Universal talking picture "Strawberry Roan," starring Ken Maynard.

For five months, Sheriff Underwood and his posse of Arizona Wranglers will tour the western states, putting on special shows in conjunction with the showing of the picture.

• • • Al Pearce flies between Los Angeles and San Francisco every week or so to record the Eb and Zeb programs. Al takes the part of Eb in these popular electrical transcriptions. He flew up Tuesday, January 2, recorded most of the night, and flew

back to Los Angeles Wednesday morning in time for the Wednesday two o'clock broadcast rehearsals.

• • • Jimmy Durante has been signed to go on the Chase and Sanborn Hour with Rubinoff this year during the period that Eddie Cantor is off the air for moving picture activities. Durante's contract calls for 24 appearances.

In his series for this program last summer the man with the noble proboscis built up a large air following, his desperate efforts to finish "Inka, Dinka, Doo," his great symphony, proving particularly engaging.

Just when Cantor will take his spring leave of the radio to seek the studios of Hollywood has not been set.

• • • Although Harvey Hays, veteran dramatic star heard as narrator on the NBC Hoover Sentinels program, has a number of fine silk scarfs in his wardrobe, he always wears a somewhat ragged woolen muffler that he regards as his good luck charm. It was presented to him by an old Swedish woman, an ardent listener, who is more than seventy years old. The scarf was knitted by her mother more than 100 years ago and she presented it to Hays as her most valued possession. It now holds that same esteem with the actor.

• • • Yogi Yorgesson, Al Pearce comic, came to Los Angeles in 1930 from Seattle, looking for a job as singer, announcer or banjo player. Unsuccessful in finding work in any of those capacities he created the character of Yogi Yorgesson, Hindu mystic, a burlesque upon the air fakirs.

• • • Charles Eggleston, heard in NBC's Ma Perkins broadcasts, returned to his home in Cincinnati for Christmas to play the part of "Scrooge" in Dicken's "A

Christmas Carol." It was the fourth consecutive year that he played the part of the famous old skin-flint, and he returned by special request because of the popularity his interpretations have found in previous broadcasts.

• • • Pat Barnes, versatile NBC star who affixes Patrick Henry Barnes to his checks, professes immediate Irish ancestry. Last summer he acted as master of ceremonies on Irish Republic Day at the World's Fair and now one of Pat's most prized possessions is a hand-woven combination rug and lap robe made in Ireland. It was a Christmas present from the Irish Republic.

• • • Eva Gruninger, NBC contralto who was featured on a recent Del Monte Ship of Joy broadcast with Captain Dobbsie, has received a letter from a listener on the Atlantic Coast who may be a long-lost cousin, since his name is Gruninger also, and his mother's first name was Eva.

• • • NBC announcer, Bob Brown, was the victim of a new racket recently. A ragged person hopped on the running board of his car when he was stopped by a stop light.

"Gimme your 'butt,' mister" he said, eyeing Bob's lighted cigarette. Bob obliged by offering him several cigarettes from his pack. "Thanks," said the racketeer counting the cigarettes, "that makes exactly three packages I have collected today, and it's only four o'clock.

• • • While a dramatic critic on a Kansas City newspaper, Goodman Ace of the "Easy Aces" once wrote a review on Jack Benny's vaudeville appearance, commenting on the latter's nasal and careless speaking voice. Now, radio listeners continually confuse his microphone voice with that of Benny's. . . . Isham Jones is the only one to hold

cards in both the musicians' and coal miners' unions. He himself once labored in Ohio mines and each year renews his affiliation. . . . Nino Martini's father is custodian of the spot in Verona, Italy, where Romeo and Juliet supposedly were buried. . . . George Hall's father, a musician and ardent lover of classical music, will never listen to his son's broadcast in Tin Pan Alley's popular ditties. . . . Abe Lyman's most treasured possession is the set of original drum sticks he purchased with his pennies during his newsboy days in Chicago. . . . The real reason Guy Lombardo carries the fiddle under his arm while conducting his Royal Canadians is to give him poise. . . . After nine years of listening to Gracie Allen's "dumbercracks" George Burns is still madly in love with the sister of the missing brother. . . . Little Jack Little wrote his first song hit, "Jealous," back in 1922 when on the train to Pittsburgh to make his first broadcast as a tune-plugger. . . . Bing Crosby bet on a horse named "Bingo" and won, 40 to 1.

• • • Harry McNaughton, known as Bottle to the millions who tune in Phil Baker, the Armour Jester, over NBC, believes that he is the world's luckiest man. Harry went through the entire war—he spent three years and nine months in the trenches—without receiving a scratch. Later he was in the ill-fated Pathe studios when they burned down, and he again escaped without any injury, although many of his friends perished.

• • • Alois Havrilla, NBC announcer, has been honored by having his biography included in the current "Who's Who" of Central Europe. The request for this information came to him from Zurich, Switzerland, and was addressed simply "Alois Havrilla Czecho-Slovakian announcer, New York."

• • • NBC's Tony Cabooch was recently presented with a watch and chain weighing over two pounds. An old Italian who would not trust the mails traveled from Louisville to Chicago. In turning over the massive timepiece to Tony, he explained, "My grandfather gave me this watch in Italy. He did not have long to wait, for a group of tourists from the Canadian town visited the NBC studios and called on Mr. Almonte. They told him all about their home town. "Greatest little city in the world," they assured him.

• • • B. A. Rolfe, the jovial maestro, gets fan letters from Chinese, Japanese, Filipino, and Hawaiian school children who listened to his music when he visited the Hawaiians. They all want him to return to the Islands and teach band music.

• • • The incidental music which accompanies Warden Lawes' broadcasts of real life crime stories over an NBC network each Wednesday evening is as complicated as it is important to the success of the program. Each week the script writer sends an elabor-

ate cue sheet to Thomas Belviso, head of the NBC music department, to whom the delicate job of directing the musical portion of the broadcast is entrusted.

Belviso received a shock when the latest cue sheet came to his desk. When he recovered, he phoned the First Aid nurse to stand by during the broadcast, and told Spencer Dean, the well known NBC man-hunter, to be on hand. The cue sheet read: "5 (2)—Mysterioso music. Play until shot."

Blackmore's famous novel, is unfolded every Tuesday and Thursday afternoon at 5 p.m. Mr. Adams, who is California-born, began his theatrical career in stock in Sacramento, San Diego, and San Francisco. He went East to create the role of "Laurie" in "Little Women," and later played in stock during several summers and six with Jessie Bonstelle in Buffalo. Among his outstanding characterizations have been the lead role in Booth Tarkington's "Clarence," which ran 76 weeks; the juvenile lead in the all-

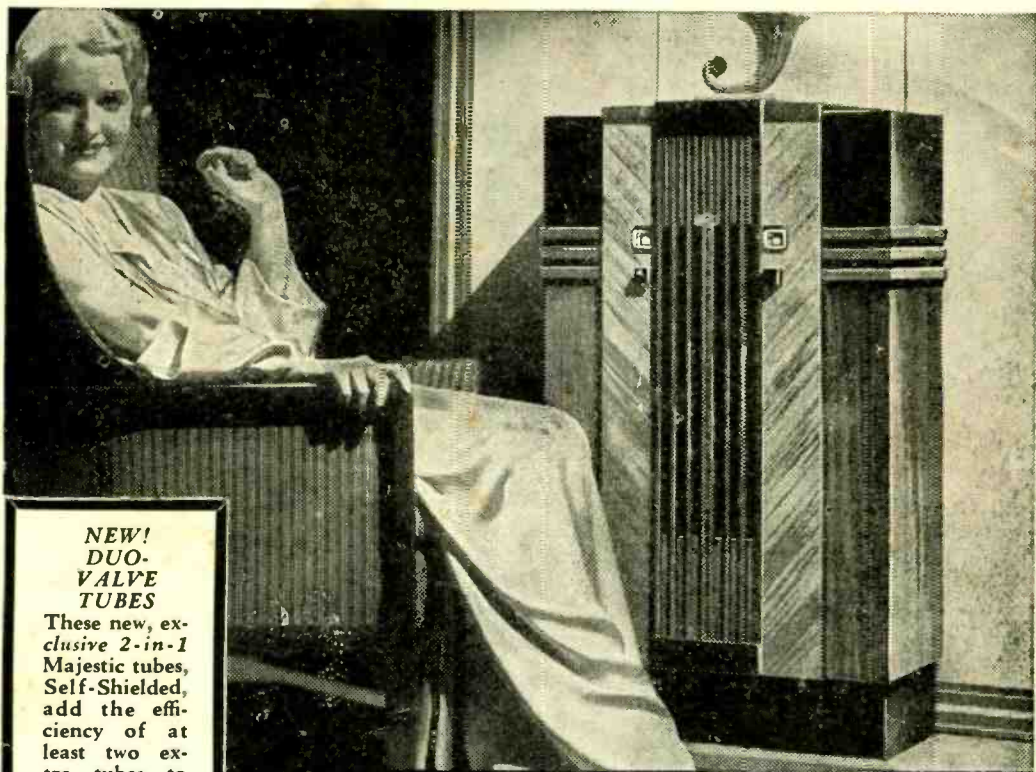
