## WHAT EVERY CB'er SHOULD KNOW

We constantly receive requests from new CB'ers asking about what they may and may not do on 11 meters. A few minutes of listening on the band and it's pretty obvious that a great many of the so-called old timers could also put this type of information to good use. We therefore present one CB'er well phrased and very frank "straight talk" on the subject. Some of Joe's comments will no doubt offend some CB'ers, who will feel that they are slightly more than barbed and harsh. If you're squeemish, better pass this article by.

In order to acquire your license, you signed a statement that you had read Part 95 of FCC regulations. How many of you actually have read them or absorbed their meaning and intent?

As CB has grown from a novelty stage into a complex and frightening giant of confusion and discourtesy, the hard-fast rules of Part 95 have been cast aside, one after another, until each new CB'er has decided to join the wolf pack and do as he pleases.

Up to this point the FCC has not been nearly as stern a father as it could have been. Whether it will be in the future, we can only hope that this will soon be the case as they promise.

Many citations and fines have been issued to date but many of the hardcore offenders are still completely free of any scolding pink slips and fines. Some CB'ers received citations the very first and only time they fell off the fence. This seems unfair but a thorough screening and constant monitoring would cost a fortune in each single locality, so you take your chances when you push the button that you might or might not be the one who is monitored that particular time.

Whether or not the FCC hears you, you

are certainly heard by a multitude of earnestly sincere CB'ers who listen a lot more than they talk, because from the onset they have enjoyed this new giant party line. They have formed social groups and clubs which unite them in a common effort to aid their communities and offer help to victims in distress.

Just imagine something you may not have realized before—everytime you transmit and clobber someone—everytime you overextend your time limit—everytime you fail to give someone else the opportunity to use the channel because you will not stand by for two minutes—everytime you use improper language—everytime you permit your children to use the set without close supervision—everytime you go on the air with some unimportant or "hammy" message and tie up the channel—anytime you violate the rights of others with any infraction of the FCC regulations or violate the rules of common courtesy—*YOU* have created an impression. *YOU* are talked about. *YOU* are a jerk and everybody knows it.

If you find anyone throwing carriers on you (this is not at all nice, it's illegal) perhaps you might take the hint that people don't like the way you operate. There are many who have actually been forced to be gypsies and move from channel to channel until they finally realized that if they observed the regulations they would be welcome on any channel.

No one likes to tell another when he is doing wrong, and in many cases, people go

on doing wrong without realizing it. We would like to list the regulations that govern normal usage both from the standpoint of the FCC and common courtesy. Please read them and pass them on to whomever you might think would benefit from reading them.

### TIME

Under present FCC regulations, you are limited to 5 minutes or *less* when you talk to a unit of a different call letter. Keep transmissions as short as possible—only long enough to convey your message and then clear off. You can be given a citation if the FCC deems your message as not substantive in nature.

When you have made only a short transmission, you must still stand by for 2 minutes. You cannot call or talk to another unit in order to use up “your 5 minutes.” You must wait a *full* 2 minutes between successive contacts with units of different call letters.

If you ask any unit to go to another channel, you must monitor that channel for a full 2 minutes. If it is busy for longer than that, you must wait till it is clear.

You may talk to your own units (same call letters) as long as it is necessary just so long as your call letters are announced every ten minutes and the entire message is substantive in nature. This doesn't mean you can call anybody else your *Unit 2* and go on a long spree. If you fool the FCC for a while you still don't fool your *former* friends who were waiting to use the channel.

Normally if you call someone and talk over five, the FCC will issue a citation only to the party who initiated the call. Set your timer when you start a contact.

### BREVITY IS THE PASSWORD

When you talk to your own units—only one of the units need identify call letters at the beginning and at the end of transmission. When you talk to a unit with different call letters—both units must identify themselves and the other party at both the beginning and the end of transmission. Third party transmissions are illegal—in other words, there is no such thing as a “breaker” except in case of emergency.

You may notify your mobile units that you are 10-8 or “in-service” but ending a transmission with a 10-8 is tantamount to inviting a contact or “CQ'ing.” This has drawn citations from the FCC.

To state that you have not made a contact or to clear without having made a contact is either stupid or another way of inviting a contact. It is also frowned on by the FCC and

will draw a citation for “CQ'ing.” In short, any unnecessary signing on or signing off is recognized as “CQ'ing.”

### TECHNICAL

Your set was designed as a maximum powered legal transmitter. Don't tamper with it. A *qualified licensed technician* may sometimes improve an inefficient set, but if you can transmit better than you can receive you will not be helping yourself but only clobbering others that you cannot hear. If you have a high noise level, it is more than possible that you clobber many people without realizing it. When your antenna is placed illegally high you may cover a greater area, but if everyone did the same it would be the same as increasing the number of sets on the air in a given area. Good grief!

Unless you are operating with a set which offers suitable selectivity, you must put up with adjacent channel interference *uncomplainingly*. It is only natural for each channel to be used more frequently as the number of sets increase; hence adjacent channels in the given area of a monitored channel will need be used. However, it is extremely discourteous on the part of any CB'er to deliberately go on a channel adjacent to the monitoring channel of another CB'er who lives close by; especially when it is known they are receiving a call.

Everyone knows who these people are and what we think of them. This kind of trouble comes mostly from the kindergarten set.

### COURTESY

Nothing in the regulations say so, but courtesy demands at least one simple rule be observed.

A parent who indulges an immature with a CB set *and gives him or her free reign* is more than just illegal. The intention appears to be a deliberate discourtesy to others and at the same time a blessing to the parents who now don't have to worry what “Junior” is up to. And what is “Junior” up to? Just what the FCC figured he would do. He wrangles and argues and fights—throws carriers on others—jumps channels—disregards the rights of others completely and last but not least does his homework for hours on end over the air. These parents will soon start receiving fines and citations. They have already lost the *respect of their CB neighbors*.

If possible, please show this article to each CB station you know of in your general area. We can do no more than bring the facts to the attention of all and hope the violators acquire a sincere desire to help us help themselves.

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

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

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
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# BRUTE FORCE BOOSTER

**A ONE TRANSISTOR PREAMPLIFIER**

I was prompted to write this article after listening to the nasal and noisy audio produced by many CB operators who are using one transistor microphone pre-amplifiers.

It is with a sincere desire to assist those of you who have been frustrated in your efforts to get a unit of this type to operate, also those of you who are inadvertently cluttering the CB band with these noise makers, that I would like to present the following material and a practical solution.

One of the major faults of the one transistor microphone pre-amplifier, now being constructed and used by many CB operators, is the fact that the particular transistor used has a very high noise figure, namely 12 db. The inherently high noise produces splatter which is usually spread over several CB channels.


This type of modulation is, to say the least, annoying to other CB operators within a radius of several miles around the offending station. It is also one of the best means of

how not to get along with your neighbors, since this sideband splatter will most certainly appear on many of their television screens. Furthermore, the usual commercial filter will have little or no effect in reducing this type of interference.

It must be admitted that on occasion someone is lucky enough to purchase one transistor of the type referred to, which may be far below the usual noise specification. However, this is rare and more often than not it is just the reverse.

The transistor in question was not designed for low level audio use and most certainly should not be used to amplify low level signals from a high impedance microphone. I must say, however, that this transistor, (the GE 2N169A) is an excellent unit when used for the purpose for which it was designed.

The design of the one transistor microphone pre-amplifier, that is commonly in use today, is not one to be recommended for the following reasons. Base bias is dependent



upon leakage current of the transistor and the voltage gain is controlled by negative current feedback. In order to get sufficient voltage gain from the transistor, it is sometimes necessary to short out most of the gain potentiometer and remove, or reduce the value of the base series resistor. Under these conditions the input impedance, looking into the base of the transistor, is far too low for use with a high impedance microphone.

It may be necessary to purchase two or more of these transistors before one is suitable for operation in the circuit in question. If you are fortunate enough to obtain a unit with high beta (gain), and nominal leakage current, then a "Brute Force" microphone pre-amplifier is possible, but you still have noise splatter along with very poor audio quality. As a general rule, the microphone pre-amplifier should have a somewhat better frequency response than the overall response of the voltage amplifier and modulator with which it is being used. If you are really a perfectionist, then a pre-amplifier which matches the frequency response of a good quality microphone is ideal. This, however, should be considerably more costly in both components and battery current since this would require a design consisting of two to three transistors.

There are few CB transmitters on the market today which have the capability of 100% voice modulation. Therefore it is obvious that a good quality microphone pre-amplifier is a tremendous asset.


We must also take into consideration the



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various voice types. Not all women are contraltos and by the same token few men have that deep, resonant and romantic voice of some of our masculine movie and television stars; for example: I recently heard a newcomer to CB radio try desperately to get a message across from this mobile to base. It was really pathetic because his particular voice could not possibly modulate the carrier by more than about 50%.

A microphone pre-amplifier with low noise and the proper frequency response is usually a necessity for satisfactory communications from a mobile. For the CB operator mentioned above it is a must if he wishes to maintain communications with his base over any reasonable distance.

We now come to the practical solution of an efficient and low noise microphone pre-amplifier which can be constructed at a very reasonable cost. For optimum results, it is strongly recommended that components listed in the parts list be used with no substitution. It is also absolutely essential that the pre-amplifier be mounted in a metal container, preferable aluminum. The design revolves around a GE 2N508 transistor, which has a typical noise figure of 2 db, as compared to the 12 db noise figure for a GE 2N169A.

This pre-amplifier has been tested on several rigs and has, in all cases, been found to be very effective. It is perfectly stable, with no annoying audio or R. F. feedback. Furthermore, the net price of the 2N508 is \$.83, while the 2N169A price is \$2.40.

Approximately 14 db of negative voltage feedback is used, which produces a flat frequency response from 500 cycles to 10,000 cycles. There is a gradual drop below 500 cycles with 200 cycles being down about 6 db. The voltage gain is 13.5 which is more than sufficient to do the job.

Negative current feedback is supplied by the 510 ohm unbypassed emitter resistor and this resistor also provides some bias (temperature) stabilization. The input impedance is approximately 250,000 ohms and will be satisfactory for use with any high impedance microphone. The transistor consumes only 1.2 ma of battery current which is also a very desirable feature.

This is a one or two evening project at a cost of approximately \$6.00 for parts. The final result will be well worth the effort and nominal expense.

I am sure that all who construct this pre-amplifier will be highly gratified with the results. I sincerely hope that I have solved the problem for many CB operators who are in need of that extra *punch* to get the message across. Good Luck, successful and happy C-being.

You will know when you start winning the battle, because you will start coming home to TV dinners because she was listening to KHA0000 and that weak station from Smallville discussing the coming Jamboree.



# SIGNA-GAINER

**ADD A SIMPLE UNTUNED IF STAGE TO YOUR RECEIVER AND GET 8 TO 10 DB GAIN!**

This almost sounds too good to be true, but this gadget *will* work in any CB rig, giving you a cool 8 to 10 db gain on incoming signals.

The unit is inserted in the circuit of the receiver at the points marked "X" which break the lead from the IF transformer to the signal grid. This will effectively place the two IF tubes in cascade.


After the circuit is wired into the receiver, the IF input transformer will require realignment. This is the only adjustment necessary.

The B+ voltage is 250 volts; with 6 volts on the filaments. The 6660 tube is available from most radio supply houses for about \$1. Other tubes which will work in this circuit

are 6BA6, 6CG6, 7543, 6AU6, 6BD6, and 6136.



## RESULTS OF THE S9 10-CODE SURVEY OR, HOW TANGLED CAN YOU GET?

In our April issue we requested readers to let us know the 10-codes used in their local areas. This was done so that we could try to piece together a uniform listing which could then be offered for use on a national basis—inasmuch as it was becoming obvious that many localities were using conflicting codes. As an example, a motorist on vacation might wish to report an accident. Using his own local 10-code signal list, he announces “10-36.” Very nice, except that the signal 10-36 means *Confidential Information*, or *The Correct Time Is*, or *No Further Help Needed*, or *Accident*—all depending upon which part of the country you hail from. Obviously something was going off the deep end somewhere along the line.

Anyway, we asked our readers to let us know what was going on in their localities and, quite frankly, the results were a bit more than we had bargained for. For instance, want a wrecker? We were told that you should use 10-31, 10-37, 10-51, 10-55, or 10-75 by CB'ers in different parts of the country. This was typical.

What to do? We decided to take a vote, with the most votes for each 10-code number-and-message taking the victor's spoils. It wasn't easy, and certainly the results will create a number of 10-codes which are different than those to which you are accustomed. Should you adopt the composite 10-code we offer here? It's up to you, and it depends pretty much on how strongly you feel about being able to *fully* communicate with *all* CB'ers, regardless of where they hail from. If you don't care, then you can continue to use your present code. If you *do* care, then you can put up with a few weeks of seemingly arbitrary changes, of possible inconvenience, to help CB'ers everywhere establish, for the first time, a truly national language. We don't claim that our little composite is a cure-all—we don't say it's complete—we don't make any claims at all for it except that it's a *first step* towards better communications (we hope).

All clubs and publications are free to copy this code we present in this issue—with or without credit to S9. We give this to all CB'ers for the benefit of the service with the hope that all clubs and individuals will adopt it. We will run it in S9 as often as space permits and free reprints are available from our offices for a self addressed, stamped envelope. Clubs requesting 20 or more copies, please request same on a club letterhead, signed by an officer.

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
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# ZONING LAWS AND THE CB'ER



## CITIZENS BAND LEGAL NOTES

With the growth of citizens band radio have come legal problems relating to the same. One question which has arisen from time to time relates to the applicability of zoning ordinances. The author is not aware of any cases which have reached an Appellate Court. A similar problem, however, did arise with reference to an amateur radio operator's activity. Because of the similarity of the problems, the case of the amateur radio operator may be of interest to citizens band operators who may be confronted with the same type of problem.

The case of the Village of St. Louis Park vs. Thomas J. Casey is a landmark case in which no question of federal control was involved. It was a case between a "ham" and the officials of the town in which he lived. The case went through all of the state courts of Minnesota and finally was decided in 1944 by the Supreme Court of the State of Minnesota. The case is cited in legal reports as 16 N.W. 2d 459; 155 A.L.R. 1128.

Mr. Casey was a "ham" and he erected a 30 foot telephone pole in his yard and mounted a 3 element rotary beam on it. The village of St. Louis Park where Casey lived had a zoning ordinance which prohibited the use of property in a residential zone for any use other than uses incidental to private homes. The city officials brought an action against Mr. Casey to compel him to remove his antenna pole and beam on the grounds that amateur radio is not an incidental use of residential property.

This case was of particular interest because most cities in the United States have zoning laws. Almost all zoning laws in turn set up a residential zone within which only private residences may be built or maintained. If the city's contention in this case was upheld by the courts, then any city with such a zoning ordinance could effectively control amateur radio.

The Supreme Court of Minnesota held as a matter of law that amateur radio activity is a proper incidental use for residential property, and, therefore, held that the city could not compel Casey to remove his antenna.

The Supreme Court used the following interesting language: "The use of short-wave amateur sets for both reception and transmission is so common in the United States that the Federal Communications Commission licenses such sets for transmission within certain wave lengths . . . that many if not most of these amateur stations are operated in connection with residences is too well known as a fact to be ignored."

This judicial recognition of amateur radio work by the Supreme Court of Minnesota was a first in recorded reports of any state court of last resort. The case has been repeatedly cited as legal authority for the proposition that in and of itself amateur radio activities do not violate residential zoning restrictions and that it is a proper incidental use for residential property.

There was no question in the Casey case with reference to violation of any building ordinances or safety ordinances.

It should not be taken for granted, however, that the case of St. Louis Park vs. Casey stopped or answered the attacks of local city authorities against amateur radio activity. Many cities, while accepting the doctrine of the St. Louis Park vs. Casey case, have sought to harass and restrict amateur radio activity through ordinances involving building restrictions, building permits, electrical or engineering requirements, and other types of restrictive ordinances.

The Casey case did not consider any question which may have arisen out of municipal ordinances relating to building restrictions, building permits, engineering requirements or the like. The Casey case

dealt solely with the question of the propriety of Amateur Radio operation as an incidental use of residential property in a residential zone.

The similarity between home use of amateur radio equipment and home use of citizens band equipment is apparent to all. The regulations envision the usage of radio equipment by citizens both at their homes and away from their homes. It would therefore seem that the precedent of the Casey case, in holding that amateur radio operation is an incidental residential use, would be equally applicable to citizens band use. Until an Appellate Court directly passes upon this question as it relates to citizens band operation, the Casey case affords some judicial precedent on the point.



We asked Peter if, like his son, he or his






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# ON THE COUNTERS

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

As usual, your inquiries have sent us scurrying to dig up information on a product which seems to have caught the fancy of CB'ers in several parts of the country, possibly the latest CB fad—dummy VHF mobile radiotelephone type antennas—they look just like the ones used by cars equipped with telephones—but *look like* is all they do, because they aren't attached to anything but the roof of the vehicle. We have seen them too, and they *do* give the

The ones we've eyed are about 12 inches worth of chrome whip with a static ball at the top and a small spring at the bottom. The spring is mounted on a black rubber suction cup which is used to hold the antenna to the vehicle's roof (with the aid of a few drops of glue). No holes are necessary.

A look through the auto supply stores in the New York area revealed such a dummy antenna, known as the *Tele-Phony Antenna*, which sells for varying prices (some for as low as \$1). If you want one, and can't scratch one up from local sources in your area, they are available by mail from J. C. Whitney & Co., 1917 Archer Ave., Chicago, Ill. 60616. Whitney's stock number on the antenna is 17-3591. The total mail order cost of the antenna from them (including postage, and a handling charge for orders less than \$3) is \$2.08. Illinois residents add 4c for Sales Tax. Fad or no fad, we sure had a rough time trying to track this one down for you—but that's what we're here for.

Dubbed "The Most Fantastic Accessory Ever Offered CB," the *Remote Phone* is a remote control head for your CB rig which was designed with the idea of letting you make the XYL happy by placing the CB rig in a hidden place, and the controlling it with something which look no more obtrusive than a telephone. The device is made by Automatic Electronics Corporation, P.O. Box 62, Folsom, Calif., and it's available in black, green, beige, gray, and white. Your rig goes on the air when the handset is lifted, and the VOX control circuit activates the transmitter when you speak. A choice of loudspeaker or handset reception is provided and a built-in mike preamp is also featured. Price is \$59.95. Looks just like a telephone—real nice.

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

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
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# ANTENNAS

## CO-PHASE'M


If you spot your neighbor mounting a second CB antenna next to the first one, he's not going stereo. Chances are he's trying out the recent CB technique of phasing antennas. After all, if one antenna works, two should be twice as good. They are. But hitching antennas together isn't enough. Phasing is a tricky process that involves the kind of formulas that can make an engineer wish he'd studied millinery. A neat answer is provided by Hy-Gain in their new Co-Phaser, a little gray box that does all the

figuring for you. Rigged between two standard CB antennas, the \$14.95 unit juggles transmitter power for more or less gain in different directions. It may even be compared to the action of a directional beam, except that elements remain stationary. It's the radiated pattern that moves.

This invisible movement results from how the Co-Phaser feeds rf to the antennas. It's controlled by the CB'er; a knob on the unit may be turned to various points of a compass dial. If signals in both antennas are in step, or phase, reinforcement occurs. An out-of-step condition produces cancellation of power. Through different combinations, the basic patterns shown in Fig. 1 are obtainable. Where the heavy black arrows appear, the signal is more than double the strength you'd get with a single antenna.


Not only is there a power gain in the directions shown, there's another useful effect. Received signals react in similar fashion. For example, in the top drawing of Fig. 1, antenna gain is best for signals which arrive from the left. Striking the elements, they are built up beyond the gain experienced with a single antenna. Signals from the right, however, enter the dead side and suffer losses. Thus the phasing effect is valuable for reducing interference from signals on the same channel, but outside the main pickup pattern.

Amid good reports from people using the Co-Phaser, Hy-Gain notices that two points tend to confuse some CB'ers. For one, gain figures given for the system are not totals, but additional power increases you can expect over a single antenna. For example, with one collinear antenna, gain is 3.4 db. Two collinears in the phasing setup can add as much as 4.5 db gain to the 3.4 db figure. Secondly, Hy-Gain points out that the Co-Phaser is not restricted to use with its own-make antennas. It works with a pair of any CB antennas, as long as they are identical to each other.



## PI-IN-THE-SKY

"I can tune my transmitter into a piece of wet spaghetti," claims one CB'er, "it's gotta pi-network." Maybe there's more sass than sauce in that remark, but "pi-nets" are coming on strong. And for good reason; they provide a handy method for transferring rf power out of the rig and into transmission line and antenna. Designers like pi-nets since they do away with a tricky mechanical link for loading the final. And TV viewers should appreciate them, too—pin-nets help knock out nasty harmonics, especially the one that puts you on TV channel 2. For the CB'er they provide a convenient method of loading an antenna to rated power. But like any good thing, pi-nets need to be handled with some care.



A rig equipped with a pi-net has two adjustments for transmitter tune-up into the antenna. Though not marked in many units, they are Plate and Antenna—two variable capacitors that control output of the final rf amplifier stage. It's a good idea to identify and label them accordingly. It can make tune-up easier and more accurate. Finding them can be done by comparing your set's schematic with the one shown in Fig. 2. First locate the final rf amplifier tube, then the variable capacitors usually located just to the right of it, as in the drawing. The one nearest the tube is plate tuning, the other is antenna loading.

We'll consider two popular methods of antenna tune-up and note how these adjustments are handled. One is the use of a milliammeter plugged into the jack found on most CB sets. According to manufacturer's instructions, when a specified amount of current shows on the meter, the transmitter is on or near the 5-watt input power rating. (Usually the reading is in the 20-30 milliamperes range.) And here is where the pi-net must be handled with care. It is easy to make the meter read enough current, but have a sizeable chunk of power turn into useless heat inside the final tube and never reach the antenna. It's prevented by the dip-'n-peak method.

Let's assume that the antenna is connected and the milliammeter jacked into the

rig. After the push-to-talk button is pressed, plate tuning is adjusted for a dip—or *least* possible amount of current on the meter. An attempt to increase current by this adjustment results in wasted watts. Next, antenna loading is varied to *increase* the meter reading. An important step here is to raise current by just a slight amount, a milliamperes or two. Now back to plate tuning which will have been thrown off by the antenna loading. Again, antenna loading is used to bring the meter up slightly. This sounds like trying to balance a pair of greased pigs, but after each back-and-forth action, the meter will read slightly higher current after the dip. This indicates that you're approaching a proper match between rig and transmission line—more rf power is flowing into the antenna system. As the match improves,

there'll be less of a tendency for antenna loading to upset the plate dip. The process is done until the meter reads recommended current. Whatever the reading, the last step is always dipping the plate.

There's a possibility that the antenna loading capacitor will not behave as described; that is, fail to increase current. It sometimes happens since the control may be in the wrong starting position (minimum capacity). The remedy is to give it a quarter-turn once or twice until it begins to behave properly.

If your antenna tune-up is done with a field-strength meter, the pi-net is handled the same, but the read-out is different. Here, both plate and antenna controls are adjusted for highest reading on the field-strength meter. Again, the careful back-and-forth action must be followed to extract most power out of the rig. It is the slow build-up that determines the best settings for the two controls.

At some point in the antenna loading control, you'll find that output on the field-strength meter drops suddenly to nearly nothing. This indicates that the capacitor has been turned too far and is destroying the proper match. Just back off slightly on the control to restore the rig's output.

# CB CASEBOOK

**WOULD YOU LIKE TO READ ABOUT YOUR COMMERCIAL USE OF CB IN S9? IF SO, WRITE TO US.**



Come on along gang. We're going to the movies! Our host is that genial gentleman, Cliff Brown, KID7894, of Kane, Penna., operator of an indoor theatre, and three drive-in theatres.

From what Cliff tells your S9 reporter, Kane must be a CB'ers idea of paradise. "Kane is located on one of the highest points in the state of Pennsylvania, about 2200 feet above sea level, and is widely known all over the East as a great spot for the relief of hay fever and asthma. It is located in the middle of the Allegheny National Forest, and in October, November, and December, we cater to Deer, Bear, Turkey, and small-game hunters from 300 miles in every direction. Kane is about 9 miles from the site of the new Kinzua Dam. We sit right on top of Pennsylvania and go down hill to go in any direction.

"It is in connection with my drive-in theatre operations that CB has really proved of value to me. My theatres are located about 25 to 30 miles apart. I can't always reach them via radio from theatre to theatre, but I never have any trouble from my mobile as soon as I get on some high ground in between. As you can imagine, I spend a great deal of my time on the road, between theatres, and it is always helpful for my associates to be able to reach me, no matter where I am.

"I have operated the Temple Theatre, here, for about 26 years, and have been in the drive-in theatre business since 1950. It was at that time that I built the Limestone Drive-In Theatre in nearby Limestone, New York, just 5 miles over the state line from Bradford, Penna. In 1953 our other two drive-ins were established; the Family, 3 miles east of Kane, and the Roulette, near Port Allegheny, Penna. The Limestone and Roulette theatres are about 30 miles from my base station, here in Kane.

"Sometimes I have difficulty reaching these two distant theatres when conditions are bad, but signals really bang-in as soon as I get on the road and reach some of the high points overlooking this beautiful countryside.

"We also make excellent use of several walkie-talkies at each theatre. They make it very easy to handle crowds, when the occasion demands. When we can anticipate an extremely large crowd we use a mobile and a pair of walkie-talkies. The mobile is parked at the drive-in entrance, and directs the ramp boys with the walkie-talkies. They can then direct the cars to the locations that are available for parking. It also makes it easier to patrol the lot and ensure proper department.

"Our principal communications between theatres concern supplies, film shipments, and bookings, and CB has saved us many times from what once were anxious moments. There is nothing like having the public beating the door down to your theatre and not knowing where the film is, or even if it is on the way.

"We had a CB Jamboree at our Family Drive-In last September 29th, and being an ardent CB'er, I considered it a huge success. I scheduled it for a Sunday afternoon, to start at 1 P.M., and I told all my CB contacts about it for a month in advance. The CB'ers started to arrive in caravans of 30 to

40 cars starting at 11 A.M. We served free Coffee and Doughnuts all day to everyone, and if they wanted other food items we were prepared to serve them from our Snack Bar. Although we experienced the only disagreeable day in the entire period from September to October—it was a rainy and cold day—we registered about 400 CB'ers, and we only got about half of them as they wouldn't stand in line in the cold. We estimate between 700 and 800 attended, and they came from all points, including Buffalo, New York, Erie (Pittsburgh, Ohio and West Virginia.

"Our local Seneca Highlands CB Association arranged a fine display of antennas and equipment for the visitors to inspect when they took a break from just gabbing. We are going to do it again this year, and the big date is set for Sunday, August 23. We expect this one to be even bigger and better, now that we've had a little experience, and everyone is welcome.

"CB just doesn't stop for me during the winter months, even though my drive-in theatres are closed from the first of November to the middle of April. I use my base station to great advantage at this time to assist in searches for lost hunters, giving people information on roads and routes, and



arranging rooms and accommodations for travelers. From my base station I can reach reliably a distance of about 50 miles, and I have been able to help in a great many emergencies. Just recently, I heard a call from a mobile who was stuck in snow about 40 miles south of here near Sigel, Penna. By relay, we were able to get him out of his trouble and send him a new tire so that he could continue on his way.

"We've even been able to help in the recapture of two escapees from the county jail, and have notified the local hospitals several times of accidents on the highway.

"Excuse me just a moment. Pardon me lady, but would you please remove your foot from the brake? The show is about to begin."





## THIS MAN IS WANTED BY THE FBI



Alfred Oponowicz, who is known as a skilled safe cracker and allegedly fled from an Ohio courtroom while being tried for bank burglary, has been added to the FBI's list of "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives."

This veteran criminal was arrested while allegedly fleeing from the attempted burglary of the Broadway and East 57th Street Branch of the Cleveland Trust Company, Cleveland, Ohio, on the early morning of September 2, 1962. Numerous burglary tools, two-way radios, a police radio monitor and a fully loaded .38 caliber revolver were recovered near the crime scene.

He is a white American who was born at Carnegie, Pennsylvania, on January 4, 1926. He is 5'9" to 5'10" tall, weighs between 170 and 185 pounds, has a medium build, a fair complexion, dark brown hair and hazel eyes. He bears a 4" scar on the inside of his left forearm, a scar on the left side of his chin, a 1/2" cut scar on the right side of his forehead, a 1" scar on the calf of his right leg, a 2" scar on his left lower jawbone, a small scar on his right cheek, a scar on the right and middle ring fingers, a scar on the back of his left hand, a scar on the point of his chin, a scar over his left eye and a scar above his right knee from a gunshot wound. The bulb of his right ring finger is large and scarred.

This fugitive is believed to be heavily armed with various weapons, including a machine gun, has a history of escapes from custody and has reportedly stated he will shoot it out with law enforcement officers rather than being taken alive. He should be considered extremely dangerous.

If you have any information concerning the whereabouts of Alfred Oponowicz, you are requested to immediately notify the nearest office of the FBI, the telephone number of which may be found on the first page of local telephone directories. 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

Anyway, getting back to the "new" ACBA, we note that they have finally gotten around to blasting poor old Ernie Walker (founder of the ACBA) for his behind-the-scenes article which ran in the January issue of S9. Ernie was notified in writing by the ACBA's new president that they would let him back in the club "if you promise to discontinue the attacks on us, and that you promise to fall in line with the present efforts and aims of the association." Them's pretty strong words, podner—they violate the basic freedoms of free thought and free speech. 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
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
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
