APRIL PROGRAMS

Columbia's Special Feature broadcasts are arranged on a week to week, sometimes day to day, and even, on occasion, hour to hour basis. One result of this flexibility and timeliness is the following partial list of April programs which were arranged too late for inclusion in the last month's issue of THE COLUMBIA PROGRAM BOOK.

As Germany struck rapidly through Denmark into Norway, and war in Europe flared up with new intensity, the Columbia Broadcasting System heightened its foreign news coverage. In addition to its present schedule of two round-ups of European news each day, CBS added several broadcasts from overseas daily when the Norwegian crisis was at fever pitch. The land battles in Norway, and the sea battles off its coast, were covered by CBS' regular staff correspondents and by Miss Betty Wason, who was added to the staff as Stockholm radio correspondent with Germany's latest thrust. After the battlcs raging in Norway subsided to the slower, steadier grind of war, Columbia returned to its regular war-time news schedule - prepared, on a twenty-four hour basis, to enlarge its coverage wherever important, unexpected events broke out again.

APRIL 6: General Hugh S. Johnson presented a "Jeffersonian Analysis" of the New Dcal as the principal speech at the annual Jefferson dinner under the auspices of the National Democratic Club in New York City. 10:15–10:30 p.m.

APRIL 7: H. W. Prentis, president of the National Association of Manufacturers, was interviewed by Edwin C. Hill on the N.A.M.'s "mobilization for better understanding of private enterprise," 10:30–10:45 p.m. APRIL 10: An address entitled "A Court of Appeal for Postal Employees" was delivered over the Columbia Network by Senator James Mead, Democrat of New York. Senator Mead's talk originated in the studios of WJSV, Columbia station for the nation's capital, 10:15–10:30 p.m.

APRIL 13: Representative Frank B. Keefe. Republican of Wisconsin, voiced a plea over the Columbia Network for further Congressional deliberation before final action on the Wheeler-Lea Transportation Bill, 10:15-10:30 p.m.

APRIL 14: Panl V. McNutt, Federal Security Administrator who will seek the Democratic nomination for the presidency if President Roosevelt does not run for a third term, described his plan of action for defeating the problem of unemployment over CBS. 10:30-10:45 p.m.

APRIL 14: Senator Clyde M. Reed, Republican of Kansas, delivered an address from the studios of WJSV, Washington, in Columbia's timely "American Viewpoints" series, 10:45-11 p.m.

APRIL 16: Senator Tom Stewart. Democrat of Tennessee, discussed "Freight Rates" in an address over the coast-to-coast Columbia Network. He spoke from Washington, 10:45-11 p.m.

APRIL 18: Representative Francis E. Walter, Democrat of Pennsylvania and co-sponsor of the Logan-Walter Bill. discussed the implications of the bill in a CBS talk originating in the studios of WJSV, 10:45–11 p.m.

APRIL 19: Lord Lothian, British Ambassador to the United States who has been heard in addresses on the European war several times over the Columbia Network, broadcast from KMOX in St. Louis, 11:15–11:30 p.m.

APRIL 20: Postmaster General James A. Farley, who is mentioned prominently as a possible Democratic candidate for the presidency, addressed students of forensics from twenty colleges. assembled in the Nassau Tavern at Princeton University. Mr. Farley emphasized important aspects of the presidential campaign, which are particularly interesting to University students, 1:30-2 p.m.

APRIL 21: Postmaster General Farley, chairman of the Democratic National Committee, spoke again over the Columbia Network in response to the tribute of Massachusetts Democrats at a testimonial dinner in Boston, 10:30–11 p.m.

APRIL 25: Senator David I. Walsh, Democrat of Massachusetts, was heard over the Columbia Network in an address on American maritime problems, entitled "The Needs of Our Navy," 10:15–11 p.m.

APRIL 27: Senator Robert R. Reynolds. Democrat of North Carolina. and Representative Jennings Randolph, Democrat of West Virginia, spoke over CBS from the studios of WJSV. Washington, 10:15–10:30 p.m.

APRIL 28: A series of CBS interviews of presidential candidates, as they are nominated, was continued as Albert Warner, Columbia Washington correspondent, quizzed John W. Aiken, candidate of the Socialist Labor Party. Aiken had just been named the party's standard-bearer for the 1940 election at a nominating convention in New York City, 10:30–10:45 p.m.

APRIL 30: I. M. Ornburn, head of the Union Label League of the American Federation of Labor, delivered a special address over the nationwide Columbia Network. His topic was "Union Label Action," and the program originated in the studios of WJAS, Pittsburgh, 3:35-3:45 p.m.

SPECIAL EVENTS

APRIL 2: Two choral programs were broadcast over the Columbia Network in connection with the Music Educators National Conference in Los Angeles. The latter—originating in the Shrine Auditorium, Los Angeles — was devoted to the Sacramento Junior College Music Festival and featured the massed Festival A Cappella Choir of 750 voices and the Festival Symphony Orchestra of 125 pieces. The earlier broadeast presented the College Choir of 60 voices under the direction of Miss Ivine Shields, 6:15– 6:30 p.m. and 12:30–1 a.m.

APRIL 6: Professor John T. Frederick of the Medill School of Journalism, Northwestern University, who conducts the CBS serial, "Of Men and Books," interviewed Neil Mac-Neil, assistant managing editor of The New York Times, in a special broadcast. MacNeil. author of a recent volume on newspaper work, spoke from New York. Professor Frederick from Chicago, 1:15-1:30 p.m.

APRIL 13: Queen Elizabeth of England was heard in a direct broadcast from London in connection with the Young Women's Christian Association's 85th anniversary eelebration. Queen Elizabeth who is international honorary president of the Y.W.C. A., spoke after brief introductory remarks by Miss F. 1. Campbell, vice-president of the British organization, 3:45–4 p.m.

APRIL 15.20 AND 27: Bryan Field described the Pomonok Handicap (4:30-4:45 p.m.), the Experimental Handicap (4:45-5 p.m.). and the Wood Memorial Handicap (4:30-4:45 p.m.) in special broadcasts from the Jamaica race track.

APRIL 15: Mel Allen, Arch McDonald, France Laux, and Pat Flanagan-CBS baseball reporters covering home games in New York. Washington, St. Louis. and Chieago respectively-previewed the 1940 pennant campaigns in a special broadcast, 11:15-11:30 p.m.
