

An Auxiliary Tone Control

To add an effective tone control on a set or amplifier, the tuned band-pass filter shown in the accompanying diagram provides a means of emphasizing bass response. A switch may be inserted in the lead to the grid of the power tube as indicated to disconnect the circuit for the reception of weak signals.



Checking a.v.c. Circuits

A simple method of checking a.v.c. circuits of many standard models of receivers is to ground the grid return of the first i.f. coil. If this trick doesn't increase sensitivity of the set something has gone haywire in the circuit.

A Hum Detector

In order to locate hum due to magnetic leakage surrounding a power transformer or filter choke, a small electromagnet simply connected to a set of headphones will serve as a direction finder of stray fields. If greater sensitivity is desired, a vacuum tube voltmeter can be employed as the detector instead of phones.


