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SA HISTORY OF IDAHO AM RADIO S

An incomplete history of Idaho AM radio would be a more appropriate title for this article as there is some station information missing. In compiling such a report we run into four main problems:

 Since it has been almost 70 years since the first licensed stations came on the air most of the people who were involved with them are now

2. The FCC was not formed until the mid 1920s (then as the Federal Radio Commission) & there are incomplete or missing records on many of the pioneer broadcasters. A few years back the FCC office in Portland OR sent me a list of stations supposedly on the air in the early 1920s. As far as I could tell only a couple of those stations survived so I suspect there could be many pioneer broadcasters long forgotten. The list was from the memory of one of the Portland FCC officials and may not be complete or accurate. Unfortunately the list is currently packed away (I am planning a move in the near future) & was not

available for this article but once it is located I hope to review it for further research.

3. In the early 1920s several federal agencies issued broadcast licenses and those records are also few and far between. In fact many of the original stations evolved from amateur stations so their actual broadcast histories may go farther back than their listed sign on dates.

4. Most of the pioneer broadcasters have been sold a multitude of times since their first sign on & they no longer have complete or

accurate information available on their own station history.

This list was prepared from information I first collected in the early 1970s when I researched the history of Idaho TV broadcasting & from information I collected directly from the stations for the IDAHO BROADCASTING GUIDE. The stations are listed in rough order of sign on date & also includes dates (when know) of call letter changes. A few stations, noted by a '*' preceding the call letters, have additional information following the list.

A major component missing are the numerious frequency changes of the earlier stations. I know from reviewing older copies of the IDAHO STATESHAN both KFXD & KIDO changed frequencies several times over the past 60 years. Forming a complete history of these changes would be an interesting project I may work on at a later date.

Specific dates for some changes in both call letters and frequencies are also missing from the mid 1970s to early 1980s as I did not start keeping complete records until I published the first IDAHO BROADCASTING GUIDE in 1984.

STATIONS NOT YET ON THE AIR

???? 870, Eagle KIDH 1000, Eagle KZUN 1600, Elk City *KLIT 1210, Meridian *KORI 1450, Payette

KIDO-First on the air as KFAU in May 1922, owned by Boise High School. Was sold to the Davidson family (who moved from Eugene OR) in 1928. They owned the station until 1959 when they decided to make KIDO-TV their primary business. KIDO-TV then became KTVB. It has been told in early accounts of KFAU, the reason for the station being sold was the school district could no longer afford to keep replacing the final tubes that were always burning out. KFAU may have been one of the first educational broadcasters in the country.

KFXD-put on the air by Frank Murt in Logan UT in 1922 (BROADCASTING YEARBOOK says May 20, 1920 but former KFXD management said 1922). He moved the station to Jerome ID in 1925 and later to Nampa in 1927. I have found some listings to show the Nampa move occured in 1930 but now believe 1927 is the correct year.

KID-former frequencies were 1320 & 1350

KUNI-was on 1240 with 1kw until the mid 1970s when it moved to 1080

with 10kw day, 1kw night. KBOI-was first on 950, moved to 670 on May 9, 1968 with 50kw day and 25kw night. Went to 50kw night Feb. 16, 1981. KDSH became KBOI in 1955 when the owners transferred the city of license of KBOI-TV from Meridian to Boise. KBOI-TV became KBCI in 1975 when both stations were sold to separate owners.

KACH-changed calls to KACH from KPST sometime in the late 1970s.

KSPI-my original listing for first sign on date was 1944 but BROADCASTING YEARBOOK shows 1949.

KRXK-station told me their first sign on was in 1954 but BROADCASTING YEARBOOK lists Jan. 1951.

KIZN-was orginally on 740, moved to 730 in Dec. 1984

KOZE and KLER (both owned by 4-K Radio) swapped frequencies in the late 1970s.

KBRV-went off the air with sister FM KFIS 100.1 in the summer of 1986. In 1988 both stations were sold and KFIS came back on the air. The new owners said they planned to have KBRV on the air later in the year. At this writing there has been no indication the station has returned.

KSPD-was off the air from 1972 to 1978. It could be argued the 1978 to present broadcast operations are actually a different station from those of 1959-1972. BROADCASTING YEARBOOK lists the first sign on date for KEST as 1959 but the original owners said the station came on the air in April of 1961. I do seem to remember the station being on the air before 1961.

KBGN-was originally on 910, changed to 1060 in the late 1970s.

KKIC-as KAIN moved to 950 from 1010 in 1968 when KBOI moved to 670. In the early 1980s it was sold to the owners of KKIC FM, 101.7. KKIC was off the air from 1984 to May 1987. The station was also licensed to Meridian from the early 1980s until 1988 when relicensed to Boise.

KZID-station may be coming back on the air under new management. has been reported prospective owners have been looking the station

KLIT-owner, Mary Lake Communications (FM KIYS 92.3) may have dropped plans for the station.

KACY/KORI-station (with sister FM, KQPD 100.1, also off the air in 1986) was sold in either 1986 or 1987 to Owyhee Broadcasters Inc. The original offices and studios no longer exist. The call letters KORI were approved for both stations in 1987. As of this date no progress has made on getting KORI (AM or FM) on the air. I checked with the Payette Chamber of Commerce in 1988 and they said there had been no Owyhee Broadcasters Inc.
