On Nov. 2nd while listening to Ron Robin over WBZ-1030, I was treated to a dual broadcast as Julian Cowley of Piccadilly Radio from Manchester, England was also on the air live via phone link. Interesting hearing ads and promos during the evening from England. Views in broadcasting and even a few comments about governments were expressed by both DJs.

Here's a DX WORLDWIDE-WEST EXTRA!!! I received this long report from Frank Merrill-Macomb, Illinois on his trip to Alaska. There is alot of interesting information that brings back memories of when I lived up there in the 60s.

FAIRBANKS-NENANA, ALASKA

AUGUST 86

Equipment used: KENWOOD R-1000, hooked up to spare car battery.

Antennas: Mile 339-450 foot longwire SE/NW, site soon abandoned.

Mile 326-900 foot longwire hidden beside highway, NE/SW, used extensively for Southern hemisphere loggings, as well as most arctic and Eastern Canadians.

Mile 326-500 foot longwire, NE/SE, running across somebodys property, used for nearly all domestic loggings, and also worked better for Asians though the 900 footer worked OK for those too. Mile 326-450 foot longwire, E-W, soon abandoned and respooled because it had to lie across the highway (risky) and its results were very similar to the 500-foot wire.

I got away with leaving the 900 and 500 foot wires to just lie there for almost three weeks and nobody ever broke them or discover and stole the wires. These three wires were on a mountaintop site on the George Parks highway, somewhat closer to Nenana than to Fairbanks. Mile 339 was 13 miles closer to Fairbanks and the additional splatter from locals prompted the 326 Mile site.

DXING IN FAIRBANKS: GE Superadio inside small efficiency apartment, downtown. A horrendous electrical buzz (even faintly audible behind KCBF-820's 25KW nighttime signal two miles away) kept most things from coming in, but occasionally the buzz could be almost nulled which would allow some nuggets like KSTP-1500 and KGER-1390 come in. TW-DX buffs will be interested to know that Channels 2 and 11 towers were both 1/3 mile from me, and mt cheap TV had signals on every channel up to 83!! Mostly due to KATN-2. This is probably the worst DX location in Alaska, though one station KWJJ-1080 was heard in the apartment and never logged at either Parks Highway site.

LEGEND AND NOTES

UNDERLINED STATIONS could be heard at least a slight trace under Daytime Band scan conditions.

NUMBERS 1 THROUGH 4 precede the call letters, and group them according to how often they were heard at night:

1. Station was a full-fledged PEST which was almost always there when reception from its area (or part of the World) opened up...and.. the station showed up every night. Dominant on its frequency. Note that any Asians shown in this category were not in every night, because there were some nights of no Asian reception at all.

2. Station appeared almost every night and maybe would dominate or mix in occasionally. There was at least one night or two, when the station never did show up.

3. Station not noted every night but maybe a small majority of nights, but was an occasional visitor noted at least three different sessions.

4. Station was rare, only heard once or twice.

NUMBERS 5 THROUGH 7 tell how I logged the station if by less than a positive ID, firm "networking" with other known stations, or obvious local/regional content, Number appears after the call letters in parentheses.

5. ID'ed by Time Check. These are English Speaking stations only and if there was a time check six hours off Alaskan time and there was only one Eastern Austraian on the frequency and nothing else in that time zone, I counted it. Almost all stations initially looged that way were later logged by call letters or other such positive IDs and very few time check IDs remained.

6. ID'ed by language (only if Japanese, Russian, or French) Music sytle (regional musics such as South Seas style) common sense, propagation patterns and so on...this was used only when I felt there was no other way to ID the stations and was usually used on stations that were somewhat common.

7. Nothing else was possible! With #RPH and 7RPH, each frequency had two stations and the 2RPH-4RPH signals were IDed. The Taiwans, after Networking 800/850/900 had faded in almost an hour after the last vestiges of Lower North America had faded, were not in English, and nothing else shows up on these frequencies that makes any sense.

NOTES ABOUT LOGGINGS, ETC.

- 711 AUSSIES-The only time I could reliably ID these was between 1210 and 1215, when each state's ABC stations run a short statewide newscast. That is when I heard a Queensland one night, Tasmania another night.
- 800-850-900 TAIWAN All // with sporting event of some kind. Long after North American sywave had faded out and not in EE, nothing else is sensible.
- 846 <u>2ZD</u> was noted only once during exceptional NZ skip in spite of relatively clear channel. Apparently doesn't get out all that well.
- 960 CBKF and the 690 presumed to be the FF's on the same morning that CKCK 620 blasted in, nothing else noted East of Wimipeg. CHAK was logged with the CBC FM Stereo program "Brave New Waves" (which I enjoy listening to here in Macomb with a satellite dish on the 900' wire and disconnecting it and putting the 500' in place immediately changed it to CFPR who had a 40's music program. Was too late for CBH.
- 1080 KASH I don't think they ever signed off, but they were more subject to fading than any other Alaskan Powerhouse over 1 KW.
- 1220 KDFC My only U.S. Daytimer heard at SRS. This was on 8/24 maybe using night authorization (170 watts?) Maybe it was SRS already in Palo Alto.
- 1230 UNIDS Starting here, there was many spots where I could say "numerous" UNID stations, but I will just state that here. It would be too redundant to do it any other way. UNID There was a strong open carrier nated often here at night, sometimes

even before Midnight Alaska Time--perhaps a Canadian or Californian? <u>KIFW</u> was the only normal on the air Alaskan that I never heard. In an <u>iron</u>ic twist, I accidently tuned to their s/off later in Northern B.C. <u>NICHTWATCH</u> All Night contemporary music show noted on 1230-1240-1340-<u>1400-1450</u> one night! Many British Columbia mentions and apparently delivered by satellite, never any mentions of call letters or main studios even on top of hour.

- 1250 UNID station noted here 8/19 running all night Jazz and Easy Listening music, noted only while CIGO/CKCW/CHRM were coming in, never breaking for announcements. Maybe CBGA? Couldn't even firm it up to anything like CBF or CJBC because nothing like it was coming in.
- 1280 CKCV? Somebody was // CHRM-1290 on 8/9. Ny CJMS logging is based on hearing its // on 1140... I have a recent Survey Chart that lists both CJMS and CJTR on it, but the chart is not recent enough to have CHRM on it, so I don't know if it's CJMS or CKCV that's in CHRM's network overnight.
- 1450 KWRW On 8/11 at 0600 it sounded like "It's the top of the hour at KWRW AM-1450, Blueprint" Station coming in quite clearly with MYL format. Good central U.S. conditions this morning. Beaumont call change?
- 1494 WSZA, No ID heard, but who else would go from normal EE United Nations program straight into Native language? No hourly ID, unless in Native.
- 1521 CHINA? I have their IS and extensive top of hour announcements on tape totally flawless at armchair copy--I cannot understand one word!
- 1584 <u>4VL TRANSLATOR</u> At 200 watts (I hav e their jingle on top) this is my weakest DX logging and my lowest watts-per mile ever...

SUMMARY OF MOST CONSISTENT STATIONS, ETC.

MOST COMMON SYWAVE OUTSIDE ALASKA: Northern California hands down!! STRONGEST SIGNAL (LOCAL): KCBF-820

STRONGEST STATION PERIOD: KYAK-650, sometimes 15-20 DB stronger that KCBF!! STRONGEST CANADIAN: CKDA-1200 (I'm glad it is off 1220, where it would have been more harmfull.

STRONGEST FROM THE LOWER 48: KFAX-1100 or KFBK-1530...these two were often the first to fade in and the last to fade out at SRS as well. STRONGEST REGIONAL OUTSIDE OF ALASKA: KHSL-1290 or KDIA-1310, real powerhouses STRONGEST JAPAN: 774, 693, or 1134 STRONGEST NEW ZEALAND and AUSTRALIA: 4CG-1197, 2WL-1314 or 4I0-1008 MOST COMMON STATION EAST OF MOUNTAIN TIME ZONE: KQWB-1550 WEAKEST DOMESTIC FREQUENCY: 840 with 1210 next in line. MOST COMMON GRAVEYARDER NOT FROM ALASKA: KNRY-1240 MOST AMAZING CONSISTANT STATION: 7AD-900, 2KW from Tasmania, noted or

suspected all of the four MM's that I DXed with KNUI off.

WORDS ABOUT NETWORKING

Fortunately Japan, Australia, New Zealand, and Fiji all have extensive networks of programmes in //. Once I would know one station, finding //s made it easy to log other stations. Sometimes the // programming made it possible to ID stations that would have otherwise been impossibly far down in the mud, like from 1200-1300 when Japans NHK-1 Network sometimes plays Hindustani-type music that "can cut through ANYTHING you want it to." The "Z" stations of New Zealand (Except the ZM's) had very long teletalk shows in // interspersed with some adult contemporary music with the ads seeming to be regionalized, while the "Y" stations (except sometimes the YCs) ran mostly musical shows ranging from soft music to pre-war country and western music. Australia's ABC has all three networks, but that sometimes got confusing because some stations will break away with regional stuff (like 40H-630), and sometimes I would note a particular transmitter with ABC-1, but an hour later the same transmitter would have ABC-2 or ABC-3 instead. This networking of ABC stations still works fine, though, when a frequency has only one ABC listed. Without these networks I surely wouldn't have heard over 100 Aussies !!

DISCRIPTIONS OF THE MOST INTERESTING DATES, IN MY OWN SUBJECTIVE ORDER:

1. August 6 (0700-1100): AWESOME signals from central U.S. stations, and KV0C-1230 dominated for 21 hours while KCRE-1450 and KCAP-1340 were in and out. Sixteen domestics heard that day that were not heard on any other date, more nonduplications taking place today than any other date. I think that this criterion is probably the best way to separate the truely great DX sessions from the others, and it works everywhere-not just in Alaska. Most of my east of Rockies regionals came today, just as WACO, WMBD, etc. The normal California "pests" didn't show up until about 1100, about 3 hours later than any other date. After 1100, conditions to NZ/AUSTRALIA were quite good. This is also the date of an awesome but non-ID KXYZ-1320, and a suspect KUN0-1400 in SS.

2. August 3, all morning: Actually these were the second worst reception conditions of any session during the entire period, but there were many things there weaker than usual, and the number of DUs (though very weak) actually was more than on normal days. With 66 new stations logged after Midnight, this was the most productive after midnight session of all. Today was also so very interesting because my only DU reception thus far in Alaska(and in the past 21 years) had been a handful of them on August 2 (the worst date of the period) and I wasn't used to the idea of lots of DUs yet. This was only my 2nd day at mile 326 DX Site.

3. August 18 (1200-1400): Asians dominated the entire dial, after an early fadeout of North Americans, with some frequencies at least 3 and 4 deep with Adians! It was awesome to hear TP frequencies become graveyarders, especially the frequencies with 1 and 2 DUs also present.

4. August 19 (0900-0900) 1 feel that #3 and this gave me a taste of routine non-Auroral winter conditions in Alaska. The top of the arc from fairbanks to the Maritimes feel into darkness for an hour or so, and CICO/CKCW/CHRM and the 1290 FF and the strange 1250 demolised their respective frequencies. These catches are similar to hearing TAS from Ohio. Of course this isn't the entire Winter story: furopeans are not possible from Fairbanks in mid-August because the entire region North of about 75 degrees North Latitude still has NSP sun! In the Winter most of the same area is in NSP Darkness, meaning one might even hear Europeans from Fairbanks at noon in early Winter!

5. August 8 (0700-0830): Good, but selective skip. This allowed me to ID quite a few Western U. S. Graveyarders without much problem. Probably half of my West Coast "4" category graveyarders came in during this 1-1; hour period. By 0830 the skip selectivity had waned, but the resulting pile-ups made the IDs hard.

6. ALL OTHER DATES: Starting 1136 August 2 and ending 0930 August 26(when I abandoned the DX Site, re-spooled the antennas and left Alaska Interior. Fvery session contributed some very interesting DX.

CONCLUDING REMARKS:

Alaska still remains a DXERS PARADISE on MW. It took no time at all to nearly log 700 stations, doing so in only 21 DX sessions. in AUGUST !! Considering distances, Alaska DXing is constantly better than Monday Morning DX in the early 60s with good conditions. This observer has not had as much fun DXing since the halcyon days in the early and mid 60s. A DXER here would need to command a number of languages, because dates like 8/18 can make MW sound as cosmopolitan as the 31 Meter Band. I'm not sure if I had any Auroral reception or not, but I can envision the Aurora playing very strange tricks on MW reception, like "auroraing out many of the Western pests, but letting a nice pocket of stations in from lets say the Great Lakes region (even Graveyarders) sneak in by ducking under the Aurora on their way to Alaska. Was this what was happening on August 6th? I am very curious to see what people heard on this date, and I actually suspect that it was one of those dates of really horrible summer conditions in the Lower 48. Everybody should keep in mind that this was not done from the coast, but in the Interior of Alaska" more than 300 miles from the coast in any direction. It certainly makes me wonder what would be possible from the true coast of Alaska!!

(EDITORS NOTES) Really an excellent article. It makes me want to go back to Seward, Alaska (South Central coast). As many know, I started DXing from Seward, Alaska in 1962. Within 2 years I heard & confirmed all 50 states. Many Eastcoast stations were a regular (about everynight) WEMP-1250, WGR-550, WKRC-550, just to name a few. Yes, Europe is very possible from Alaska. You're right, around Noon (local time) in Seward, Alaska I logged Norway and a couple of Germans in December. A DXer in Palmer, Alaska in the 60s heard and verified about all of Europe and much of Africa. Palmer is only 50 miles North of Anchorage!! I agree Alaska is still a DXers Paradise. It may get to the point someday when the only true DX can be heard from places like Alaska, Hawaii, Guam, etc. It makes you think doesn't it....
