An Open Letter to IRCA CPC Committeemen

The BCB DXing community, including many members of our own club, has mixed emotions over the efforts of our CPC this year. First it should be pointed out that the committee has arranged a total of 41 programs scheduled through the end of November, and that such an effort demonstrates a great deal of enthusiasm and hard work. For the second consecutive year, the committee has dominated CPC activities in our field.

However, not all the programs arranged have really been suitable in the sense they have not aided our members to log new catches. I'm referring mainly to stations that simply dedicate a portion of their regular schedule to our club, and stations that are normally AN 6-7 days a week. Such programs may serve to publicize our club somewhat, but that is not the function of the CPC.

In the same category of less suitable programs I would include frequency checks, especially regular ones. These stations are going to be on the air anyway, and will not be airing a special test for the benefit of distant listeners. Unusual f/c's could perhaps be listed separately on the front page of the DX Monitor, but our club can really take no credit for setting them up as CPC programs.

The above comments are certainly not intended to dampen the fine spirit of our CPC. Of the 41 programs arranged through November, 24 have been excellent ones, as compared to, for example, 6 in the same category arranged by the NRC. I would only suggest that all CPC members direct their efforts toward the more suitable type of BCB station to further the goal of the committee: to arrange special programs from seldom-heard stations at times appropriate for distant reception -- by our membership and by DXers in other clubs.

Following are some suggested guidelines for the type of station to contact for CPC programs:

- 1) Stations that are not often heard or reported.
- 2) Stations on the clearer frequencies that have a better chance of penetrating.
- 3) Not stations that are AN and not programs scheduled during RS, unless foreign.
- 4) Not stations that conduct early-AM f/c's, since they will test anyway.
- 5) Most foreign stations are good CPC bets.

Regarding the fifth item above, I'd suggest that programs arranged with stations in Mexico and farther south would be very appropriate, for those interested. Even some of the AN Colombians (e.g., HJLQ-1520) might agree to dedicate an hour of their RS with frequent ID's in English to help our members log new catches. Better still, of course, would be programs arranged with seldom-heard foreign stations which are not normally AN.

Gray Scrimgeour has proposed a possible solution to the problem of arranging more suitable CPC programs. He suggests that an ANARC CPC-Controlling Committee be established to act as a clearinghouse for programs before requests are sent to the station. The goals of the committee would be to set up programs to insure stations get sufficient reports to warrant their effort and expense of broadcasting, and to avoid "repeats" and a large number of tests scheduled at the same time -- in addition to sorting out the less desirable type of program, as discussed above. This proposal has not yet been sent to the IRCA Board of Directors for a vote (as far as our club's participation in such a joint ANARC project). If you have opinions on the proposal, I hope you'll write your representative on the Board or include your comments in the DX Forum.

As a concluding remark, I'd like to point out that the IRCA is not the only club faced with the "suitability question." This season of the 9 programs the NRC has set up through November, 2 were from AN-6 stations (WQWA and KFOX) and 1 was during a f/c (KNEI). Also, last season the NRC arranged at least 8 DX programs during f/c periods and at least 1 (WWSW) during RS. It seems that both major clubs are plagued by the same situation, except that the IRCA has had much better CPC results thus far this season and (through this editorial and the discussion to follow) is recognizing the problem and attempting to do something about it.

I have included several articles in the special features section this time but will limit it to about 2 per entry.

Washington's Soul Radio
WOL

Perched high above Dupont Circle, Bob Terry, the WOL Nighthawk, presides nightly over the aviary that is Washington's Soul Radio control room.

Terry is big and sitting-bouncing really- at the control panel in a yellow undershirt, "shades" over his eyes, sweat pouring off wrestler's arms that flail at switches and dials and turntables, he plays the Soul Radio console like Ray Charles doing a gig on the piano... Hands never stopping, feet tapping, head bobbing up and down to the pulse of the music.

The Hawk sings, too. Into the microphone that hangs from the center of his nest, he coos, gawks, screams, wails, cries, and occasionally talks to thousands of listeners who tune in to the Number One music show on Washington's Number One radio station.

The station represents not the more incendiary aspects of Black Power but rather its theoretical basis, of being black, the idea of a united Negro community, prideful and fed up with a system Negroes believe perpetuates submission.

There is enough Black Power at WOL to make the District Building pay its housing inspectors overtime because more than 1,000 complaints against landlords were received when the station decided to launch a War on Slums; enough Black Power to capture 65 per cent of Washington's Negro listening audience every day; enough Black Power to scare an awful lot of white mothers about where their little darlings pick up expressions that ruin family dinners; enough Black Power for the station to gross \$1.5 million in its first year of operation; enough Black Power to force competing disc jockeys at white stations to talk on the air in their version of how they would sound if they dropped out of Carl Hansen's basic track at Cardozo; enough Black Power to rattle the shuffling bones of Washington's old cornbread and grits Negro stations, WOOK and WJST; enough Black Power-and this is the real Nitty Gritty...enough Black Power to establish what may become the first genuine spokesman for Washington's mass of unrepresented Negroes.

And who wons, manages, encourages and organizes all this Black Power?

White People.

The saga of Soul Radio in Washington begins in the spring of 1965, when WOL was still the epitome of white Washington respectability, what with Milton Q. Ford telling everybody the morning weather forecast, playing a few Patti Page records for the swingers in the audience, breaking up Agriculture Department secretaries with mouthings from the Godawful parrot he kept caged in the studio, and not making much money for the station's owner, Henry Rau of Washington.

So Rau, who turned WOL into the city's Mutual Radio Network outlet, let it be known that his 1450 spot on the dial was up for grabs. Because the FCC had limited WOL's power to 1kw however--meaning that the station's signal could not extend far into the suburbs--Rau was not exactly besieged with offers.

While Rau was looking for buyers, Egmont Sonderling, who at the time owned 5 radio stations and is the white granddaddy of Negro broadcasting, sent emissaries to Washington to take a look at the local market. And although the city had two Negro stations, Sonderling's investigators reported to their German-born boss that Washington could be turned up-side down by a third with the right sound.

"They told me what I had suspected," the 60-year-old Sonderling says. "The city had two Negro stations that thought Negro radio means Negro disc-jockeys playing Negro records, nothing more. And this is the most important, most unrepresented Negro community in the country. They were idiots."

In April, at the NAB convention in Washington, a Sonderling representative learned of WOL's availability, called the boss at his home in California and the next morning Sonderling flew into the National Airport with a \$1.25 million offer and plans to turn Henry Rau's 1kw white elephant into a gold mine. The deal was approved several weeks later by the FCC.

A week after he bought WOL, Sonderling summoned Frank Ward, program director of WWRL, and Dave McNamee, also from WWRL, to his California home. "Both these boys have been with me a long time," Sonderling explains, "Frank since Oak Park. They know what I want." "I told them to find the best talent. If you have the best you do the best. That's why we could push over WUST and WOCK, they weren't willing to pay the talent. They didn't realize that Negroes wanted the best... Why do so many Negroes buy expensive cars? It's not because the car is flashy; it's because a car is the only thing a Negro can afford the best. Radio is no different. A Negro wants the best in Negro radio. Commercially, Top-40 radio is the best. It's the most professional, it's where the talent is. I told Frank and Dave to search all over the East for Negro disc jockeys with experience in Top-40 radio."

So Ward and McNamee piled their suitcases into Frank's convertible and began driving up and down the East Coast, the car radio constantly competing against two transistorized portables hanging from each front window. For three weeks, the pair went their bizarre way, two guys in a big Cadillac with three radios going at once... Two white men switching dials on three radios, their ears pressed against the speakers, and asking each other: "You think he's a Negro?"

The trip paid off. All but one of WOL's present disc jockeys were hired during the mobile sound survey. One other key piece of hiring was handled by Ward. From WLEE in Richmond, he brought a then 21-year-old white disc jockey earning \$120 a week, Bill Sherard, to serve as WOL's program director at \$12,000 a year. Ward, McNamee and John Pace, the WOL executive vice president hired by Sonderling from ABC on the west coast to be the station's administrative chief, began mapping plans for the station on May 1, 1965, six weeks before Soul Radio was to make its Washington debut. These four--especially Sherard--plus music-director-DJ Rudy Runnels put together "The Sound" the sound that is the reason WOL is emerging as the closest thing to spokesman that Washington Negroes have.

There is the legacy of Sherwood Ross, called the "boss with the slum sauce" by the disc jockeys and also known variously as a white liberal, Robin Hood of Sherwood Jungle, a white Nigger, the only honest white man in town, an anarchist, somebody trying not to be a white liberal, the man in the House, the first white guy in the city to get some results.

Ross resigned last month as WOL's public relations director but not before establishing a precedent for the kind of community involvement previously unheard of from a Washington radio station.

Four or five times a week Ross would get into his WOL slummobile and head for the city's ghettos, where children would run alongside the car saying things like "go next door if you want to see some rats," OR "hey slumman, you gonna fix my house?" or "the landlord hasn't been here yet, you gonna get him?"

The disagreements between Sherwood Ross and the station's management that led to his resignation could indicate WOL is wary of controversial programs that ruffle more feathers than did the War of the Slums. The nighthawk likes to say that "When we're sockin' it to 'em, there's nobody listening who doesn't know where we're at."

The question now is: How hard baby, and you going to sock it to us?

Where the Girls are Paid to Talk

The Old MacDonald, who had a farm in the famous ditty, kept his chicks in the barnyard, which was square. Leslie Allen had a better idea. He installed his chicks in his Brampton, Ontario radio station call letters CHIC, "where the girls are."

His is the first AM station in North America to introduce an all-girl disc-jockey team. And it is fast transforming CHIC from a small time suburban radio station that nobody ever heard of into an outfit with its own measure of fame.

Since the first five girls who act as DJs went on the air in August of 1966, interested inquirers have come in from radio stations as far away as San Francisco, Dawson and Houston, Texas. There are 3 radio stations with female on-air staffs in the U.S. - one in Chicago, one in Florida and WNEW in New York - but they are all FM stations. CHIC is both AM and FM.

The little station, located in an old brick house of Brampton's main street, had 200 applications for the five jobs spinning discs night and day. Two months later, says program director Dan Roman, they were still getting calls and visits from as many as six girls a day who were "audio-struck".

The chicks at CHIC do much the same as the male DJs they replaced; introducing records, giving the time and weather and most of the commercials. The difference is they're dulcet. And dulcet damsels are different.

That was precisely what was needed at 790 on the dial, which is where CHIC is. Because the competition is rugged, stations have to have an interesting format and the girls do a nice job. There are 33,500 people now in Brampton. But Brampton is only 25 miles NW of Toronto which means right in its back yard. CHIC is after its share of the million listeners in the western half of Metro. Toronto.

They couldn't hope to match the giants of radio, CFRB and CHUM or even the CBC. Country and western music was already pouring out of CFGM, good music out of CHFI, French from CJBC and the ethnic beat was being grabbed by the station in Little Italy, CHIN.

What was left? Well, how about girls?

And that is how advertising copywriter Febby Barnard, from N. Vancouver, found himself driving out to Brampton at 5am every day to do the early show. Although once she gets there she's transformed into Wendy Howard, resident chick at CHIC.

Marilyn MacDonnell heads out from Forest Hill Home which she shares with her 3 1/2 year-old son and her husband, a trust company officer. Later on in the day, she then becomes Jane Miller. Marilyn is a long-stemmed ex-model whose first and greatest ambition in life was to become a singer. Jan Campbell, from Watrous, Sask., began her career as half of a speciality dance team and has been an actress for 20 years in summer stock, CBC TV and elsewhere.

Penny Machtell went to CHIC from a summer long stint as singer in the Imperial Room in the Royal York Hotel. Toronto is her adopted home. She is originally from N. Carolina and came further North when her mother married a Canadian. The fifth girl DJ, PatMoffatt, was away in New York when this article was written. A familiar face on TV commercials and an actress in summer stock, she is also a playwright and has sold a TV play to CBS. The Brampton station saves itself from such comings and goings by having standard on-air names as slots into which it can slide any girl. Soon to join this line-up is Toronto actress Lindsay Punched, a tempestuous redhead.

She'll be new at the game, but so are they all. Dan Roman helps by giving on-the-air training.

The golden rule for the chicks at CHIC is: It's a microphone, not a telephone. And, and if you can say it in one line, that's fine. Which is a tall order for any woman!

Many of these stations are remote, small and poor, and this ANARC help is modeled on the initiative of American hams who help amateurs in other countries with QSL card printing. If you have sent detailed, Spanish-language reception reports to such stations, and if these stations have not verified you or other DX-ers (see QSL columns of the DX press), send full details to the Committee. As a non-profit organization, we will appreciate a dollar or so with every request, to cover our printing costs and postage. If this campaign is successful, it will later be extended to cover Brazil and other Portuguese-speaking countries."
