### News From HQ

There is a strike going on at the CBC, affecting all their AM, FM & TV operations. We don't know of any major changes in station s/on & s/off times or national program feeds. The biggest effect is on the local programming from s/on to 0900, noon to 2pm. & 4-6 pm local time. Shawn Axelrod says to expect lots of music and national nx/wx/sports instead of the usual offerings.

KNBR-680 has been sold, marking the end of the original NBC radio network. The NBC programming services were sold to Westone One last year, and will retain the NBC name. All other NBC radio stations have already been sold, following General Electric's purchase of RCA in 1986. The new owner of KNBR is Susquehanna Radio Corp, owners of KFOG-FM & 18 other AM or FM stations. No word yet on how the sale might affect their format.(SF Chronicle, via Rbt Wien)

KDON-1460 stopped their simulcast of KDON FM on 3/23. They are now KZXR. "The Rock of the 90s" with a heavy metal rock format. (Jim Hilliker)

### Dayton Hamvention

The annual Dayton Hamvention will be held the weekend of April 29-30 at the Hara Arena in Dayton, Ohio. It's the largest ham radio gathering in the US - over 30,000 people are expected to attend. It will feature seminars, a flea market, and comercial exhibits, and would be of interest to just about any DXer or radio enthusiast (ham or otherwise). There will even be a SWL/monitoring forum 4/30 at 0930-1130.

CHICAGOLAND RADIO CALL LETTERS AND MEANINGS by Marty Zivin, Contributing Writer to Radio Waves

Before the establishment of the FCC in 1933, radio stations chose their own call letters and registered them with the Federal Radio Commission. These early broadcasters used K, N and W calls. When the FCC began licensing of stations, they also began assigning call letters. Any station east of the Mississippi was assigned W, and west of the river was assigned K. As in vanity plates, stations prefer call letters that they or listeners can identify with; the FCC does its best to honor these requests. Here is a list of Chicagoland radio call letters, and what they represent now and/or historically.

### FCC Rules on AM/FM Station IDs via John Johnson

### § 73.1201 Station identification.

- (a) When regularly required. Brondcast station identification announcements shall be made: (1) At the beginning and ending of each time of operation, and (2) hourly, as close to the hour as feasible, at a natural break in program offerings. Television broadeast stations may make these announcements visually
- (b) Content, (1) Official station identification shall consist of the station's call letters immediately followed by the community or communities specified in its license as the station's location: Provided, that the name of the licensee or the station's frequency or channel number, or both, as stated on the station's license may be inserted between the call letters and station location. No other insertion is permissible.
- (2) When given specific written authorization to do so, a station may include in its official station identification the name of an additional community or communities, but the community to which the station is licensed must be named first.
- (3) A licensee shall not in any identification announcements, promotional announcements or any other broadcast matter either lead or attempt to lead the station's audience to believe that the station has been authorized to identify officially with cities other than those permitted to be included in official station identifications under subparagraphs' (1) and (2) of this paragraph.

- (c) Channel-(1) General. Except as otherwise provided in this paragraph, in making the identification announcement the call letters shall be given only on the channel identified thereby.
- (2) Simultaneous AM-FM broadcasts. If the same licensee operates an FM broadcast station and a standard broadcast station and simultaneously broadcasts the same programs over the facilities of both such stations, station identification announcements may be made jointly for both stations for periods of such simultaneous operation. If the call letters of the FM station do not clearly reveal that it is an FM station, the joint announcement shall so identify it.
- (3) Satellite operation. When programming of a broadcast station is rebroadcast simultaneously over the facilities of a satellite station, the originating station may make identification announcements for the satellite station for periods of such simultaneous operation.
- (i) In the case of a television broadcast station, such announcements, in addition to the information required by paragraph (b)(1) of this section, shall include the number of the channel on which each station is operating.
- (ii) In the case of aural broadcast stations, such announcements, in addition to the information required by paragraph (b)(1) of this section, shall include the frequency on which each station is operating.

### LATIN-AMERICAN DX TRIP February-March, 1989

On February 22, my wife Kristine, my trusty ICF 2010, the beloved Palomar loop antenna, another couple and I took off to Miami to start our Latin- and Central American excursion on the Royal Viking Star. The Star actually left L.A. in January and toured the Pacific; we were scheduled to hop on it for our trip February 27 from Lima. For reasons which will become apparent, we decided to rest up a night in Miami rather than going from S.F. to Lima in one day. In Miami, we noted the new WWFE-670 testing with OC and no ID with the strong Cuban easily readable underneath. Also noted was WRFM-830 getting wiped out rather easily even during the daytime. My reference here will be WRTH-89.

LIMA, PERU. We arrived at 11:30pm, got to the Lima Sheraton at 1:30am and had a wake-up call for our flight to Cuzco at 4:45am (now you know why we decided to rest up in Miamil). Peru time incidentally is the same as EST, and it was not on DST as of February 24th. A quick 1:30am non-loop scan revealed a dozen all nighters (540 660 680 730 760 850 880 930 1040 1160 1200 1300 + OCs on 780 820 900) and

some white noise being generated on or about 900kHz.

CUZCO, PERU. We were here to see the ruins of Macchu Picchu, capital of the Incan empire before its demise at the hands of the Spaniards. Cuzco is at about 11,500' so needless to say, it was a breathtaking experience. Confirmed locals were Mundo-870, Macchu Picchu-1000, Superadio-1030, Salcantay-1080, Lider-1110, Universal-1150, Tawantinsuyo-1200, La Hora-1410 (not 1390), El Sur-1510 Onda R. Tropical-1540 (not R. Chaski) and Triunfo-1580. I never could get an ID out of semi-local 940 or locals on 1300, 1330 and 1470. I monitored 1230 at great length and never heard R. Madre de Dios; several times I heard "?? en total pais." For SW buffs, 1200//6170, 1330//4965 (might have been an image) and 1410//4977. We drove around a bit in and around Cuzco but I never saw any buildings with station call letters or slogans. Up in the hills, we saw several unidentified transmitter sites. Is Cuzco a swinging town? All I can tell you is that half the stations were off the air by 9:30pm LT on a Saturday night. Also noted were beacon ZCO on 415kHz and FMs on 92.1, 98.1 and 99.9 plus another one on 102.1 which must have been skipping in from Lima. On the way back to Lima on Sunday 2/26 I ended up sitting next to J. Luis Castro Garcia, owner of Macchu Picchu-1000. He said his station was the most powerful one in Cuzco, with 5000 watts. Obviously, this tells you that most of the stations just can't tweak their transmitters up to the powers listed in WRTH. He identified the 940 outlet as R. Willkamayu, Sicuani (pr. "Sih-KWAN-ee"). The 1987 phone book showed two stations in Sicuani, R. Canchia and R. Sicuani, along with La Hora (486 San Andres) and San Miguel (N-146 Av. H 'Ccapac') elsewhere in area 7. Several of the stations had Quechuaoriented programming. The most frequently heard song in public was "El Condor Pasa," which some of you may remember as a Simon & Garfunkel hit a few years back. Most of these songs are female duets and really remind me of Chinese music. Cusco is the Quechua spelling and Cuzco, the Spanish. Also noted at night were 690-HCJB, Guayaquil-700, Bonaire-800, R. Radial Andina-810//1580 Cuzco and 1545, presumed Quito. Other than these, not a lot came in at readable strength. I will be communicating with Sr. Castro for updated information. Peru, FYI, had a 2400% inflation rate last year and not all the people are happy.

LIMA, PERU. Except for 930, 1400 and 1420, all the local stations were identified as per WRTH with these exceptions and variances. R. Comas is on 580, not 590 as on p.346. 800 is Radio Sol, not San Juan. 1040 for some reason was //760 Radio Mar the afternoon of 2/26, but had its own Onda Popular programming after about 5pm. Callao-1400 was heard with Quechuan melodies sung in Spanish. 610, 1080 and 1180 were not on the air. Selecta-1130 was heard the evening of 2/26 with programming from

RNE. Imperial was on 1439.9. 21 local FM stations were also noted.

Enroute GUAYAQUIL, ECUADOR. Quite honestly, much of my time was spent listening to LW beacons and FM. However, perched anywhere outside on the ship where it wasn't too windy or wet to DX, I went over all the bands at least once nightly. On the morning of 3/1 between 1-1:30am EST, UNID SSers were heard on 530 and 555, WCKY-1530 was in the clear and the white noise jamming was quite strong on 900. That night between 11:30pm-12mid EST, it was Grenada-1555 w/GSQ s/off 11:30, AFCN-1420 UPI network news and KAY-1090 along with many SS.

GUAYAQUIL, ECUADOB. For me, there were 50 unidentified AMs (+17 FMs) to contend with and since we went touring, 1 didn't identify many. IDs confirmed were Huancavilca-830; Cristal-870; CRO-920 (not 930); R. Guayaquil-1325 Babahoyo; R. Natl. El Oro-1335, Machala; and the time signal station 1510.

ENROUTE PANAMA. On 3/3 by 4pm ET, we were about on the same latitude as Quito and most of the outlets came in quite well. Others of note: R. Eco-1085, Manta; the Portoviejo spitis on 625 & 715; HCLD4-1265 Junin (ex-1270); an unlisted "Radio Richie" on 1470; and something on 1603 whose ID never came to pass. HCMO1-1260 ID'd simply as "HCMO" and had children's records on between 4:30-5:30pm. At about 4:15pm, an OC was heard over HCJB-690; audio finally came on some time after 5 in the form of HCEA4 Portoviejo. HCRL4-1031 wins the "close but no cigar" award today. The same evening about 11:30pm, something like "R. Recará" was heard on 1600.

PANAMA. Saturday evening 3/4 we were moored off Panamá City a half day early to transfer two passengers to medical authorities (one heart attack, one multiple fracture). I didn't attempt to ID everything. However, I did note Radio Ritmo Stereo on 890, ex-1070. Radiolandia-1450 in Venezuela was heard with 11:50pm CST s/off. On 3/5 we went through the canal, and like nearly everyone else, I watched the process so didn't get in much DX. Near Colón, we did go by what appeared to be the AFCN-1420 tower. We got out of the Canal about 3 CST; by then, Colombians were all over the dial. Also, it took me over a half an hour to ID some canned religion on 1290. "Surely V.I. can't come in this early," I conjectured. Right on; It was HOS2- David, with IDs consistently at 5 of and 25 after.

ENROUTE PUERTO LIMON. That night around 2300 CST, Cuban Reloj outlets on 590-760-930-940-950-960-1270 were heard well along with WSUN-620 and a pesky drifter with SS paid religion floating

around 1522.8 or so.

PUERTO LIMON. We docked about 6:30am and eventually took an all day bus trip to San José. Outte a few towers were seen including the 4-tower array of R. Rumbo-530. Back at Limon, locals on 1220 1360 1460(I/760) were noted along with semi-local TIPJ-1180 Heredia and some U.S. C&W on 1300. At about 7:55pm CST it was interesting to note political addresses on both ZNS-1540 and Cayman-1555. VOA-1580 was good, as was Jamaica-560. Costa Rica incidentally is a very friendly country where Americans are still welcome and where the literacy rate is about 85%.

ENROUTE COZUMEL. Around 12n CST 3/7 I was able to identify HJLQ-1523, R. Minuto, Barranquilla, "The religious voice of Colombia." Radio Costa Rica-930 was fair, but nowhere on the trip was it notably strong as itself or in VOA mode. By this time we were off Nicaragua (40 miles or so) but you couldn't tell it by my dial. One would think Bluefields-1090 would be banging in, but no way (something was there but I can't confirm it was Bluefields); in short, Colombians (particularly San Andres ones) were all over the dial at great strength, but I can't positively say I heard any Nicaraguan station. Weak SS noted on 1235. "B.B."-1240 out of San Jose really lasted a long time; I thought the new megawatt Venezuelan must be on. HJAY was on 1489.9 and TISHB was on 1127.

COZUMEL. In the morning, we took a tour to some ruins, and as we went by the tower, the guide was proud to point out that XERB had 5000 watts at 1170 on the AM dial. Eight Texas FMs (mostly Corpus Christi area) were noted here. Radio America-630 was strong, but it didn't seem to be La Ceiba, Honduras, since nothing else out of La Ceiba seemed to be coming in. Between 3-4pm CST, I observed WQAM-560 (no Jamaica), WTKN-570, WIOD-610, WWAM-770, WNWS-790 (in the clear), Tampa-970, Reloj-1100 (//940 with WINZ under), WQBA-1140 (clear), Tampa-1150, VQA-1180, WAMR-1320, WBRD-1420 and the St. Pete area stns. on 1380 and 1590. Also noted was Belize, splattering all over the place between 819-833KHz. What a mess! Locals and semi-locals included Merida-550, Cancun-580, Radio Caribe-860 (not listed, probably Cancun), Chetumal-960, XERB-1170 Cozumel and Radio Hit-1550. The latter, unlisted, had ads for maids for a Hyatt hotel, and was wiped out by co-channel hash by 5pm. My guess is 250w in Cancun, or if not, then in some resort area. However, it had to be a resort where elderly Mexicans go, because the music was like Xavier Cugat dance music of the 40s-50s. Somehow I just don't think it was HITS-1550 in the Dominican Republic...

ENROUTE FT. LAUDERDALE. On Friday March 10 we were back on EST and off of Cuba. Around noon, I noted Progresso-640/880/730/90.3; Rebelde-550/610/620/670/710/91.9; FM Latina-95.1 (classical); Reloj-760/790/etc./95.9; Unknown network-820/98.7; Metropolitana-860/102.9 and three UNID FMs on 93.7, 97.7 and 100.7. By this time, everything was predictably Cuban or Floridian. About 3, I wangled my way onto the bridge and read through a beacon log published by the British Hydrographic Office. The ship used satellites for navigation but still had a 250-500kHz direction finder which I got to play with.

In conclusion, unfortunately, there were just too many stations in Guayaquil, Panamá and San José for me to get a handle on and still see some of the territory we took the trip to see in the first place. Therefore, I primarily looked for variances. Also, I was mystified by the white noise (jamming?) surrounding R. El Sol-900, Lima. I couldn't get a handle on its source; it was quite strong the night after we left Lima but not noted in Guayaquil. T&C-1570 gets out pretty well; it was heard at various places after the Canal with no sign of XERF. And finally, the Cubans really have done a remarkable job infringing on the coverage areas of the Miami stations. The 710 signal was good off of Colón and is even with WAQI days in Palm Beach. R. Taino-830 really brutalizes WRFM. (Also, WWFE-670 was testing again Sat. 3/11; it was fair 11am in Ft. Lauderdale [strong Cuban under] but was either off or just plain gone an hour later in Delray Beach).

In summary, it is splendid DXing on a ship with no locals most of the time and I strongly recommend it. However, even on vacation, you can't DX all the time!

Oh yes, one final note. About four days before we left, a small article in the local paper mentioned that the airlines might stop allowing you to bring radios on board. In my briefcase, I had the ICF 2010, the two loops, the amplifier, earphones, the LWCA Beacon Log and WRTH - and some SS DX report translation forms and some copies of Latin American OSL cards and letters, including one from OAX4A when it was on 854kHz (reported 36 years ago from Durham, NC). I shuddered each time the briefcase went through the X-ray apparatus. However, I never heard a peep out of anyone, except in Miami, where the operator asked me if it was camera equipment... Who was I to dispute a proficient operator's observation?!!

Just because the days are getting longer and warmer is no reason to leave the radio off. In June, 1987, I heard KTRB-860 CA at 0600 FLT at SR and with CJBC on, I caught KOMO-1000 WA in April before 0530 ELT with the WCFL still off but SR right at the doorstep, even recently I've had 1410's WDOV, WPOP and WLSH in after 0800 ELT in late Feb. and early March, plus WDRC 1360 CT. While all these were unneededs here they do represent what can happen. I found the info regarding the laud heaped on US VI's WWWI-1000 in the 2/11 DX Monitor of interest. I might drop them US VI's WVWI-1000 in the 2/11 DX Monitor of interest. I might drop them a letter (or may have by now) praising them for their news effort, but also take it as an opportunity to seek a MM test of the station with the 5 kw power. A chance to hear US. VI must not be passed by, especially while WLUP still has a MM SP--this is almost assuredly not going to last forever. I would recommend other IRCAns to contact WVWI to see what can be arranged. I noticed in the same IRCA DX Monitor the ANARC report concerning the article by Larry Miller with respect to AM radio and also to some degree FM radio as well. I'm not sure what "digital" modulation involves but it sounds like a nice idea but can it deliver and be used economically—how does it work? What I'm getting at is that AM is not antique nor is it subgrade as a transmission of consumer-grade audio. This is a farce and fallacy that FM broadcasters have perpetuated (successfully) on the young impressionable and non-discerning listener. I have AM-stereo in my '88 Buick and I'd welcome any of the AM detractors to sit in my car and listen and tell me if they can really discern the difference -- if there is any at all. The business about "consumer-grade audio" is laughable. Am I to believe that the average radio listener who buys the cheap small pocket size transistor or poorly selective and sensitive boom boxes cares that much about audio quality below 500 Hz or above 5000 Hz; give me a break! AM can be, and is delivered just as well at 100 Hz and 10,000 Hz as FM. I agree with Albert Lobell AM-stereo is as good as FM, maybe even better because the speech and music that is heard more closely resembles the manner we more predominantly hear in and that is <a href="mailto:amplitude">amplitude</a>-wise as opposed to frequency-wise. I agree a fine set of speakers, sensitive and selective enough receivers and decent equalizers will more than offset any so-called advantage FM pretends to have. DM sounds like a <u>DuM</u>b idea to me. Nothing's broke that needs to be fixed other than noisy transmission lines and excess interference. Enuf said. 73's de GES. P.S. Good AM's can compete with FM's favorably if they dare.

I don't think that's realistic. If a station is filling a niche well, finding advertisers and able to pay its bills, what does it matter where it ranks in the stats? Some formats will never be in the top 15 or 20 in a large city, but they do fill a void. I think it's great. As I understand it, the great thing about America is its diversity. I like several different kinds of music and which one I listen to at any given time depends on how I'm feeling. It's great to have several different stations I can tune to. That's why there's five different buttons on a car radio. I also expect AM (and FM) stations to start going dark in the next 20 years. Just look at the demographics of the baby boomers! They mark the years of the baby boomers being born as the period 1/1/46 thru 1960. After that, the birth rate really dropped off. Even now, business is having trouble finding young workers, and are hiring older ones in the low paying jobs. Follow the bulge thru, and about 2010 (the year I turn 65), the youngest of the baby boomers will be 50, most will be closer to 60, and, frankly, many will be dead. With a shrinking population, what happens? 73.

Reading Floyd Perry's experience with KCVR in the 11 March issue brought up an interesting point. FCC rule 73.1201 on ID's states that for simultaneous AM-FM broadcasts that dual ID's are to be made. I've sent a copy of this

section of the FCC rules to Bruce to reprint in an upcoming issue.

Floyd made one mistake - he called the station. Another mistake was to tell Mr. Turnbeaugh he was an expert. (That is, a person familiar with station operations, a DX'er, etc.) I'm sure the owner took offense to everything that was said. Floyd should have handled this another way. Write a letter to the nearest FCC office explaining fully the problem. Sending an air check audio cassette would be helpful - and spark interest by the FCC. State in the audio cassette would be helpful - and spark interest by the FCC. State In the letter to the FCC that you've sent a duplicate letter to the station asking it be placed in their Public Inspection files. Any time the FCC visits a station they first look through the Public Inspection File. It's quite clear KCVR is breaking an FCC rule, but the FCC - not KCVR - is the one to complain to. I'm sure Mr. Turnbeaugh is fully aware of the FCC rule on dual ID's. Don't expect a quick reply from the FCC. A recent article mentioned the FCC receives 50,000 letters a day - yes, a day! Most are tossed in the garbage (letters such as complaints about loud commercials, CB QRM on the TV, etc.). It seems whenever anyone calls stations all that comes of it is DX'ers get another black eye!

On the other side of the ID thing, local KBSO 1490 runs OC late nights, but every hour you hear a very complete legal station ID. Courage.

The solar flare activity in recent weeks has been interesting. KGO has been having trouble with their remotes. Local TV also having trouble with their satellite reports. Once breakfast was finished I was ready to make my trek. I got on to I-90 at the Perry Highway exit rather than the Highway 8 exit because my car needed the longer acceleration ramp. I travelled in the right-hand lane for the first 3 exits. After I passed the Highway 18 underpass I flicked on the my turn signal indicator and changed lanes. I made sure my speed was 53 miles an hour and I settled back to listen to the radio. The FM dial seemed really dead, until I remembered that only the AM worked on my car. I tuned in to WWWE-1100 and was amazed at how well the station was coming in, even as far west as Elyria! WOHO and WSPD were noted bombing in as I-475 crossed the Turnpike! The Ohio Turnpike and Indiana Toll Road were much more expensive than the preferred US-20 route, but of course I didn't have all that much time! I travelled in the left-hand lane, ignoring all of the cars and trucks tailgating me, until I got near the Elkhart service area. I stopped for a Wendy's Classic and Coke in Michigan City around 1 p.m. and then got back on the Interstate. Unfortunately, all of the stations there were locked up tight - and nobody answered the door! On to US-83 North I went, with Minot as my next destination. I listened to KFYR and KOTA most of the way. I didn't have any luck at any of the area stations until I reached KZZJ-1450 in Rugby. There, I met station janitor Gus Baker. It turns out that Gus' 5th cousin had taught me Grade 11 Chemistry back in Erie! Gus didn't know very much about the station, but he did show me KZZJ's new vacuum cleaner. After bidding Gus farewell, I made my way towards Grand Forks. But first it was time to catch some badly needed shut-eye. I wheeled the time to catch some badly needed shut-eye. I wheeled the Maverick into the CheapskateLodge Motel parking lot, put the seat back and slept until sunrise. Before visiting KNOX-1310, I stopped in at Dunkin Donuts for breakfast. KNOX Morning Man Joe Norris was too busy to talk to me, but Secretary Alice Brady was happy to give me a tour of KNOX's facilities. 



