Another chapter was recently written in the US-Cuba radio war. According to a 4/15 article in the Seattle Times, the US began daytime TV Martí broadcasts to Cuba on April 1. The broadcasts were for 1% hours a day on channel 13, which was not being used during the day. Cuba had recently curtailed daytime TV broadcasts on this channel due to a severe energy shortage. Previously. TV Martí had broadcast only during the early morning hours.

Cuba, of course, was very upset by the move and began airing an all-day test pattern on the channel. The Cuban foreign ministry fired off a major protest over the broadcast. claiming it caused "harmful and illegal interference" and was a threat to Cuban sovereignty. On about April 14, the midday TV Martitransmissions were curtailed.

The Cuban response may have also involved cranking up the power on some AM transmitters (again). Cuban interference was reported on 830 1040 1100 1160 & 1180. causing stations in Florida. Ohio. N Carolina & Iowa to file written complaints with the FCC. The article said Cuban signals "began interfering with their AM programs" shortly after the daytime TV broadcasts started.

<u>DOMINICAN REPUBLIC:</u> On 2/14/92 Radio Enriquillo-1020 was ordered by the Dominican government to stop airing Creole news reports. The news program "Nouvelles d'Haiti" (News from Haiti), began broadcasting a few days after the coup d'etat in Haiti in 1991. To get around the restric-tions, R Enriquillo staff have begun to sing news reports and communiques. The following are excerpts from an interview with Enriquillo's director, Pedro Ruquoy, on 3/12/92. (Originally published in "Sak Pase." a clandestine bulletin in Haiti).

"On Feb. 14, we received a telegram from the Director of Telecommunications, ordering R Enriquillo to suspend the Creole program "Nouvelles d'Haiti." Dominican President Joachim Balaguer declared that the problem was not the language of the program, but its contents... In his telegram, the Director of Telecommunications stipulated a complaint from the Haitian authorities, that the program be suspended because of the content of its messages. According to President Balaguer. R Enriquillo was calling for violence and was providing subversive news... We are still not broadcasting the traditional Creole news reports. We are trying to get the Dominican govern-ment to lift its censorship measures." [Peacenet via SW Echo]

RADIO ANTILLES

(The following is a transcript of an interview by Radio Nederland's "Media Network" host Jonathan Marks on June --, as posted on the Shortwave Echo computer bulletin board.)

Towards the end of the 1980s, the Caribbean had a powerful regional voice which covered most of the Eastern Caribbean area. Radio Antiiles on 930 was at one time owned by the German external service Deutsche Welle, although it also relayed programs from the BBC, VOA, and Radio Canada International. In 1989 Deutsche Welle decided to sell the station to the Organization of East Caribbean States. But just as negotiations were taking place in the second half of September 1989. Hurricane Hugo devastated the region. and the island of Montserrat in particular. Radio Antilles was blown off the air. The 135 kw mediumwave transmitter was damaged beyond repair. Dave Demambro is a BBC Engineer who's been out at the transmitter site completing a major reconstruction project. designed to but the station back on the map.

DEMAMBRO: Yes that's correct. We've just completed the re-engineering of the entire broadcast complex here. The transmitter is a new Harris BP-100, power 100 km. We've also completed re-engineering of the antenna system, which is a pair of phased quarter-wave verticals which get the ERP back to the same kind of strength it was before. I think it was the only mediumwave station to cover the whole of the Caribbean, and that's why Radio Antilles is obviously guite important.

MARKS: Radio Antilles built up a name in the field of public broadcasting. Whereas many commercial stations in the region tend to focus on the island where their transmitter is located. Radio Antilles took a much more regional rocus. It was also important as a source of marine weather forecasts for the eastern farinteen. Media. Network monitor Paul Gritliths in frinidad spotted an item in last Friday's frinidad Suardian: it ducted Subin Meads.

Montserrat's First Minister, as saying that no less than seven hours a day on the station will be local in nature. The rest is going to be sold to international broadcasters. So when will the transmitter really come on?

DEMAMBRO: There are one or small things which have to be sorted out right now. The transmitter is running on test. We're running some local tests with the studio complex in Plymouth on Montserrat, and we're really just generating some local output to test the transmitter out. And hopefully in around about eight weeks time we'll be able to go on the air full time, and that will be with VOA. BBCWS. and hopefully by that time there will be an element of local output. Deutsche Welle will also be broadcasting from the station; in fact, they're one of the most important people to mention because they actually made a virtual gift of this station to the Montserrat government.

MARKS: And the BBC put in the

transmitter.

DEMAMBRO: That's correct. And VOA donated the equipment. so it's been a real team effort here. One major factor, though, is that Radio Antilles will have to find a manager, so I suppose if there's anyone listening to this that would be interested in running such an important station, write to Radio Antilles. P.O. Box 35. Montserrat, West Indies.

RADIO STATIONS FACING TOUGHER TIMES

(from Adelaide Advertiser 2/13/92 via DX Australia)

The Australian radio industry has a case of the shakes and the glitzy giveaways and competitions could be

part of the illness.

Media analysts predicted yesterday more stations could experience the severe financial strifes facing Sydney stations 2GB and 2KY. With a drop in advertising revenue, the move to FM. and 1980's bull market all contributing factors.

But independent analyst Peter Cox also claims an outmoded notion of "buying listeners" is doing serious damage to stations' viability.

"Radio has turned full circle to its total reliance on buying listeners with Tames and giveaways that FM avoided when it was first introfuced", he said vesterday.

He predicted the bottom 50% of stations would face financial crisis

in the short term.

A report in yesterday's Sydney Morning Herald newspaper said both 2KY and 2GB were in severe financial difficulties.

Ms. Cass O'Conner, media analyst and associate director at Turnbull & Partners, agrees that a gap is growing between the viability of the top rated stations and the also-rans.

She believes the industry's snakiness dates back to the bull market of the mid-1980's and the move to

"The process started in 1986 when stations were bought at high prices, which initially was a problem for the parent company and not the station. But then spending gets curtailed and money for poaching talent gets curtailed. The next step was the opening up of the airwaves, with stations moving from AM to FM and taking a lot of the AM market. Some of the audience went back to AM but it destabilized the pre-existing listening market."

Ms O'Conner said there was some validity to the idea that stations were splurging improvidently on buy-

ing listeners with gimmicks.

She said broadcasters also might be feeling shaky in the Federal Government's draft Broadcast Services bill. The bill, which proposes freeing up limits on foreign and cross-media ownership, was still under public discussion and it was too early to assess its final form or effect, she said

A recession associated drop in advertising revenue across the media has been hurting radio stations over the past 2 years. But the Federation of Australian Radio Broadcasters believes radio has not been damaged by it as other media.

FARB general manager, radio marketing, Mr. Robert Lee, said there had been a 2% drop between 1989 and 1990 in advertising revenue across all media from more than \$5 billion.

But this had hit the different sectors unevenly, with radio actually experiencing a slight 0.08% growth while newspapers had a 5.6% arop.

It never fails - you finally get your radio into tip top shape and the band goes to pieces. I have gotten the PLAM or Phase Locked Amplitude Modulation board installed to the ICOM R-70. It is well worth the price which was \$150 in Canadian funds. The board comes with a great manual that guides you through the step by step installation. It comes with detailed pictures that shows you where to solder right down to which side of the diode. Even an inexperienced operator could do this if he were half decent with a soldering gun. All you need is a screwdriver, small wire cutters and a soldering gun to put in the board and align the receiver. All is spelled out clearly and simply with no big technical words or schematic drawings. Once you have it in you WILL like this unit. It is used in either USB or SSB and gives you use of not only your AM filter but your SSB filter on AM as a bonus. I now have the use of a 4 and a 2.4 filter on AM and the 2.4 for the Plam board. The board works something like the synchronous tuner found on the Sony 2010 and Drake R-8. The PLAM however goes a step further and helps boost the signal after it locks onto the signal. All of this and improved audio to boot. On the first trial the board came through with flying colours. 1375 has yielded HETs on several occasions here but after hearing the HET and tuning in the PLAM board the HET turned into audio for a new one - St. Pierre and Miguelon. The same has proven true for R. Reloj on 640. And by the way 640 is only 10 KHZ away from CKRC which runs 10,000 watts all of 2-1/2 miles from my place. The PLAM plus the 4 foot loop make for a great combination. As for the technical aspect of how it works, I'm not too sure - all I know is that it DOES work and work well. Any one interested in more info can write to me. As for as I know the PLAM works on ICOM R-70 and 71's as well as NRD 525 and 535's. Hope you have a great summer - 73. Shawn

Here's the first of what I hope will be many topical DX Techniques columns. The subject is "Effective Summertime DXing." Away we go ...

PHIL BYTHEWAY: I use my summer DX time to log those easier/closer stations that have changed calls or are new on the air. The first thing I do is create a comprehensive list, using "Broadcasting Information," and appropriate DXR columns in the past year's DXMs. I enter them into a file on the computer at work, in frequency order. Once I have this master list complete, I go through it station by station and note the best time to try for each. Then I rate the probability (1-10) of hearing, based on previous loggings, frequency conditions, and "gut feeling." The list is them sorted by probability, and printed out for easy reference. For a normal DX session, I usually consider the top 5 stations, crossing them off the list when logged. Using this technique, I have often heard other (more true DX) stations, as well as the targeted ones. The key for me is that the list gets me to think of regular DX during the summer, when I would normally not turn the radio on for months.

LARRY GODWIN: The key to summertime success is, I think, persistence. Sometimes I'll get up at 0445 and all I'll hear will be lightning static. Other mornings there's an annoying buzz from I don't know where. It takes some self-discipline for me to keep at it, but I'm always rewarded. I believe there is a great deal of potential for hearing distant southern hemisphere stations stations around the changing of the seasons, which is June 22 this year. In previous years I've been able to hear stations in Chile signing on around 0700 ELT, plus a few in the South Pacific. So far this June, I haven't had much success, but come a GOOD sunspot year, these stations will make it plentifully, I'm sure.

ED: My comments are somewhat in line with Phil's, in that I use summer to log the closer stations. My "hitlist" still shows many stations unheard within a 500 mile radius. I take advantage of the shorter skip conditions during summer to log these closer stations. Then, closer stations may be heard that are covered during winter by stronger, more distant stations coming in on the longer skip. The SSS/SRS periods are longer in summer, and while not providing the long distance reception they often do in winter, the DX stations tend to stay "in" longer during summer.

Thanks to all the reporters for their support. As you can see, summer can be used for more than mere logbook maintenance, and wistful thoughts of cool, crisp fall evenings to come.

THE RADIO STATION - by Michael C. Keith & Joseph M. Krause

This is not a new book (1986) and it is not about DXing, but I would rank it as a "must read" for anyone interested in AM and FM radio. It is worth looking at for the cover alone, a colorful collage of radio station bumper stickers.

It begins with a brief history of radio broadcasting, then covers every aspect of radio station operation, including programming, sales, management, production and promotion. All the current formats, including CHR and UC, are described in detail. (I now understand what MOR REALLY is.) Automation, and satellite programming are discussed, as well. No mere dull treatise, this book is full of illustrations and real life experiences and situations. A real treat are the reproductions of actual radio station forms, maps, and flyers, complete with logos! Look for it in your library at 384.54 or HD8698.K45 1986. I do not know if the book is still in print.

CHANGES AFOOT IN THE AM BAND

Bruce Portzer

Back in the 1970's an international agreement was reached to expand the AM broadcast to 1700 Khz in the western hemisphere. Since then, further international negotiations have taken place to work out the details of the agreement. During that time, the AM band has been losing audience share to FM, with the listening public perceiving AM as interior to FM.

The decline of AM has been a big concern at the FCC and in industry circles, and various moves have been made by the FCC and the broadcast industry to shore up the AM broadcast band. At the same time, the FCC has been faced with the problem of now to fairly allocate the additional 100 Khz of radio spectrum to AM broadcasters.

The need for improvement and expansion of the band brought about a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking by the FCC in 1990 to revitalize and expand the AM broadcast service. This process covered technical and regulatory changes to the existing AM band, as well as the new portion of the band, with a goal of improving the quality of service.

After a long period of public comment and review, the FCC finally came out with its final decision last fall. I recently obtained a copy of the FCC's Report and Order on this process from the local FCC office. The report is dated October 25. 1991 and documents the FCC's findings and the resulting changes to the FCC Rules. It is a couple hundred pages long and, as government reports go, makes fascinating reading.

I quickly discovered that the Rules changes are much broader than merely expanding the band. Many other changes were made which will have interesting effects on our hobby in the years to come.

Existing Stations

For decades, the FCC has had four classes of stations, with several subclasses. These included Classes I & II (clear channels) with subclasses such as II-A, II-B, etc to denote levels of power and interrerence protection, class III (regional channels) and Class IV (local channels). In the future, there will be four somewhat different classes of stations:

Class A, the current class I stations; these are the major clear channel stations like KFI and WCCO.

Class B. the current class II and III stations; these include the full-time secondary stations on the clear channels, plus the full-time regional channel stations.

Class C. the current local channel ("graveyard") stations.

Class D. including daytime—only and certain other class II and III stations with limited interference protection.

At first glance, this change looks like mere administrative bookkeeping. However, such is not the case, because the rules change also allows up to 50 kW for all class. A and B stations. In other words, the 5000 watt for less) regional channel stations can potentially poost power to 50 kW! This may not be as bad as it sounds, nowever, because all stations are still required to maintain current levels or interference protection to other co-channel stations and first adjacent channel stations, plus more stringent protection to second adjacent channel stations (i.e. those 30 kHz away). The rules change also requires stations to demonstrate a 10 percent interference reduction when any modifications are made to existing AM facilities. In other words, they'll be allowed to boost power if it results in less overall interference to other stations!

Given the large number of stations operating on regional channels, many

with complicated directional arrays. I'm not convinced we'll see large numbers of stations boosting power, although some rould take advantage if it in coastal locations. One area in particular would be the southeastern US, where AM stations are plaqued by JRM from stations in Cuba and other Latin countries. I wouldn't be surprised to see most of the stations in Miami running 50kw in a few years. In other parts of the country, some stations may boost power but blast most of the siunal towards Europe. Africa, Australia, or Japan. As an example, KXRU-1320 in Aberdeen, WA could probably get away with it by building a new 50kw transmitter site SE of town, with deep nulls to protect CHUM-1320 Vancouver, KMPS-1300 Seattle, KUPL-1330 Portland, KHNN-1320 Eugene and several other stations, and blast away at Aberdeen and Siberia. On the other hand, KMEN-1290 in San Bernardino, CA probably couldn't boost power because they have co-channel and adjacent channel stations in all directions.

In addition, the FCC revised the method by which nighttime interference levels are calculated. The revised method is said to more accurately account for real world conditions. I'm not sure what impact this will have, if any, on DX listening.

Expanded AM Band

Many years ago, an international agreement allowed for the expansion of the AM broadcast band to 1700 kHz in the western hemisphere. The FCC has finally adopted rules for operating in this expanded portion of the band, and has established a procedure for filling this frequency range. This process will basically be as follows:

- As a general rule, stations on the ten channels between 1610 and 1700 will be allowed to operate with 10kw days and 1 kw at night. In a few cases, higher night power may be considered. They will be allowed only non directional or simple directional patterns.
- Stations will be spaced every 400-800 km. It is anticipated that this
 will allow a maximum of 25-30 stations per channel. This is roughly
 equivalent to the number of full time stations on most regional
 channels.

At some undetermined time in the future, the FCC will begin taking applications for operation in the expanded band. There will be a time window when stations will be allowed to file a petition to allow them to operate in the new part of the band. The stations which file will be prioritized through a rather complex process, based on interference reduction, area served, and willingness to use AM stereo. Existing full-time stations will receive priority over daytime-only stations.

The FCC will then indicate which of these stations will be allowed to apply for an authorization to move to the new band. Frequencies will be selected by the FCC (not the applicants) based on the optimal "mix" which minimizes co-channel and adjacent channel interference. Eventually, after many months, construction permits will be issued, and the successful applicants will be able to start operation on their new frequencies. Stations which move to the new part of the band will be able to simulcast on their old and new frequencies for up to tive years.

I'm not sure how long this process will take, but I won't be surprised in it takes until at least the end of the current millennium for the new band to fill up. In any case, the moves will take place one station at a time. I envision a period of at least a couple years when we will be in a get-it-while-you-can mode: we'll have clear shots at stations hundreds or thousands of miles away, which will eventually get covered up when much closer stations come on the air. Those of us on the west coast could conceivably have a limited window of opportunity to hear rare states like Maine and Delaware, while DXers in the east might have similar prier apportunities to log Idaho or Montana.

After that, the channels will start to get more crowded; nowever, sunrise and sunset. DXing could still be interesting with startons ewitching from 10kW to 1 kW. For vice versal. Rear in mind that radios signals or paga!

better above 1600 than in the current band. Five hundred watt Aussies were heard recently on 1620 & 1629 in the eastern US & Canada, and hams have long enjoyed worldwide communications on 160 meters (1800-1900kHz) with less than 1 kw. I'm chomping at the bit, hi.

It should also be noted that 530 kHz was authorized for broadcast use in the western hemisphere. However, the FCC decided not to open this frequency for broadcast use. It will continue to be used by TIS stations, plus broadcasters in Canada and other countries.

Traveller's Information Stations

TIS stations are currently allowed to operate on 1610 kHz and 530 kHz with ten watts or less. With the expansion of the band to 1700 kHz, TIS stations will be allowed to operate on any standard (10kHz) frequency from 530 to 1700 kHz, which doesn't result in interference to and from broadcasters. This will probably make them more difficult to hear, since their ten watt transmitters will have to compete with multi-kilowatt broadcast stations (except on 530 kHz).

Consolidation

The FCC will also allow owners to surrender AM station licenses for cancellation. In return, the station owners will receive tax certificates enabling them to defer. As a result, owners will be able to receive tax breaks by closing down marginally profitable stations. The FCC's goal here is to provide an incentive for interference reduction. It will be interesting to see how many stations take advantage of this rule.

Some ownership rules have also been relaxed to allow common ownership of stations with overlapping 5 mV/m contours. These stations may operate with parallel programming. We may soon start seeing more minimetworks of stations in the same geographical area. Here in western Washington, we already have something called the "Country Gold" network, consisting of KJUN-1450, KWYZ-1230, KTOL-1280, KENU-1330, and KBLV-1540. These 4 suburban stations each have power and/or antenna pattern limitations which greatly limit their individual coverage; however, together they cover a large area. The advantage here is that operating costs can be consolidated for several stations, and coverage can be expanded over that of a single AM station. I believe in this case the network owners are leasing 100% of the air time from the station owners, but the same principle would apply if the stations were all owned by the same individual.

Conclusions

At this point I'm not sure when all these rules changes will take effect. However, I expect it will be soon. The expansion of the band will be exciting during the transition period. Beyond that, it's not clear what impact these changes will have on our hobby. A few stations will probably leave the air for good, but these will not exactly be the most powerful stations in their markets. A couple hundred stations will move to the upper end of the dial, eventually vacating their present channels. This will make DXing a little easier on individual channels for individual DXers. However, the change will only affect less than 5% of the existing stations, most of which presently have facilities which the owners feel provide less than acceptable coverage.

The FCC's Report and Order on Docket 87-267 "Review of the Technical Assignment Criteria for the AM Broadcast Service" has a lengthy discussion and analysis of the above changes, including technical criteria and Rules changes covered by its decision. I was able to obtain a cory from the FCC's Seattle office for no charge. You can also find the same information in slightly abbreviated form in the December 12, 1991 Federal Register.
