





[1/22] This has been a pretty good DX season for me. One of the best in a longtime. My hat goes off to J.D. Stephens for all the great DX tests he set up. I wouldn't have logged Rhode Island without it. Getting QSLs is sure not as easy as it used to be. Even calling the stations doesn't do as much good at it used to. Sometimes a prepared QSL card works, but who wants a collection full of those! I do have some in my collection, but sometimes that is about all you can do is to get one. Last October I finally logged the last Guam station, KGUM-567-5KW. I sent a report out with a tape, and nothing came back. I sent a f/up a month or so later - still nothing. So finally I decided to phone the station which cost me \$8.00 for 6 minutes. I was told to send the report to the GM, which I did and I got a nice letter from him. I remember the days when I first started to DX and QSL in the 60s when a reception report on a 4-cent portcard would do for a report. I was in High School at the time and didn't have a lot of \$\$\$. I lived in Seaward AK at the time and managed to get at least 90 percent return without f/ups! Today I am lucky to get 50 percent the first time around. A few years ago it was 70%. Recently I read a forum by Olle Alm-Sweden who is one of the greatest DXers and QSLers on MW in the world. He recently went on a DXpedition to Northern Sweden where he does every winter and sent out many reports, including 11 to the Philippines. Not one came back - a very poor return. QSLing is still fun but much more difficult than it used to be. I am glad I QSL'd a lot in the years gone by. If I had to verify those stations today (If I could even hear many of them), it would be impossible. The last month has been great with QSLs from KBIB-AR, CBA-NB, CHOK-ONT, KPCR-MO, KWOG-WY, CJXX-AB, KGUM-GM, KXEP-TX, KVML-CA, KCOL-CO, WARV-RI, etc. It would be interesting to hear how other Dxers make out with QSLs in the 90s. I know many do not QSL anymore because of the time and expense. But there are some that continue to QSL no matter what. Sometimes I ask myself why bother? But then I look at a 2100 + MW QSLs I have, then I have my answer! Good DX. 73s, Patrick.

Luckily, decoding the date code appearing on the box and in the battery compartment is easy: Ignore the first number. If the second number is a 2 that means it was made in 1992. The last two numbers are the week of manufacture. Week 42 and later are supposedly OK. Mine, purchased 9-24-92, was made during week 29 and is very numb, along with other problems. Just follow the warrantee exchange procedure outlined on the back cover of the instruction manual. Mine's going back right away. I'm interested in putting together a list of hams in the club, to be distributed to interested members. [3/29] Sorry I missed the Anniversary issue, so here's a brief re-intro: I'm 36, married to a librarian (Gov't Documents assistant), and I program classical music (mostly) and jazz at WSMU-FM (91.1), the NPR station at SW Mo. State Univ. I've been a member of IRCA since 1989 and have DXed the BCB off and on since 1969; currently limping along with a late-model Realistic TRF and a 4-foot spiral loop mounted on a slab of plywood. Not much DX done lately--did try for the WLKW-790 DX test on 3/29 but heard nothing [Note to J.D. Stephens: please try to get participating stations to indicate whether they'll be using dir. ant. during DX tests -- heck, while you're at it, try to convince them to go non-dir., hi!] Noticed Rich Eddie sent in a report to CDXR recently -- good to see he's still active in MW DX. In other news: the broadcast-industry paper Radio World just ran a review (including tests by hi-fi critic Len Feldman) of the Superadio III. Surprise -- the broadcasting industry LOVES it. Apparently it's designed mostly for "wideband" AM audio (that's why the filters are 'normal' and 'WIDE') out to 8 or 9 kHz, NOT for DXing. Also, GE/Thomson admits that "a few early models...made in mid-to-late 1992, were shipped from the factory with severe sensitivity problems..." Thomson didn't catch all of 'em before they hit the stores. They say to look for the 4-digit code (NOT the serial #) on the box or in the battery compartment... if the 2nd no is "2", the set was made in 1992 and could be defective; ditto if the 3rd and 4th numbers are "41" or lower (referring to the fiscal week the set was made). If they're "42" or higher (or if the 2nd # is "3" [1993]), then the set should have better sensitivity than the ones Gerry Thomas and others checked out. That doesn't explain the "birdies" however ... audition before buying! Speaking of radios, I'm anxious for someone to review the new Yaesu FRG-100 -- looks like a decent little rig. Also, does anyone have any experience with/knowledge of the MW performance of the (British) Lowe HF-150 and -225? If so, let us read about it in DX Monitor. Greetings all. My congratulations on IRCA wrapping up its 29th year. I missed the anniversary issue due to a busy schedule here. Still I'll offer a reintro here. I'm 42, newly married to a great gal-Jeannette, and have been a dispatcher with the Sylvania, OH police dept. for over 15 years, the last 11 as Chief Dispatcher. Prior to that I was announcer for radio stations WCWA-1230 here in Toledo and also for Toledo's 1520 which at the time was WTUU and WANR but which most recently was WVOI and is now WJCM as of 3/15/93. The station is now black gospel. You might want to note this change. My totals are now 3,075 heard, 49 states, 10 provinces, 53 countries. I only have a small smattering of veries, never really got started in that area due to the expense/time involved. Incidentally, the WJCM calls at Toledo's 1520 is now the 6th they've had, now in its 4th ownership, whew! One of the most recent format/ownership changes of some note in this area involves CKLW-800 in wirdown Windsor. The CHUM, Ltd. group has now taken over all four Windsor commercial stations and per the CRTC documents I sent for cited severe competition and possible financial failure of the Windsor commercial stations for allowing this monopoly ownership situation in Windsor. This effective as of 3/1/93. The CRTC cited the competition from the Detroit stations as being hurtful to the Windsor operations. In CKLW's case this ownership change caused the new owners to swap CKLW's highly successful nostalgia format with its newstalk 580 sister CKWW. In cities such as Toledo and Cleveland, etc. this move has proven to be very unpopular as the demise of CKLW has taken away the last vestige of 'good' listenable music from the AM dial in this area. CKLW-800 pulled anywhere from a 3 to a 5 share in Toledo and was 10th rated in Toledo's most recent arbitron. Just proves once again good radio must die! Looks like the AM's are trying to commit hari-cari by making themselves so unlistenable that eventually they all go out of business. Quite a hard fall for CKLW-800 which once dominated Detroit/Toledo/Cleveland markets as the #1 overall station in the '60's & '70s. Enough for now. 73s. Aloha.

Also in the same issue of the newsletter was this unreferenced comment regarding the relationship between weather conditions and DX: "Measurements made at various universities showed that on the night following a cloudy day signals were received more clearly than on nights following days of bright sunlight. On other matters, I've put together a coupler for use with the Quantum Loop and radios not having antenna terminals. It actually seems to work better on portables like the Superadio than the direct connection method (because you can control the degree of coupling and. therefore, the Q); details in an upcoming article (also, some updates on the Quantum Loop). #### Super-MWDX-5 Phasing Unit Mark Connelly - WAIION - 07 FEB 1993

The Super-MWDX-5 is a phasing unit with enhanced capabilities over the MWDX-5 described in my article of OCT 1991 (available as NRC / IRCA reprints). Added features include transformers for use as part of a noisereducing antenna system, additional controls to give better nulling ability, and a jack for a "spare antenna" usable for broadband monitoring and quick parallel checks / scanning during DXpeditions. A metal box is used for superior shielding and mechanical ruggedness. A new hardware scheme was developed to "float" the tuning capacitors from chassis ground. This method should be of value to builders of balanced loops that also require a tuning capacitor isolated from chassis ground. The Super-MWDX-5 may be used for two-wire phasing or loop-vs.wire phasing. In either case, nulls may be obtained that differ in directivity from those achievable with a standard loop; the result is potentially different DX from the loggings acquired with a loop alone. Nulling midwest "clears" to log Europeans at an East Coast US/Canada QTH is definitely a job better suited to phasing than looping. The MWDX-5 article gives useful background information on phasing as well as a list of other articles on the subject. The Super-MWDX-5 uses the BBA-C1 broadband amplifier which has good strong-signal handling performance; the BBA-B used on MWDX-4 style phasers could be substituted in rural areas for reduced battery drain.

#### Operating the Super-MWDX-5

Figures 1 through 3 are the schematics of the Super-MWDX-5. Please refer to them during the discussion of phasing procedure. Use wires at least 15m./50 ft. in length. There should be some angular or distance separation between the wires for optimum results in two-wire applications. See Tables 2 and 8 for physical positioning of switches.

1.0 Phasing Steps (2-wire)

#### (COMMENTS)

The best method of nulling when the two antennas are delivering comparable signal levels (e. g. within 6 dB) differs from that to be used when there is a considerable strength difference (e. g. one of the Beverages or longwires is already throwing a partial null on the dominant; or, one of the wires is considerably longer than the other and, therefore, consistently provides more signal). Unlike previous phasers, the Super-MWDX-5 provides both Q-skewing (R3) and non-Q-skewing (R1, R2) level adjustment methods to handle a wide variety of nulling situations. Certain nulls may be achieved best by a blend of both methods; as operator experience with the unit increases, nulling judgment improves and getting to the desired DX becomes a considerably faster procedure. Nulling procedures sound complicated at first, but are quickly executed once learned. The user should practice during non-skip daylight conditions on "graveyard" and regional channels having discernable subdominants to get familiar with operation of the controls before attempting night-time nulls of unsteady signals. As with a loop, solid nulls of skip stations above 1 MHz in the 50 to 500 mile range are difficult because of the rapid changes in vertical (and sometimes horizontal) arrival angles inherent when dealing with highangle skip. Such nulls are better when using phased Beverages than when using a loop or phased shorter wires.

#### 1.1 \*\* INITIALIZATION OF SWITCHES \*\*

Set frequency-range switch S1 to the correct range for the frequency of operation (see Table 2). Set S3 to Common (unless using an antenna system with noise-reduction transformers). Set Input Coupling switch S4 to Normal (or to a different position, depending on experimentation that leads to having determined the best position for a given antenna system). Set S5 Output switch to Phaser / Unamplified. Set S6 to Wire. S2 will be set subsequently.

1.2 \*\* INITIALIZATION OF POTENTIOMETERS \*\* Set level pots R1 (Line 1) and R2 (Line 2) to fully counterclockwise (minimum attenuation). R3 settings will be made subsequently.

#### 1.3 \*\* CONNECTIONS \*\*

Connect longwire #1 to J1 and connect longwire #2 to J2. If coaxial cable is used (as in a noise-reduction transformers scheme), BNC or SO-239 to dual-banana-plugs adapters should be used to connect Line 1 to J1 (center) / J3 (shield) and Line 2 to J2 (center) to J4 (shield). Otherwise, an available ground may be connected to J3 and J4. Connect phaser's output (J5), via coaxial cable, to the input of the receiver to be used, or to a tunable preamp. between phaser and receiver. Connect a 9V battery to the J7 battery holder and plug P1 into J6, or connect the plug of an 8V to 16V DC power source to J6.

#### 1.4 \*\* PEAK LINE 1 \*\*

(S2 on Line 1 / R3 at center) OR (S2 on Null-a / R3 fully CCW) Tune Line 1 by peaking desired-frequency signal strength with C1. At this time, leave C1 at its peaked-signal position. NOTE THE SIGNAL STRENGTH (observe S-meter, if available, or note audible level).

[At this time, other positions of Input Coupling switch S4 may be tried to see if greater signal transfer is possible. Readjustment of C1, and possibly S1, may be needed to re-establish a peaked condition. In any event, the peak should have reasonable Q (be well defined) and C1 should not be set too close to fully CW or fully CCW. In most cases, S4 on Normal will provide good enough signal levels and reasonably sharp tuning not overly affected by differences in length between the two wires to be phased.] 1.5 \*\* PEAK LINE 2 \*\*

(S2 on Line 2 / R3 at center) OR (S2 on Null-a / R3 fully CW) Tune Line 2 by peaking the desired-frequency signal strength with C2. At this time, leave C2 at its peaked-signal position. NOTE THE SIGNAL STRENGTH (observe S-meter, if available, or note audible level).

1.6 \*\* DETERMINE POTENTIOMETER TO ADJUST \*\*

If the dominant-station signal level noted when peaking Line 1 with C1 (step 1.4) is comparable (within 6 dB on meter, or not audibly different) to the strength noted when peaking Line 2 with C2 (step 1.5):

Adjust R3 to search for a null while trying the Null-a and Null-b positions of S2. If a distinct null is found, leave S2 and R3 at the best null-producing settings and proceed to step 1.7a. If a null is not found:

Switch S3 between Line 1 and Line 2 while adjusting R3 to make the observed signals equal on the S-meter (or not audibly different). R3 should, at this point, be close to its center position. Then, proceed to step 1.7a.

If the dominant-station signal level noted when peaking Line 1 with C1 (step 1.4) is noticeably greater than the strength noted when peaking Line 2 with C2 (step 1.5):

Set R3 to its center position. Adjust R1 to search for a null while trying the Null-a and Null-b positions of S2. If a distinct null is found, leave S2 and R1 at the best null-producing settings and proceed to step 1.7b. If a null is not found:

Switch S3 between Line 1 and Line 2 while adjusting R1 to make the observed signals equal on the S-meter (or not audibly different). Then, proceed to step 1.7b.

If the dominant-station signal level noted when peaking Line 1 with C1 (step 1.4) is noticeably lower than the strength noted when peaking Line 2 with C2 (step 1.5):

Set R3 to its center position. Adjust R2 to search for a null while trying the Null-a and Null-b positions of S2. If a distinct null is found, leave S2 and R2 at the best null-producing settings and proceed to step 1.7c. If a null is not found:

Switch S3 between Line 1 and Line 2 while adjusting R2 to make the observed signals equal on the S-meter (or not audibly different). Then, proceed to step 1.7c.
