Greetings. The next XEKTT/XEPE saga continues to unfold. The station with its new call sign and 560 frequency kept on blanketing everything in its path here in the southwest. XEMO has followed suit on 860 with its massive power increase, and there is talk of US will react by relaxing power limitations on its stations. Graveyarders with 5 KW! I did recently log another gy call change on 1490. KFFN in Tucson faded up at the top of the hour. I recent years I've heard them as "K-Joy" and "The End". Back when I first started DXing in the 70's they were Beautiful-music KAIR. I remember the last time I ever heard those call letters back in 1988. I went to Tucson for a weekend via Braniff Airlines, and the airport shuttle driver had that station on his radio. Most Tucson area stations are loggable from the LA area. 1490 Arizona also produces signals from KYCA Prescott and KZZZ BullheadCity, here at

nighttime. KCUZ in Clifton is a bit tough to catch, at least at this location. I have tentatively logged the call change for 1450 Tucson (Ex-KTZR). I heard about a thousand "Cool-1450" slogans but I'm still waiting for a KWFM ID. According to Bob Wien, KKZZ-1400 Santa Paula is now calling itself "The Lounge". I was watching Myth busters on Discovery Channel and they showed a 1974 segment of the Dick Cavett Show which actress Lucille Ball was claiming to pick up radio signals on her dental fillings. Their experiments concluded that radio signals probably couldn't be heard, however various metals in the mouth might cause an electric reaction similar to a battery. They even built a couple great crystal radios for their demonstrations... On the 80 meter band I recently had the privilege of talking to Art Bell (W6OBB). At the beginning of December 2003, I was surprised to receive a phone message and Email from Terry Klasek. It was through this E-mail that I received some sad news. Some of you may remember a DXer from Webster Groves, MO named Rich Eddie. He was able to DX AM, FM, shortwave and UHF television despite living within line-of-sight of several local FM and TV towers, not to mention living a short distance from the transmitter site of KSIV 1320. licensed to Clayton, MO. Sadly, Rich Eddie is no longer with us; he died of a ruptured aneurysm in the summer of 1996 at the young age of 48. I hadn't heard much from him since the end of the 1980s, except for his keeping me updated with St. Louis radio while I was living in suburban Atlanta. GA. One of the worst choices (if not THE worst choice) he made was the unwise choice of taking a domineering wife (which I avoided completely). The last time I saw Rich Eddie's name anywhere in DXing circles, it was in the fall of 1993, as he heard the DX test from WAGL 1560 Lancaster, SC from the St. Louis area. I also was lucky enough to hear the test, even lighting up the Stereo light on my Realistic TM-152 AM Stereo tuner. Rich had an interesting way of putting things. When a signal he received was very weak or interference prone, he would note in his log that the signal was "crummy", as in "usual crummy signal". He wisely chose the equipment for the area he lived in, such as a Hammarlund HQ-180A for AM and SW, a McIntosh MR-78 for FM DX, and some of the best FM and UHF TV antennas he could buy. As I recall, he couldn't DX VHF TV much because of the proximity of his Webster Groves QTH to the local FM and TV towers. In 1987, I visited him at his shack, and was amazed at the kind of FM stations he could pick up with his MR-78, even in such an RF jungle. Terry Klasek was right: Rich knew so much about DX, he was a walking encyclopedia of DX. Of course, I've learned from Rich's experience, and wisely chose to position my listening post some 20 miles from the powerful FM and TV stations. I live even further away from the AM antenna farms in Illinois. Rich Eddie was a top-flight DXer, despite the area he lived in. He is already sadly missed by those who knew him. 73.

EUROPE, AFRICA, AND MIDDLE EAST

CZECH REPUBLIC: Important changes on MW from 1 Feb - All transmitters of CRo 6 on 1071 1233 & 1287 will cease operations on 31 Jan. Program CRo 6 will be rescheduled, new on-air time will be 1800-2400 LT (1700-2300 UTC). The program will be relayed on CRo 2 transmitters on 639, 954 & 1332. (CRo = Cesky Rozhlas = Czech Radio.). More transmitters to cease operation on 31 Jan: 558 - Tachov/Právo, 864 - Strakonice/ Radomysl, 981 - Jihlava/Vetrník. With Tachov 558 closing down it is now the last chance to catch, report and verify the last regional program from the Czech Republic on MW. Tachov relays regional

program of Studio Plzen (Pilsen) - 24 h. Power is not too big - 1 kW. Despite the plans to close down the LW transmitter Topolná 270 too, the transmitter seems to survive again and stays on the air after 1 February.(Karel Honzik MWDX 18 Jan)

DJIBOUTI: The new 600kW transmitter that the IBB installed at Arta is going to start with test transmissions on 1 Feb, relaying Radio Sawa from 1600-0400 [Moscow Time?-BT]. (Feodor Brazhnikov Russian open_dx mailing list, 31 Jan 2004, via Bernd Trutenau, mwdx) I tried to pick it up ..but I managed to get it only once around 21.45 very weak signal with a new stream. I tried to // 990 1260 1548 but sounds like it's a new stream to me. will keep on listening and will keep you updated. (Tarek Zeidan, Egypt, via Steve Whitt, mwc)

GERMANY: The nationwide overnight programs still exist, but one station after another is dropping them. Here is the current situation for overnight programming on the AM outlets of ARD stations:

567. Radio Multikulti (RBB): Own programming, includes rebroadcasts of shows from various European stations (VRT, ORF, RDP etc.)

576, 666, 711, 1017, 1485. SWR cont.ra: From January 1st relay of MDR INFO

594. hr-skyline: ARD-Nachtexpress, will be probably replaced by relay of MDR INFO

702, 792, 828, 972. NDR INFO: Own overnight programming (ARD-Nachtexpress dropped earlier in 2003)

720, 774. WDR 2: Own programming

729, 801. Bayern 1: ARD-Nachtexpress

783, 882, 1044, 1188. MDR INFO: Own programming

828. SWR 4: ARD-Nachtexpress

936. Bremen Eins: Relay of SWR 1

ARD-Nachtexpress is one of the three overnight programs produced on a rota scheme and distributed through circuits leased anyway and otherwise used for feeds. The other ones are ARD-Nachtkonzert, aired by all culture / classical music programs, and ARD-Popnacht. The latter one is already dead meanwhile, used only by HR and SR anymore. (Kai Ludwig, 23 Dec 2003 via Arctic)

North German daytime station Power Radio 612 has asked to suspend transmissions for half a year in order to restructure both finances and programming. The suspension of broadcast lasts from 25 January to 31 July 2004. It starts with a one week penalty suspension given by the authorities in 2001 for failing to broadcast a program in line with the original licence. This measure was challenged by Power Radio, went through the courts and was uphelt. (Dr. Hansjoerg Biener, via Steve Whitt, mwc)

IRELAND: After a delay of two and a half years due to planning difficulties, Irish religious broadcaster Solas AM is finally able to go ahead with construction of its transmitter site. Irish media site Radiowaves reports that the station has been given a 20 year permit to erect a 61m high transmitter mast together on a site located within the grounds of Orlagh College in Rathfarnham, South Dublin, owned by the Augustinian Order. The decision was made on appeal following a rejection of a previous planning application by South Dublin County Council. The Broadcasting Commission of Ireland awarded Solas AM a licence in July 2001 for a 10 kW MW transmitter, which expected to operate on either 531 or 1143. At one stage, the station investigated buying the longwave site of Radio Tara, which is now owned by RTE. (Andy Sennitt, mwdx)

ISRAEL: The Hillel transmitting station (at Tel Aviv) closed on Jan 1 and with it the two AM transmitters: 200kW for Alef on 576, and 1200 kW for Dalet on 738 that was not in use due to ban from the environmental authorities. The location also had two shortwave transmitters: 100 kW Thomson from 1959 (11585) and 500 kW from Telefunken from 1983. Only the 500kW transmitter is being retained, everything else in the station is being scrapped. The staff has been dispersed and dismantling is now starting. Reshet Alef (the first network) is now on 531 AM - replacing Reshet Gimel (the third network), which was on that frequency. (Daniel Rosenzweig via Bengt Ericson, Arctic)

According to MV-Eko, the 1200 kW transmitter started operations on 7 November 1972 after a few months at 600 kW. Tel Aviv also received 4x100 kW Thomson MW transmitters around 1959-1961 according to CFTH advertisements in the WRTH. (Olle Alm, Arctic)

NETHERLANDS: Agreement reached on future use of Lopik. Here in the Netherlands, an agreement has been reached between the local councils of IJsselstein, Lopik and Montfoort,

the Ministry of Economic Affairs, the Province of Utrecht and transmitter operator Nozema which should bring an end to interference suffered by nearby homes from the MW transmitters at Lopik. The key points are as follows:

- 1. The total permitted power output will be reduced from the current 240 kW (2 x 120 kW) to 100 kW, with a reserve of 40 kW.
- 2. The mast at the northern end of the site closest to Ijsselstein will be dismantled within 12 months from the signing of the agreement.
- 3. Transmissions on the higher MW frequencies such as 1008 and 1395, which require more power to cover the same area, will no longer be made, even as backups.
- 4. In the long term, the transmitter site could be moved to a platform on the Markermeer polder. However, this won't be necessary if MW goes digital.

The plan means that the transmitter power of Arrow Classic Rock on 675 will be reduced from the present 120 kW to 100 kW, but the big loser is Quality Radio bv, which holds six MW licences including the one for 1395 currently leased to Radio 10 Gold. "We have not even been informed, let alone consulted," said a Quality Radio spokesman. The license for 1395 officially permits the use of up to 120 kW from Lopik, but a lower power transmitter at Trintelhaven is currently used, significantly reducing the coverage area. According to Quality Radio, it appears to be wrongly assumed by a number of parties, such as the municipality of IJsselstein and the province of Utrecht, that the current situation is satisfactory. It means that Arrow Classic Rock, which was involved in the consultations although it officially doesn't have a terrestrial licence, gets to use Lopik, leaving Quality Radio - which has a valid licence for 1395 - empty handed. Quality Radio says it will block the signing of the agreement as long as all the possibilities for 1395 AM from Lopik have not been investigated fully. The broadcaster says that in principle it's prepared to keep the power level as low as possible to ensure that the nuisance to nearby homes is restricted to an acceptable level. (Media News of Radio Netherlands)

Update: Arrow Classic Rock has issued a statement refuting suggestions on some media Web sites that the power reduction to 100 kW means it will have less than 100% coverage of the country. In fact, the reduction in signal strength is unlikely to be noticed by anyone within the Dutch borders, though some listeners further away might notice a small difference. Media News från Radio Netherlands. (Media News of Radio Netherlands)

SUDAN: Around 3.30 UTC I checked some of the Sudan frequencies on MW published in WRTH 2004 and noticed that 765 is fair to good with a morning program , a phone conversation with Khartom airport with a weather report, followed by local news. Checked 7200 but it was not on, also 1296 was not on. Around 0410, 7200 signed on //1296 with the news about the visit of the Sudanese president to Egypt and his talks with the Egyptian president. (Tarek Zeidan, mwc, 19 Jan)

UNITED ARAB EMIRATES: 1539 Sadiyat no longer mentioned in the IBB and Radio Farda schedules, so may have been taken off the air as no longer needed after the activation of 1170. (Olle Alm, ARC)

VATICAN: On 26 Jan at 1534 I was scanning the bands and stopped on 4005 where nice blues music was heard. This freq is usually occupied by Vatican Radio, so I checked their other common freq 5890 and indeed same music there. With brief Italian announcements they played "I ain't got nothing but the blues" "Night time is a right time" etc, even one Janis Joplin blues song. This was really nice programming instead of "Ave Marias" or Mass. At 1559 interval signal, bells, brief Radio Vaticana ID and then vespers. Blues was over and I continued scanning Both 4005 (AM with suppressed LSB) and 5890 are listed in WRTH 2004 as Vatican City with powers of 10 and 80kW. So, according to WRTH, there are still two SW and two MW transmitters inside the tiny Vatican City area. (Jari Savolainen, HCDX)

WESTERN HEMISPHERE

ARGENTINA 2379.83 LRA15 Radio Nacional Tucumán (2x1190), Jan 28, 0940, unbelievably strong signal, news and network "...Radio Nacional..." ID, // 6060. For about 1/2 an hour this morning from 0930 to 1000 the opening to LA was incredible. I couldn't keep up with all the carriers I was hearing below 3 mHz. (Mohrmann-VT, HCDX)

BRAZIL: In my visit to Salvador de Bahia, BA, Brazil, I could confirm Radio Educadora da Bahia is off air in short wave from some time ago. Two local DXers from DX Clube do Brasil: Djaci Franklin da Silva & Antonio Rosset confirm me this information too. The station transmitte only in FM band, on 107,5 Mhz (Arnaldo Slaen, Argentina, HCDX)

COLOMBIA: 2020.18 HJZD Radio Panzenú, Montería 27 Jan 1020 UTC. Radio Panzenú is new for me and it's the first time I'm hearing something on this freqy. IDs with prefix quite often and some ads. Harmonic from 1010. (Bjorn Malm, Quito, Ecuador, HCDX)

ECUADOR: 2299.84 La Voz de Riobamba (2x1150), Jan 28, 0932-0943, Andean vocals, lively announcer yelling announcements and ID's, good signal // a weaker 3449. (Mohrmann-VT, HCDX)

GREENLAND: "Sunnia Kalippoq" or "The whaleboat Sonja drags whale" is the title of the interval signal used by Radio Greenland, according to WRTH. This elusive melody, now that this remote station is only now available on low-powered MW and FM, can be heard in a good-quality audio clip just uploaded to the Interval Signals Online website. In full, what you'll hear is: a brief announcement in Danish - news jingle - time check, ID and sign-off announcement in Greenlandic - national anthem. All this on Interval Signals Online @ www.intervalsignalsonline.com (Dave Kernick, hcdx)

MÉXICO: CGC Communicator readers are already familiar with XEPE (formerly XEKTT), the new 560 station near Tijuana that is causing massive interference to U.S. broadcast signals (see CGC #609). XEPE is authorized to run 20 kW day and 10 kW night and is nondirectional, real flamethrower. Reliable sources in Mexico indicate that two more AM stations, 780 and 920, are under construction at Rosarito Beach and may be on the air as early as mid-February 2004. The stations are said to be 20 kW day/10 kW night, same as XEPE, and will also be non-directional. The transmitter site is reported to be approximately two miles north of the famous 1090 array. These new stations are also expected to cause massive interference to U.S. broadcast interests. (Patrick Martin)

From the CGC Communicator:Regarding XEKTT (XEPE), 560, Tecate/Tijuana, a group of U.S. broadcasters has asked the FCC to rescind the Section 325(c) cross-border programming authority that the Commission has issued to Pacific Spanish Network, Inc. (see CGC #611). Turns out that Pacific would ordinarily be allowed 10 days to respond to the interference charges that have been filed against them, but Pacific now asks for two and a half months to do so.

No way, say the U.S. broadcasters. They object to any extension of time arguing that (a) severe interference from XEKTT to nearly 29 million people within the protected contours of the affected U.S. stations deserves immediate (not delayed) action, (b) only a few days should be needed to review and comment on the engineering interference showings already submitted, and (c) XEKTT's internationally uncoordinated operation is on its face a violation of the U.S./Mexican AM agreement which is sufficient grounds for immediate dismissal of the cross-border permit. Stay tuned for the next chapter in this saga. (Dennis Gibson)

ASIA AND PACIFIC

CHINA: National channels: CPBS 1st channel is now called "Zhongguo zhi Sheng" (= Voice of China), in English "China National Radio". CPBS 2nd channel is called "Jingji zhi Sheng" (=Voice of Business), in English "China Business Radio". "Zhongguo zhi Sheng" is also heard in connection with the newscasts in the 2nd channel. The CPBS organisation name ("Zhongyang Renmin Guangbo Diantai" = Central People's Broadcasting Station) is retained and is often added before the individual channel names. (Olle Alm, ARC)

PHILIPPINES: 1143, 1170 The Poro medium wave site is about to be moved further out on the tip of Poro Point to the site of the former Wallace Air Station. The RFP for the replacement antenna towers was advertised in the FedBiz webpage last month. This is the site of the last remaining Continental 1 MW 105B, now in service on 1170 (Ben Dawson III, Dec 29, DXLD)

TAIWAN: 1368 is the new frequency of the Buddhist station in Kaohsiung, previously on 1593. It has also been renamed to Voice of Jinxi. Website: http://www.am1368.com.tw 1476 is a clandestine station, more and more pirate stations appear around the island. There are more than 5 stations logged in Taipei QTH. (Miller Liu, Taibei, Dec 20, DXLD)
