NOTES

Corus is selling all their radio properties in Quebec to Cogeco Incorporated. The stations involved are CFQR 92.5, CKOI 96.9, CHMP 98.5 and CKAC 730 in Montreal; CFEL 102.1 and CFOM 102.9 in Quebec City; CKOY 104.5 and CHLT 107.7 in Sherbrooke, CIME 103.9 in Saint Jerome, CJRC 104.7 in Gatineau-Ottawa, and CHLN 106.9 in Trois Rivieres. It is unclear as to why CKRS 98.3 in Saguenay-Chicoutimi was not mentioned or whether the deal also includes the licenses for CINF 690 and CINW 940 which recently went dark. Cogeco will either have to apply for an exemption from the common ownership policy or flip some of these stations as they will now be over the allowable number of stations in Montreal, Quebec City, and Sherbrooke. The whole deal is subject to CRTC approval.

I attempt to be as accurate as possible with this information. I visit many websites and message boards on a daily basis seeking the latest in Canadian radio news to report in this column. I trust this information to be worthy: however I can't be in all these places to confirm everything. If inaccurate information is reported I do apologize, but don't blame me... WBAF - BARNESVILLE, GA

In this Forfeiture Order we issue a monetary forfeiture in the amount of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) to Barnesville Broadcasting. Inc. ("Barnesville Broadcasting"), former licensee of Station WBAF(AM), Barnesville, Georgia ("Station"), for its willful violation of Section 73.3539 of the Commission's Rules ("Rules"), by failing to timely file a license renewal application for the Station. On February 27, 2007, the Bureau issued a Notice of Apparent Liability for Forfeiture ("NAL"), in the amount of one thousand, five hundred dollars (\$1,500) to Barnesville Broadcasting for willfully violating Section 73.3539 of the Rules, based on the fact that it failed to timely file a renewal application for the Station. As noted in the NAL, Barnesville Broadcasting's renewal application for the Station's license term was due on December 1, 2003, four months prior to the April 1, 2004, expiration date. Barnesville Broadcasting did not file the application until March 23, 2004, and provided no explanation for the untimely filing of the renewal application. In response to the NAL, Barnesville Broadcasting submitted a letter on March 20, 2007. In its Letter, Barnesville Broadcasting asserts that the proposed forfeiture should be cancelled because: its failure to timely file its renewal application was an oversight, and paying the forfeiture would present a financial hardship.

1300 KROP Brawley, CA from IVPRESSONLINE.COM

KROP AM 1300 is off the air and in the process of being sold, its former station manager said. "I don't know if it was a function of the sale or if it was just a case of turning it off until it is sold," Tony Driskill, the former station manager and general manager for Cherry Creek Radio Corp.'s Lake Tahoe stations, said. Cherry Creek Radio Corp. is the owner of KROP. The station was sold, Driskill said, because without an FM station in the same market it "doesn't make sense from a competitive standpoint" to continue running the AM station. Q96 was previously operated in conjunction with KROP but was relocated to San Diego in January. Q96 is for sale now that it has relocated. Driskill said if the deal goes through and the new owners take over the station it will be turned on once again. He declined to name the potential new owners. KROP is also the local broadcast affiliate for Los Angeles Dodgers baseball games. Driskill said the Dodgers have been on KROP since 1958 and he believes the new owners would want to continue to have the Dodger games broadcast on the station, but said that was only his opinion. "It's up to them," he said.

BRUCE WILLIAMS SHOW ENDS from ALL ACCESS.COM

ALL ACCESS has received word from BRUCE WILLIAMS affiliates that the syndicated host has sent them an e-mail informing them that his show will end on MARCH 5th. The e-mail tells the affiliates, "After a great deal of thought. I have concluded, as has been said many times, 'all things come to an end,' and this is true for me of my radio career. As a consequence, it is my painful chore to announce with much regret that MARCH 5th, will be my last Network broadcast." "There have been enormous changes in our industry in the past three-and-a-half decades. Those of you who have been in the business for a long period of time know full well many of the things to which I elude (sic). Those of you running independent stations are more aware then anyone of the challenges you face. The last several years have been very difficult economically for most. There's no question that there will be continued innovations in this enterprise and the choices are clear, adjust or leave. "You may rest assured that this was not a decision made lightly," continued WILLIAMS. "I truly appreciate the difficulties it will impose on many of you. If it would be helpful, I will do my best to provide some older shows, which you may continue to use at no cost and without any commercial obligations." The e-mail also thanked the people and organizations who played a part in his success, with a special mention of the late WCTC-A/NEW BRUNSWICK GM TONY MARANO, who gave WILLIAMS his start in 1975, his family, and his assistants BETH RICHARDS and DENISE GAMBALE. "I have learned 'never say never," added WILLIAMS. "This moment is closing a chapter of my life, which has meant a great deal to me. I have no broadcast plans. This is not to say that if someone made an overture that I would automatically say no. Unlikely, but the door is never firmly closed A great many factors went into making this decision. I have agonized over it for some considerable period of time. The decision was not made lightly but I firmly believe it is the correct one...." WILLIAMS assured affiliates that he will go ahead with the planned "mystery cruise" he is hosting next month, and will also continue his column for UNITED FEATURES SYNDICATE

WATO Oak Ridge, TN from KNOXVILLEBIZ.COM

It was a short-lived resurrection for Oak Ridge's only radio station. WATO went off the air last week after it had signed on again in late August. Ann C. Walden, president of WATO Radio, blamed ongoing economic malaise and the high cost of getting new transmission towers for the shutdown. "The economy has been really difficult to get enough ad sales to make it a profitable venture." said Walden. After pouring more than \$125,000 into the station, Walden said she was facing another "extremely large expenditure." She said she had been leasing a tower and equipment from local radio pioneer Johnny Pirkle, but Pirkle has sold his building on Tulsa Road in Oak Ridge to make way for a planned new hotel. Installing new towers and gear either on an easement at that site or in another location – would have been too pricey. Walden said Since the station went off the air and word of its shutdown spread, Walden said she's received several expressions of interest in acquiring its Federal Communications Commission license. Walden said the station's new leased offices on LaFayette Drive in Oak Ridge have been closed, and she's sold equipment there to a radio station in the Maryville-Alcoa area. The WATO's Internet site for simulcasts – www.sheepdogbroadcasting - will be "going down soon," Walden said. Walden snapped up the license for the station - AM 1290 and FM 101.1 - weeks before it was to be pulled by the FCC. After a 60-year run, the station first signed off the air in March 2008 after a windstorm toppled one of its towers in east Oak Ridge. The renewed radio station featured a talk-show format with conservative leanings and broadcast Oak Ridge High School athletic events. The station would have gone off the air earlier, but Walden said she had a commitment to broadcast the Oak Ridge Lady Wildcats' basketball tournament action last month.

WAGE Loudoun, VA from Leesburg Today

The effort to bring an AM radio station back to Loudoun is meeting with some resistance from the county's planning staff, as well as some members of the public, but the Planning Commission has sent the application to work session to try to work out the specifics of the application. Potomac Radio, which ceased transmitting WAGE Radio from his Leesburg headquarters in 2008, is seeking permission to establish an AM radio transmitter on a 7.5-acre leased property located on the northeast portion of property at the intersection of Loudoun County Parkway and the planned extension of Gloucester Parkway. The site is owned by Loudoun Water and is next to the property planned for the Kincora mixed-use development. The station will consist of three 195-foot self-supporting lattice towers with a buried grounding system of 120 equally spaced copper wires extending in 200-foot radius around each tower. A 20-foot by 25-foot transmitter building, satellite dishes and auxiliary generator with above ground natural gas tank will be located in proximity to the proposed antenna arrays near an existing gravel road. The proposal would require ground-disturbing activities within the floodplain as well as the removal of approximately two-acres of forest cover, requirements that have raised concerns of county staff members and the public, particularly with regard to the nearby heron rookery on the Kincora property. Project manager Pat Giglio acknowledged that Potomac Radio has submitted a series of conditions to mitigate the potential impacts, but said staff can still not support the application.

Middle East Loggings from Nick Hall-Patch

A couple of months ago, Susan and I visited our daughter in Qatar. Most of the time was taken up with family visiting and exploration of part of the world that was quite unlike home. Part of the exploration, however, was performed by an RF Space SDR-14 receiver driven by a Wellbrook ALA100 single turn loop antenna, hung inside an apartment in Doha, Qatar and a hotel room in Dubai, UAE. Quite a number of 190 kHz wide files were recorded for a couple of minutes around the hour and half hour, not so much for DXing, as to get a flavor of the local band in that area. With luck, they might provide some background for identifying DX that might be heard outside the Middle East. (We may have to wait for the next solar minimum here in western North America though.)

Some, such as the Radio Iran and many of the Saudi stations were regular visitors, if nothing else; the sheer quantity of them is a testimony to the significant role that the two countries play in the region. Others were only IDed once; parallels were very helpful, but I still have quite a number of

unIDs. Of course, it was also entertaining to be driving in Doha (an entertainment in itself, actually) and listening to Farda-1575 and Saudi Arabia-1521 on the car radio in the middle of the day.

It was interesting to get a taste of how many local Iranians go to Radio Iran feeds overnight. One of the recordings crossed over the time in the morning that they went local again, which probably contains more info than I'll ever discover without learning Farsi. Also, Iran's time zone is offset by one half hour, but I didn't get a lot of ID's on the half hour GMT; R Iran seems to ID on both the hour and half hour which is very helpful to the DXer. Other stations never IDed that I could hear. The Quran stations in various Arab countries have very distinctive vocal mx that goes on and on, but IDs are practically non-existent.

Mauno Ritola in Finland did marathon DXing session with these files, and sent me his loggings for which I am very thankful, as they were most helpful in my making my own identifications. He also heard a good bit of real DX there, much of which I haven't found yet, so I'll be asking him for hints!

They are identified in the filename by "Doha" or "Dubai" depending on the listening location. After the location is the center frequency of the file, followed by time and date of recording.

If you don't own an RF Space receiver, you can still listen to these. Download the Spectravue software to play the files from: http://www.moetronix.com/svdownload.htm and it will give a taste of listening with a software defined radio if you haven't already experienced it. There's other software that will play the files, but Spectravue was written specifically for this family of receiver.

Here's the first part of what I heard, covering the low band only. More to come.

This past week, I was able to pick up a copy of the Union City, Indiana Evening Times dated 9/2/1932. It's not in the best of shape-many papers that old are not - but I found an interesting item on the front page. It's titled "Finlep H. Gray's radio hour changed". The articles says that the series of talks over WOWO in Fort Wayne. Ind on "Why the Depression" has been changed to the noon hour and starting on 9/6, would be "every Tuesday noon, 12:15 Central Standard time or 1:15 Daylight saving time, which station at this hour is almost as clear as WLW." I found it interesting that that they would be comparing the signal strength of the two stations since Union City is fairly close to being about the halfway point between the two stations. Also, I had read from time to time that the whole state of Indiana had been on Central time at one time, but this is the first I had actually run across a reference to it as an existing reference to it in a publication. Another interesting point was the reference to both standard and daylight time at the same time. Many of the IRCA members were DX'ing about the same time I started about 1960 and will remember that there was nothing standard about standard time back in those days when county seats would be on daylight savings time while the county itself would not be. It wasn't until 1970 with the Uniform Time Act that the observance of daylight time became the law across the country unless the whole state exempted itself. That led a year later to what was informally called the Indiana exception where part of the state could observe it and the other portion not if the state was divided into two time zones as Indiana is. By the way, the news stand price of that paper was two cents. I wish they were still that low, hi. As I type this column, I am listening to George Jonescu doing Big Band Sunday Night on CFZM-740. He just made the comment that he had to borrow a song from the music director because he didn't have it in his personal collection but that he normally programs most of the music he plays from his personal library. The am740.ca website says that Jonescu celebrates 60 years of broadcasting this September, 73.

The Tecsun PL-380 by Graham Maynard

WOW! what a potentially capable miniature receiver we have here, whilst to my ears - what a truly obnoxious sounding little radio it seemed!

Out of the Box: The PL-380 might embody amazing reception flexibility via its digital signal processing circuitry, but out of the box, its Longwave sensitivity is very poor, its Medium Wave sensitivity poor below about 1200kHz, both being aspects which render it inferior to most of the basic track tuned solid state pocket portables made during the last 45 years. Additionally it makes no attempt to offer comfortably balanced reproduction of original broadcast program material due to it

beaming sharp, "spitchy" and sibilant sound (especially on FM) via a tiny internal loudspeaker, which for me, made this Tecsun quite *impossible* for me to listen to. I still have smaller 1960s AM radios which are both more sensitive and more acceptable in their own right; they might not have DSP, but they are more competent when it comes to general listening!

Whether a radio is analog or digital there can never be any excuse for bad audio, and designers really should consider the nature of human hearing with its innate need for balanced low and high frequency sound pressure level comfort with respect to our listening norm, as is set by the mid range frequencies we must hear in order to comprehend communications. This means that

when there is little bass output - as via a tiny loudspeaker - then the treble output must also be reduced in level, and not be left to propagate tweeter like with unnatural loudness via untamed small driver high frequency efficiency.

After reading the comparative review by Gary DeBock (USA) as published in Medium Wave News. other DX magazines, and on the Internet. I bought this receiver through E-bay with no problems via International Air-mail from Hong Kong: http://cgi.ebay.co.uk/TECSUN-PL-380-FM-Stereo%2F-SW% 2F-MW%2FLW-DSP-Radio-(-Silver-) W0QQitemZ270519397606QQcmdZViewItemQQimsxg 20100123?IMSfp=TL100123233001r19279.

Gary went on to overcome AM insensitivity by mounting a 7.5" long ferrite rod antenna on a support externally affixed to the top of the radio. This antenna is two inches longer than the radio itself, thus making the set larger than my pockets. This was described in DX Monitor for January 2 2010, and online at: http://www.dxer.ca/file-area/doc download/290-tecsun-pl-380-review.

However, Gary's comparative reviews with other small radios, did not fully express how poor the digital PL-380's daytime sensitivity is when compared to more normal sized AM portables, nor how atrocious the sound is should this receiver be used as a portable radio. I found myself needing to use the AM passband selector as a treble cut, but that simply muffles reproduction and degrades clarity. As a direct result, not only did I find myself very disappointed with this purchase, but my set holds the record here for speed of removing the cabinet back on a brand new piece of equipment; ie after only five minutes of listening time.

On the Bench: Three back screws allowed rear removal, and then I saw with my own eves the miniscule size of ferrite antenna bar as commented on by Gary - it is only 3.5mm by 7.5mm in cross section, and 79mm in length, so no way could this be capable of providing any radio with adequate daytime MW sensitivity. Not only that, but the antenna coil turns are wound directly over the ferrite bar without any insulating former, as is normally the case with high impedance AM frequency overwinds in order to reduce transduced voltage field losses that are capacitively coupled between the wire at the live end of the coil and the bar surface itself.

I de-soldered the Tecsun antenna coil; temporarily connected up a 3.5"x 3/8" diameter ferrite antenna/coil from another radio, and immediately noticed a significant improvement; while observing good varactor diode tracking across the entire MW band. Then by comparing the new coil inductance with that of the original. I measured a difference of more than a factor of two between readings; the Tecsun coil being lower at circa 250uH. Thus I cannot do other than conclude that either someone at Tecsun, or Silicon Laboratories (the si7434 chip manufacturer), has not done their calculations correctly, because the antenna fitted during manufacture does not come near to optimizing the si7434 IC circuit capabilities. Indeed, Gary DeBock independently found his PL-380 performed best when its antenna coil was closer to 600uH, this value being outside the range specified by Silicon Laboratories

With adequate coil inductance the PL-380 performed well across the entire MW band, but it was still poor at longwave frequencies unless the antenna coil was moved to the center of the ferrite rod. There was almost 20dB sensitivity difference at 198 kHz for that same antenna coil between the center of the rod and the end position that was necessary for good MW tracking. Thus not only was the original ferrite bar itself too small and the overwind not sufficiently insulated, its inductance was too low for efficient pickup of MW signals, and the LW tuning capacitance too low to be using the same antenna coil. Actually Silicon Laboratories specify a separate and greater inductance coil for LW tuning, so really the Tecsun PL-380 is not properly longwave capable at all, especially when compared to what we have long taken for granted in this part of the World.

Now I was not seeking supercharged DXing capabilities from such a small set, just a half decent portable capable of receiving regional transmissions from around the British Isles during daylight. Given that the internal ferrite bar really did need to be replaced, I had to get my head round the necessity for some internal surgery in order to fit a larger one. Here the planning was scarier than implementation itself, for removing the original ferrite bar and cutting the plastic 'chassis' proved relatively easy.

The existing ferrite antenna appeared to be held in place by some plastic impact adhesive. Without damaging the original antenna bar or its wire I was able to remove it by very slowly pushing the blade of a terminal screwdriver between it and its mounting bed at the loudspeaker end of the plastic 'chassis'. Over a period of about ten minutes the glue stretched enough to either give way or be undercut with miniature wire cutters.

Then the plastic chassis was nibble cut with the same miniature wire cutters until there was a long slot between where the radio back would be, and the internal metal LCD screen plus the light switch PCB. See photograph showing a slot opening large enough to hold 4" of 3/8"



diameter ferrite rod with antenna coil. The bottom of this slot was then lined with fine neoprene foam to keep the new antenna coil from pressing closely against the metal screen.

Next I cut down to 4" a longer length of 3/8" AM antenna rod (make a hacksaw blade notch, face this upwards at the edge of a table, then sharply tap the unwanted overhanging end downwards to snap it off) and fitted the MW antenna coil from a scrap transistor radio. The coil was from a damaged £5:00 Mikomi CT-2388, and this winding is not likely to be bettered by any separately obtained specialist product. Actually, for those who do not have a ferrite rod either, the 3.5" long Mikomi rod and MW coil work fine, thus that radio represents an inexpensive transplant source. The Mikomi coil also has the higher inductance necessary for optimizing PL-380 input sensitivity, whereas coils salvaged from older transistor radios might be less suitable due to these having been manufactured with lower inductance for use with higher value variable tuning capacitors.

When this coil was measured on a rod away from the radio, its inductance was between approximately 500µH at the end of the rod, and 750µH for mid positions. However as soon as located within the radio slot, the proximity of the metal LCD screen and loudspeaker frame reduced the antenna coil inductance. Thus, there was a need to move the coil down the rod in order to re-establish track tuning alignment when compared to the coil's optimum position as found with the rod being held away from the radio. I loosely set the coil plus rod into the slot previously cut to house it, (with the grounded end of the antenna coil towards the strobe wiring at the light switch PCB), and then moved the coil up and down the rod whilst watching the S meter in a mirror

to establish an optimum position for the coil on the rod.

Unfortunately, not only was antenna sensitivity reduced when the ferrite was close to the internal metal screen and loudspeaker, but background noise levels were increased due to direct digital pickup from on-board circuitry. When just two inches away from the radio PCB, that same 4" antenna is about 3dB better for both sensitivity and S/N on MW, so clearly Gary's externally mounted antenna represents a much better arrangement for those wishing to optimize stand-alone DX capabilities.

New Performance

Overall I estimated the MW reception improvement due to antenna replacement as a useful average 10dB above the original, thus providing this little radio with respectable daytime sensitivity for MW listening, even though it remains poor on LW when compared to most other radios. The PL-380 is, however, good for indicating the presence of night-time split-channel DX reception, even if not being the best to resolve it, because resolution is also impaired by having the ferrite antenna so close to digital circuitry, as revealed by the on-board S/N-ratio meter. Nor is there any substitute for synchronous demodulation when it comes to weak signal AM reception.

The highest signal strength reading indicated here on the Tecsun meter is 63dB in the 10 to 15mV/m fields from MW locals and the 100kW regional transmitter, this appearing to be the maximum reading possible with any powerful signal. The best S/N ratio indicated is 25dB, though in reality it might be better and more like the typical 40+dB with solid state portables (whilst 60+dB has been measured with good tube receivers). However, unless signal strengths are good, completely steady, and not close to 100% modulated, the S/N reading can fall from 25dB to 15dB whilst listening to say a 10mV/m R5-Live broadcast, this with an accompanying low level digital mush just observable on accompanying audio. At night any fading or fluttering signals, or momentary adjacent channel splatter seemed to induce noise which destabilized and affected reproduction when compared to straight analog or non DSP digital receivers, though this might have been due to digital feedback into the closely sited ferrite antenna. (See below.)

Another aspect of the radio relates to AGC speeds. This is not a dedicated communications type receiver, so whilst the speedy receiver gain degeneration is useful, I feel that gain recovery is too fast for AM listening of fast fading and fluttering carriers, such that dissonance from momentarily unmodulated sidebands could become seriously exacerbated by the radio's tweeter like reproduction, even when a narrow DSP passband is selected. This same 'mush' was apparent and hard to tolerate on SW where the receiver might additionally oscillate if the whip antenna was not fully extended.

Not being one to give up I determined it was time to take the back off again to see if anything could be done about the strident reproduction. I removed one screw beside the volume control and two in the battery holder ridge to release the plastic 'chassis' from the radio's front casing. It then became possible to click the USB+phone socket insert away from the front case molding, and lift that end of the chassis by about 2.5cm (1"). Then I see the loudspeaker, and 'Oh' what a tiny magnet, how shallow it is, and with a plastic cone as well!

Being 16 ohm made me think of inserting a choke in series with the loudspeaker voice coil, plus a capacitor connected directly across it in order to empirically implement a high cut filter. This worked, and sounded most acceptable with values of 1mH (Toko 8RB) and a sub-miniature 4.7uF electrolytic capacitor, but it made the digital noise worse on weak signal reception. I imagined the possibility of field coupling between the tiny choke and the ferrite antenna on MW, yet the SW oscillation was worse too'?

Treble Cut

Checking on the Internet I read that the CD1622CB audio IC has input pins of 1 and 9, these being positioned towards the center of the radio. So it was 'out' with the L+C and 'in' with one 0.01μ F (10nF) miniature capacitor between each input pin and the central common ground track.

This simple mod immediately made the PL-380 most acceptable to listen to. The previously raised hiss/noise levels during AM fades were no longer so objectionable, and !'YeeHa'! the SW oscillation was completely cured. Clearly there had been an original problem due to inadequate si7434 'line out' filtering



between the on-board DACs and the separate audio IC, as if transient potentials superimposed on AF around the audio IC were coupling directly with the thin antenna wire running across the cabinet back to the telescopic antenna. I had already tried positioning this wire to the very top of the cabinet back prior to fitting capacitors to the PCB, but this had not cured the SW oscillation either – it took the capacitors to do that.

It is possible that younger ears than mine might not like the same degree of treble cut I prefer, thus fitting 0.0047uF (4.7nF) capacitors might be more appropriate, and ordering two of each value at outset might be worthwhile.



So now, with a new ferrite antenna fitted to the Tecsun PL-380 pocket portable, it can hold its own against other radios, and I can enjoy its useful MW performance. It also has reasonable SW plus FM sensitivities for such a short telescopic whip, whilst those two easily added capacitors have made FM so much more acceptable to listen to, it being better still if placed standing with its left side end on to a book, frame or wall. Average modified Tecsun PL-380 reception is equivalent to being about one 'S' point below that on my Sangean ATS-803A, and whilst its DSP works very well, it is still not as good as synchronous demodulation on my modified, but so much larger, Sangean.

Conclusion

Mission accomplished! Tecsun, if you are reading this, do please check out the AM antenna specifications for this pocket radio, also its LW track tuning components, because something is very wrong here. The simple modifications described here so much improve this little receiver that you might have an even more popular product – if – it could come straight off your production line with them installed. A Mk2 version with slower AGC

recovery would be worth paying more for.

Personally I would prefer ergonomic Up-Down tuning buttons to reduce the need for knob spinning after selecting a SW band (yes, I do realize spot memory frequencies could be stored). Also separate Memory Store and Recall buttons are easier instead of needing to knob spin through all the 'EasyTune' memories via the tuning knob carousel in a manner which then denies subsequent fine tuning without first needing to press yet another button.

Nor have I managed to figure out why my radio keeps flipping into channel change mode whilst I am already fine tuning to search for DX between channels.

The antenna and capacitor modifications described here make the Tecsun PL-380 into a most satisfactory and thus daily used MW, SW and FM band pocket portable. Just a little additional effort has turned this little radio into a bargain buy, and I have become very pleased to own it.

Seefontein 8 DXpedition March 29th to April 1st 2010 by John Plimmer

Vince Stevens and John and Dawn Plimmer attended. Vince arrived first at 11.00 am – we came later at 1.00 pm and found Vince busy in the bush erecting his beverages. Our hostess proudly told us she had upgraded the awful gas heater hot water system to a solar system. It was much better than the old gas system, but did not heat up until midday, so I could not bath after the session, but had to wait until lunchtime. Vince kindly helped us unload and brought in the heavy stuff like the 25 kg tractor battery.

We had lunch and then a nap and only got started on setup later in the afternoon. Weather was ideal, warm and sunny with a light wind. The weather remained good for our entire stay. On reeling out my 350m/1150 ft beverage I noticed that the owners' herd of cattle had grown from three to many more. Previously they had kept their distance away from us, so I hoped they would stay away now as well. 5.30 pm we were all set up and tested; Vince and his Drake R8A and my Icom IC-7600 and Perseus, waiting for the early signals from the Far East. Then horrors, I noticed that the cattle had followed us to the seaside cottage and were now trampling though the beverages and their terminations. We tried desperately to chase them back down the road, but not being herders the cattle were not particularly attentive to us.

Anyway eventually they left and we were able to assess the damage. My wires were okay, just stretched a bit here and there. Vince's main beverage to Aussie was okay, but a wire he had set up Southward to catch Falklands IsI had been stretched and broken. He was soon able to repair it and we were all ready for sunset at 6.46 pm local time. First arrival was ABC Perth on 720, followed by the Taiwan gospel stations and RFO Mayotte. The Australians continued to come in well during the evening and a new one for me was 981 Kalgoolie. Signals faded later, so we retired to our beds at 9.00 pm local time.

Perseus was powered by a 12V to 5V little power board.

Wednesday evening more Australians come in with the highlights being Broome and Adelaide. I also have some success on the HF aero bands and get the Honolulu WX.

Thursday morning, our last session, my reception goes weak at 5.00 am local time. I go and have a chat to Vince and he is going like a Boeing, so I guess my wire has been cut. This turns out to be correct as when Dawn and I reel it in later, it has been neatly cut without disturbing it, perhaps by a rodent and not the cattle I had expected.

So that's the end of the DXpedition and we all pack up and reel in our wires. Vince and I confess what a pleasure it is to come to an interference free site and DX with huge beverage antennas – both Vince and I live in RFI noisy suburbia so Seefontein is always a revelation with tons of signals never head at home coming in = lovely! Although Seefontein situated on the Atlantic West Coast should favour N. America, this time round we did not get too many U.S. stations and one Canadian, whereas we did get more Aussies than expected.

So, after the new style of DXing, many days at the home QTH are spent going over the Perseus .wav files and the Edirol .mp3 files. I must now admit to being absolutely enthralled at being able to go over the full spectrum of an active band days after the session and was quite thrilled with the great catches the .WAV files revealed. So now I am sold on Perseus like all you others who have had it for ages = way to go!

However, Perseus is not a miracle machine and of the 47 good logs I got, only 9 were from Perseus. Many of the great catches I got on the loom and Edirol .mp3 recorder were not even heard on the Perseus .wav's, leading me to the conclusion that Perseus is less sensitive than the loom by quite a long way. I also think that the recording process of the .wav's introduces more noise, rendering many of the recordings useless when compared to the loom and Edirol recordings. However, on receiving Vince's logs I was able to add another three US stations to my log from the Perseus .wav's. Vince had some good sessions and produced many enviable logs.
