F.C.C. FINES

Beacon Broadcasting, Inc. Licensee of AM Station WGRP, FM Station WEXC, and Aural Studio Transmitter Link WQGW238 Greenville, PA

In this Notice of Apparent Liability for Forfeiture we find that Beacon Broadcasting, Inc., licensee of AM station WGRP, FM station WEXC, and aural studio transmitter link WQGW238, in Greenville, Pennsylvania, apparently willfully and repeatedly violated Sections 73.3526(e)(12), 73.1745(a) and 1.903(a) of the Commission's Rules by failing to maintain radio issues/programs lists in the station's public inspection file, operating its broadcast station in a manner which complies with the terms of the station authorization and operating an STL for Station WEXC on an authorized frequency. We conclude, pursuant to Section 503(b) of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, that Beacon is apparently liable for a forfeiture in the amount of eighteen thousand dollars. On November 18, 2009 and November 19, 2009, an agent from the Enforcement Bureau's Philadelphia Office conducted an inspection at the WGRP main studio in Greenville. Pennsylvania with the station's General Manager. While at the main studio, the agent reviewed the contents of the WGRP public inspection file and found that it did not contain any radio issues/programs lists since the grant of the latest WGRP renewal application on July 28, 2006. In Exhibit 11 of its renewal application. Beacon acknowledged that the public inspection file did not contain the radio issues/programs lists prior to September 14, 2005 because the former station principals had not prepared them. Beacon also stated that "the public inspection file is complete and timely for all periods after the consummation date of the transfer of control." In addition, on November 18, 2009 at 10:13 p.m. and again on November 19, 2009 at 2:28 p.m., the agent conducted field strength measurements of the WGRP signal on the frequency 940 kHz. The agent found that the field strength of the station during the nighttime was 5.2 mV/m and the field strength of the station during the daytime was 31.0 mV/m. During the inspection on November 19, 2009, the agent observed that WGRP was operating with an antenna input power of 957 Watts during the daytime. Based on both the field strength measurements and the observed daytime antenna input power, the agent calculated that WGRP was operating with 26.9 Watts on November 18, 2009 at 10:13 p.m. The license for WGRP, by contrast, requires operation with an antenna input power of 2.2 Watts at nighttime. Further, during the inspection on November 19, 2009, the agent found that Beacon was operating a Nautel AM Transmitter (Model J1000) and that Beacon had programmed the transmitter to automatically reduce power to 28 Watts at nighttime. The FCC agent contacted a representative from Nautel through the Technical Support Line on that date to determine if the Nautel J1000 AM Transmitter is capable of operating at WGRP's authorized nighttime power of 2.2 Watts. The Nautel representative informed the FCC agent that the Nautel J1000 AM Transmitter is only FCC certified to operate at power levels between 10 Watts and 1100 Watts. The representative also said that the Nautel J1000 AM Transmitter is not capable of operating at 2 Watts without experiencing audio distortion. The agent found that the minimum operating power for the WGRP transmitter is also specified as 10 Watts on the Technical Summary Page from the Nautel J1000 manual. Beacon shares the WGRP main studio with co-owned FM broadcast station WEXC. On November 19, 2009, the agent also inspected the STL for station WEXC. The agent observed that Beacon was operating a Mosely Associates STL (Model PCL505) on the frequency 951.500 MHz. The service label on the rear of the STL specified that J Squared Technical Service of Grants Pass, Oregon programmed the transmitter with the frequency 951.500 MHz on February 22, 2001. Beacon's General Manager showed the agent a copy of the license for station WPYK361, which authorized operation of an STL on the frequency 951.500 MHz at the WEXC main studio location. Commission records show, however, that the license WPYK361 was cancelled on March 20, 2007 pursuant to a request that Beacon filed on that same day. At the time of the inspection, Beacon was only authorized to operate an STL for WEXC on the frequency 948.000 MHz, under the license for station WQGW238. Accordingly, IT IS ORDERED that, pursuant to Section 503(b) of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, and Sections 0.111, 0.311, 0.314 and 1.80 of the Commission's Rules, Beacon Broadcasting, Inc. is hereby NOTIFIED of this APPARENT LIABILITY FOR A FORFEITURE in the amount of eighteen thousand dollars for violations of Sections 73.3526(e)(12), 73.1745(a) and 1.903(a) of the Rules.

Rama Communications, Inc. Licensee of Station WRHB Leesburg, FL 34748

In this Notice of Apparent Liability for Forfeiture we find that Rama Communications, Inc., licensee of AM station WRHB, in Leesburg, Florida, apparently willfully and repeatedly violated Sections 3.1125(a) and 73.3526 of the Commission's Rules by failing to maintain full-time managerial and staff personnel at its main studio and failing to maintain and make available a complete public inspection file. We conclude that Rama is apparently liable for a forfeiture in the amount of twenty-five thousand dollars. On September 3, 2009, in response to a complaint, agents from the Enforcement Bureau's Tampa Office conducted an inspection during normal business hours of AM Station WRHB's main studio and transmitter location in Leesburg, Florida. During the inspection, agents from the Tampa Office questioned all of the individuals present at the main studio, and each stated that they were employed by Heartbeat Radio. No managerial or staff personnel employed by Rama were present at the main studio or at the transmitter site. Heartbeat Radio provides programming for Station WRHB pursuant to a time brokerage agreement with Rama. During the inspection, the agents also requested to inspect the station's public inspection file. The staff employed by Heartbeat Radio was unable to produce a complete public inspection file for the station. The public inspection file that

was produced did not contain, among other things, any issues/ programs lists after June 12, 2007, or a copy of the time brokerage agreement. While agents were at the station, Rama faxed to the main studio a current copy of its time brokerage agreement with Heartbeat Radio. On October 8, 2009, during normal business hours, agents from the Tampa Office revisited Station WRHB's main studio in Leesburg, Florida and found two individuals present at the main studio. The owner of Heartbeat Radio stated over the telephone that one of the two individuals present at the main studio was employed by Rama and had begun working at the station less than two weeks prior. The two people present were unaware of any other Rama employees working at the main studio prior to the recent addition of this Rama employee. The Rama employee confirmed that she started less than two weeks ago, was unfamiliar with the management and operation of the station, and did not appear to have any managerial authority over the station, full-time managerial personnel at Station WRHB's main studio from September 3, 2009 until October 8, 2009, and failing to maintain full-time staff personnel at the main studio from September 3, 2009 until September 23, 2009.

Accordingly, IT IS ORDERED that, pursuant to section 503(b) of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, and sections 0.111, 0.311, 0.314 and 1.80 of the Commission's Rules, Rama Communications, Inc. is hereby NOTIFIED of this APPARENT LIABILITY FOR A FORFEITURE in the amount of twenty-five thousand dollars for violations of sections 73.1125(a) and 73.3526 of the Rules.

FROM: MIAMI HERALD DOT COM Miami Heat changes flagship stations. As expected, the Heat announced Saturday morning that it is changing radio flagship stations from WINZ-940 to 790 The Ticket, beginning with Saturday's game against New Jersey. Last month, the Heat filed a lawsuit against WINZ's parent company, Clear Channel Communications, claiming Clear Channel gave a better contract to the Dolphins than it did to the Heat, whose contract stipulated that it would be extended the opportunity to receive anything given to another team by WINZ. The Dolphins, for example, were given a two-hour weekday talk show on WINZ; the Heat was not. Besides filing the lawsuit, the Heat exercised a 30-day termination clause in its WINZ contract. Those 30 days ended Friday night, allowing the Heat to change stations this weekend. Mike Inglis and John Crotty will remain the Heat's radio announcers. The shifting of the Heat leaves 790 with the Heat and Marlins (plus FIU football, whose game will move Saturday to 1080-AM, according to 790); WINZ with the Dolphins; and WQAM with University of Miami sports and the Florida Panthers. WINZ management said Friday that it wanted to keep the Heat games. But after filing the lawsuit, the Heat had no interest in a reconciliation.

FROM: OC REGISTER DOT COM - KSPA 1510 will abandon Talk Radio for Standards Broadcasting executive Art Astor, who is as well known for his one-time large collection of classic cars as well as owning several radio stations, says he has had enough of talk radio and will flip his local KSPA/1510 AM back to contemporary standards right after Christmas. KSPA, which can be heard in Orange County and is streamed at www.am1510kspa.com, introduced talk last March with a lot of promise it would bring in advertising dollars. He also had the programming support from Cable Radio Network (CRN). "The billings were not better than before," Astor said in an interview. "Then I lost Glenn Beck to KRLA and now Dr. Laura is leaving at the end of the year. And my observation was the topics were in one direction, mostly conservative talk people, and I thought they would be a little more diverse. "I cannot compete with big talk stations. Michael Savage is controversial and we lost some advertisers. It is piecemeal. At the same time, we were hearing listeners and advertisers wanted the music back, so we will go to Christmas music on Thanksgiving and return to contemporary standards after Christmas," he said. Plans call for KSPA to go to 50,000 watts in 2011, he said, and he plans to add more Orange County traffic reports with the format change. Astor made news in 2008 when he auctioned his Orange County collection of more than 300 vintage cars and other memorabilia for \$15.4 million. Since then, he has reduced his remaining collection from 75 to 40 cars and moved into a smaller location a short distance away from his original studio and event center in Anaheim. "Wherever I would go, I would hear people say they want the music back. We play the standards as performed by not only the original artists, but the newer performers like Diana Krall, Michael Bublé, and others. As soon as we started talking about this, advertisers called to express interest," he said.

FROM ADN DOT COM - KNOM radio pioneer Busch dies at 63 NOME -- KNOM broadcasting pioneer Tom Busch has died. Busch died unexpectedly Monday morning in his sleep. He was 63. Busch was born in Philadelphia and graduated from Boston College. He moved to Nome in 1970 to design and build the radio station. Busch served as KNOM's general manager from 1975 to 2005 and then served as the station's fundraiser. KNOM is a public service radio station in Nome that is owned by the Catholic Bishop of Northern Alaska, and serves Eskimo and Indian villages in western Alaska. Busch was a member of the Alaska Broadcasters Association Hall of Fame.

FROM: ACCESS ATLANTA 640/WGST-AM, which has been going all syndicated talk on weekdays the past 15 months, is bringing back local talk radio to both mornings and late afternoons Monday through Friday. Rob Johnson , a talk show host from Modesto, has arrived in Atlanta and is scheduled to start his live, local show in the mornings. He was last on KMPH-AM/840 in Modesto. Based on Arbitron measurements, Modesto is the 113th largest market in the United States with 426,000 people ages 12 and up in the area. Rusty Humphries, a producer for Steve & Vikki on Star 94 back in the 1990s, became a popular syndicated talk show host with nearly 300 affiliates. He will be coming to Atlanta from Oregon to do his show from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m..

UAE. Al Dhabiya, Radio Farda, ME style singing poor to fair at 0120 Nov 8, similar to webstream. First sign of them for me this season. Later on audio traces on 1269, 1422 (not at the same time. I've had them parallel in the past) 855 w/murky talk and a bit of a hum. 963 and 675 also, 999 w/woman in Slavic inflected language at 0345, (NHP-BC)

PAN AMERICAN DX ROUNDUP

- MEXICO, Los Mochis, Sin. XEHS. 11/06 0200 UTC Mexican mx, followed by woman's voice with "La Nortenita" and "Sinaloa" Moderate QRM and interference from second Unid SS language station. (GS-CA) (Likely your second Unid was XEWA - PM)
- MEXICO, Cd. Obregon, Son. XEHO. 11/06 0323, SS music followed by man's voice and clear "Radio Centro" and a full minute with same man talking by more music. (GS-CA)
- MEXICO. Cd. Obregon, Son. XEEB, 11/06 0443 UTC, Clear ID in SS of "equis e, e bey (XEEB) followed by what may have been their address. Signal was good at times with moderate interference from second unid SS language station and KFMB San Diego nulled.

- 1130 MEXICO, Los Mochis, Sin. XEMOS. 11/14 0730 Mexican music ended then a man's voice with "equis ehe eme oh ess" "La Nortenia" and "Sinaloa" Moderate QRM and interference from second Unid SS station. (GS-CA)
- CUBA, Radio Rebelde. 11/13 0535 UTC SS Music then a man speaking in SS followed by pips. Interference from KSMH as well as WDHP. This seems to be the logical choice. I have a friend who speaks SS that is going to listen to it for me to get a positive ID. (GS-CA)
- US VIRGIN ISLANDS, Frederiksted, WDHP on 11/13 at 0525 UTC In male British accent "BBC... Show" Followed by an update on the Davis Cup finals. A SS language station over rode him and about 4 minutes later I heard the same British accent voice going into international news mentioning the Dominican Republic, Haiti, Indonesia, and Thailand. WDHP is the only station that makes sense. Some interference from nulled KSMH as well as a SS lang. station assumed to be Radio Rebelde-Cuba. (GS-CA) (An excellent catch! This sounds similar of what I heard back several years ago before the X Band filled up.)

- N KOREA, Chongjin, Pyongyang Bangsong. Mx seemed //2850 at 1436 Nov 10 along with big hum, likely this one. (NHP-BC)
- N KOREA, Pyongyang, KCBS. 1454 Nov 7, fair w/choral mx //2850. (NHP-BC)
- N KOREA, Sinuiju, KCBS. Fair strength fighting w/JOGB, //2850 at 1429 Nov 10 w/singing. (NHP-BC)

There seem to be two stations here slightly out of sync. 3 and 1 pips offset from each other by less than a second at 1500 Nov 7; fair strength. Investigation of Haida Gwaii recordings by Gary DeBock's and Chuck Hutton's sources say this is Life Radio identifying as 104.5 FM Heilongjiang. (NHP-BC)
- 1503 **JAPAN**, Akita, JOUK. Man talking //594 at 1511 Nov 7. (NHP-BC)
- 1584 **JAPAN**, NHK1 synchros. Actually fair for a moment w/taik //594 at 1511 Nov 9; very nice surprise. (NHP-BC)
- 1593 CHİNA, Changzhou, CNR1. Seemed like CC talk by man just before 1500 Nov 4 and sure enough CC pips on the hour. Poor strength at best. (NHP-BC)

DXpedition to Grayland

Guy Atkins

My recent two-night DXpedition to the Grayland Beach State Park had an unusual "first" for me, after 20 years of DXing at Grayland: an earthquake! This small 4.2 magnitude trembler happened 9 miles below Mossy Rock, WA, and was definitely *heard* by me, if not felt. It struck at 7:51 a.m. on the 16th and sounded like a loud, large semi truck was rumbling by, right next to the yurt. In fact, I got up and looked out the door of the yurt (cabin) to see what was going on. That's when I realized it wasn't a truck or noisy RV!

While at the coast I tried a new antenna design – a dual pennant phased array on behalf of Andy Ikin of Wellbrook and two other designers – Neil Kazaross and Mark Connelly. Andy simplified Neil & Mark's dual pennant loop by placing the feed point and termination (1400 ohms) in the bottom corners. He also indicated I could use Wellbrook FLG100 matcher/amplifiers I already had on hand. Two of these 20 ft. high X 72 ft. long loops (each loop looks like a big "bow tie") were spaced about 150-160 feet apart and phased through a Wellbrook phaser. Each loop contains 200 feet of wire but due to the bowtie shape they only take up 72 feet (each) on the ground. The bottom points of the "bowtie" shaped loops were 2 feet off the ground (I used 22 ft. tall masts). The array worked well to reduce stateside station QRM while being sensitive to Asian MW DX. However, I had a heck of a time getting the loops aligned (on-axis) because a stand of trees obscured my view from one loop to the other.

The loops worked well on all of shortwave too, but with reduced directionality above a few Megahertz. On medium wave I found rearward nulls on the order of 25-35+ dB for stations in the San Francisco area. Stations on other bearings toward the rear of the antenna were reduced, but not as much. It seemed like the "null aperture" to the rear was not that wide compared to the best array I've experienced--the 4-loop QDFA. It also seemed narrower than even two phased delta loops or "KAZ" antennas.

The array was oriented at 270 degrees due west, so the best nulls off the back side should have been Richland/Pasco, Centralia, and Pendleton stations. As I mentioned though, the best nulls by far were the San Francisco bay area stations...so some skewing of the pattern was happening. Also, the phaser's balance control needed to be fully counter-clockwise for the best nulls. Andy says this indicates an imbalance situation. Ideally both phase and balance controls would be at the midpoint of their adjustment.

Bill Whitacre of Alexandria, VA hopes to replicate the phased dual pennant array this coming weekend, so it will be interesting to learn if his nulling results are better than mine.

MW DX the first night on the 15th (UTC) was strongly Asian/TP as expected this time of year. Reception was good but not outstanding. For instance, Tier 1 and tier 2 Japanese stations were easily heard, but frequencies with low power synchros were just a jumble of weak audio. The lone DU signal I heard was 2BL 702 in Sydney.

Below are MW loggings from just the first night of DXing on November 15th (UTC), mostly from listening across the top of each hour. I have yet to go through the Perseus WAV files from the 16th. Background noise levels on this early winter DXpedition were very low. At the edge of the band and on long wave, the noise level was a steady -110 dB (Perseus 2,000 kS/s setting). I can only dream of such low noise levels at home!

- NORTH KOREA Pyongyang Pangsong, Nov 15 1600 A strong signal with strident talk by male announcer in Korean, and uninspiring orchestral music. Actual frequency as shown on Perseus zoom tool was on the low side at 656.96, typical for Pyongyang on this frequency. (Atkins-WA)
- JAPAN JOBK Osaka, Nov 15 1100 3+1 time pips at top of the hour; female announcer in Japanese. Fair signal at best. (Atkins-WA)
- 675 **VIÈTNAM** V of Vietnam, Nov 15 1600 Poor signal of Vietnamese talk by man and woman. Back down in the noise shortly after 1600. (Atkins-WA)
- 193 JAPAN JOAB Tokyo, Nov 15 0800 Good signal of Japanese talk, and mentions of Tokyo at 0800. (Atkins-WA)
- 702 **AUSTRÀLIA** 2BL Sydney, Nov 15 1200 ABC trumpet fanfare, and into news in English, read by a female announcer. Poor to fair level. (Atkins-WA)

- 756 JAPAN JOGK Kumamoto, Nov 15 1600 Time pips (ping-ponging with another background station on frequency) and 'NHK' network ID heard at the top of the hour, followed by announcements by woman in Japanese. Weak but fairly clear signal. (Atkins-WA)
- 774 JAPAN JOUB Akita, Nov 15 0800 News items in Japanese at the top of the hour. Good level. (Atkins-WA)
- 792 **SOUTH KOREA** HLSQ Love FM, Nov 159 1600 Romantic music before and after 1600, at a good signal level. Talk in Korean by male and female announcers, with a clear mention of 'FM' but I couldn't pick out any other words. Single time pip at 1600. (Atkins-WA)
