FROM: RADIO INFO DOT COM WVOL BERRY HILL, TN 1470 A radio station not immune to its hosts receiving death threats for their positions was taken off the air after vandals cut the transmission lines to all six of their towers, causing an estimated \$1 million in damage. Nashville's WVOL-AM (1470) is back on, but only one of the six towers has been repaired. WVOL GM John Heidelberg tells WSMV-TV. "I think this kind of dialogue is needed in this community. You can't let this kind of thing distract you, because if people can intimidate you with fear and those kind of tactics, it'll only get worse." Both the local police and the FBI were contacted to investigate. There was concern that the vandalism may be tied into discussions about President Obama, health care and religion, regular topics on some shows. You can view the WSMV-TV report here. WVOL was where a young teenager named Oprah Winfrey got her first job in broadcasting. One poster on the Nashville Board of Radio-Info.com hears that the vandal "took all the coils and busted all the capacitors at all six towers. (I would really have to guestion the one million dollar figure...- ed)

FROM : MY DESERT DOT COM KPSI PALM SPRINGS, CA For Stan Layne, 1970 was the year he flipped his first vinyl at KPSI (now 920 AM): The Who recorded "Live at Leeds." Simon and Garfunkel released their last album together, "Bridge Over Troubled Water." Layne, 59, rolled out easy listening tunes: "Moon River" by Henry Mancini. A range of hits by Jack Jones and Frank Sinatra. Working first as the nighttime DJ, "Shoeless Stan Layne" moved to the morning slot in 1971 to give valley residents their wake-up call. "I was 19 — a kid," he said of his start on KPSI. Forty years later, Layne is retiring. "It's been great," he said of his time putting his "progressive" spin on national news and issues at "Newstalk 920" KPSI. "But, it's time to retire." Lavne, 59, will log his last KPSI show on Friday. Known for his quiet humor, Layne described himself as the "token liberal" who has taken his lumps from Rush Limbaugh fans and feels good about striking a balance. Now, he wants to strike a balance with his personal life. He wants to sleep in - have coffee in the morning with his wife. "Getting up at 4:20 a.m. to be at the studio — well, it's worn me out," Layne said. "I need the weekends to replenish my batteries." Layne's not shucking it all: He's still got a busy, private practice to maintain as a family therapist in Palm Springs and a teaching post to juggle as an adjunct psychology professor at College of the Desert in Palm Desert. His morning gab sessions with a loyal following will be replaced with quiet time to grade papers and plan lectures. "Stan's been great," said Mike Keane, the station's general manager. "But we respect his decision to slow down a bit to enjoy life, his practice and his teaching." R&R Broadcasting station owners Ric and Rozene Supple plan to host a 9 a.m.

coffee reception for Layne on Friday at Camelot Theatre, 2300 E. Baristo Road, Palm Springs. "Come on over to say hi and goodbye," Layne said. KPSI's Steve Kelly will expand his one-hour "Coachella Valley Report" to a three-hour show beginning at 6 a.m. Monday. KPSI news director Gene Nichols will join him. Kelly called Layne a great guy, and said, "He will be missed." "Stan's been consistent all the way," Keane said. "Much of what he's done on the national level, and with the guests he's brought on, has been relevant to what's going on here. It was part of the Coachella Valley's morning ritual." "It's been a labor of love," Layne said.

FROM: MEMPHIS DAILY NEWS DOT COM Two years before the next national election and with fervor for conservative activism, Memphis-based MPS Broadcasting Monday announced the launch of WMPS "The Point" simulcast on 87.7 FM and 1210 AM. The Point - the first conservative talk radio show in the Memphis market - will have 15 hours of live radio each weekday in addition to a weekend lineup with live programming. The station will begin live programming Feb. 21 at 4 a.m. with a news show "First Light." "The talk listener is sophisticated and intelligent and I wanted to program great radio seven days a week," said Mark Skoda, president of MPS Broadcasting. "We're going to present content that's not just what I call 'Beck-Limbaugh-Hannity,' but people will actually be able to call and talk to the hosts and get their viewpoints heard, and at the same time, really bring some very thoughtful talk to Memphis." Skoda grew up in Cleveland, spent 11 years overseas and has lived in Memphis for about 12 years. Skoda became interested in radio in the beginning of the tea party movement and decided to launch his first talk show locally. "By bringing and leveraging my technology skills, my international - I speak German, I speak Japanese understanding those markets in a different way, recognizing the need to promote the international view of American exceptionalism, which sometimes is not done in this government today, I think it's a lot of fun and to do it here in Memphis is pretty cool," he said. Skoda teamed with George Flinn, president of Flinn Broadcasting, which offered Skoda the opportunity to expand his own program while also creating a unique conservative talk radio station. "Mark's passion and commitment inspired me to work with him to provide the platform for his vision," Flinn said in a statement. "I believe he has created a unique offering of content while also expanding his own on-air commentary." Nationally syndicated hosts like Dennis Miller and Doug Urbanski are scheduled to air throughout the week. In addition, WMPS will offer regional platforms for activists like Rusty Humphreys from Atlanta, Matthew Hill of Chattanooga and Steve Gill of Nashville, who was in the White House for the George H.W. Bush and Bill Clinton administrations and has overseen assignments in Iraq and Afghanistan. "Steve Gill is an activist in the patriot movement, particularly in the tea party in Nashville, has good insights and instincts about grassroots movements," Skoda said. Skoda said that his hope is that WMPS will bring a broader listening audience to politics by appealing to a younger demographic. "The reach of the combined FM and AM stations will be unprecedented and we look forward to collaborating with MPS Broadcasting to provide compelling radio for listeners in the tri-state area," Gill said. "And of course we look forward to broadcasting on location here in Memphis from time to time and to meet those listeners." Skoda said he intentionally chose to announce the launch on Valentine's Day because he is, "falling in love with talk radio all over again. In addition, he talked about the two years unitl the presidential election to get his message across before heading into the next cycle. MPS Broadcasting will also program content for local television channel 6, which is broadcast via analog signal. It is expected as content is developed, the station will be moved to local cable for a broader viewing audience. Skoda also announced that the "Mark Skoda Show" will be simulcast on WMPS TV 6 where he has also launched "Fire From The Heartland with Mark Skoda." WLXN-AM (1440), which broadcasts in the Greensboro/Winston-Salem market, officially dropped conservative talk for oldies music Monday morning. In addition, Davidson County Broadcasting will also have its new "Kool" on the FM dial, using translator W260BG at 99.9 FM. The website is still in the process of changing over to oldies

FROM: RADIO INFO DOT COM Spanish tropical KGLA, Gretna, LA (1540) admits that it had been remaining on at reduced power at night for several years. Its fine is only \$4,000, but the Commission takes the unusual step of requiring "a sworn statement certifying that it is currently in compliance" with its license. KGLA gets a second, much bigger, fine of \$10,000 for public file problems. A November 2 visit by agents from the New Orleans office discovered that the last two years worth of quarterly issues/programs lists were missing from the public file. Also, there was no copy of the station's authorization, which would have reminded the operator that KGLA is a 1,000 watt daytime-only station. The same licensee also owns Telemundo affiliate KGLA-DT, "T42."

Eric Bueneman (NØUIH), 631 Coachway Lane, Hazelwood, Missouri 63042-1347 At 0158 ELT on February 17, I hit another milestone when I logged KYSM 1230 Mankato, MN with local ads and legal ID at 0200. KYSM is the 1.200th AM radio station logged at this location since I started my current log on July 4, 1992. While all the other milestones (#100, 200, 300, etc.) have taken place on the Class A/B or Class C frequencies, this milestone took place on a graveyard frequency. It is also my third GY from Minnesota, after KROC 1340 and WJON 1240. To add to my last Forum, I would strongly disagree that the computer has improved radio programming...it's made matters worse. Radio has not improved with the computer. Most of the broadcasters who have gone completely to computer automation are not being professionally run. This is especially true on AM. with computers failing to turn daytime-only stations off, as was the case several times with WLRB 1510, or switching from day to night power and/or pattern. Computer failures also occurred in the St. Louis area; last winter, I twice caught KSLG 1380 illegally simulcasting KTXR 101.3 Springfield, MO (both are separately owned) after failing to switch over to Fox Sports Radio following a Missouri State basketball game. Another result of deregulation is that convicted felons are now allowed to own radio stations and work in broadcasting. The most notable convicted felon who had a syndicated talk show is Watergate co-conspirator G. Gordon Liddy. The owner of Insane Broadcasting Company, licensee of KQQZ 1190 De Soto, MO, KZQZ 1430 St. Louis, WQQX 1490 East St. Louis, IL and WQQW 1510 Highland, IL (presently on an irregular schedule) is Bob Romanik, a former Chief of Police in Washington Park, IL. He is a convicted felon; as far as I know, Mr. Romanik was convicted of verbally threatening another public official while running the Washington Park Police. He also hired a disc jockey for a Saturday afternoon Jazz show on KZQZ that was under suspicion of taking payola when he was working with me at WSIE; he has pending litigation against Southern Illinois University Edwardsville. And all these stations include "Hot Talk" in their slogan, even though the two most powerful stations in this group, KQQZ 1190 and KZQZ 1430, don't air one single hour of talk programming! WQQX airs a talk show with controversial talk show host "Onion" Horton on occasion. Some radio stations even go as far as to hire registered sex offenders; that is not the kind of radio industry that embraces the values of hard work, honesty, fair play, adherence to civil law, and devotion to their communities and families. The lack of a listenable format on AM and FM has forced me, and some several million others, to subscribe to satellite radio. Internet radio is not portable. With the loss of many international broadcasters providing fair and balanced news and talk programming via shortwave, as well as the loss of a full-time Classical music station in St. Louis, satellite radio especially comes in handy. The closest Classical music station to me now is KXTR 1660 Kansas City. KS. Easy Listening? The closest one to me is WGCY 106.3 Gibson City, IL (near Pontiac and Bloomington/Normal). And what does "HD Radio" do? Nothing but degrade the AM signal and audio guality to worse than analog AM guality, degrade FM Stereo performance to the point where there is little or no Stereo separation versus the near-CD separation offered by analog-only FM stations (like KLJY 99.1 and WSIE 88.7), and cut down on the signal coverage of many AM and FM stations. DRM isn't any better; I've heard a demonstration of DRM, and the sound quality does not approach that of analog AM. The amount of spectrum wasted is too valuable: depending on the distance from the transmitter. "HD" takes anywhere from 30 to 100 kHz of AM spectrum, and up to 600 kHz of FM spectrum. DRM takes up 40 kHz of spectrum on shortwave. Any country who wants to scrap analog

broadcasting is living in a fantasy world. Terrestrial digital radio will never approach the high sound quality of analog AM, FM and shortwave, especially with today's DSP technology. Keeping analog broadcasting on AM, FM and shortwave is a more efficient use of spectrum than going digital. Radio would be better if all owners and employees adopted the same character requisites as those expected of licensees in the Amateur Radio service; I think that all format changes should be approved by the FCC before they are implemented. If I ran a radio station, criminal background checks on potential employees would be standard operational procedure. And even with the proposed Cumulus Media-Citadel merger, radio is only going to get worse. None of the mergers in radio over the last 15 years have led to job creation. The fewer jobs radio is willing to create, the worse the radio economy will get. 73.
