FROM: PENNLIVE DOT COM: Electrical fire knocks Carlisle-area radio station WIOO off the air Carlisle-area radio station WIOO was knocked off the air indefinitely Monday by an electrical fire that heavily damaged its studio and offices. But like the heroes of many of the country tunes it celebrates. station owners and staffers said Monday night that while they might be down, they are most definitely not out. No one was in the 180 York Road building when the blaze — believed to have started in wiring in a first-floor ceiling — broke out. There were no injuries. But fans of Patsy Cline, Johnny Cash. Loretta Lynn and a variety of other country superstars with heavy rotation in the station's "Country Gold" format will experience an aural gap on their radio dial. Temporarily, at least. Co-owner Eric Swidler said he and his father, station founder Harold Swidler, plan to get WIOO back on the air as soon as possible. "We believe we are part of the community fiber here," Eric Swidler said. "We provide entertainment, local information, community bulletins and weather to a tremendous local following, and we want to restore our operation to the way it was. "It's not going to be easy, but we're going to do our very best." Craig Senior, the station's morning disc jockey and news director, said the recovery will occur in stages. First, he said the station must find a temporary home for its studios, determine how much of the existing equipment needs to be replaced and then tie it all back in with the off-site transmitters, which were not affected by the blaze. As one example, Senior said that station personnel don't know how much of the digitized music library was destroyed, though it appears much of the station's compact disc and record library has survived. "We're trying to figure out what we need to get something up and running, and then what we need to get it right," Senior said. He said the niche station does about 60 hours per week of locally originated programming. In the short term, Senior said. WIOO might try to do limited broadcasts from its transmitter site, but that likely would not be today. The blaze was reported shortly after 1:30 p.m. Monday by passers-by, according to John Bruetsch, a spokesman for Cumberland County Emergency Management Agency. Bruetsch said firefighters arrived to find smoke and flames visible from the outside of the old farmhouse, located just east of the Carlisle Borough line in South Middleton Two. Crews had the fire under control within about 15 minutes, Bruetsch said, but not before the building's first-floor sustained heavy fire damage and the second-floor — home to the broadcast operations — took heavy heat and smoke damage. The building might be a total loss, Senior said. Bruetsch said about 60 firefighters responded, including volunteers from Carlisle's Union Fire Company, Carlisle Fire & Rescue Services, and the Citizens, Monroe Twp. and North Middleton Twp. fire companies. Owned by the Swidler family since hitting the air in 1965, WIOO-AM was historically a dawn-to-dusk station that went off the air each evening. Originally a Top 40 station, WIOO's niche more recently has been traditional country music featuring top country and western hits from the 1950s through the '90s. The station launched an FM translator broadcast in 2009, giving it a nighttime presence after the AM station leaves the air. The Swidlers said at the time they wanted to reach the wider audience that tunes in to the FM band without abandoning WIOO's established AM audience. The expansion also allowed the tiny station to broaden its offerings, including evening political talk and high school football games on Friday nights. Senior said WIOO employs, not including the owners, five full- or nearly full-time employees and several part-timers. Until today, the station's simulcast signals could be heard at 1000 AM and 97.9 FM in Carlisle and 1480 AM and 93.9 FM in the Shippensburg/Chambersburg area

FROM: WORTHINGTON DAILY GLOBE KWOA-730 drops network talk for Nostalgia Big changes are coming to the region's airwaves within the next few days. Radio Works, owned in part by Chad Cummings of Brewster and John Daniels of Sioux City, Iowa, as well as Ted Mahn of Hot Springs, Ark., and Cy Chesterman of Sioux City, will officially complete its acquisition of Three Eagles Worthington on Jan. 1. Three Eagles currently includes KWOA's AM and FM stations, as well as KITN-FM; Radio Works currently operates KUSQ-FM. "We have big plans for all four stations." Cummings said last week, "The first week of January is our target to introduce our formats on the four radio stations." KUSQ, now known as US 104, will move down the FM dial to 95.1. "KUSQ is currently a 6.000-watt station and the move to 95.1 will make it a 100.000-watt station." Daniels said. "It's a greatly increased coverage area, and greater penetration." KITN-FM. located at 93.5 on the dial, will see a rock format that varies from the current classic-rock music currently heard in Worthington, "We'll be playing new classics — from very select '70s rock to lots of '80s rock and early '90s and grunge." Cummings said. "We'll call it ROCKIT FM." "I grew up on Rolling Stones. Led Zeppelin and The Doors, but I'm at a point now where just like something a little less extreme, or even a little NPR." Daniels said. "That's what we really do with our stations — to have variety both in music and in the age groups listening to us." The current home of KUSQ, 104.3 FM, will become home to a format that, according to Cummings, has yet to exist in the Worthington region. Call letters have yet to be announced. "We're also going to offer the younger and female demographic a station that we've never had here," he said. "It will be contemporary hits radio. ... We're calling it 'The Party,' and it will be a little more aggressive with current music." KWOA-AM, located at 730, has been around since 1947, Cummings said, and has a range that can allow a listener to clearly hear the station as far as 200 miles from Worthington during daytime hours. "It's a huge pioneer station." Cummings said of KWOA-AM. "We plan to continue the core of it with local programming, local news, sports, farm and weather in the morning. Then, in the afternoons and evenings through the overnight, we'll offer a nostalgia format. It will be 'music of your life' — the music of Tony Bennett, Frank Sinatra, Perry Como, Andy Williams... It's for a generation that has not been served by any station here." The KWOA-FM call letters will be dropped, Cummings said. He also said all operations for Radio Works will begin a transition from the current downtown Worthington location to the Three Eagles location on Nobles County 35. Besides offering a variety of listening options, the four Radio Works stations will become entrenched in the communities they serve, Daniels said. "Since we've been here with US104, we've made it a point to be involved with what our community does, and tell everyone what's going on in the community," Daniels said. "With this expansion, it gives an opportunity for further involvement — and it's more than Worthington." "We have employees who live in Rock Rapids, Iowa, Rushmore, Brewster, Heron Lake, Luverne, Adrian. ... We're going to be an active part of the whole area," Cummings added. A local-first philosophy currently drives US104, Cummings said, and that will continue with the three additional radio stations. "Instead of one outlet we'll have four, and that's exciting," Daniels said. "I've come to meet and get to know a number of local businesspeople here, and it's fun for Chad and me both to do radio like we believe radio should be done." "We're just playing radio." chimed in Cummings, smiling.

FROM: PETOSKEY NEWS DOT COM Petoskey radio station changes format Petoskey-based radio station WMBN (1340 AM) switched Monday to a new 24-hour-a-day sports format, "The Ticket." WMBN, owned by MacDonald Garber Broadcasting, previously had used an adult standards musical format for many years. Bill Michaels, corporate director of programming for MacDonald Garber, said the previous format, known as "Michigan's Beautiful North," was proving unprofitable, and the company anticipates that a sports format appealing to males ages 25-54 will have greater income potential. "We liked the station the way it was, but unfortunately in these tough economic times, we're forced to make some difficult decisions." Michaels said. Under its new format, WMBN will be an affiliate of Fox Sports, featuring such radio personalities as Dan Patrick and Jim Rome. It also will feature local content, including a daily morning show hosted by Tom Devitt. Other local contributors will include Vic McCarty, who has previously been a sportscaster for 9 & 10 News and TV 7 & 4, former Michigan Wolverine and Detroit Lion Jon Jansen, former Petoskey High School and Kent State basketball standout Trevor Huffman and two-time Michigan amateur golf champion Joey Garber.

FROM: WAFB DOT COM BATON ROUGE, LA (WAFB) - Sports radio personalities lose shows Just one week before LSU tries for the National Championship, many of Baton Rouge's most recognized sports radio personalities have lost their voices. Radio station 1210 AM "The Score" switched formats Sunday from Sports to Gospel. The station is owned by Clear Channel Communications. Former show host Buddy Songy told 9News he got a call around 10:30 Sunday morning notifying him of the switch. He said rumors of a change had been swirling in recent weeks, but the timing of the change caught everyone off guard. Jordy Hultberg, Jimmy Ott, Tommy Krysan and Richard Condin also had popular shows on The Score. Long-time radio personalities Clarence Buggs and Scott Innes lost their Clear Channel positions last October.

The Backpack Ferrite Sleeve Loop (FSL) Antenna

This is a design for a 12" diameter backpack version of the FSL with a "contra" wound coil that allows coverage between 150 and 1700 kHz in two overlapping bands. The actual coil of the antenna is approximately 11 inches in diameter, and it is housed in a plastic "pie carrier" which provides structural support and protection from the elements.

My goal was to build an FSL that I could take with me to work, stopping off at the local park to DX and then continuing on. I therefore needed a much slimmer FSL than a design using 6" or 8" long ferrites, plus some sort of stand to get the

antenna off the ground. My hope was that it would be nearly as effective as my larger FSL.



The main elements of the design include:

- A 12" diameter pie/food carrier, available at Bed-Bath-and-Beyond (#14383824), Walmart and likely elsewhere, for under \$10
- 92 ferrite rods, each 65 mm long and 8 mm in diameter (\$75 shipped for 100 rods on eBay) <u>OR</u> about 70 ferrite bars 62x12x4 mm (120 are currently \$43 shipped).
- 100 feet of 330/44 Litz wire, available from eBay seller zlowe7 (\$65).
- Two 2x342 pf variable capacitors, with shafts and knobs, available from eBay seller zlowe7
- A 6-inch PVC coupler, and 3/4"PVC pipe and fittings for the stand
- Foam wrap, preferably 1/2" thick, although 1/4" will do with two layers
- One DPDT switch, tape, wire, solder etc.

A few design notes:

- The "contra" method of winding the coils allows for dual-band operation with the flip of a switch. A
 good discussion of this winding method is presented by Dave Schmarder at
 http://makearadio.com/coils/contracoils.php. I ended up with two 17
 - turn coils. In series, they have about 780 uH of inductance, and in parallel 195 uH.
- A schematic of the circuit is in Figure 17. Using a DPDT, in one position
 the coils are in parallel for MW, and it tunes 440 to >1700 kHz if both
 sections of variable capacitor 'A' are tied to Point 'D' on the schematic
 (rather than one section to Point 'E'), and down to about 610 kHz if
 wired as shown.
- In the other switch position, the coils are in series, and all four variable capacitor sections are engaged. This tunes from 153 to 850 kHz, covering the entire LW broadcast band, the NDB band and a good

- chunk of the MW band.
- A consideration in using shorter ferrites is that there is less room to wind the main coil. There should probably be at least 10-12 mm (up to a half inch) or so of ferrite on either side of the coil. With the 65 mm rods or 62 mm bars, a MW coil of say 15-20 turns fits easily, but a LW coil gets cramped, and may not fit on a smaller-diameter FSL. For example, with the Backpack FSL, the required turns for a LW coil just barely fit, using 330/44 Litz wire.

Here's how I made the Backpack FSL:

The inside of the pie carrier is about three inches deep, and the ferrites are about 2.5" long. The 6" PVC coupler was cut in half on a table saw to make a 3"-high form. I then put two layers of 1/2" foam wrap around the PVC coupler (see Figure 1), making a final diameter of approximately 8.5" on which to put the ferrite sleeve, which will eventually just fit the ferrites and the pie carrier.

Each layer of foam wrap was held in place with heavy duty double-stick carpet tape, Ace Hardware #54308. The outside of the foam wrap was wrapped with 2-inch strapping tape, resulting in a very sturdy foundation for the ferrites.

The contra-coil design has four wire leads to be connected to the switching and tuning circuitry. In order to pass the two middle leads through to the center, I drilled a 1/4" hole through the foam wrap and PVC coupler for these leads. See Figure 2 for position of the hole.

Using two thin strips of the double-sided carpet tape, start putting the ferrites on, starting right next to the 1/4" hole and ending just short of the hole. With all of the ferrites on, I put another layer of strapping tape around them to firmly hold them in place as well as to provide something for the next layer of foam wrap to adhere to. Make sure you punch a hole in this and subsequent layers of foam and tape to keep the 1/4" hole open and accessible. In Figure 4, you can see the small gap I left in the ferrite sleeve at the top for the wires to pass through.

the necessary gap between the ferrites and the Litz coil. I used a 1/2" gap, which seems to be close to an optimum distance, at least for a larger FSL such as this. This was again wrapped with a layer of strapping tape (see Figure 5).

I wrapped another layer of 1/2" foam wrap around the ferrite sleeve, giving

I then wound the coils around this, first threading the ends through the 1/4" hole to leave about a 6 inch end that can connect to the switching and tuning circuitry. Note that high-count Litz wire flattens out when wrapped in a coil: I didn't realize this, and my coil was wider than I anticipated. If I re-wrap this

FSL, I will make sure to squeeze the coils together, likely raising the inductance of the coil and extending the lower tuning range.

With the coils on, I wrapped a 1/4" layer of foam around the coil, bringing it to the final diameter which fit snugly inside the pie carrier. Again, this received a final wrap of strapping tape to hold it all together. (see Figure 6). The yellow circle is masking tape that I used to keep the coil in place. You can use double-stick tape to wind the coils on, which would then make the masking tape unnecessary.

You can also see the one of the Litz wire leads travels underneath the ferrite sleeve and through a notch in the PVC coupler, and is held in place with a piece of yellow masking tape. Since the FSL will sit flush against the bottom of the pie carrier, this notch is necessary to protect the wire.

Figure 7 shows the FSL snugly installed in the pie carrier. The wire coming through the notch is seen at the

bottom of the inside of the PVC coupler, and the two center leads (via the 1/4" hole) are seen at the top. I used a couple pieces of strapping tape on the inside

of the PVC coupler to hold the FSL in place and keep it

from rotating.

Next drill three holes in the pie carrier's cover and mount the two variable capacitors and the DPDT switch.

I used double-stick foam to adhere the varicaps, but 2.5 mm screws may also be used. With these three components in place, wire up as suggested using the schematic in Figure 17. For experimental ease, I used a 4-wire spring-loaded speaker-type termination plate as a wiring

harness to provide for connecting the four FSL leads. (see

Figure 8)

Figure 9 shows what it looked like before I closed it up, with the FSL connected via the wiring harness. Eventually, I will shorten the wires up and solder everything. I laid a layer of 1/4" foam across the top of the FSL to make it fit snugly under the cover.

Figure 10 shows the front of the assembly, with the varicaps flanking the DPDT switch which is in the center. I put two small pieces of 1/2" foam under the pie carrier's handles to keep them up and away from the cover itself, providing extra protection for the knobs and switch.

(Figure 11 shows a holding stand fashioned out of commonly-available PVC pipe and fittings, while Figure 12 show the FSL sitting in the stand. With the two arms holding the FSL cut to just the right length, the antenna sits perfectly vertical.)

Longer legs can be put on the stand for outdoor or floor-standing use as seen in Figure 13. This stand is

about three feet high, and quite stable. Disassembling the taller stand yields a manageable pile of pieces, seen in Figure 15, all of which fits nicely into a standard student-size backpack (Figure 14).

Performance Comparison

To see how well the Backpack FSL performs, I compared it on LW and MW with my "reference" FSL seen in Figure 16 and described in the article A Dual-Band Ferrite Sleeve Loop (FSL) Antenna (found at http://www.angelfire.com/electronic2/index1/12-Inch-FSL-Design-Rev-A.pdf), which has a larger 12.5" coil of 660/44 Litz wire and 160 mm ferrites. I went out to a local park in order to get away from as much RF noise as possible, and selected weak daytime signals on the LW and MW bands. In summary, the shorter ferrites allows the Backpack FSL to have the same signal coursing through its Litz wire as with the reference FSL.

On MW, I simply couldn't tell any meaningful difference in performance between the two, using a Tecsun PL-380 DSP and PL-210 analog receiver. The only difference was that I generally had to hold the radio a bit closer to the Backpack FSL to get the same result, both in terms of audible results and the SNR/RSSI readout on the PL-380. A recent trip to the beach had the same results with other portable radios as well.

On LW, the need to hold the radio a bit closer was more pronounced, and it became






With a receiver that is reasonably sensitive at LW frequencies such as the Tecsun PL-210 or a "stealth" PL-380 (or a very sensitive souped-up

DeBockian Tecsun PL-380, pictured on top of the 12" FSL, below), the radio had to be closer to the Backpack FSL, but the LW beacon or broadcast station sounded essentially the same in the end. Occasionally, the larger FSL had a marginal signal-to-noise advantage: with its slightly larger capture area and higher-count Litz wire, some difference is to be expected. The radio was generally louder as well, even if the DX signal sounded the same. In my testing, though, the antennas were very close, and I didn't hear anything on the larger FSL that I didn't on the Backpack.

However, with a radio that is quite insensitive on LW, such as the stock Tecsun PL-380, the larger FSL was noticeably better on the low end of the LW band. In this case, the stock PL-380 is so stone-deaf on LW that it seems there simply wasn't enough signal coming from the Backpack FSL to get completely above the radio's noise floor. The outer case of the pie carrier meant that the radio has to be at least an inch or so from

the windings of the FSL coil, whereas for the bottom of the LW band the radio really needs to be right up against the coil. This was noticeable up to about 300-350 kHz, at which point the paltry stock internal ferrite antenna was finally sufficiently sensitive, and the two FSLs started sounding almost identical again, even with the radio an inch away from the Backpack FSL. So, provided that a portable radio with at least modest sensitivity is used, an FSL built with shorter (and cheaper) ferrites works as well as one built with longer ferrites.



MW-only Version

A simpler, less expensive version can be made for MW frequencies.

Perhaps half of the Litz wire may be used to wind a single coil of around 250-300 uH, and this may be directly attached to one or both sections of a variable capacitor. This would save approximately \$30 in Litz wire and perhaps \$10-15 in parts.
