Trivia time: How many AM calls stand for the cities of license? The most notable one in the Midwest is KCMO 710...the calls stand for its city of license, Kansas City, Missouri. The last three letters of WCIL 1020 stand for its city of license, Carbondale, Illinois. The first three letters of the city of license name are included in the calls of another 1020; WPEO in Peoria, Illinois. Even the city's initials are included in a station's call sign, such as WNYC 820 in New York City (known simply as New York). One of my locals has the city's three letter code...KSTL 690 in St. Louis. One station has the first letter of the former name of the city of license in their calls: KFMO 1240 in Park Hills, Missouri (the former city of license is Flat River, which was combined with Esther, Elvins and Rivermines to form Park Hills in 1994).

First, here's an apology from Nick: "My apologies to Keith McGinnis and Bill Nollman. I somehow managed to send the first draft of the article to Eric, rather than the more (I hope) organized and detailed version that follows." (Nick, I know Keith and Bill from WTFDA-EiC)

Some thoughts on Software for SDRs

Keith McGinnis:

I spend a lot of time with the Perseus receiver (http://microtelecom.it/perseus/) and Studio 1 (http://www.sdrapplications.it software. I've also used the SDR-Console (http://sdrnuke.wces.net/) with the Perseus, and while I find that it's a pretty good package, it's a little cumbersome to use compared to the Studio 1 and certainly compared with the native Perseus software. So, here are some basic thoughts on all three software packages.

First of all, I believe that if I hear something with the Studio I also hear it with SDR-Console and the Perseus software. That being said, I do find that hard to hear signals pop out better with the SDR Console and most certainly with Studio 1. SDR Console has many noise reduction features and there are a couple that shine compared to both other packages but the fact they can't be really combined into one NR or NB piece is a pain. Studio 1 does it and does it fairly simply (learning curve is easy even without a comprehensive manual). Here's a little deeper breakdown of how I feel about all 3 in different areas of 0-30000 kHz.

<u>LW</u>---Studio 1 is the winner by a slight margin over the SDR Console and wider margin over the native Perseus software. Adjusting the filter size is easier than all 3 (I keep mine at 4Hz for NDB's). Audio response is about the same with SDR-Console and Studio 1 but the visual display (especially the waterfall, which I use only for NDB's and MW offsets) is better on the SDR-Console.

<u>MW-</u>--Studio 1 is the clear winner here. Audio is superb and while in some instances the NR and NB sections of the SDR-Console may be better, overall Studio 1 is better. Also the Synchronous AM (SAM) function on Studio 1 is fantastic. Another nice touch on Studio 1 is the Soft AM filter...makes you think you are listening to a nice old tube radio.

 $\underline{\text{HF}}\text{---}$ All three are pretty close but once again if you are talking audio quality, then Studio 1 is the winner.

Now if you do any utility DXing and decoding, the native Perseus software is easier to use. For whatever reason, when VAC (Virtual Audio Cable) is involved it makes it a little more difficult with Studio 1. The inability to actually hear, say a Navtex signal, may not be important to some but I like it, and when I use Studio 1 with a decoding program and VAC, then I have to open a second virtual receiver with the Studio 1 software and tune it the same frequency, unless there is something in the VAC settings that will allow me to do that. I still haven't explored all of this. In fact, each time I go to decode some signals I have to find my old notes to remember how to set everything up. So for me, any decoding is easier in the native Perseus software, but that may just be due to me not figuring things out fully in Studio 1.

One other thing about the Studio 1 software to note. If you record using it, you can't (at this point in time) play it back with the native Perseus software. You can play that file back with the SDR Console (there is a little trick, but it works*). Everything recorded with the native Perseus software can be played back with both Studio 1 and SDR-Console. I haven't used the SDR-Console to record anything, so I don't know if it works on the other two. (ed. note: although Studio1 can control other USB-based SDRs, it can't always accurately play back files recorded with their native software. For example, Keith found that it could not accurately display frequencies from files recorded using RFSpace's SpectraVue, but seems to do alright with files recorded with Elad's native software (see references at the end of the column to Elad))

Finally, I'm into FM DXing big time. I've owned a few good tuners (a Bill Nollman modified Yamaha T-85, a modified Hafler 330, etc) and using the Perseus FM+ downconverter with the Studio 1 software is just fantastic. Possibly, it's better than anything else. It has RDS (like the native FM+ software does and the SDR-Console) and you can adjust the filter up to 192 kHz (hopefully wider someday), but the main feature that puts it above the rest is the SNR (Stereo Noise Reduction)...it's a killer part of the software and just cleans up an FM stereo signal so darn well. The one area that that SDR-Console may have (at this point) the others beat is in RDS, as it seems a little more sensitive and it also logs them for future review, which is good for longer recordings and for meteor scatter.

(*The trick mentioned above is fairly simple but some people might not realize it. When you go to play a recording with the SDR Console that was made with Studio 1 you will have to choose "all files" when the little drop down Windows box comes up. Then you just search for the correct file. It will play back but won't show up as option (only Perseus wav files will show up automatically) so you have to find it with the method listed above.)

Bill Nollman adds: As for audio quality, I think you will find SDR-Console and Studio1 very close. Both are better than the Perseus GUI although that often depends on your personal preference. I don't think there is anything I've ever not been able to hear with the Perseus GUI. In fact, in most cases I think Perseus has a better Noise Blanker, which I need below 300kHz. Studio1's might be better but

requires adjusting. Perseus GUI just works. I prefer the notch filters in Studio1 for TA DXing. There are four and can be set to -2, -1, +1, +2 and engaged quickly depending on the offset het. I've asked for six so that I can also preset -3,+3kHz. Hopefully that happens. I also like being able to setup Studio1 full screen on my 24" monitor. One potentially useful feature of Studio 1 is that you can create many virtual receivers within the 2MHz bandwidth of the Perseus. So if you want to watch a wide range of frequencies all at the same time you can. To switch between each simply mute the unwanted ones and unmute the one you want to listen to. Works just like individual radios.

Studio1 is actively being developed although not, it seems, as actively as SDR-Console. And the need to use a USB dongle (and the up front cost) seems to annoy most people. As Keith said to me, it's another powerful tool to have in your toolbox.

(ed note: see http://www.hamradioscience.com/studio1-sdr-software-review/ for a further take on Studio 1.)

(further from editor:) Software Defined Radio (SDR) hardware can vary quite a bit as to cost and functionality (see Jack Weber's Technical Column in 16 March 2013 DX Monitor), and now, experimenters are using SDRs that look like USB memory sticks. The Funcube Dongle (http://www.funcubedongle.com/) is probably the most accessible of these for the MW or LW enthusiast. 125 British pounds is not a bad price for something with that frequency coverage, less costly than RFSpace's SDR-IQ which has a similar 190kHz bandwidth, but it is still more costly than some others such as the NooElec RTL-SDR series (http://www.nooelec.com/store/software-defined-radio/sdr-receivers.html), which can be under \$25, but its frequency coverage starts at 25MHz, so the MW enthusiast needs a \$40 upconverter (http://www.nooelec.com/store/ham-it-up-v1-0-rf-upconverter-for-software-defined-radio.html#_UwafOlXKvcs).



Elad FDM-S1

The downside of these inexpensive units for those used to the Perseus or similar SDRs, is the 190kHz bandwidth, poorer signal handling ability and sensitivity. But a worthwhile piece of SDR hardware, at around half the price of a Perseus, has been available for awhile, also from Italy, the Elad FDM-S1. It started as a unit with 190kHz passband, but is now available with a bandwidth of up to 6144kHz, as well as its own software. In addition, the S1 can be controlled by SDR-Console and

Studio 1. It is small (~3.6"x4.3"x1.1"), powered via the USB port that also provides the communications link, so really looks like one to beat. It is reviewed at http://www.eham.net/reviews/detail/10549 and http://www.sm5bsz.com/linuxdsp/hware/elad/elad.htm tests some of its capabilities, with

http://www.sm5bsz.com/linuxdsp/hware/elad/elad.htm tests some of its capabilities, with reference to other SDRs. It is available from Elad USA (http://shop.elad-usa.com/), Woodbox Radio (www.woodboxradio.com), or Elad Europe (http://ecom.eladit.com/)

Just arriving on the market is the Elad FDM-S2, a step up in price and capability from the S1. It is referenced on the same websites that sell the S1. Simon Brown on the sdr-radio list reports: "Preliminary: FDM-S2 has a 122.88MHz sampling rate with 16bit ADC High performance analog to digital converter this means: 9kHz to 52MHz direct sampling SDR receiver; -132dBm MDS (Bandwidth 500Hz) @ 14 MHz USB Port Powered 2 antennas input: one forfor HF one for VHF (VHF input has 2 filters: one for use Broadcasting FM Band (74-108MHz), one for 136-160 MHz, and more. - possibility two independent receivers: FDM-S2 has two independent NCO (Numerical Local Oscillator) and the new FDM-SW2 software, using Multichannel Extio DII. "Another contributor to that site mentioned (in comparison with the S1): "16-bit vs 14-bit, 122.88 vs 61.44 sample rate, and 52Mhz vs 30MHz tuning capability" Definitely one to watch, especially if you have FM interests as well.
