- 580 WKTY WI, La Crosse. 5/17 1359 - Fair in null of WILL with "WKTY" heard in station ID during 10-second break on the Milwaukee Brewers Radio Network. [RD-IA1]
- 590 WJMS MI, Ironwood. 5/17 0144 - Good in KXSP null with C&W mx, ID as "Real Country", so running that network. A Google search using "Real Country 590 AM" pointed directly to this. I'm inclined to think, by the loop bearing, that it was, indeed, WJMS. [RD-IA2]
- 640 KWPN OK, Moore. 5/17 0202 - Fair in WOI null with mention of Oklahoma City Thunder BKB in local promo. UnID noted at the same time with REL program "Thru The Bible" -- most likely WCRV. [RD-IA2]
- WMFN MI, Zeeland. 5/17 1408 - Weak in tight WOI null with music in Spanish. Only Michigan station audible here in the daytime, as KCCV-760 covers WJR. [RD-IA1]
- 690 KFXN MN, Minneapolis. 5/17 0224 - Strong. Woman singing in Hmong language. [RD-IA2]
- 750 WNDZ IN, Portage. 5/13 1914 - Very good with Christian talk program by male in Spanish. 50 miles west of here, in Iowa City, 250 watt KBOE-740 comes in with a stronger daytime signal than WNDZ. Here, it's just the opposite. [RD-IA1]
- 790 WKRD KY, Louisville. 5/16 2228 - Good signal. Scoreboard show following Louisville Bats BB. [RD-IA2]
- WRMS IL, Beardstown. 5/17 1450 - Fair with recitation of rosary. "WRMS" heard in a long string ID of Covenant Network stations at 1459. Only got this by pointing the loop straight south (and 90 degrees from Chicago) to eliminate as much of WBBM's IBOC as I could. [RD-IA1]
- 810 KBHB SD, Sturgis. 5/17 0259 - Very good signal, giving WHB fits with classic C&W tunes and a "KBHB, Sturgis" ID. Has since been noted running day power all night long by many DXers in the Midwest and Pacific Northwest. [RD-IA2]
- 880 CKLQ MB, Brandon. 5/17 0231 - Fair in WCBS null with C&W music and western Manitoba weather. [RD-IA2]
- 910 WUBR LA, Baton Rouge. 6/1 fair to poor signal over KVIS. 02:55 noted with CBS Sports Radio, local spots, "WUBR Baton Rouge" legal ID at 03:00. Louisiana AM #40 from Hazelwood. [EB-MO]
- 920 WBAA IN, West Lafayette. 5/16 1447 - Fair in null of polka music (had to have been KDHL) with NPR program "Here and Now" //WSUI-910. Pointing the loop in a NE direction brought in a weak 3rd station, most likely WOKY in Milwaukee. [RD-IA1]
- 940 WFAW WI, Fort Atkinson. 5/16 1450 - Fair in KPSZ null. Milwaukee Brewers BB. [RD-IA1]
- 1020 KJKK MN, Fergus Falls. 5/16 2256 - Fair in KDKA null with Minnesota Twins BB. [RD-IA2]

- 1030 WQSE TN, White Bluff. 5/17 0119 - Fair under WBZ with Southern Gospel music, ID: "...on WQSE...White Bluff, Tennessee..." [RD-IA2]
- 1050 WNES KY, Central City. 5/17 0117 - Good with "WNES 1050" heard in liner after Reba McIntire C&W oldie "Little Rock". [RD-IA2]

- 1180 WSQR IL, Sycamore. 5/13 1752 - Fair with "WSQR" in liner between oldies by the Charlie Daniels Band and Kansas. Situated about 12 miles from the transmitter of KJOC-1170 at the time of reception, splatter on 1180 was minimal when turning the loop 90 degrees from KJOC. [RD-IA1]
- 1190 WNBC WI, Sun Prairie. 5/13 1753 - Good with "Faith Radio" heard in promo. Turned the loop ESE (and away from Sun Prairie/Madison) in hopes of getting a daytime reception of WOWO, but it didn't show. [RD-IA1]
- 1460 KBRZ TX, Missouri City. 6/3 fair to poor signal, mixing with WKAM in KHOJ null; ACI from WMBD 1470. 02:33 noted with Bollywood-style music, local spots in heavily accented English. [EB-MO]
- 1490 WDBQ IA, Dubuque. 5/16 1501 - Fair in daytime pileup with "WDBQ" heard during ID time on the Chicago Cubs Radio Network. WZOE was topping the channel with Dave Ramsey at the time, and KBUR was airing the same, only able to separate the two at legal ID time. A 4th station was also audible when pointing the loop north, this one with satellite oldies -- WGEZ in Beloit is the most likely possibility. [RD-IA1]

- 1660 KQWB ND, West Fargo. 6/3 fair signal over KRZI. 03:03 noted with "KQWB West Fargo" legal ID coming out of a Classic Country format, into ABC News. [EB-MO]

- 1360 WKMI MI Kalamazoo – 5/26 2124 noted with "...mornings at nine on Talk 1360 WKMI" mention. A poor signal was noted with no sign of WTAQ and other stations. (JJR-MI)
- 1400 WBIZ WI Eau Claire – 5/23 2202 noted with "Sportsradio 1400 WBIZ" ID clearly heard. A poor signal was noted with WCCY (carrying Detroit Tigers baseball) nulled. (JJR-MI)
- 1420 WJUB WI Plymouth – 5/23 2200 noted with legal ID and "1420 The Breeze" jingle into SRN news. A poor signal was noted with WOC and KTOE tightly nulled. A rare reception in L'Anse! (JJR-MI)
- 1490 KXRA MN Alexandria – 5/25 0430 noted with "AM 1490, FM 100-point-3 KXRA Alexandria" legal ID into an ad for Toyota. Poor signal, above the mess then faded out. (JJR-MI)

- 1490 KOVC ND Valley City – 5/25 0321 noted with "...on Dakota Country Radio" mention into Country format. A poor signal was noted; lost in seconds. (JJR-MI)
- 1510 WUFC MA Boston – 5/25 2100 noted with "Yahoo! Sports Radio WUFC" ID by a male announcer. The signal was noted mixing with WLAC, WRNJ and unidentified stations carrying Christian talk and a Country format. (KK-VA)
- 1510 WRNJ NJ Hackettstown – 5/25 2040 noted with Oldies format, "Local news you can bank on" mention by a male announcer. "All day, every day" slogan by a female announcer noted, followed by a "WRNJ" ID by a male announcer. The signal was noted mixing with WLAC, WUFC and unidentified stations carrying Christian talk (Salem, NJ?-eb) and a Country format. (KK-VA)
- 1520 WMLM MI Saint Louis – 5/26 2206 noted with "Big M, 1520 AM wishing you a Happy Memorial Day" slogan. A poor signal was noted; lost to KOLM. (JJR-MI)
- 1520 WDSL NC Mocksville – 5/25 2011 noted with Country format, "Hey folks, I'm Ken Ressimyer, and this is your Classic Country and Bluegrass Connection, WDSL, Yahoo!" ID. The signal was noted mixing with WWKB and unidentified stations carrying Oldies, Talk and Christian music formats. (KK-VA)
- 1530 WMCE PA North East – 5/25 2001 noted with Oldies format, "Ladies and Gentlemen, You're Listening to The Greatest Hits of All Time, WMCE" ID by a male announcer. No mention of the AM or the FM on 88.5 in nearby Erie. The signal was noted mixing with WCKY and WLLQ. (KK-VA)
- 1540 WYNC NC Yanceyville – 5/25 2059 noted with a Southern Gospel format, "1540 WYNC Yanceyville" legal ID by a male announcer. The signal was noted mixing with WJJT, KXEL and unidentified stations with vocal music in Spanish, Oldies, a car race and China Radio International (CHIN Toronto-eb). (KK-VA)
- 1540 WJJT TN Jellico – 5/25 1938 noted with "The Gospel Music You Love is right here, WJJT Jellico" legal ID by a male announcer. Station #1,218 noted at Manassas. The signal was noted mixing with WYNC, KXEL, CHIN and unidentified stations carrying Talk, Oldies formats and vocal music in Spanish. (KK-VA)
- 1560 WKIK MD La Plata – 6/1 1926 noted with "Southern Maryland Country, WKIK" jingle by male vocalists. The signal was noted mixing with WSVB, WQEW, WYZD and an unidentified station carrying an Oldies format. (KK-VA)
- 1560 WYZD NC Dobson – 6/1 2030 noted with "You're listening to WYZD Dobson, North Carolina. A Gospel Broadcasting radio station, and streaming worldwide..." ID by a male announcer. The signal was noted mixing with WSVB, WQEW, WKIK and an unidentified station carrying an Oldies format. (KK-VA)
- 1570 WYTI VA Rocky Mount – 6/1 2100 noted with this sign off announcement: "WYTI Rocky Mount, Virginia now concludes its broadcast day; WYTI is operated on the assigned frequency..." by a male announcer. The signal was noted mixing with WNST, WFLR, WYTI and unidentified stations carrying an Oldies format and Christian vocal music. (KK-VA)
- 1580 WTCL FL Chattahoochee – 6/1 2030 noted with Spanish language programming, "WTCL 1580 Chattahoochee" legal ID in English by a female announcer. I know WTCL was silent. Perhaps DXers nearer to the station will verify they are on the air. The signal was noted mixing with WJFK, CKDO, WGYM and an unidentified station carrying Christian vocal music. This is the 1,220th station logged at Manassas. (KK-VA)
- 1580 WGYM NJ Hammonton – 6/1 2059 noted with vocal music in Spanish, "This is WGYM 1580 AM Hammonton, New Jersey" legal ID in English by a heavily accented male announcer. The signal was noted mixing with WJFK, CKDO, WTCL and an unidentified station carrying Christian vocal music. This is the 1,219th station logged at Manassas. (KK-VA)
- 1590 WIJK MD Ocean City – 6/1 2057 noted with CBS Sports Radio programming, "Sports Radio 1590 and 105-point-1 Ocean City, Ocean Pines" mention by a male announcer. The signal was noted mixing with WHGT, WFBR, WAKR and unidentified stations carrying ESPN Radio and Spanish language programming. (KK-VA)

UNIDENTIFIED

- 1570 unID 6/1 2050 noted with Adult Standards format, male announcer mentioned "WRKI" many times. WRKI is an FM station in Danbury, CT. Then, a really strange occurrence as the station begins playing Christmas music at 2100, such as "Sleigh Bells" and "Let It Snow". Was this an unannounced DX Test? The signal was noted mixing with WNST, WFLR, WYTI and an unidentified station carrying Christian vocal music. (KK-VA)
(The NRC AM Log doesn't list a station in Connecticut on 1570. Danbury is in western Connecticut; maybe a station across the state line in New York is simulcasting WRKI?-eb)

EDITOR'S NOTES

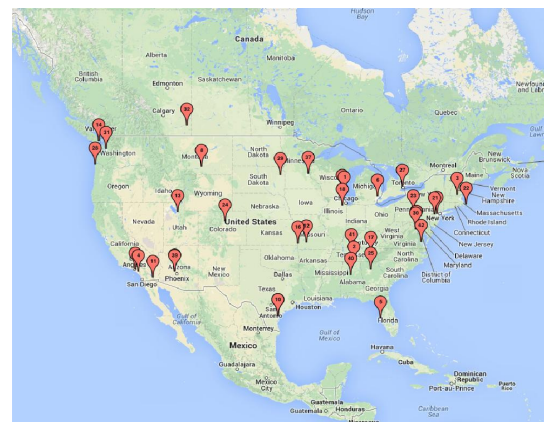
Kraig Krist says this about WKDV 1460: "Unfortunately, WKDV 1460 kHz, Manassas, VA is only 2.6 miles from my QTH. Unless they're off the air, 1460 is useless. I'm also amazed I'm able to hear anything on 1450 or 1470 kHz."

About Christmas music in summer: When I worked mornings at WSIE 88.7 Edwardsville, IL, I made it a habit of playing a Christmas song during the 6:00 a.m. hour the morning after the temperature hit 90 degrees or higher. Two Christmas songs, back to back, were played the morning after the high temperature was 100 degrees or higher. That would make the listener think cool thoughts, such as the cooler weather over Christmas.

FM DX season is in full swing at this end; one of the stations I heard on a May 25 E-skip opening was KURL 93.3 Billings, MT. Many of us remember KURL on 730 kHz (also in Billings); I heard the station on 730 during a 1994 DX Test. It took me a while to get the QSL; I'm glad it's part of my collection. A clip was sent to CDXR's John C. Johnson; he was amazed to hear that KURL 93.3 made it to the Midwest!

Trivia Time: Did you know that the original calls of WCBS were WABC? The flagship station of the CBS Radio Network, now on 880 kHz, was originally known as WABC. The flagship station of the NBC Red Network was known as WEAJ (now WFAN on 660 kHz) and the NBC Blue Network was known as WJZ. In 1943, NBC had to divest its Blue network; it later became known as the American Broadcasting Company (ABC). The flagship station of the ABC network (on 770 kHz) changed calls to WABC in 1947, shortly after the WABC calls were replaced by WCBS on 880 kHz. The WCBS calls were originally in Springfield, IL (later WCVS, now WFMB). The WJZ calls wound up on a TV station in Baltimore, MD; the calls are also on 1300 kHz in Baltimore and 105.7 MHz in suburban Catonsville.

As an added bonus to this column, I'm including a map where the recent DX Test from KCKM 1330 kHz Monahans, TX was heard. I was fortunate to catch this station on regular schedule.

Many DXers only think of radio in Tahiti [French Polynesia] as being the public radio station Polynesie La Premiere at 738 AM or have memories of listening to the long gone shortwave outlets of the same station in previous names such as Radio Tahiti, FR3 or ORTF.

In fact, the World Radio TV Handbook 2014 records more than 30 radio stations now broadcasting from these islands in the South Pacific.

Recently, a new radio survey shows local listening habits as clearly favoring private commercial radio [48.8% market share] and private non-commercial radio [37.0%] over public radio [11.5% market share] with popular stations including Radio Te Reo O Tefana, Polynesie La Premiere, Taui FM and La Voix de l'Esperance.

Changes are underway to some licences in French Polynesia, and some new stations are also planned to come on the air in Tahiti, Moorea and other islands.

Currently, the Pacific Asia Listener Guide [PAL] at www.radioheritage.net lists just 738 AM as broadcasting from Papeete, Tahiti.

One of the things that a DXer has to do is double-check his or her logs. This is especially true when the DXer keeps his or her logs on a computer program; I use Microsoft Excel for my logbooks. Thanks to this program, I am able to keep logs sorted in chronological order, as well as geographic logs in state and province order (for the U.S., Canada and Mexico) and country order for outside the U.S., Canada and Mexico, as well as frequency order (from 530 to 1700 kHz). A couple of weeks ago, I went over my chronological and geographic AM logbooks, and found that I didn't include 20 stations in my geographic logbook (which I use to determine how many I've logged from each U.S. and Mexican state and Canadian province) that are in my chronological logbook. Thanks to the reconciliation of these logs, I now have a third state from which I've logged over 100 stations: Texas. KJON 850 in Carrollton, which I logged 5/2, is my 100th AM from the Lone Star State. I'm also now one shy of my 100th AM station from Tennessee. My count from Missouri now stands at 105 after finding three stations in my chronological logbook I didn't add to my geographic log. I also found one from my former state of residence; my count from Georgia now stands at 63. I've also passed the 40-station mark from Indiana and Minnesota. On June 1, Louisiana was added to that list. At 0255 ELT on that particular day, I was hearing CBS Sports Radio programming on 910. I was thankful the signal was strong enough to take out KVIS, the usual dominant station on the frequency. The signal held long enough to get a legal ID out of this one; it was WUBR Baton Rouge, the 40th AM station logged from the Pelican State. Another Texan made it into the logbook on June 3, when I pulled in KBRZ 1460 Missouri City (a suburb of Houston) with South Asian music reminiscent of Bollywood movies and local ads in heavily accented English at 0233 ELT; the signal was mixing with WKAM while putting a null on KHOJ (10 miles away). KBRZ is my 103rd Texas AM station logged at Hazelwood. FM and TV DX season has gotten under way at my QTH; I added 20 new FM stations, three new analog TV stations (two Canadian and one low-power U.S. station), two new NOAA Weather Radio stations (both on 162.400 MHz) and two new digital TV stations during the E-skip opening 5/25. I even logged KURL 93.3 during that opening; I also logged it on 730 kHz during a 1994 DX Test. It seems that apart from the Anniversary Issue, I'm the only one that's submitted a Forum in recent months! As Editor-in-Chief of this bulletin, I encourage all our members to submit a Forum, especially our new members. I'd like to thank all of you who have supported our column editors and our club. You are what makes IRCA go. Without you, I wouldn't be putting together DX Monitor and editing Eastern DX Roundup, DX Worldwide East and SportChannels. 73.

I think everyone keeps their logs in the way they first did it when they started out so many years ago. I finally put my logs into the computer after I got to Indianapolis in 1999, which means eight different AM logs (plus another one to cover all of them) plus six FM logs (and one for all) plus three TV logs. For all of that, though, there are only three different formats I use. One is for what I hear/see, one for reporting/veries, and the third wraps up all the locations for each separate band by order in which it was heard. The only real overlapping on AM was from Echo, Dale County, Alabama where I kept a log for what I heard at my mother-in-law's place while I would be there on vacation. (That was her suggestion as she realized I got bored fast listening to the same gossip as different neighbors/relatives would drop in for a few minutes here and there. The stories and people didn't mean much to me, hi.) So, below is an example from my Indy log - hopefully people can read it. I couldn't print out the headings so from left, they are: Sequence (order in which heard), then sequence by state and frequency, reference to seq. in reporting log, seq by verie in the reporting log,

columns to let me know if I heard/verified it at another location, date heard, frequency, a box to X if it is a graveyarder, calls, new calls if they changed, state, city, time in military time (ELT), power when heard and distance in straight miles using a web based program.

?
So, this entry is telling me it's WELC-1150 in Welch, WV. It was the 122nd station heard here in Indy, the fourth from WV, the third on 1150. It was heard at 12:29 AM 3/26/2000 with a power of 5000 watts at a distance of 288 miles (give or take a mile or so). It was the first (and actually only) report sent from Indy and the only station verified from here. It's done on a database and I can sort using any one or up to three columns (of my choosing) at a time. It wasn't a hard log to put in the computer here as I started doing it right after I got here and have kept it current since then. I have a printout I make notes on and reprint pages as they get messy. The bad log to put in was from northwest Indiana as it was 1337 stations from 49 states and about 30 countries on four continents. I still don't have all the distances figured out there because I had five different locations there to figure them from. For the heard all log, the date is by year. Julian letter format (today as I type this would be 2014.155A) to keep things in good order. I needed to do that to set up the sequence numbers properly. Indy heard total is now 720. 73
