

- 1310 CIWW **ON**, Ottawa. 10/3 fair to poor signal over other stations. 0239 noted with local spots. [EB-MO]

### FLASHBACK

October 16, 1965 issue of "DX Monitor" ... Jack Paton of Winnipeg MB had logged 41 states ... John C Johnson of Pensacola FL talked about stations on the air all night during Hurricane Betsy. //October 13 1990 issue of "DX Monitor" ... Tom Jasinski of Shorewood IL told about the tornado that hit less than 5 miles from his location ... Rick Dau of Oakland IA commented on the local weather by explaining "global warming theory seems to have become reality" ... Mike Sanburn of Bellflower CA logged CBW finally after 15 years of DXing ... Frank Aden Jr of Boise ID mentioned KTOX changed to KUCL.

#### **OPEN MIKE**

As Hurricane Matthew is hitting Florida, flashback to 1965 when I was stationed with the US Navy in Pensacola, Florida as Hurricane Betsy hit New Orleans. There was damage in Pensacola, my only experience being close to a hurricane. Perhaps we'll see some DX reported this next week concerning stations special coverage of Matthew. #### Signal strength advantage of the Rockwork 4 site by Nick Hall-Patch

The "Rockwork 4" listening site situated on a cliff side pull out on Highway 101 north of Manazanita, Oregon, has been popularized by Gary DeBock, particularly as a DXpedition location to hear unusual New Zealand medium-wave broadcasting stations in the summer months. There is an ongoing question among DXers as to whether this site is unique in its ability to hear these weak stations from across the Pacific Ocean. Certainly the anecdotal evidence points in that direction, but until now there has been no real hard evidence, using parallel listening systems at the Rockwork 4 site, and from somewhere nearby. This past summer, I joined Gary and Tom Rothlisberger, as well as visiting DXers from Japan, Hiroo Nakagawa and Satoshi Miyauchi in an attempt to provide some of that evidence






Figure 2 - Nehalem Bay site



In the early morning hours of 11 July 2016, an AMRAD active whip antenna (http://www.amrad.org/wp-content/uploads/2014/12/actant.pdf.pdf) was quickly set up at the Rockwork 4 site (see Figure 3) to feed an RFSpace NetSDR connected to an Acer netbook in the back of Tom Rothlisberger's vehicle. This was configured to record the entire MW band while a similar system was set up by myself at another site at the Nehalem Bay campground a few minutes later. Figure 1 shows a Google Earth rendition of the Rockwork 4 site (see Figure 5), at a bearing of around 160 degrees. (all Google Earth images are aligned so that north is towards the top of the image)



The antenna at the Nehalem Bay campground was set up in the scrub behind the dunes, about 300m from the high water mark (see **Figure 4**). This site was slightly further inland from the water compared with Rockwork4, and although the antenna was placed to be above nearby foliage, it did not have the bird's eye view of the antenna at the Rockwork 4 site. It might have been better to have used a few hundred more feet of coax lead-in and placed the antenna on top of the dune between the ocean and the campsite, but time was short, and visibility was poor in the dark. On the other hand, as noted below, overall domestic signals were similar in strength to that observed at Rockwork4, so there was not that much evidence of poorer capability to pick up signals at the Nehalem Bay site.

#### Analysis of signals heard at both sites

A quick listen to the files from each site would lead to an easy conclusion: there was very little overseas DX heard at the Nehalem Bay site during a time period (1123-1248UT when there was some overseas audio being heard at the Rockwork 4 site. And, for example, on 900 kHz at 1228UT, ESPN radio was heard at both sites, but at Rockwork 4, it was from Hawaii, and at Nehalem Bay, it was Wenatchee, Washington. But that statement wouldn't exactly address whether DX signals were stronger at the Rockwork 4 site, or whether domestic signals were stronger at the Nehalem Bay site. I generally find that signal to interference ratio is the best indication of whether DX is likely to be heard, a ratio referred to by Mark Durenberger as "carrier to noise" (C/N), and that will be used in this article, though raw signal strength is important as well.

All SDR files were recorded using RF Space's SpectraVue software with a span between 450 and 1750 kHz. As with most SDR software, SpectraVue can display a "waterfall" representation of band conditions, although 9 kHz channel visibility is better when viewing a few hundred kilohertz of the band at a time. So files from approximately 1215 to 1245UT were played back using the waterfall display for both the Rockwork 4 and Nehalem Bay sites, allowing the entire time period to be displayed in one waterfall. Figure 6 shows the display from Rockwork 4, while Figure 7 shows the display from Nehalem Bay, with 1215UT at the bottom of the display and 1245UT at the top.

Note that some domestics appear stronger at Rockwork 4, including the San Francisco stations on 680 and 810 kHz, while Seattle area stations on 710 and 820 kHz are stronger at Nehalem Bay along with Portland stations on 750 and 860. As an example of site differences, KCBS-740 was found to average over 10dB greater strength at Rockwork 4 than at Nehalem Bay, while Nehalem Bay gave a 7dB advantage to KKXA-770. There is more electrical noise at Nehalem Bay, not surprising, given that it is a paved campsite full of motor homes with AC power to every site. Noise was both discrete (the spectral line at 666 is actually a spur for example) and diffuse (see around 680 kHz). There was also noise at Rockwork 4; particularly noted were annoying spurs in the 760 kHz region. It is surmised that these were picked up by poor placement of antenna lead-ins past DXer computers in the back of Tom's car; these spurs had not been observed on previous mornings.

It has been suggested that some of the success of the Rockwork 4 site was due to the undoubted "horizon blockage" of domestics effected by having a 25m high cliff continuing immediately up above the other side of the road, covered by a large wire mesh to contain rock pieces that randomly break off from the cliff. Certainly, lower signal strengths from Seattle and Portland stations can be observed comparing the waterfalls of **Figures 6** and **7**. But there are many domestic stations still unblocked to the south of the Rockwork 4 site, and they, such as the San Francisco stations in **Figure 7**, may well have been stronger at this southerly looking site.

Upon playback of a recorded SDR file in SpectraVue, it is possible, using the Continuum function, to record changing signal strength power values over time within different frequency passbands, from the full bandwidth of the file to less than a 1Hz wide passband in these 1300 kHz wide files. So, average signal power delivered over the entire 450 to 1750 kHz band was calculated for both the Rockwork 4 and Nehalem Bay sites using SpectraVue Continuum, followed by averaging the resultant .csv file in Microsoft Excel. Both NetSDRs' software had been calibrated to show signal strengths in dBm, so, given that exactly the same antenna was used at both sites.

The results showed that Nehalem Bay had a total average power across the MW band of -37.1dBm, while Rockwork 4 showed a total average power of -36.5dBm. It would appear that there was not an overall attenuation of domestic broadcasters at Rockwork 4, and from the waterfall display, we could see that any attenuation of domestic signal strength was not compensated for by very strong signals from the other side of the Pacific Ocean.

But, what about the DX? Star-657 was one of the better signals at Rockwork 4 during this DX session, as was Tahiti on 738. 657 provides a solid spectral line in **Figure 6**, while it is barely visible in **Figure 7**. Similar situations can be noted on other channels, such as 774, 792 and 828, which were weaker than 657 at Rockwork 4, but weaker yet at Nehalem Bay. 738 is more visible than 657 in **Figure 7**, but it is still weaker than in **Figure 6**, particularly later in the session.

As mentioned above, SpectraVue's Continuum function can also record very small passbands, down to 0.73Hz in this case, so one can look at the changing strength of a single AM station's carrier with little interference. With pre-calibration of receivers and using the same antennas, it was possible to record equivalent signal strengths at both sites for a number of exact frequencies, corresponding to DX signals on 657, 765, 774, 828 (New Zealand) 738(Tahiti), and 1116 (Brisbane, Australia). Because the DX signal levels were not very good at Nehalem Bay, approximately 10 minute long averages were taken of each signal at both sites during the time periods each particular signal was at its best strength at Nehalem Bay.

In addition, noise/splatter levels were recorded and averaged all in the same narrow passband as the DX carriers were. These were at 658,737, 768, 827, and 1117 kHz, frequencies close enough to the DX signals to give a good sample of the interference likely heard when listening to those signals. The results of the analysis of the recordings can be seen in the table below. "C/N" refers to "carrier to noise" strength, where the carrier strength in a narrow

The results of the analysis of the recordings can be seen in the table below. "C/N" refers to "carrier to noise" strength, where the carrier strength in a narrow passband is compared to the noise/splatter level in a similar narrow passband nearby as described in the previous paragraph. Where noise levels are noticeably different between sites, a note has been added as to the likely reason. The discrepancies observed between raw strength differences and C/N differences between the two sites seems heavily influenced by the relative strength of nearby domestic stations, as one might expect.

So, yes, Rockwork 4 has a raw signal strength and C/N advantage, at least for New Zealand and Pacific Island stations. Because we heard few Australians on 11 July 2016, it wasn't possible to say whether the relative disadvantage in raw signal strength at Rockwork 4 for 1116 is an anomaly. One very interesting point is that the direction of the cliffs at Rockwork 4 is very close to perpendicular to the likely direction of the arriving wave front from New Zealand and particularly from Tahiti.

It must be noted that although New Zealand was dominant on 765, 774 and 828, and Tahiti on 738, there was at least one more good strength carrier on those channels perhaps from Australia, which may have affected the results somewhat if we are considering New Zealand stations only.

There is quite a bit of complexity buried in the analysis here, and I am not certain that I understand all the details yet, if ever. And that doesn't even start to address why there is such a difference in reception capability between the sites. More study is obviously needed!

Jon Pearkins sent along a brochure from an unusual SDR, the Titus II, from a Panama-based company. It appears to be an Android tablet with a radio built around it: details at http://titusradio.com/ . Coverage is 100 KHz to 2 GHz, and includes a "balanced tuned ferrite antenna" for MW. One might suspect something that is being effectively crowd funded at this point, as "Shipments are scheduled to begin in the 4th Quarter of this year", but pre-ordering, with a suggested price under US\$100, simply expresses interest, not an actual payment. Jon also points out that one was shown at HFCC 2016 Miami (http://hfcc.org) and it "outperformed a DR-111 on a test broadcast from Vatican Radio" (http://swling.com/blog/2016/08/details-emerge-the-pantronx-titus-ii-drm-portablereceiver/); this test is probably not relevant for MW listeners, however.

There is no mention of actual bandwidth, beyond the fact that it will handle broadcast FM, so this is likely is more like a CommRadio CR-1, something that uses SDR technology to deliver individual signals, plus a graphical user interface. But, if they can sell it for under US\$100, and it has reasonable sensitivity, selectivity and signal handling, then it will be an interesting addition to the marketplace.
