AUSTRALIA: Seeing Craig's mention of hearing an announcement on 4WK 1359 about a move to FM, and finding no information about it on their website, I sent a query email to them. A prompt response from Kirsty Batchelor from 4WK Accounts/Administration today advises: "The new FM Frequency is 99.5FM and 4WK has been running on this frequency since the 10th August. 1359AM was shut down last night at 7pm and no longer will be running." CHINA: Pearl River EBS 1062 et al now IDs in English on the hour and half hour as "FM Ninetyseventyfour - Your Radio", All in Cantonese. (Tony Magon, RealDX)

FIJI: A NEWLY-rehabilitated medium wave AM infrastructure and transmission was launched by Fiji's Prime Minister Voreqe Bainimarama this morning. With the upgrade of the infrastructure, which is managed by national broadcaster Fiji Broadcasting Corporation (FBC), indicates 100 per cent coverage for the islands.

That means every Fijian in every community in Fiji can now tune to clear and dependable AM signals that will broadcast programs on the Radio Fiji One and Gold stations," Mr. Bainimarama said. He said it also meant listeners would now have access to critical flows of information - programming on youth development, women's issues, health, agriculture and many other important topics.

Mr Bainimarama said while the wide range of programming brought information that could be extremely useful in people's day to day lives, added "the right to access information is one of the most important rights my Government is sworn to uphold". GUAM: Agaña stations KUSG 1350 and KVOG 1530 both went silent on 1 July, having lost their licensed transmitting site - they will look for a new one. (NRC)

HONG KONG: End of 24/7 BBC World Service on 675 MW in Hong Kong and digital radio switch off. Hi Glenn, I recorded the moments when Radio Television Hong Kong (RTHK) switched off their DAB+ digital radio service at 1600 UT on 03 Sep 2017: https://youtu.be/mllLPqiZfHk At the same time, they ended their 27-year 24/7 BBC World Service rebroadcasting on 675 kHz mediumwave: https://youtu.be/w6ZdJww4Pxs Hope your readers find those videos a little interesting. According to various news sources, the BBCWS relay on 675 will be replaced with China National Radio Hong Kong Edition, mostly in Mandarin, apparently a special service tailored specifically to HK. BBCWS relay will continue overnight 1500-2300 UTC. (bp)

INDIA: All India Radio adds to massive digital radio deployment with four 100 kW and two 200 kW NX transmitters.

Hackett's Cove, Nova Scotia - Nautel Limited has shipped six additional high-power DRM-enabled MW transmitters for deployment at All India Radio, the largest digital broadcasting system in the world. Four 100 kW NX100 and two 200 kW NX200 transmitters were shipped to India in July 2017 for installation in six cities. The transmitters will be commissioned by Nautel's in-country partner Comcon in association with India's Prasar Bharati.

The July, 2017 shipment of 6 NX transmitters complements the 27 NX transmitters which are already on air with DRM transmission throughout India. The massive project has the goal of bringing digital radio to nearly a billion residents of the country. The new transmitters will be installed at All India Radio (AIR) facilities in Hyderabad, Jagdalpur, Vishakhapatnam, Bhawanipatna, Jeypore and Sambalpur. All 33 transmitters in the AIR project are configured for DRM30 operation.

MICRONESIA: According to the Station Manager who I met at an ABU meeting in Honiara in mid-August, V6AI Yap operates from 7am-11pm Yap time [2100-1300 UTC], daily 7 days a week on 1494 kHz with 10KW. (Martin Hadlow, NZDXT)

NEW ZEALAND: We have confirmation from Dudley Scantlebury that the Gisborne Rhema station on 684 AM has closed down and the mast will be dismantled very soon. To take up some of the coverage of the old Gisborne AM station, Rhema broadcasts on 103.7FM in Gisborne and 92.5FM in Wairoa in Northern Hawkes Bay. The old Gisborne AM transmitter has been moved to Taranaki with Star using it at 5Kw on 612 AM. So, there are now stations carrying the Star network on 612 at Christchurch, Nelson and Taranaki. TIMOR-LESTE: Mediumwave is a thing of the past in Timor-Leste. 684 Radio Timor-Leste in Dili has been gone for several years now. 1404 Radio Timor Kmanek also in Dili was last heard, most irregularly, four years ago, and now remains just on FM. (David Foster, ARDXC)

TONGA: According to RNZ International on 4 July, the Tongan Government proposes selling off 49% of the Tonga Broadcasting Commission to private ownership. (Bryan Clark, NZDXT)

EUROPE, AFRICA, AND THE MIDDLE EAST

DENMARK: Three new radio stations are due to launch in Copenhagen on MW within the next couple of months. The stations will be broadcasting on 846 (300 W), 927 (300 W) and 1440 kHz (power not yet confirmed, but max. allowed is 500 W). Two of the stations will be music based and the third all talk. (Stig Hartvig Nielsen, Ydun's Medium Wave Info 4 Aug 2017)

ERITREA: Voice of the Broad Masses of Eritrea – Programme 1 was observed on the off-channel mediumwave frequency of 950 kHz (WRTH indicates this is an 'alternative frequency') at 18:20 UT on 31 July 2017. Typical HoA music followed by vernacular news and sign-off with choral anthem, finishing at 18:32 UT – transmitter switch-off was at 18:36. This was monitored with fair to poor reception via a remote web SDR in Oman. Signal on (parallel?) 7150 kHz was too weak and noisy to confirm ID in the time available. Incidentally, this Oman rx gives good round-the-clock reception of the Saudi-based Radio Sanaa surrogate on 11860 kHz – It can be accessed via the portal at www.sdr.hu (David Kernick, DXLD 1 Aug)

FRANCE: Radio France 162 longwave is now regularly operating with 1100kw, after a trial period at 800kw. The weekly maintenance break on Tuesdays has been rescheduled to 8am to 12 noon, so there are no night outages anymore. The CSA received 4 expressions of interest for broadcasting on 162 kHz. But none showed how they could sustain operations, lacking a business model to cover the heavy operational costs. As a result, CSA decided not to open formal allocation procedures that in the end would lead to nothing. (Kai Ludwig 18 June via WWDXC Contact 7/17)

ISLE OF MAN: Intriguing announcement on the Radio Caroline website: "Caroline North – Our friendship with Manx Radio will extend further and longer than we imagined. The 1368 AM transmitter on the island that was scheduled for closure will now be overhauled to stay on air. Maybe we will have more to announce on the day." Caroline North continues via Manx Radio and online, many listeners have told the station that they have found Caroline again after a very long time! Great programming. (Mike Terry, mwdx 15 Aug-2017)

LITHUANIA: According to the Lithuanian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, a new 200kw Nautel NX-200 transmitter has been inaugurated on 1386 kHz at Viešintos in northeast Lithuania to broadcast Radio Liberty programs in Russian to the Russian Federation, Belarus and Ukraine. The new transmitter will replace the old 75kw unit at Sitkunai, which worked for about 40 years. The US-funded broadcasting of Radio Liberty, launched in 1953 from West Germany, but was jammed in the Soviet Union. Between 1991 and 2012 Radio Liberty was allowed to operate within Russia, but since then has only been available on the Internet. (TASS report via Anatoly Klepov in Glenn Hauser's DXLD Yahoo Group)

MOROCCO: New LW transmitter planned for 207 kHz. After interruptions in broadcasting due to breakdowns, the longwave transmitter located between Azilal and Ait in the centre of Morocco will be replaced. A tender was launched for an AM / DRM radio transmitter with a power of 800 kW configured in two blocks of 400 kW and for the repair of the mast 300.50 m high. The names of the companies that won the offer will be known in a few days.

The station broadcasting on 207 kHz is AI Ida AI Watania [SNRT National Network], a general radio which offers varied programs ranging from information to culture through to entertainment, with a variety of musical programming. NETHERLANDS: Groot Nieuws Radio will continue using 1008 kHz until 28 February 2018 and possibly until 31 December 2018, if no maintenance is needed. Novec, the owner of the transmission facility, wanted to end broadcasting from the site but agreed to an extension. SLOVENIA: Radio Slovenija's transmitter in Domzale 918 kHz was switched off for financial reasons on September 4th, 2017 at 1205 Local Time.

Here's the info I got from the engineer at Domzale:

"Hello, Patrick!

It's true, yesterday at 12:05 locally we switched-off our central MW transmitter (918 kHz), mainly due to economic reasons. I'm afraid that it will stay switched off in the future, but – for now – In a stand-by mode (ready for transmission in a short time, if necessary).

Our FM and DAB+ network is already sufficient for practically complete coverage of the country, plus there are other ways of delivering programme to our listeners abroad. This fact, relatively high costs of energy and maintenance, and diminishing audience of listeners on MW band led to the decision to cease with transmission on 918 kHz.

That said, a few other MW transmitters will continue to operate – on location Beli Križ (549 and 1170 kHz) and Murska Sobota (558/648 kHz). These are transmitters with lower power output and smaller coverage, transmitting mainly radio programme for Italian and Hungarian minorities in Slovenia.

On June 10 2017, I took delivery of an Ultralight receiver, a CountyComm GP-5/SSB Gen 3. For the first month of Ultralight DXing, I used the highsensitivity AM antenna (smaller than my hand) that came with the receiver. I found the receiver to be excellent on the AM broadcast band; it also has shortwave in AM and single sideband modes, and a very good FM section. Even with the telescoping rod antenna, I can pull in the local FM relays and It does an excellent job on the graveyard channels, especially at night. With the new Ultralight, I've logged ten new stations, including two call letter changes. I reached my 70th AM station from Wisconsin on July 15 at 0349 ELT when I caught WRDN 1430 with an ID and Country music. Local KZQZ was off for maintenance. 25 minutes later, at 0414, I logged my 50th Indiana AM when WBNL 1540 Boonville took out KXEL with an ID and Easy Listening music. On August 22 at 0600, I logged my 1,700th AM at my present location when I pulled in a logal ID and CBS News from WBEX 1490 Chillicothe OH. On August 21, I had the radio on instead of being outside to see the total solar eclipse. I missed being in the area of totality by 15 miles; I was more interested in finding out which stations I pulled in during the eclipse. Semi-local WQQW 1510 Highland IL was overtaken by WLAC during the eclipse, while local KATZ 1600 was nullable; they were probably on night power and pattern. KBOA 1540 Kennett MO was taking out WSMI at 1421 with Adult Standards and mention of AM 1540 and 98.7 FM (WGCQ Hayti MO). WCKY 1530 Cincinnati OH practically obliterated WLIQ at 1424 with NFL talk and an ID mentioning Cincinnati. A big surprise was Morse Code on 1360 at 1435 before WNAH Nashville TN identified in voice mode, mentioning the eclipse and QSL cards for correct reception reports. WLIJ 1580 Shelbyville TN topped the channel with an ID and Country music at 1443. WSLM 1220 Salem IN took out KLPW at 1450 with call letters and Country music. KRHW 1520 Sikeston MO was noted with call letters and Classic Country music at 1453. The signal enhancement from the solar eclipse faded by 1500. The next eclipse will be in April 2024, and the peak of totality will be east of St Louis. 73 from the Florissant Valley Dial Twister.

Introduction: Once in a great while everything seems to fall perfectly into place! After 12 Medium Wave DXpeditions to the sheer ocean side cliff near Manzanita, Oregon we had experienced everything from dicey weather, touch-and-go propagation and even turf claims by "sleeping squatters" as we set up our antennas in the predawn darkness. Despite the challenges we had established Rockwork 4 as the premier west coast location for chasing New Zealand MW-DX, even to the extent that the site had gained the nickname of the "Kiwi Cliff." But I was personally convinced that the location had far more to offer – and it was certainly going to prove it in a major way this time.

From August 1-9 an all-out effort was made to chase South Pacific DX at the sheer cliff, along with my DXpedition partners Tom Rothlisberger (from August 2-7) and Chuck Hutton (from August 1-3). Despite the ocean cliff's reputation as a magnet for dicey weather all 9 days were free of any rain, and practically free of wind. During each predawn antenna setup session we were treated to dazzling displays of the Milky Way galaxy in the skies above our DXing venue. This was far and away the most favorable weather any of us had ever experienced at this highly exposed site, and it almost seemed bizarre in comparison to the vicious wind and rain that pounded the Japanese visitors as we welcomed them in last year's July 2016 DXpedition.



My own DXpedition started with an overnight drive in from Puyallup, Washington in the early morning of August 1st, during which the largest collection of ferrite this side of the Ukraine rolled over the Columbia River bridge at the bizarre hour of 0200 local time. My Toyota Corolla was absolutely crammed with 5 very large FSL (ferrite sleeve loop) antennas, a creation of the U.K.'s Graham Maynard introduced in 2011 (which has probably provided early retirement options for the Ukrainian ferrite sellers on eBay). After arriving at the wild ocean cliff site at 1020 UTC (0320 local time) I set up the first FSL antenna to chase 1017-Tonga – which was very cooperative. As daybreak approached Chuck drove up, and we proceeded to check out the MW propagation on other frequencies. The very rare 2 kW Kiwi station 531-More FM (which has never been heard anywhere on the west coast except here) was pounding in at the strongest level I had ever heard, pretty much setting the tone for the propagation that we would experience for the rest of the week. Tom joined us on the next day, and participated in the Australian propagation bonanza on August 4th (during which we tracked down two Western Australia stations at over 9,000 miles, or 14,000 km). Overall this August 2017 DXpedition has been far and away the most productive Rockwork 4 trip ever, with the two Western Australians (531-6DL and 558-

Overall this August 2017 DXpedition has been far and away the most productive Rockwork 4 trip ever, with the two Western Australians (531-6DL and 558-6WA) received at decent levels, five stations received on 531 kHz alone (PI, More FM, 2PM, 4KZ and 6DL), 558-Fiji completely restored and reaching S9 levels, an S9 recording of 585-2WEB (confirmed by David Sharp), the best-ever signals from the Kiwis on 531 (More FM), 603, 657, 765, 936 and 1503, monster signals from 585-7RN and 639-5CK, multiple receptions of 1017-Tonga, etc. Even when we needed to dodge the "sleeping squatters" it was a lot of fun to share the cliff with my DXpedition partners Tom and Chuck, especially during the phenomenal August 4th session (when Tom and I both made out like bandits). I'm sure that both of us will remember that wild and wacky session for years to corne!

All of these and the other South Pacific loggings below were received with Ultralight radios and huge "airport unfriendly" FSL antennas (guaranteed to cause security alerts at any TSA screening checkpoint). Signals which reached an S9 level are listed with a double asterisk (**). Special thanks is in order for Theo Donnelly, Andrew Brade, James Niven, Todd Emslie, Bill Whitacre, David Sharp, Walt Salmaniw and any others who assisted in the identification of the following stations (and especially to my DXpedition partner Tom Rothlisberger, who researched parallel stations for the two Western Australia loggings).
